DENNY CRUM, University of Louisville basketball coach, on his contract: "I'm getting \$300,000, but over 150 years."

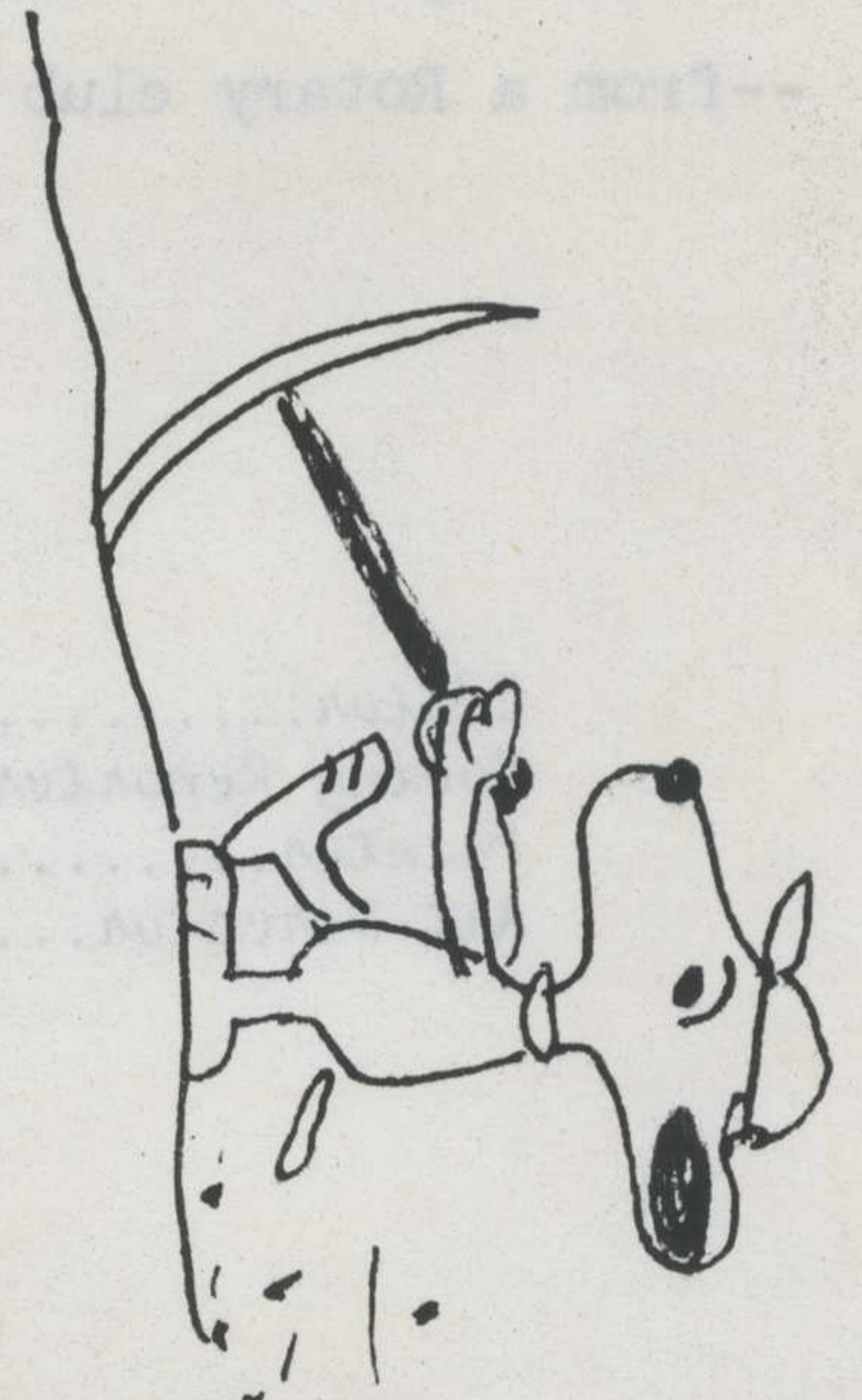
PROGRAM

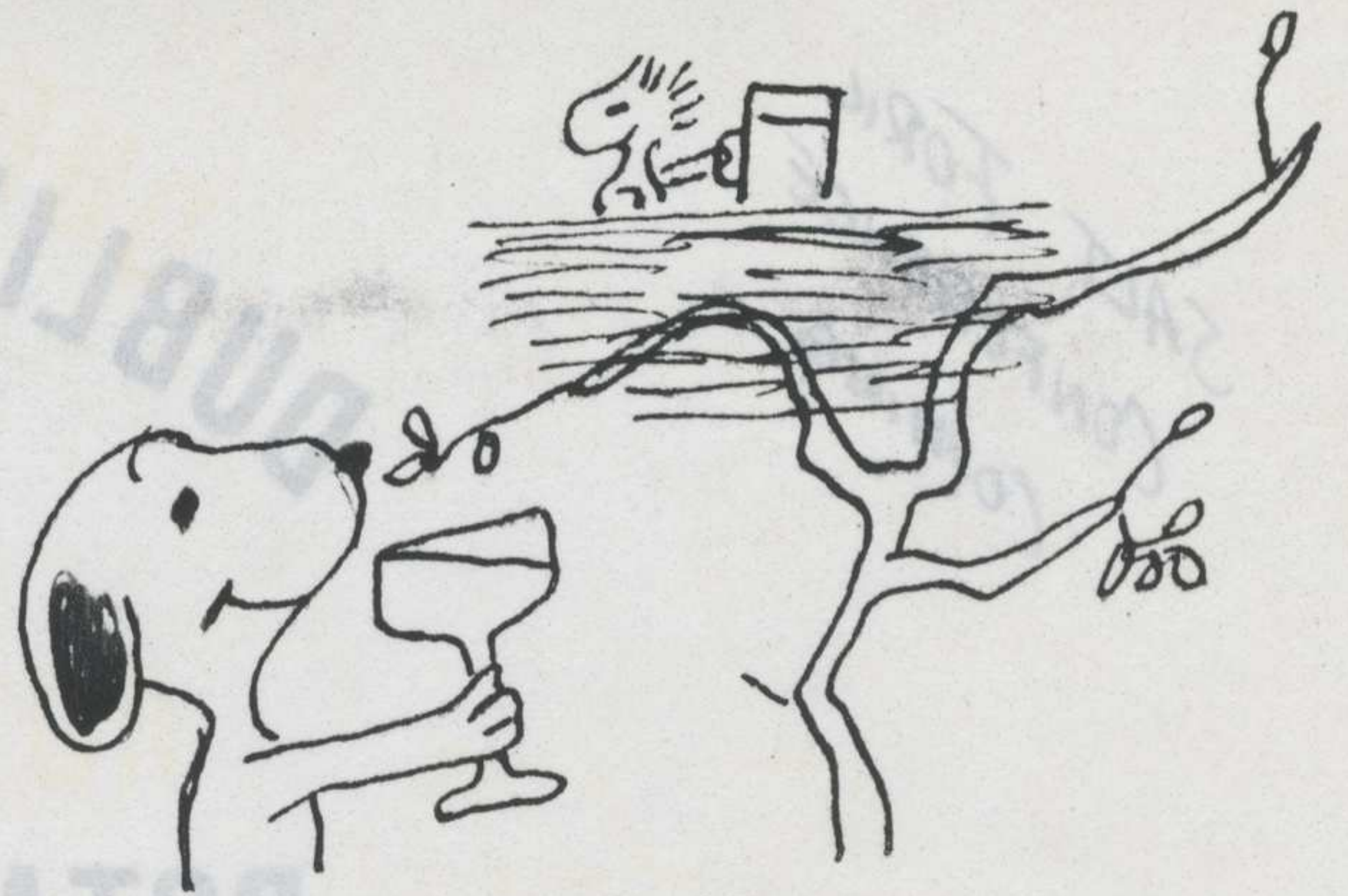
