
SUPERINTENDENT




PRINCIPAL

SHORT CIRCUIT






ORCHESTRA





This year the Student Council sponsored, among other things, two paper drives, a dance, and a party.



















BASKETBALL

Well it's been fun! And I don't think that we will ever forget our trip on the Cardinal Special with the Class of '51.

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
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
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
