

DR. GLATT MOURNED

MARC members were especially saddened by the death Sept. 19, 1975, of Dr. Charles Glatt.

Dr. Glatt, who was a professor of Educational Development at OSU, was slain in Dayton while working on a desegregation plan for the Dayton public schools.

Dr. Glatt, a compassionate and committed man, worked on behalf of deprived and disadvantaged children.
