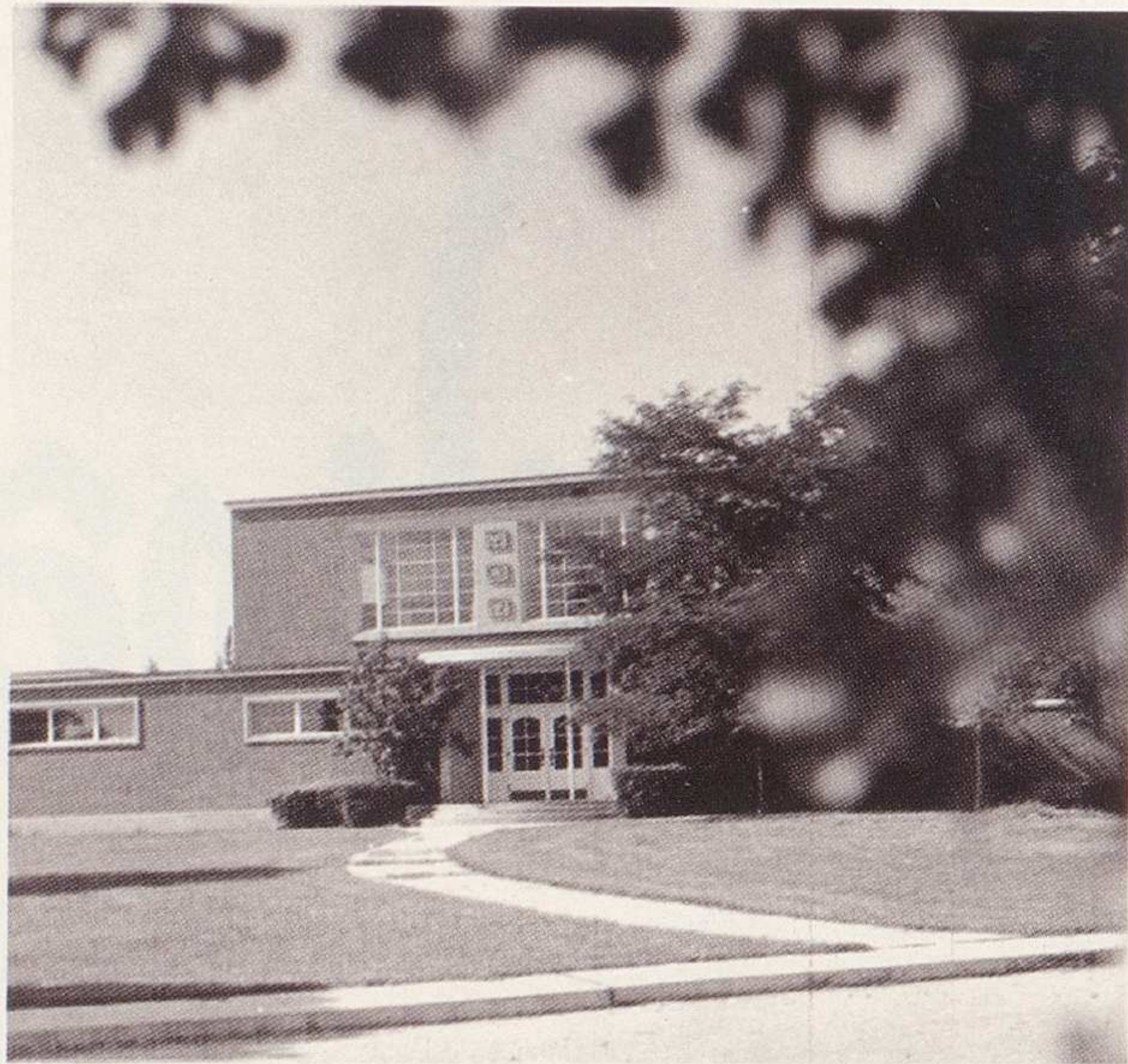

Spacious Campus Spurs Broad Learning

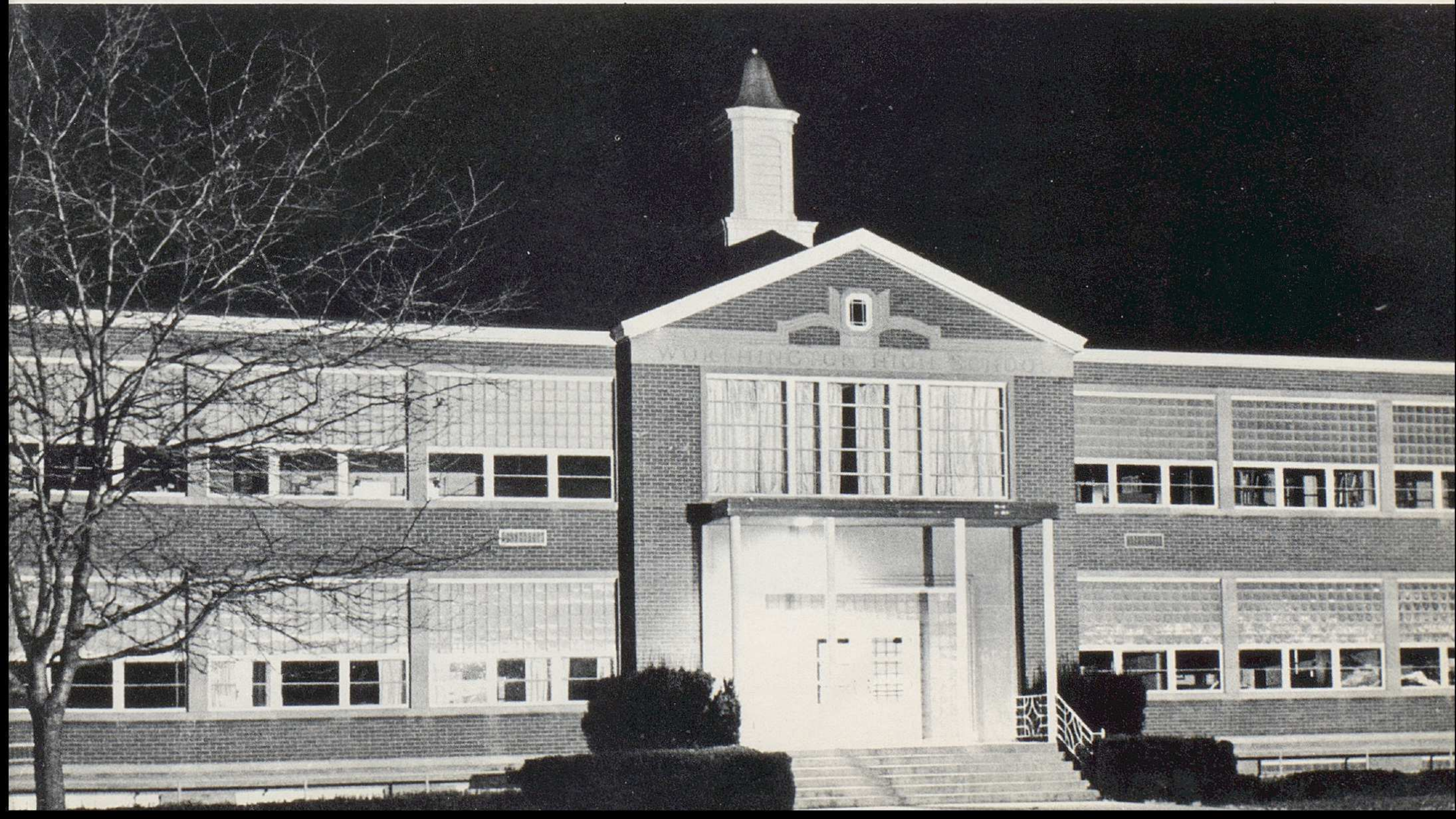
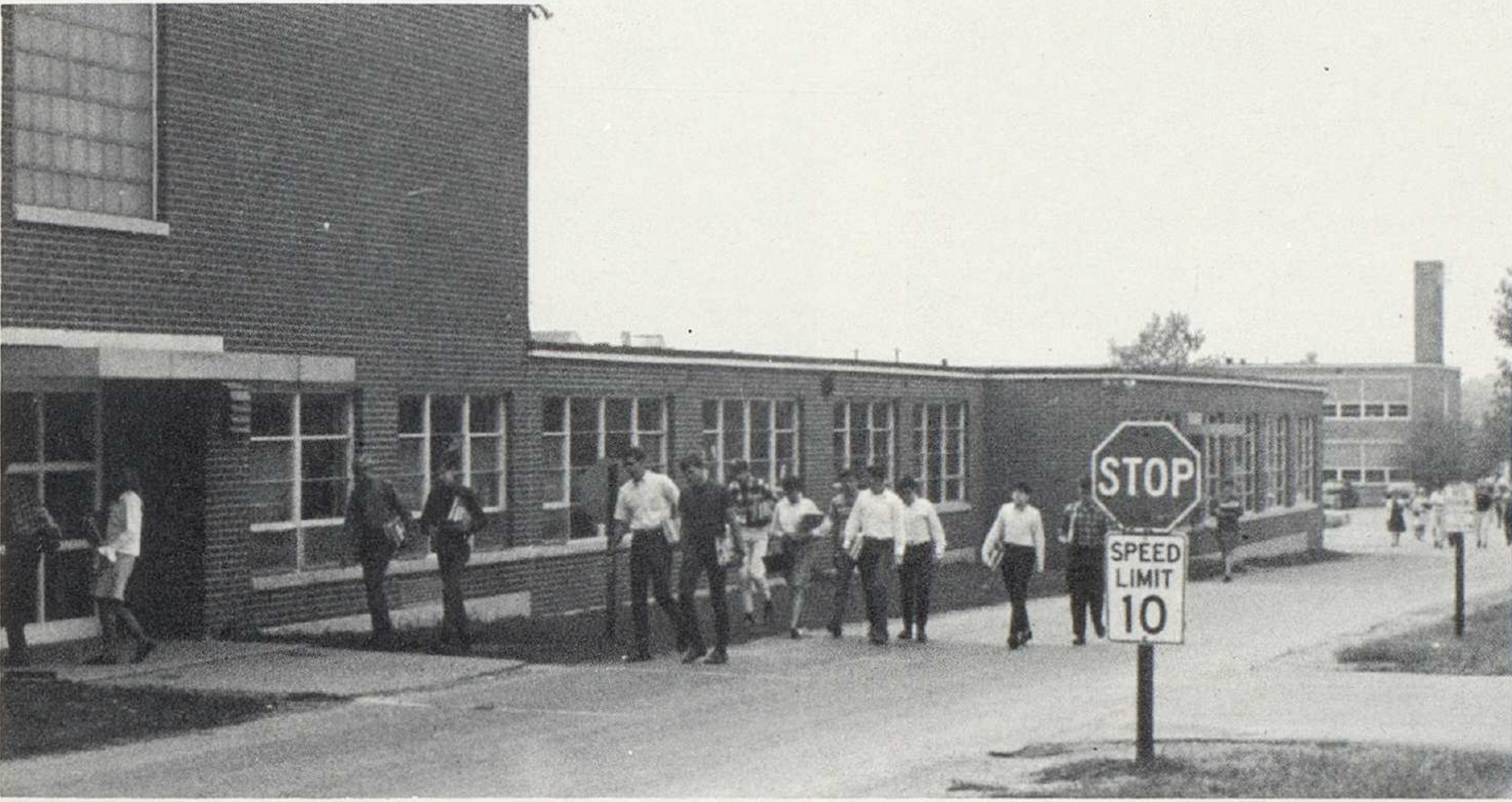
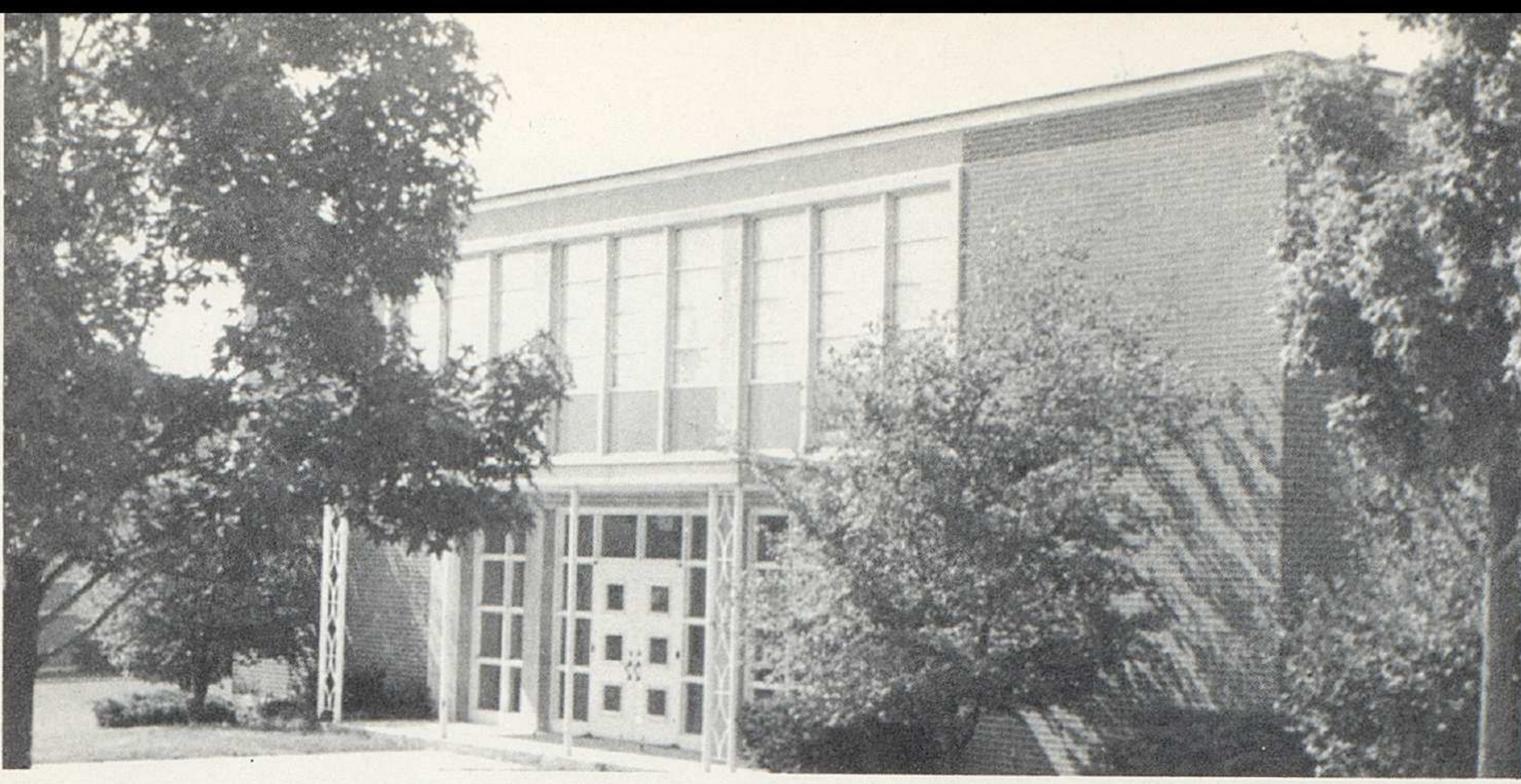


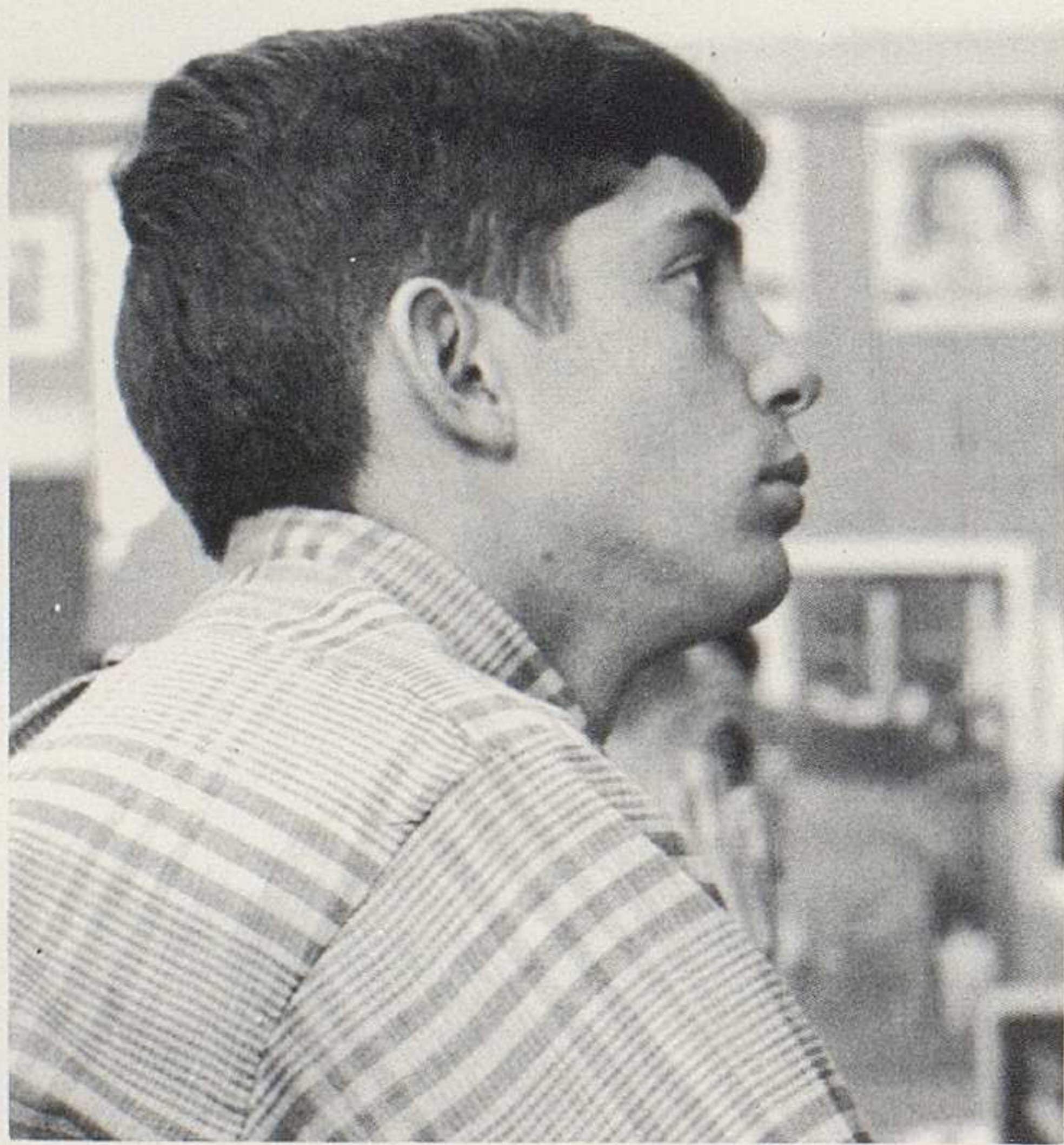
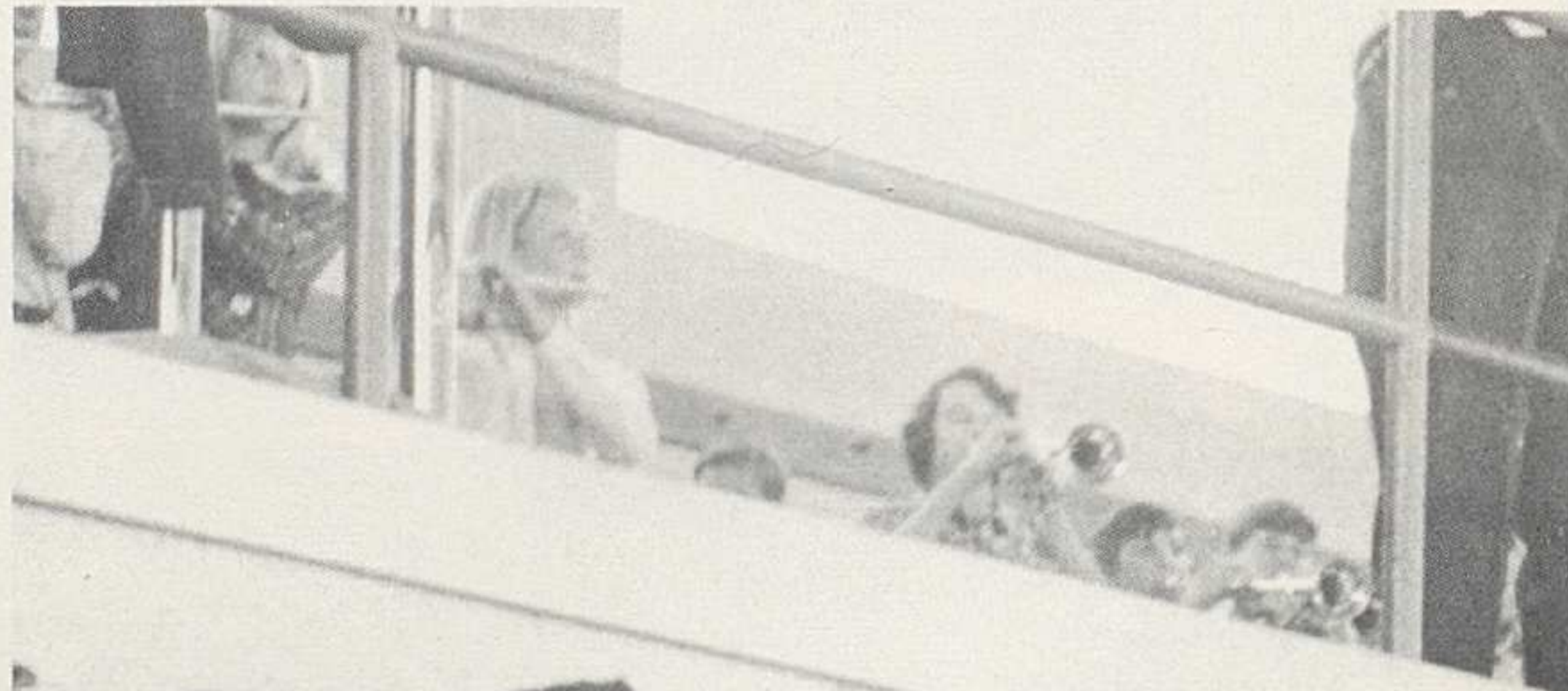

Far-sighted planning on the part of school administrators have given Worthington youth an unusually beautiful, spacious, and well-equipped backdrop for growth.









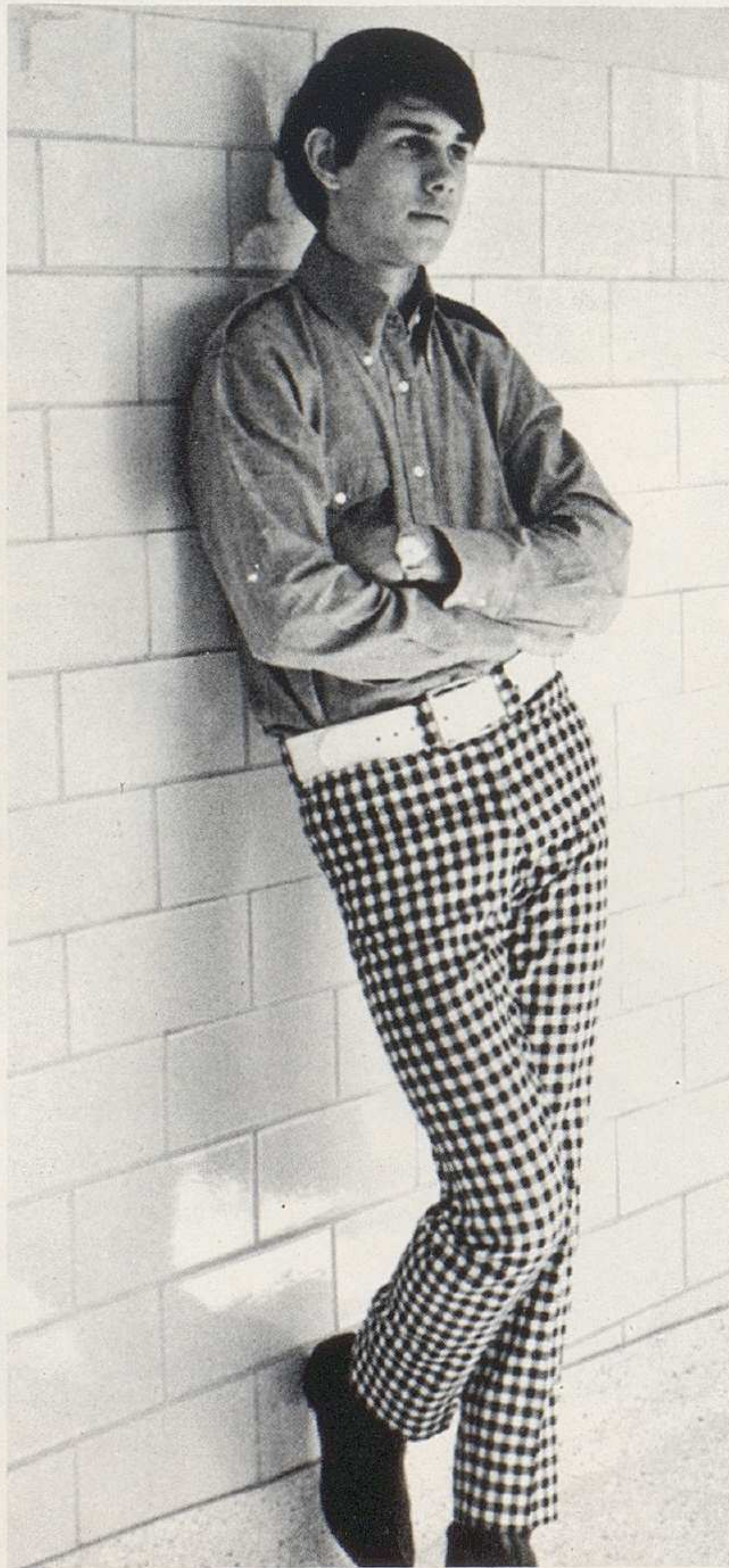
Variety Of Individuals Compose WHS

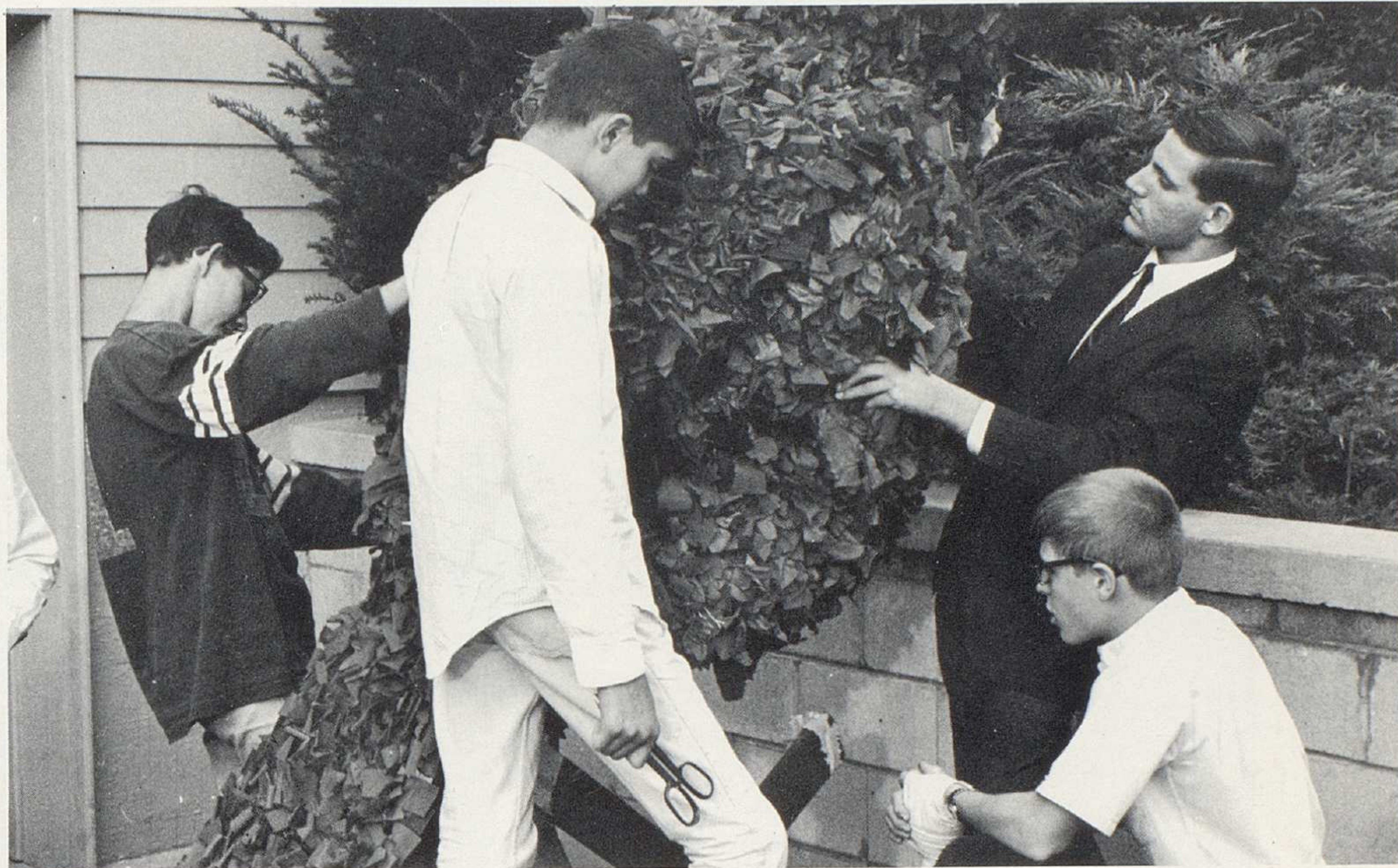

“Mod” Styles Fashion 1967

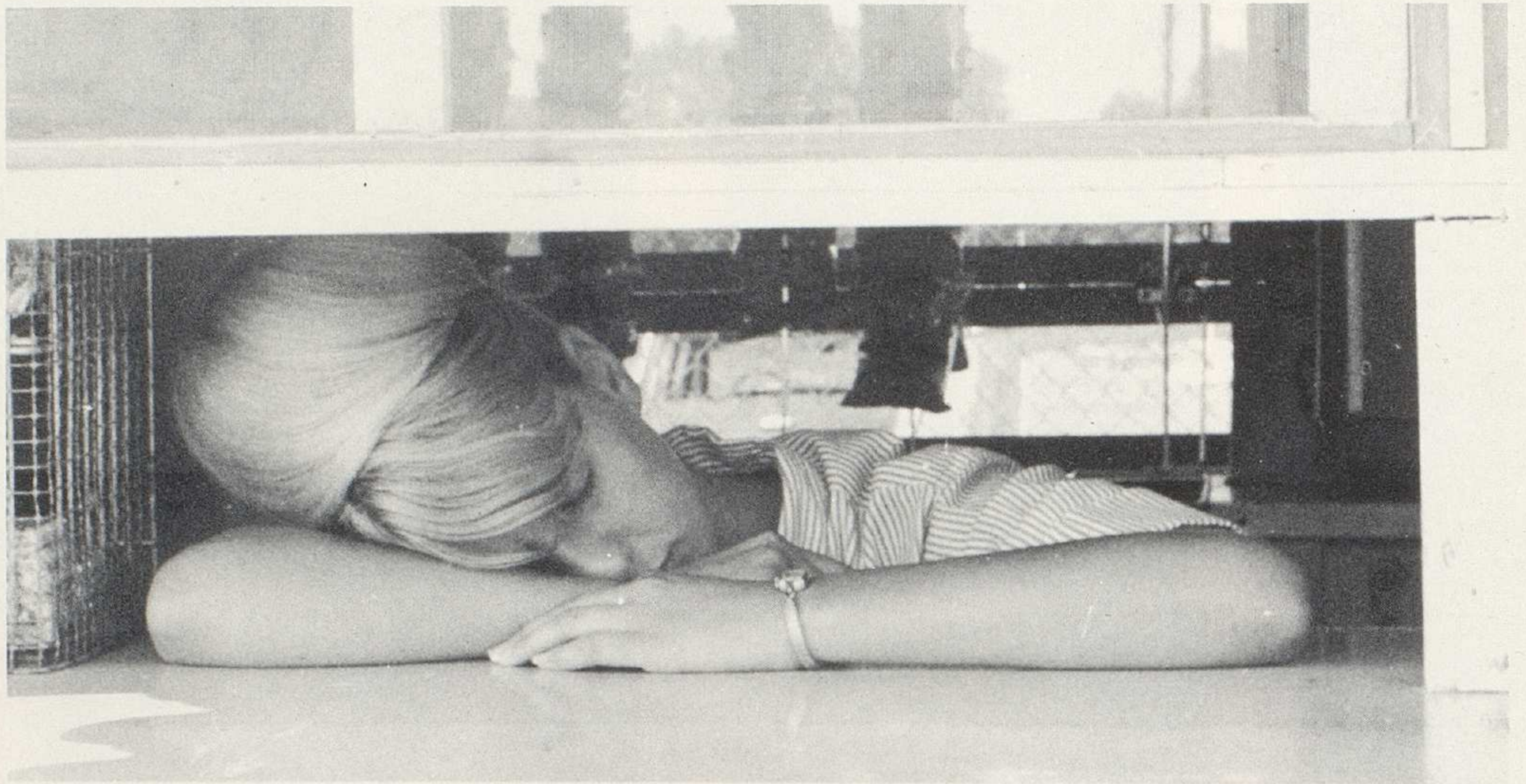


After gymnasium bleachers had collapsed into the walls for the summer, and the tires had screeched out of the student parking lot, the year 1967 expired. So the **panorama of a year** remarkably different from any other was also finished.

In that time Austrian Erich Kastner, AFS student, became a very special addition to the student body. Fashion took a zany turn as students modeled a variety of “mod” creations. 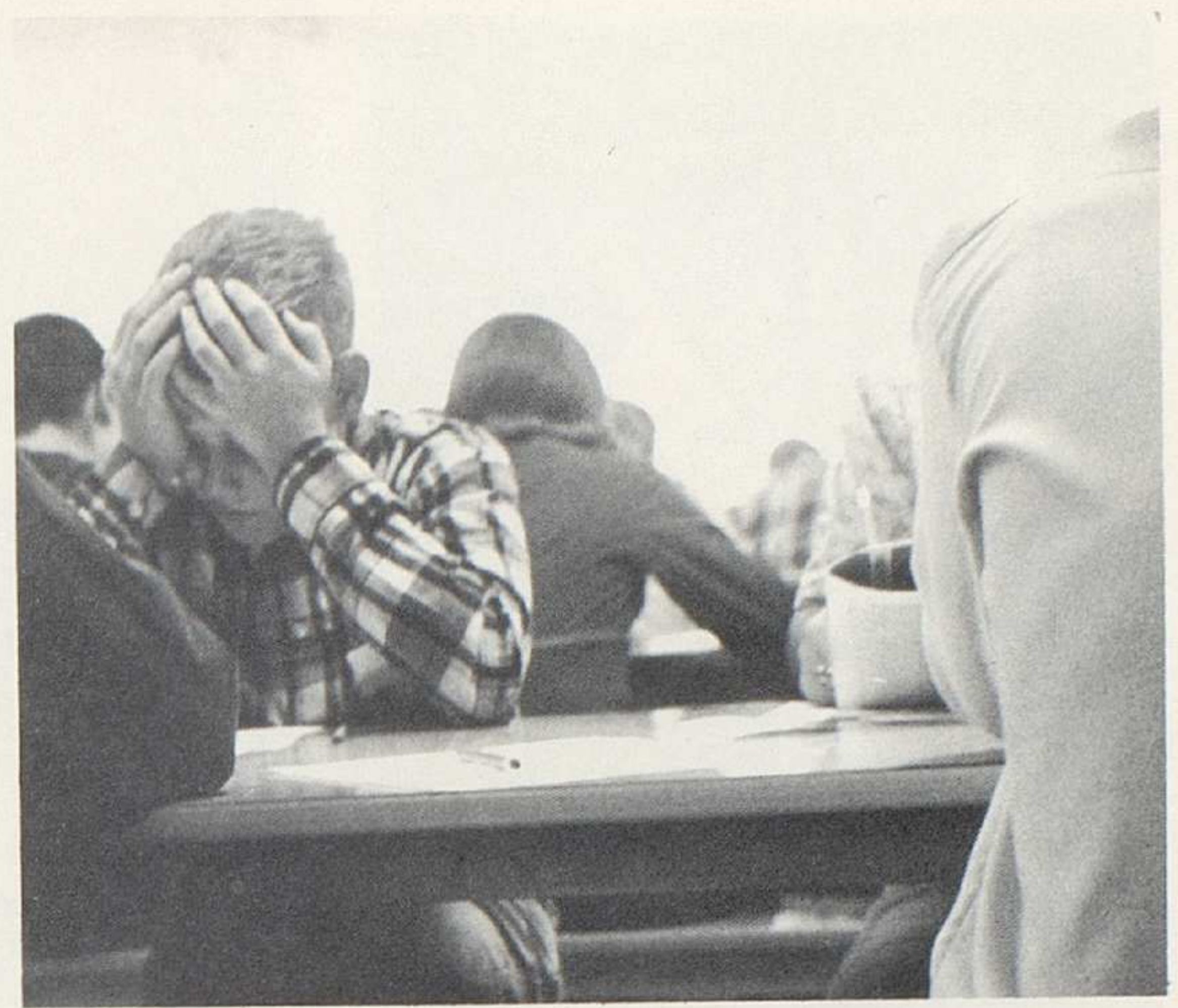
Zest And Vigor Enliven School Routine

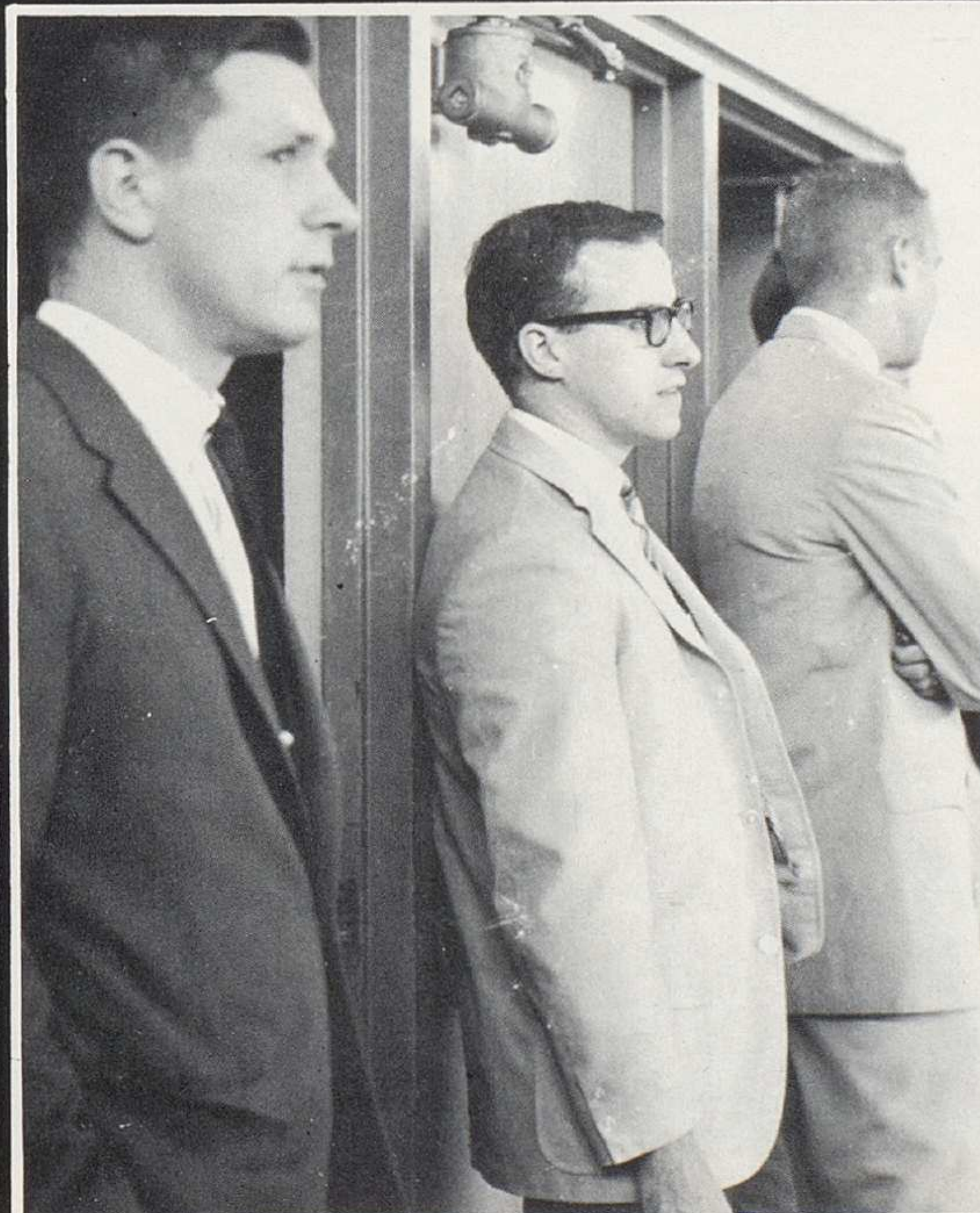

Besides explaining, demonstrating, and repeating ideas in the classroom, teachers must advise clubs, coach and inspire teams, and counsel confused teenagers. Officials Complete Smooth Change Of Jobs

Operating smoothly and efficiently, Worthington school administrators underwent a change of jobs this fall that resembled a momentous chain reaction. The resignation of Assistant Superintendent of Schools and Director of Instruction, Mr. Harold R. Armstrong, set in motion the major shift.

Voting October third after careful study, Worthington's Board of Education transferred Mr. Earl W. Lane from his job as high school principal to Mr. Armstrong's former work. Previous Assistant Principal, Mr. Louis E. Koloze, already known to students as manager of attendance, became principal of the high school, while American history students saw their teacher, Mr. Charles W. Merrilees, named assistant to the principal.

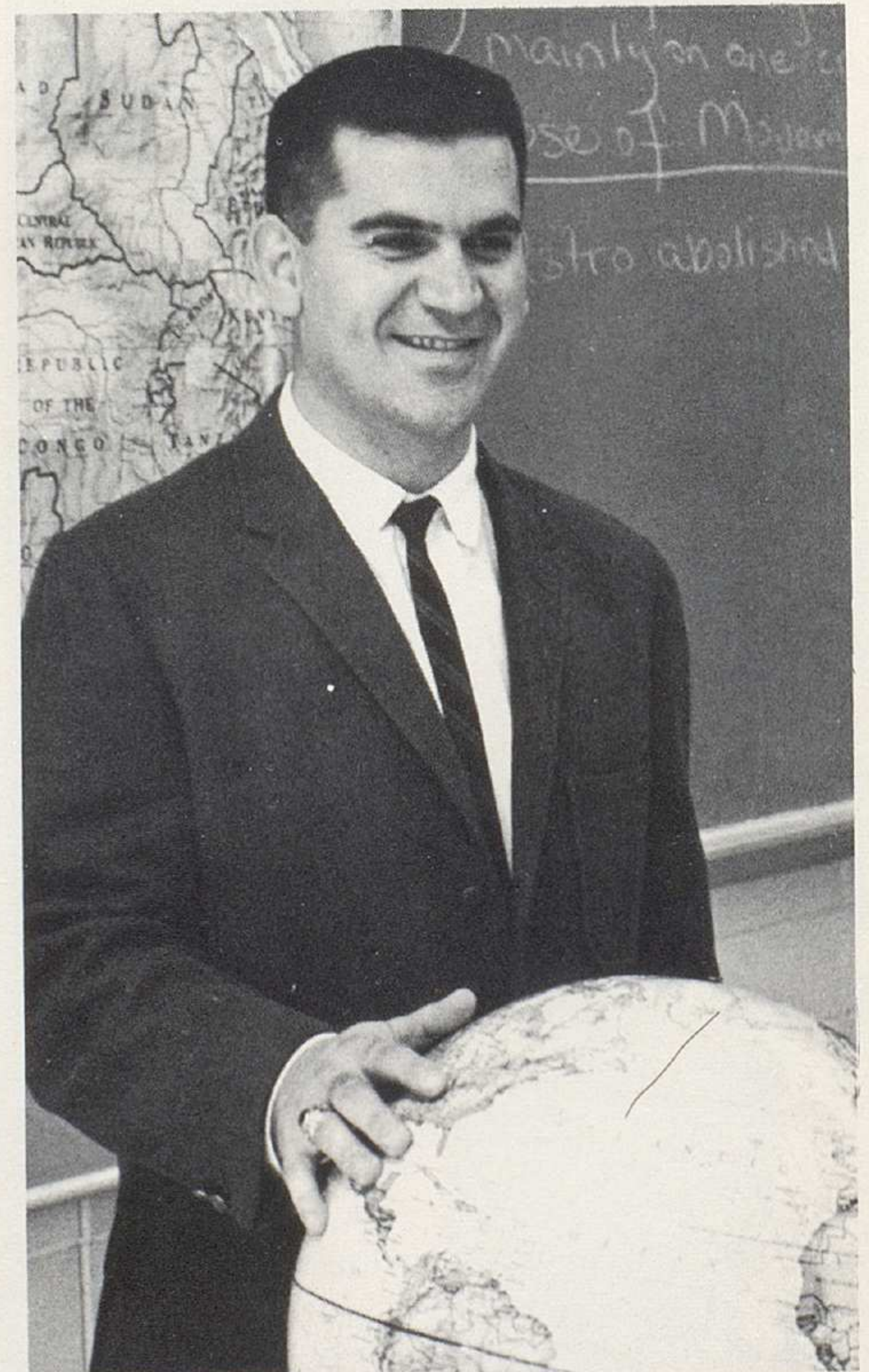


Seminar Students

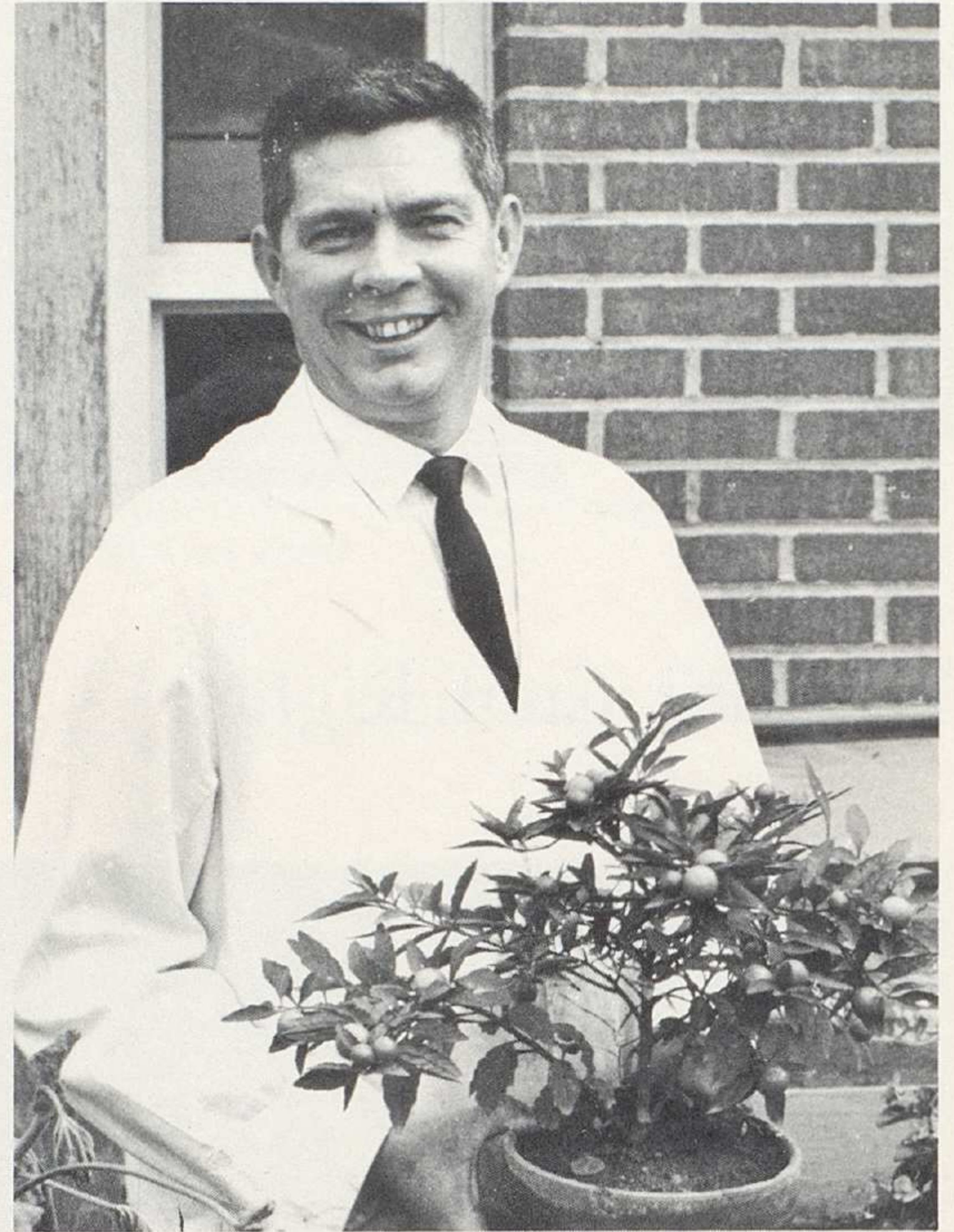

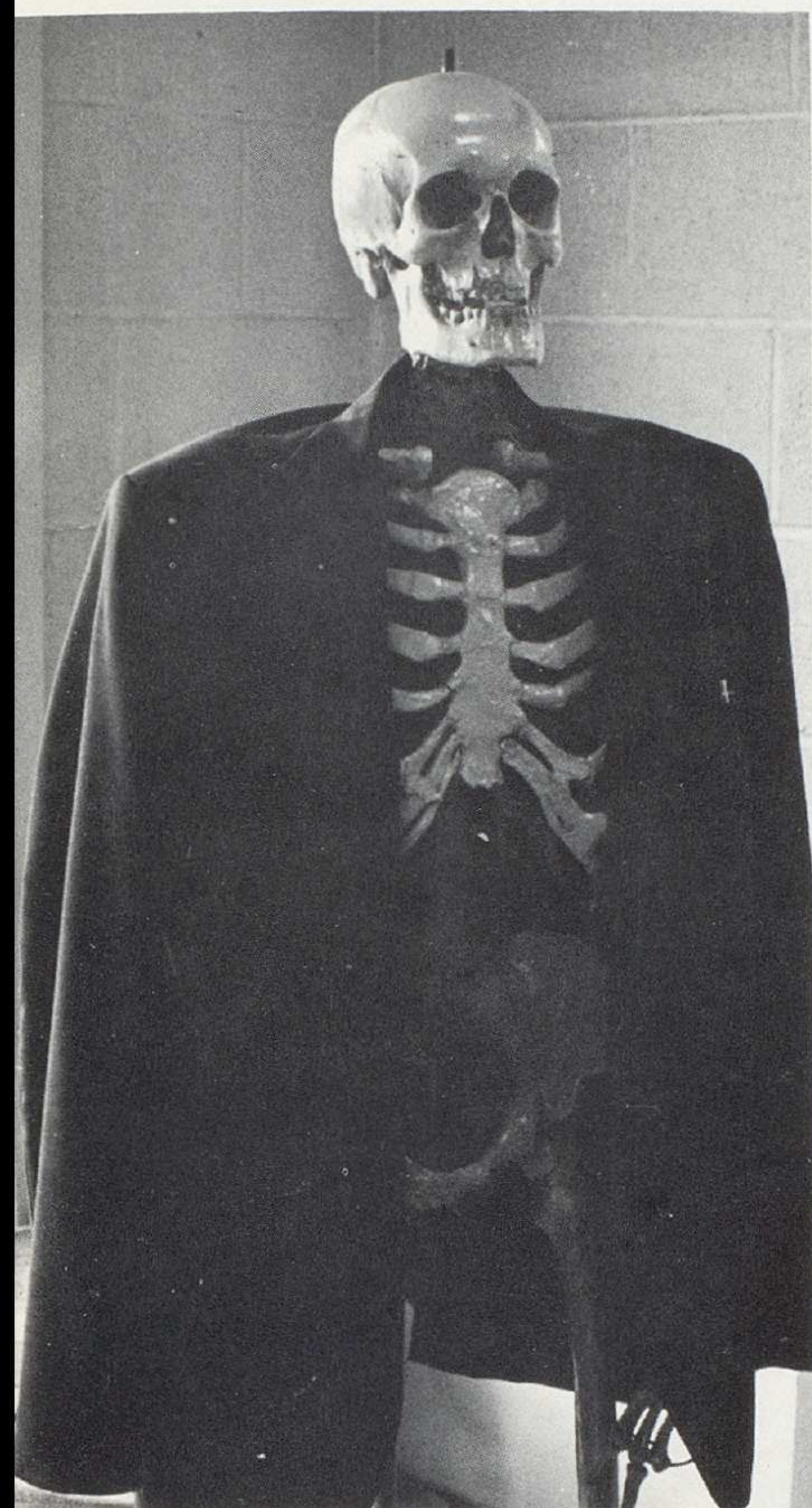

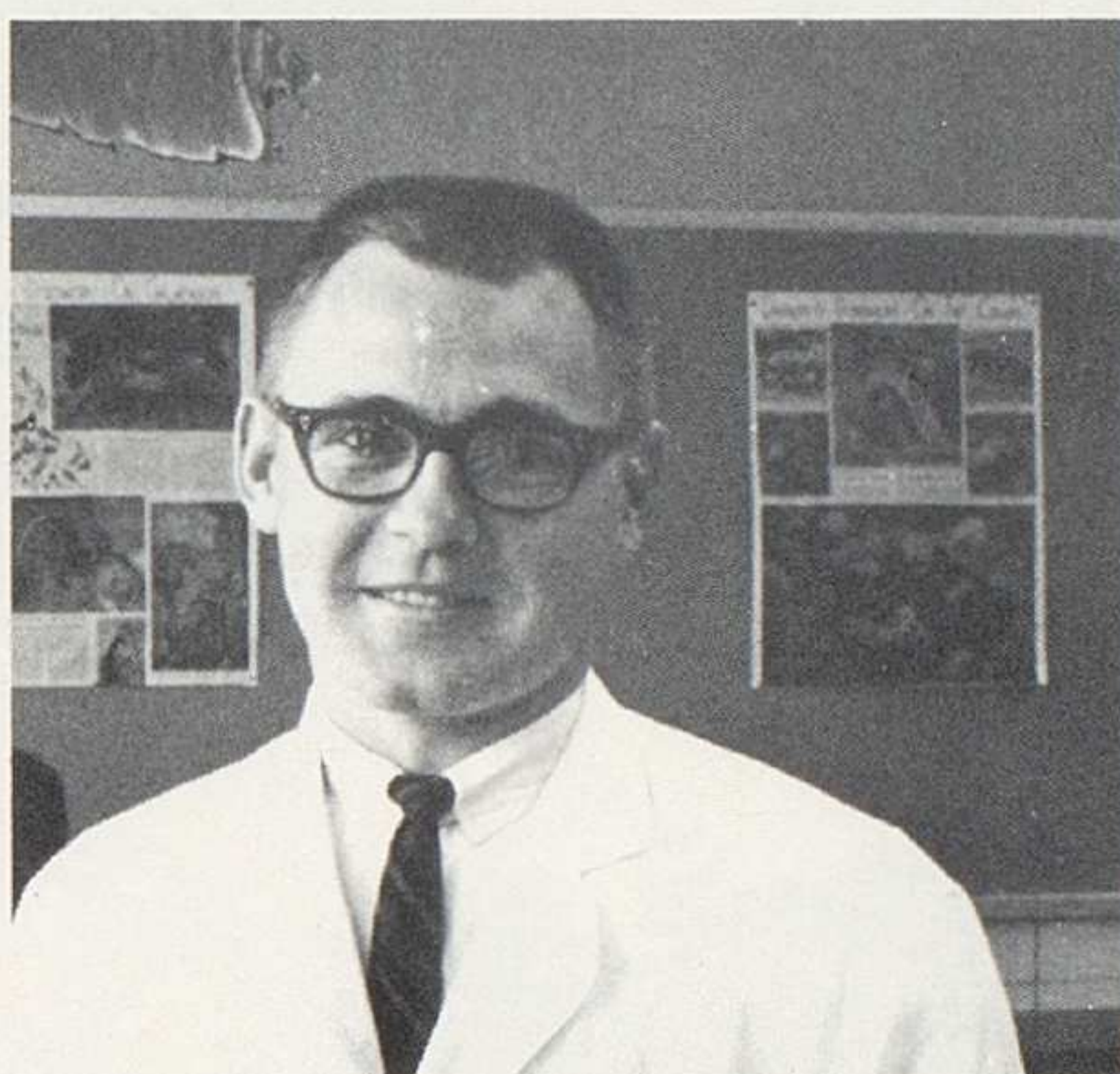

Courses Amplify Science Department

Faced with the challenge of keeping up with trends in modern research, the science department expanded both its courses and facilities. Advanced chemistry, to be studied concurrently with physics, was opened to qualified upperclassmen. To handle the surge of chemistry students, Room 103 was transformed into a second chemistry lab. New devices such as balances and semi-micro equipment excited more thorough lab work. Streamlining further, the science department created a single course for freshmen from the former earth science and space science programs. Team teaching of this course gave students well-rounded instruction from several specialists.

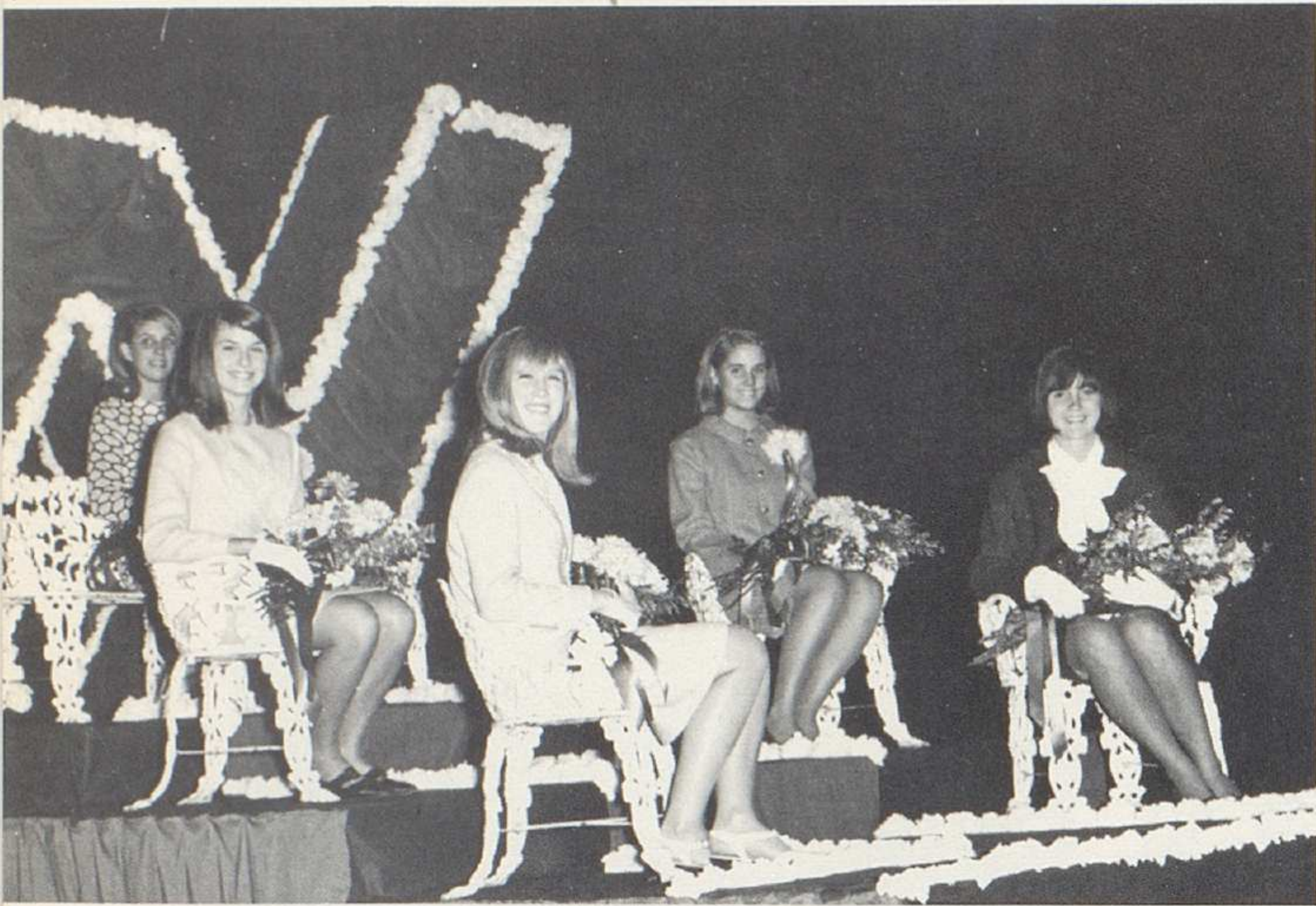
Student Life

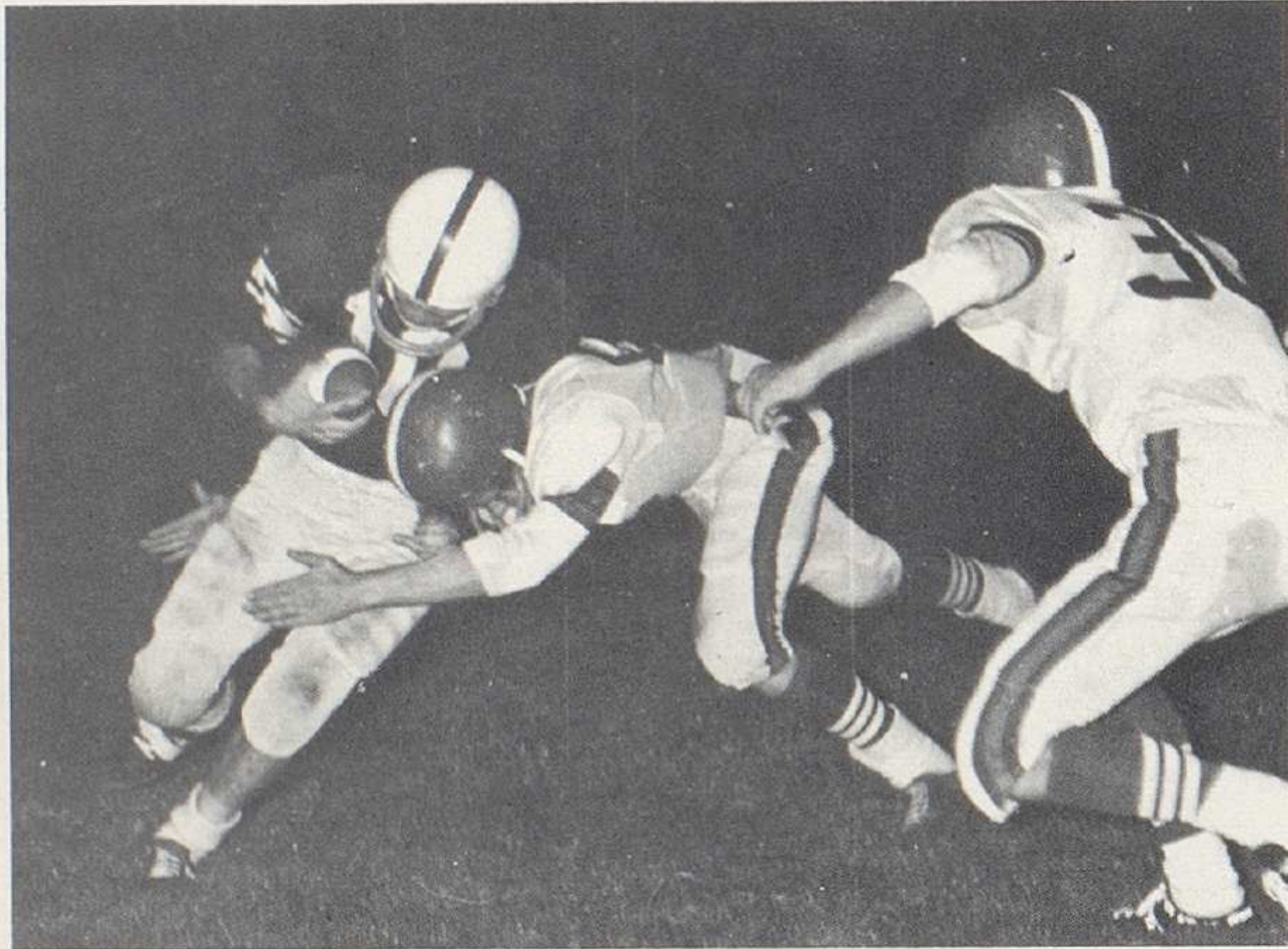

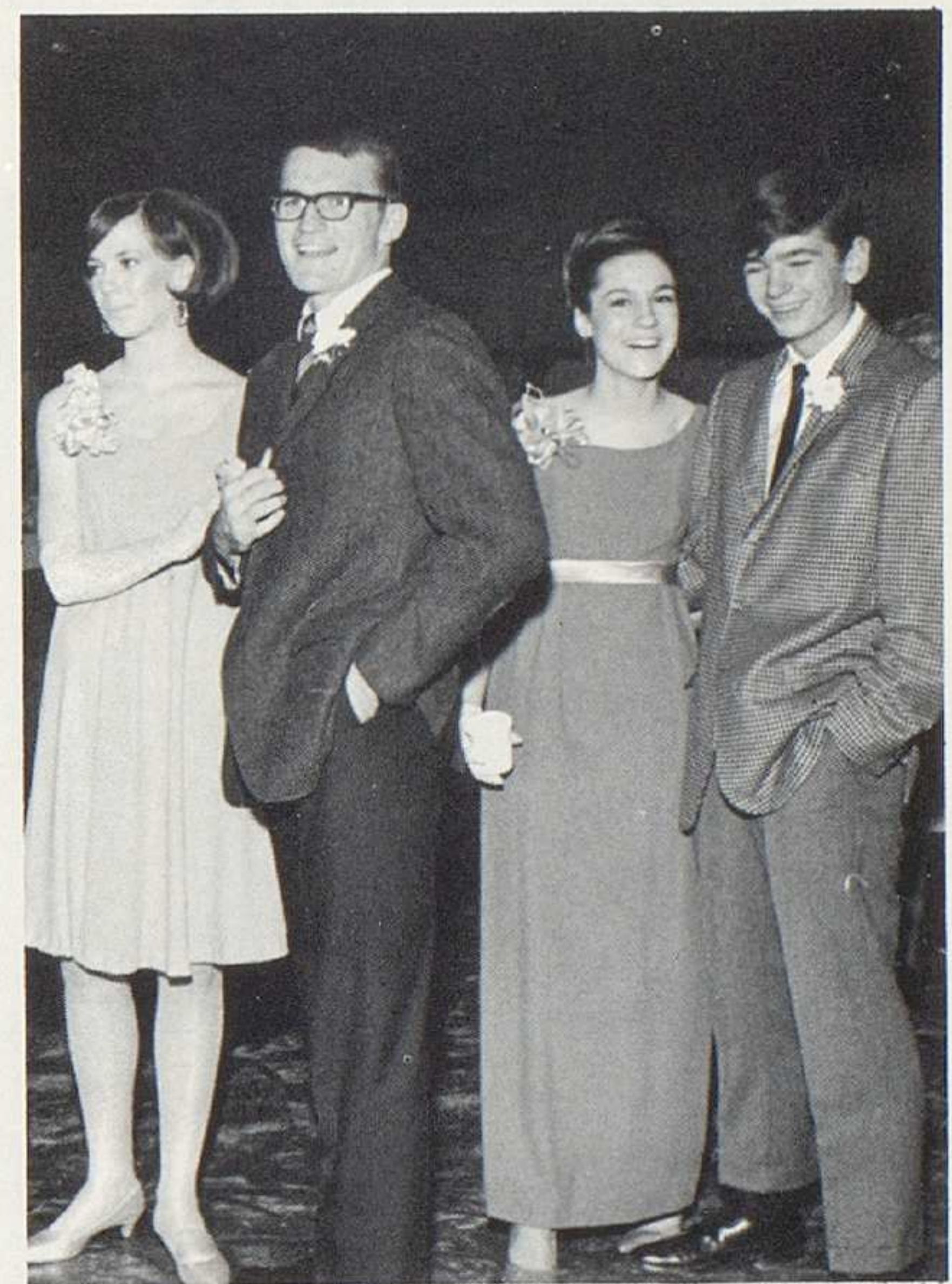

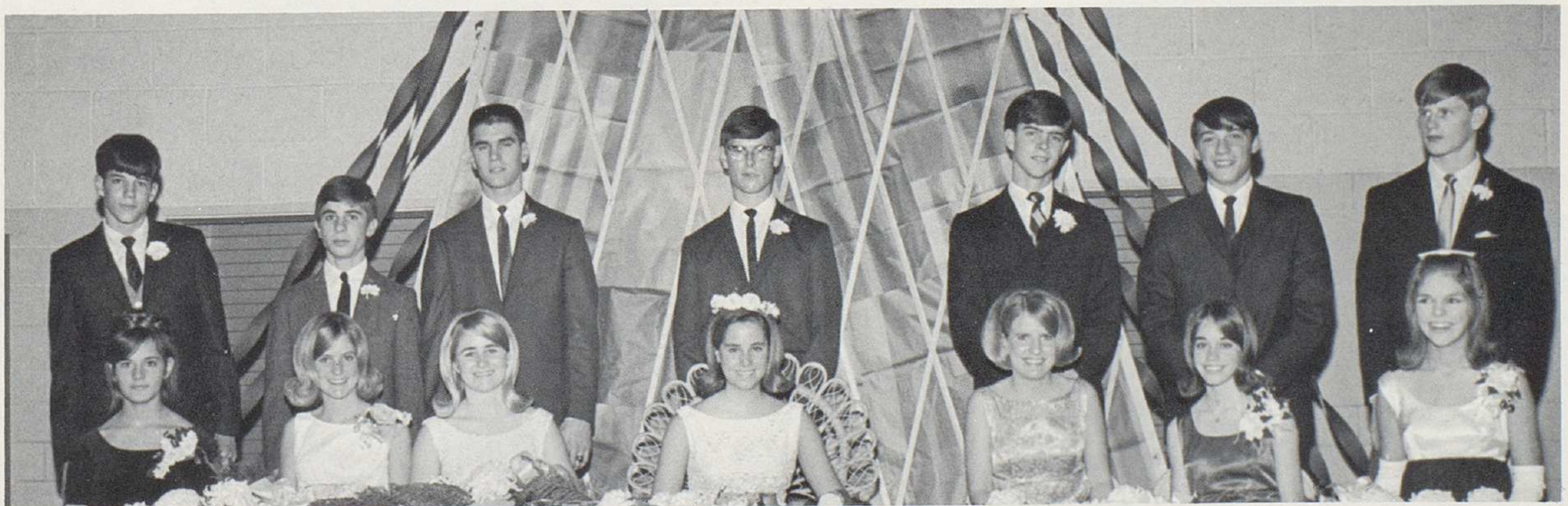

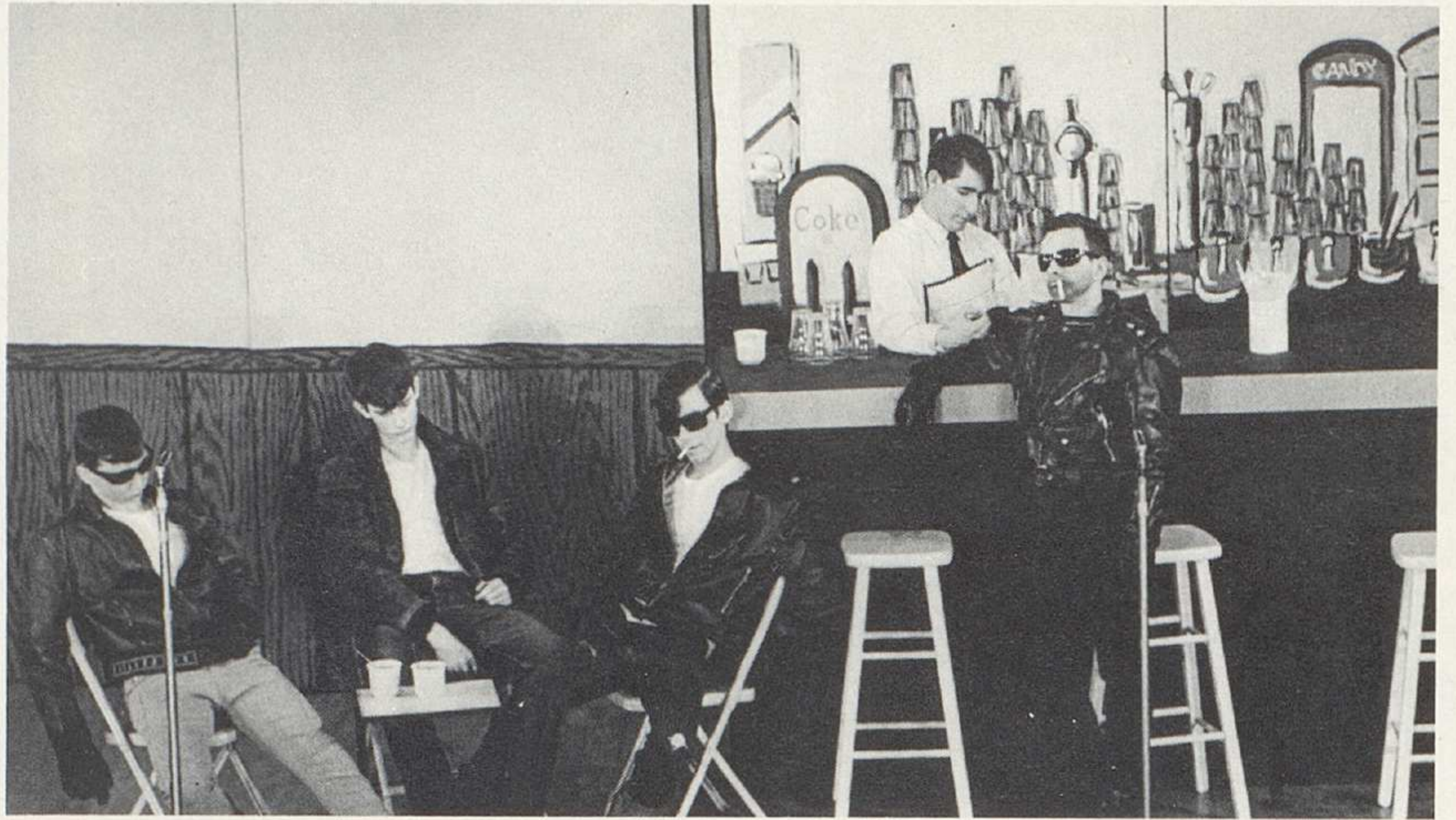

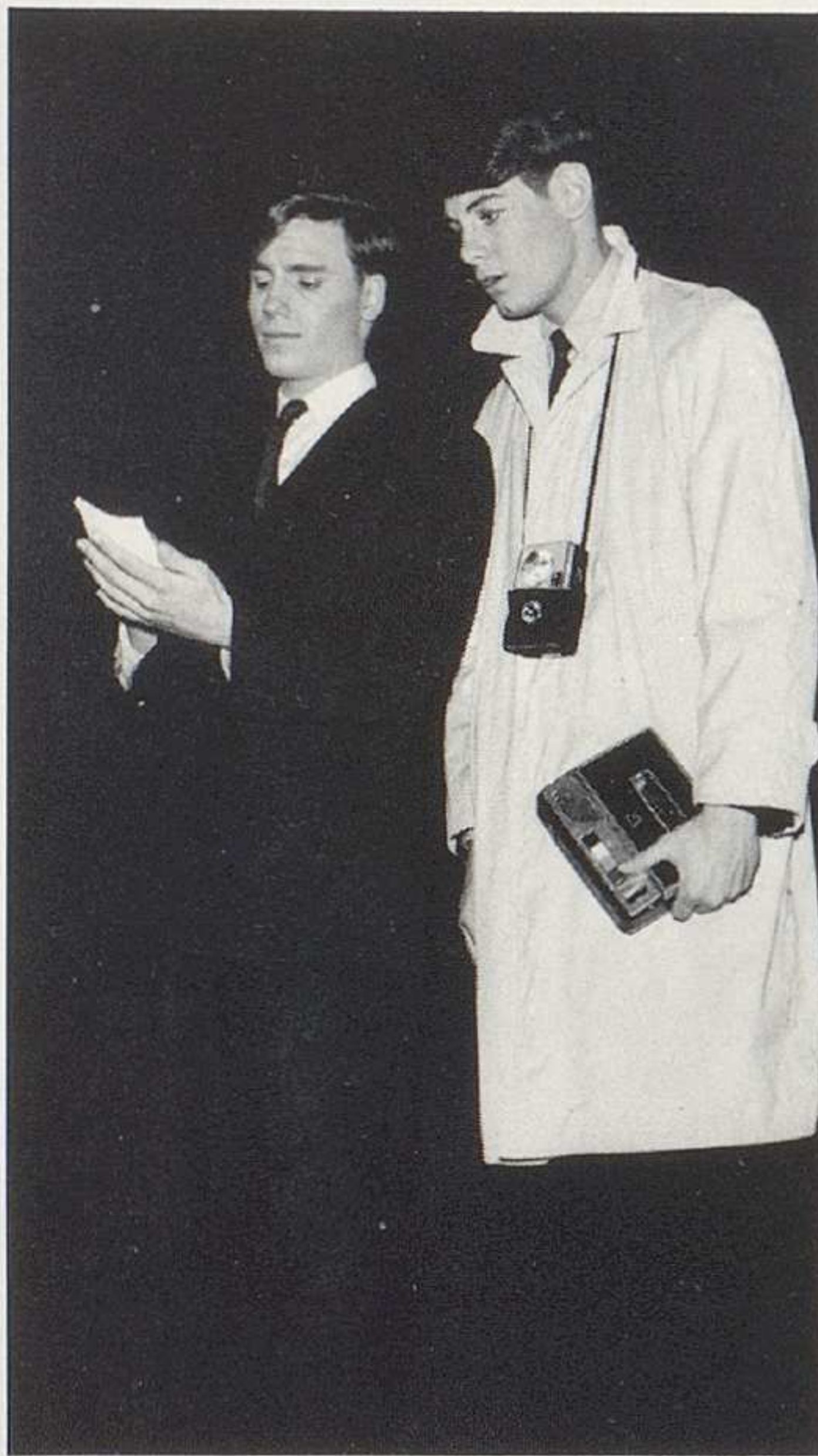

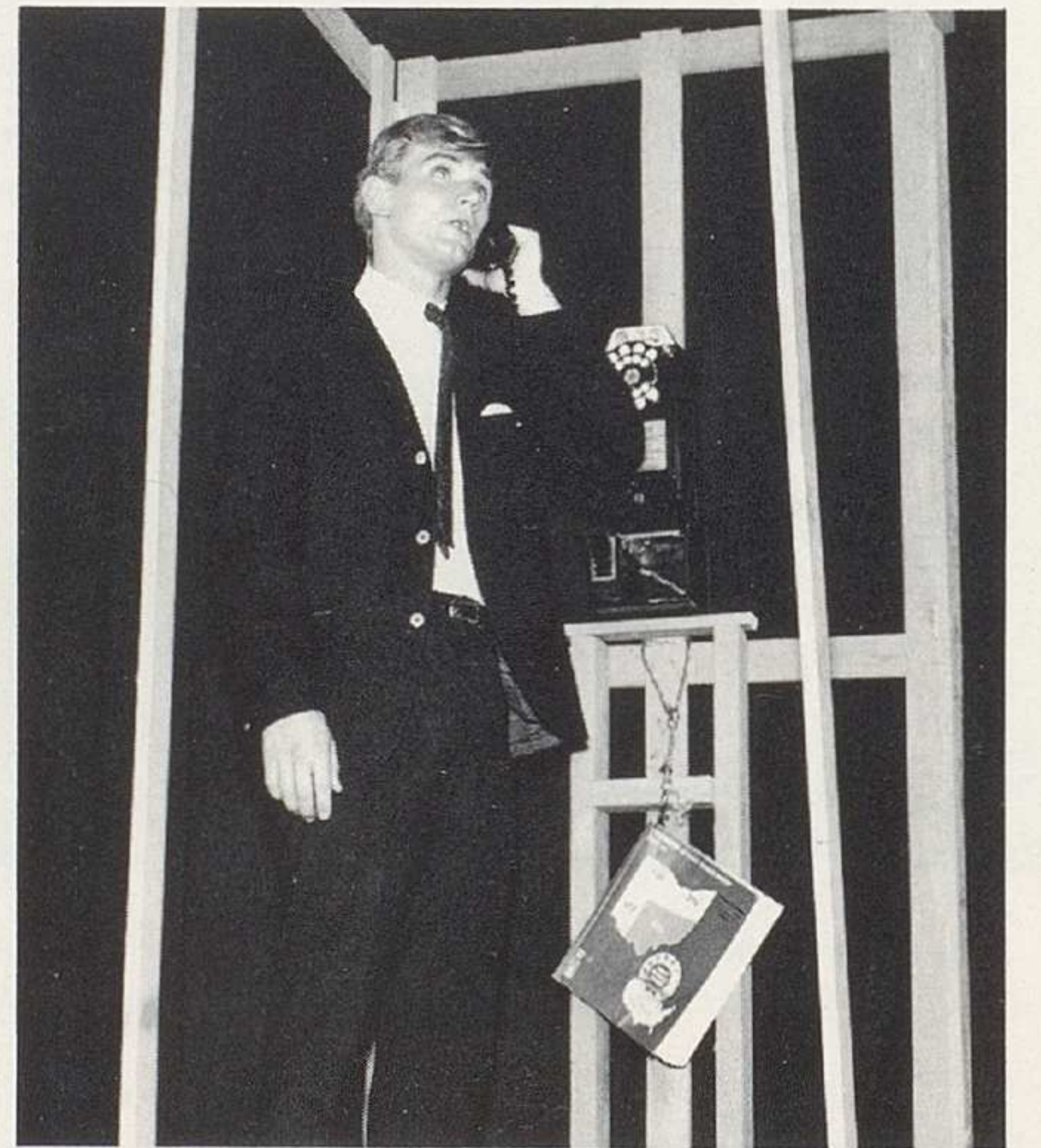

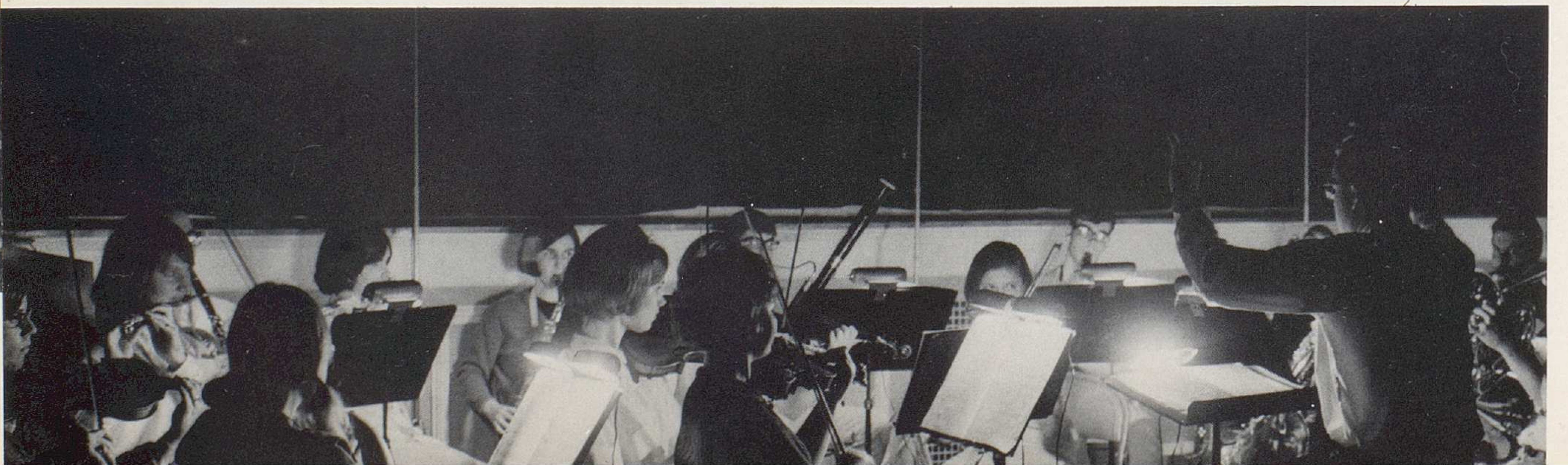

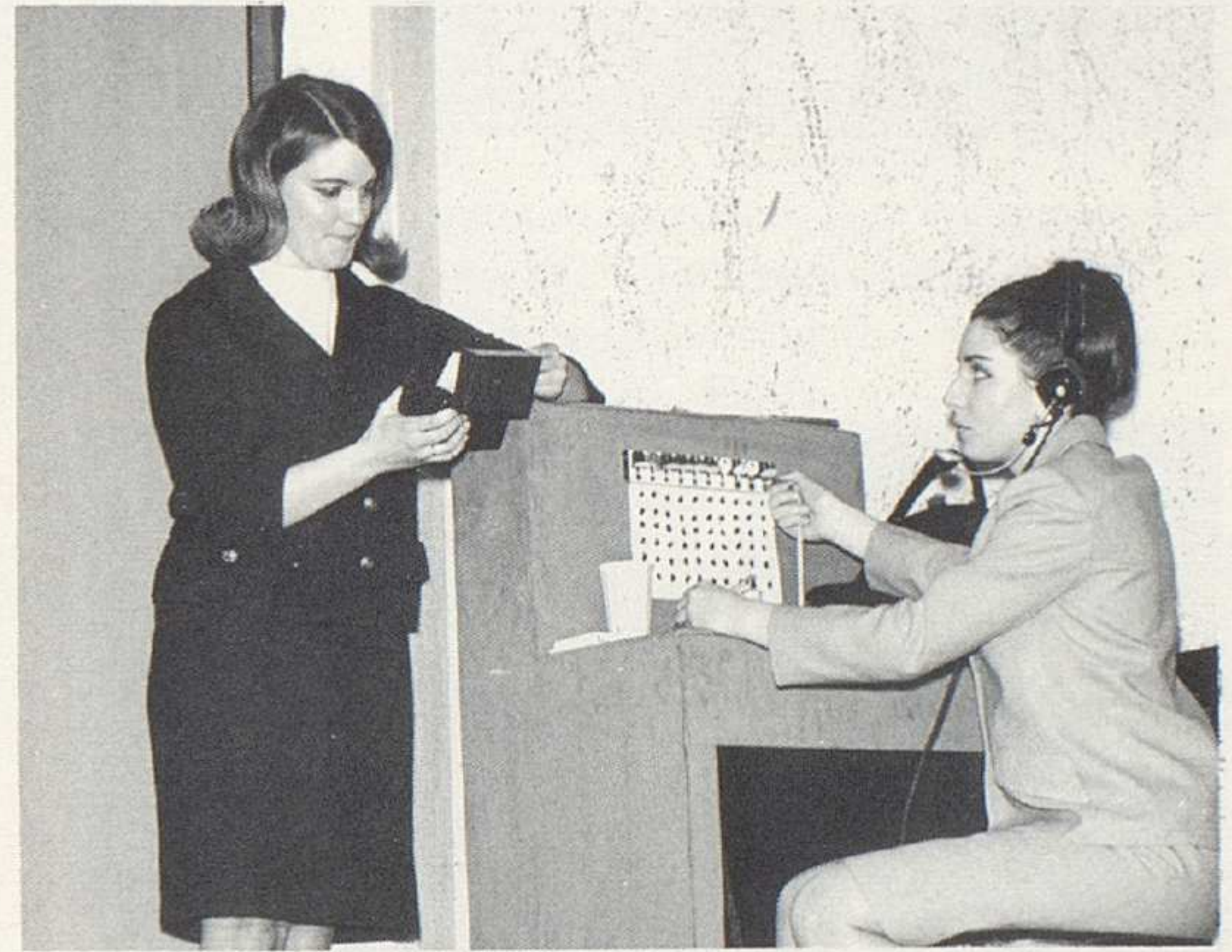

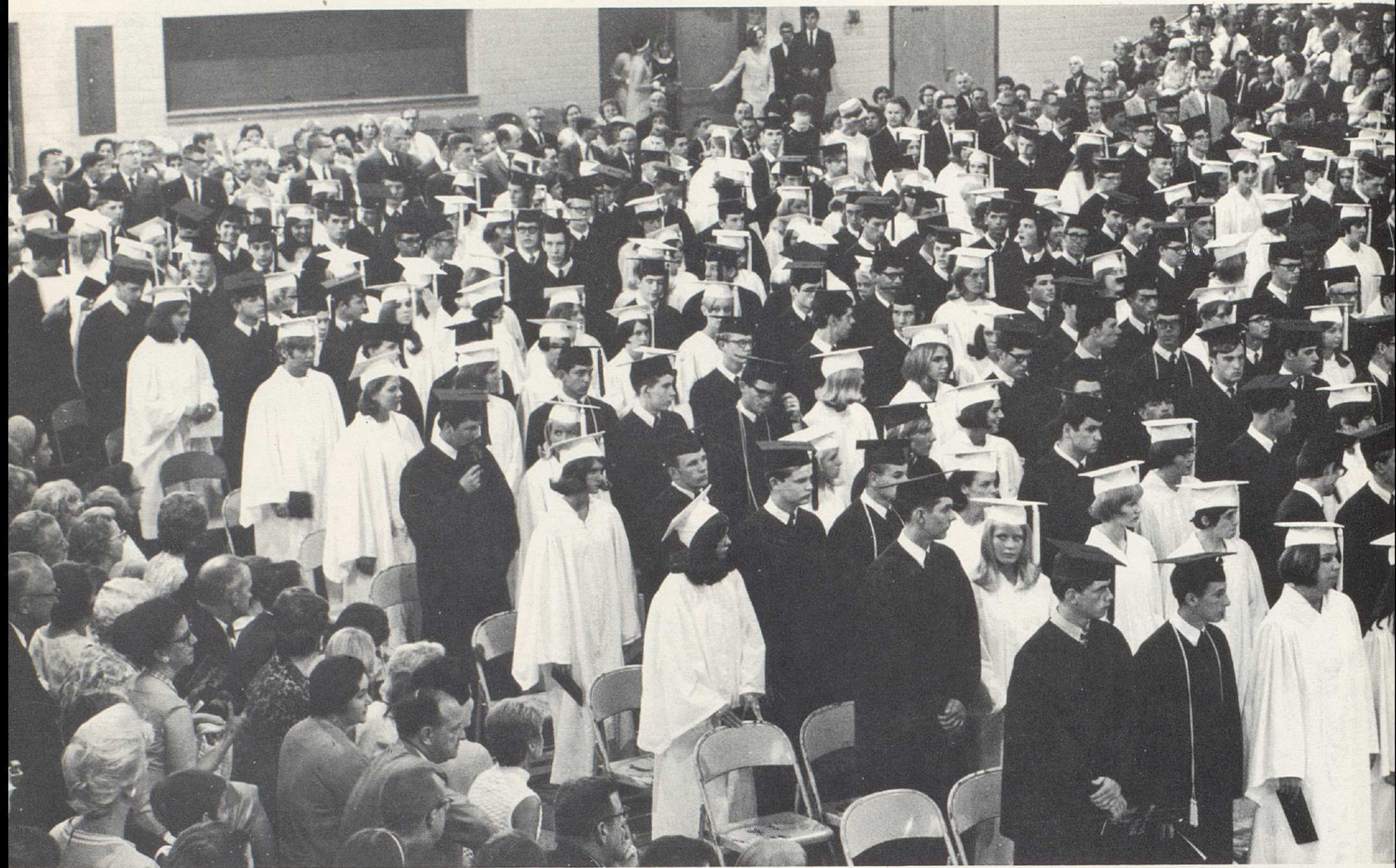

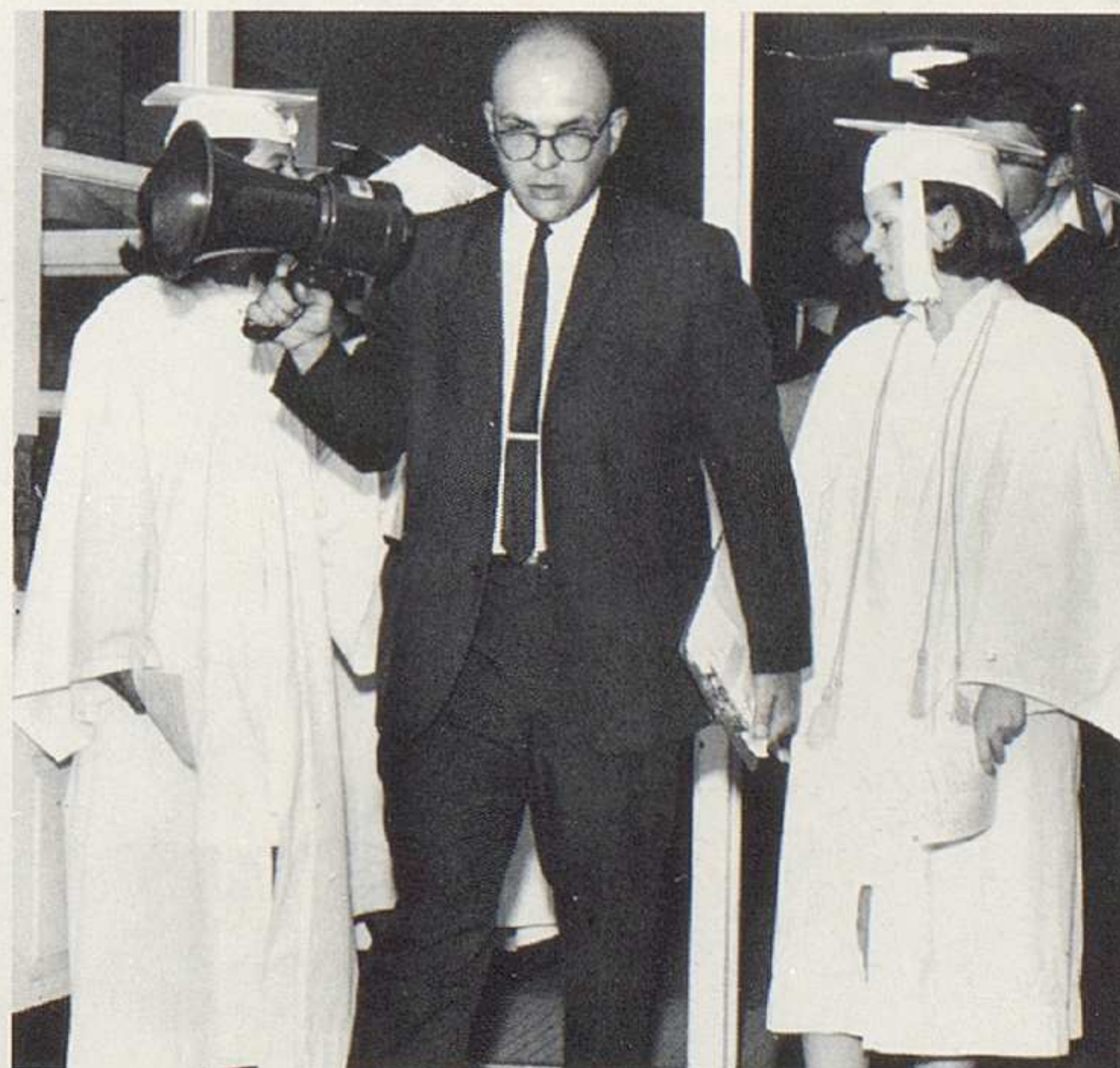
Diplomas For 376 Seniors

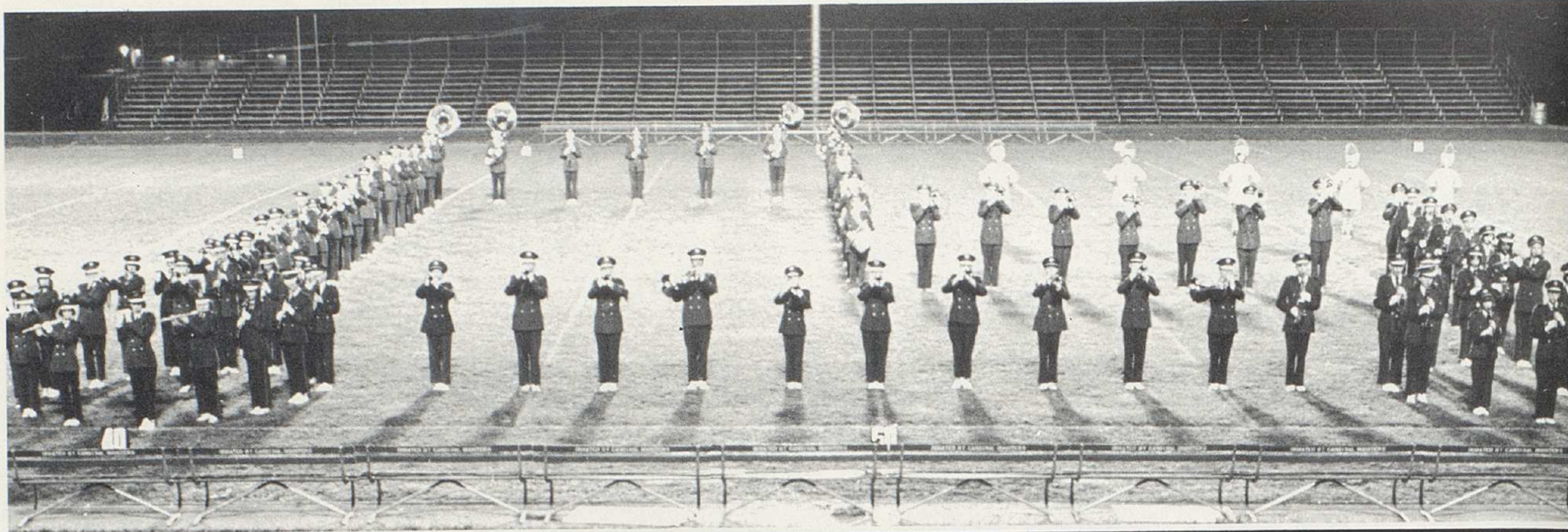

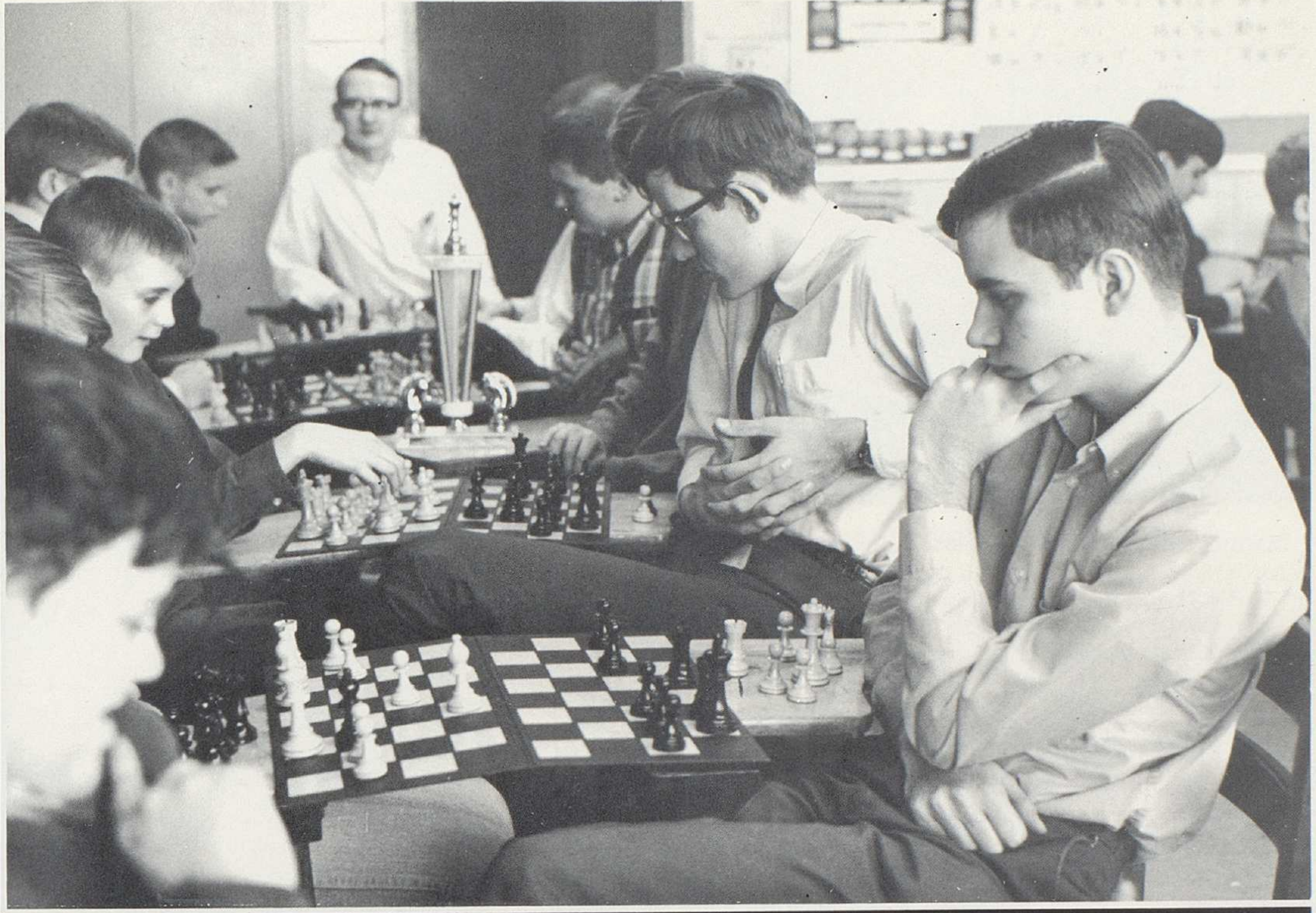

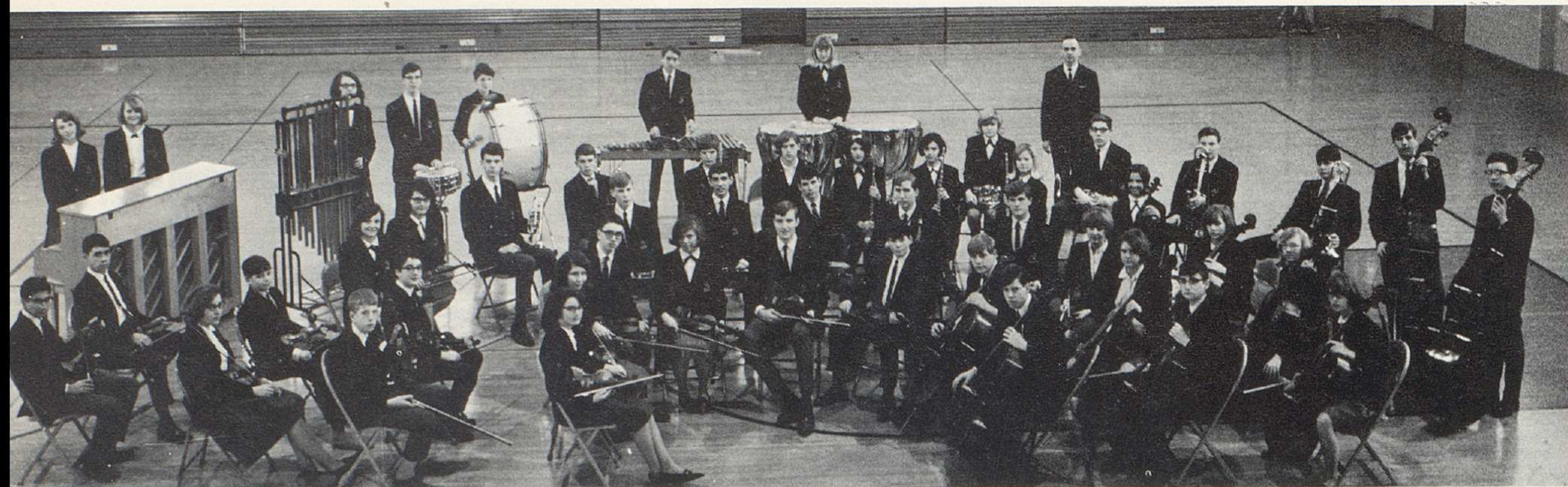
Organizations

Orchestras Delve Into Symphonies And Modern Works

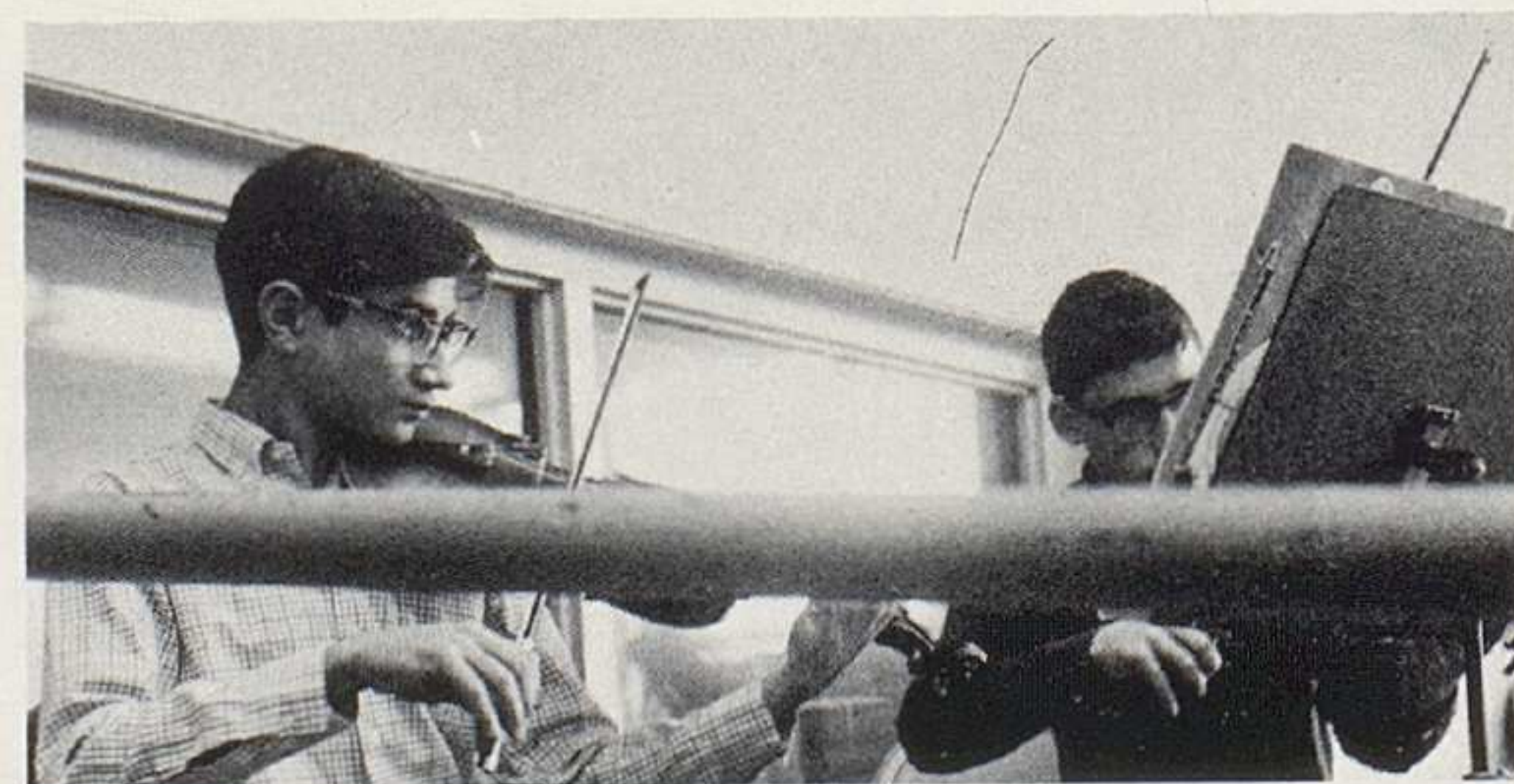

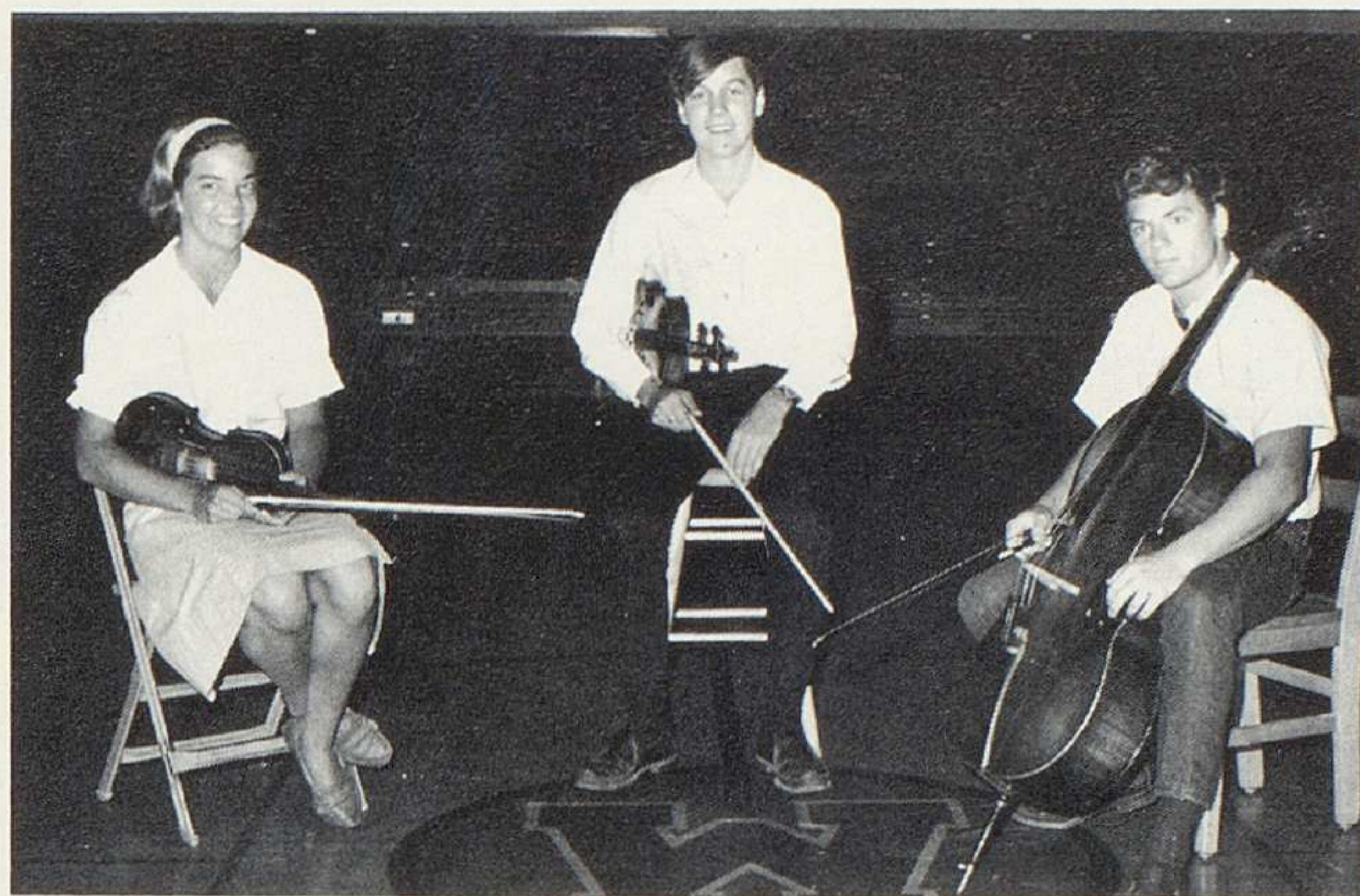

Singing throughout the year, students took advantage of this chance to enjoy themselves and to prime their voices for more difficult singing.



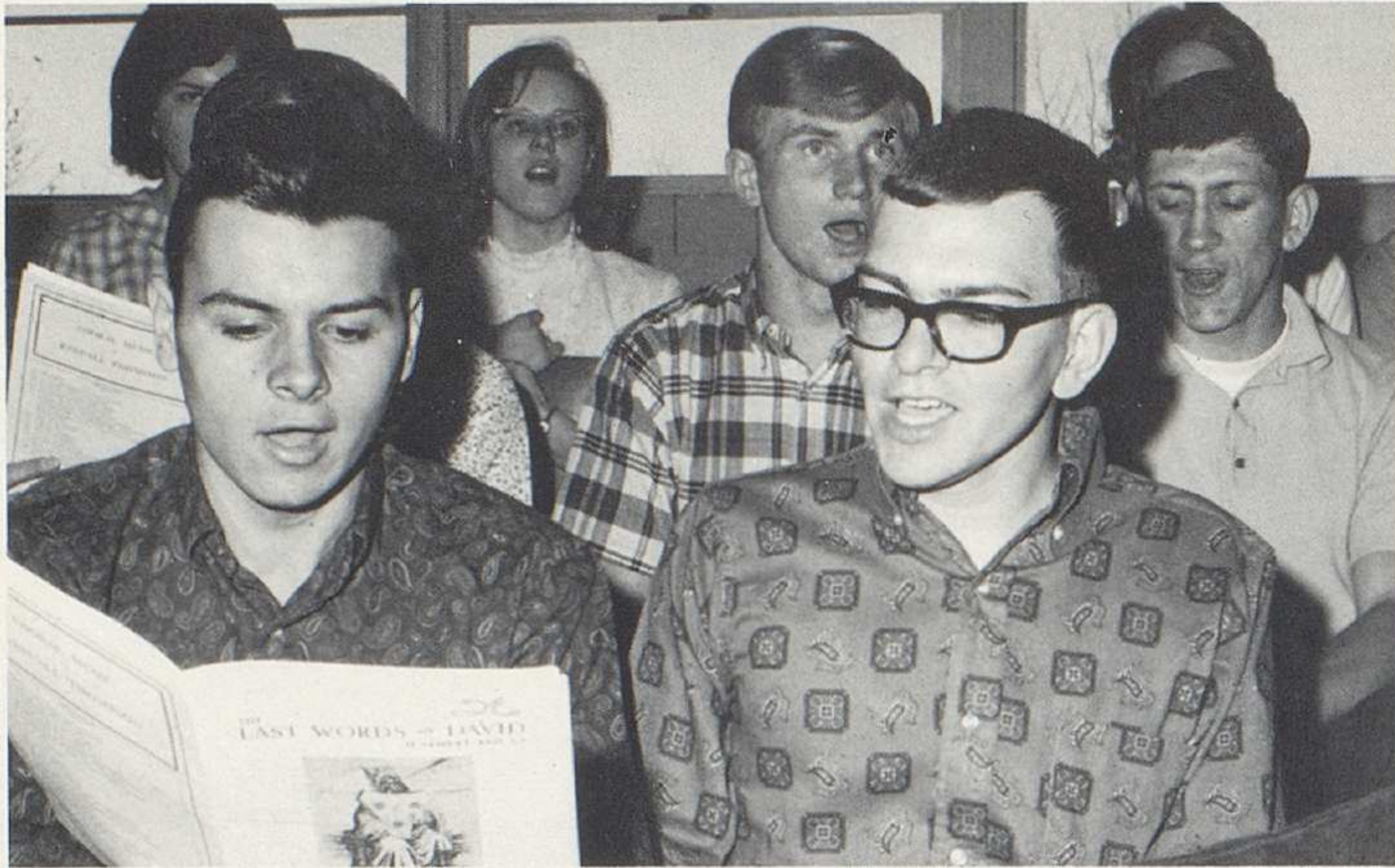

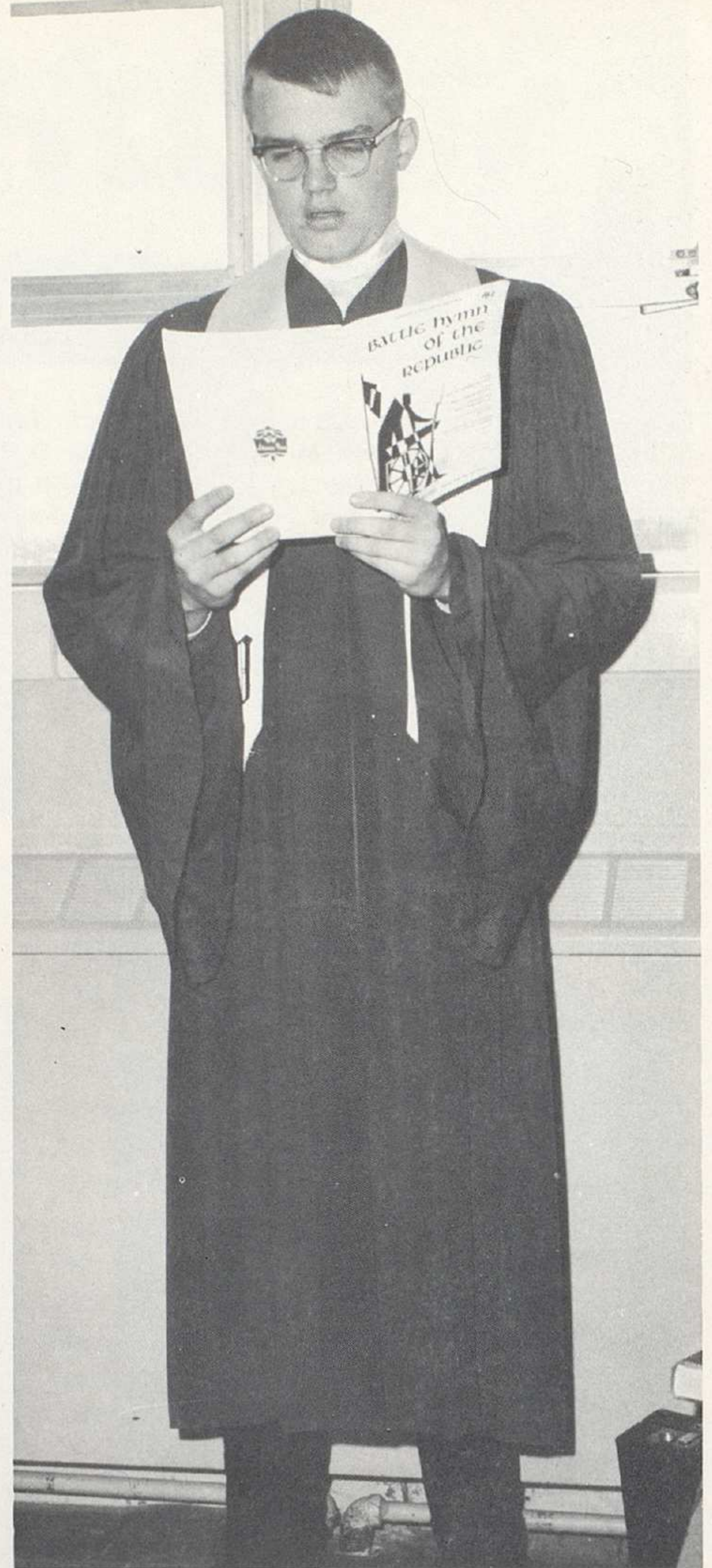

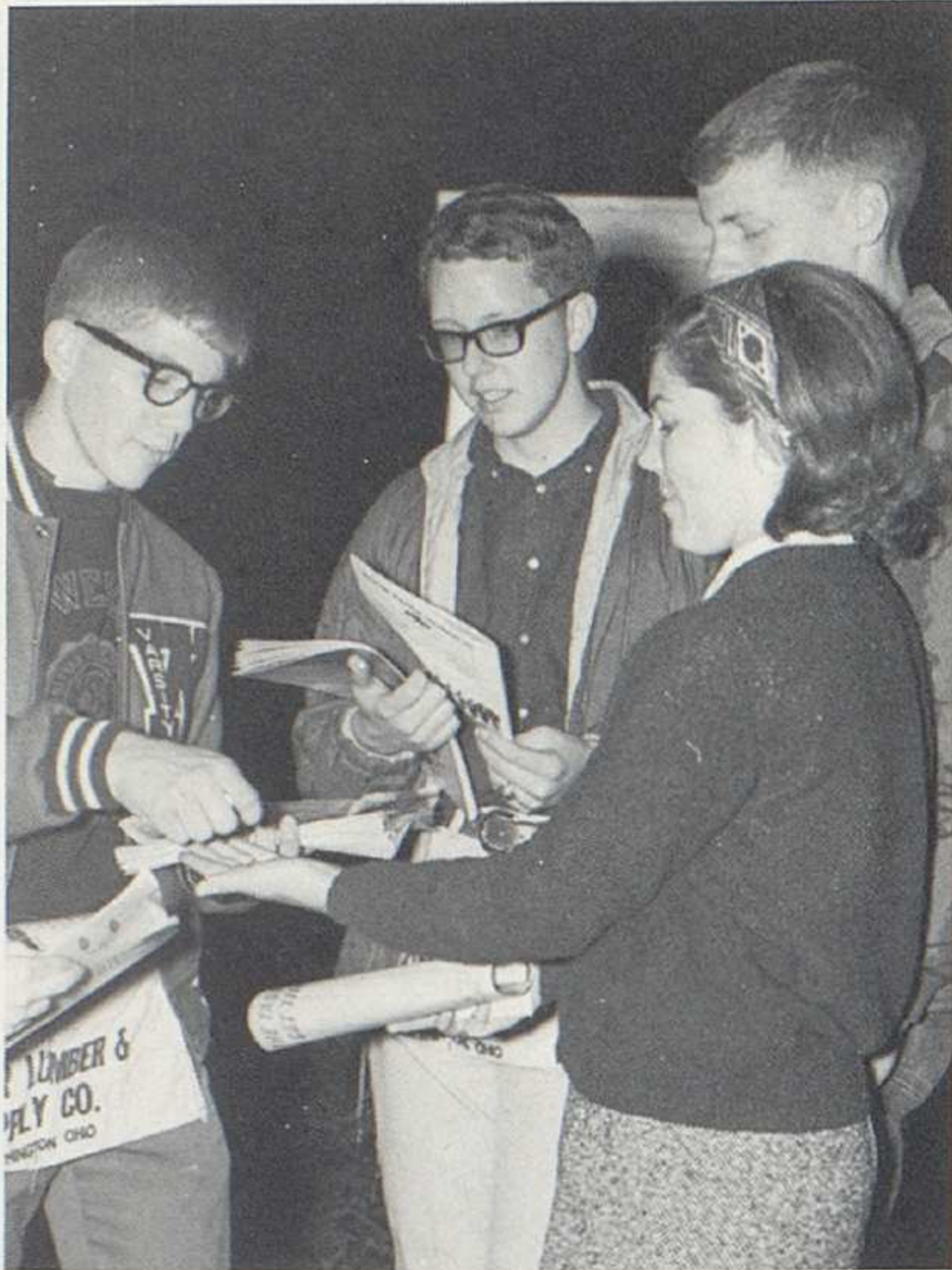

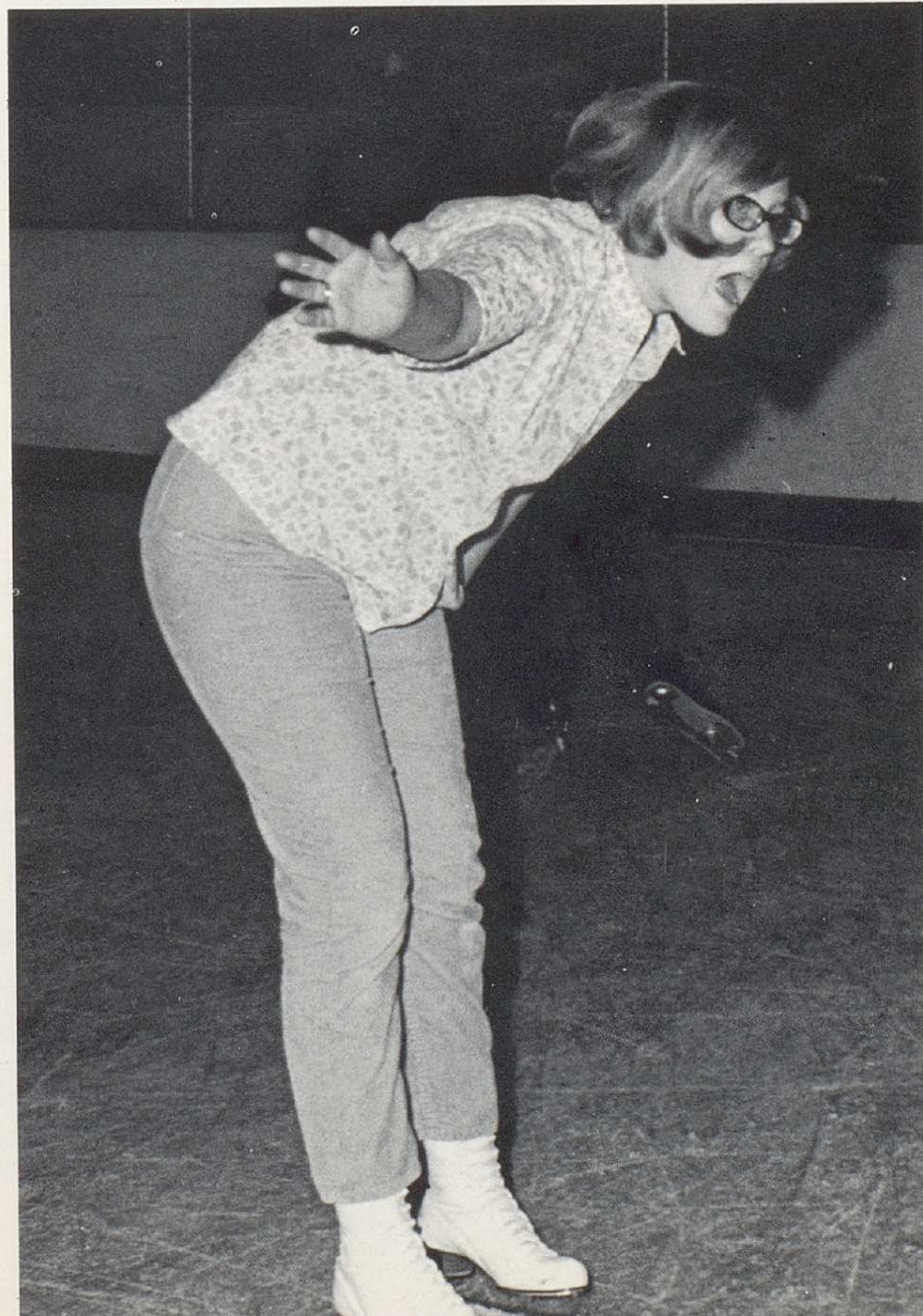
GAA Calendar Weighted With Ski Trips, Picnics

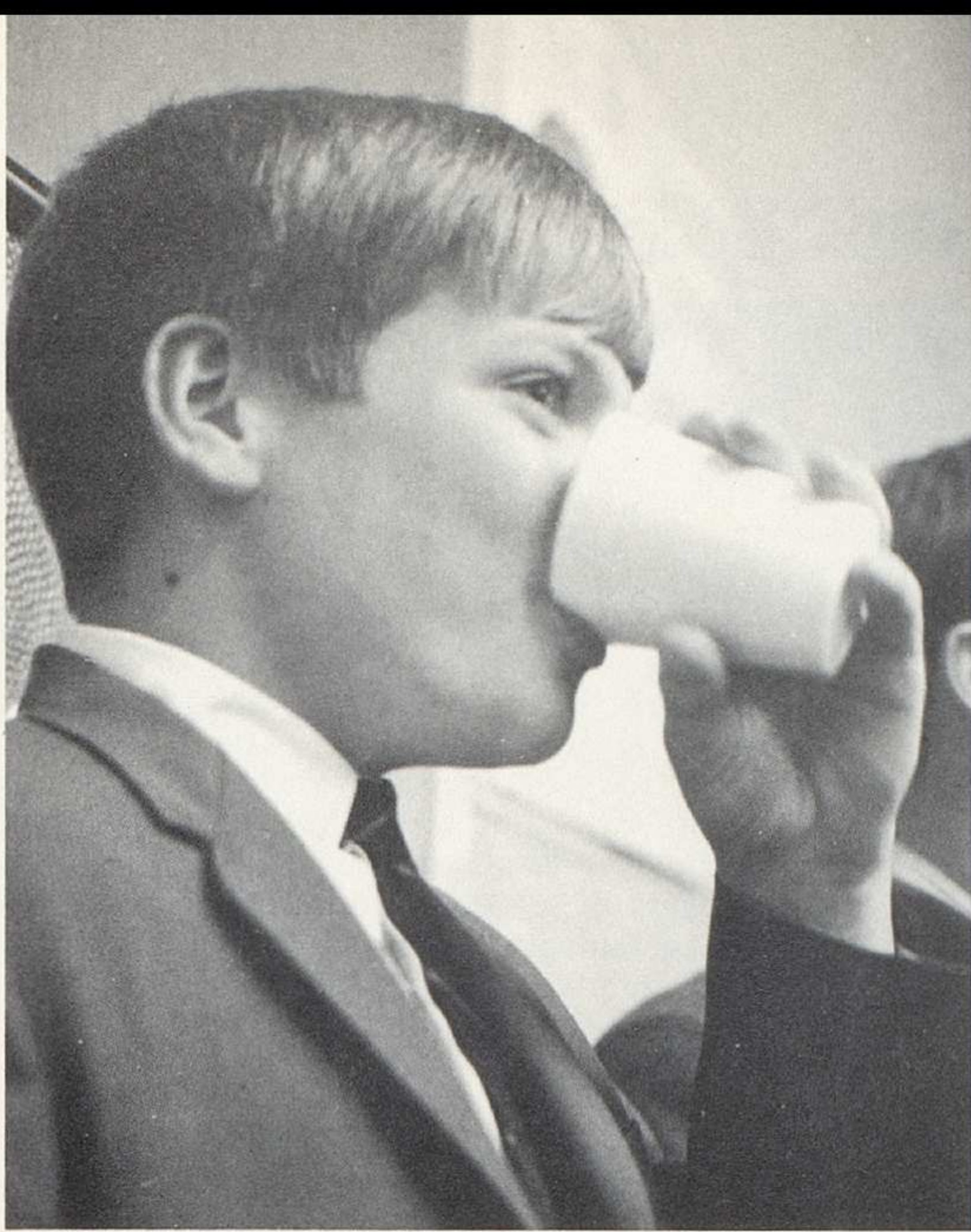

To run the two main offices crisply and effectively, officials recruited a crew of girls to help the office staff. 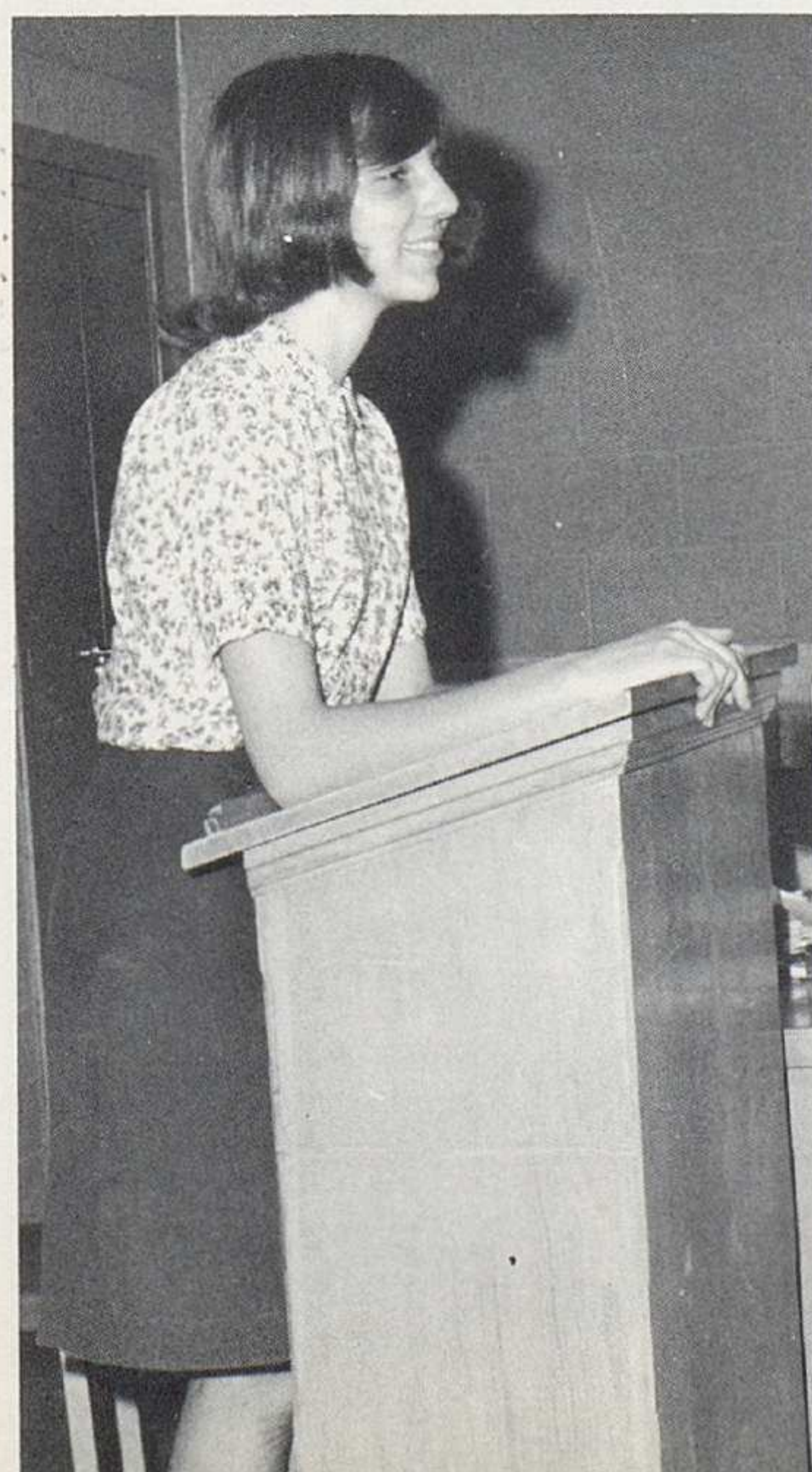

Erich Shares Austrian Life With Worthington AFS Club

"Buy a share in next year's AFS student," read the signs that lined Worthington halls. For their colossal fund raising endeavor, American Field Service sold shares for twenty-five cents each to help finance Worthington's next guest. People all over the town remembered the fun of hosting the 1967 student, Erich Kastner, of Austria, and they responded whole-heartedly.

From Linz, Austria, where he lived with his mother and brother Kurt, Erich transplanted himself to live for a year with senior Paul Chakroff and family. Speaking English with a powerful touch, Erich was a friendly, often amusing addition to his classes. In America, he skied, hiked, swam, sang, and bicycled with all the love he knew for those activities at home.

Commencement marked Erich's reluctant departure. Until the end of July, he was swept up in a whirlwind bus tour of the U.S.A. with other AFS students. 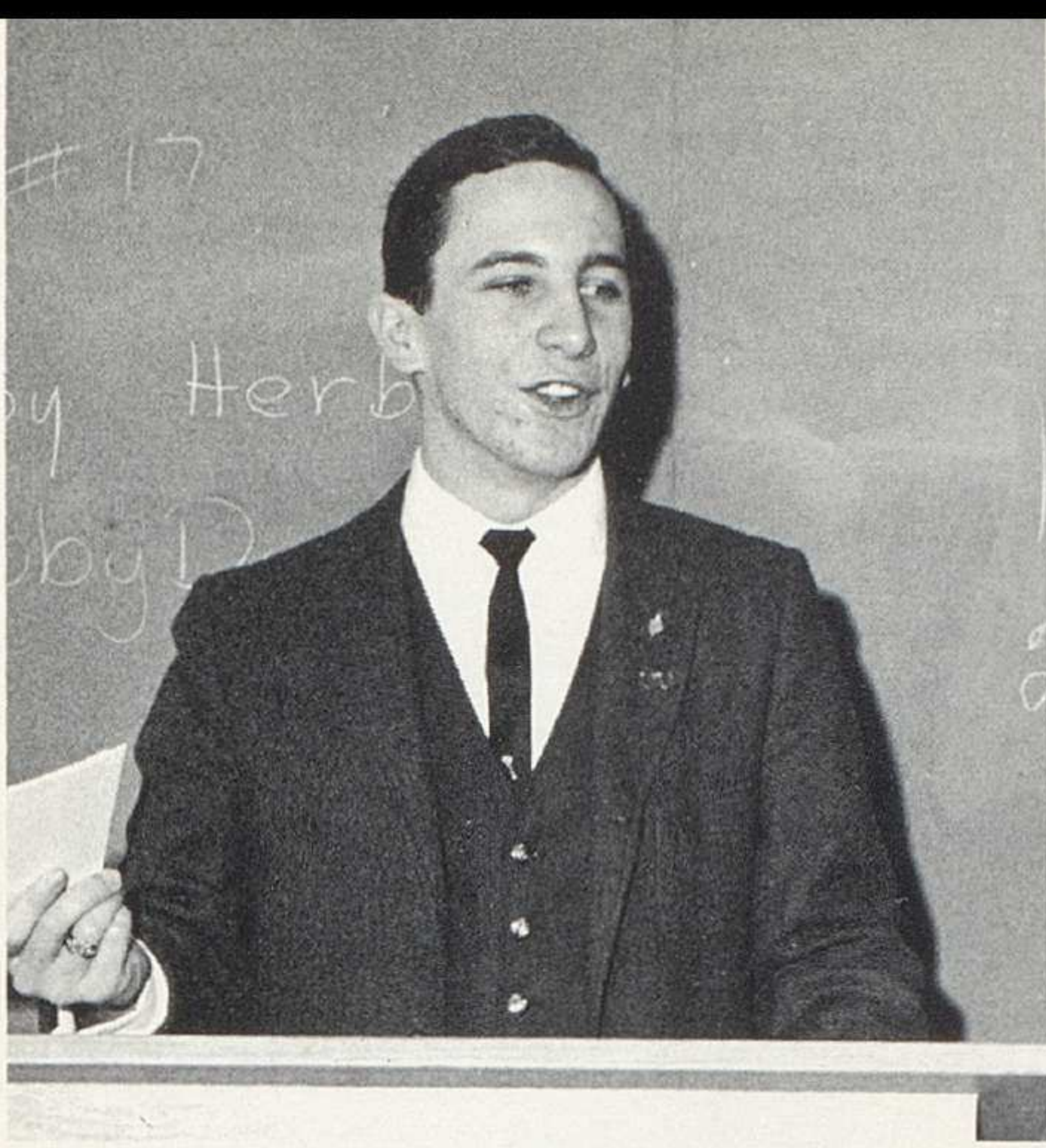

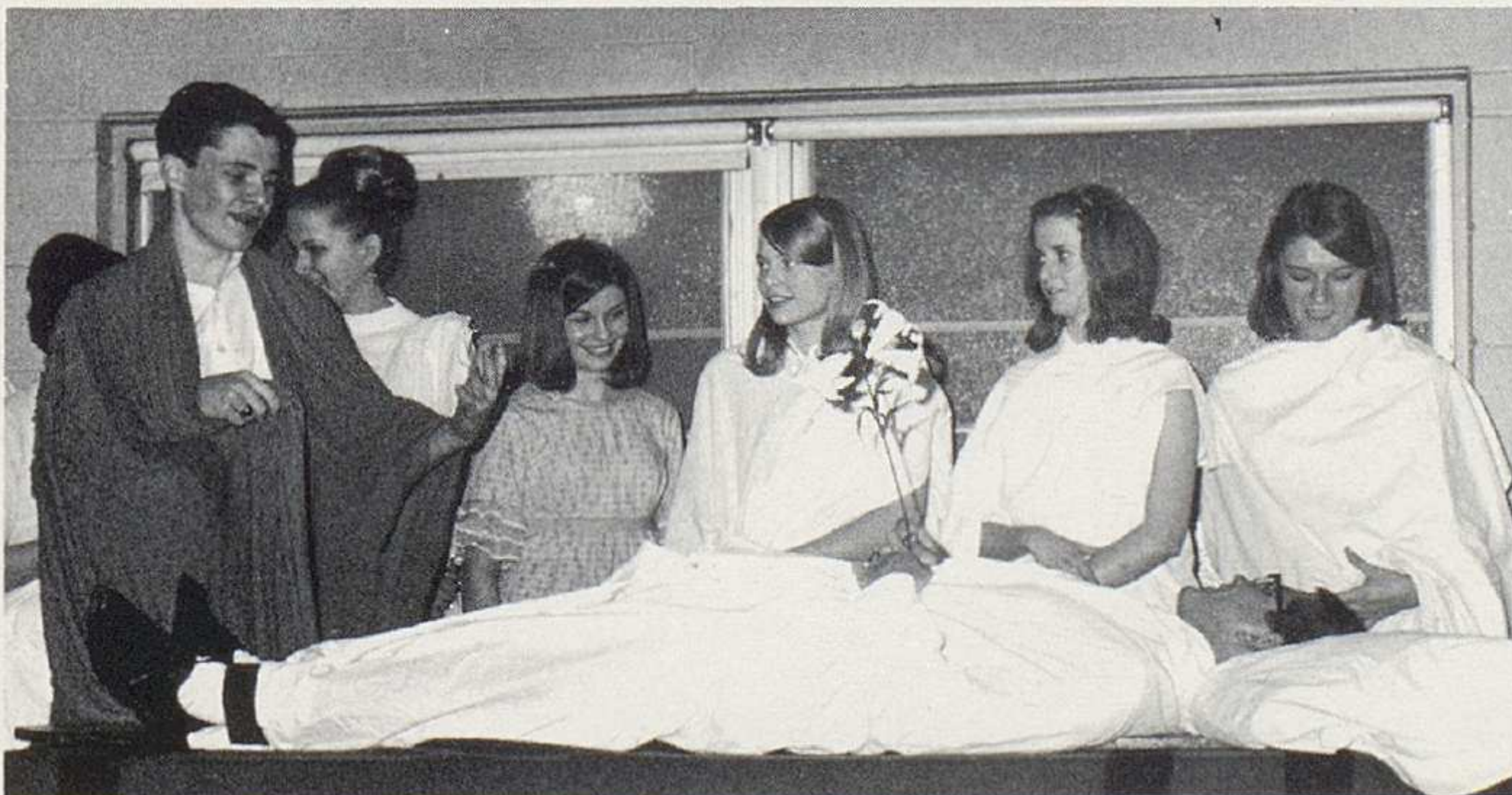

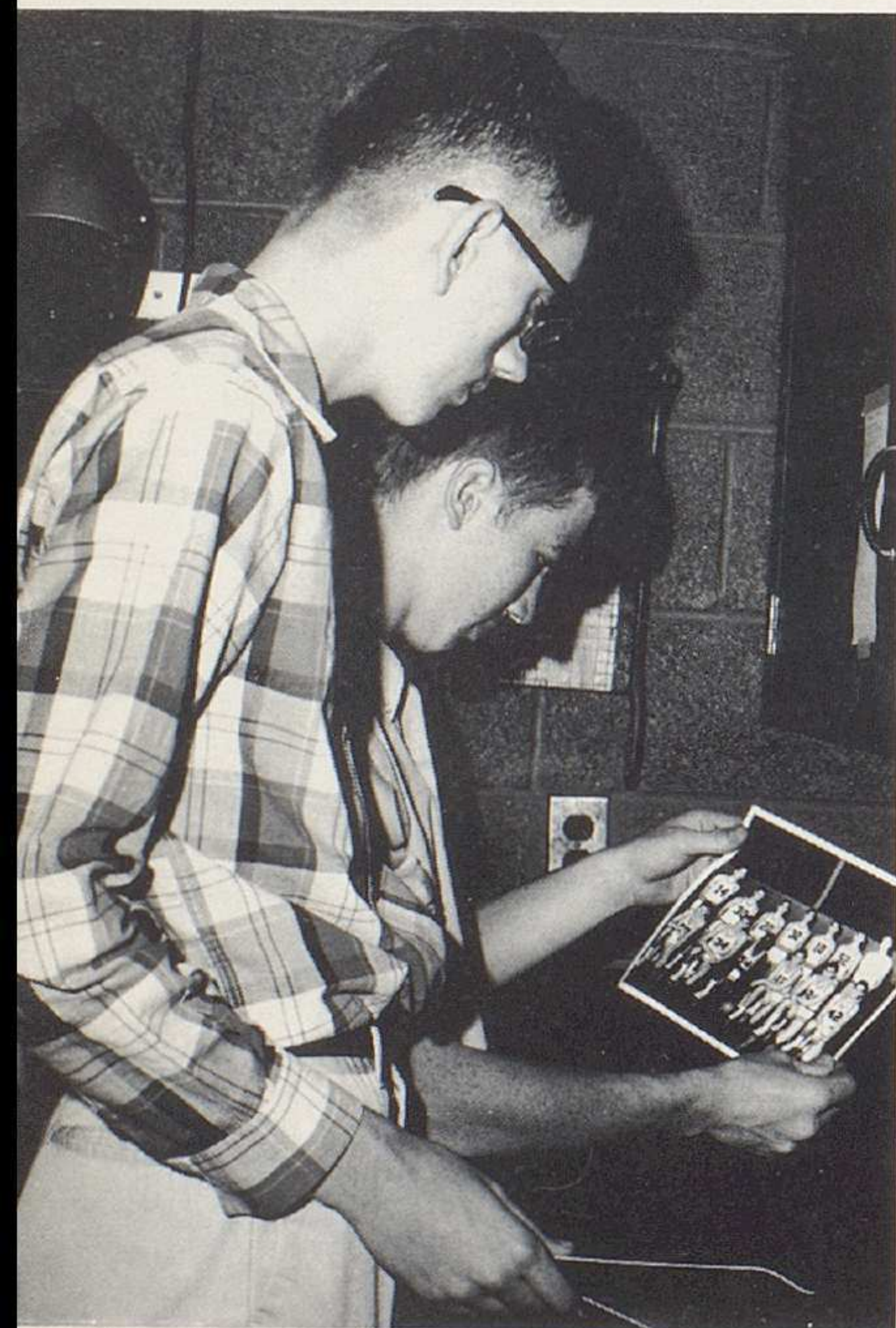

vice-president; Steve Rigsby, as secretary; and Doug Dovenbarger, as treasurer.

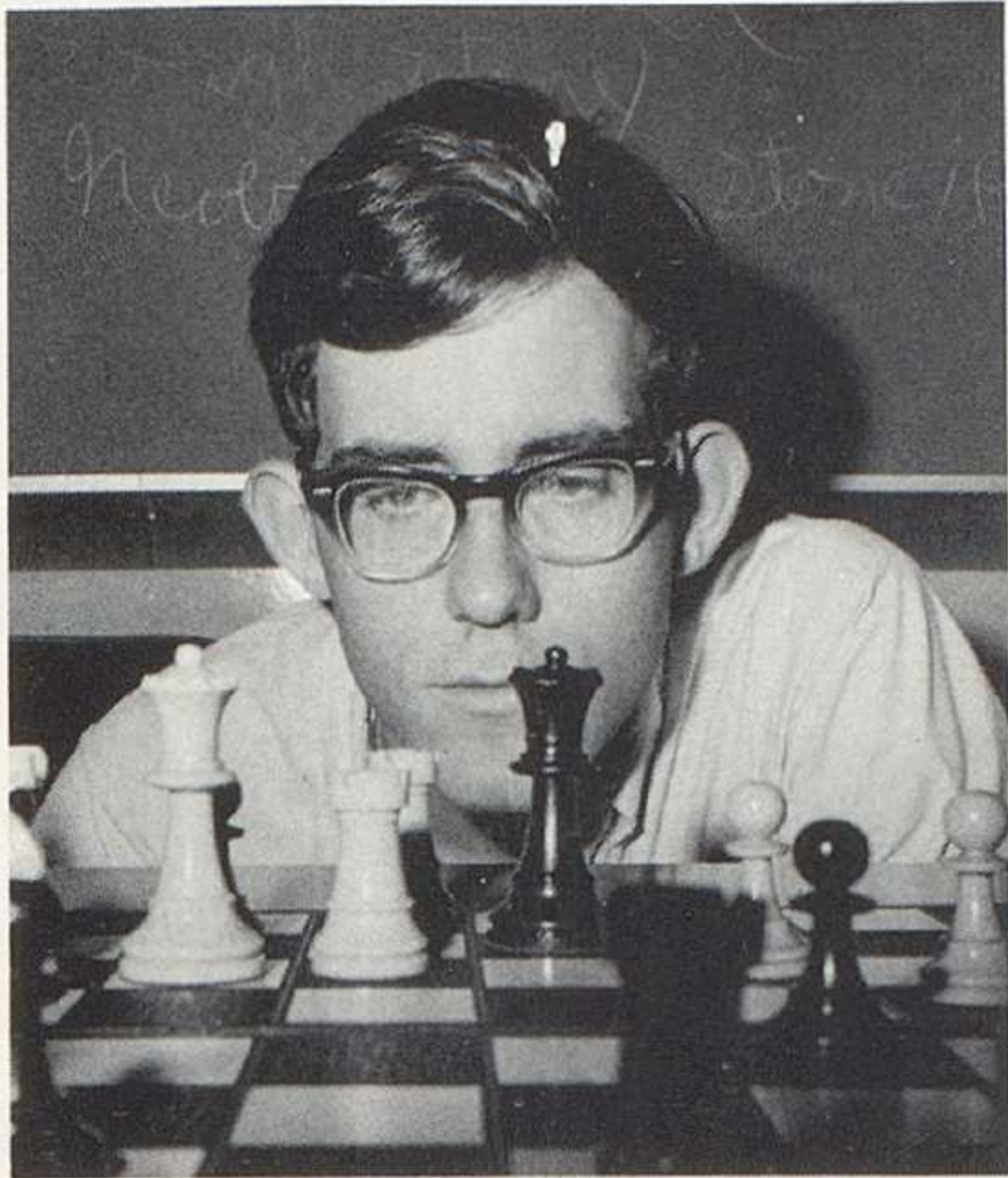

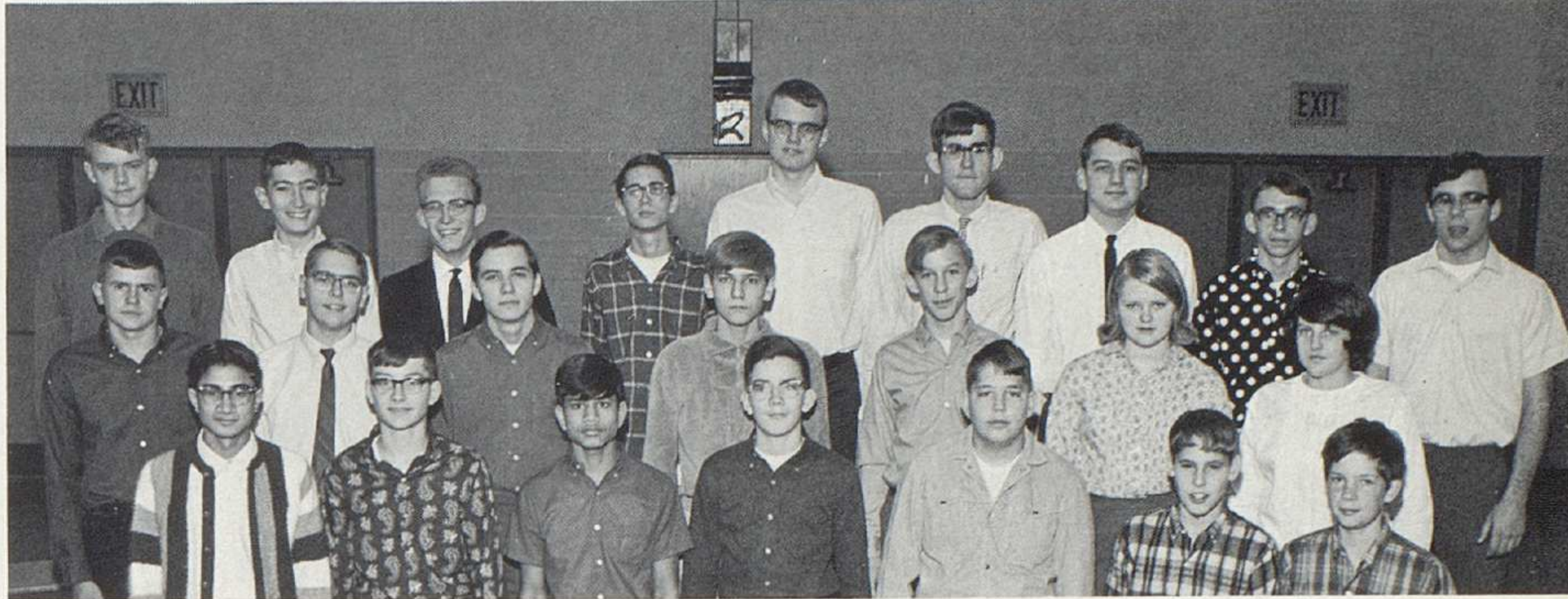
Ron Jewett (left) and Tom Webb take the first glance at a picture which will be seen in the 1966-67 basketball program.

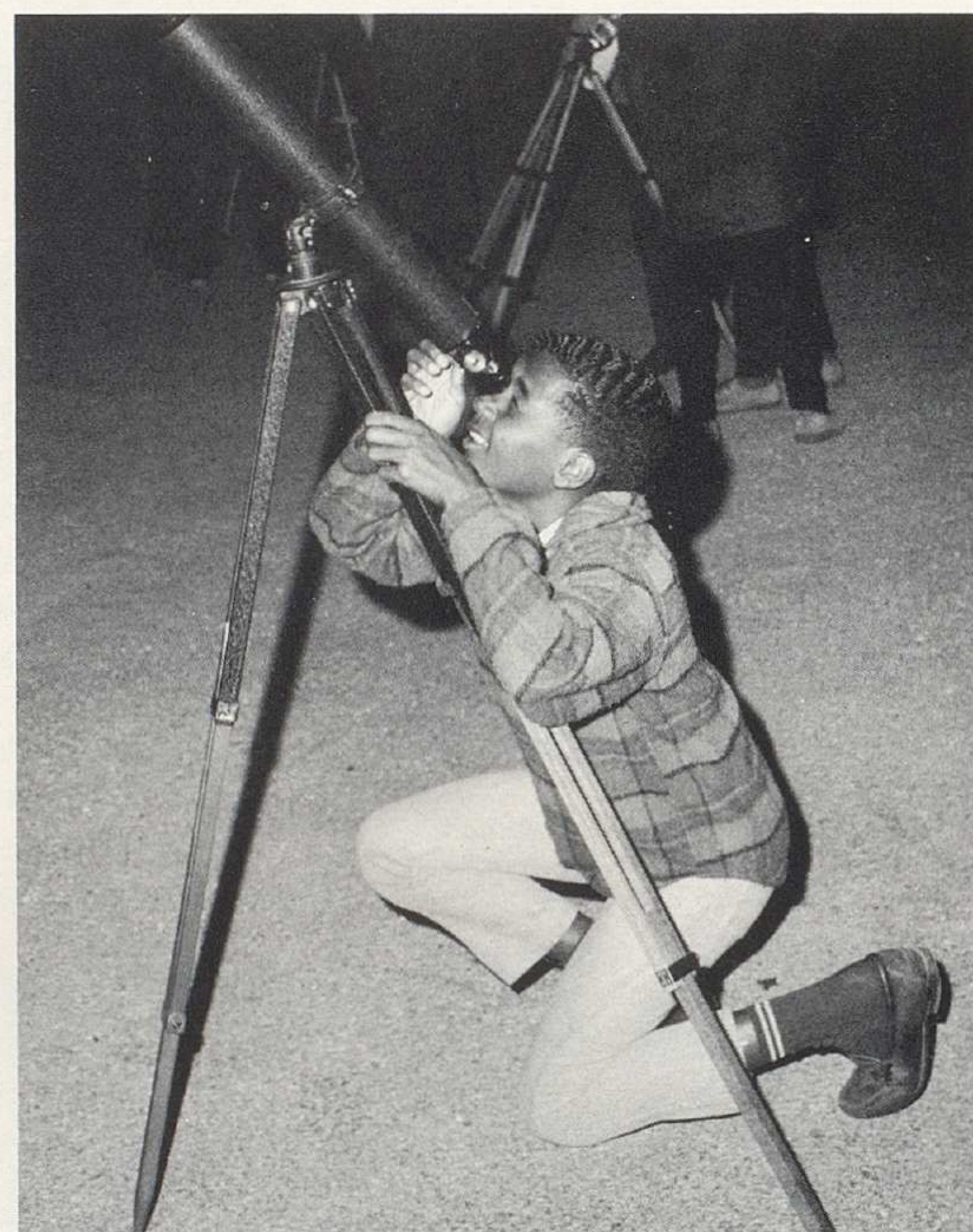

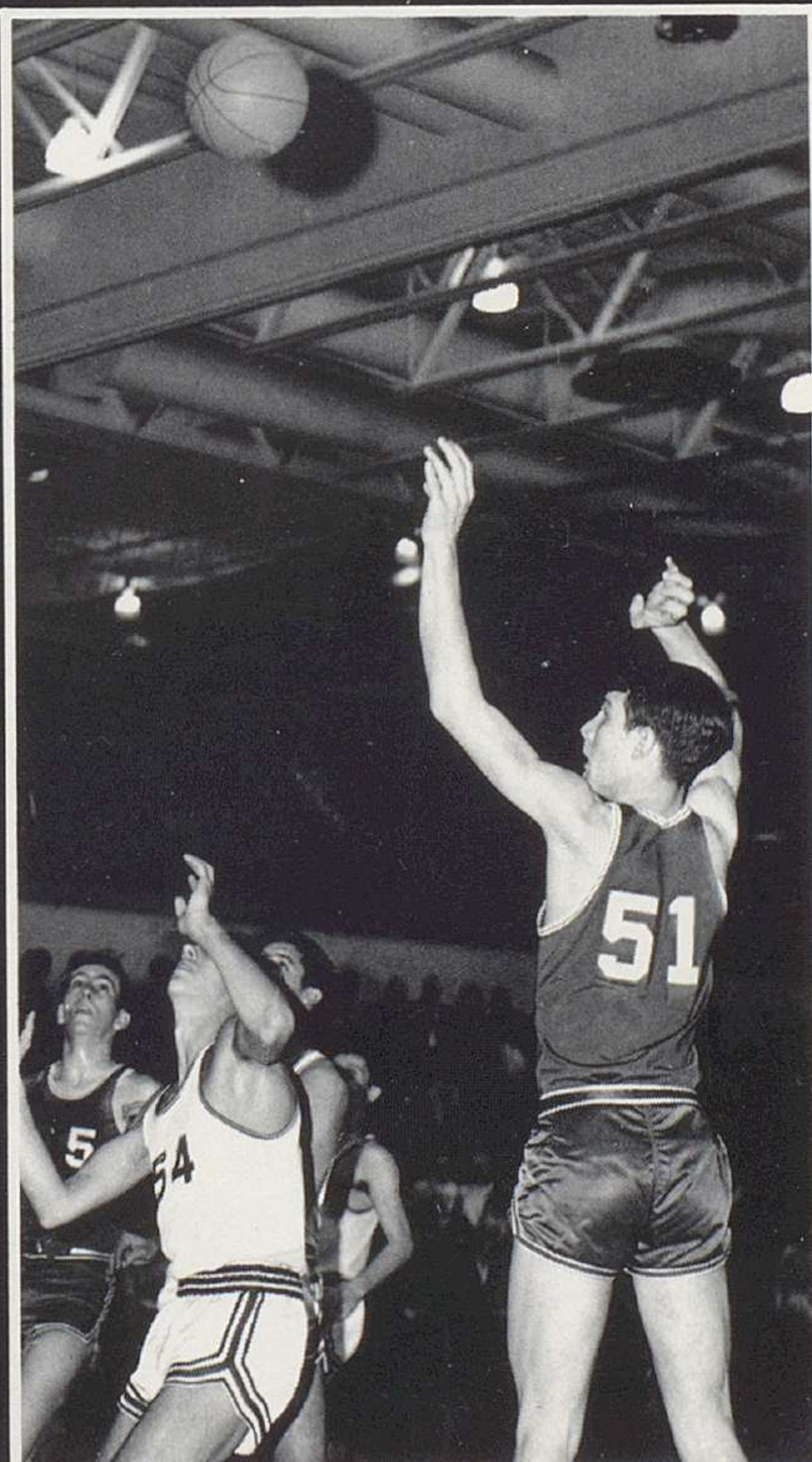

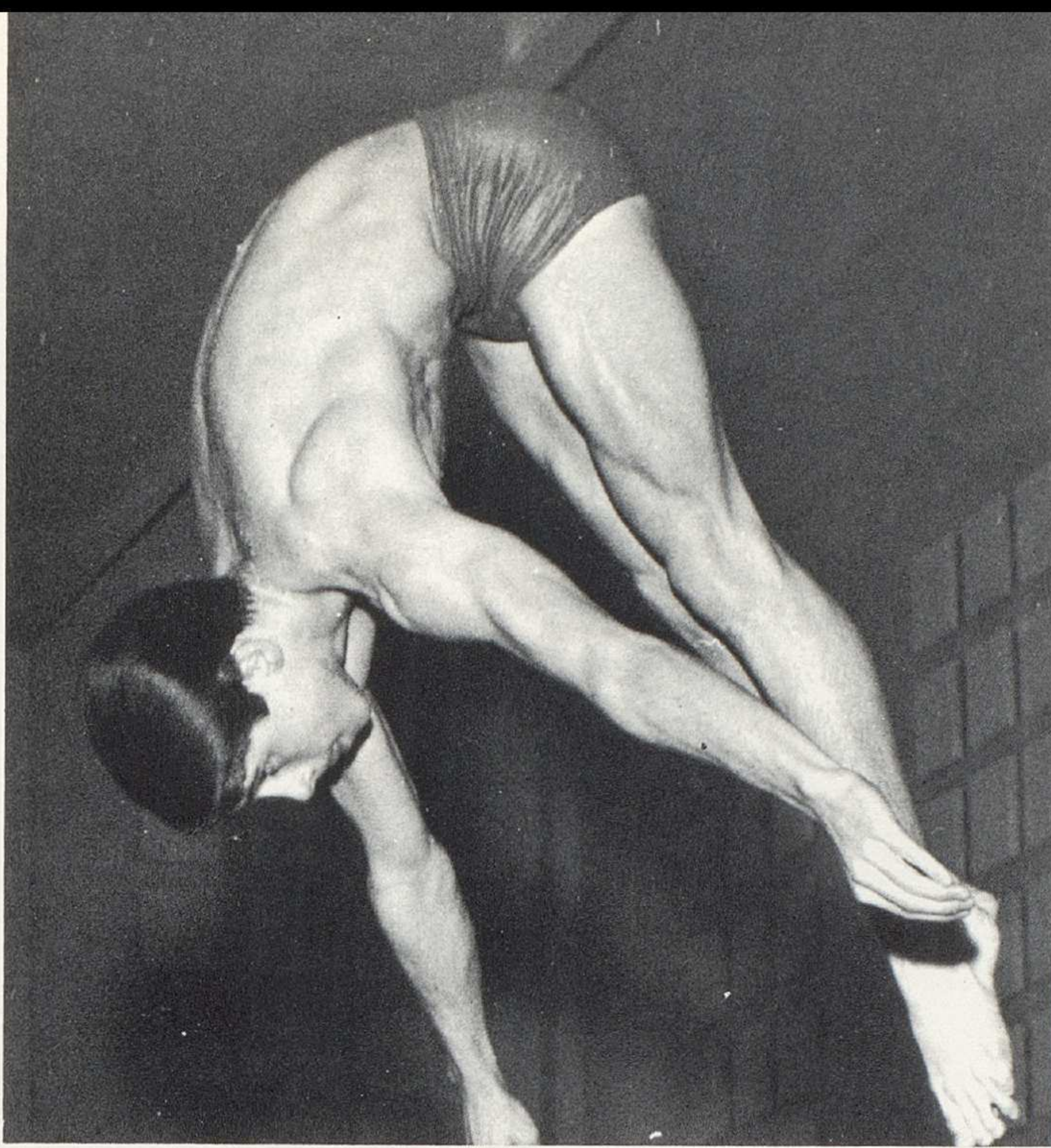

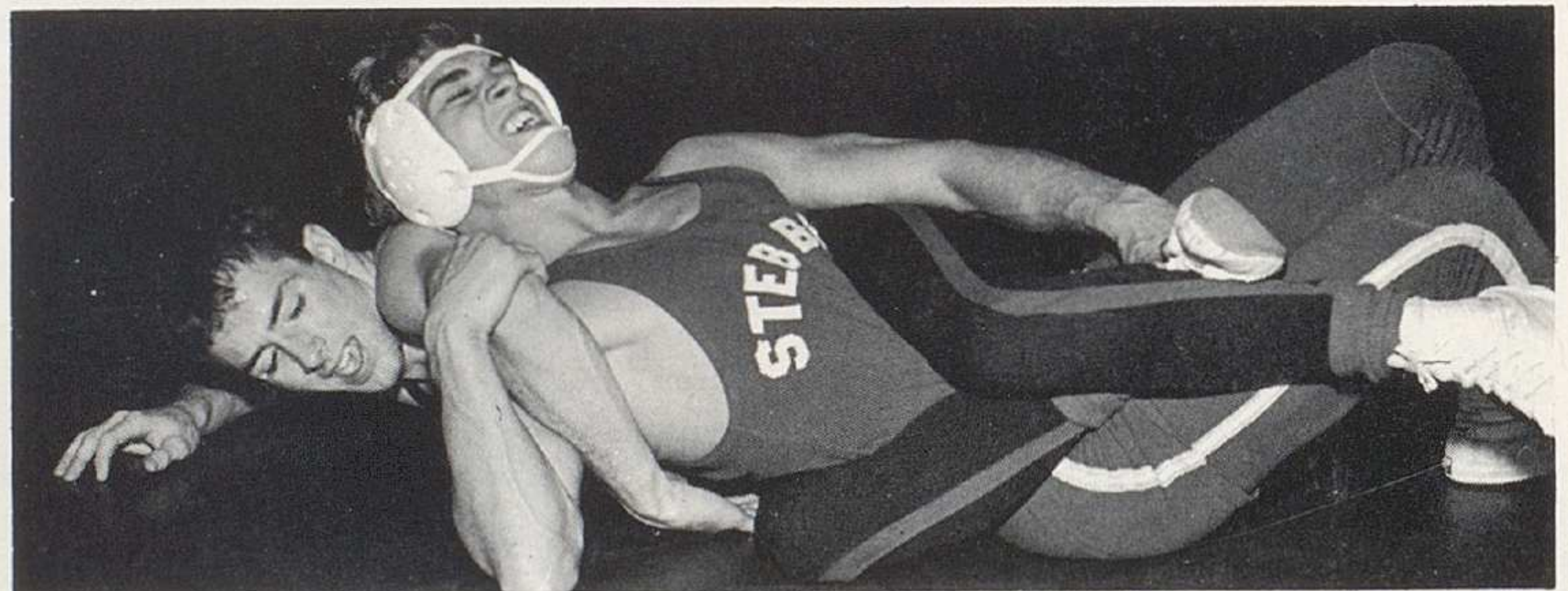

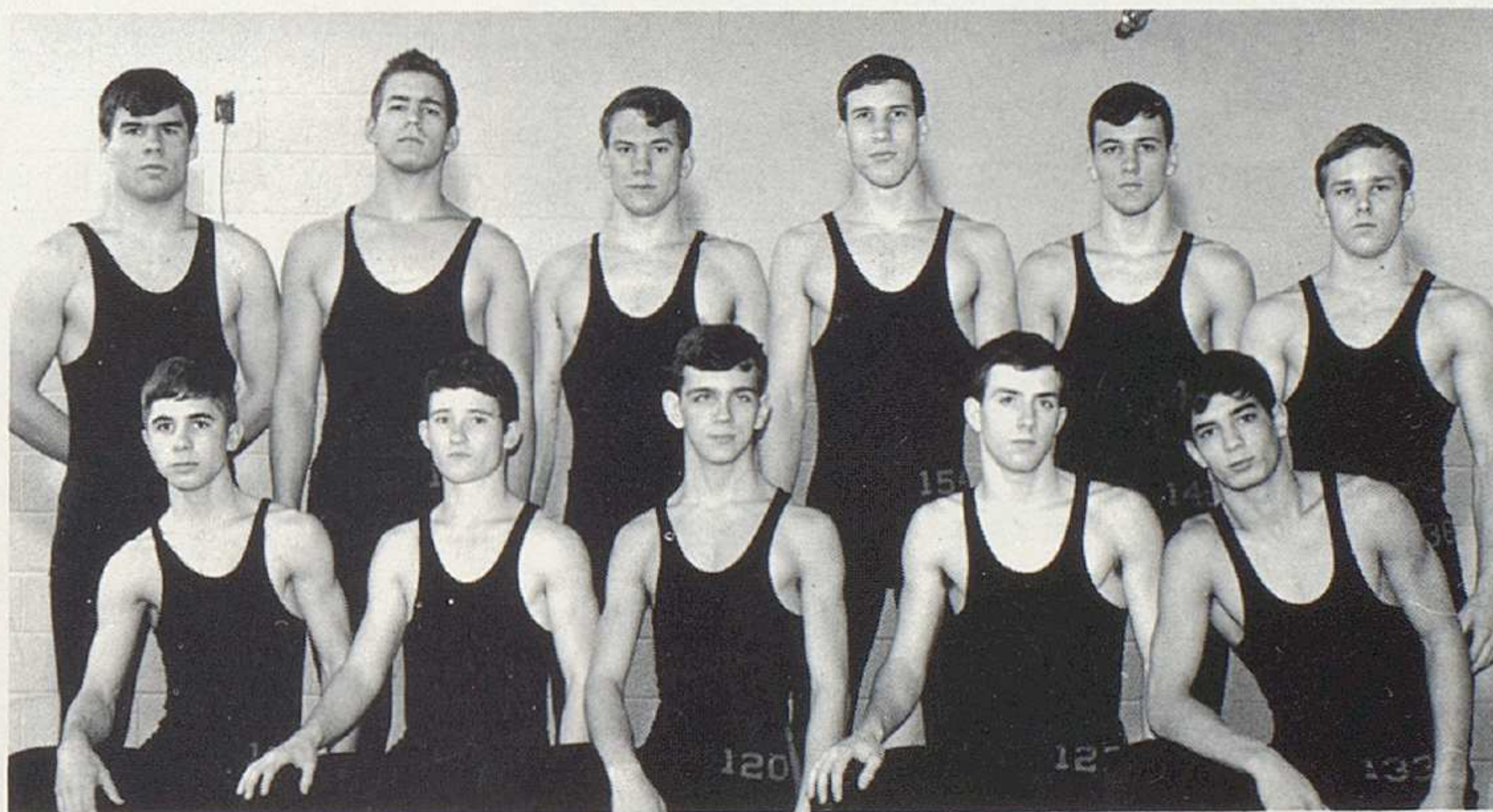

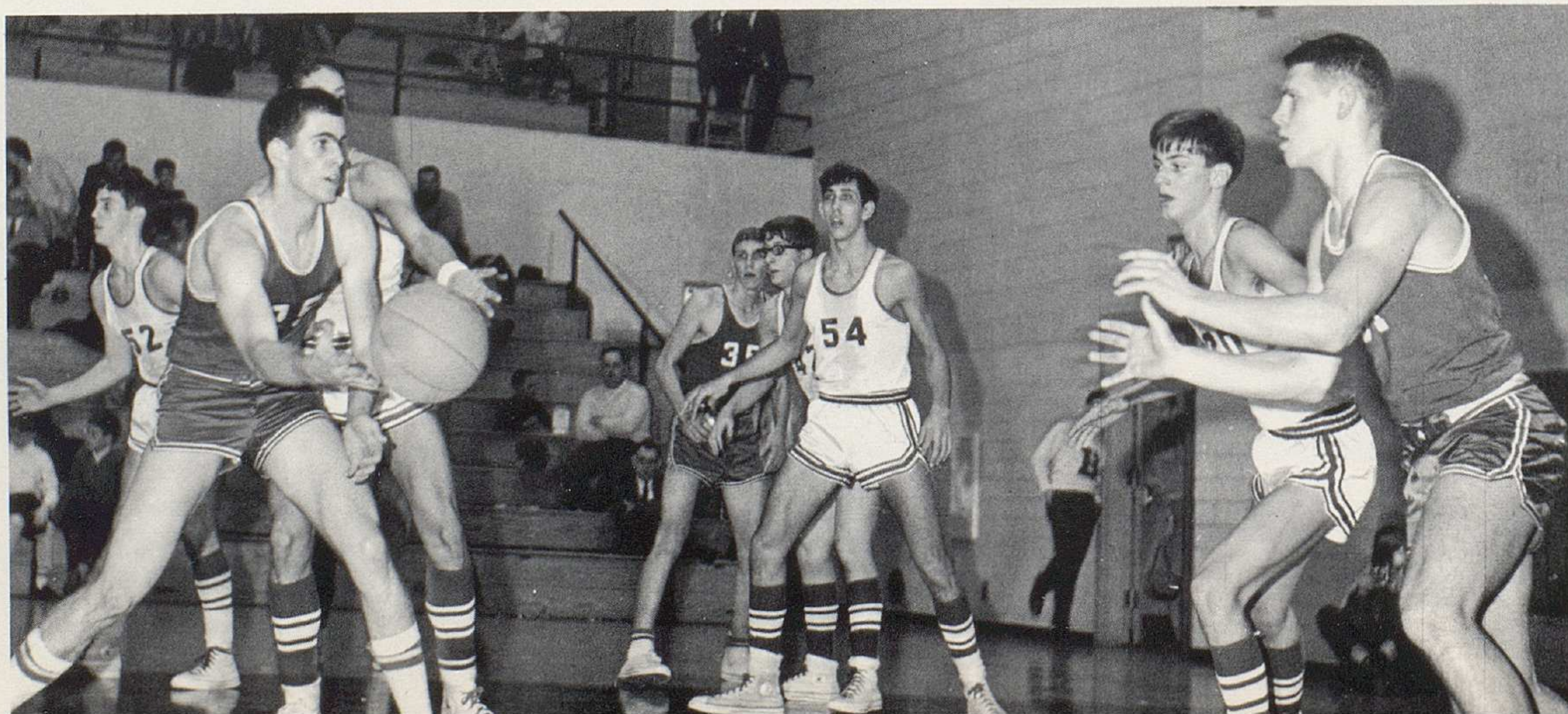

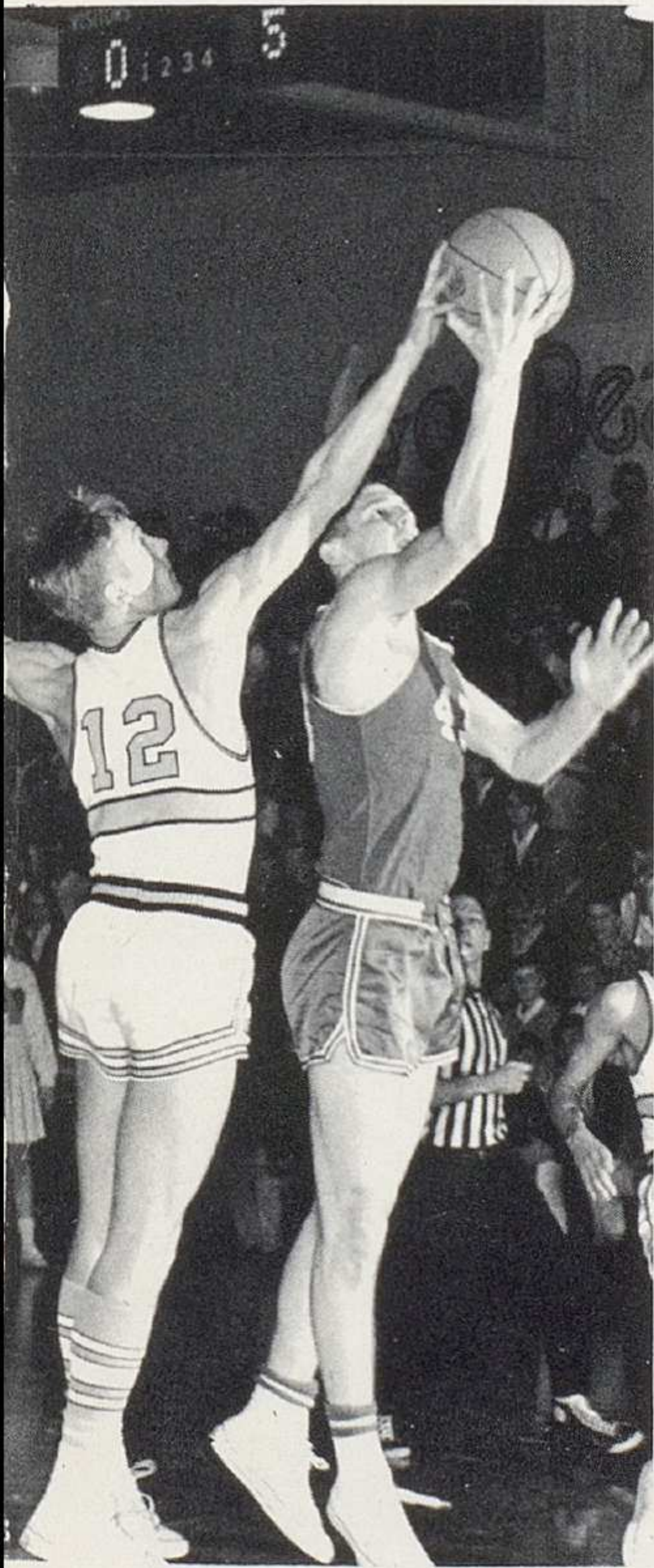
Champions On The Courts

Grind Out A Record 20-2 Season

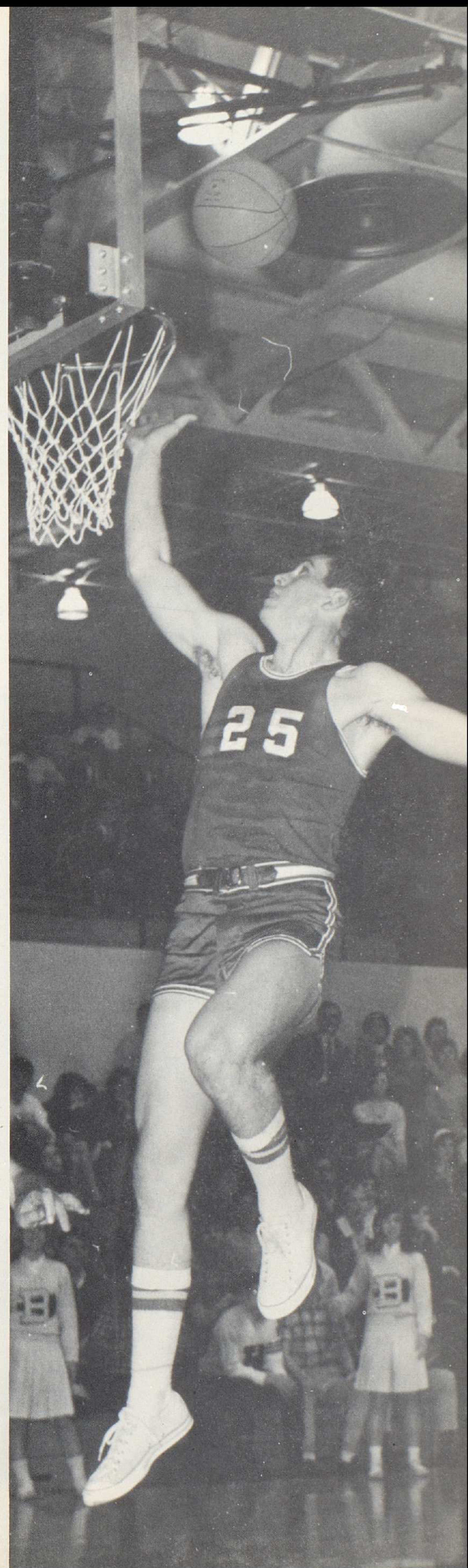

Although the squad placed eleventh at the Bellaire Relays, a distance medley relay team of Romohr, Wilson, Lowery, and Titus zoomed in on second place, breaking the school record. The four mile relay squad of Lowery, Wilson, and Co-Captains Titus and Dave Rieke came home from the Lancaster Relays (where the team placed fifth) with a first place and a new state record. Some other school records that were broken:

- High-point man Titus ran the mile in 4:32.7.
- Randy Chadwell, Warren Taylor, Steve Kight, and Ken Pruden dropped the school's eight mile relay time.
- Rieke, Larry Ray, Heise, and Titus spruced up for the sprint medley relay and brought that time down to 3:43.7.

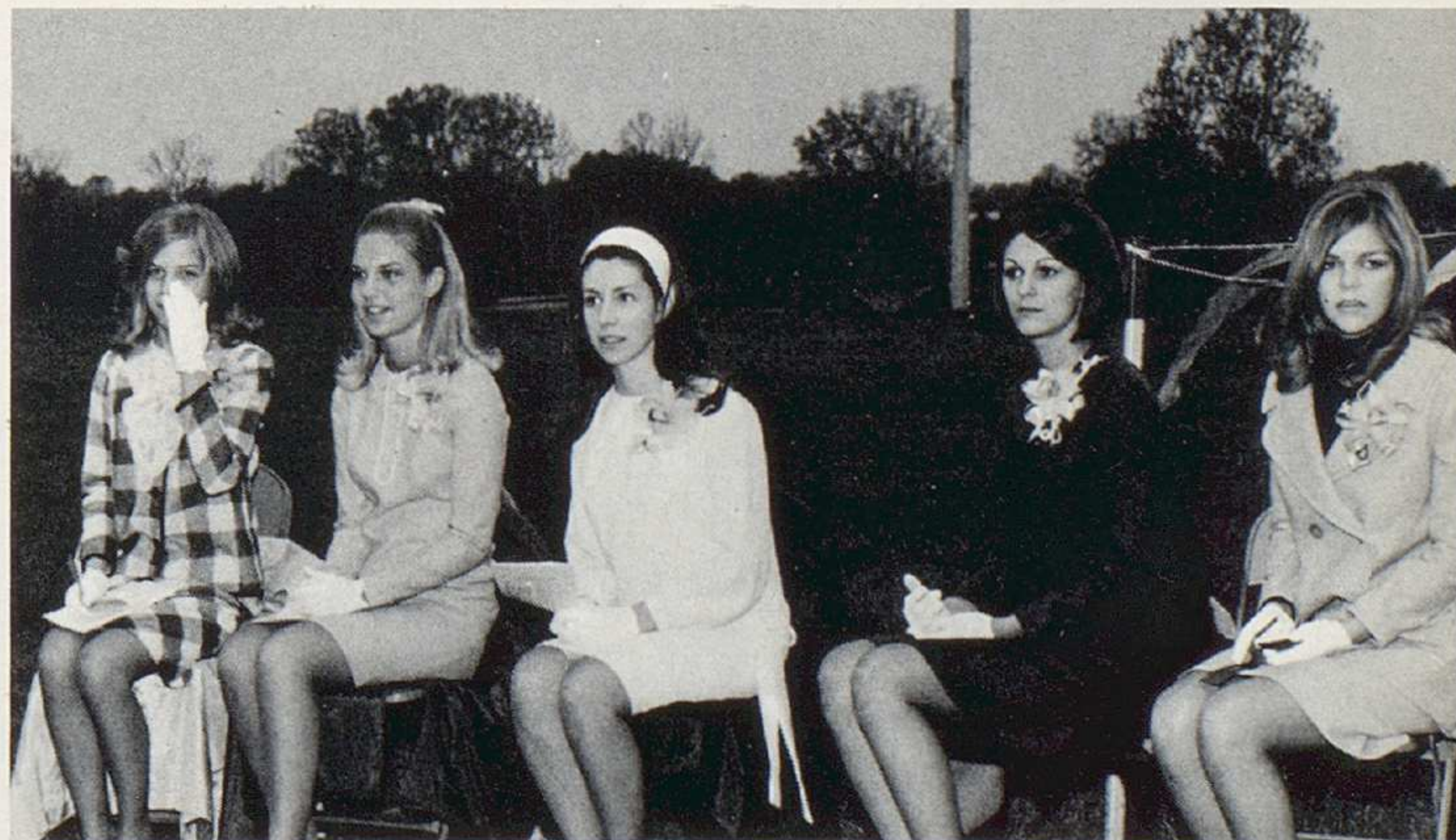
—Finally, Rieke, Ray, Steve Bennett, and Lowery posted a new time of 2:44.1 for the medley relay event.

Reserves lost their four meets against varsity teams, and the freshman squad earned a 4-4 seasonal record.

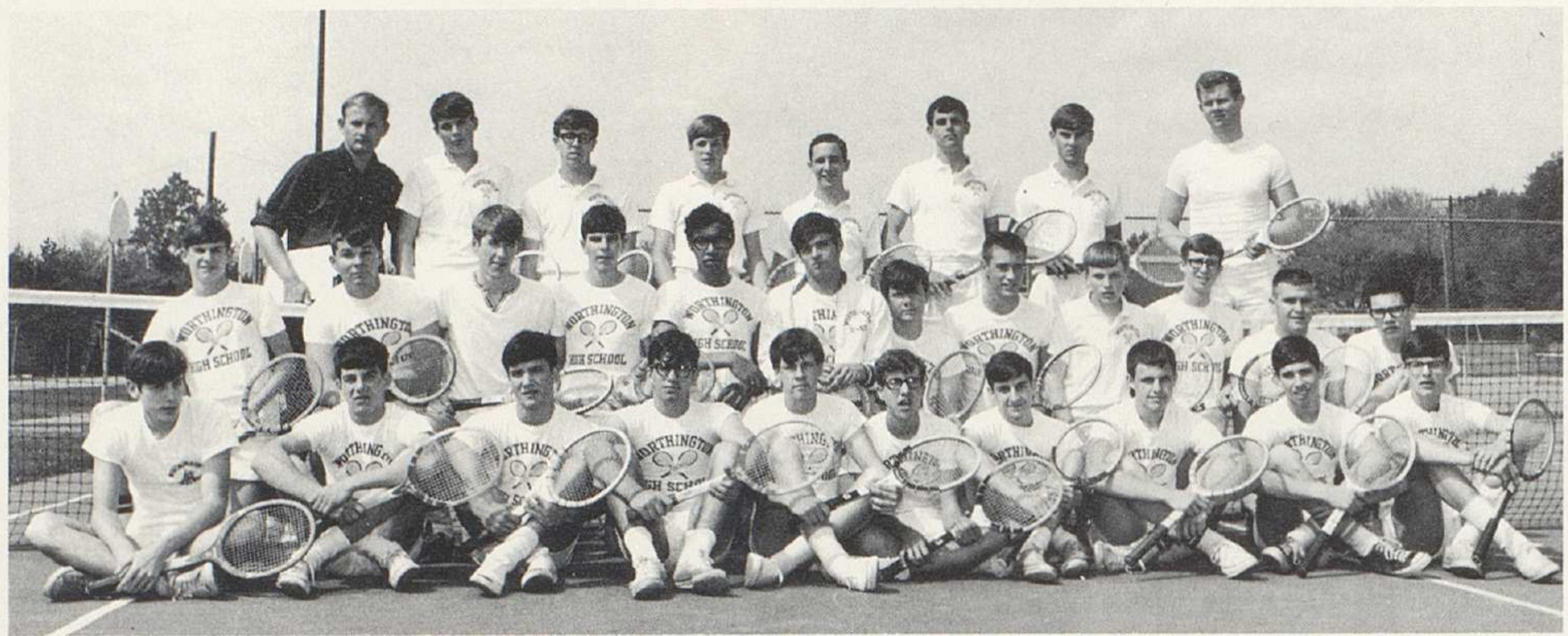

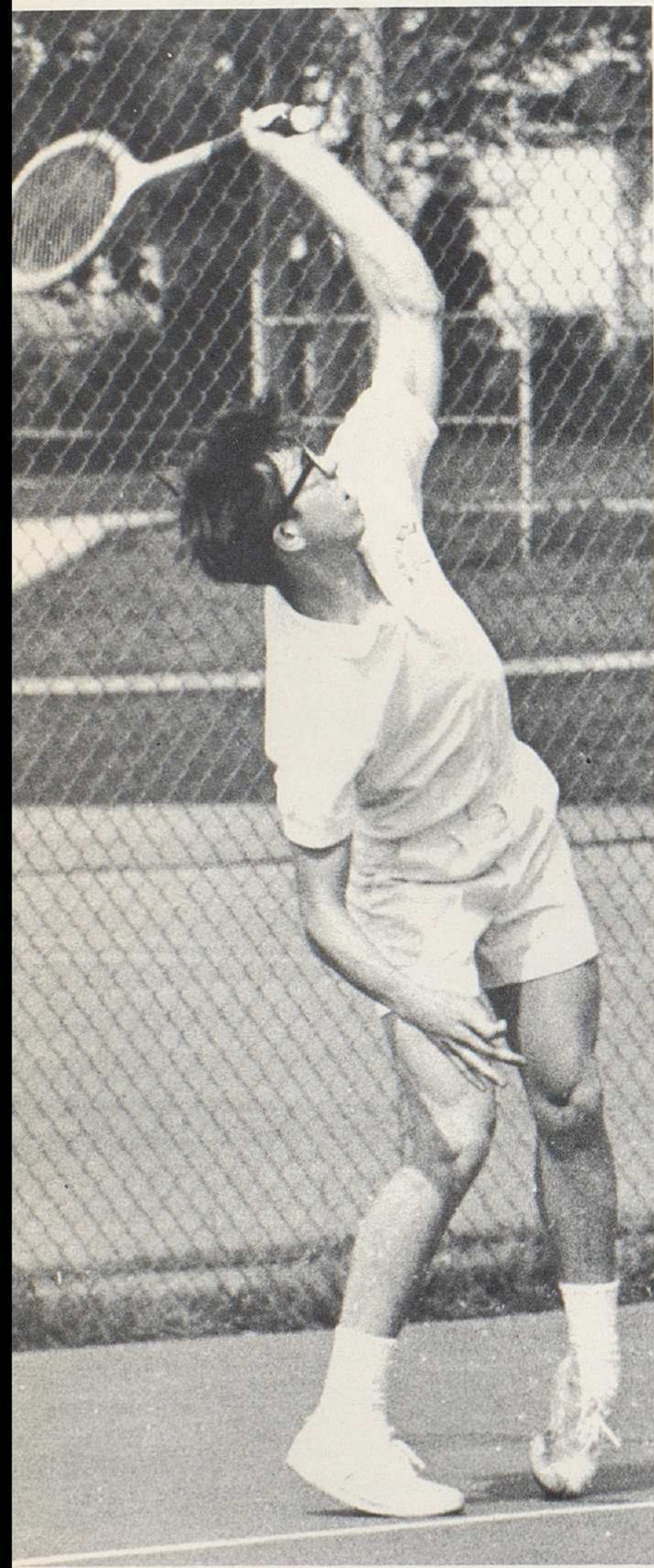
Racketeers Draft UA Tennis Star, But Cannot Checkmate Golden Bears

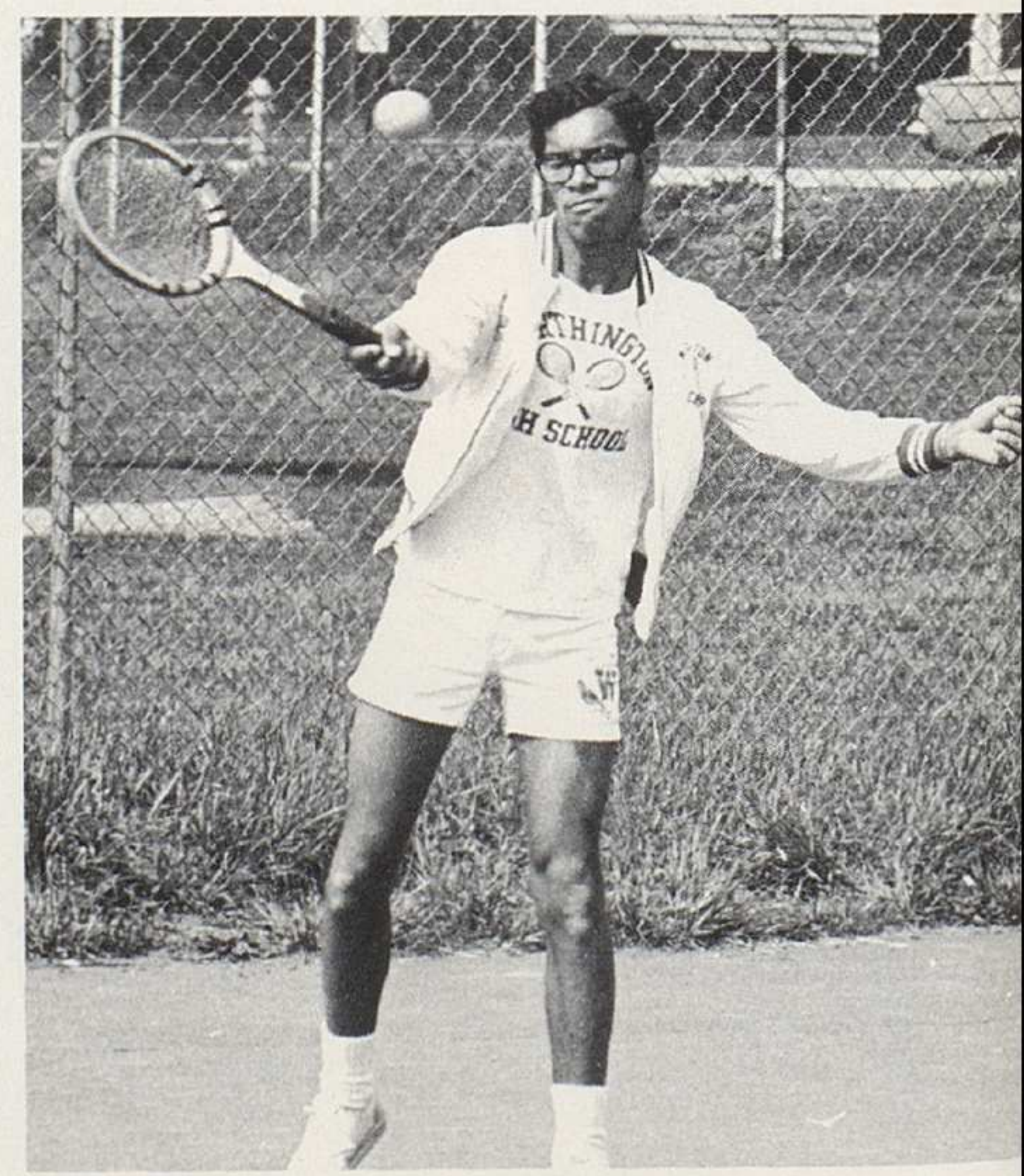

Clinic And Last-Minute Victories Into A Winning Season

April and May crowds drew up at the baseball diamond to count up an 18-6 record for the 1967 varsity team. Because seven of those wins stemmed from ninth inning reversals, most of those crowds saw some good action. Watterson smothered any of WHS's district hopes when its team pulled an eighth inning victory in its first district game.

Cincinnati was the host city for a baseball clinic in May which brought Ohio high school teams together with the Cincinnati Reds. Worthington's squad listened as Red players cast out baseball hints, and then the Cardinal batmen sat in the bleachers for a Reds' game.

Several stand-outs helped bring on the Cards' fine season. Pitcher John Savage hurled nine wins and two losses, managing 105 strike-outs and two shut-outs. Shortstop and catcher Greg Nesser batted a .340 average, knocking out six doubles, two triples, and two home runs. In response, Ohio named Nesser to its all-state high school team. When his team came up to bat, third baseman Bob Hill clubbed one double, three triples, and three home runs for a .321 average, while senior Jim Fleeman, who covered second base when in the field, came up with a .325 batting average.

Season's end found the reserves at 11-3 and the freshmen at 3-4.

Girls Battle And Yell In Intra- And Interscholastic Sports

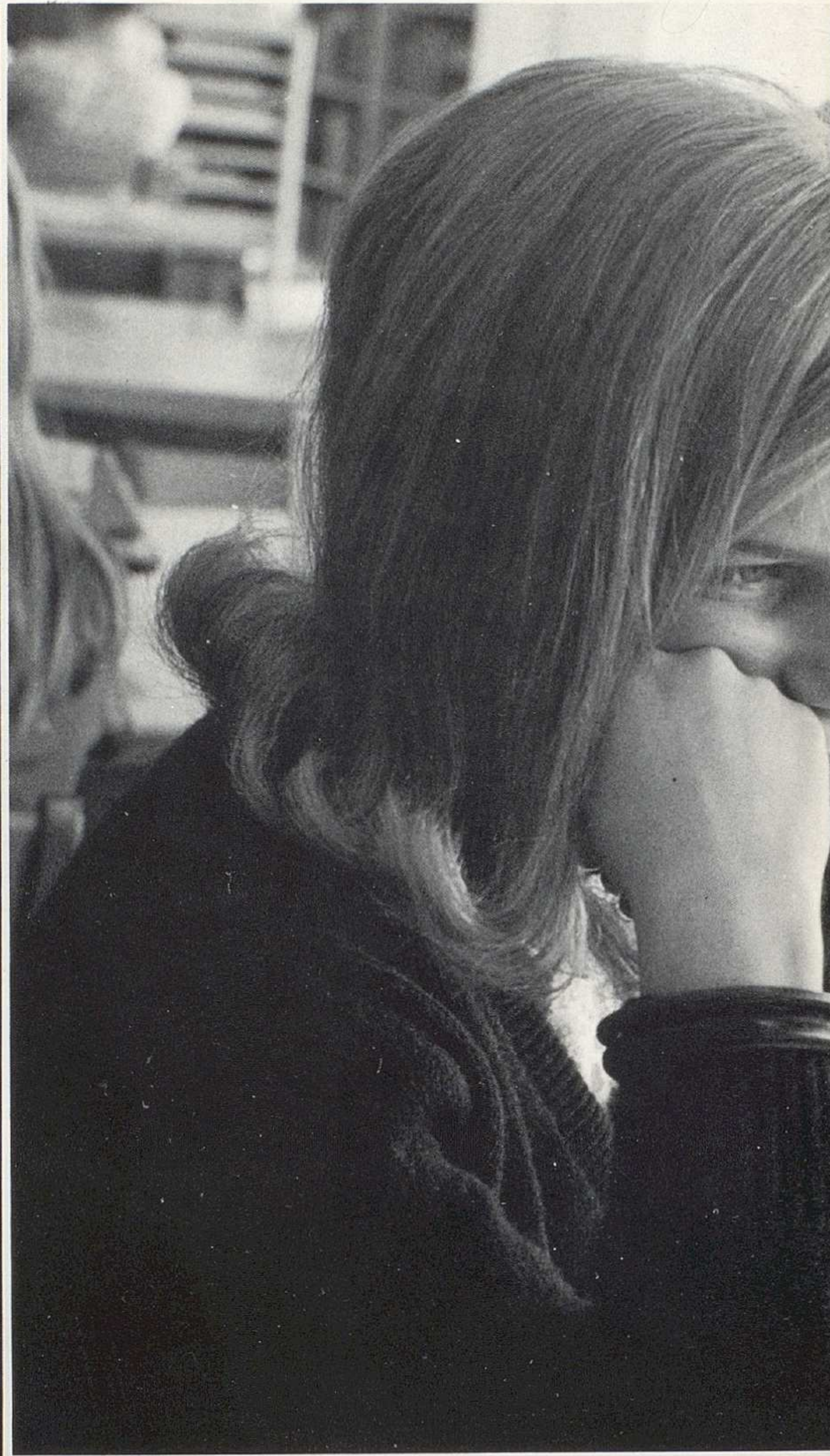

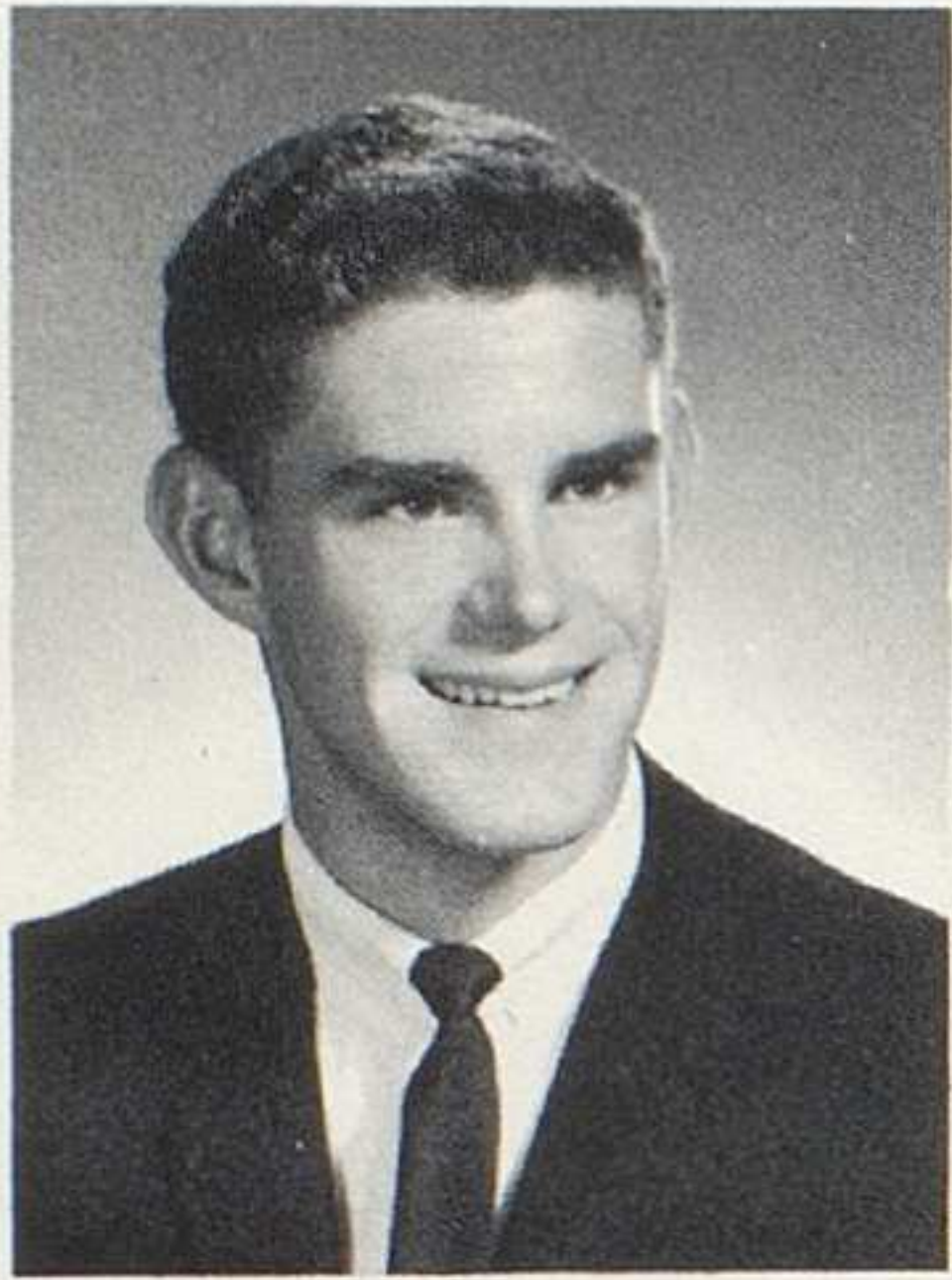
Students

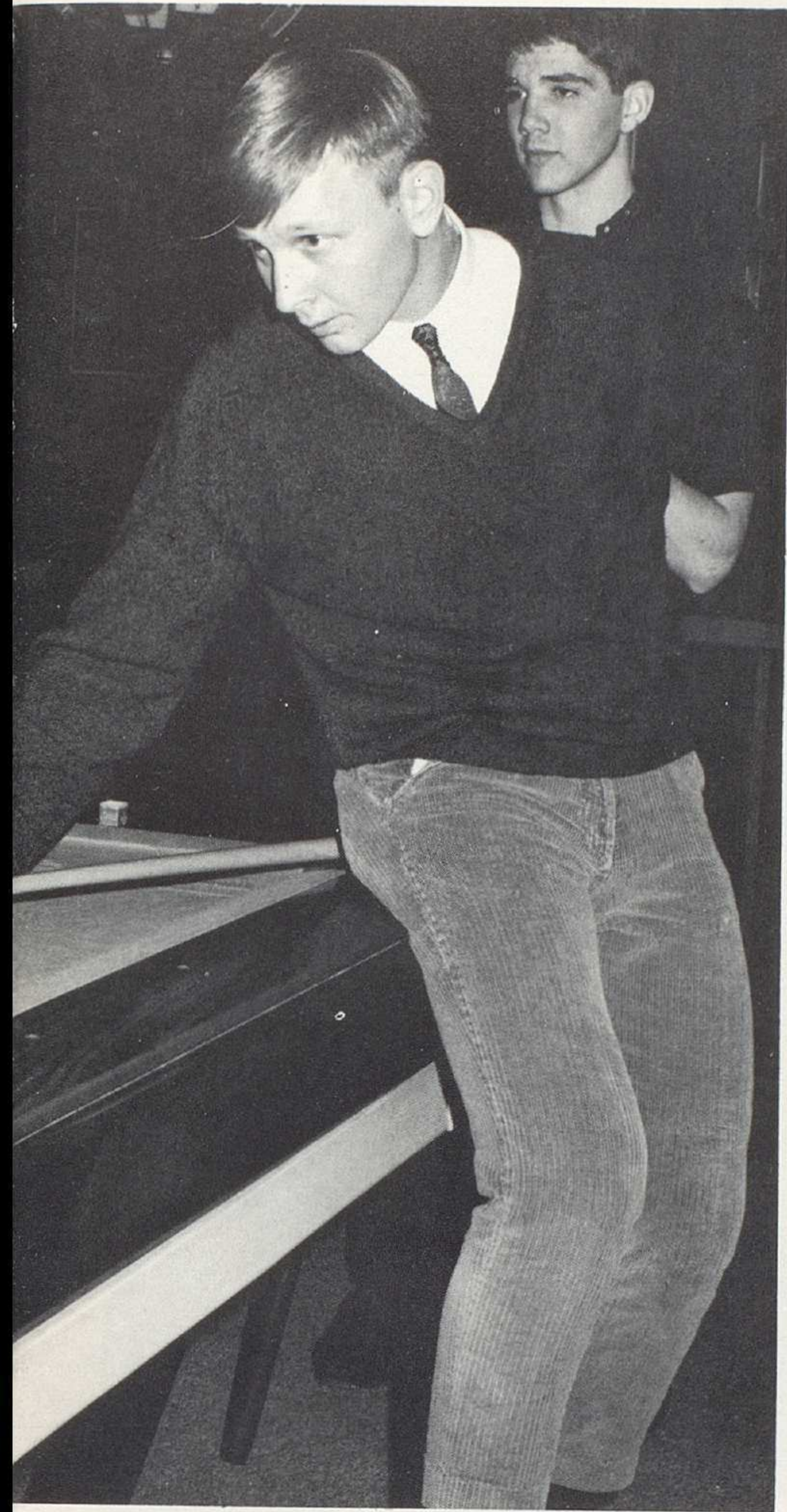

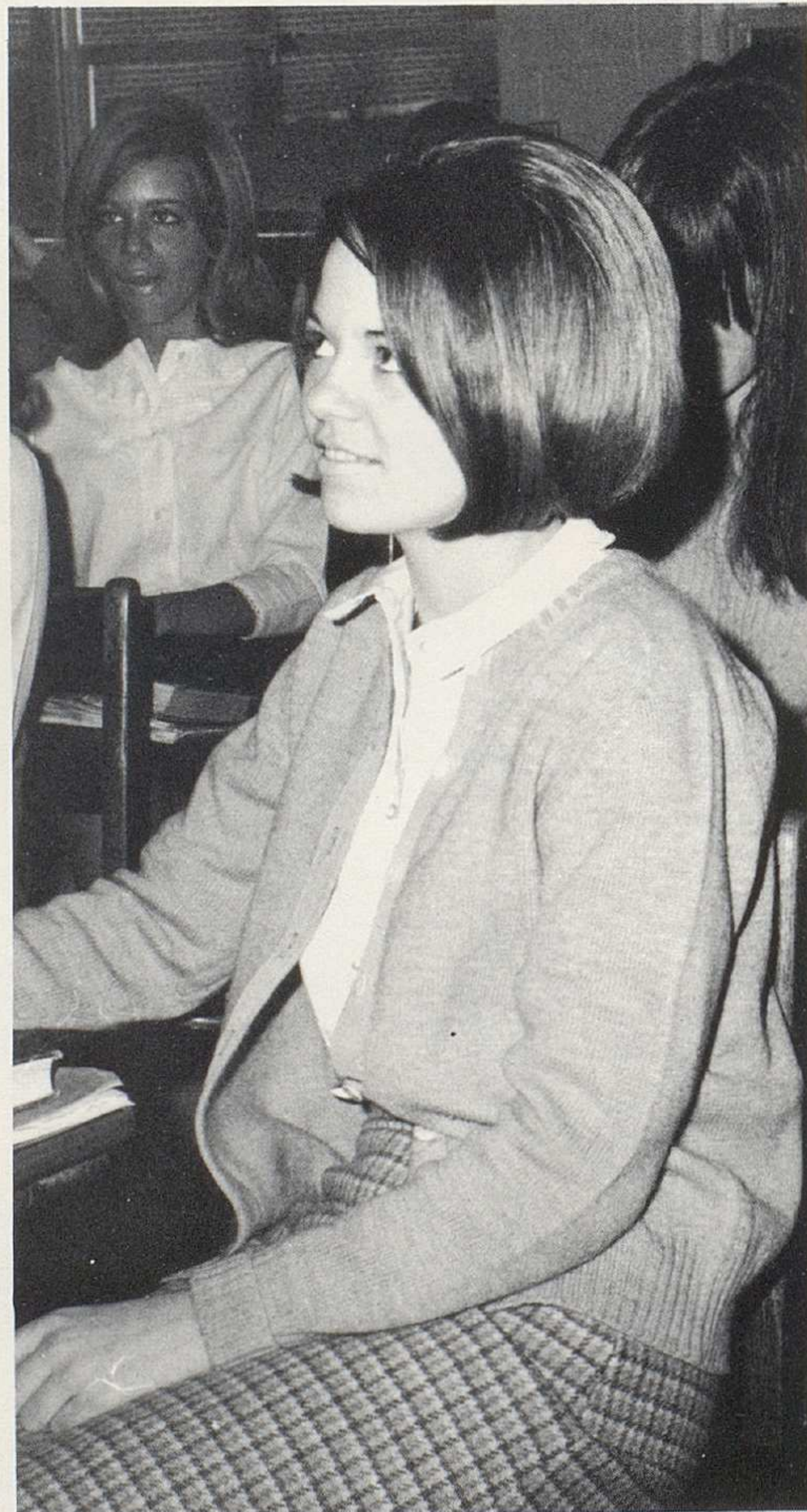

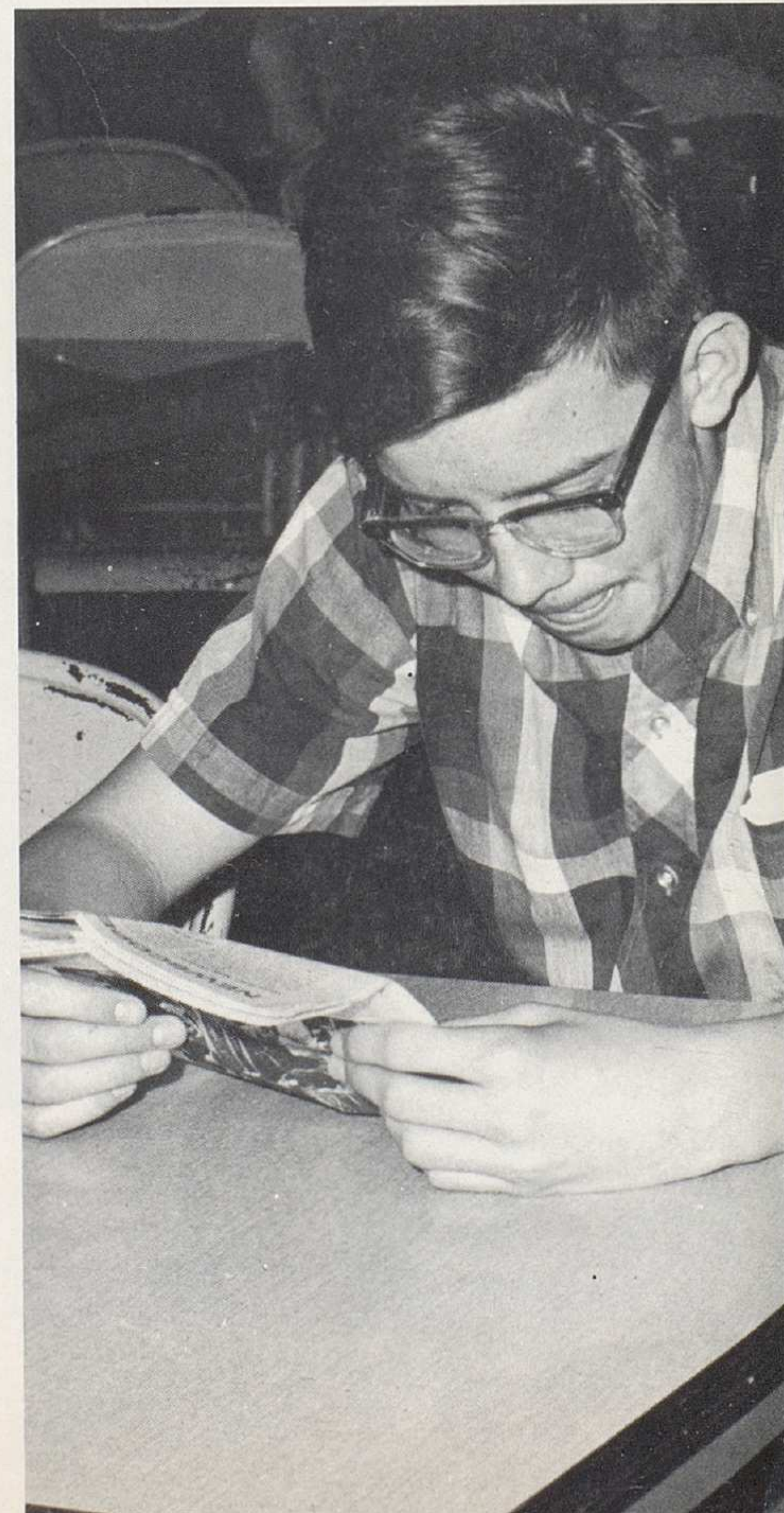

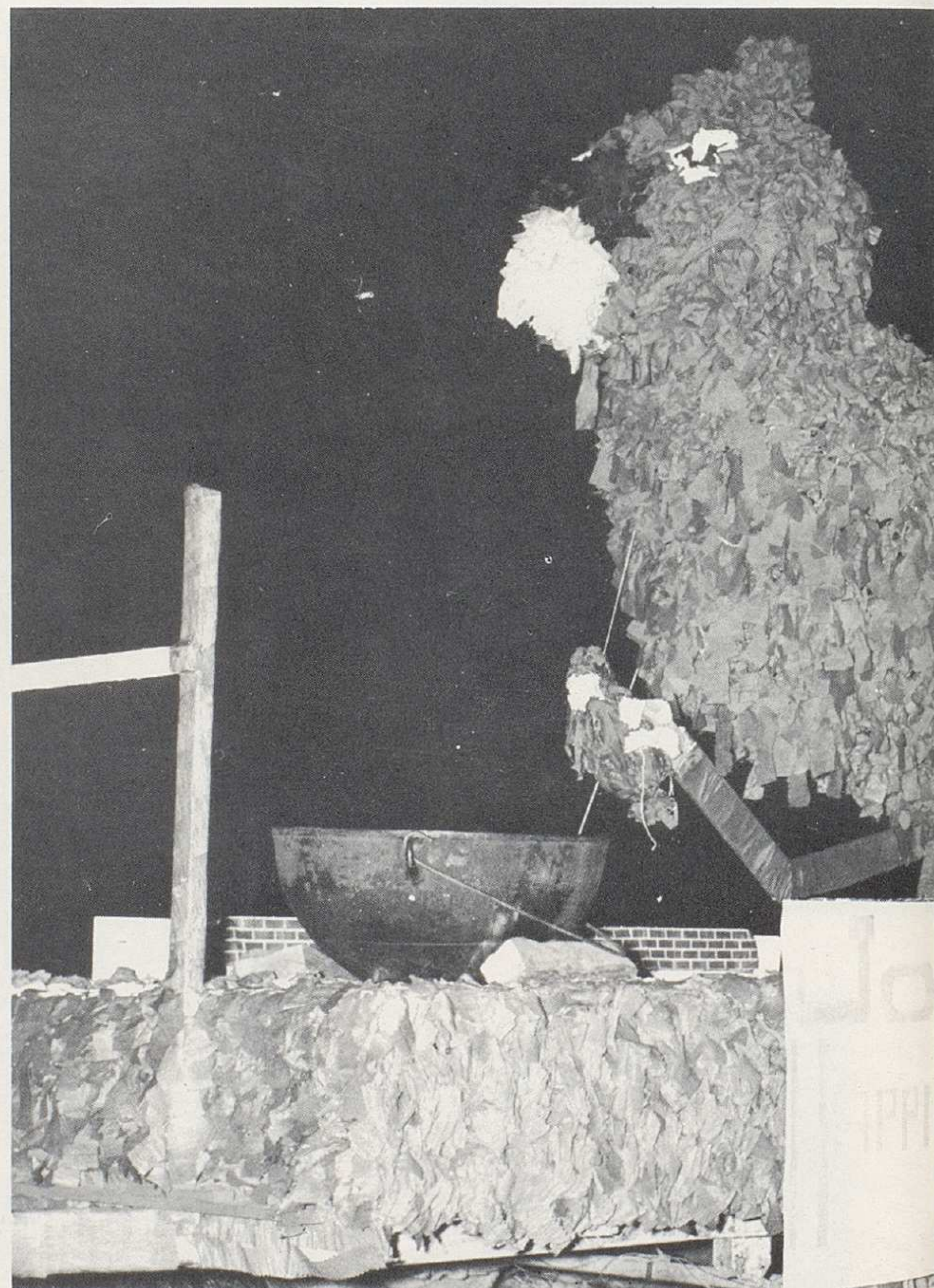

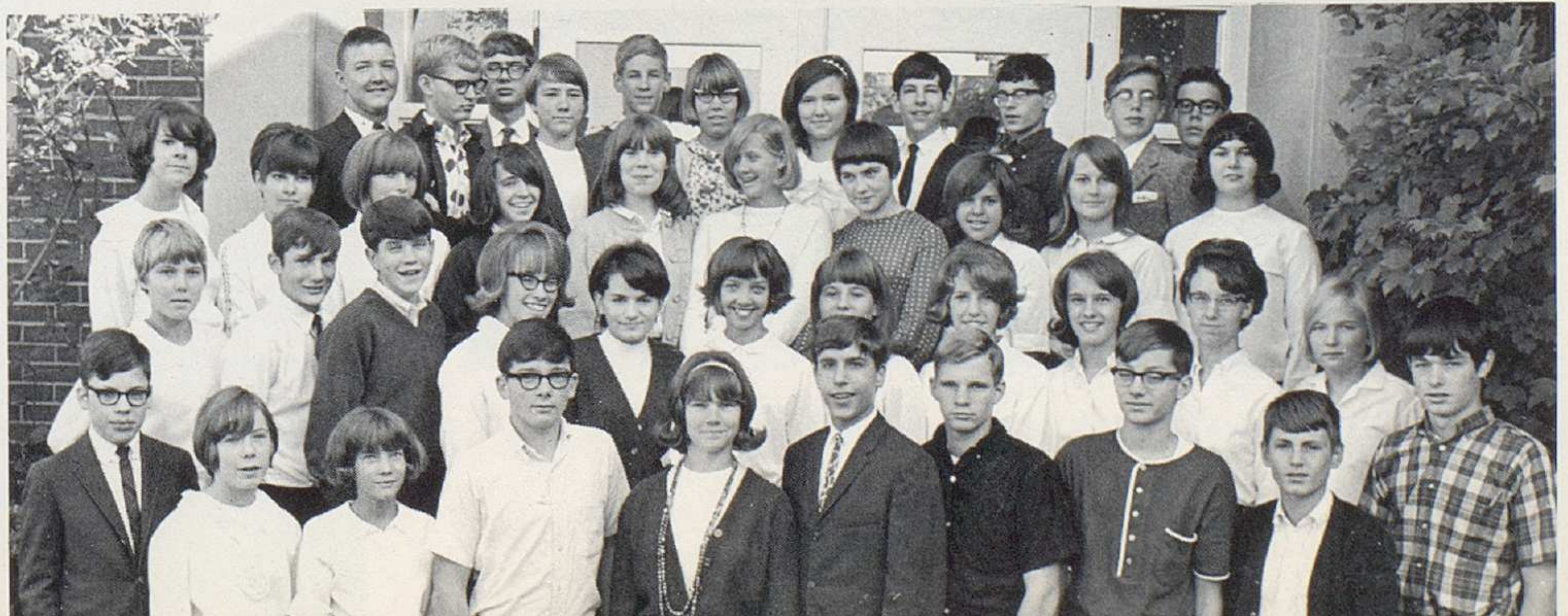

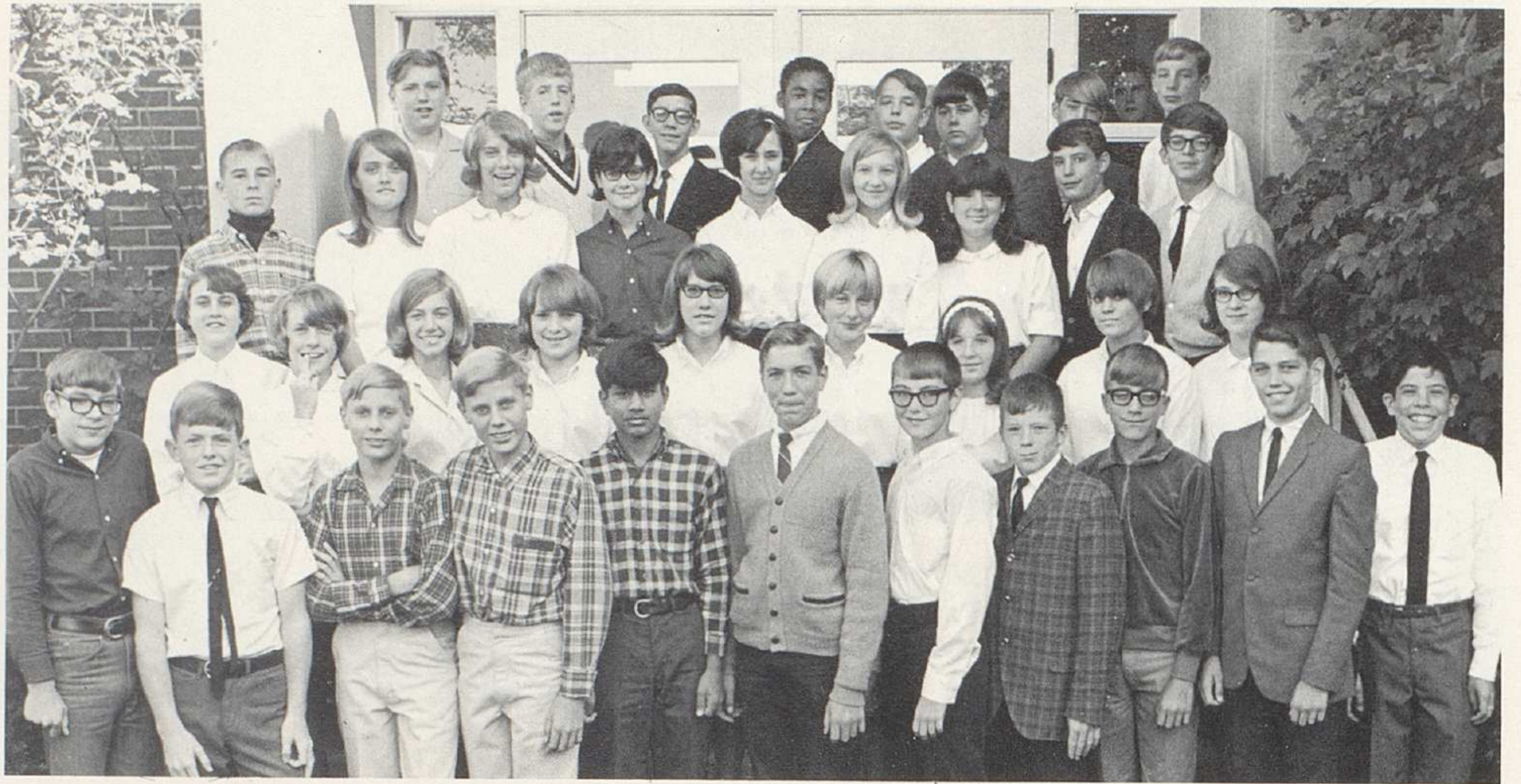

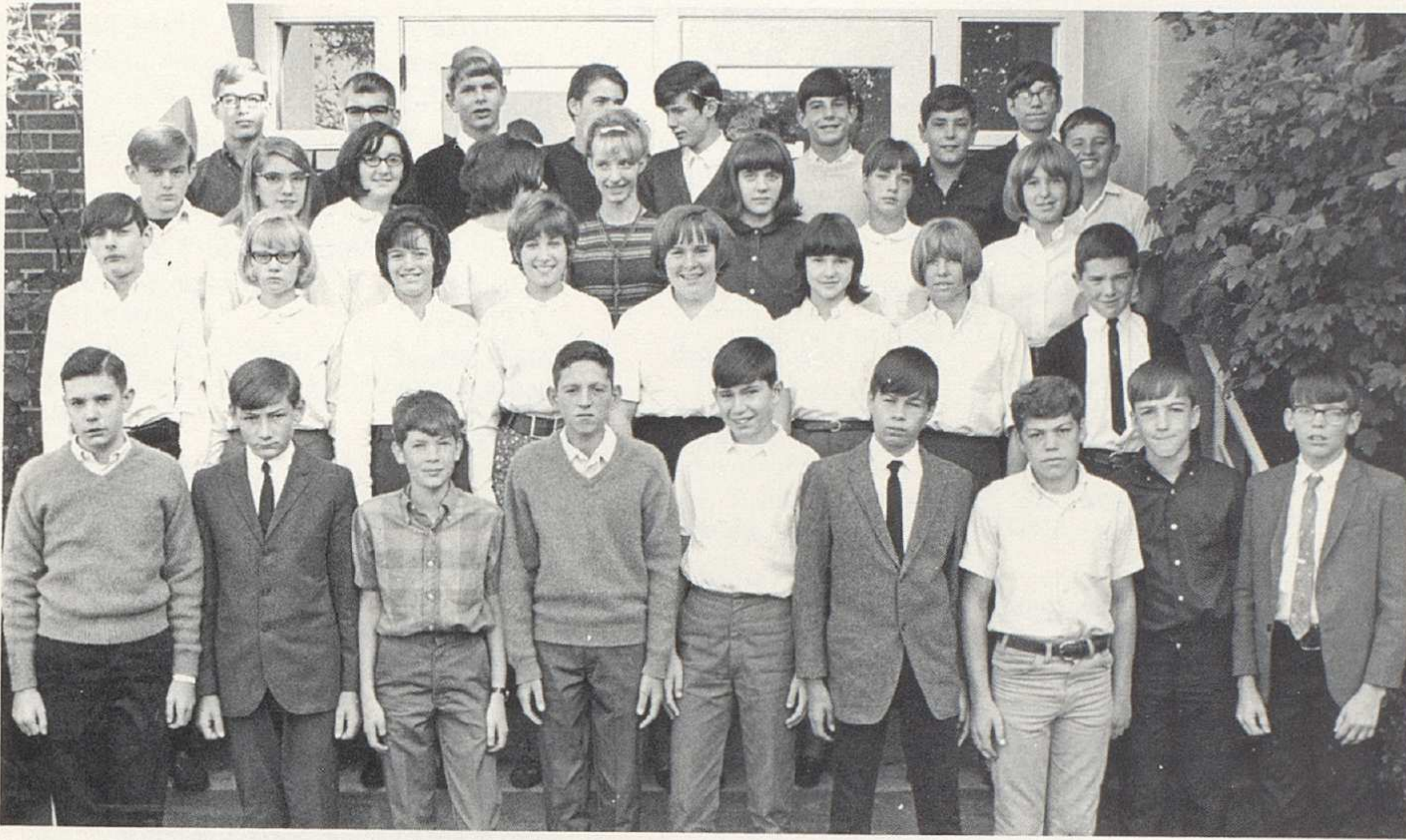

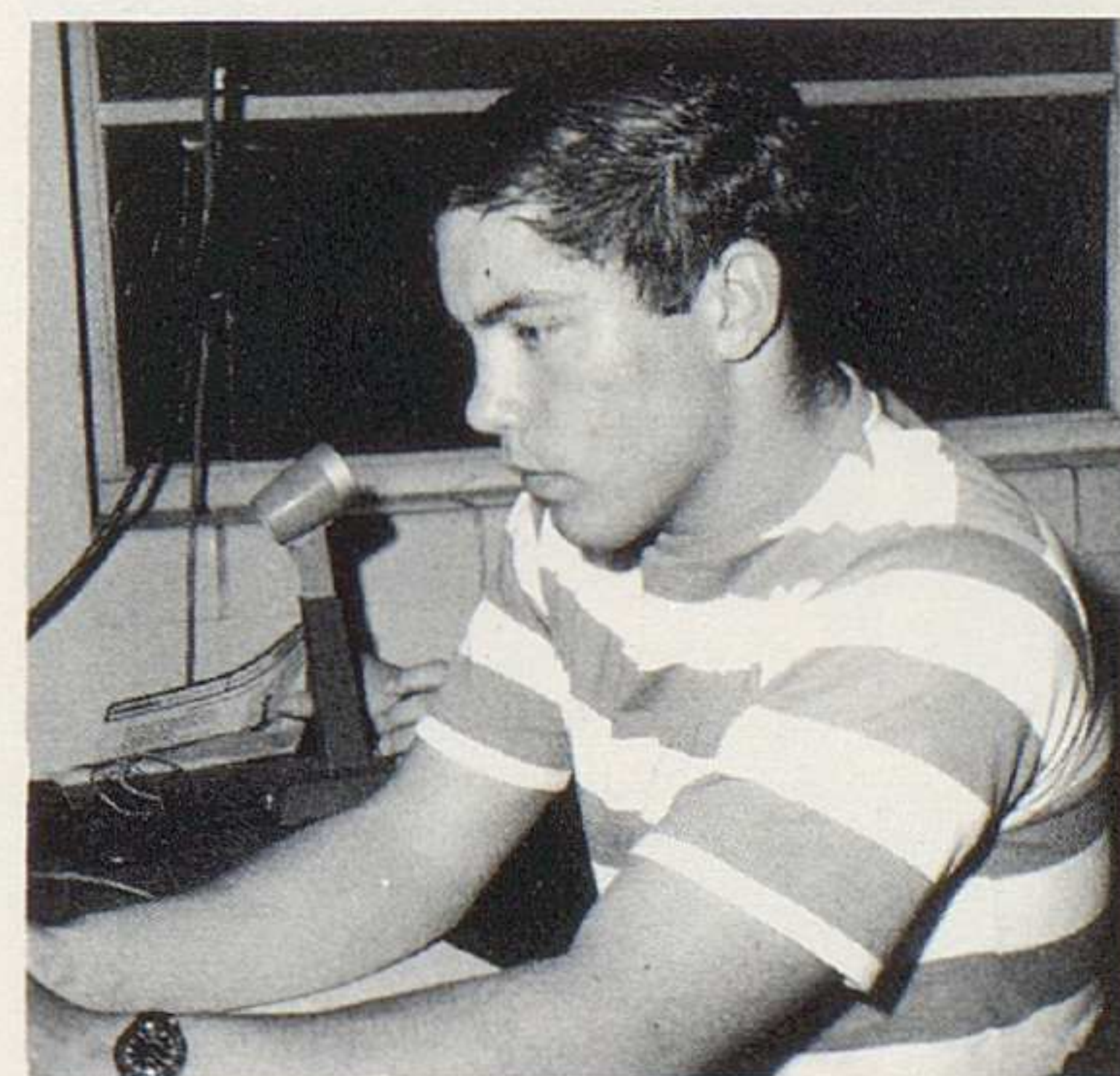
