

# Mansion Along The Scioto

(The Mansion along the Scioto is now owned by the City of Dublin and houses the Dublin Arts Council.)



7125 Riverside Drive

In 1913c Columbus attorney and businessman, Charles S. M. Krumm, purchased 11.28 acres in Perry Township, along the east side of the Scioto River. (South of Bright Road and Riverside Drive) On his land were two historic landmarks: remnants of Corbin's grist mill and the Ferris Pioneer Cemetery.

At the site of Corbin's Mill, Charles and his wife Sarah, built a summer home using the old mill's foundation. After enjoying over twenty summers in their cottage, the family chose to build a permanent home several hundred feet north and closer to Riverside Drive.

## The Ferris Cemetery

In 1930 the Ferris Cemetery was in good condition with at least twenty-four standing tombstones. By 2003 only broken pieces could be found in the tree line along Riverside Drive. Several of those pieces have been reset beside the sign.

Diaries of early settlers confirm the burials of Pioneers David Smith and his wife, Elizabeth.

The Cemetery sign was made by Linworth Methodist Church Historical Society member Ed Pollock and placed at the Cemetery site by the City of Dublin in 2003.

The Ferris Cemetery is located approximately seven hundred feet south of Bright Road on the east side of Riverside Drive. The Cemetery is across the road from the Mansion along the Scioto.

The land that included the Ferris Cemetery remained with the Krumm Family until Albert Krumm was killed in an airplane crash December 16, 1960 in New York City.

### Corbin's Mill

In the early 1800's, a stone grist mill was built on the east side of the Scioto River, one mile north of Dublin. It was later destroyed by fire. In 1855 Norris Corbin built a frame mill on the original site.

In 1913 Maggie Mae Corbin painted a picture of the mill for her friend and neighbor, Jennie Thompson, who was sick with tuberculosis.

It is the only known picture of the mill.
