Sow seeds of Petunias, Snapdragons, Ager-
atum, Asters, etc.

A dormant spray of lime-sulphur or miscible
oil will control scale

Reminders for April

Topdress the lawn with commercial fertilizer, 20 pounds of arsenate of lead per 1000 square feet of lawn will control Japanese beetle grub.

Plant Gladiolus bulbs if you desire early bloom. Cosmos, Marigolds and Zinnia seed may be sown in permanent location.

Tulips respond to a dressing of fertilizer

The ideal garden fertilizer is cow manure to which superphosphate has been added

Dust Delphiniums and Hollyhocks with sulphur.

Chrysanthemums must be divided and transplanted now to insure sturdy plants for fall blooming

Reminders for May

Control dandelions by spraying with 2-4-D.
Set lawn mower to cut the grass 2" high.

Dust or spray Roses at 10 day intervals to
control blackspot, aphids, rose chafer, etc.

Stake perennials if necessary

Leave tops on Narcissus, Tulips and other
perennial bulbs.

Remove old flower heads from tulips that
have finished flowering.

For continuous bloom plant Gladiolus every
two weeks.

Spring flowering shrubbery can be cut back
after it has finished blooming.

Reminders for June

Bare spots in perennial border may be filled in with your favorite annual.

Keep the perennial and annual beds weeded.

Dust Zinnias and Hollyhocks with sulphur.

If plants need water— soak, do not sprinkle.

Keep the Chrysanthemums pinched back to produce bushy plants.

Poison Ivy may be killed by spraying with 2-4-D or Ammate.

Rotenone will control bean beetles.

D.D.T. will control flea beetles.

Supplementary feeding should start when plants are half grown.

Reminders for July

2-4-D will control ragweeds.

Last call for sowing quick growing annuals to fill in borders and provide plenty of color in Autumn.

Keep Phlox blooms cut.

If necessary, replant the Daffodil bed.

Make notes on gaps in borders, and where color and heights are not right— replant in fall.

Give Roses a cupful of liquid manure every two weeks to encourage maximum fall bloom.

Set out Cabbage for a late crop.

Divide and transplant Iris.

Cut Delphinium flowers— another crop will be produced in September.

Renovate the old Lily-of-the-Valley beds.

Reminders for August

Start preparing for a new lawn.

Madonna Lilies may be planted.

Order perennials that will make good showing next year.

Chrysanthemums will respond to side dressing of fertilizer.

Spray Nasturtiums to kill plant lice— use nicotine.

Remove Asters that are stunted and yellowed.

Watch for crabgrass in lawn, mow high and remove plants when young.

Remove canes from raspberries which produced fruits this season.

Pick vegetables when they are young and tender.

CONSTITUTION

Article I — Name

The name of this organization shall be —
“The Worthington Garden Club.”

Article II — Object

The object of this club shall be:
To encourage a love for growing plants,
To develop an appreciation of garden design,
To promote village pride in constructive planning and planting,
To aid all State conservation and creation of beauty.

Article III — Officers

Section 1. The officers of this club shall be:
a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer.

Section 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of this Club and of the Executive Committee, and shall be “ex-officio” member of all committees.

Section 3. The Vice-President shall perform all duties of the President in her absence.

Section 4. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Club; shall keep a list of all members; and shall issue all notices of meetings.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall collect, hold and disburse funds of the club as directed by vote, shall keep accurate accounts which shall at all times, be open to inspection, and issue receipts for all paid dues.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall be responsible for correspondence between the club and other organizations.

Article IV — Committees

Section 1. The affairs of this Club shall be managed by an Executive Committee, consisting of the officers of the Club, with three others, appointed by the President at the first meeting following the Annual Election.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee (of three) shall be appointed by the President at the meeting preceding the Annual Meeting, to present names of candidates for balloting at the Annual Meeting.

Section 3. A Membership Committee (of three) shall be appointed by the President at the first meeting following the Annual Meeting. This committee shall work for the up-building of the membership, soliciting new members who are interested in the purposes of the Club. It shall recommend these candidates to the Executive Committee for further action.

Section 4. A Program Committee (of three) shall be appointed by the President at the first meeting following the Annual Meeting, to as-

sign topics for discussion by members at ensuing meetings; to arrange for talks or lectures by invited speakers, and to plan Garden Tours, etc.

Section 5. The Executive Committee may create any other committees and determine their duties and these may then be appointed by the President.

Section 6. The Civic Committee (of three) shall be appointed by the President at the first meeting following the Annual Meeting, to cooperate with the village officials on affairs which are of interest to the Club, also introduce projects for village improvement.

Article V — Membership

Section 1. All names for membership shall be presented in writing to the chairman of the Membership Committee, together with the name of members proposing the name, and shall be voted upon by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Chairman of Membership Committee shall inform all members of their election.

Section 3. All members shall perform such duties as are assigned.

Section 4. The membership of the Club is to be limited to 50 families.

Article VI — Dues

Section 1. Dues of this Club shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per year per family, payable at the June meeting.

Section 2. Members admitted in mid-year or after, shall pay one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) the yearly dues.

Section 3. All dues shall be paid within one month of the date of Election for new members, and within one month of the June meeting for other members or membership shall be terminated.

Article VII — Meetings

Section 1. The Annual Meeting shall be in June, and officers shall then be elected for the ensuing year; these officers shall assume their duties September 1st.

Article VIII — Quorum

Seven members of this Club shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business.

Article IX — Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, provided such amendment has been presented for discussion at previous meeting.

Section 2. This Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the Executive Committee, but such amendment may be vetoed by a two-thirds vote of the registered membership.

Section 3. The past presidents constitute an Advisory Board for the Club.
