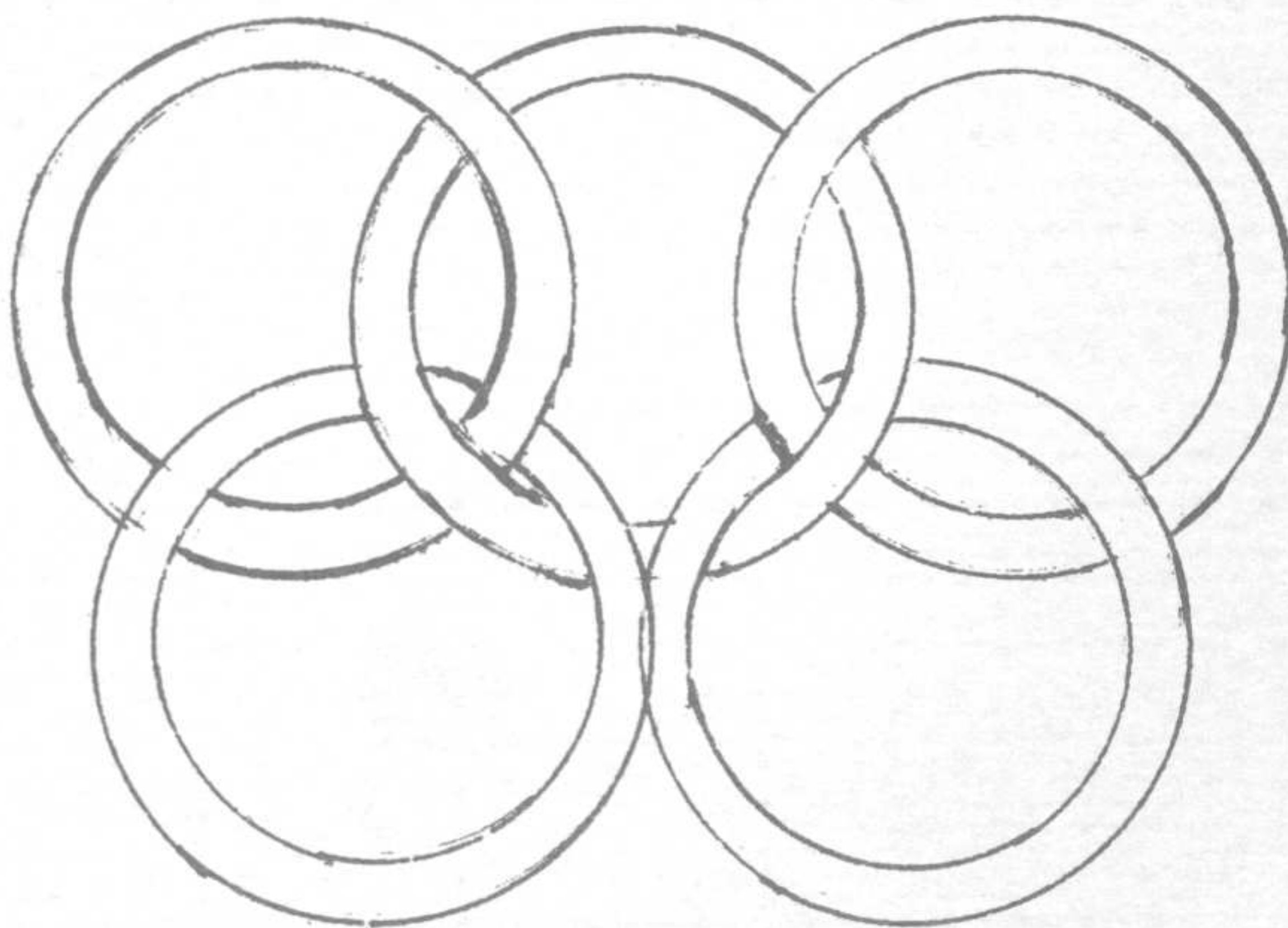

5. LIGHTING THE OLYMPIC FLAME — An arrangement using red and/or orange flowers.
6. THE OLYMPIC HYMN — Religious interpretation. Accessories permitted.

SECTION B — WINTER GAMES

7. HOST COUNTRY—FRANCE—An arrangement incorporating a wine container.
8. BOBSLEDDING — Hogarth curve.

RULES

1. Entries are open to amateurs only.
2. Specimen flowers must be grown by the exhibitor. Containers will be furnished. All foliage growing on the stem must be present.
3. Homegrown flowers only may be used in arrangements, but need not be grown by exhibitor.
4. No artificial or artificially colored plant material or water may be used unless otherwise stated. All plant materials in arrangements should be listed on the back of the entry tag.
5. Accessories are permitted only as specified.
6. An exhibitor may compete in as many classes as desired, but may make only one entry in a class. Only one member of a household may compete in any one class, except in the Junior Divisions.
7. All exhibitors must register and be assigned a number. They must present registered entries at the door of the exhibition hall to the Staging Committee between 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Sunday, August 11, 1968. Entries arriving after 11:00 a.m. will be marked "Not for Competition."
8. Judging will start promptly at 11:15 a.m. Only authorized persons will be allowed in the exhibition hall during judging.
9. Ribbons will be awarded as follows:
 - First — Blue ribbon — 3 points
 - Second — Red ribbon — 2 points
 - Third — White ribbon — 1 point
 - Honorable mention at the discretion of the judge.

MOST POINTS

An award will be made for the best arrangement in each of Sections A, B, C, D and F (classes 1 through 27), and the best entry in each of Sections H, I, J, M, N; and O.
10. Senior sweepstakes award will be made for the highest total points in all Sections excluding Sections E, G, K and L.
11. The Guy Morgan Memorial Trophy will be awarded for the highest total points in Section K.
12. A Junior Sweepstakes Award will be made for the highest total points in Sections G and L.
13. In Sections N and O, only clean, healthy plants will be accepted. Plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least 90 days.
14. Exhibits not meeting the specifications of the schedule will be disqualified; any award may be withheld at the discretion of the judges and show chairman.
15. No exhibit may be removed before 7:00 p.m. on the day of the show.
16. The management will not be responsible for the loss of exhibits or awards not claimed at the close of the show.
