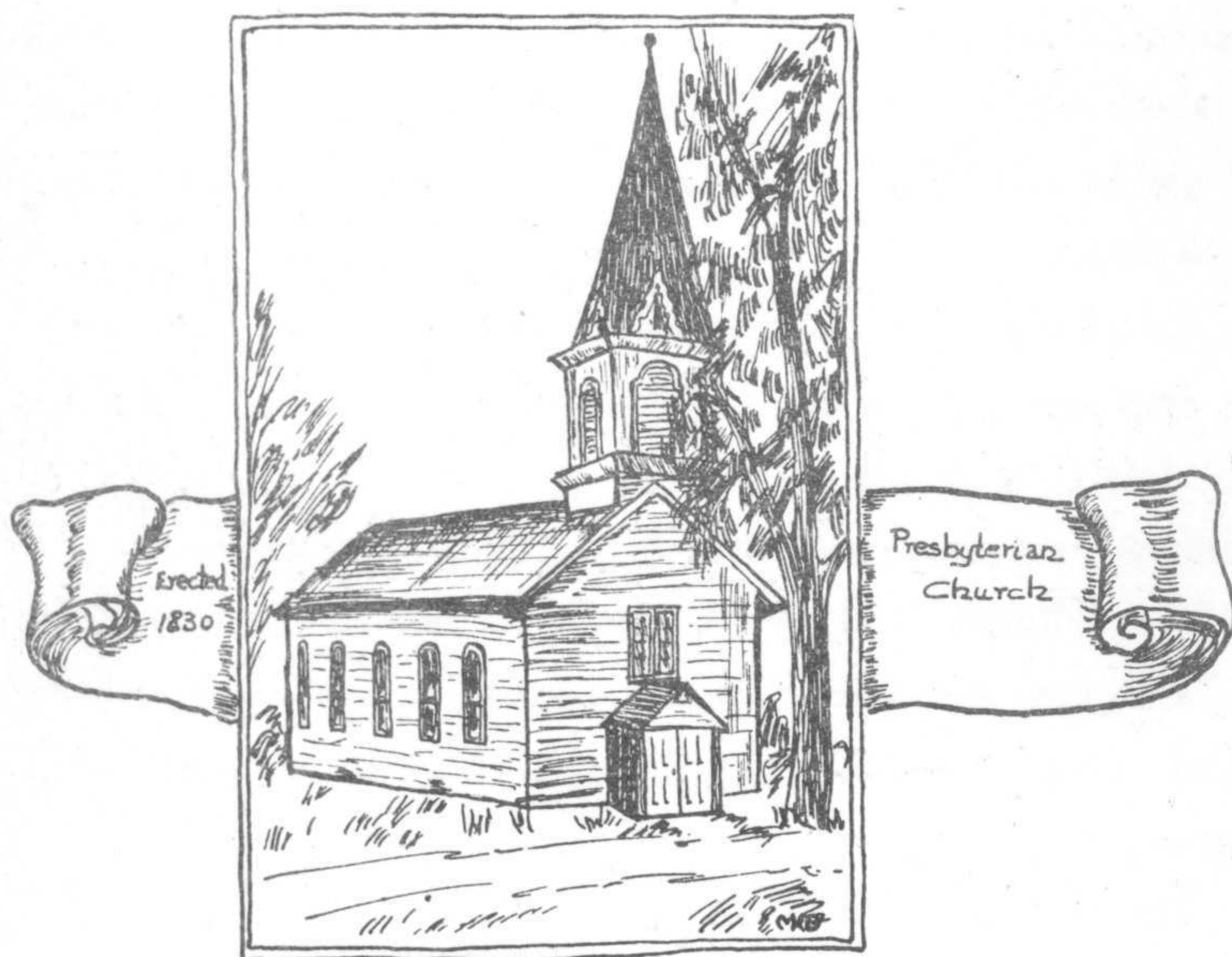

HISTORY  
of  
FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF WORTHINGTON  
Salient Facts and Ministers

Research has uncovered some surprising facts in the history of The First Presbyterian Church of Worthington, Ohio.

1. It had a Stated Supply minister in December, 1805. (Ohio Presbytery Records)
2. It is on the General Assembly list of churches in 1809, but had no installed pastor. (General Assembly list of Churches and Clergy of 1809)
3. It had a Stated Supply minister in 1814. (Ohio Synod Records)
4. The founding date, 1816, which has been used for a long time, is incorrect. (See 1857-1861 paragraph)
5. The Worthington church is the oldest Presbyterian church in Franklin County, the second oldest being the First Presbyterian Church of Franklinton, now known as Old First Church in Columbus, Ohio, which first met February 8, 1806.

At first the Worthington church belonged to Ohio Presbytery, then to Lancaster Presbytery when it was formed in 1809, and has been in Columbus Presbytery since it was organized in 1823. It was in the Synod of Pittsburgh until the Synod of Ohio was established in 1814. As population moved westward, new presbyteries and synods were formed. This necessitated changes in affiliation.

MINISTERS

1805 – The Reverend Mr. Bracken                      S. S. \*

Eleven men and women organized the first Presbyterian Church of Worthington in Peter Barker's home, which is now 957 North High Street. We do not know the date, but it must have been before the Reverend Mr. Bracken's assignment. At first, meetings were held in the homes of members, then in the Academy building on the Square (rent \$20 a year), next in the Goble blacksmith shop, and later in a small brick schoolhouse on Oxford Street.

1814 – The Reverend Mr. Cunningham                      S. S.

Communion tokens were probably used in the church at this time as their use was widespread among the early churches this far west. They were of lead, pewter, or other metal, and looked like battered coins, stamped with the name or initials of the church or minister. The session gave them out at preparatory service to those deemed worthy to take part in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Communicants brought them Sabbath morning; and as they took their places at the table, they laid them on the cloth to be gathered later by an elder.

1817-1818 – Ebenezer Washburn                      S. S.

The Reverend Mr. Washburn served on many Presbytery committees. He says in a letter, "I was the first that preached steadily to that church." He was appointed principal of Worthington Presbyterian Academy. It was founded in 1826, and closed shortly after 1832.

1819 – John B. Whittlessey                      S. S.

First recorded examination of Worthington session records by the Synod of Ohio in April, 1819, shows 43 members.

\* Stated Supply ministers, <sup>are</sup> appointed by Presbytery. Salary is usually paid by the church served. A pastor is a minister who has been installed by the Presbytery to have responsibility for a particular congregation.

1822 – Alexander Cowan

S. S.

On January 1, 1822, the Trustees of the church received rent free the use of the Masonic Hall for worship services for the next six and one-half years.

1824 – Stephen Lindley

S. S.

This man was a charter member of Lancaster Presbytery and is mentioned frequently in old Presbytery records.

1826-1830 – Highland Hurlburd (Hulburd)

First Pastor

The Reverend Mr. Hulburd (36 years old) was the first pastor of the Worthington church. He was very active in Presbytery and was on many important committees. Shortly after his installation, the Trustees began planning for a "meeting house." On March 9, 1829, they paid James Kilbourne \$40 for one and one-half lots which is the land on which our present church stands. That same year the Reverend Mr. Hulburd made a long, tiresome journey to the General Assembly offices in Philadelphia to seek financial assistance. He probably received it, as the new "meeting house," a small, plain, frame building without a steeple, was dedicated on April 17, 1830. It was used as a church sanctuary for the next 100 years, then it housed the Sunday School for 28 years more.

1831 – James Wells

31 members reported

1832 – Henry Wells

S. S.

Received 22 new members; total, 53 members. In 1831 and '32 the membership was divided into seven sections. They assembled weekly for "conversation meetings," each on a different evening and each with its own leader.

Record Book 1 of the church is missing. Record Book 2 begins with the date, May, 1832, and is stored with later records in the church depository.

1833-1834 – James Larabee

1834-1835 – The Reverend Mr. Highby

65 members reported in 1835

1835-1837 – Simeon Woodruff

S. S.

Total debt of church was \$152 in April, 1835. 82 members in 1836.

1838-1839 – Alexander Cowan

He was a Stated Supply in 1822, but returned as a pastor in 1838 at a yearly salary of \$500. On May 8, 1838, the Trustees gave "liberty to persons living at a distance to erect a horse shed on south line of meeting house lot, beginning at east line of said lot." They also authorized a committee to build a "good substantial board fence around the lot on which the meeting house stands except the west end which may be made of other material deemed suitable."

1839-1842 – Timothy Stearns

41 members reported in 1841. The meeting house was remodeled in 1842. A vestibule with a balcony above it and a spire were added. The two front doors gave way to one. A little later a bell was placed in the spire.

1842-1846 – John Donaldson

The Reverend Mr. Donaldson was ordained in December, 1842, and was installed as pastor of Worthington and Dublin churches. The Sunday School was "reorganized" in December, 1844, with Ed Mallory, superintendent. This is the first mention of Sunday School in the old records.

1846-1847 – S. K. Hughes

S. S.

1848 – February 18, 1848

The Church was designated as a non-profit organization under the Ohio General Law of March 12, 1844, and given the corporate name, "First Presbyterian Church and Society of Worthington." The articles of incorporation are on file in the county recorder's office, also in the office of the Ohio Secretary of State.



1849-1857 – Thomas Woodrow, D.D.

Salary \$350 a year, payable semi-annually. 50 members in 1850; 68 members in 1853, and 60 enrolled in Sunday School. During these early years, a written notice was posted at the door of the usual place of worship two weeks before the annual meeting. In 1850 only one person and in 1851 only two persons appeared for the annual meeting so the old officers each time held over for another year. In 1852, the Trustees "paid \$85 for care of the church, making fires, etc., and a pair of brass candlesticks." The Reverend Dr. Woodrow is the grandfather of President Woodrow Wilson.

1857 – James Hoge, D.D.

S. S.

Dr. Hoge is called the father of the Synod of Ohio and the Columbus Presbytery. He was appointed as itinerant missionary in Ohio by the General Assembly in 1805 at a salary of \$33 a month. He organized many churches all through central Ohio, was pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Franklinton for years, and was Moderator of the General Assembly in 1832. His relationship with the Worthington church was of short duration as he was in his sunset years and was taking care of this congregation just between other pastorates.

1857-1861 – Silas Johnson

Salary \$550. 91 members reported in 1861. The Reverend Mr. Johnson wrote a historic sketch of this Church in October, 1861. This hand-written history is in our files; and nearly all of our Church's history prior to 1831 comes from this document. He says in it that he got his information from the oldest members of the congregation. He gives 1816 as the founding date, but we know now that this date should be recorded as 1805.

1861-1862 – James H. Gill

S. S.

During the early 1800's, there were occasional church trials in local churches and in Presbytery. Some such trials are recorded in our Church books. If members "imbibed too freely," or "lived in licentious and wicked way," or "abstained from worship service," or danced, or played cards, etc., they were ordered to appear before the Session. They were counseled; and if they "confessed their fault" and "repented," they were put on probation. If wrong doing continued, they were "dismissed from the communion of the church."

1863 – J. K. Kost

S. S.

Plans were made for a new church. Subscriptions totaled \$4,320, but the church was not built, probably due to the war.

1865-1867 – J. D. Hoey

S. S.

1868-1869 – H. Bartholomew

1870 – M. D. A. Steen, D.D.

S. S.

1872-1874 – David Kingery

Dublin and Worthington shared his services and his salary of \$1000 a year. The Church was mortgaged in 1874 for \$160 to take care of a claim against it. The Reverend Mr. Kingery is the grandfather of our Mrs. Harry O'Brien.

1875-1878 – Charles Pelton

The Trustees sold 10 feet off the north side of the church lot in 1876 for \$160 to pay the afore-mentioned mortgage.

1878-1882 – J. L. Gage, D.D.

80 members reported in 1880; 60 enrolled in Sunday School.

1882-1883 – Charles Lee

1885-1886 – Robert L. Armstrong

S. S.

### 1888-1893 – S. P. Herron

On February 9, 1889, the annual meeting date was changed from the first Monday in May to the first Wednesday in January. This was necessary because of change in Presbytery dates and rules. The Trustees sold 20 feet off the south side of the church lot for \$170 in 1890 to pay The Reverend Mr. Herron the amount owed him.

### 1893-1894 – John Bliss

S. S.

### 1894-1905 – H. P. MacAdam, D.D.

72 members reported in 1894; 71 enrolled in Sunday School. 90 members in 1905; and 93 in Sunday School. In 1899, the Session asked the Board of National Missions for \$150 for current expenses. During Dr. MacAdam's pastorate, among those received as members were Mrs. Porter Darby (Willamette Michael) and Frederick Kirker. Mrs. Darby has been a member of this congregation longer than any other living member, and she served as the first woman Elder in the history of this Church (1953-1956). Mr. Kirker later became a Presbyterian minister and had a distinguished career as an Army Chaplain. He also was pastor of the Miami Avenue Presbyterian Church and Oakland Park Presbyterian Church (now Overbrook) in Columbus.

### 1906-1908 – Campbell L. Mackay

He was young and full of enthusiasm and new ideas, and was dedicated to promoting Christian living and understanding, so the Church was a thriving, happy community while he was here.

### 1908-1912 – William Hooper Adams

In 1910 there were 82 members; 109 enrolled in Sunday School.

### 1913-1917 – William Blake Hindman, D.D.

The Centennial of the Worthington Presbyterian Church was celebrated on June 16, 17 and 18, 1916. Five former pastors participated in the services; Steen, Gage, MacAdams, Mackay, and Adams. On Friday afternoon there was a garden party and reception at the home of Mrs. S. C. Robinson (mother of Stanley U. "Pete" Robinson, Sr.); and on Saturday evening, a historic display in the Church. There were religious services on Friday and Saturday evenings and three on Sunday; morning, afternoon and evening. Dr. Hindman, now completely retired, resides near Washington, D.C. with his daughter.

### 1917-1919 – David E. Craighead

### 1920 – Eugene P. Edmonds

Supply

The Reverend Mr. Edmonds was a retired Methodist minister who lived in Worthington. He graciously accepted an invitation to fill the gap between Presbyterian ministers.

### 1921-1923 – Hamilton B. Williams

The Trustees bought the manse, 47 West South Street, in 1921; appraised value on tax duplicate – lot \$610; building \$3,250.

### 1923-1925 – Edward Milton Page, D.D.

Dr. Page, a retired Presbyterian minister, had moved to Worthington recently. The Church was practically dead. No services were being held. Dr. Page was asked to preach and try to revitalize the Church. He accepted the challenge, and his success was phenomenal. Plans were made for a new building. \$20,000 was subscribed, but Dr. Page died suddenly before contracts were signed. On April 2, 1924, eldership was changed from life to a three-year term. Elders may serve more than once, but cannot succeed themselves. 22 new members in Dr. Page's pastorate; total membership, 85. His daughters, Mrs. Tyler Brightman and Mrs. James Mills, are members of our congregation.

### 1926-1930 – Tom Penn Ullom

The Trustees sold the South Street manse in 1926 for \$8000 or thereabouts. Gifts from two members (Mrs. Frances Johnson, \$5,000; Mr. J. F. Dennison, all the brick used in the building) and \$7,500 from Columbus Presbytery enlivened the idea of a new sanctuary. Plans were completed. The old church was turned crosswise, was moved behind the new part, and was used for a parlor and Sunday School. The old church was encased in brick to match the new. The sanctuary was dedicated January 1, 1927. It was considered the most beautiful in this part of the state. During construction, worship services were held in the old Methodist Church. Mrs. James F. Foley, a member of our congregation, is the daughter of The Reverend and Mrs. Tom Penn Ullom.

### 1930-1937 – Charles Hunter, D.D.

Salary \$1500. 114 members in 1930; 156 in 1937. The depression plus the big debt on the new church caused financial difficulty. \$10,000 was borrowed from National Missions. This eased the problem. Dr. Hunter's pastorate provided the firm foundation on which succeeding successes rest.

### 1937-1943 – George E. Parkinson, D.D.

Dr. Parkinson gave impetus to the Youth Program. He and Mrs. Parkinson worked with the young people and established a camaraderie that enabled them to give valuable advice and leadership. There was church financial trouble again. The bonds, sold in 1926 for the building fund, came due. There was no money to pay them, so drastic steps had to be taken to prevent foreclosure. More money was borrowed, and the church was saved. Then the congregation began working hard to liquidate the big indebtedness. The manse on Stafford Street was bought in 1940 for \$5,500 with money that was willed to the church for that purpose (donor, Mrs. Frances Johnson). 241 members in 1943.

### 1943-1950 – Nelson J. Wright, D.D.

The Youth Program was continued. Church debts were paid and the mortgage was burned. The church prospered in all areas.

### 1950- Paul W. Johnston, D.D.

603 members in ~~1960~~<sup>1950</sup>; 2100 in 1965. 430 enrolled in Sunday School in 1950; 1156 in 1965. Four Youth Choirs in 1965 (150 members).

The following changes in church structure help to take care of this unprecedented growth. An educational unit with two additions has been built and the sanctuary has been enlarged. The old church was torn down and the present transepts took its place. While this was being done, worship services were held in the Public School auditorium. The new sanctuary was dedicated September 22, 1959. An assistant was provided for Dr. Johnston in 1953, an Assistant Pastor in 1957, two Assistant Pastors in 1959, and a Director of Christian Education in 1964. Now we have two Associate Pastors and a Director of Christian Education. Several secretaries have been added to the staff to facilitate communication. In 1963 the manse on Stafford Avenue was traded for a new manse on Crandall Drive with the difference in value (\$18,000) paid by the church; cost of new manse, \$35,000. Two lots adjoining the church land on the west were bought and are used for parking. The Lewis property, which is just south of the original church lot, was purchased in 1965. For several years, the benevolent budget equalled 50% of the budget for local operations. The benevolent budget for 1966 is \$46,163, and the budget for local operations is \$108,000. Population increase in the Worthington area and untiring, devoted Christian leadership have promoted the above accomplishments.

Two young men, who belonged to our congregation, were ordained in our Church as Presbyterian ministers; Leroy Nelson in 1955, and Gary Schwab in 1964. The Rev. Mr. Nelson is serving in Korea, and the Rev. Mr. Schwab is Assistant Pastor in the First Presbyterian Church in Roslyn, New York.

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May the past be a challenge to the future, and may we reach forward into the years ahead with courage, zeal and determination to do our part here and now, as co-workers with God.

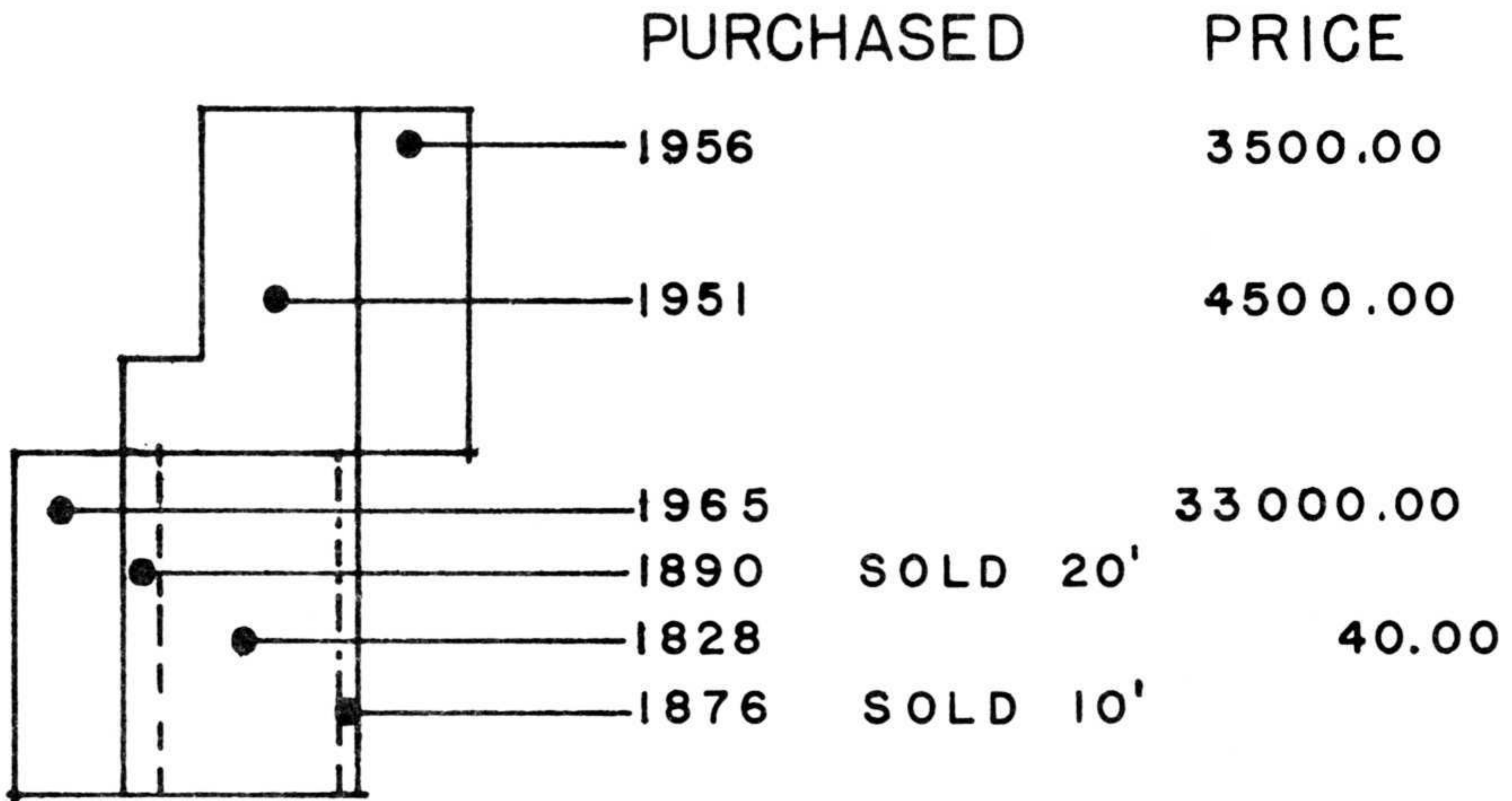
Mrs. Darby is a distant relative of Peter Barker, one of the founders of our Church.

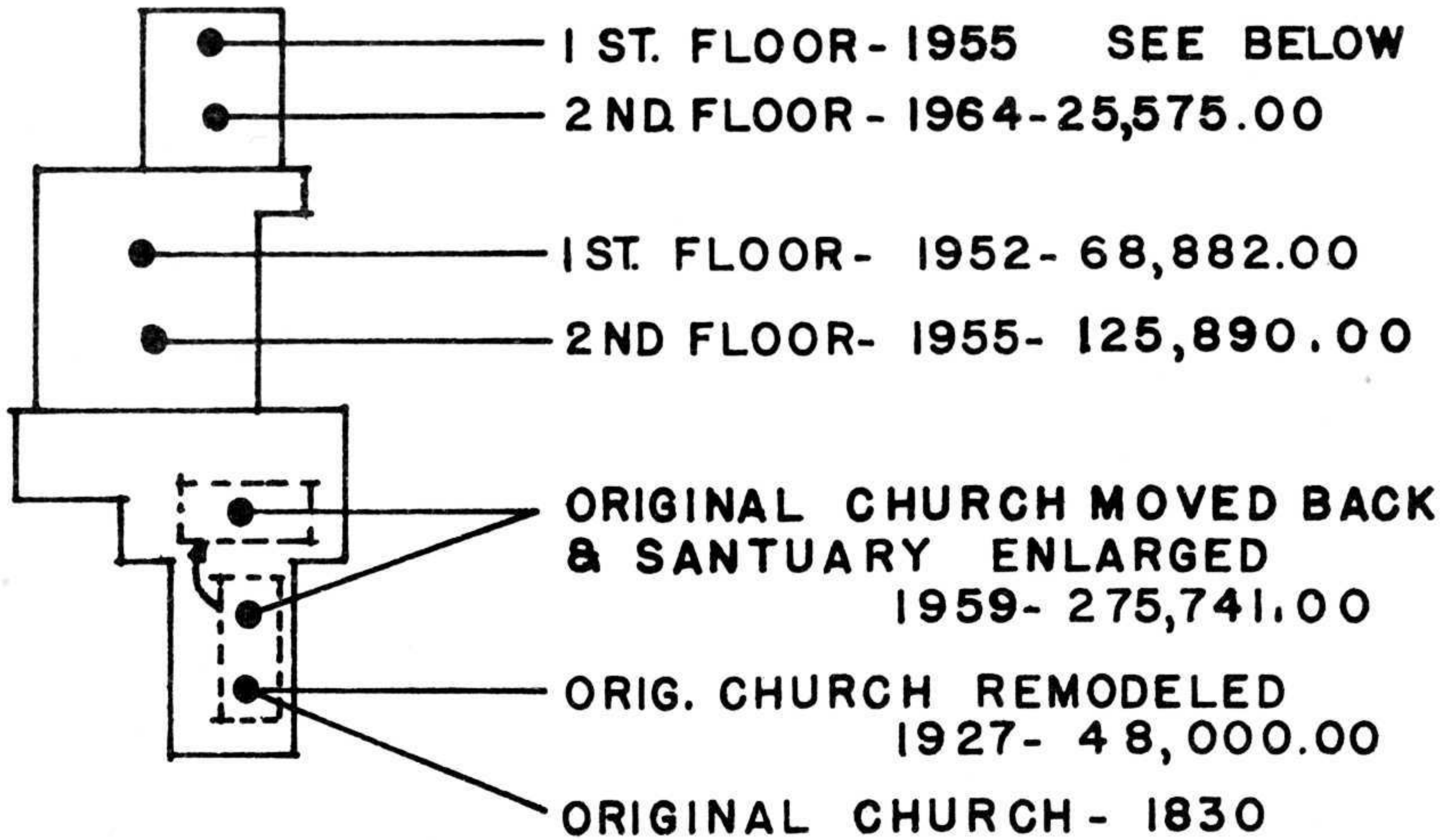
WORTHINGTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

CRANDALL DR. MANSE 1963 35,000.00

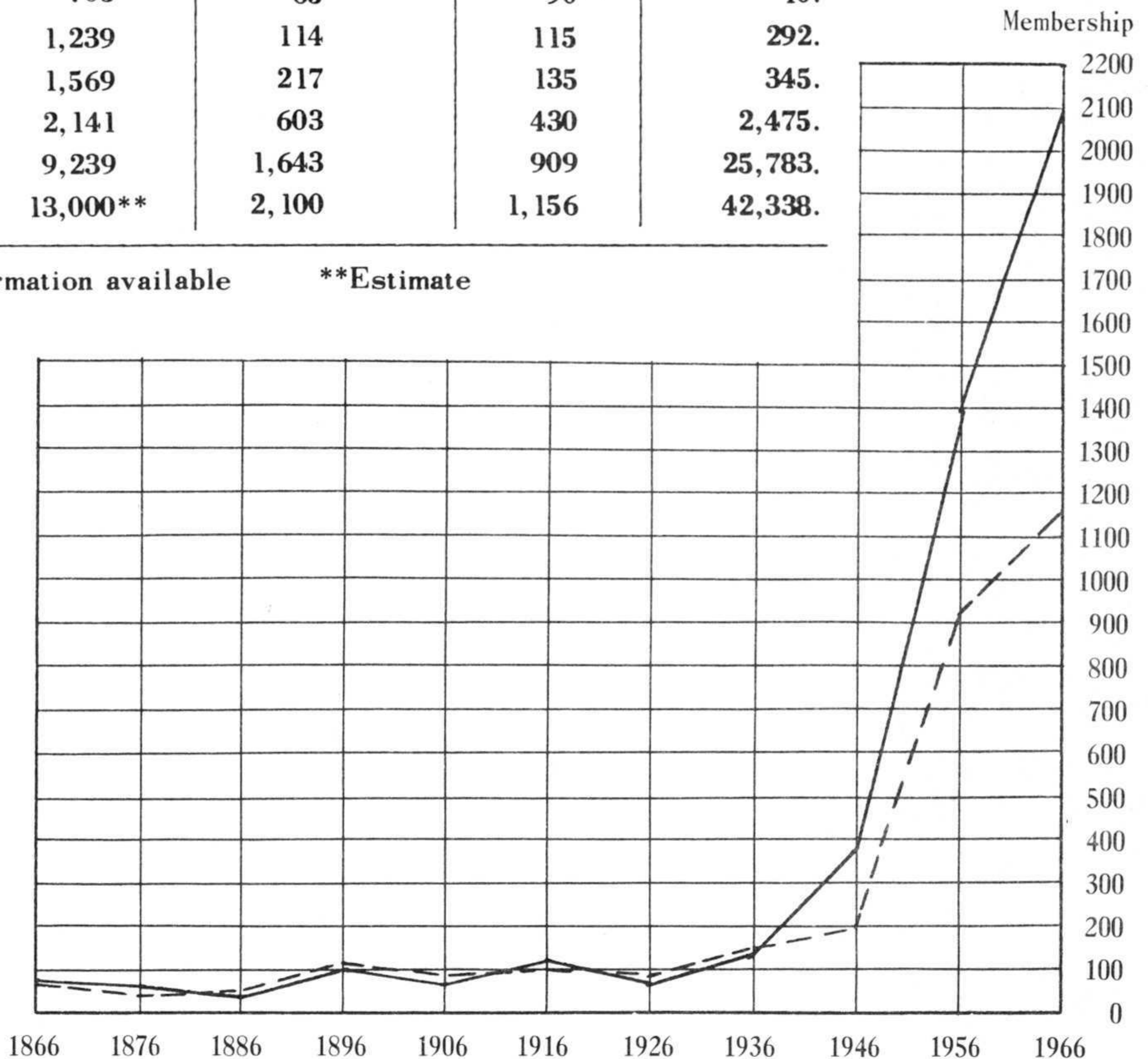
NET WORTH OF CHURCH - JAN. 1, 1966 = 676,462.42

## ADULT CHURCH GROUPS OF THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF WORTHINGTON

**MEN'S COUNCIL** – The men of the church meet once each month to become more closely associated with the programs and effort of the Church toward extending the Kingdom of God. The programs bring information concerning the economic, spiritual and social needs of people everywhere. Mr. Jack Gray, President.

**WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION** – The Women's Association seeks to implement its witness to the proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ by study, prayer and service, supporting with their giving to the Board of Christian Education and the Commission on Ecumenical Missions and Relations. The six circles of the association meet once each month for study. The circles are open to all members of the church. The membership of the association is approximately 170 women.

**WOODROW GUILD** – The Woodrow Guild was named in memory of The Reverend Thomas Woodrow, grandfather of U.S. President Woodrow Wilson. The Guild promotes fellowship, good work and service to the Church. The group raises funds for the Church, serves as hostesses for wedding receptions, membership teas and other activities.

**COUPLES' CLUB** – This club promotes fellowship and Christian education. The club meetings serve as an 'ice-breaker' for new church members. All new church members are invited to attend.

**PRESBYMATES** – This is a social organization for young couples (twenties and thirties) of the Church. Some of the activities of the past year have included week-end camp-outs at the Presbytery Camp in the Hocking Hills, a square dance, picnic, bowling, sledding, skating and a card party. As a service project they take care of the 11:00 A.M. nursery on Sundays and have repaired, cleaned and painted the nursery furniture and toys.

**GENEVA FELLOWSHIP** – Three groups meet in homes for study and discussion of varied subjects related to their Christian Faith and Life.

**ADULT BIBLE STUDY** – 24 adults of the Church are enrolled in the group. The average attendance is nine.

**ADULT PRAYER GROUPS** – An average of twenty persons attend the two adult groups organized for the members of the Church.

**WOMEN'S BIBLE AND STUDY GROUPS** – A group of seven women meet regularly to consider Prayer and Bible Study. Mrs. O. D. Anderson is the Correspondent.

## YOUTH CHURCH GROUPS OF THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF WORTHINGTON

**SUNDAY CHURCH SCHOOL** – The Sunday Church School Program offers classes at both 9:30 A.M. and 11:00 A.M. for all ages from crib to adult. The official graded curriculum of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. is used. The "Christian Faith and Life" is a program for church and home. The total Sunday Church School education program provides training and experience for which the final goal is Christian discipleship and membership in the Church.

The curriculum is organized around the three main themes of "Jesus Christ", "The Bible" and "The Church". A teaching staff of 120 and pupil enrollment of 1,300 participate in this school. Mr. Jack Gray is Church School Administrator.

**SENIOR HIGH YOUTH FELLOWSHIP** – Youth of senior high school age has established an informal, honest, open-atmosphere fellowship where they explore the meaning of their faith and the opportunity to re-dedicate themselves to the ministry of Jesus Christ.

**JUNIOR HIGH YOUTH FELLOWSHIP** – This group establishes an honest, open, friendly atmosphere where young people may explore the word of God in relation to their individual lives. They participate in creative thinking and expressions through pantomime, skits, shadow graphs and drama in the exploration of scriptures and human relations.

**BOY SCOUT TROOP 333** – The Troop has 31 boys registered, with approximately 20 active. The Troop Committee consists of a chairman, scoutmaster, secretary, treasurer, outdoor chairman, and publicity chairman. Dr. Walter Holbrook, Chairman.

**CUB PACK 333** – The program is for boys between the ages of 8 through 11 years. The Pack meets on the third Monday of each month in the Church Dining Room. New boys in the community and others are always welcome. Dale Wiltrout, Cub Master and David Lockhaupt is the Committee Chairman.



## CHURCH MUSIC GROUPS

CHANCEL CHOIR – This Choir provides the anthem for the Sunday morning worship service. It has presented the choral worship service in late spring including Haydn's "Creation" and the annual Christmas Vesper Service. Dr. Laurence Burkhalter, Director.

HIGH SCHOOL CHOIR – This Choir is composed of high school students. It takes part in services on Sunday morning and the Christmas Eve Family Service. Rehearsals are held Sunday afternoon. Organized in the autumn of 1964, Mrs. Laten Carter, Director.

CHAPEL CHOIR – This Choir is for children in grades four, five and six. The Choir participates in Sunday morning worship about once each month. It also participates each year in the Presbytery Junior Choir Festival. Rehearsal is every Saturday morning at 10:30. Mrs. Rodney Harrison, Director.

CAROL CHOIR – This Choir is for children in grades one, two and three. The Choir participates in Sunday morning worship about once every six weeks. Rehearsal is every Saturday morning at 9:30. Mrs. Rodney Harrison, Director.

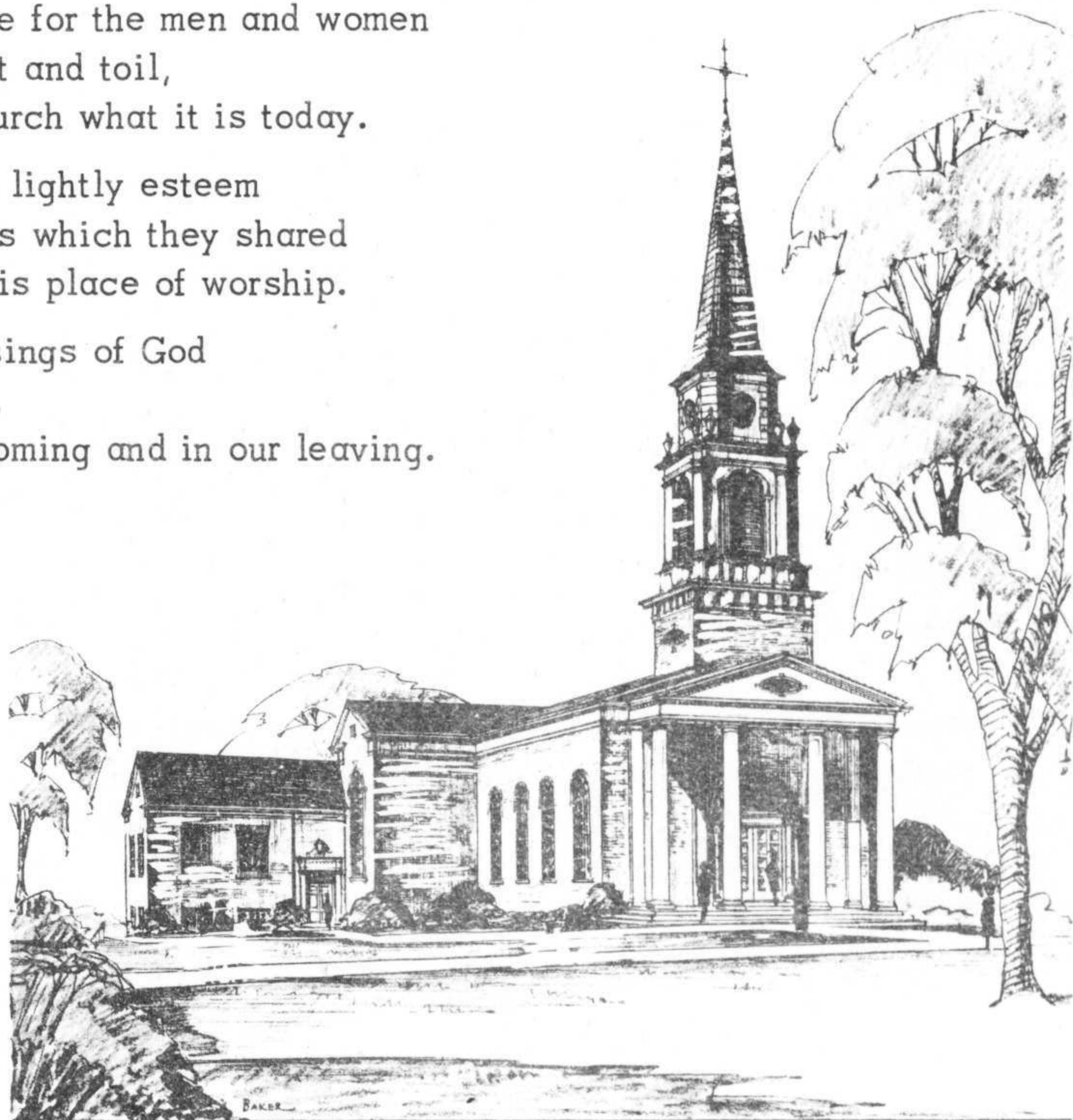
