CONSTITUTION (Revised April 28, 1958)

ARTICLE I - NAME

This organization shall be known as The Activity Club.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of this club shall be to assist the children of Worthington schools in social development and to sponsor ballroom dancing.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section I. Active membership shall be limited to thirty members. No member may miss over three consecutive meetings without a legitimate excuse and remain a member of the club.

Section II. Any member must signify in writing by or at the March meeting if she wishes to withdraw from the club or she may petition for a leave of absence of one year. Resignations would be effective the following September.

Section III. New Membership:

A. New members may be considered only when a vacancy exists in the active roll.

- B. The name of a prospective member, together with the names of the two active members sponsoring her, shall be submitted to the membership chairman on forms provided for that purpose by February first.
 - C. No member may sponsor more than one person per year for membership.
 - D. A list of the names of those sponsored for membership along with the respective sponsors shall be prepared by the membership committee to be read at the February meeting.
 - E. Election of new members shall be held at the March meeting by secret ballot. Absentee ballots shall be accepted by the membership chairman up to the time of the meeting.
 - F. A candidate must receive a majority vote of the total active membership
 to be elected. A second ballot shall
 be taken only in the event of a tie for
 one of the vacancies. If a second ballot is necessary, only the names of
 those figuring in the tie shall be voted
 upon and the one receiving the majority
 vote of those present shall be elected.

G. Three tellers shall be appointed by the President to count the ballots.

ARTICLE IV - DUES

The annual dues for club members shall be \$1.00, payable in September. All members whose dues are unpaid at the close of the December meeting shall then be notified by the Treasurer. Members failing to pay dues for any current year shall be dropped from the list.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS & DUTIES

The officers of this club shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. These officers shall perform the usual functions of their respective offices.

The President shall preside at all the meetings.

The Vice President shall preside in the absence of the President and shall serve as chairman of the program committee.

The Secretary shall keep complete records of all regular meetings. She shall also take care of all correspondence. The Treasurer shall keep a complete record of all receipts and expenditures and present a report at each regular meeting.

ARTICLE VI - ELECTIONS

Section I. At the April meeting of the election year, the nominating committee, appointed by the President at the March meeting, shall present a list of candidates for the offices to be filled.

Section II. A majority of those voting shall elect.

Section III. The official term of office shall be for two years.

Section IV. New officers shall take office at the May meeting.

ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS

Meetings shall be held on the fourth Monday of the month. Three members shall be hostesses at each of the meetings. One member to furnish the home and beverage, the other two members are to furnish light refreshments. The list of hostesses shall be made up at the April meeting.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the membership, provided that the proposed amendment has been read at the previous meeting.

HISTORY

In the late summer of 1937, Mrs. Mariam Mackay invited a group of Worthington women to her home to present to them her ideas as to how the youth of the community could be helped with their social and personal problems. The aim was to bring to all, new opportunities for social activities with the accent on personality development - not to entertain but to stimulate correct thinking about social problems, to strengthen personalities, overcome shyness and eliminate class distinctions.

With the women's support, Mrs. Mackay presented the idea to the local Parent-Teacher Association who then sponsored the group. The Worthington Women's Club also offered its services and support.

The first members were not all mothers but all had an understanding of young people and an earnest desire to serve them. With the help of the superintendent, Mr. McCord, the principal and the teachers, the work began. The high school girls submitted questions and suggestions for discussion for the meetings. The best obtainable authorities within the means of the club were provided to conduct these discussions.

Among the many speakers have been Mark Russell, Dr. Samuel Shellabarger, Dr. W. H. Licklider and Mrs. John Bricker.

Members of the club along with volunteers had teas for small groups of high school girls where they served as hostesses as well as guests.

Both boys and girls needed to learn and improve their ballroom dancing. Kathryn Simonds of Columbus School for Girls was paid \$25.00 an evening to teach dancing and each pupil paid a fee of 25¢. This was a new experience for both Miss Simonds and Activity Club. Unfortunately, the first venture did not meet expenses and the deficit was made up by benefit parties. Later the dance class expenses were estimated and pupils were

charged accordingly. As the first of its kind in the country, the dancing program steadily grew in popularity and has now been imitated in many schools in this area.

The original "Personality Club" met at the library or school with no refreshments or social aspect. Later, because of the broadening interests, the group was renamed "The Activity Club". To create more enthusiasm and interest, meetings were held in the homes of members and a more closely knit group came into being.

The present purposes of the club remain practically the same as the original ones. The school has now taken over many of the former services of the group. The style shows, assemblies, teas, library periods with book reviews, reading helps conducted by the librarian, New Year's Eve dance, Halloween party, Senior tea and Freshman mixer have been discontinued. The main projects of the club are sponsoring ballroom

dancing lessons, a party at Christmas time for the afternoon dance classes and their mothers and a dance for the evening classes with the music being furnished by an orchestra. Our Senior Reception for the graduating students and their families after commencement has been deeply appreciated by the entire community.

As the treasury has increased greatly through the remuneration from the dancing classes, the money has been disbursed for the suggested needs of the youth, such as: record, printing press, books and magazines for the library, radios, movie screens, a water fountain and tape recorders.

Much of the success of the club can be attributed to the fact that through the years it has become a tradition that a member never answers "no" when asked to do a job.
