At First

“With the completion of the building, our school invited the citizens of Worthington to an open house on August 27th before the season's first football game.”

The day of reckoning was at hand: on September 4, 1991, the doors opened for the first day of our first year as a school. Before those doors could open, however, planners had given much thought to make this a special day. Mr. Porta, principal of our school, said, “Mental readiness was the key.” He had begun planning for this event two years ago by making certain goals: one at the top of his list included having a smooth first year. Since no school is perfect, he and other administrators and staff tried to anticipate both problems and their solutions.

With the completion of the building, our school invited the citizens of Worthington to an open house on August 27th before the season's first football game. Before school could officially open for classes, however,

the building had to pass the official safety inspection. With the determination of many working hard around the clock all week before the opening of school, Worthington Kilbourne passed inspection on the evening of September 3rd, the night before classes were to begin.

The big day was upon us. During the first week Mr. Porta met with each class to express his goals and expectations; he also stressed how excited he was and how fun this first year was going to be. Keeping with previous traditions, the student body held its first pep rally in Ron Hopper Memorial Stadium on September 8th.

Several speakers including Linda Hopper, wife of Ron Hopper, their children and his fellow classmates were on hand for the October 18th formal dedica-

tion of the stadium in memory of Ron Hopper, former Colonial Hills and Granby Elementary principal. This Homecoming weekend which also celebrated the dedication of the building in the name of James Kilbourne, the founder of Worthington, symbolized the official opening of the school. Such dignitaries as United States Representative Chalmers P. Wylie, State Representative Bill Schuck and Superintendent Damon Asbury attended the dedication which included a speech by State School Superintendent Ted Sanders.

Extensive planning throughout the project orchestrated a successful first year. That same hard work also contributed to the dedication of both the stadium and building, a great kick off for a great school.

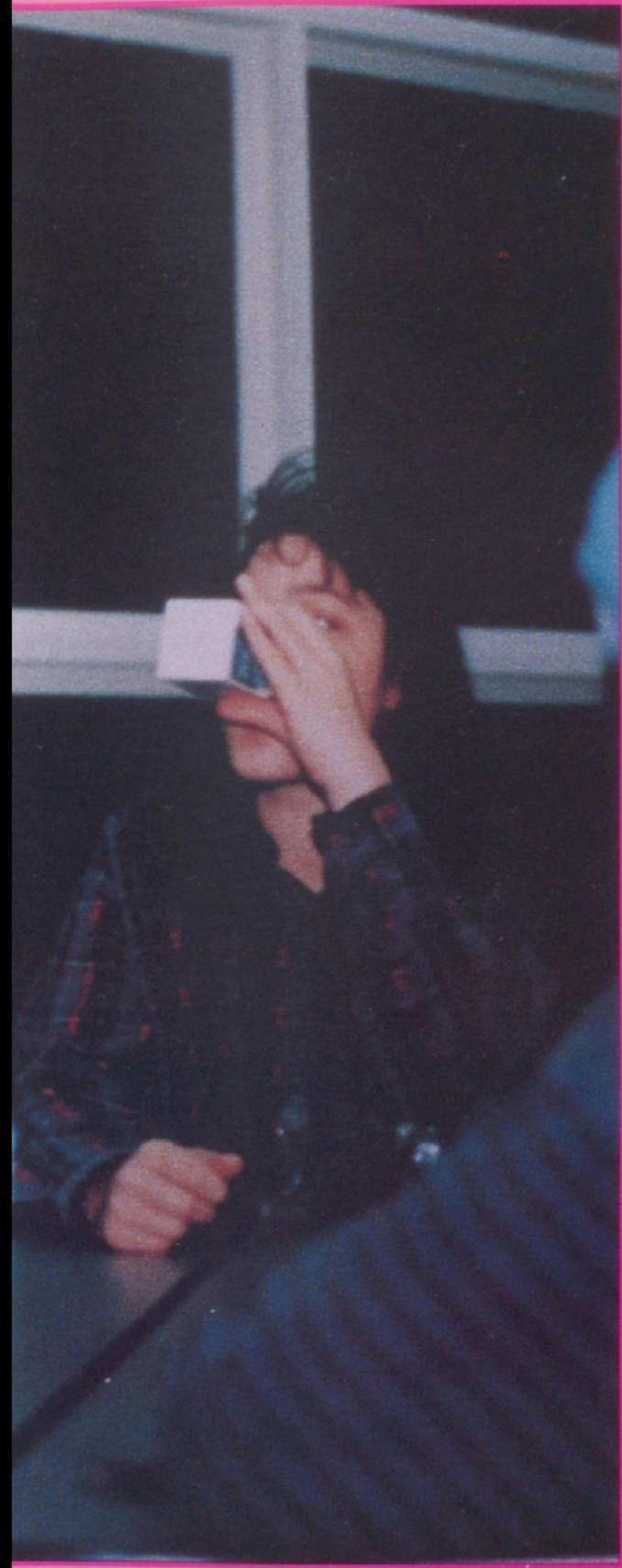

In a land called Worthington lived many, many students, in fact too many to fit into one high school building. The chief townspeople declared that there shall be two high schools, and everyone would live happily ever after.

The trusting teenage subjects waited patiently and watched with anticipation as the shining new structure emerged from the ravine. On September 4, 1991, the regal doors opened, and the division of the high school became a reality.

This concept of division has not been clearly defined as of yet. Growing pains and glitches this first year have made Worthington Kilbourne's quest to establish its own identity difficult.

In order to foster harmony throughout the community, the planning committee decided that both high schools would share the name Worthington and one

of the school colors. The committee also promised that the curriculum at both schools would be equal.

However, students soon discovered this was not true when they tried to schedule a class not offered at their respective building. Some foreign language, history, and English classes were jointly shared, causing teachers to travel between the two buildings. "I think it's neat to keep in touch with the people at Thomas; however, I'm sure our identity will soon be established," stated Don Andrews, who taught most of his science classes at W.K.H.S.

The schools also shared some extra-curricular activities. The two separate swimming teams practiced together because the community hasn't yet raised the funds to build a new natatorium. Activities such as ABSAPP (Adventure Based Substance Abuse Prevention Program) and

some dances have also been combined. Because of inadequate funds, juniors and seniors from both schools attended the same prom. Even though the majority of clubs and activities were separate, a few such as forensics, Amnesty International, STAND, student mediation and the French exchange trip were open to students at both schools.

Although many students found this new situation difficult, some looked on the bright side. "Being separated helps because it shows who your real friends are and your relationships can grow stronger," suggested senior Heather Davis.

This first year of growth has been successful in many ways. Even though the change has been difficult, we have learned to adjust to the separation. As years go by, we will develop identity and pride in our school, but we will not forget the land called Worthington.

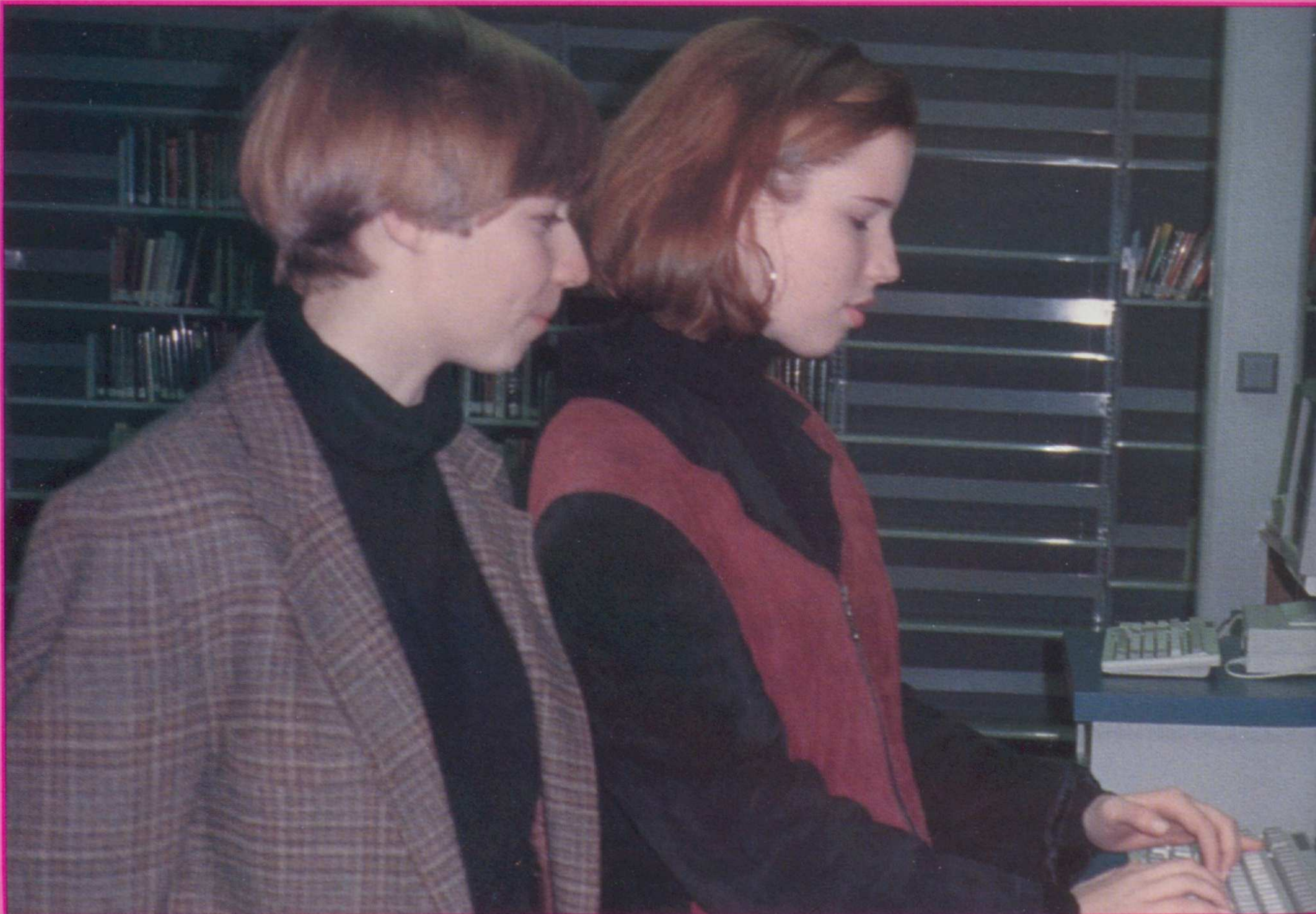

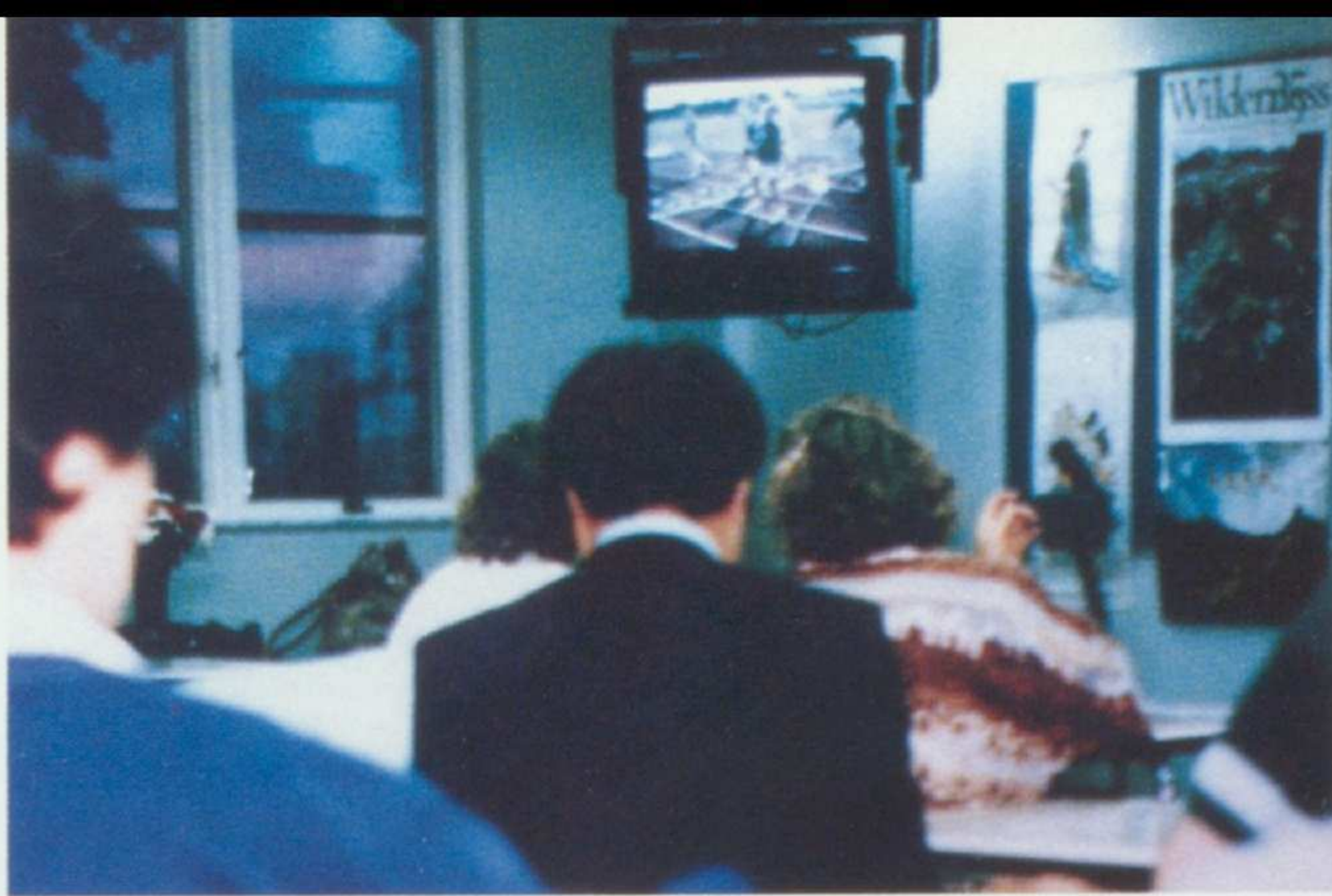
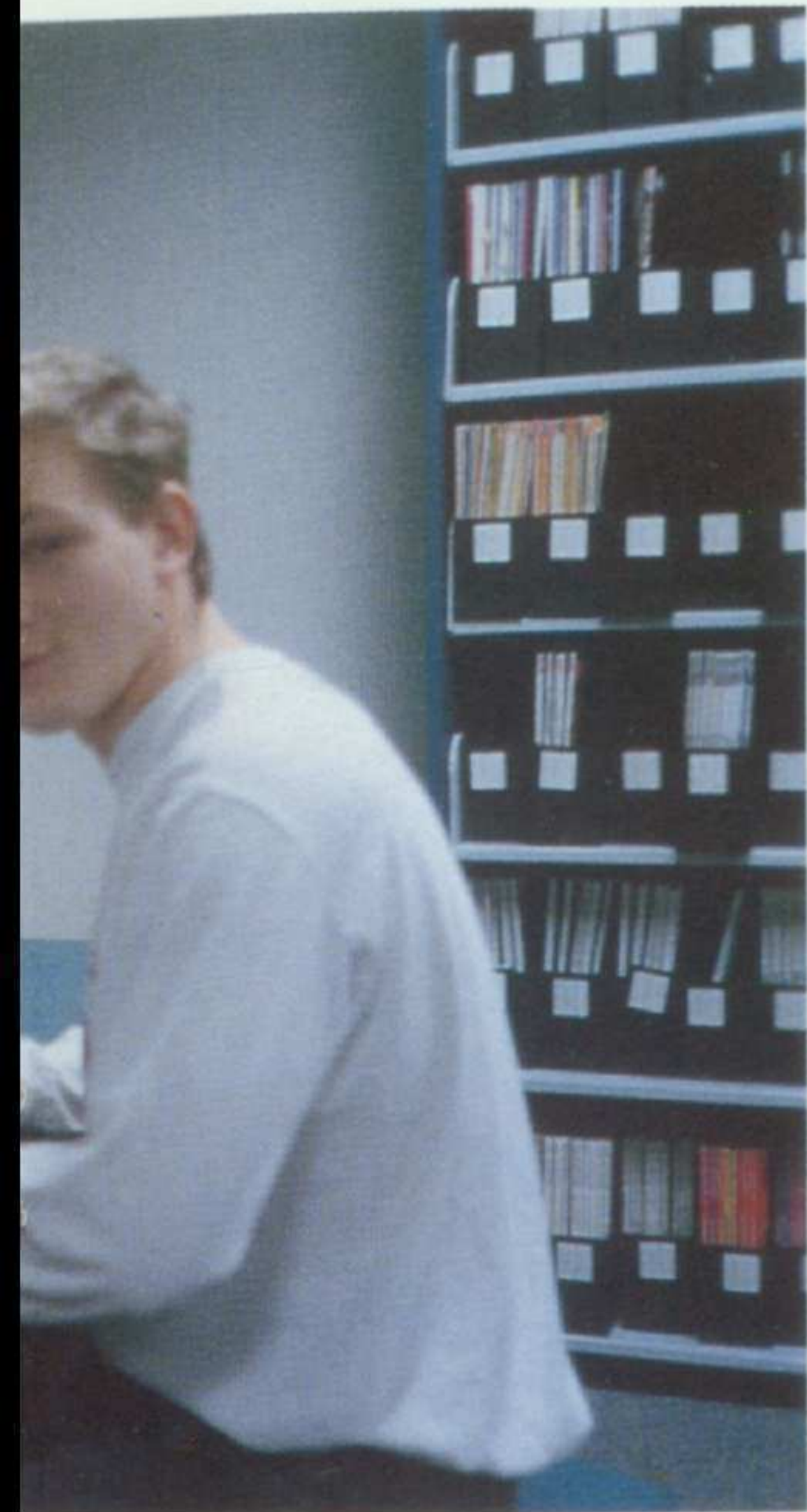

The administration used the Dynacom system not only to show what a beautiful school we have because of the facility, but also to show the rich diversity of student activities.

Technology

Dynacom, Microsoft, InfoTrac, Cybex, Star Plus II, and Serverly. These 21st century words have already become a part of the Wolves' language. They reflect the hi-tech programs designed into Worthington Kilbourne to keep pace with the fast-moving world which students will enter after graduation.

The library, the heart of technology, is centrally located for easy access. Using a local network for circulation and catalog searches, students can locate books by subject, title, author, series, or keyword. The Modem, which provides a way to call reciprocating libraries such as OSU, Westerville, Worthington, and Columbus also helps students find sources. A replacement for the Reader's Guide to Periodicals is the InfoTrac System which provides access to periodicals by subject entry. These advancements have helped students benefit from all the library has to offer.

The math and science depart-

ments are already making extensive use of the technology. Teachers in these disciplines have incorporated laser and floppy disks into their curriculum. They use a Canon Zap Shot camera with a two-and-one half inch floppy disk during field trips for slide-making purposes. The new Biological Earth Science Systems class is probably benefiting the most from this new technology. A data base on endangered species, graphing systems, modem linkups with Compu Serve and NASA, and an earthquake link for monitoring activity are other examples of hi-tech programs in the science department. The favorite of most BESS students is the "Sim City," a simulated program in which students build cities and encounter obstacles such as pollution and environmental problems. Students and teachers are very enthusiastic about all the new programs and opportunities available to them through their science classes. Mrs. Papp, a BESS teacher, com-

mented, "It's exciting that kids get the opportunity to use technology now because it's constantly changing and they need to keep up with everyone else."

The Dynacom or the TV system is the most prominent manifestation of the technological revolution at our new school. With 78 locations throughout the building and 20 VCR's, television and its benefits are easily accessible. Not only can teachers show videos and movies, but they can also project their syllabuses, class notes, and outlines on the screen. The new opportunities throughout the school have changed many students' outlooks about their educational experiences. "Having all these cool new things makes learning, which is normally dull and boring, fun and exciting," stated freshman Mike Link. Teachers now must learn how to use this technology to its fullest extent so students can reap the benefits.

Options

As a result of the split and the formation of two high schools, all students have more opportunities. They now enjoy additional options with both extra-curricular and academic areas.

Educational programs are open to students who wish to expand their minds. Students may choose correspondence courses, independent study, and post-secondary college coursework. Correspondence courses, credited through Indiana University, hold no formal class meeting because students submit their work through the mail. The correspondence program offers only high school credit; however, the post-secondary option involves attending a local college or university for a college level class. The majority of the students in this program attend Ohio State, Otterbein, or Ohio Wesleyan. Students may also participate in independent study which enables them to

work with the teacher on a one-to-one basis. They meet two to three times a week to discuss previous assignments and receive material. In speaking about his independent study program, student Isreal Najera said, “I like it a lot because I can set my own pace as to when I want to do the work.”

Aside from varied academic opportunities, students are also offered many extra-curricular options at WKHS. Students who have some free time during and/or after school can choose from a wide variety of activities. Along with the vast number of athletics and clubs available, students can participate in a wide array of intramurals. The program's rapidly growing success results from allowing students to become involved at a time convenient to their schedules. Javin Duncin, an avid participant in the program, stated, “It is an opportunity for us to have

something fun and different to do on our lunch time.” Intramurals available to students include three man basketball, free throw contest, three point contest, volleyball, aerobic exercises, noon walking, tennis, weight training, and after school golf. Held on Tuesday and Wednesday nights at the Columbus Square Bowling Palace, bowling, is by far the most popular activity, is open to teachers and administrators as well as to students.

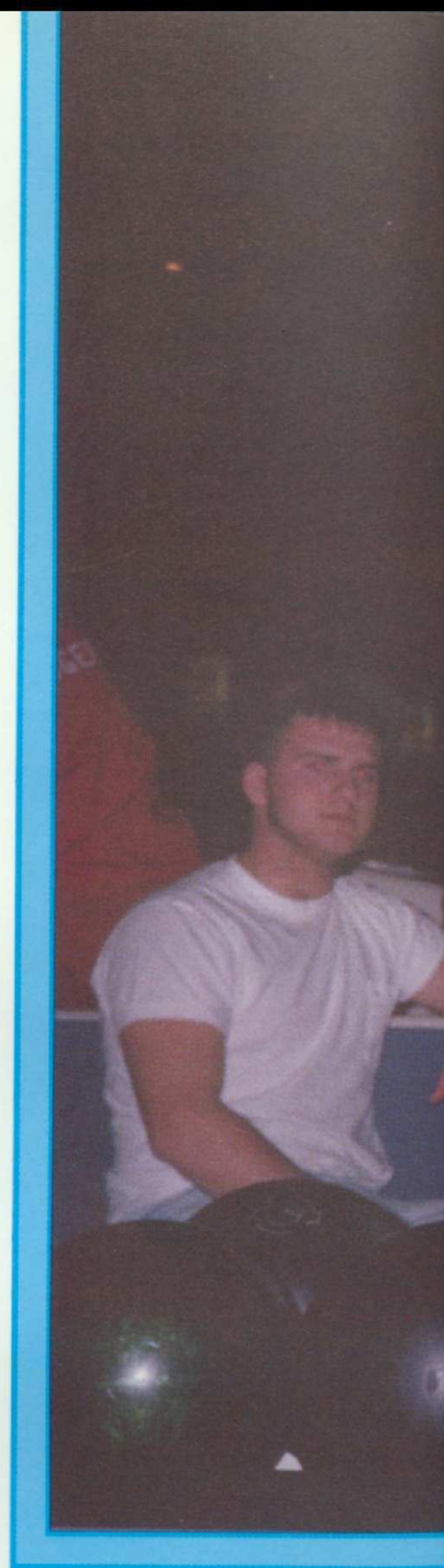
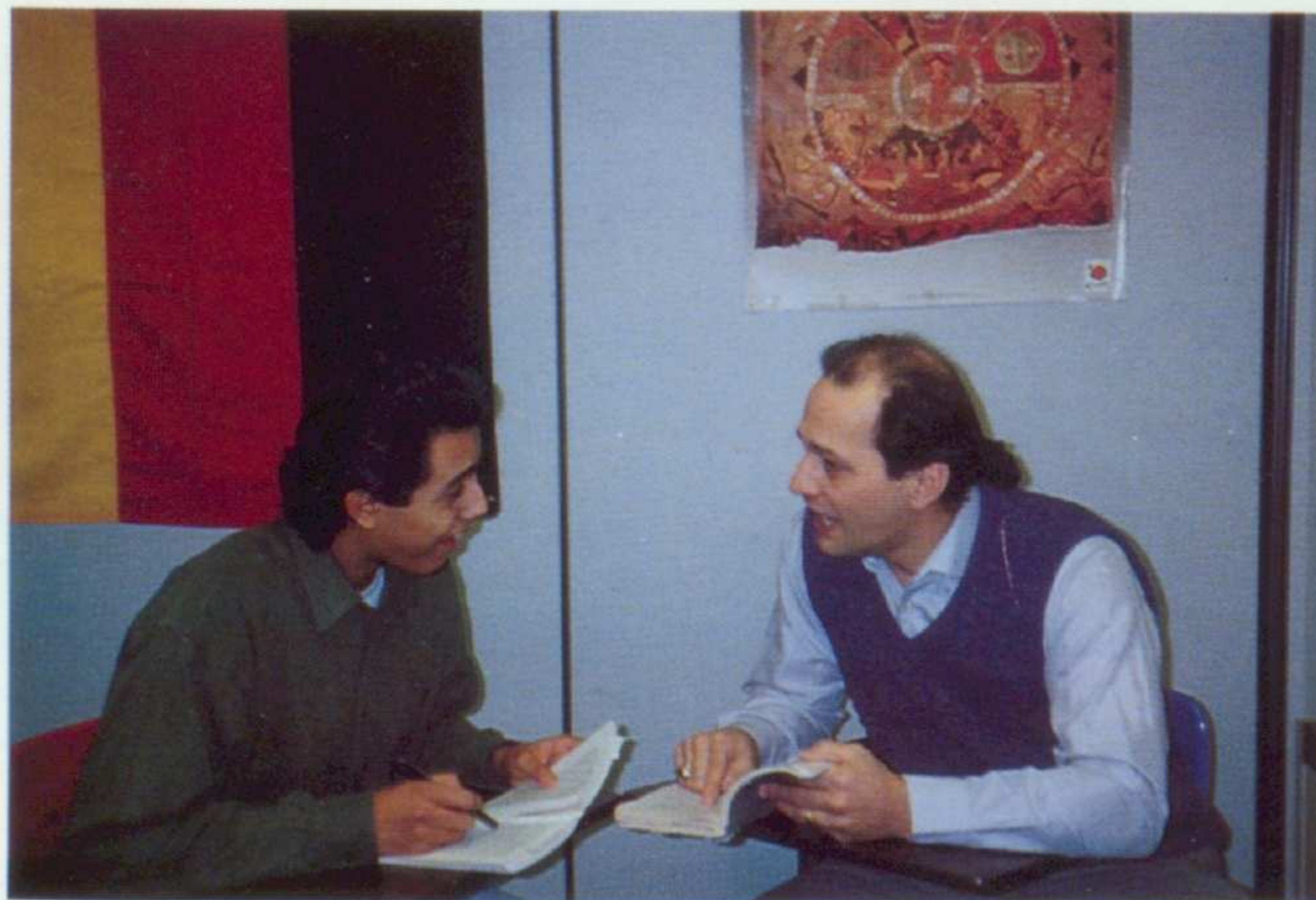

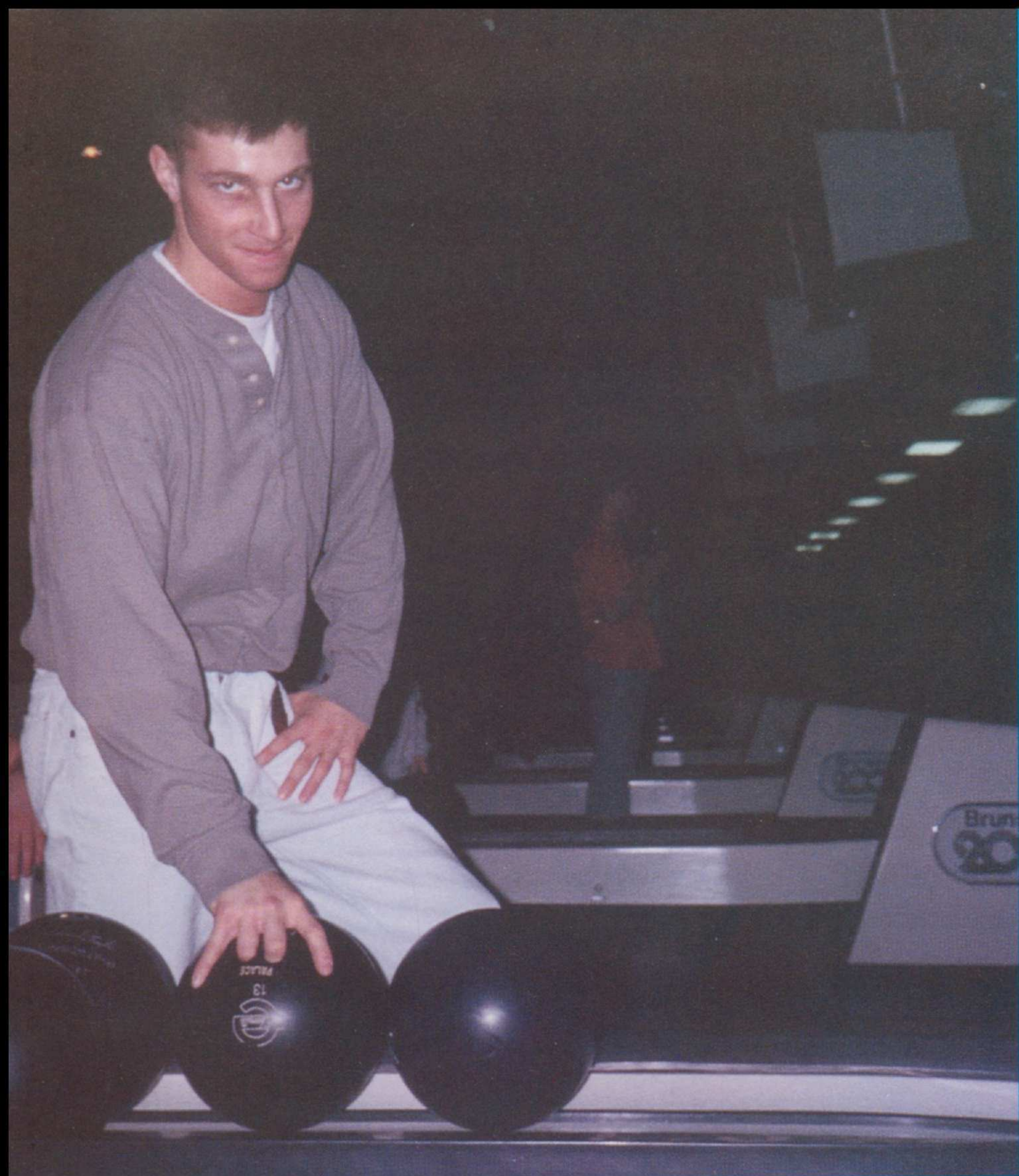



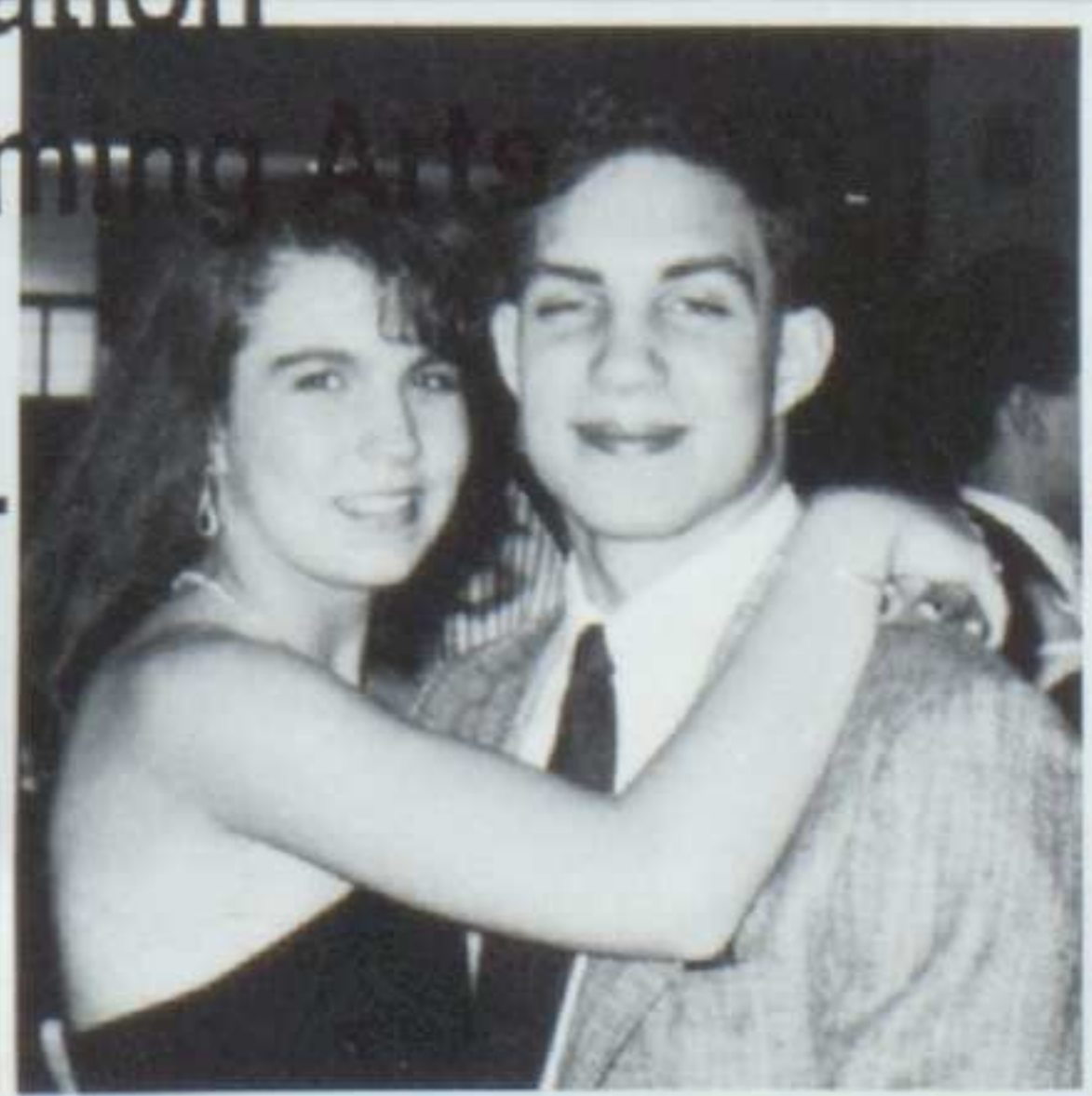

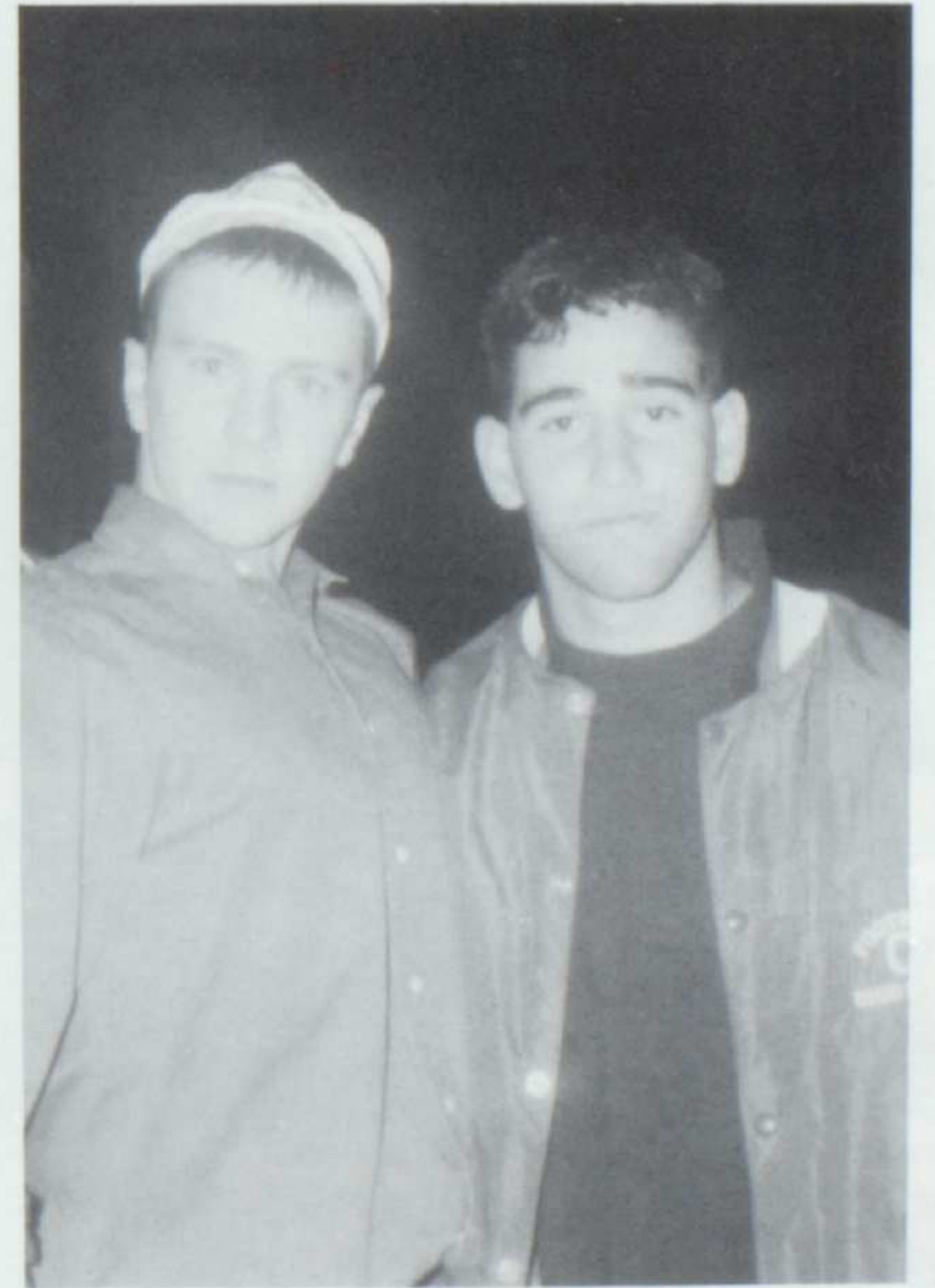

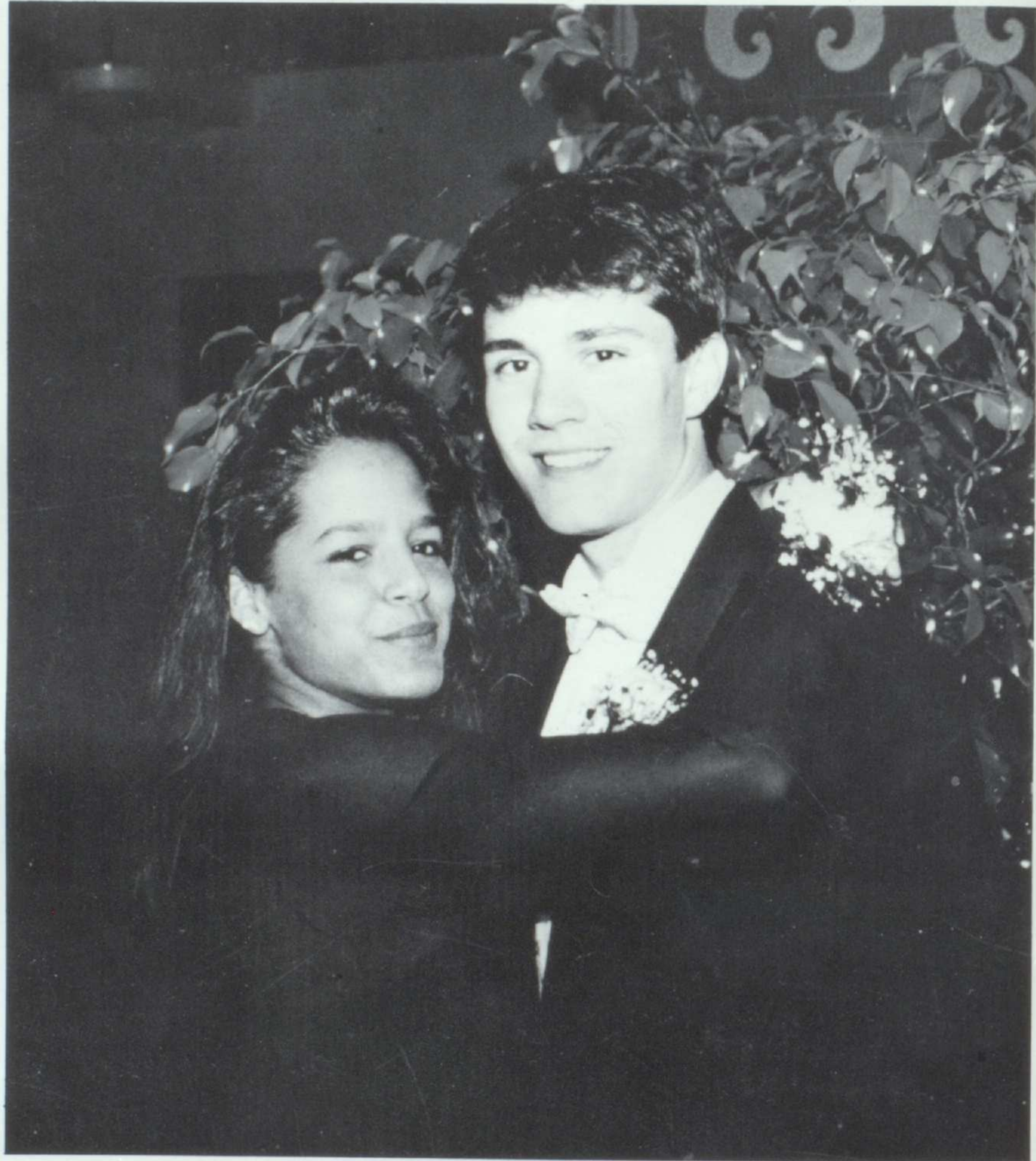

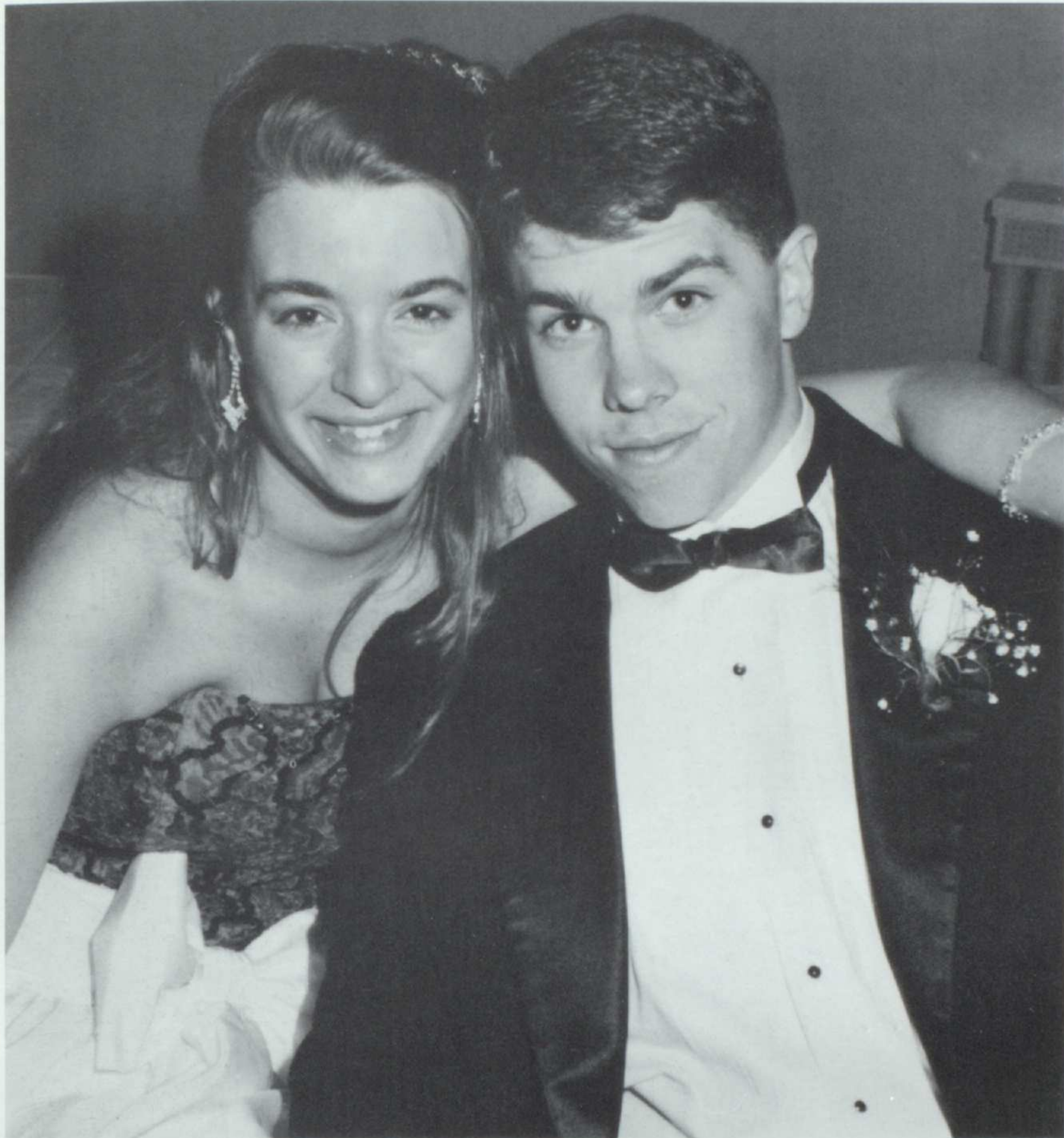

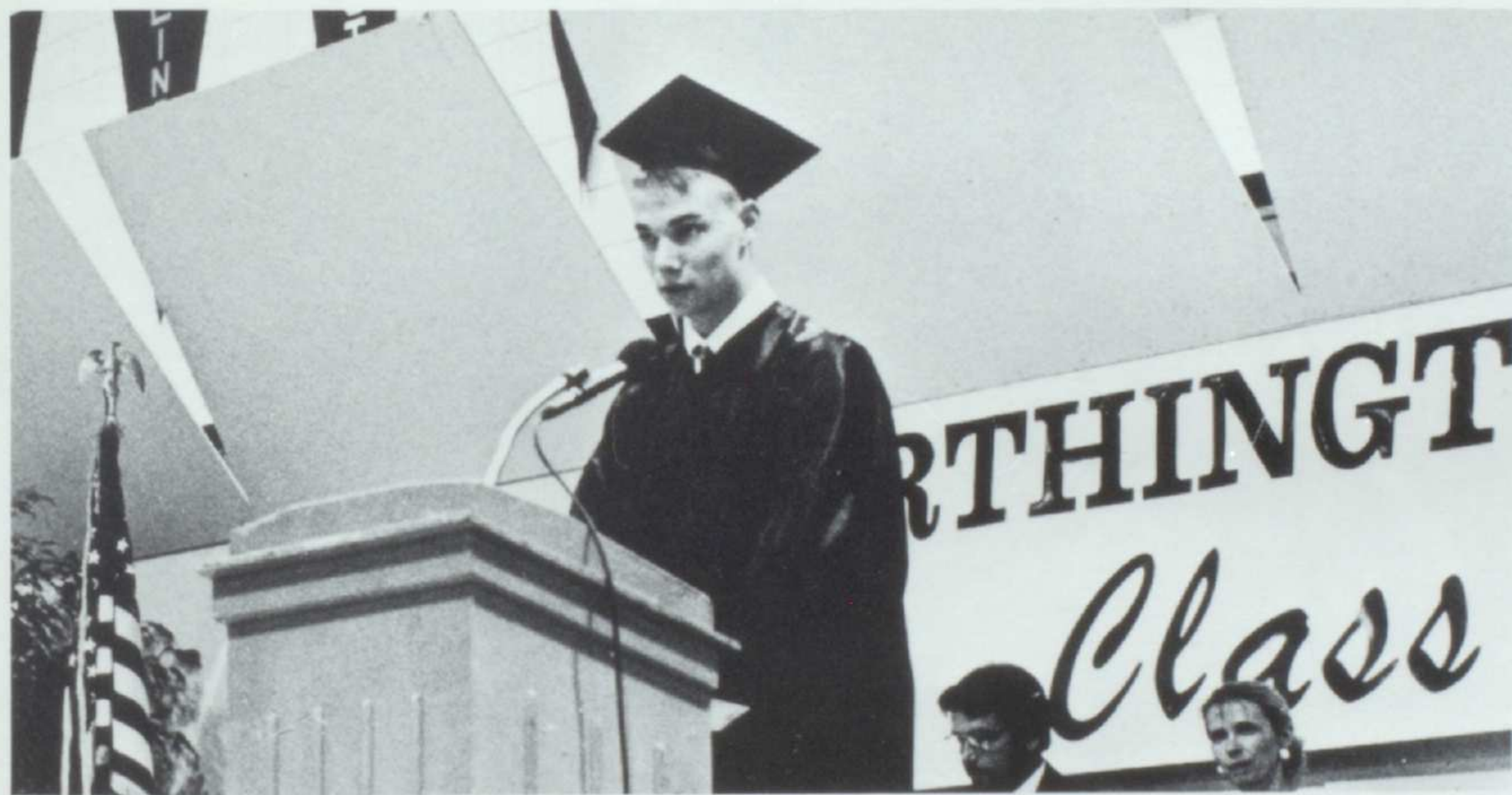



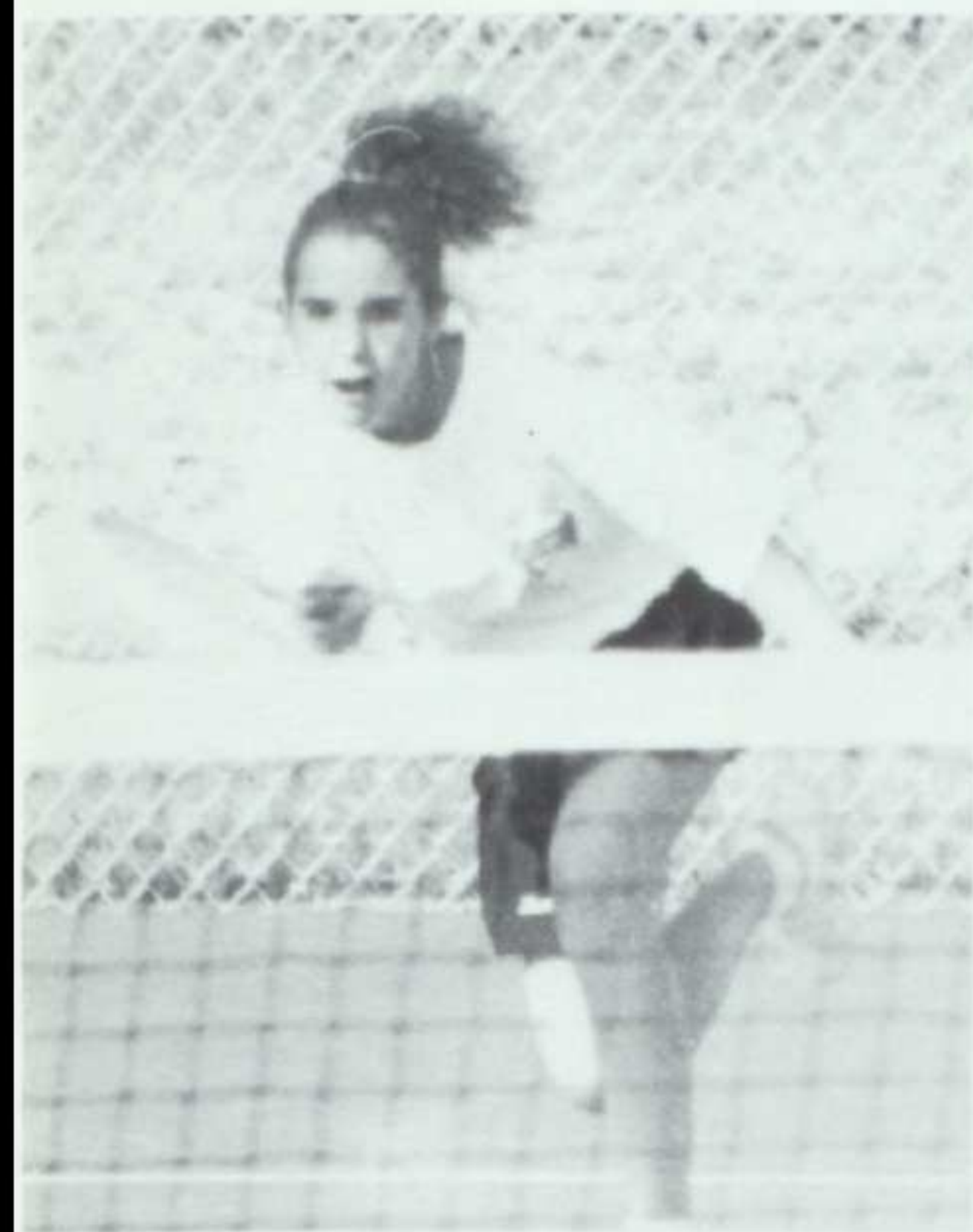
The varsity team finished 3rd in the OCC tournament. Karin Boerger

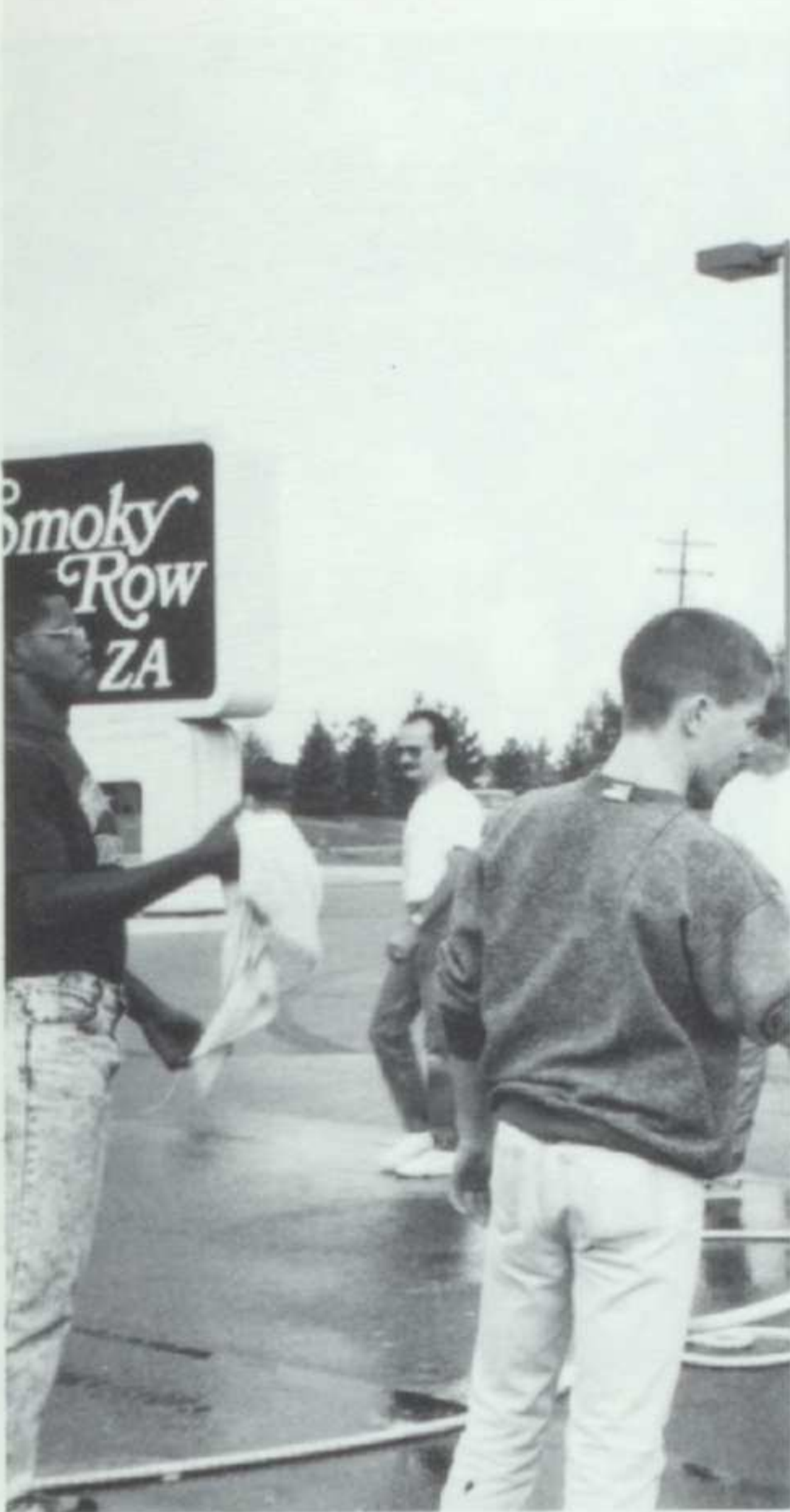

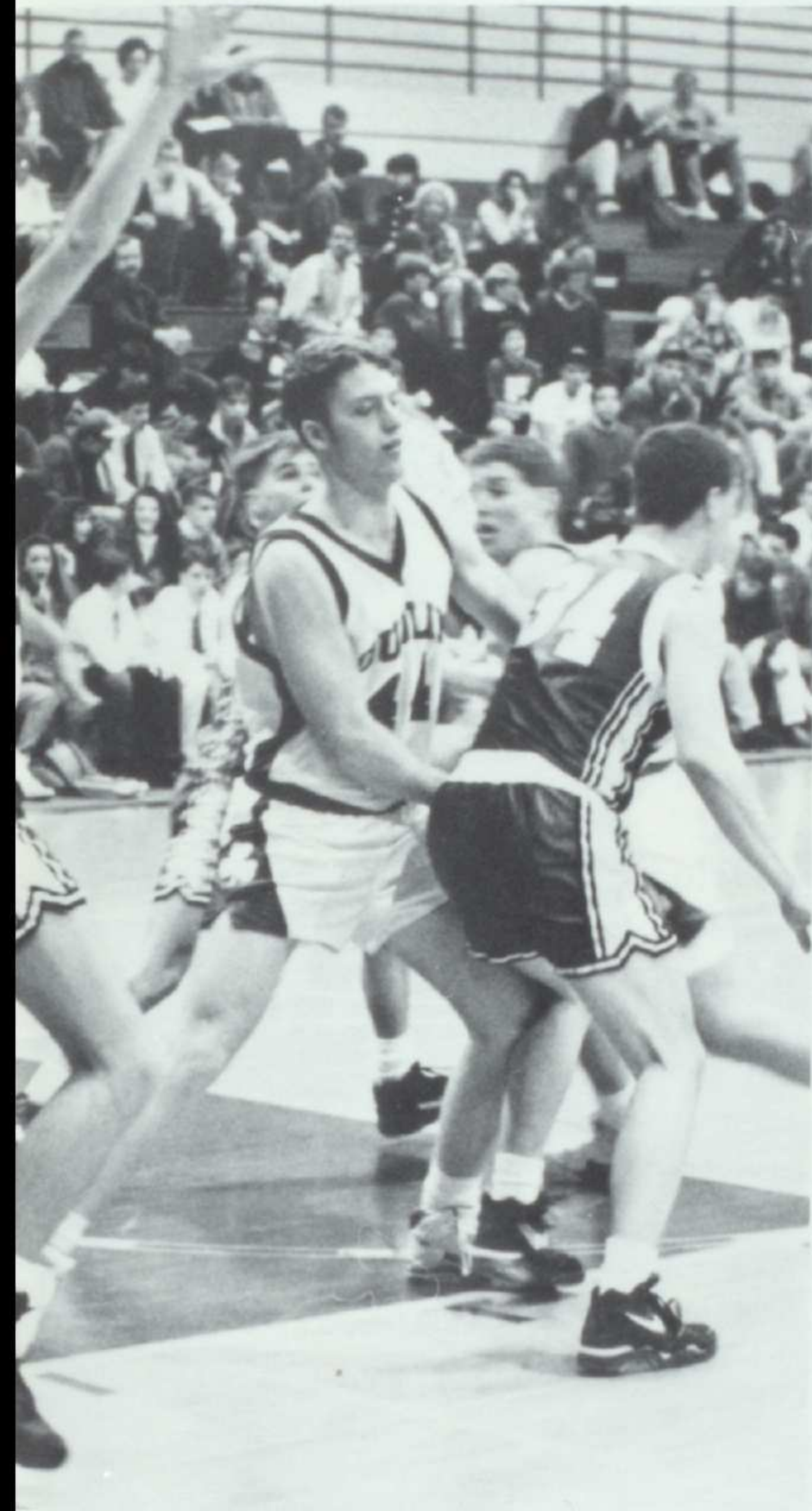

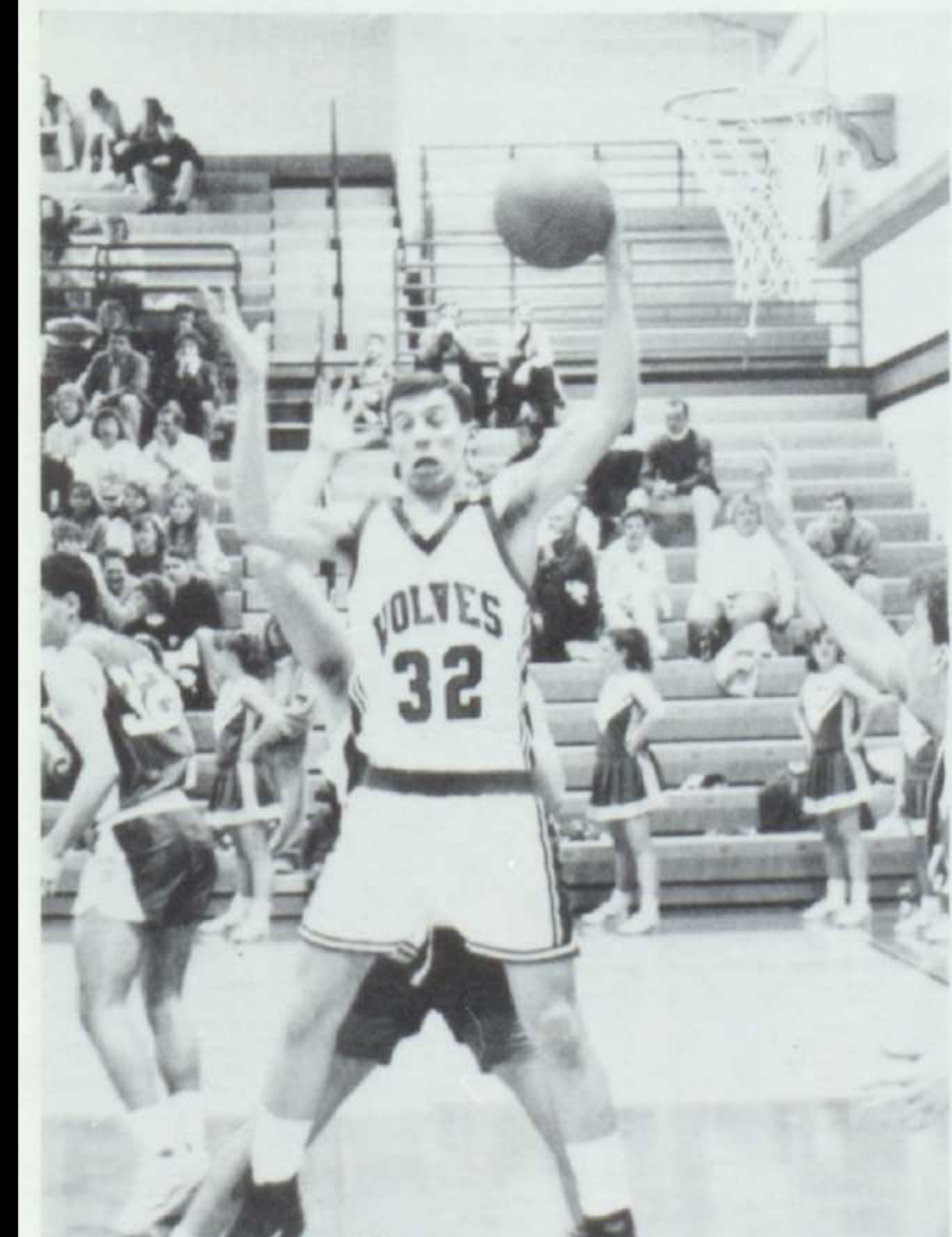

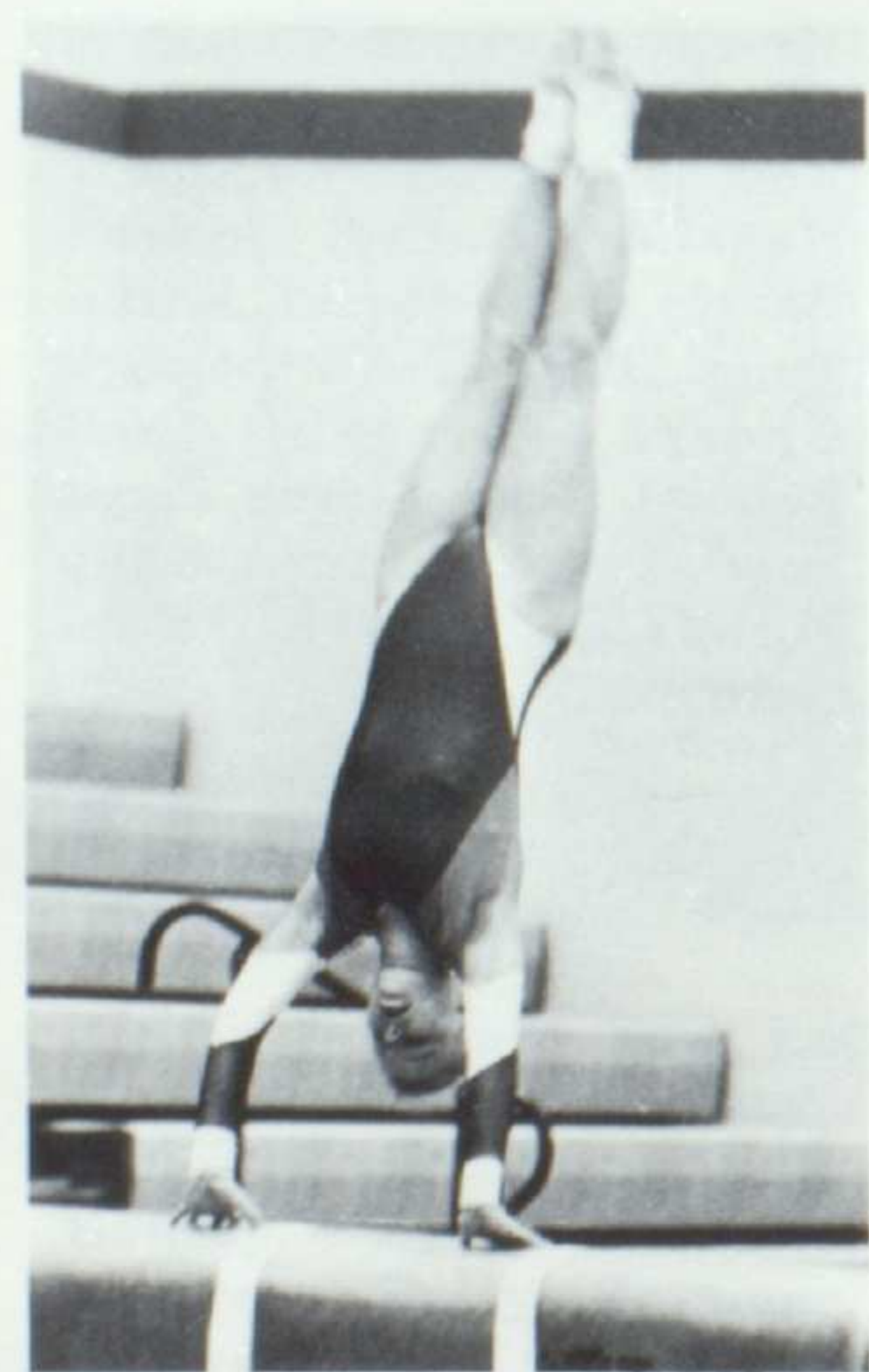
brought our team's score up 23 points from the first meet to the last meet which was a district record." Both Captain Vaas and Amy Calhoun scored highs with 29.15

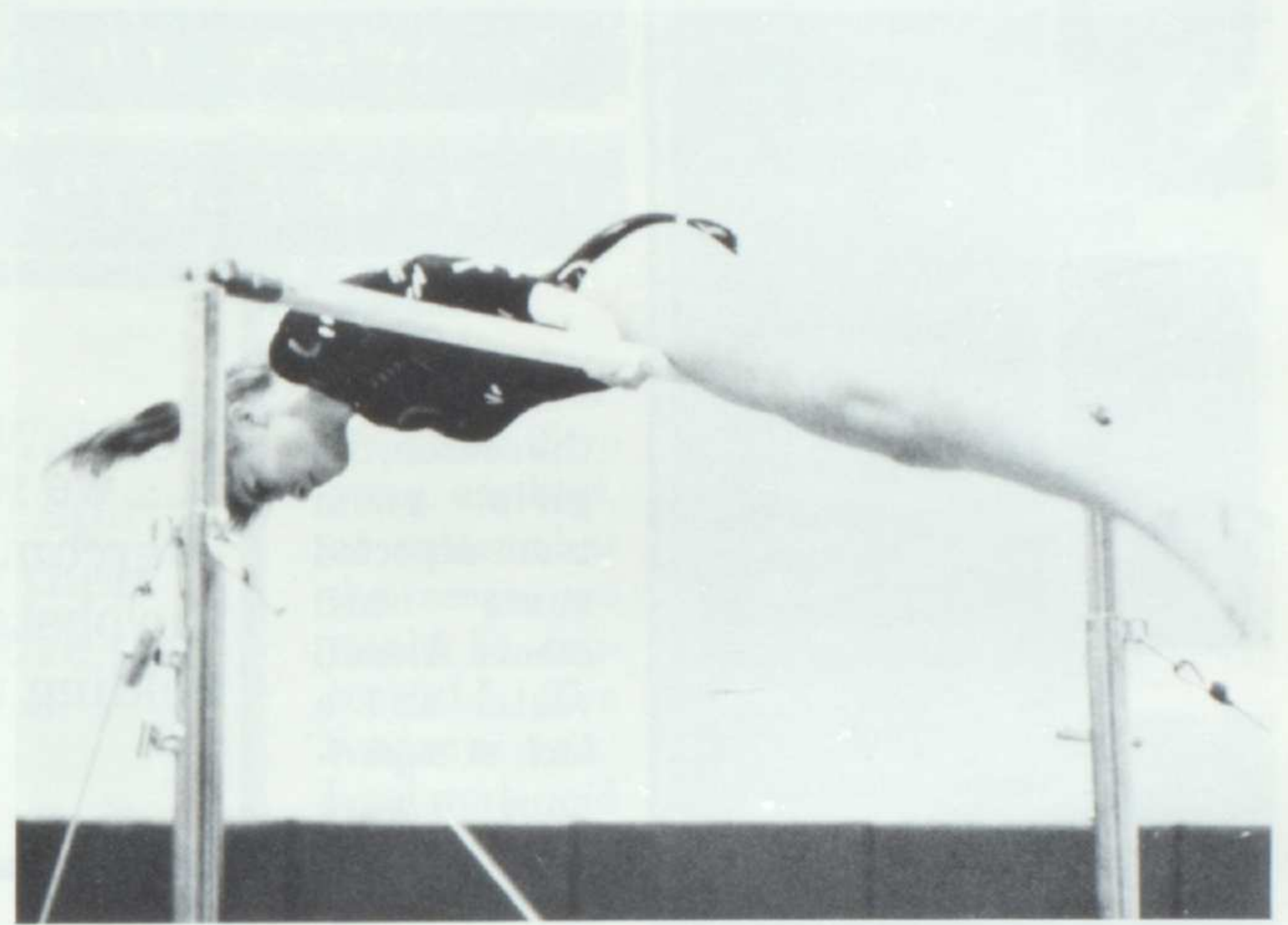

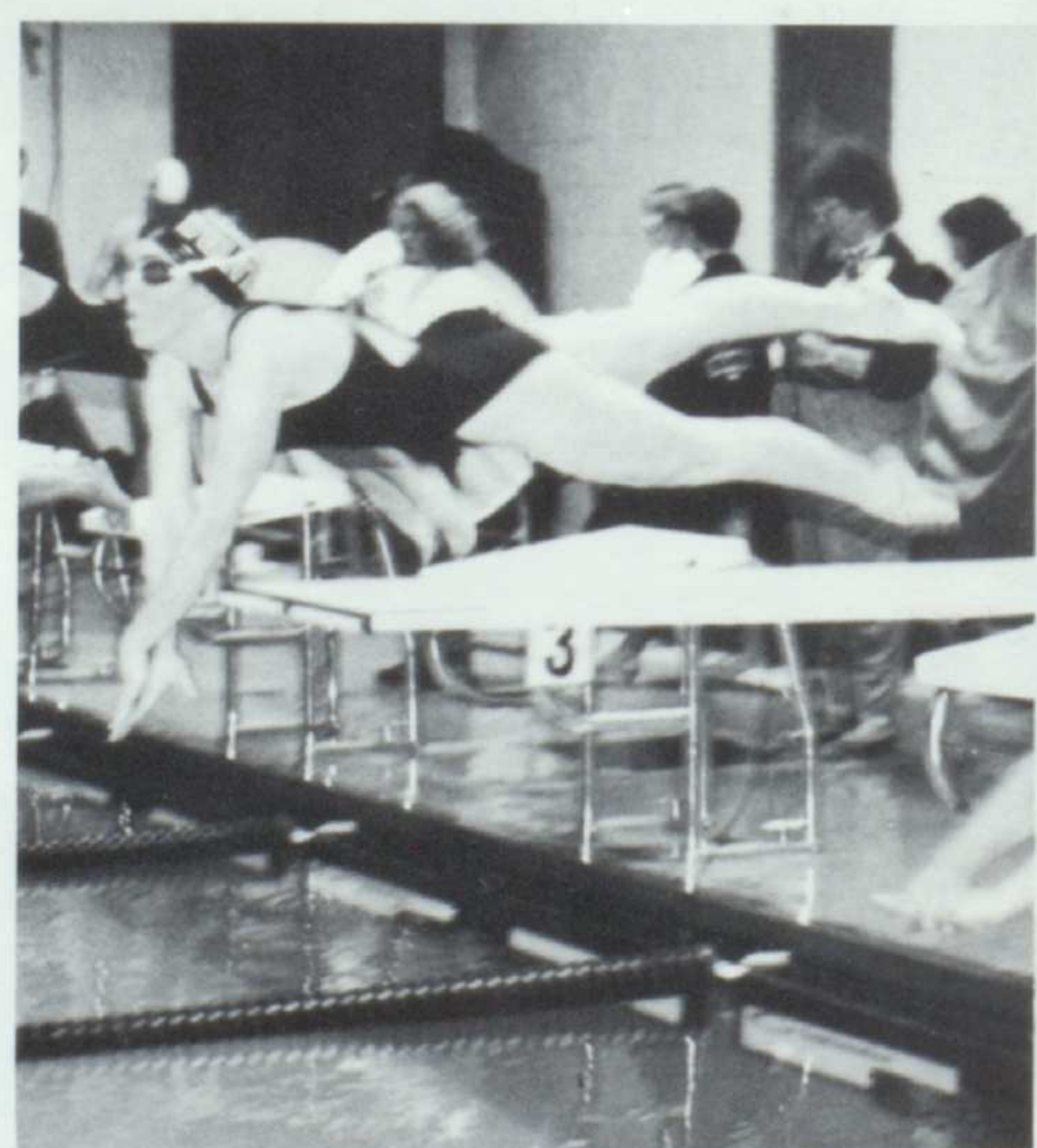

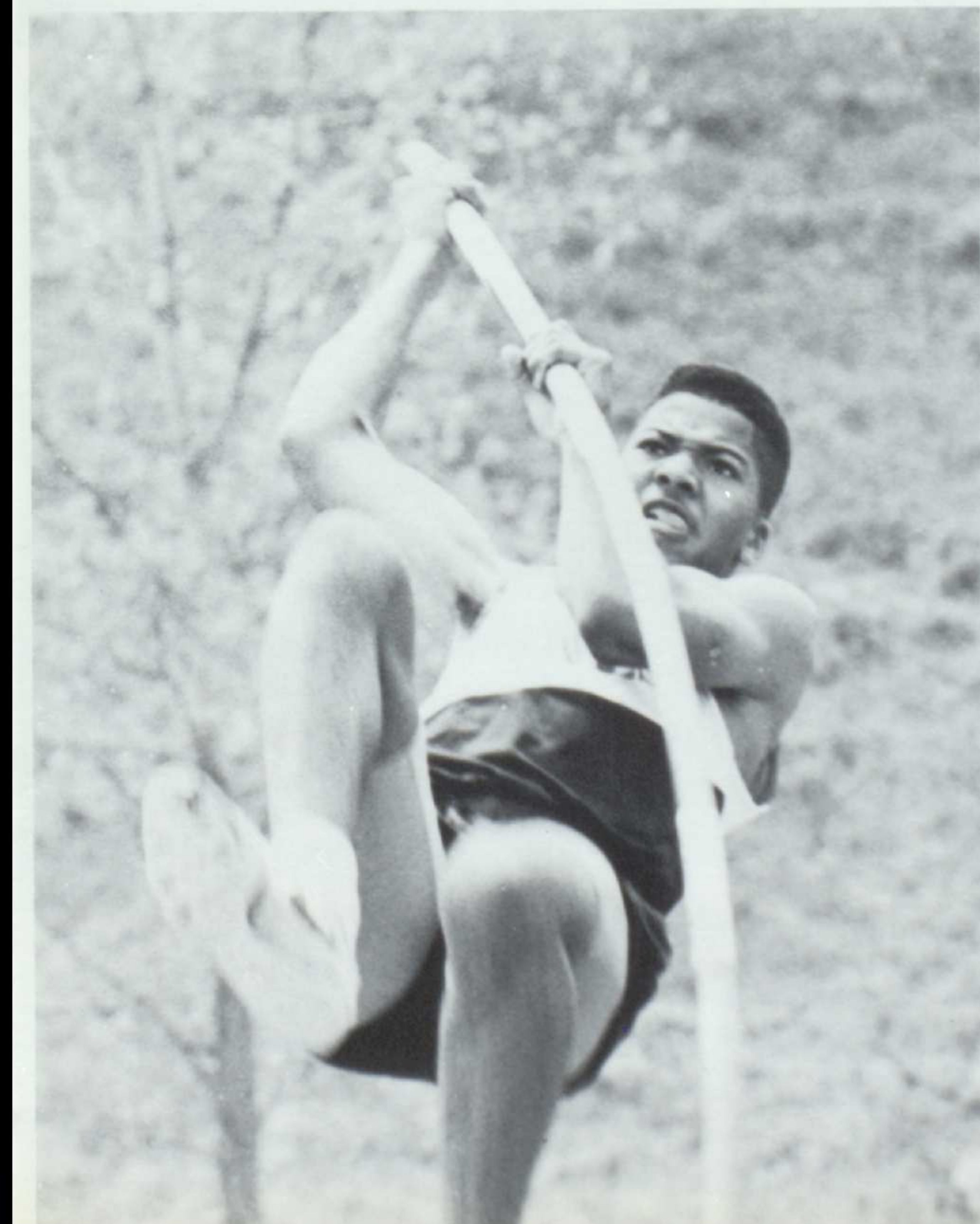

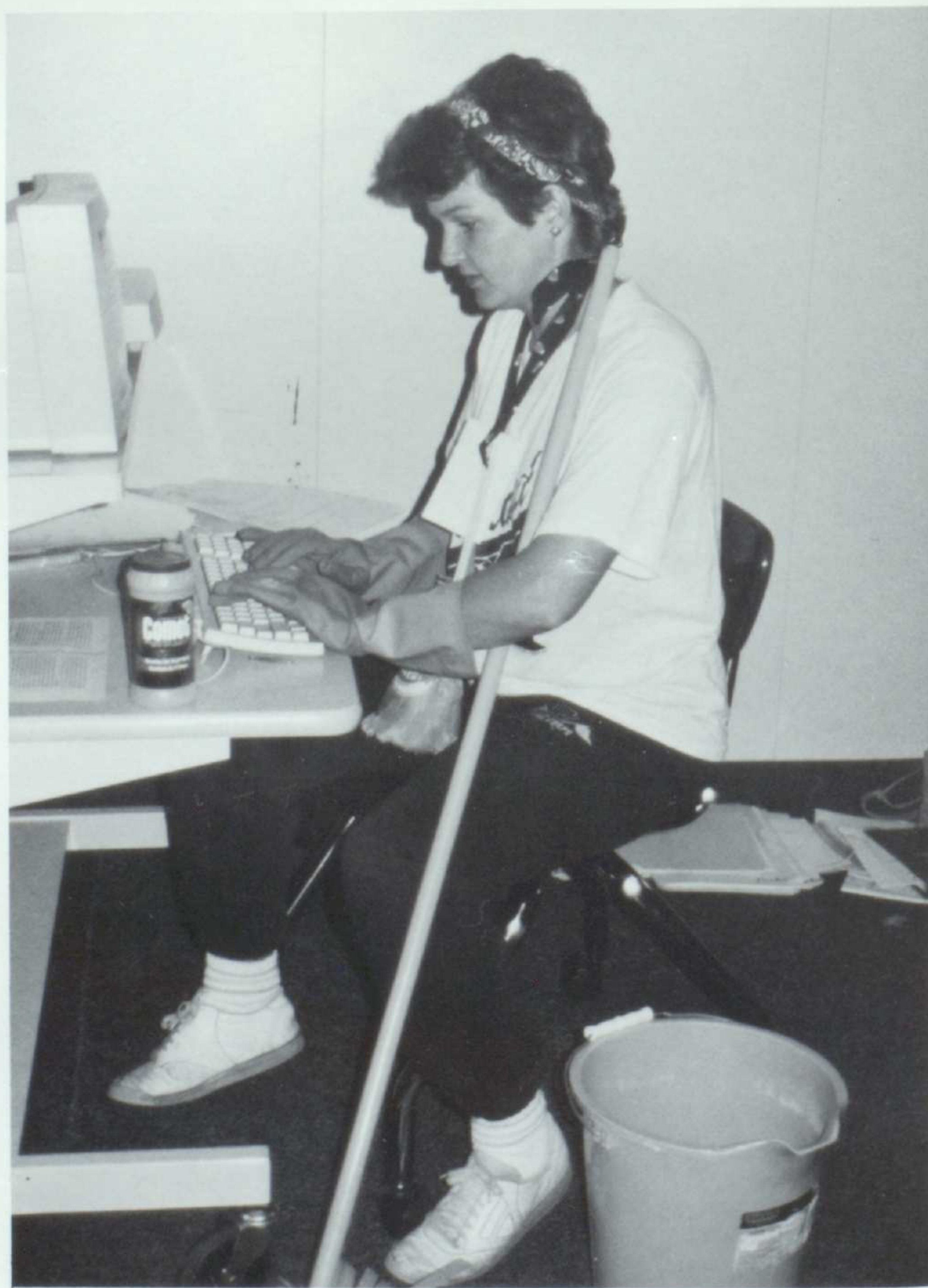
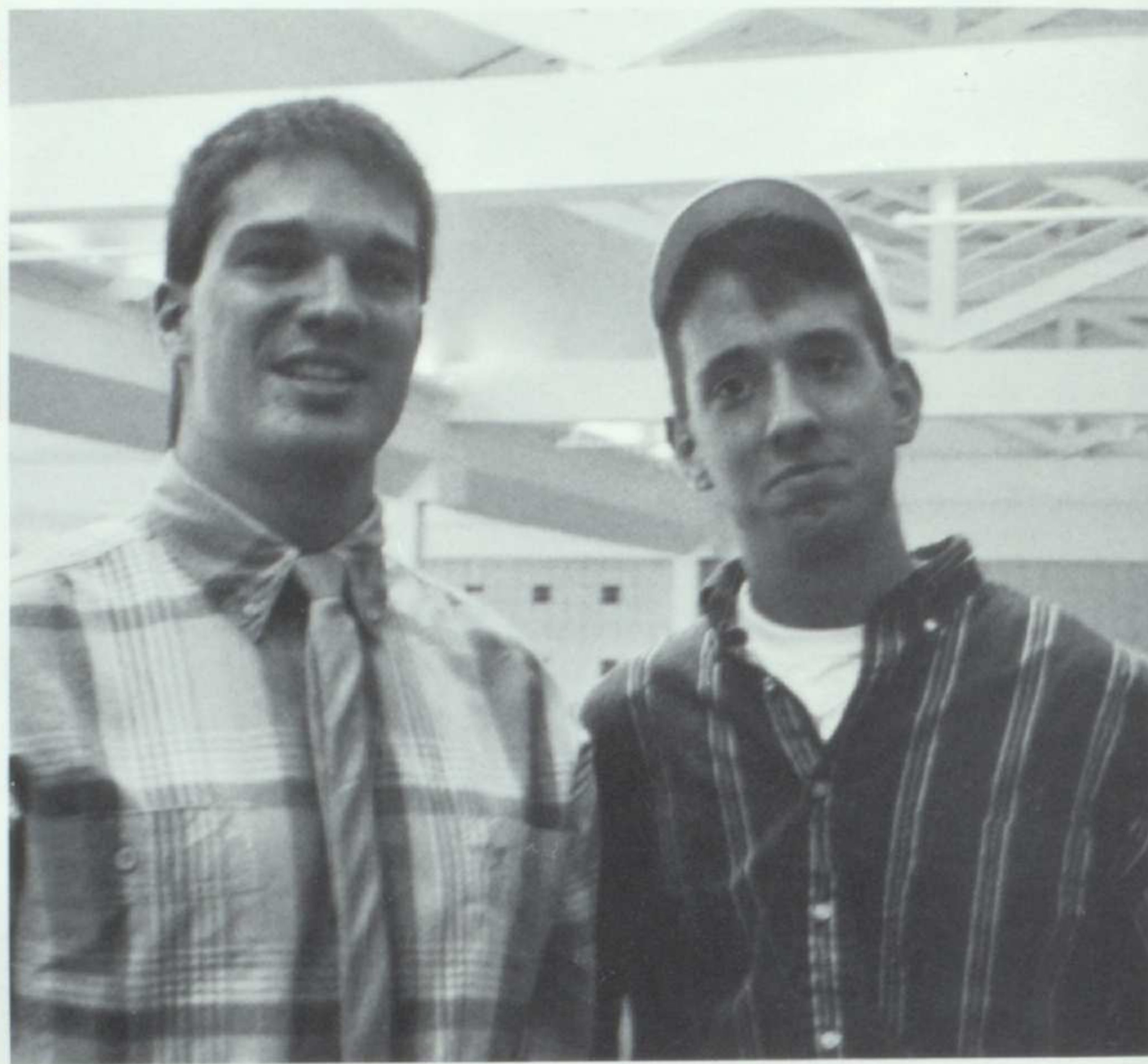
Familiar Faces at Different Places

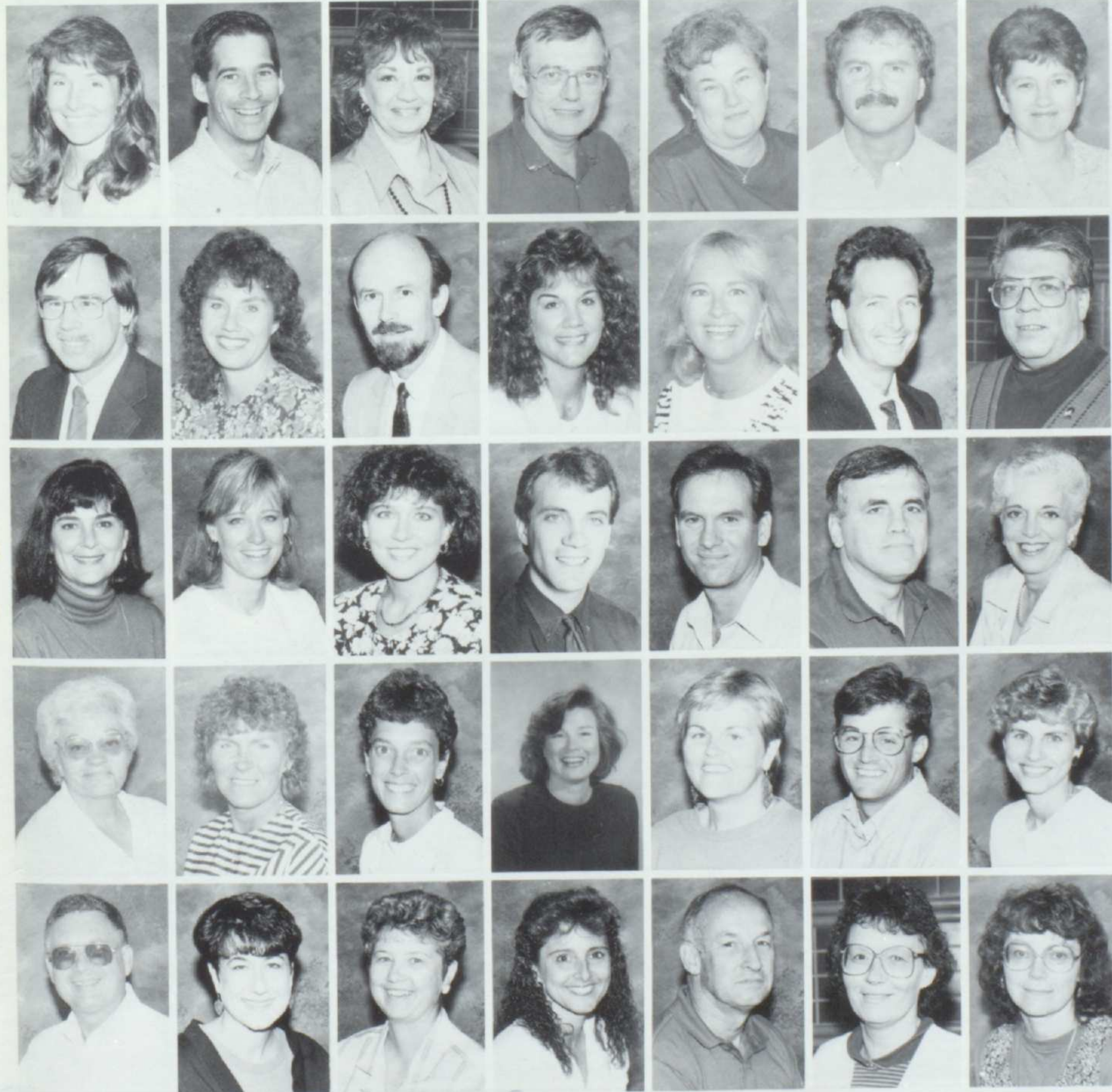

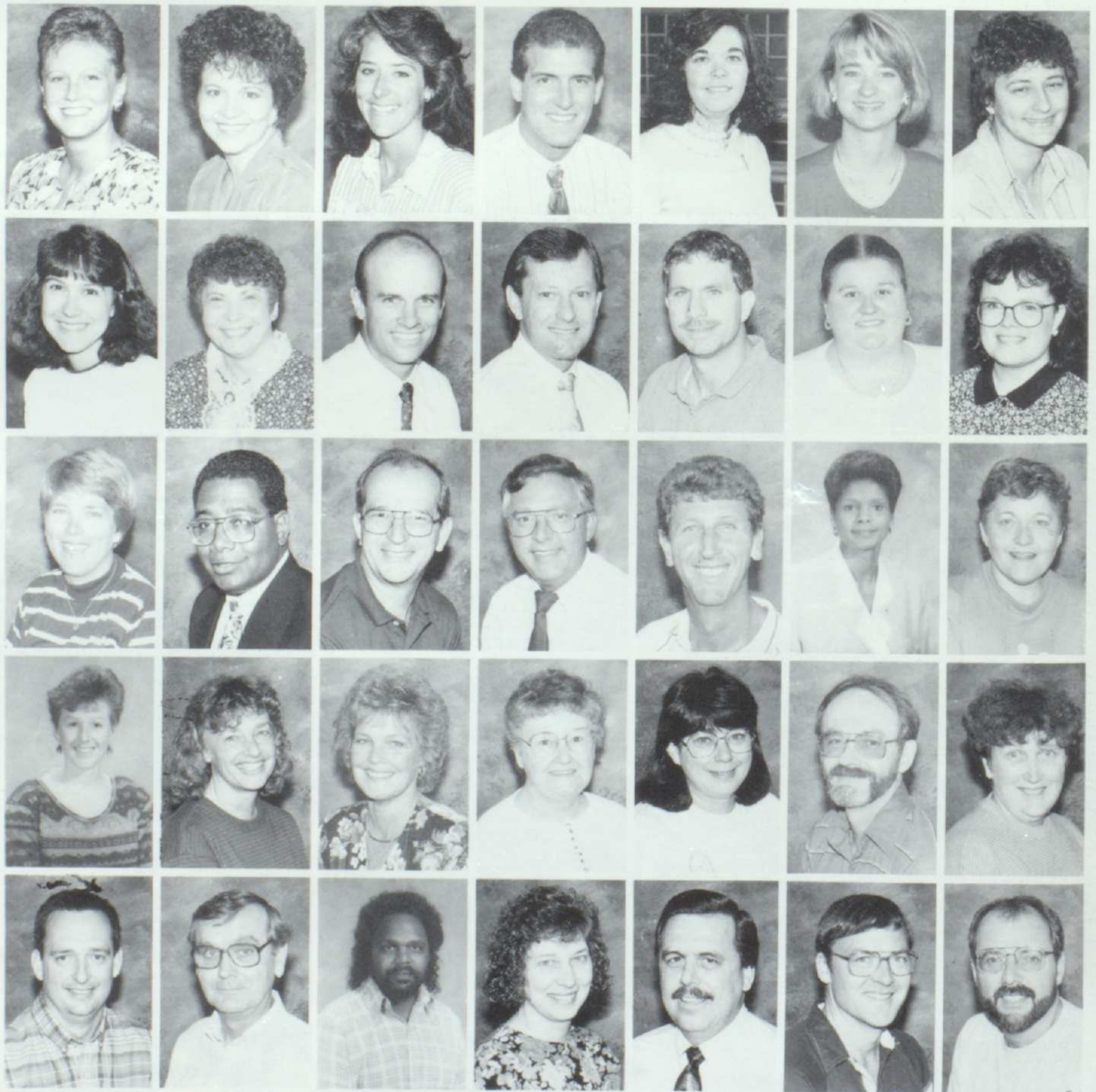

Students Publish Their Writings

Since we're a new school, we're trying to establish our own traditions, but we also recognize the need to continue what's good from the old school even among our new beginnings. The literary magazine, with Louise McDonald as its adviser, carries over many traditions established through 14 years of publication.

Creating *Writerspatch* because she saw some interest in a literary magazine, Mrs. McDonald gathered information for the first issue, a labor of love which eventually turned into a full time, recurring project. But "the work pays off in every issue!" insists Mrs. McDonald.

For the moment, our school's magazine is still called *Writerspatch*, the name given to the literary magazine in a contest conducted 14 years ago. This year's staff has decided to run a similar contest in the spring to name our literary magazine.

This collection of poetry, prose, sketches, artwork, and short stories, all created by students, develops not from an official class but as an "extended educational option." Some students just write or submit pictures to the magazine and are not involved with the production. "So many students have talent that is not recognized," acknowledged Mrs. McDonald. "Not all students are academically outstanding, but many can write very well," she added.

Approximately 100-110 writers and 30-40 artists publish in the 100-110 page magazine. Every issue demands at least 60 hours from each student on its staff. Mrs. McDonald admitted that she puts in 300+ hours for one issue.

The magazine is a product of hard work and many accomplishments. "It gives me the chance to help students publish their writing and to read others' poetry," stated Renee Schlater. "I also help choose the poetry that is published and submit my own work for others to read. Hopefully, everyone will enjoy this year's *Writerspatch*," she added.

The beginning of this new literary magazine is setting a standard for every one that follows for years to come.

Proficiency Tests - Not Just a Thing of the Future

When I interviewed Freshmen at the beginning of the year, I asked them what their feelings were concerning the proficiency tests. I was surprised that half of them didn't know what the tests were! So what are they?

In July of 1987, the Ohio State Legislature passed a law mandating that all public high schools in Ohio must test all students who will graduate in 1994 and beyond. Students must successfully pass exams in four areas: reading, writing, citizenship, and math. The legislature's action in passing the law resulted from the increasing number of students who have graduated from high school without knowing the basics essential to surviving in society.

In 1984 seniors must pass the proficiency tests before they graduate. If they don't pass, they'll just receive a diploma of general attendance, which will not allow them admission into universities.

Many disparities concerning the proficiency tests have arisen. Why are private schools exempt from the testing? Some students question the advantages of using tutors. Students wonder how they'll feel before and after taking the tests!

Teacher Mrs. Curtain remarked, "Until private schools are funded by the state, they should not have to meet the same requirements as public schools."

The administration provided after school tutorials for those students who wanted a little extra help. The students who took advantage of them agreed that for the most part tutoring did help prepare them for the tests. Even without attending the tutor sessions, many freshmen said that the tests had both easy and hard sections. Because freshmen cannot choose courses in government, they found citizenship to be the most difficult.

Many students share similar views concerning the tests. Freshmen Allen Longoreth complains, "One test should not determine our entire future." Kristi Chitwood thinks, "You shouldn't have to pass a test to graduate if you can pass all your classes." Jenny Galvin simply doesn't think the tests are fair because some students aren't good at taking tests. While some had definite objections with the tests, freshmen Josh Jones points out, "If students can't pass the test after eight chances, they don't deserve a diploma!"

Although many opinions on the tests exist, the fact remains that freshmen must pass them in order to graduate. But look on the bright side. Once you've passed the proficiency tests, upperclassmen can sleep in while others are painstakingly answering questions about how many stripes are on the American flag.

Chris seemed larger than life to some. He was nearly 6'4" and wore size 12 shoes. But under that ball cap, short sleeved shirt and shorts was an emotional, free thinking young man. He was rough on his shoes, clothes, and his golf clubs. (However, he never met a refrigerator he didn't like.) He was also the kid who cried at the end of *E.T.*, helped his sister make sand castles and surprised his parents by cleaning his room without being told.

He loved the earth - from backpacking, camping out and sunsets to the things that run across the landscape-Lamborghinis, Mercedes, skateboards, bikes, Pinewood Derby Racers, rollerblades, his first big wheel, roller coasters, trains, Mickey Mouse, slot cars, remote control cars, pot-bellied pigs, sleds and skis. His favorite states were Florida, California, and anywhere he could ski or swim.

In the water he would snorkle, boogieboard, dive for koosh balls, canoe and fish forever. Combining dirt and water, when he played soccer, he was a true "mudder."

He filled the air with golf, volley, tennis, basket, table tennis and lacrosse balls, kites, rockets, an occasional swear word, frisbees, badminton birds, a great laugh, Heavy "D" and the Boyz, The Beatles, B-Bs, The Columbus Dispatch, piano and trumpet notes, "Married with Children," "In Living Color," and "Cheers."

His favorite holidays were ones that got him out of school, involved presents - getting and giving - and candy. He loved fireworks on the 4th of July, coloring Easter eggs, blowing out candles, opening sur-

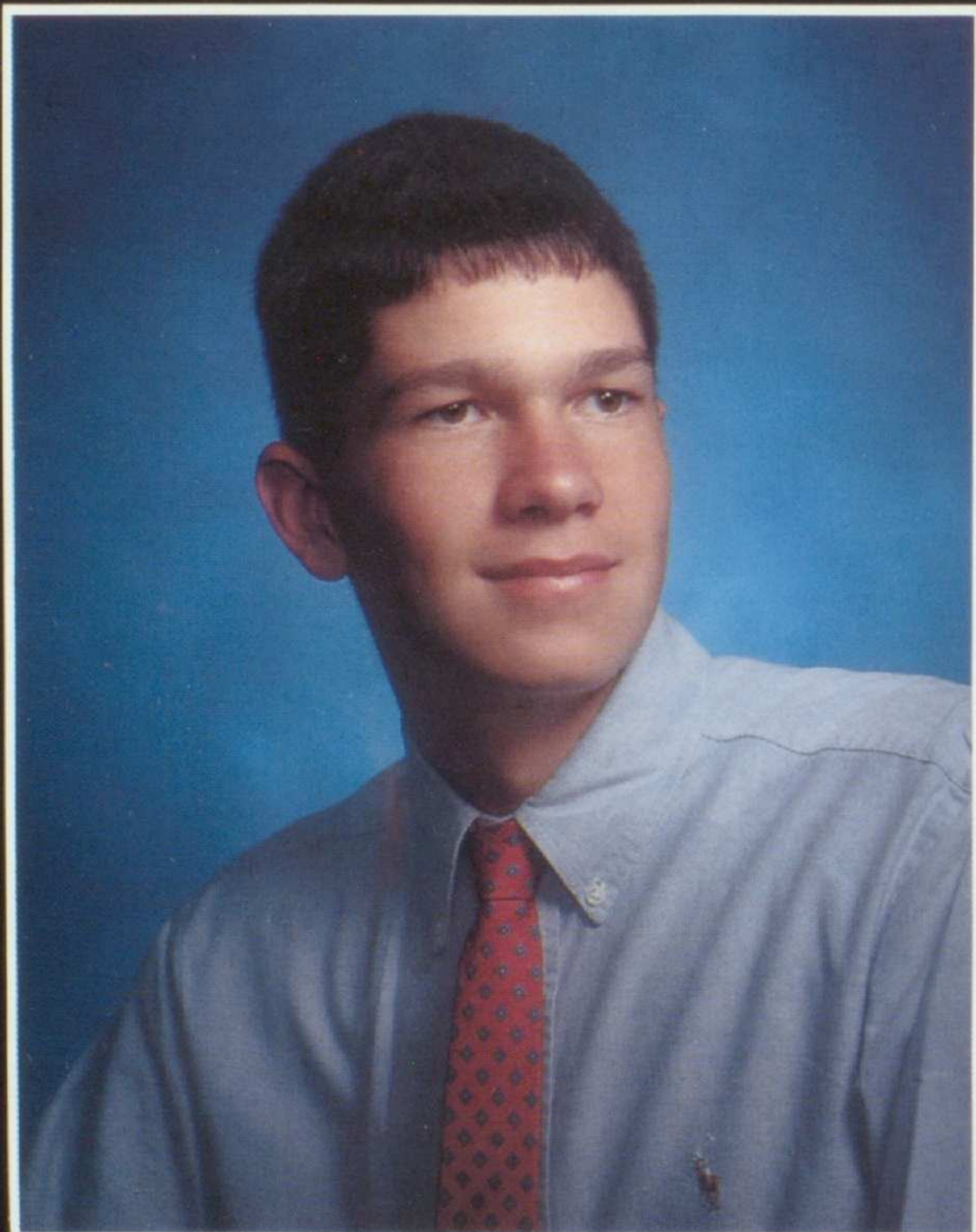
prise packages, scaring the life out of kids and their mothers on Halloween, hanging Christmas tree ornaments and making the yearly snail out of Christmas cookie dough.

The sports Chris didn't play, he watched intently. He loved the Buffalo Bills, the L.A. Lakers, the L.A. Dodgers, Worthington football and basketball, and Ohio State anything. He followed Syracuse University, the Columbus Chill, U.C.L.A., the Florida Gators, and the University of Michigan. *Sports Illustrated* was his bible. He went to the Columbus "500" on a too cold day but did not complain. His Air Jordans were beat up but they took him to school, his friends' homes and sporting events.

His other loves included wood-working, frequent haircuts, his room, "Faulty Towers," slime, Nintendo, "Black Adder," Fahrvergnugen, croquet, all his friends at both high schools, beating his father at anything, dressing up, pool, chess, checkers, Outburst, Pictionary, Labyrinth, cards, pin ball machines, Hermit Crabs, all seasons, dogs, study hall, Pepsi, getting out of French, Calvin and Hobbs, The Far Side, his inherited Playboys, pizza, being with big brother, zoos, Polo anything, and radar detectors.

Chris loved life and nearly everything in it. Only two things can be accounted for that he disliked - Plymouth Horizons and cats. He packed a lot of living into 17 years. To paraphrase the words of a song by another Chris - Christopher Cross - "When you remember Chris, laugh, don't cry, you know he'd want it that way."
