

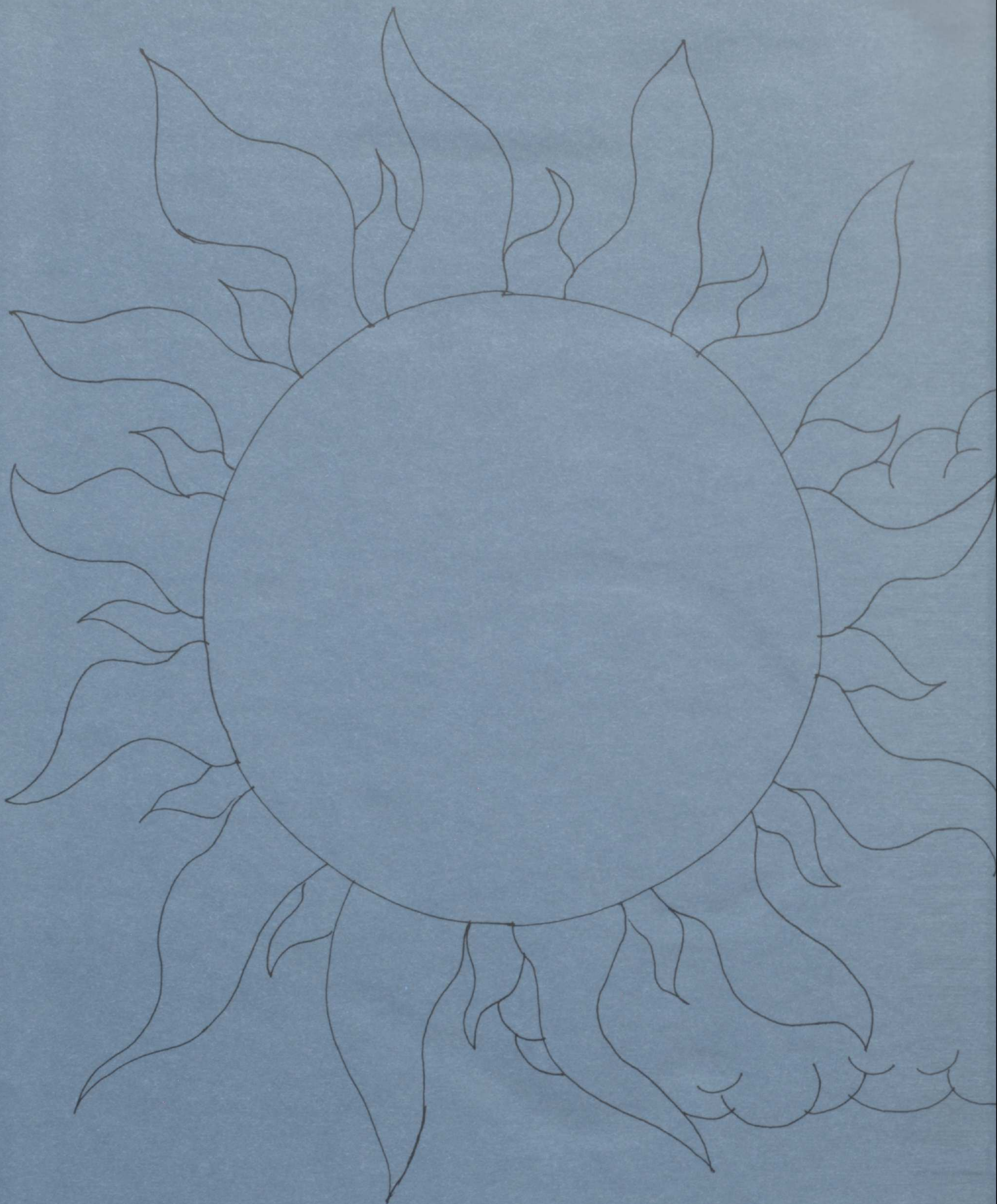

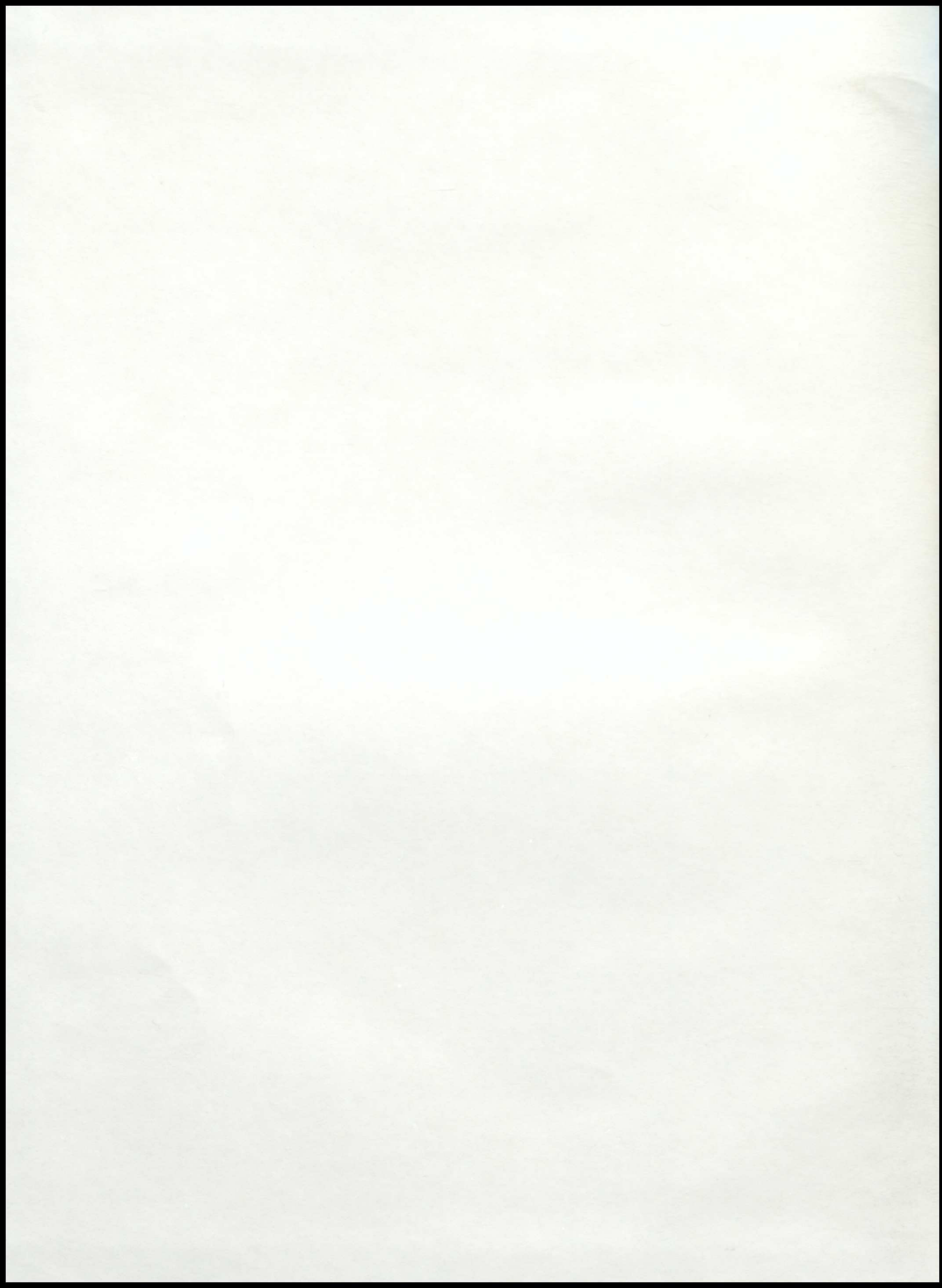

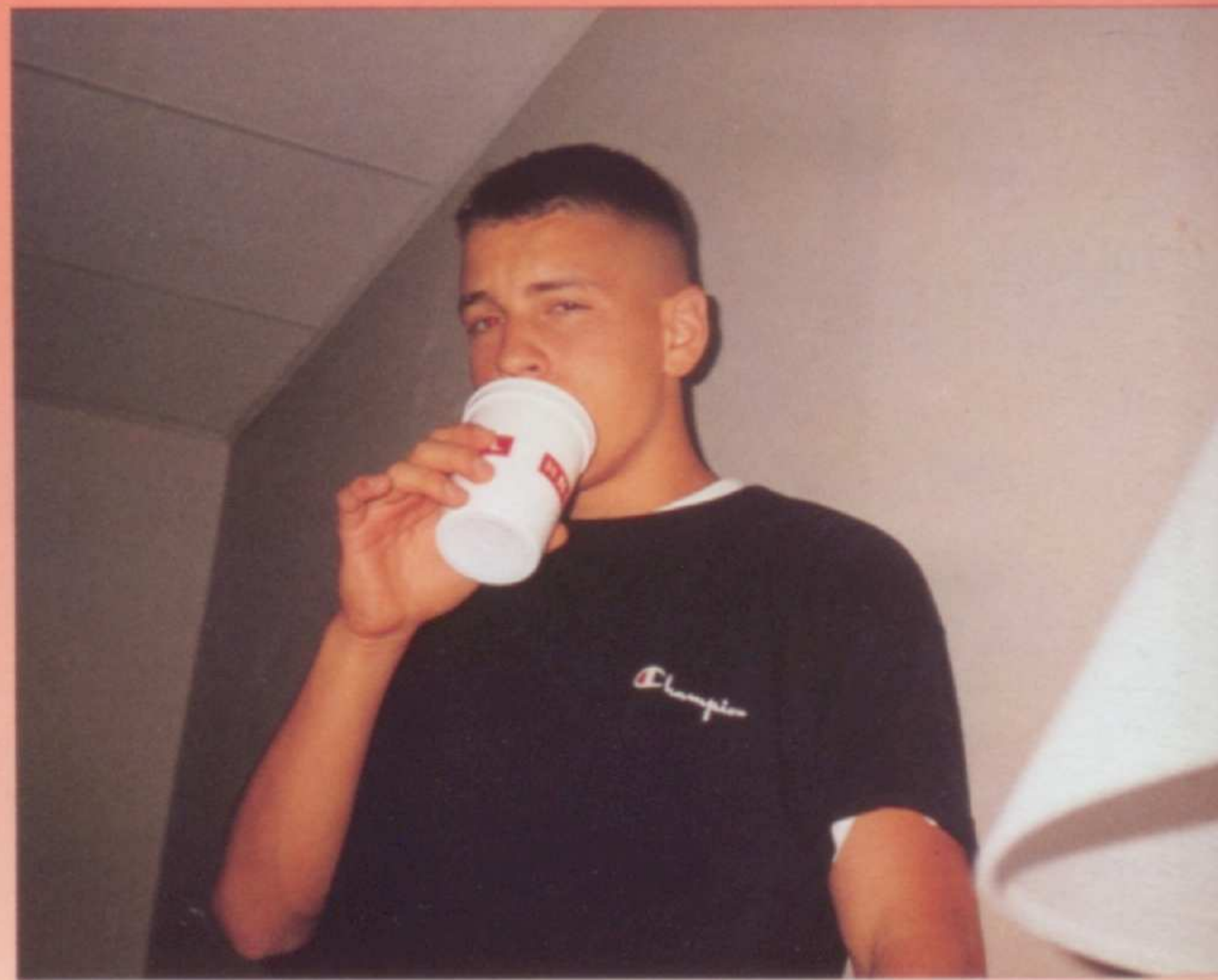
Days to Remember

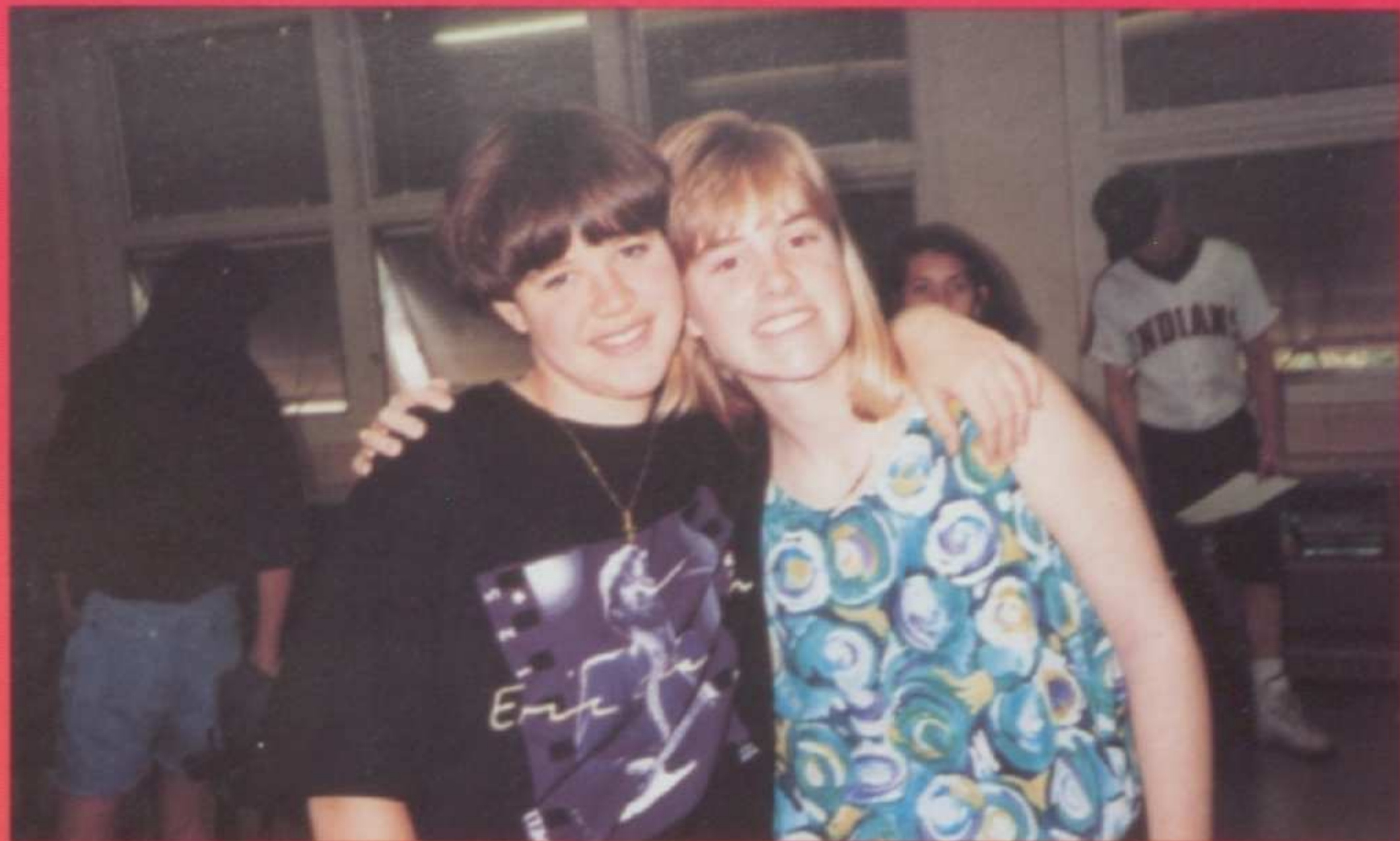

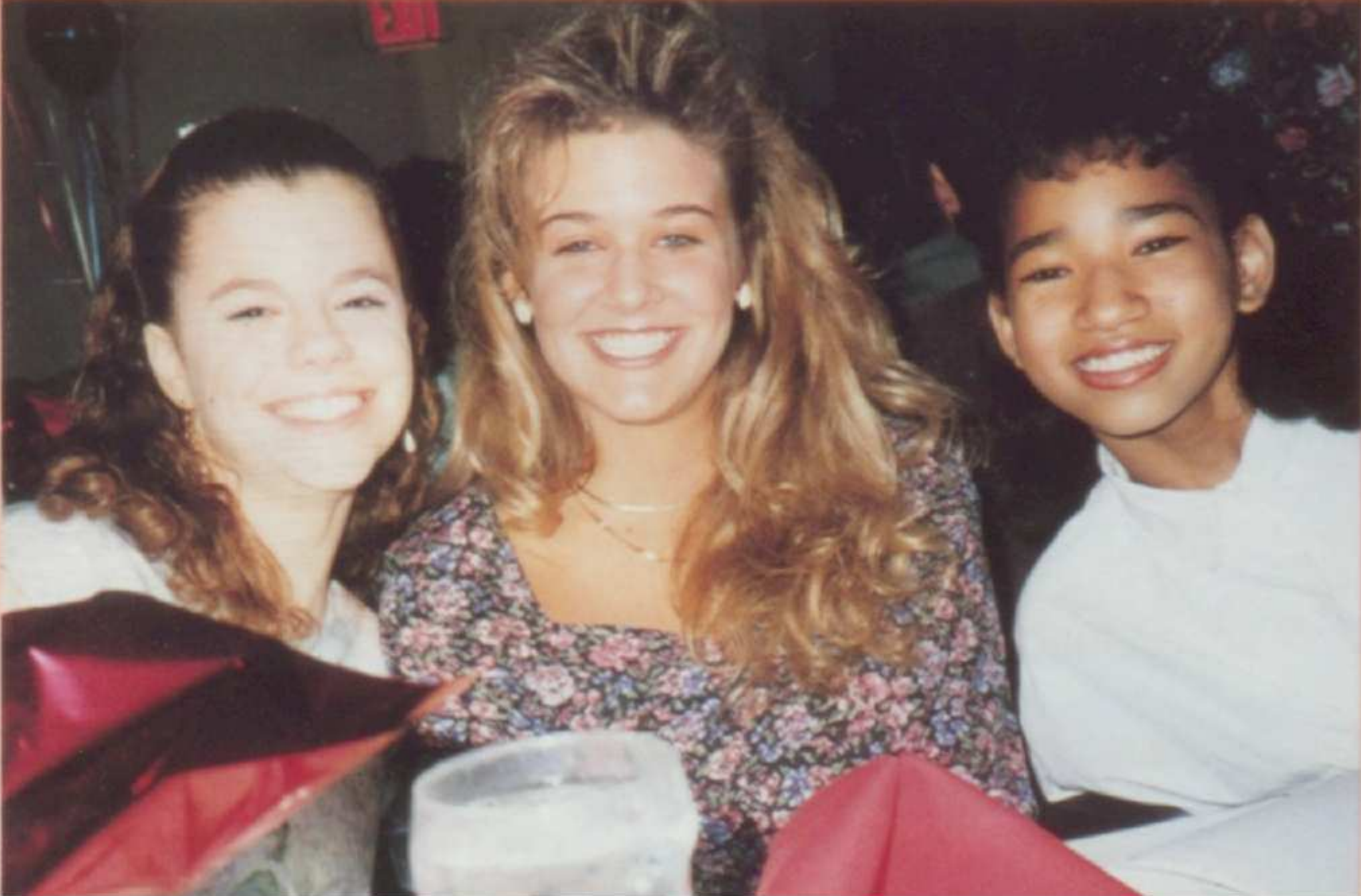

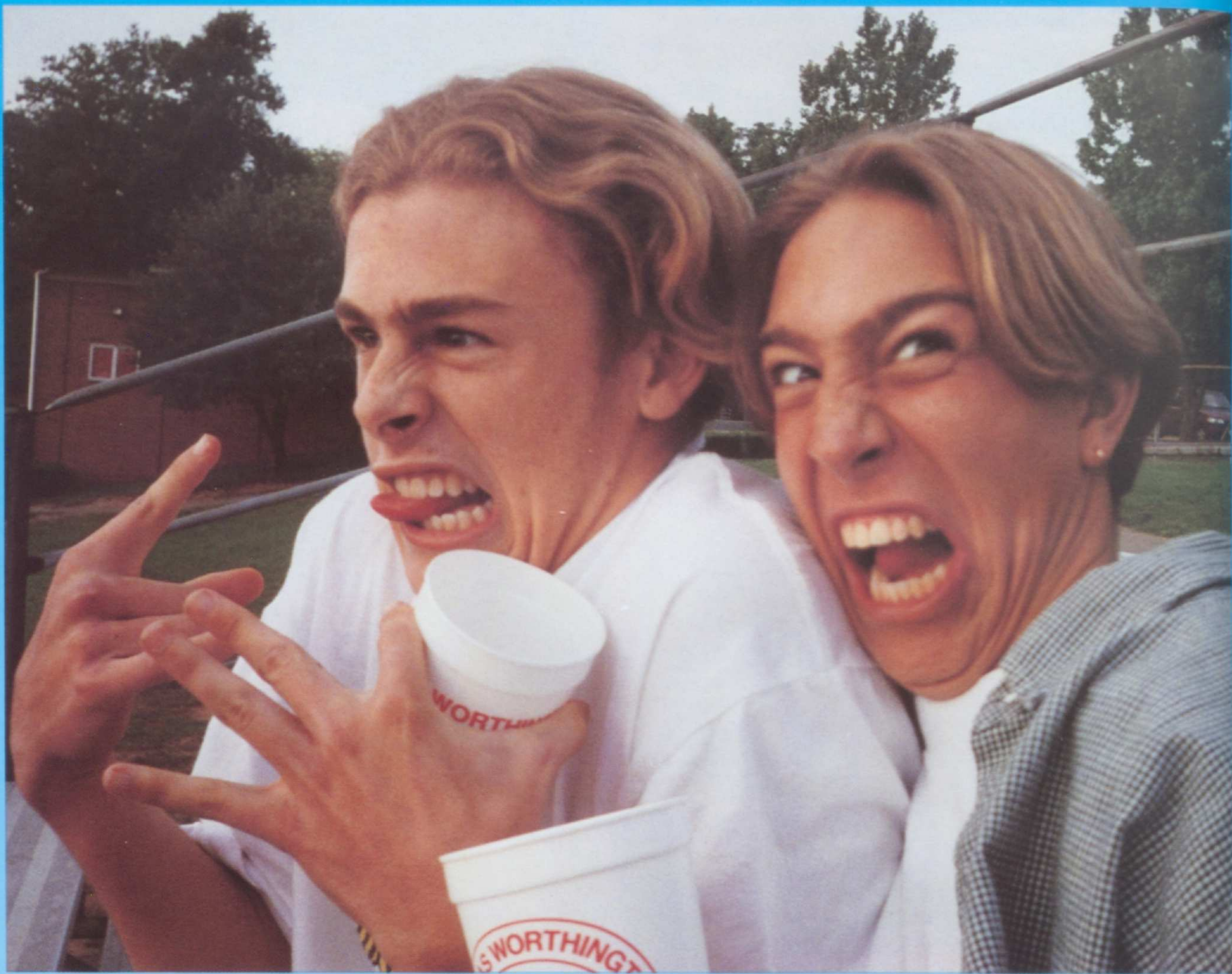
The 7:25 bell rang, and I decided to go in search of my homeroom. A crowd of matching shirts walked by me, and I followed them. As we passed a long strip of dry

With the opening of the 1994-1995 school year came many new privileges for TWHS seniors. One of their new privileges is the options regarding senior lunch. Many seniors chose to have an hour and a half lunch which keeps them at school until the regular dismissal time, three o'clock. Other seniors chose to have only a half an hour lunch period. As a result, these students are dismissed at two o'clock.

In order to get a full overview on how the senior class felt about these changes, we asked many seniors if they felt the longer lunch was beneficial or simply a waste of time. 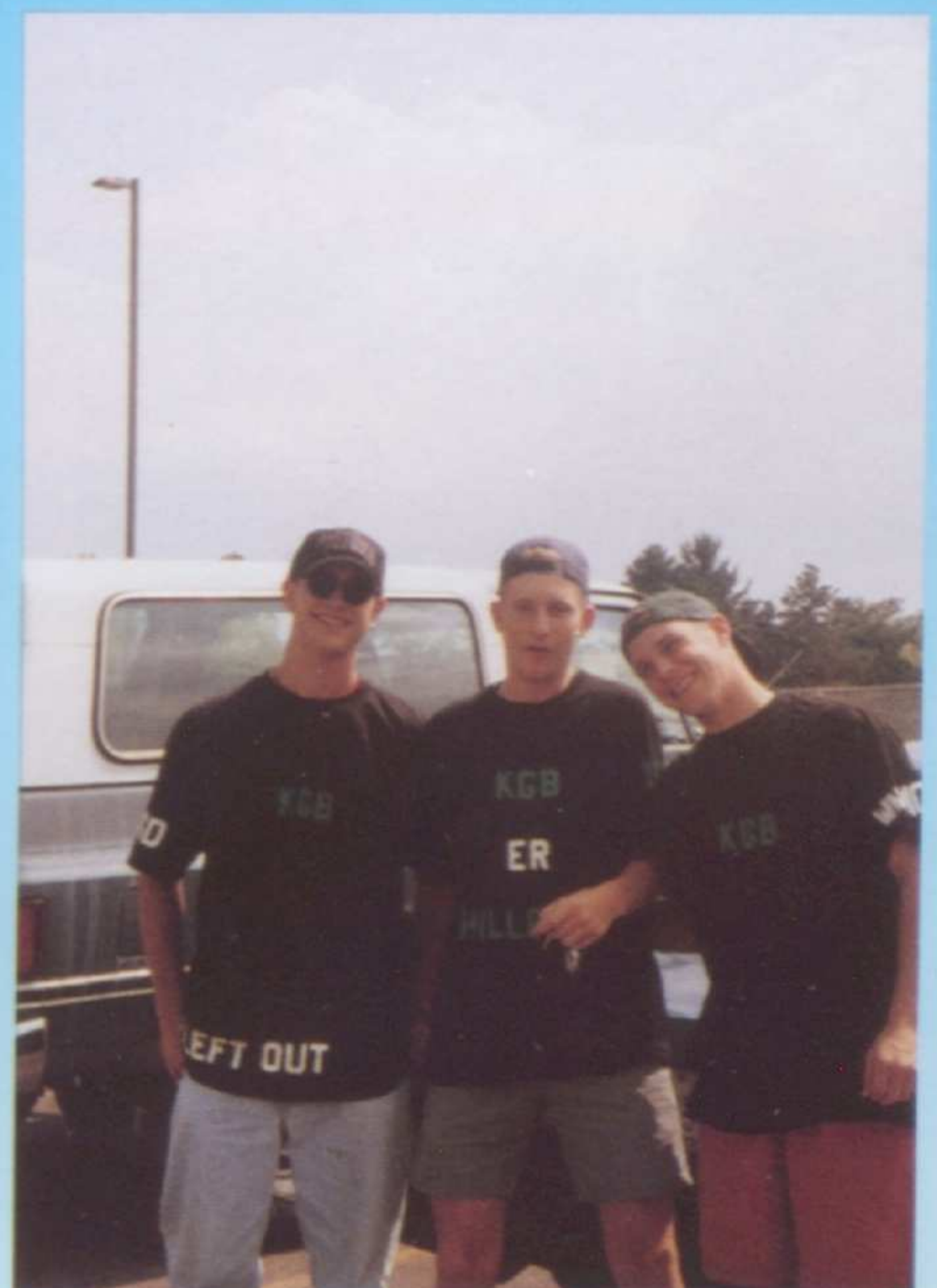

Many students at TWHS have used this past summer to convert their bodies into works of art by getting tattoos. Students have found interesting ways to express themselves through this new art form. These tattoos can be seen anywhere on the body from arms to toes to ankles to hips. In order to learn more about this art form, we surveyed several TWHS students about several aspects of their experiences.

Tattoos may range in cost from \$35 to as much as \$150. The tattoo cost includes a tip for the tattoo artist. The cost depends on the size of the design and the number of colors in it. Almost any design can be requested. Usually it's up to the person getting the tattoo to draw his or her own design. However, tattoo parlors may have a book of tattoos that the buyer can choose from. 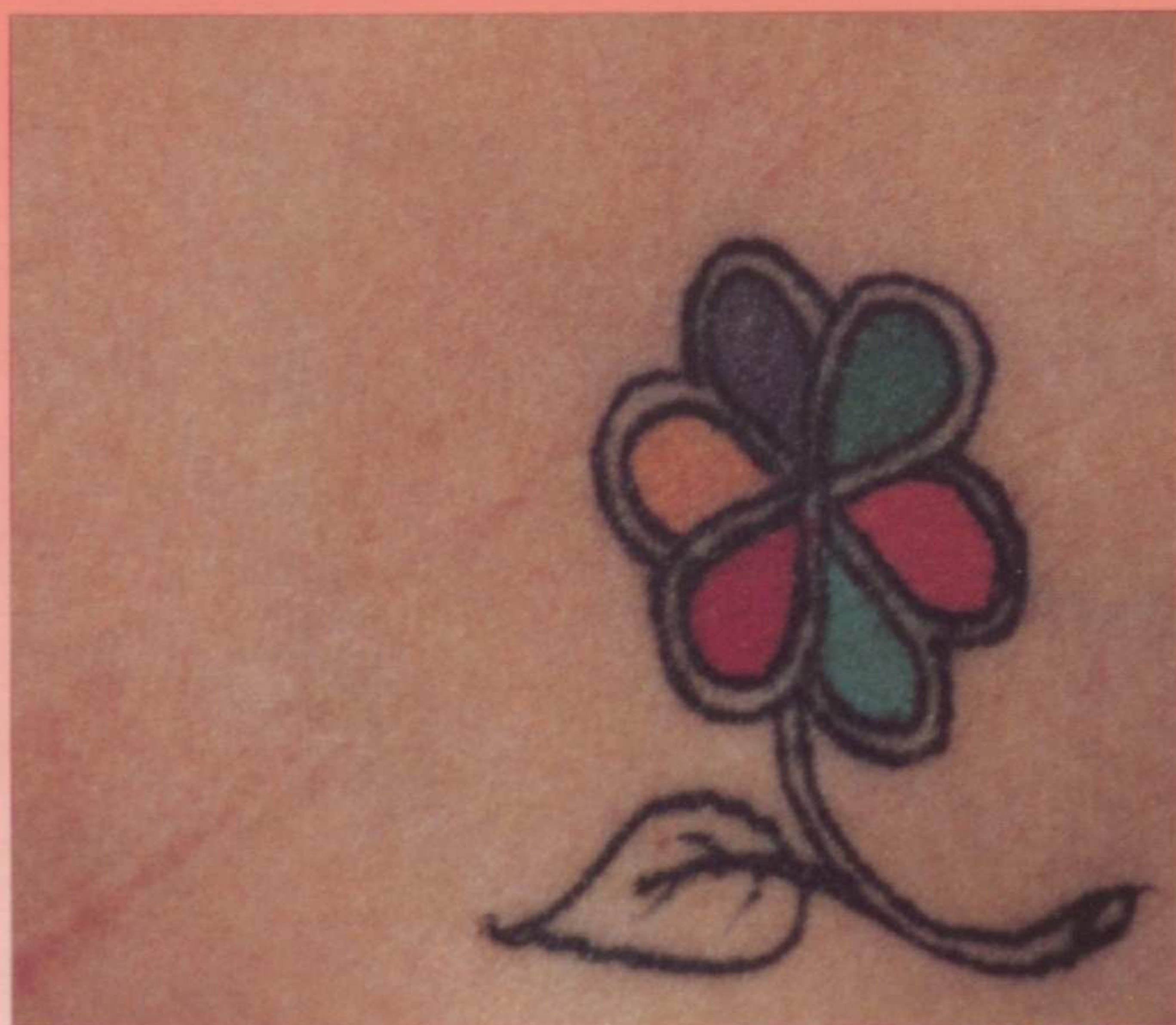

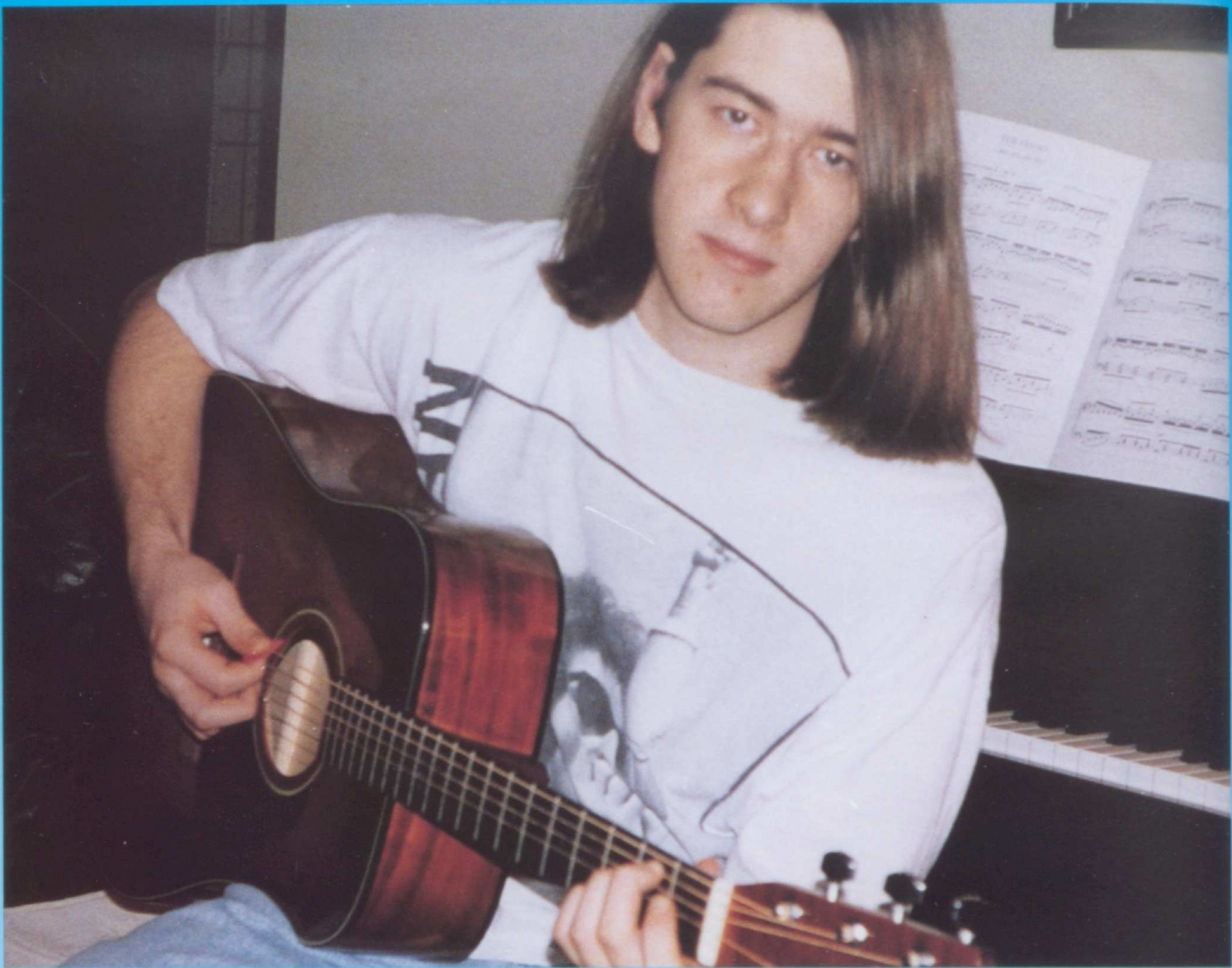

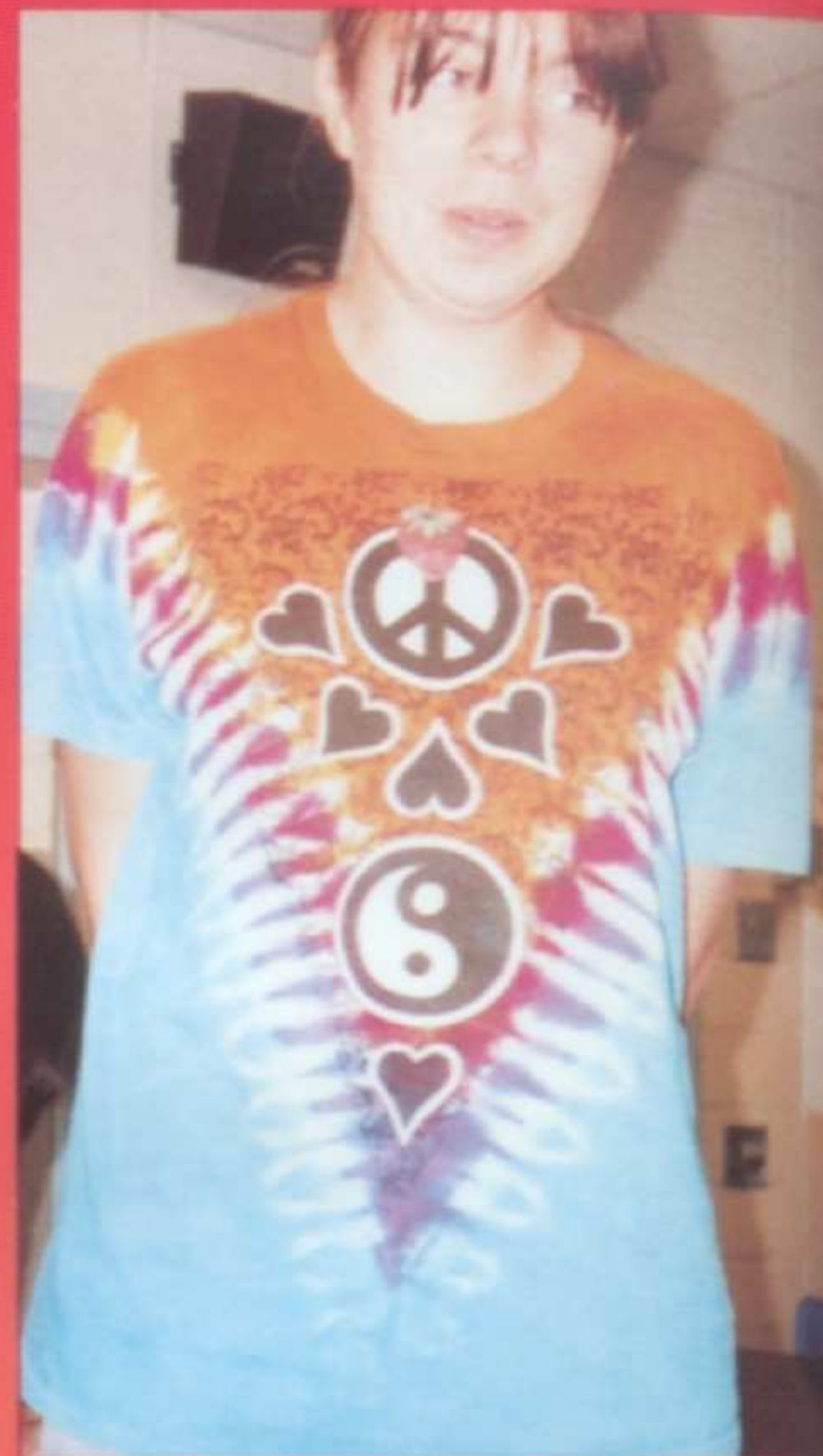

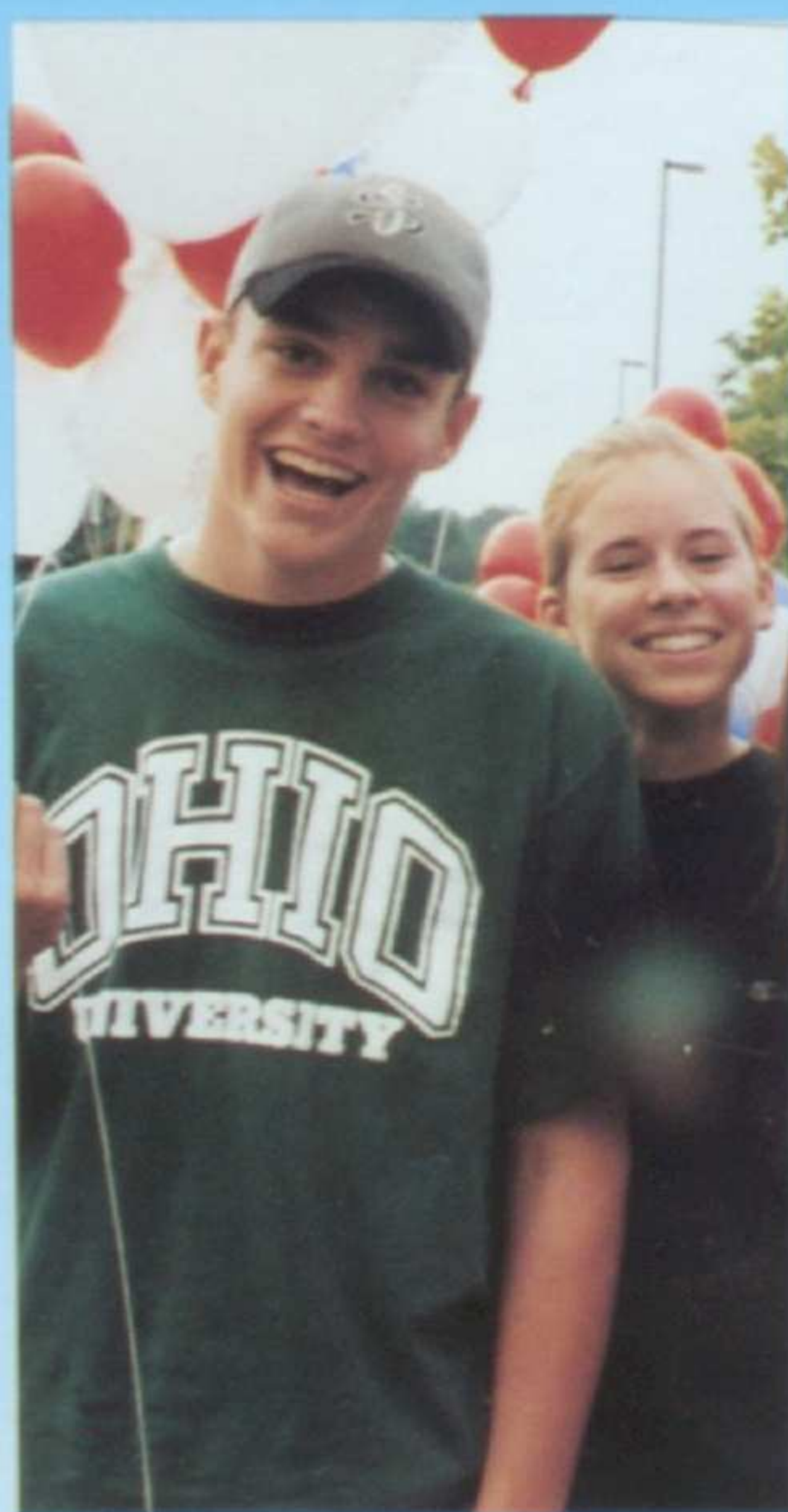

Active Students

On November 8, 1994 voters in the Worthington school district went to the polls to decide upon, among other things, Issue 43. Issue 43, otherwise known as the levy, was a 6.4 million dollar sum of money to fund Worthington Schools. In order for the money to be raised, a majority of voters would have to be willing to impose an increased property tax on themselves. Failure to pass the levy would result in reductions affecting staff, academic and athletic programs, and technology. Many students at Thomas Worthington knew the deep division that the levy issues had caused in the past and feared cutbacks in teachers and programs at Thomas Worthington. Because of this, the students and staff became involved with each other in a process to encourage members to pass Issue 43.

Supporters of the levy feared that the defeat of Issue 43 would bring about the downfall of the high standards

of achievement and excellence that have been synonymous with the Worthington School District. The diverse and varied curriculum would see foreign languages and advanced placement courses reduced or eliminated altogether. Staff such as academic assistants, lower-

determined action. Many staff and senior students of voting age supported the levy by registering to vote and casting their ballot in favor of the levy. Others, like senior Mason Tootell, organized groups such as Students For the Levy. When Mason was asked why he was compelled to do this, he

education is important. Success of the Worthington Schools is definitely a top priority among students at TWHS." When Mr. William K. Northrup, principal of Thomas Worthington High School, was asked how he felt about student and staff involvement in the levy, he said, "The involvement of students and teachers is one of the key reasons why I believe the levy will pass this time. It is a concerted effort and it will make the difference. I am pleased with the student participation."

Thanks in part to the effort put forth by many people from Thomas Worthington, the levy was passed by a significant margin on November 8, 1994. Many students and staff can feel proud for the part they contributed. Because of them, cutbacks and reductions were not allowed to occur.

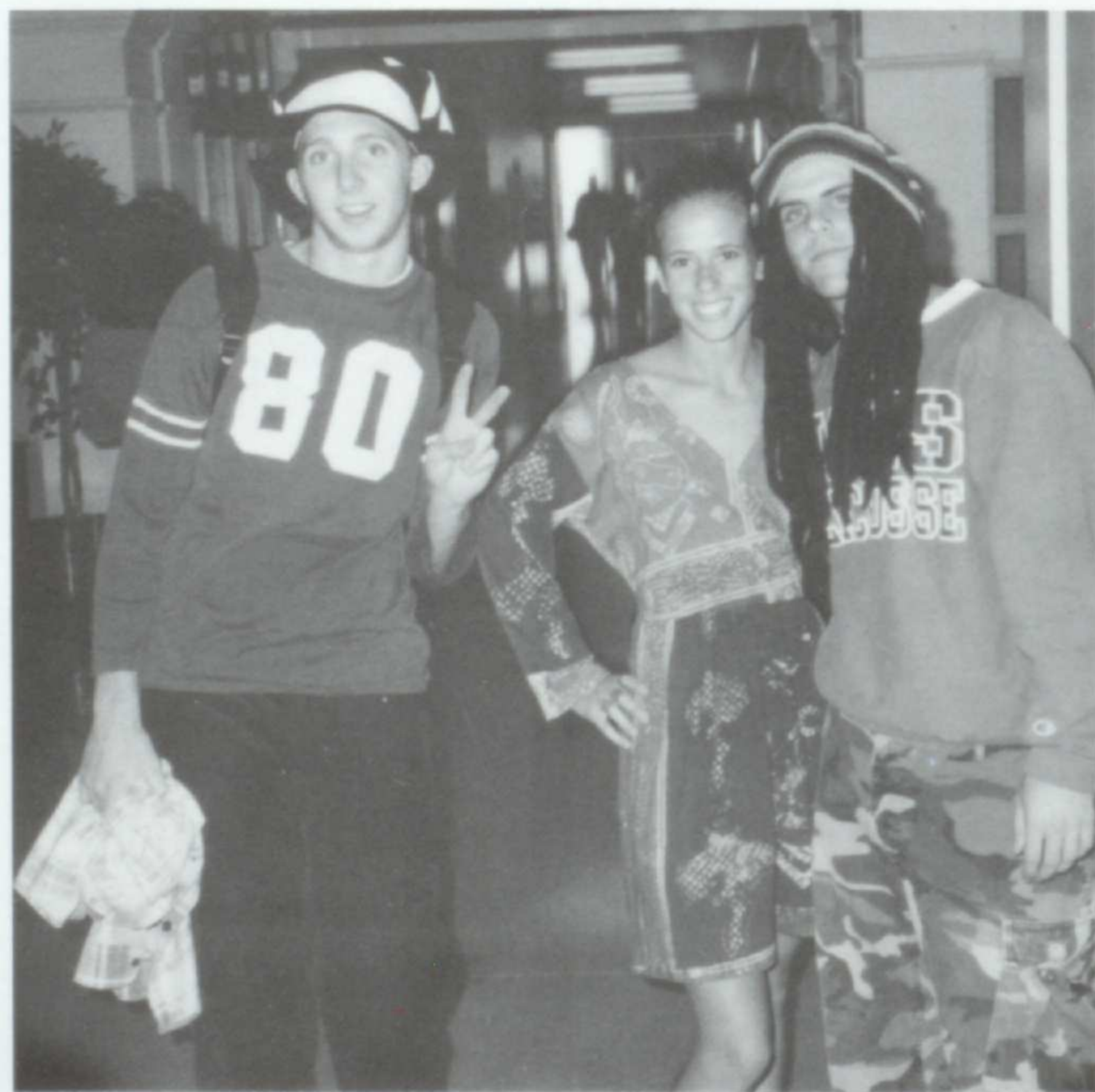

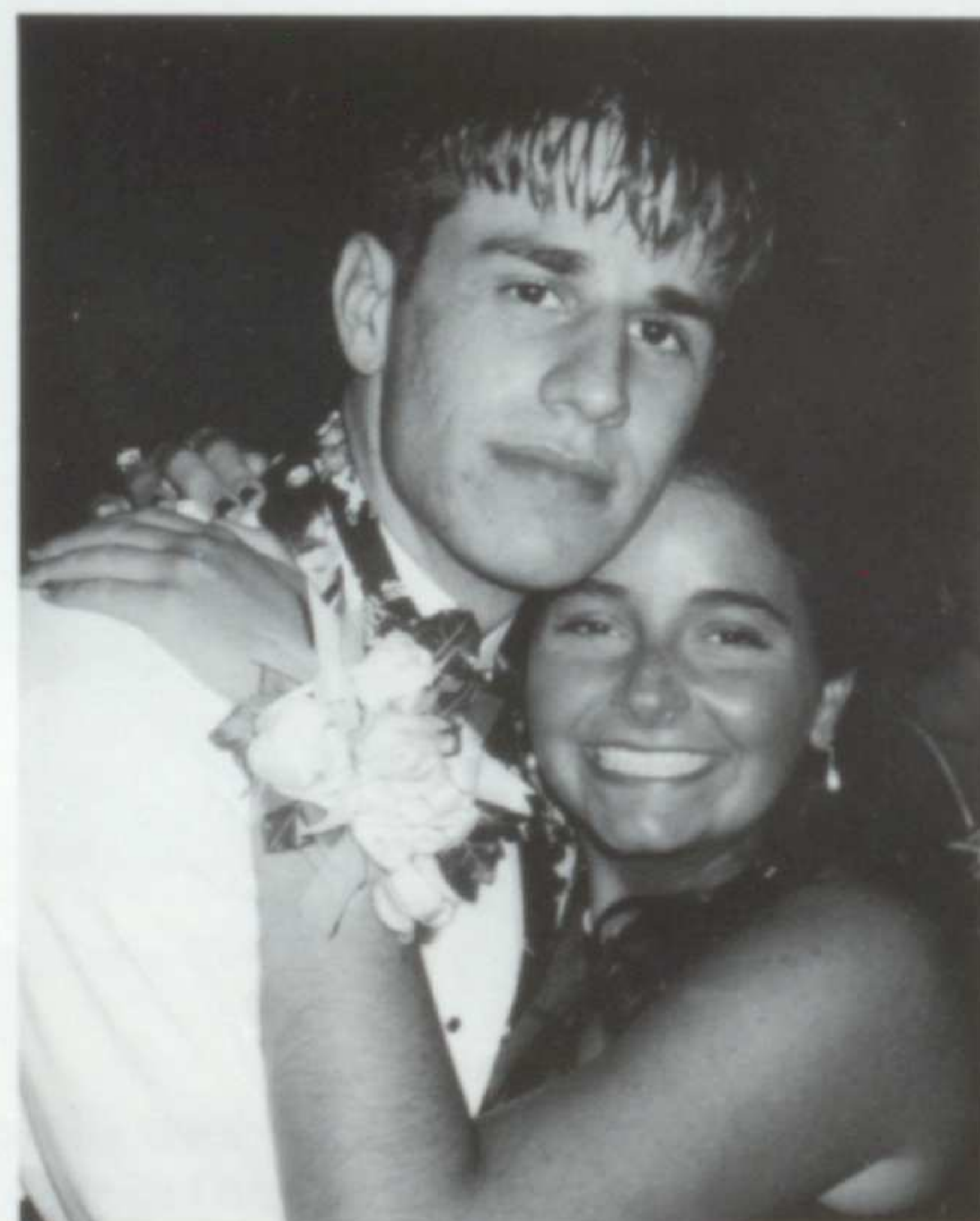

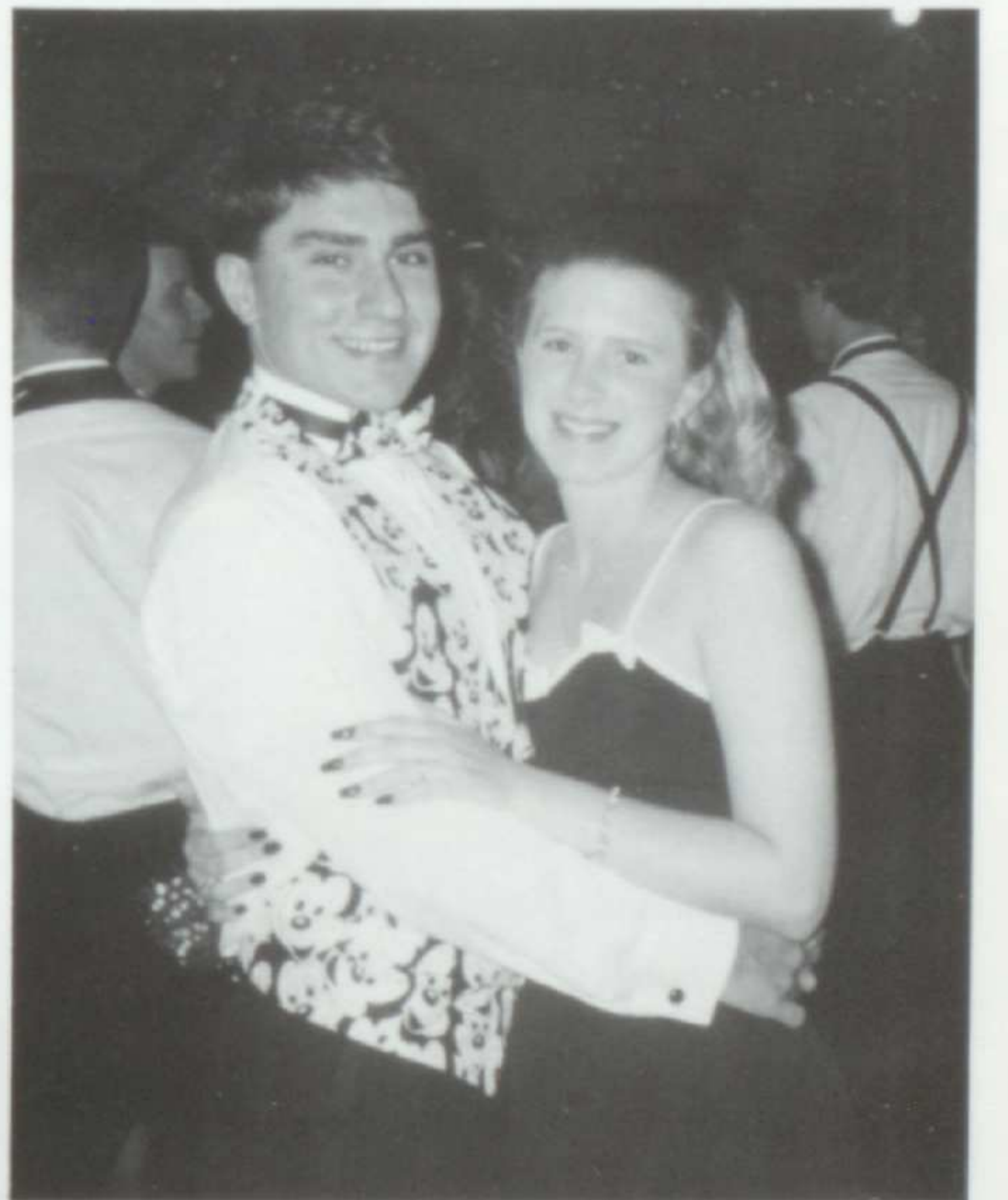

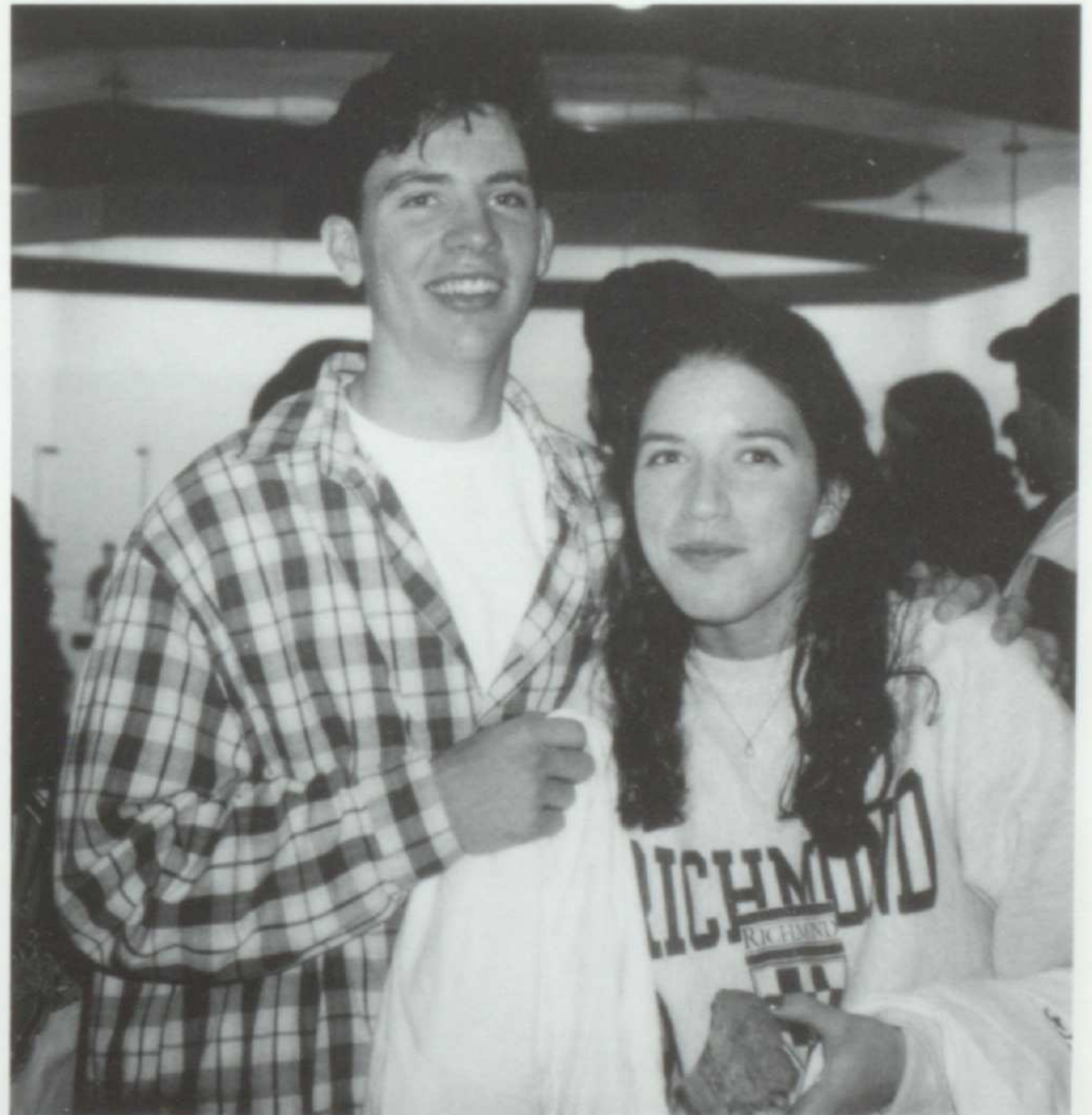

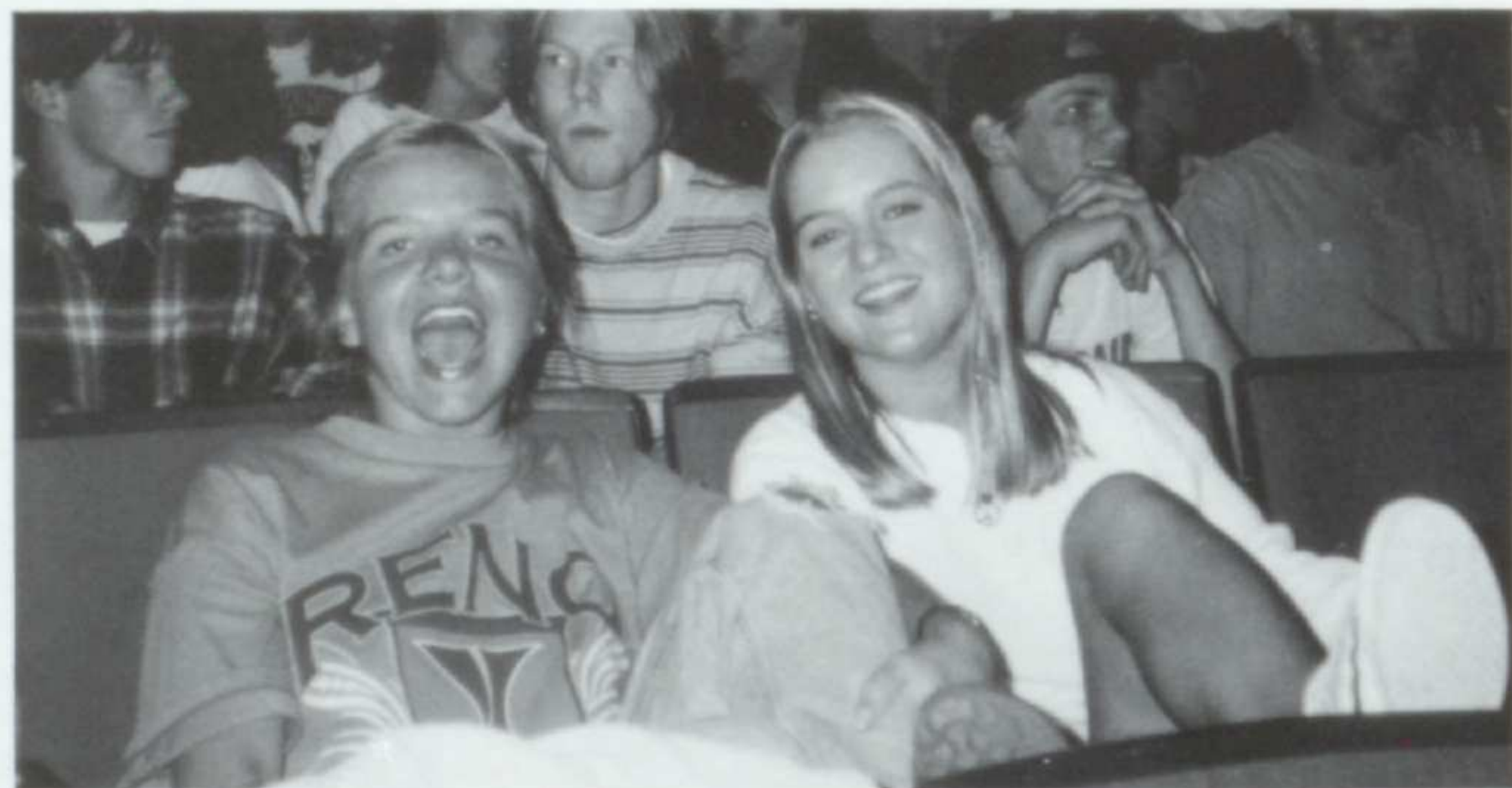

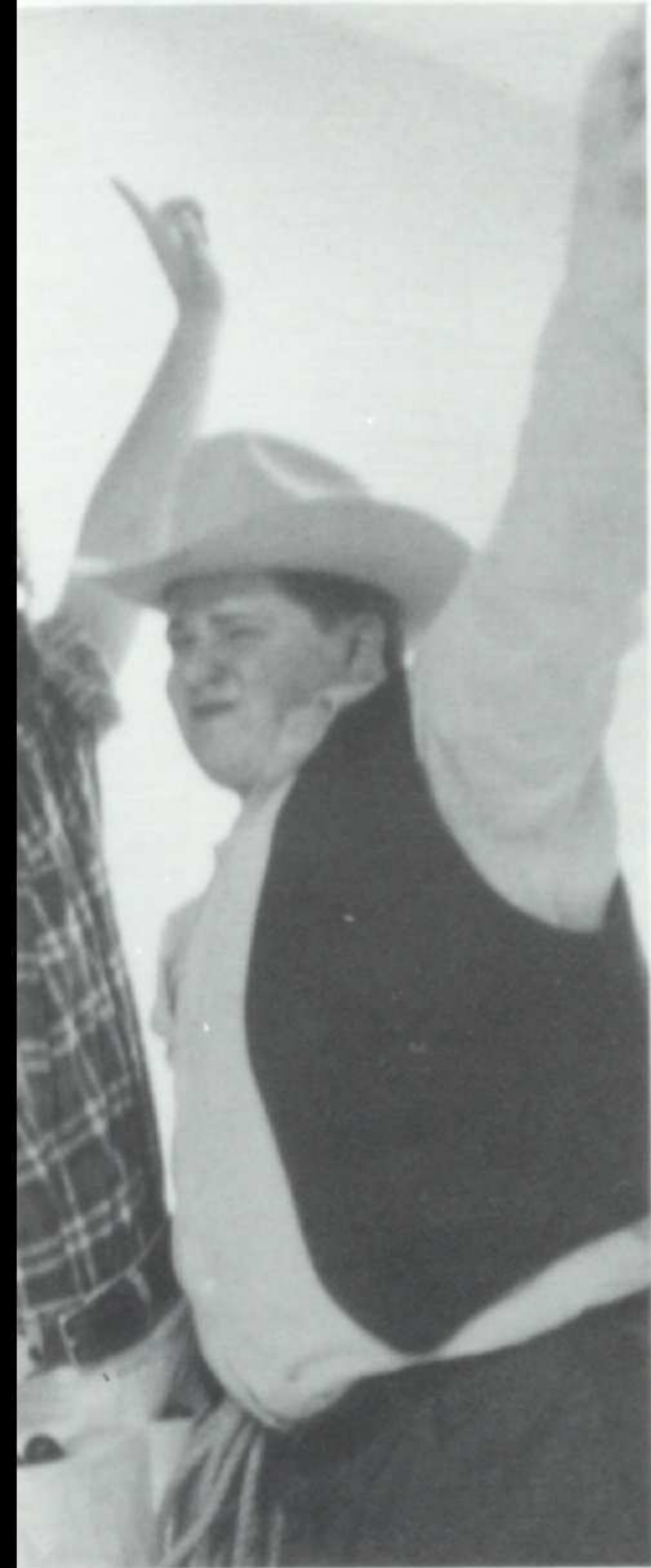

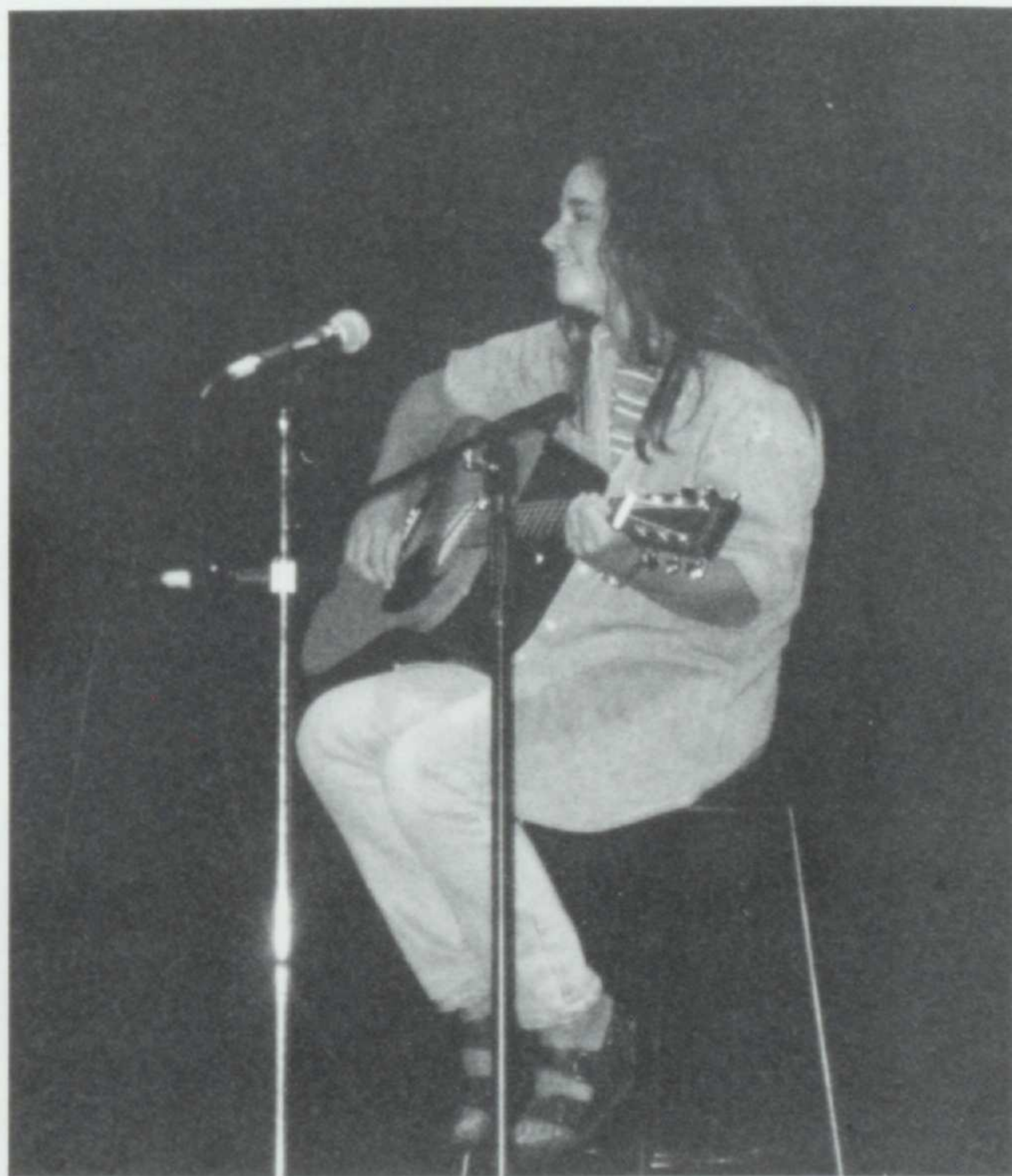

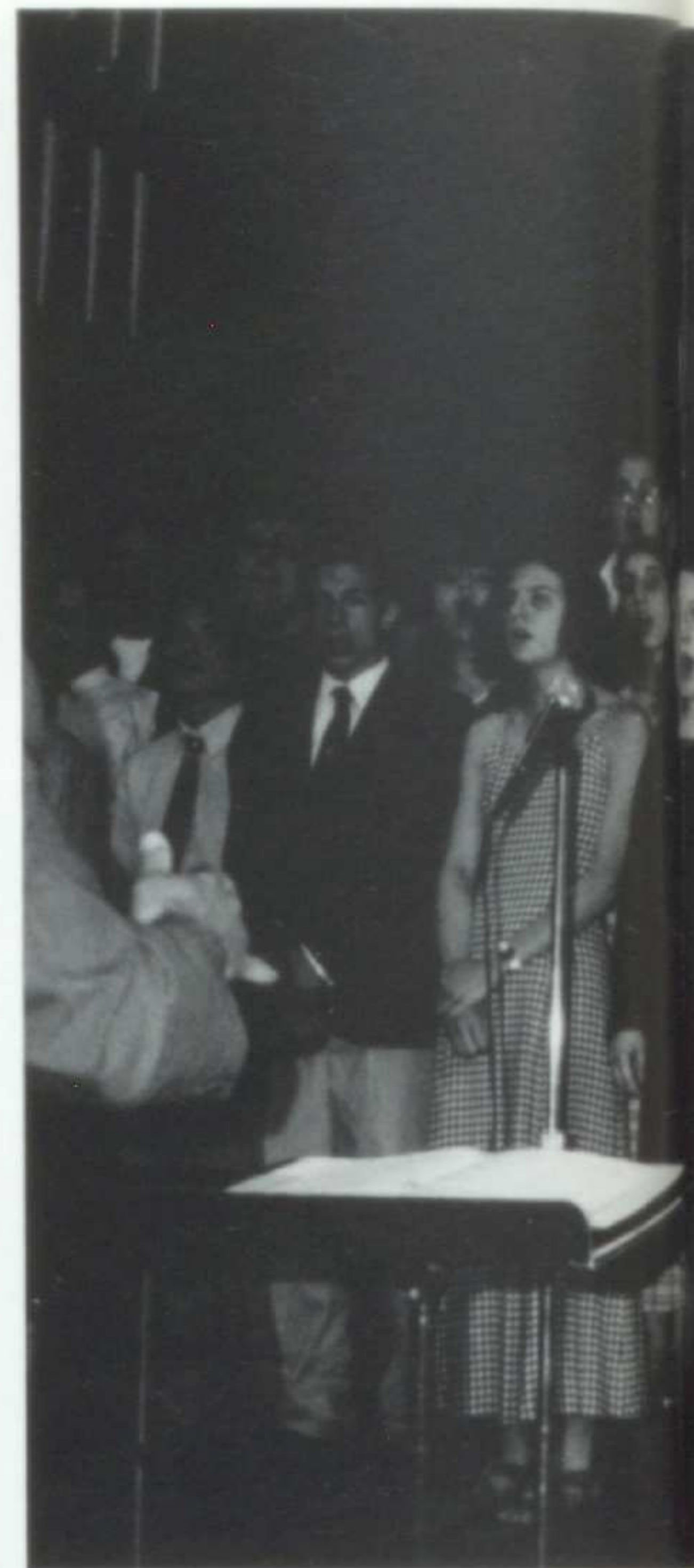

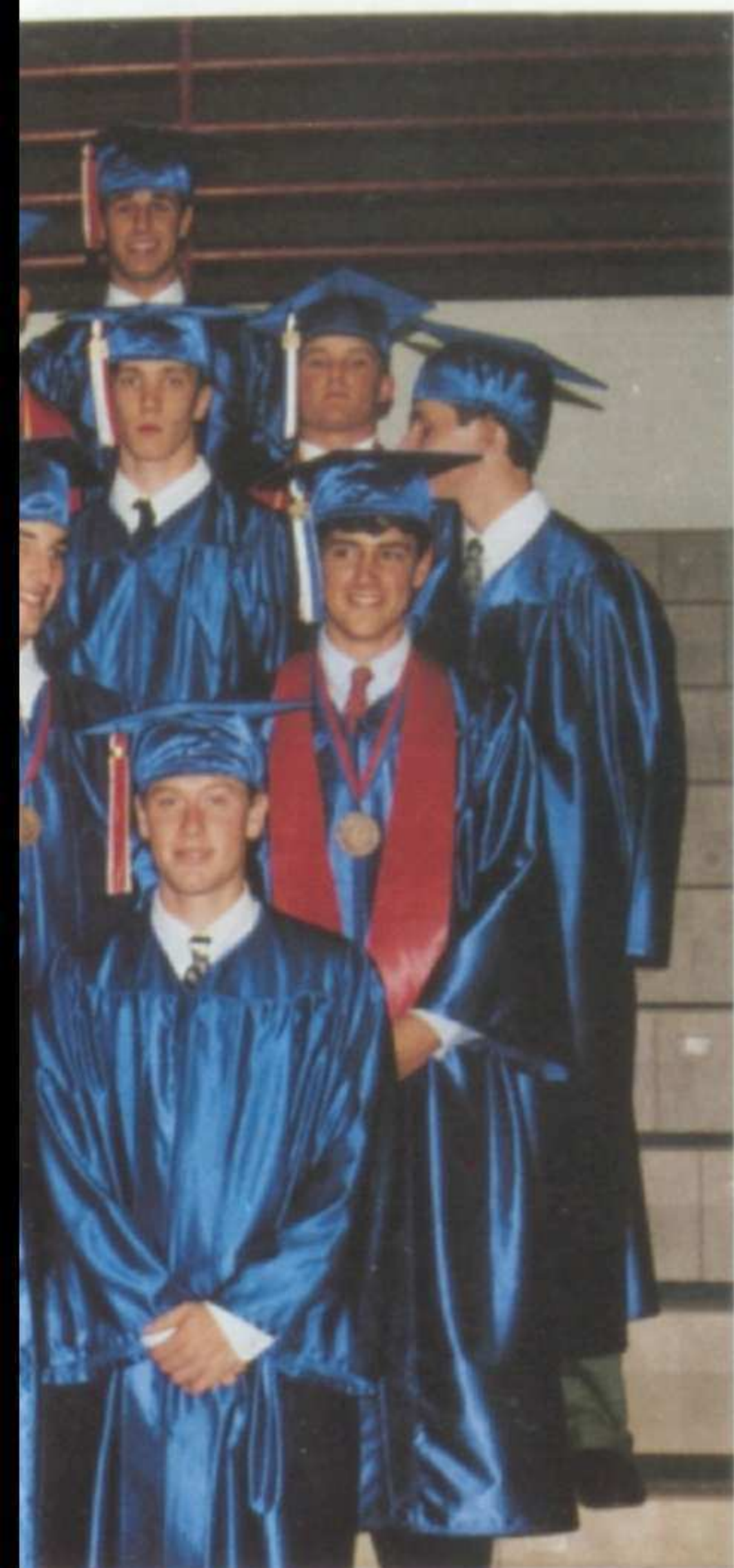

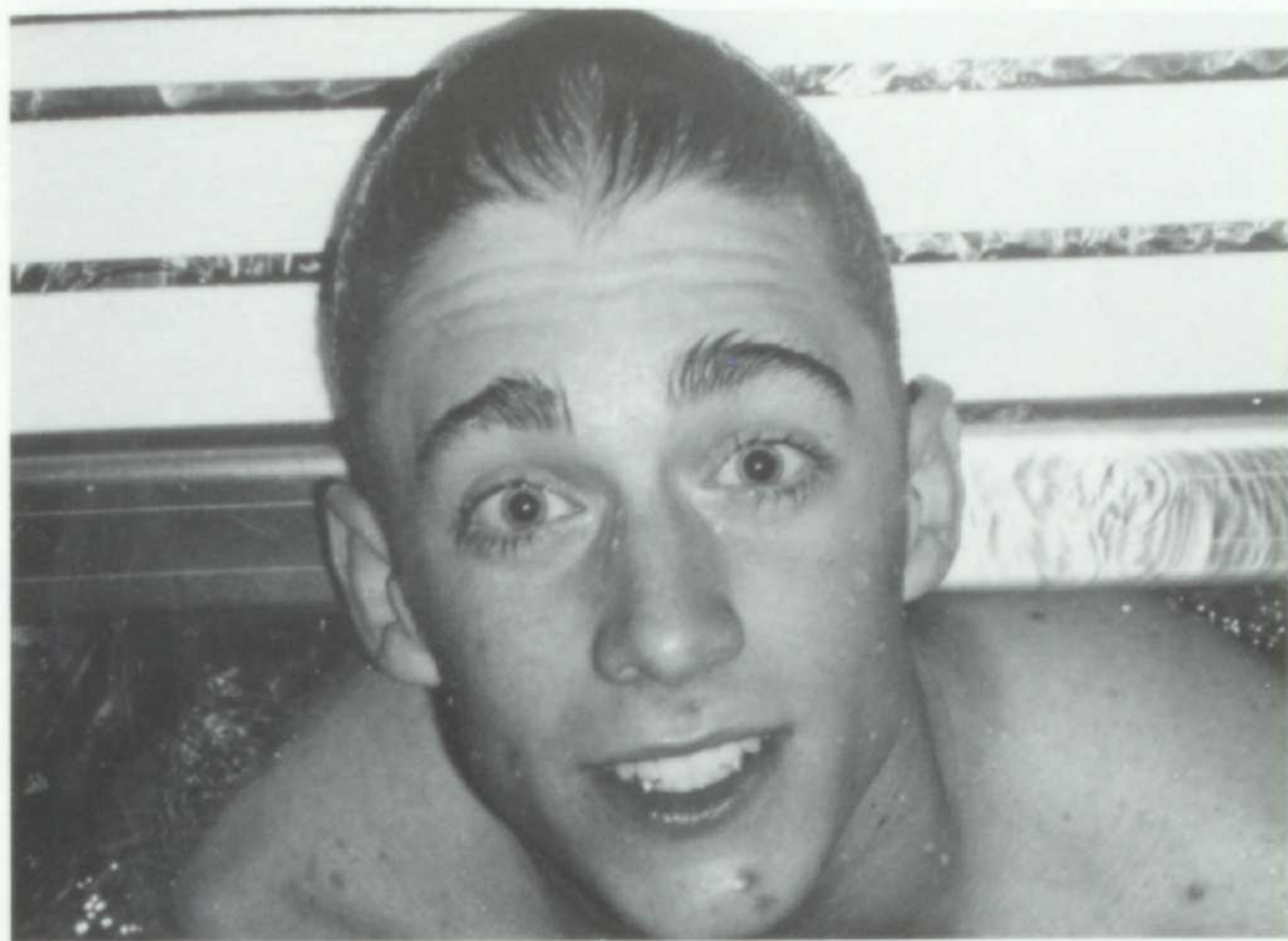

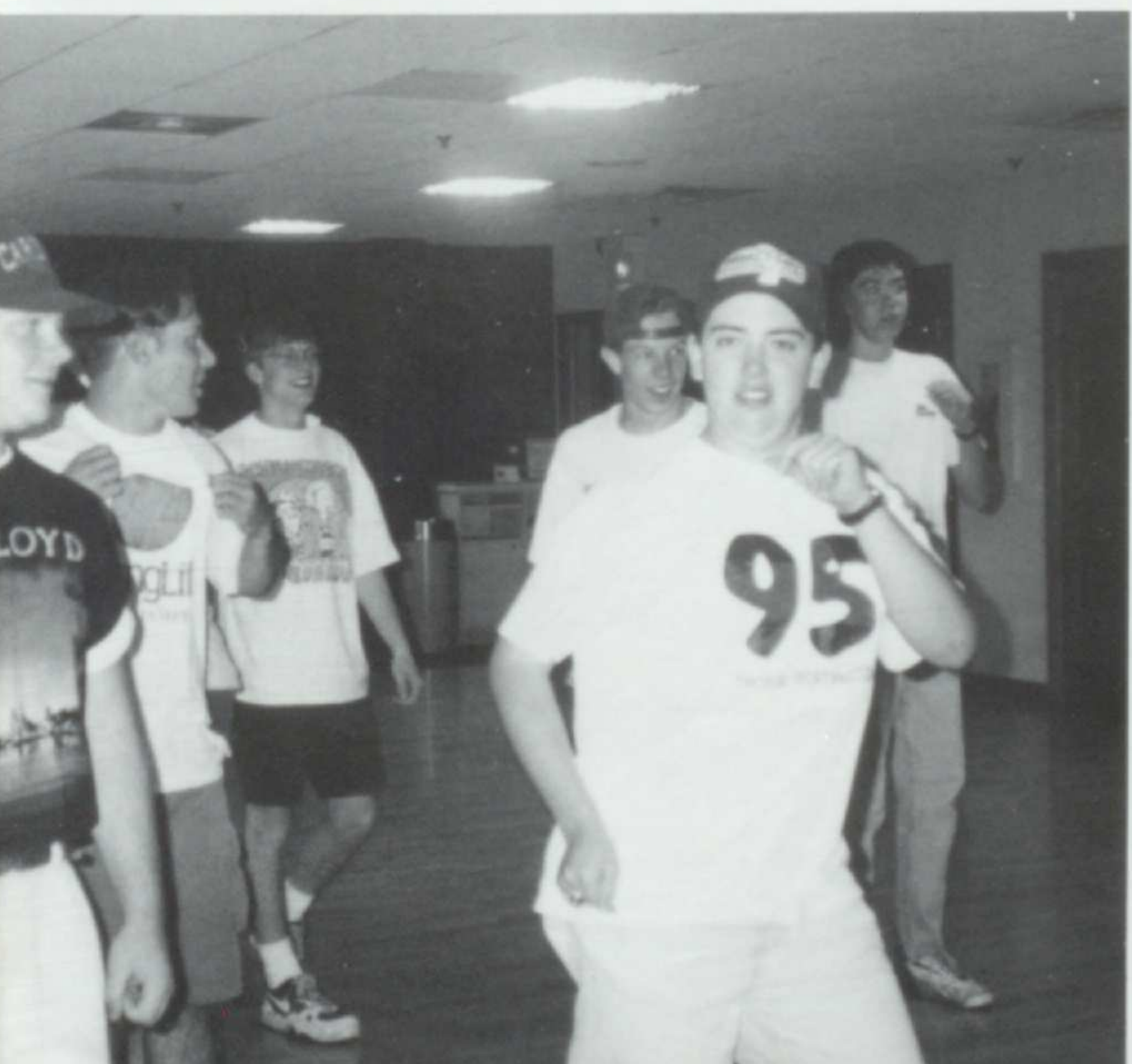
Polo and diving for pennies, recent graduates sloshed down the thirty foot slide.

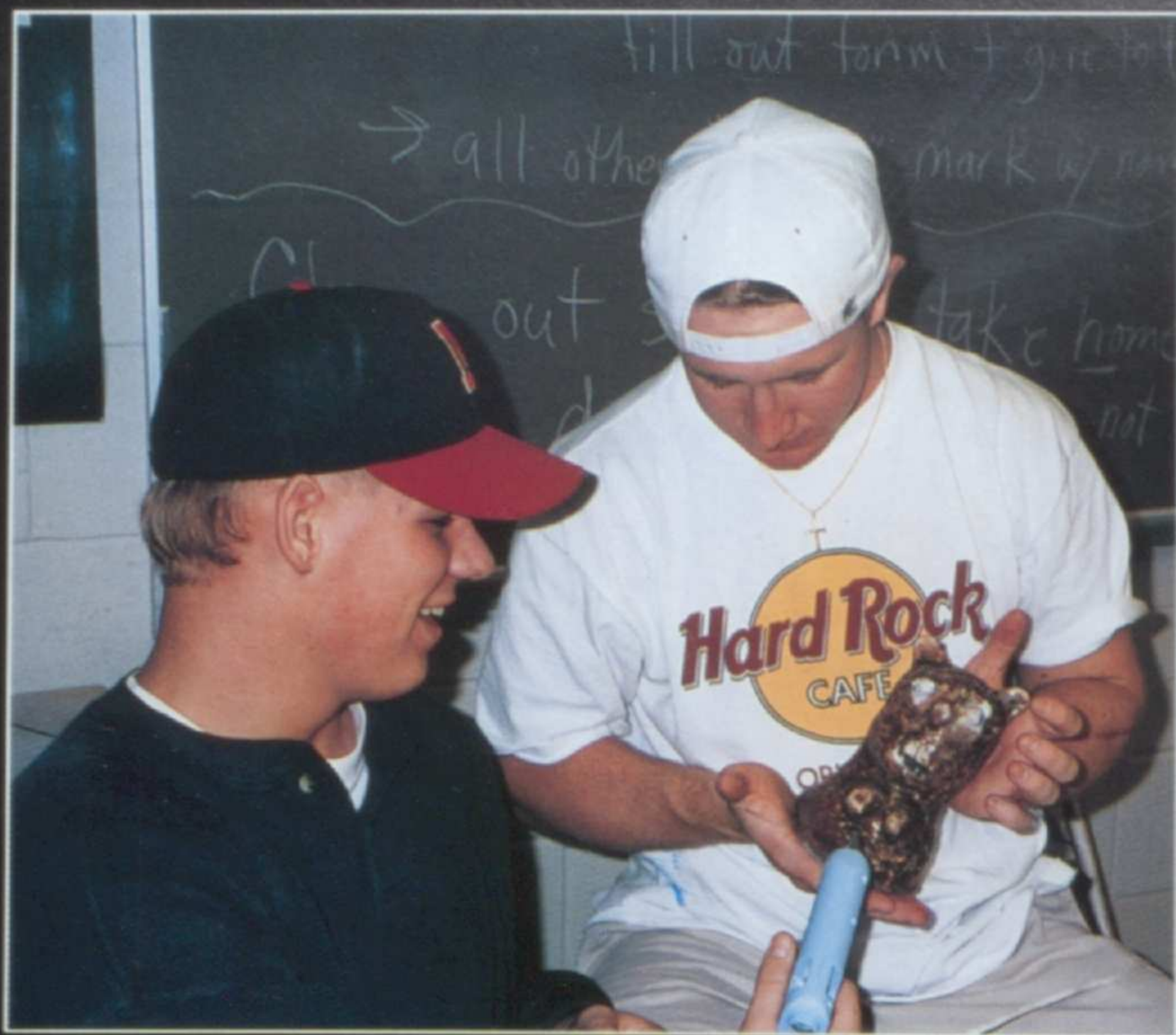

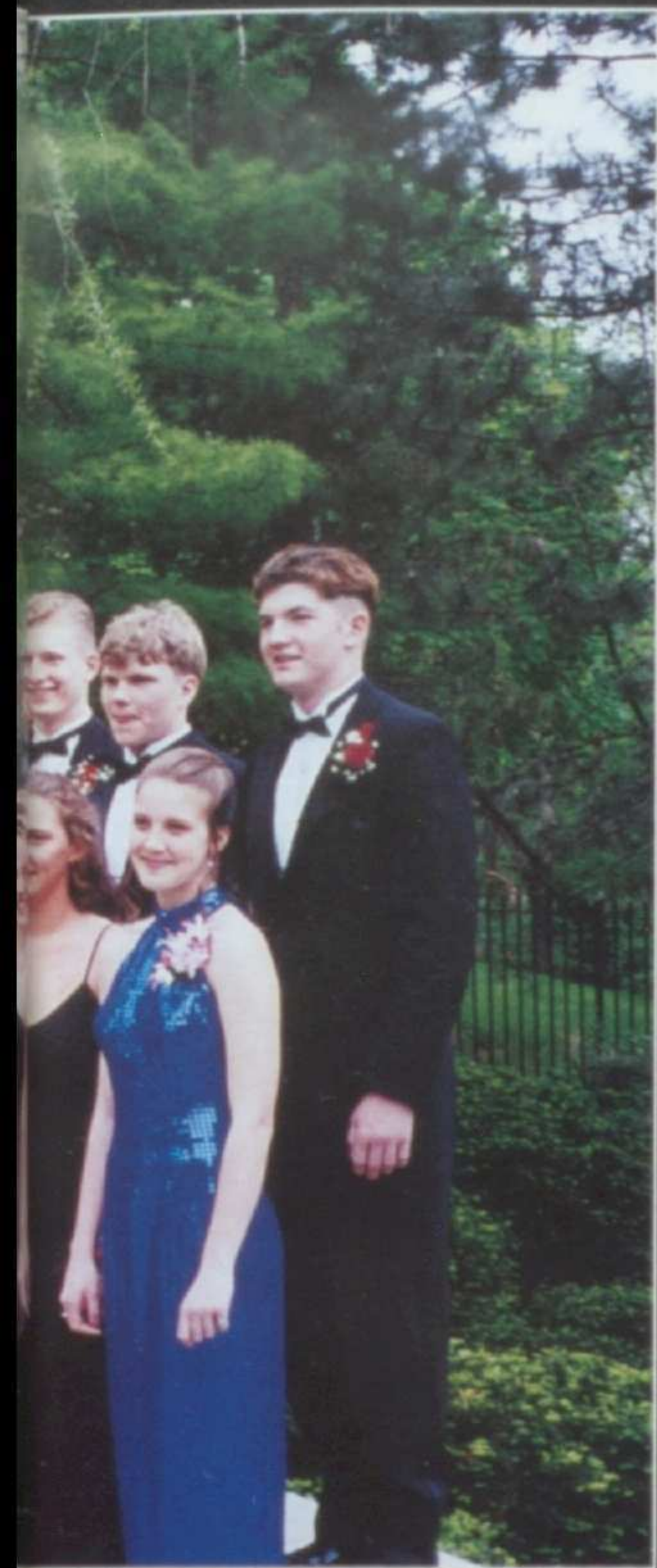

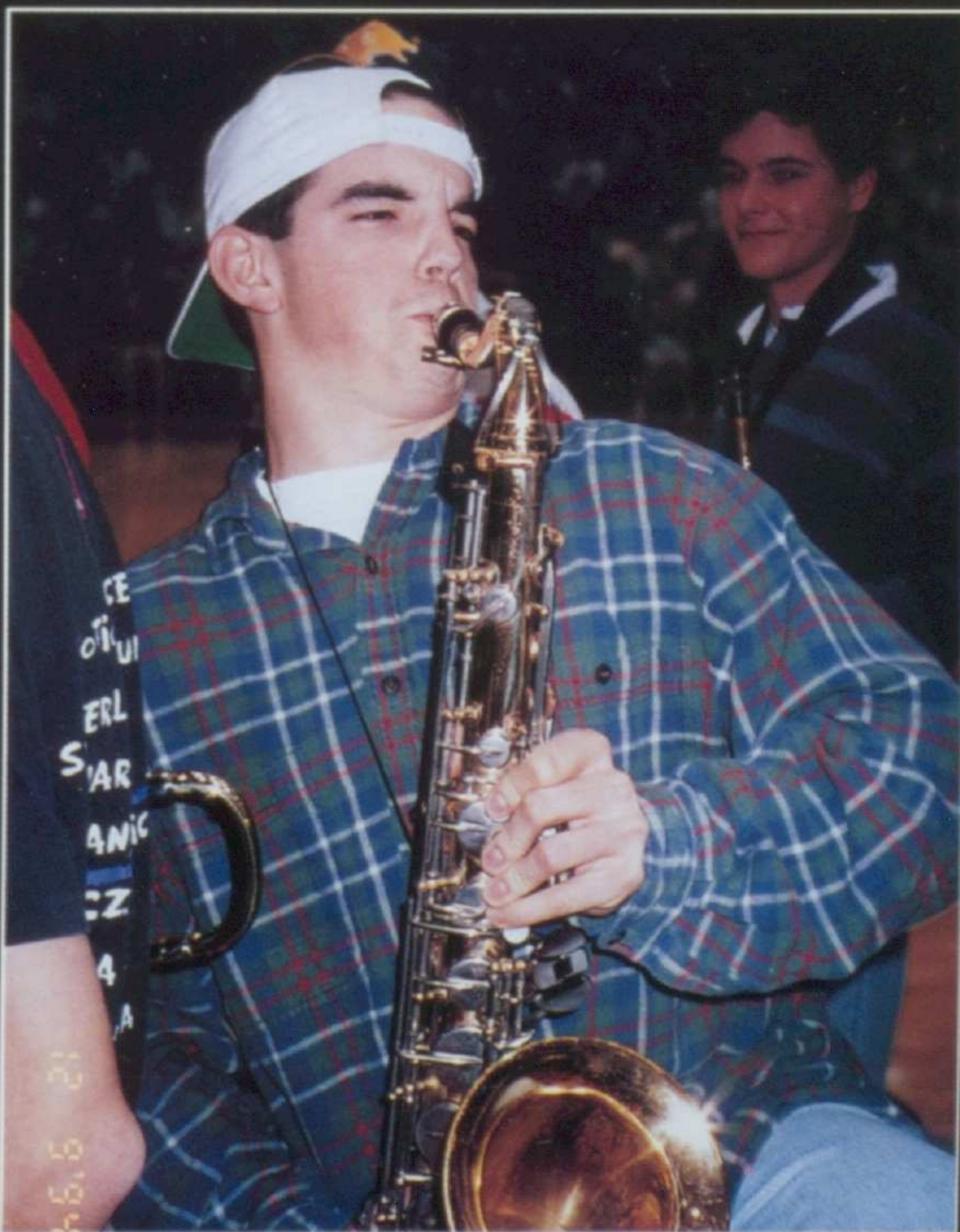

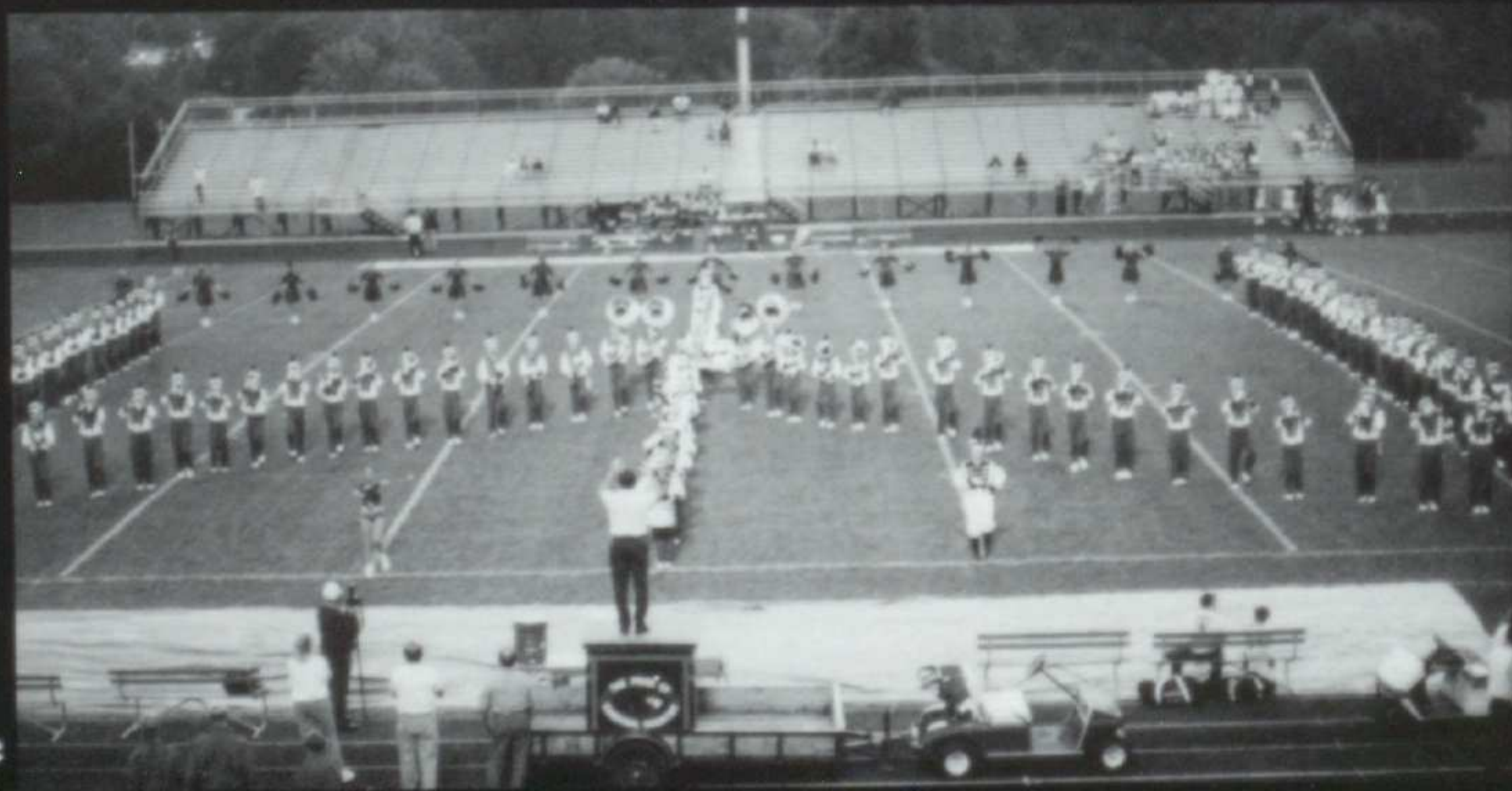

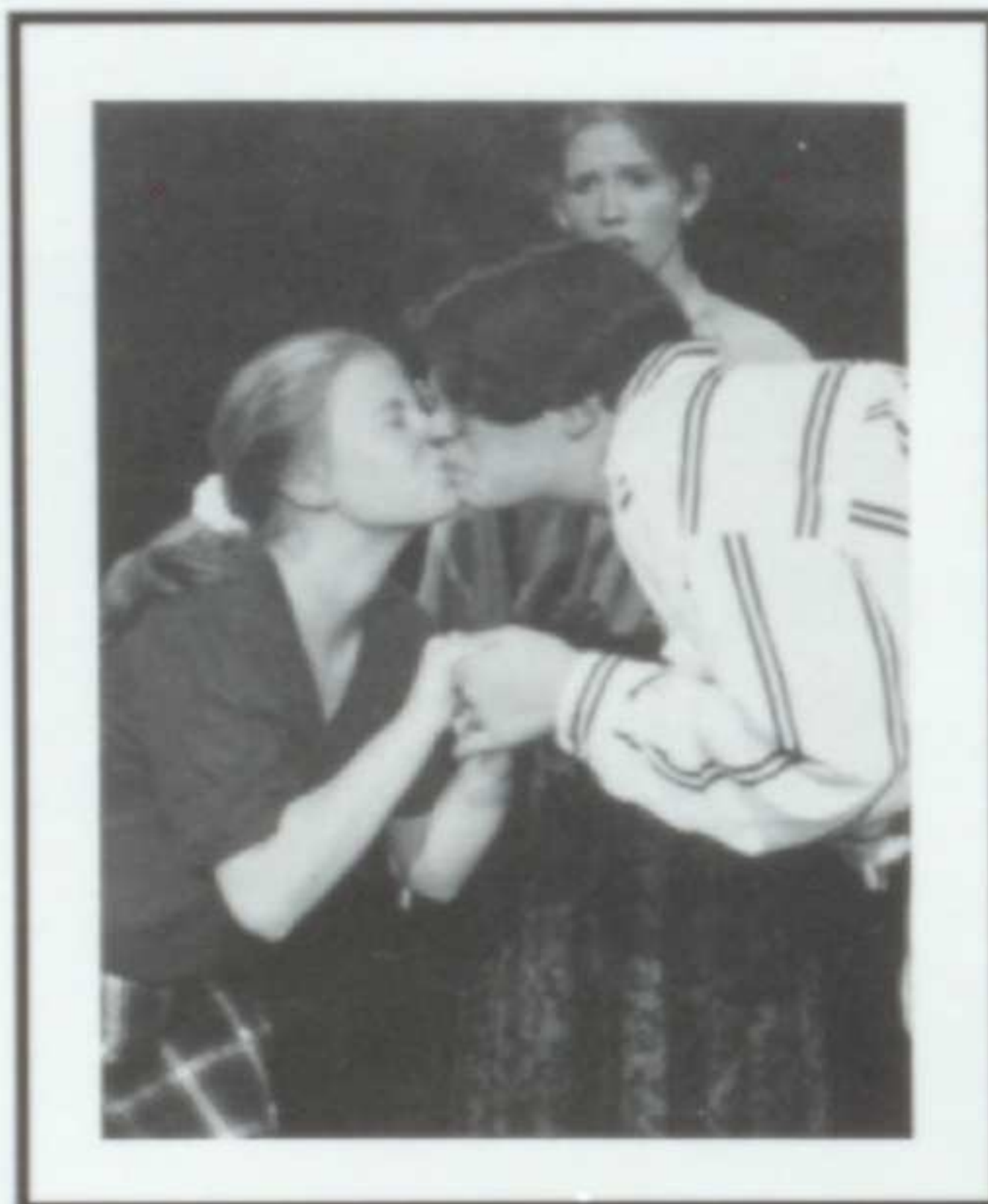
The Season Preview

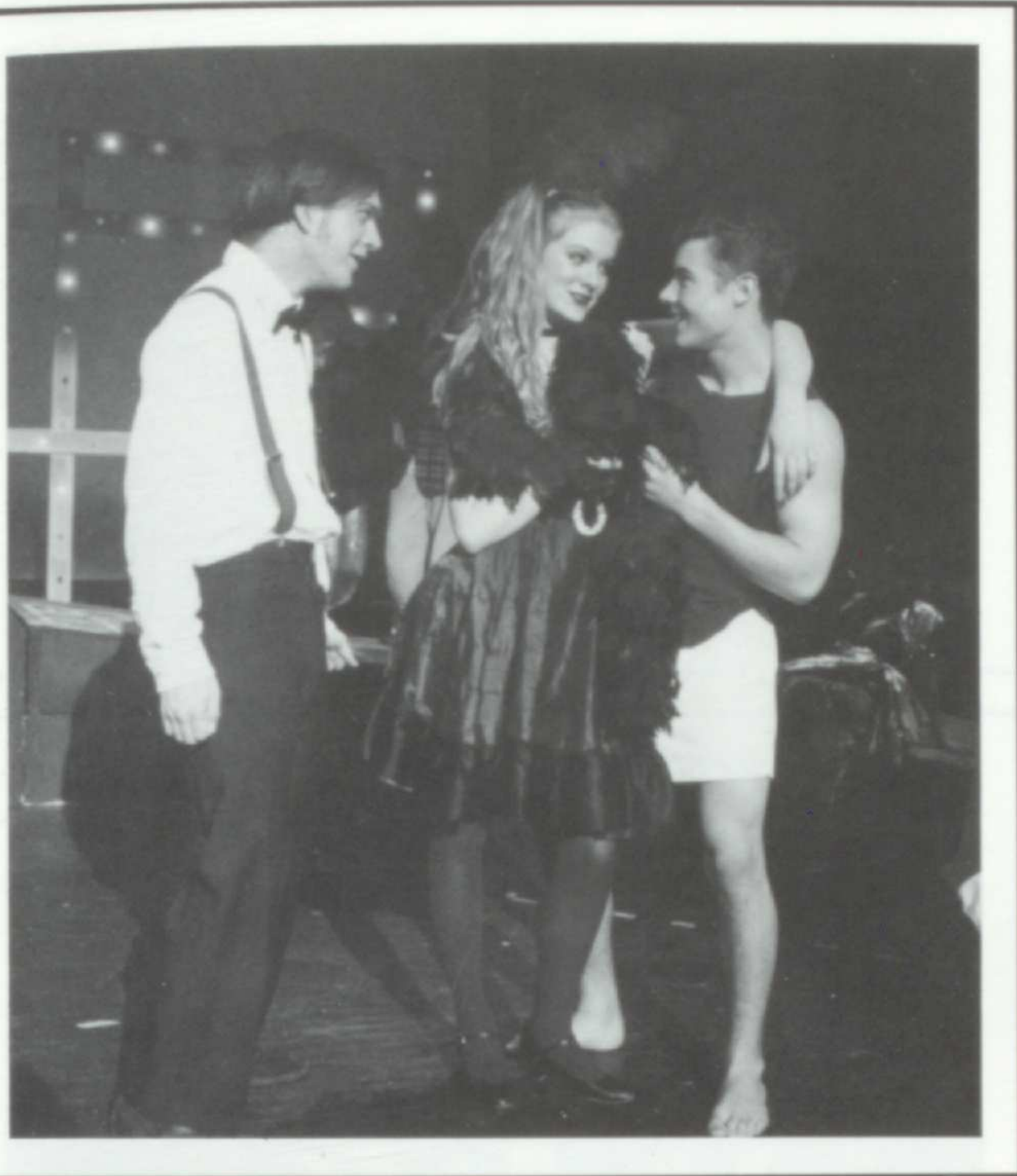

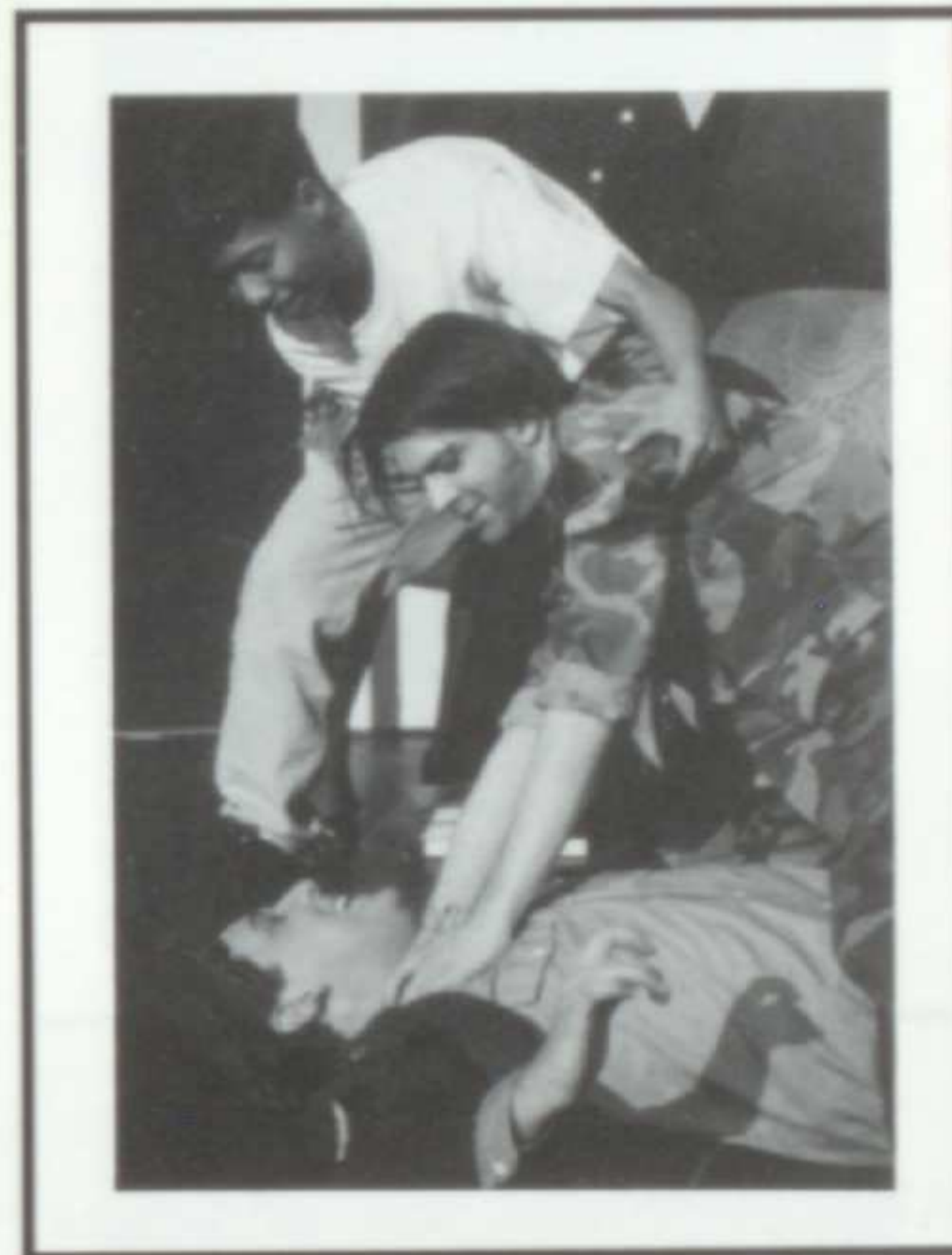


The Skin of our Teeth

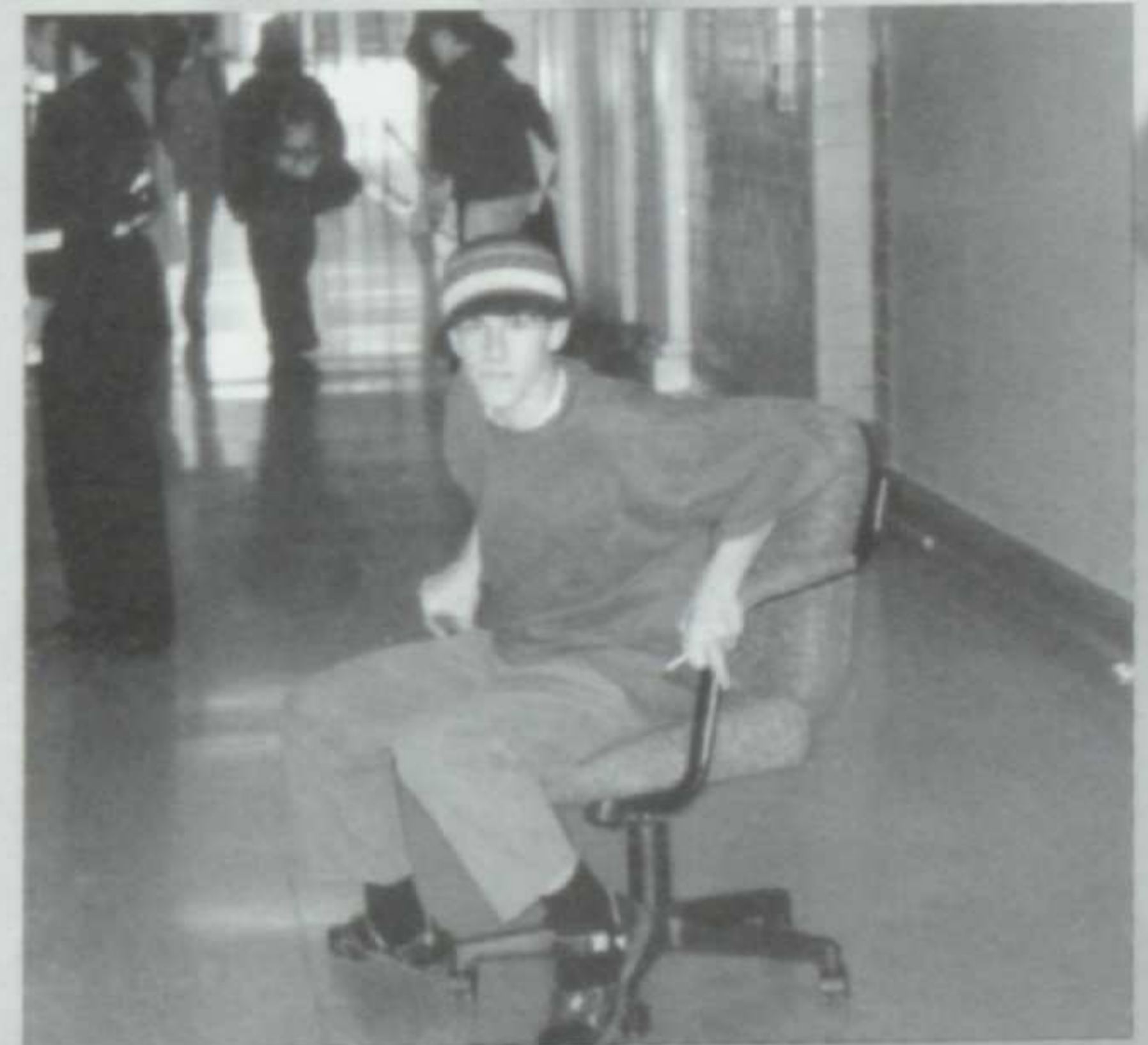

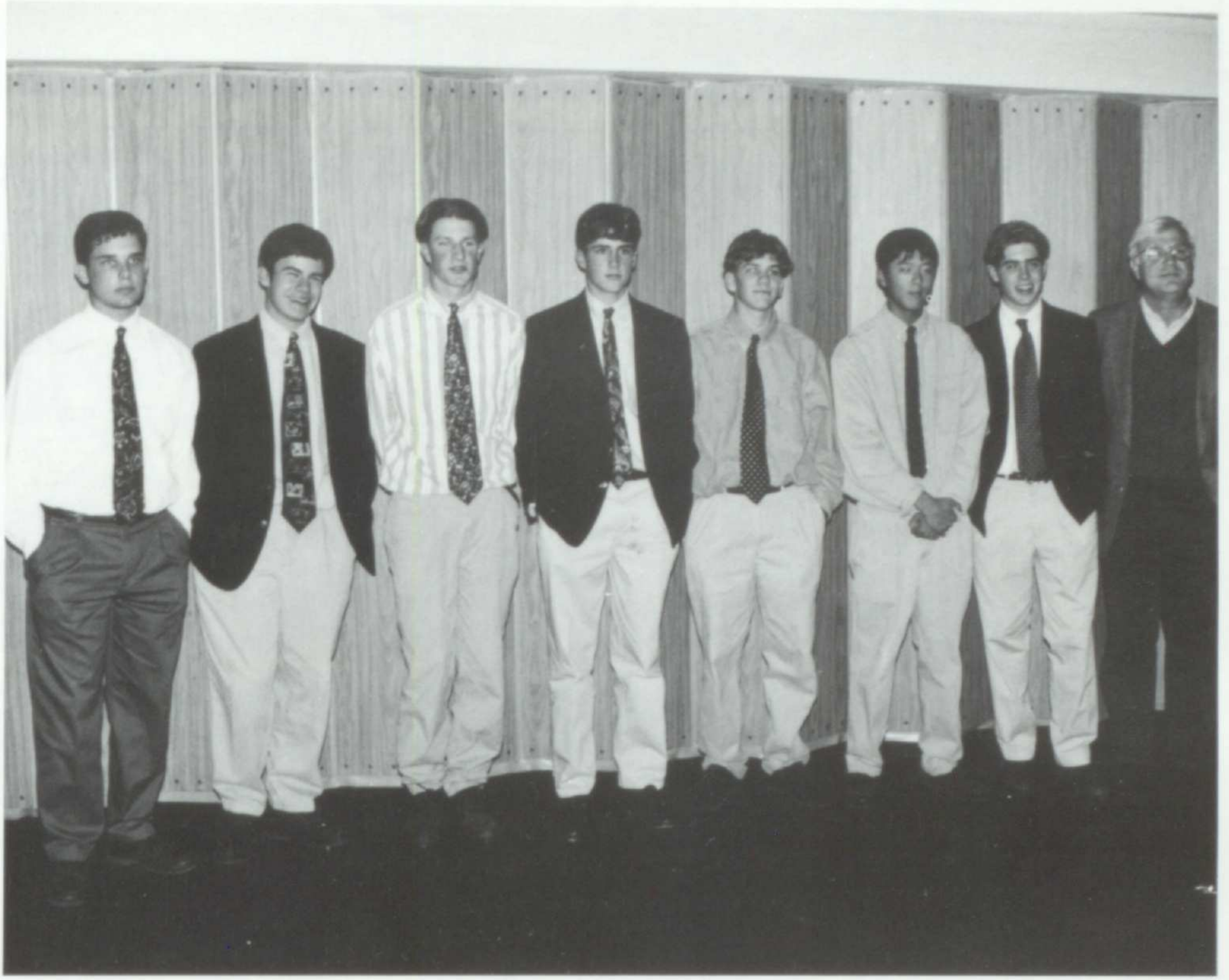

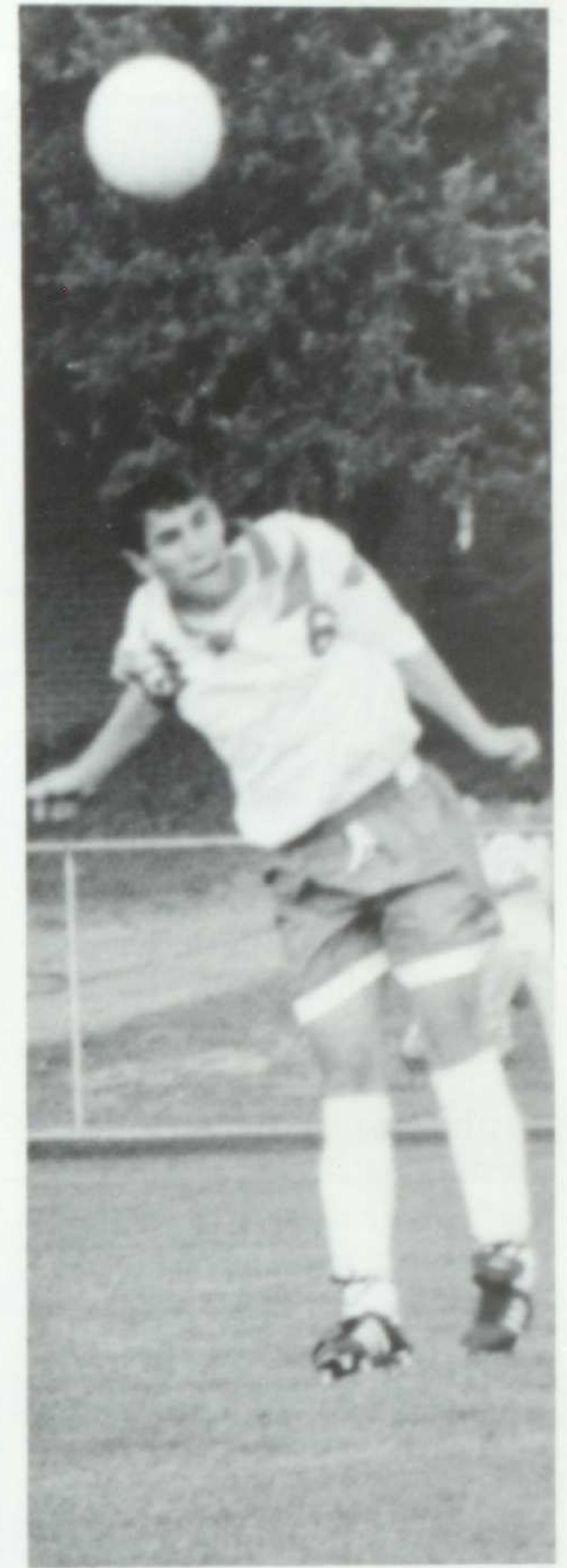

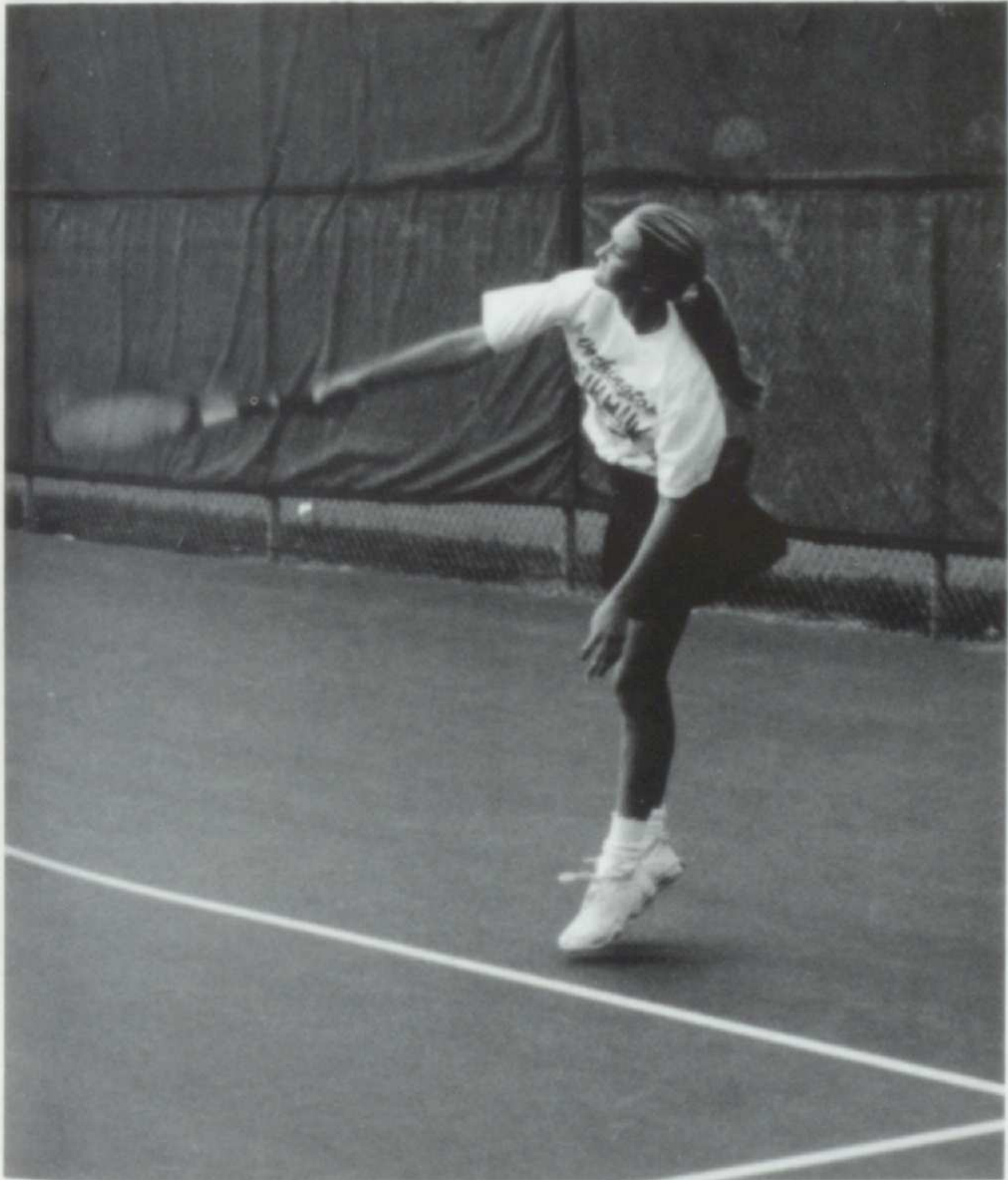

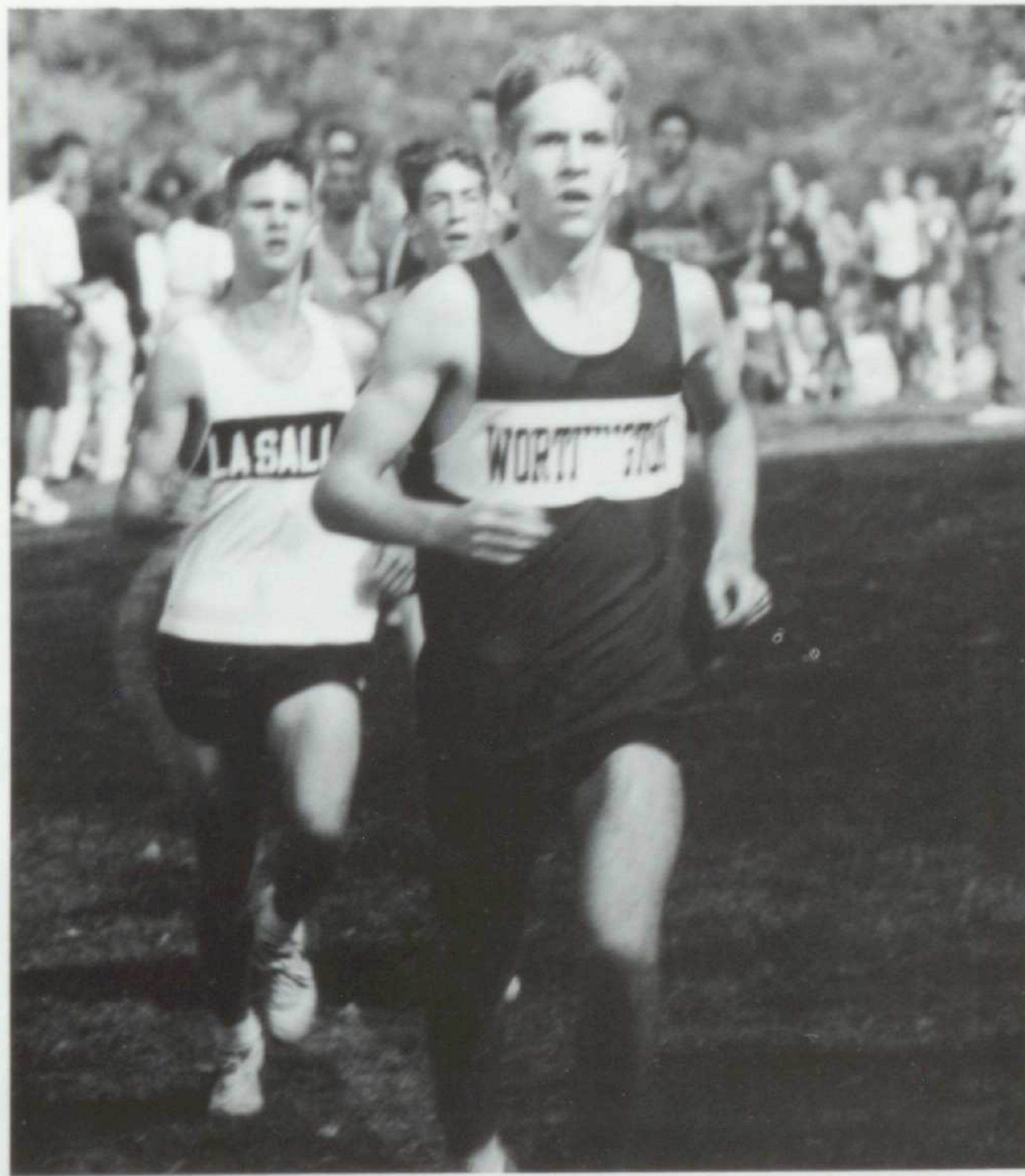

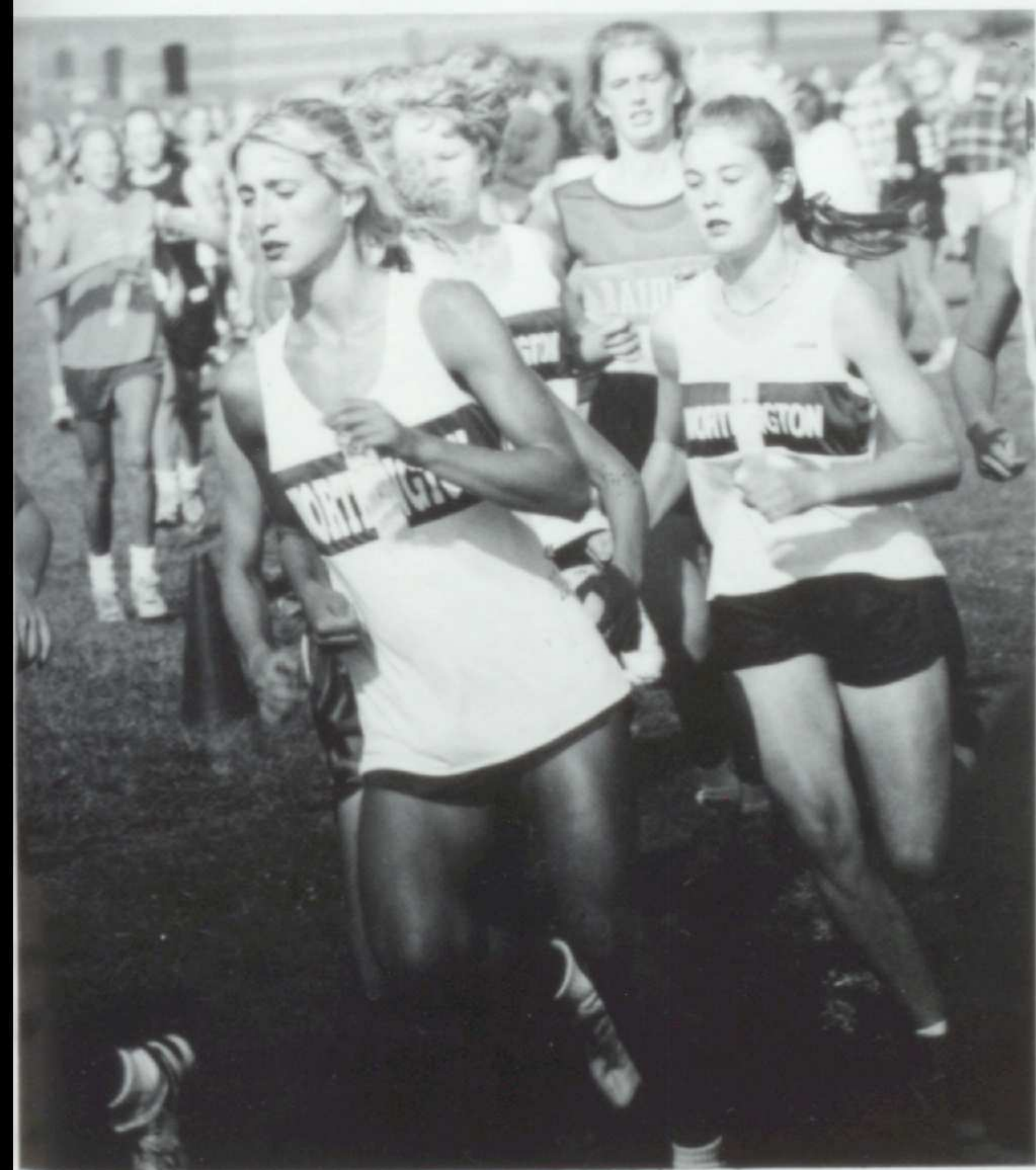

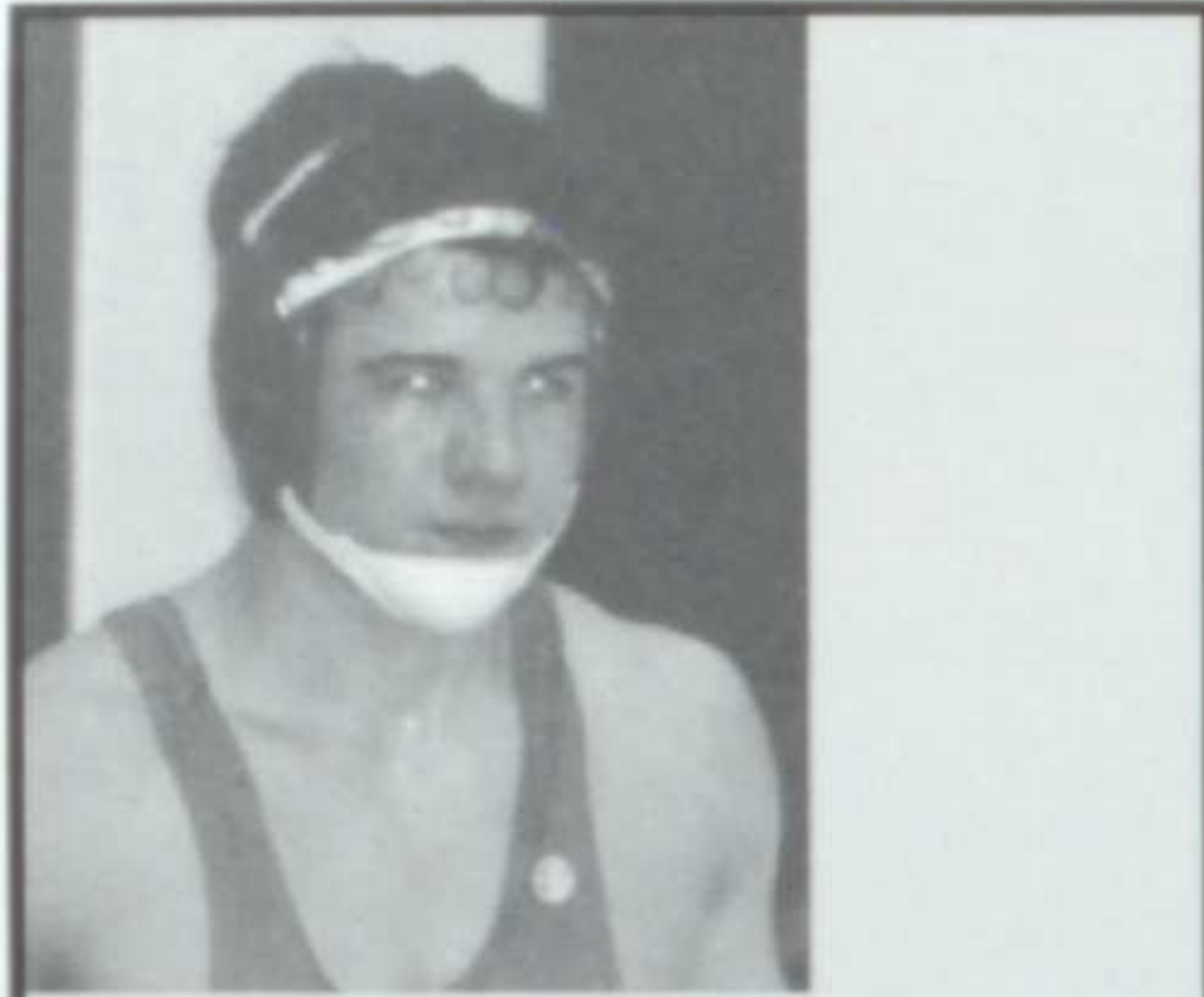

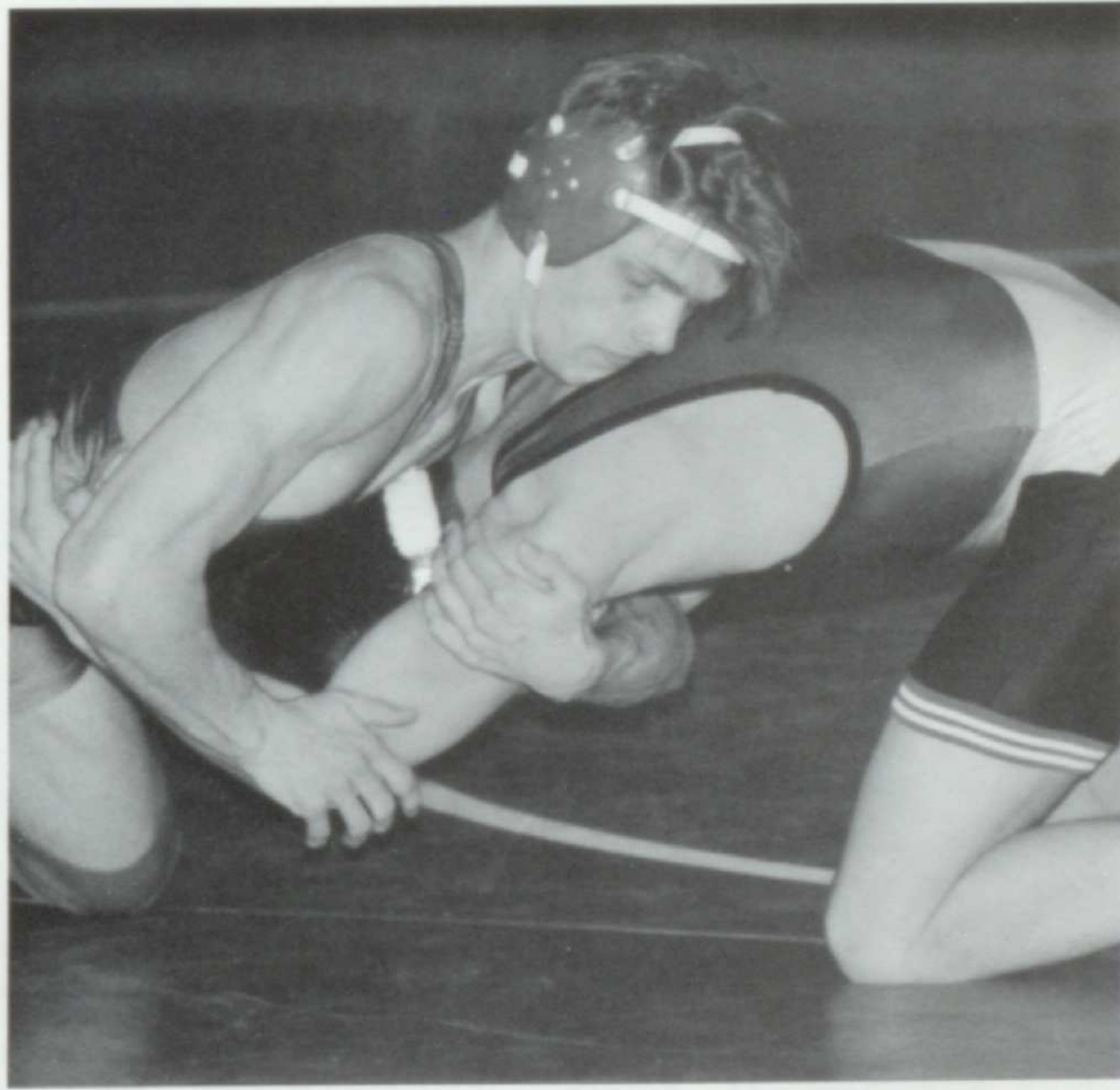

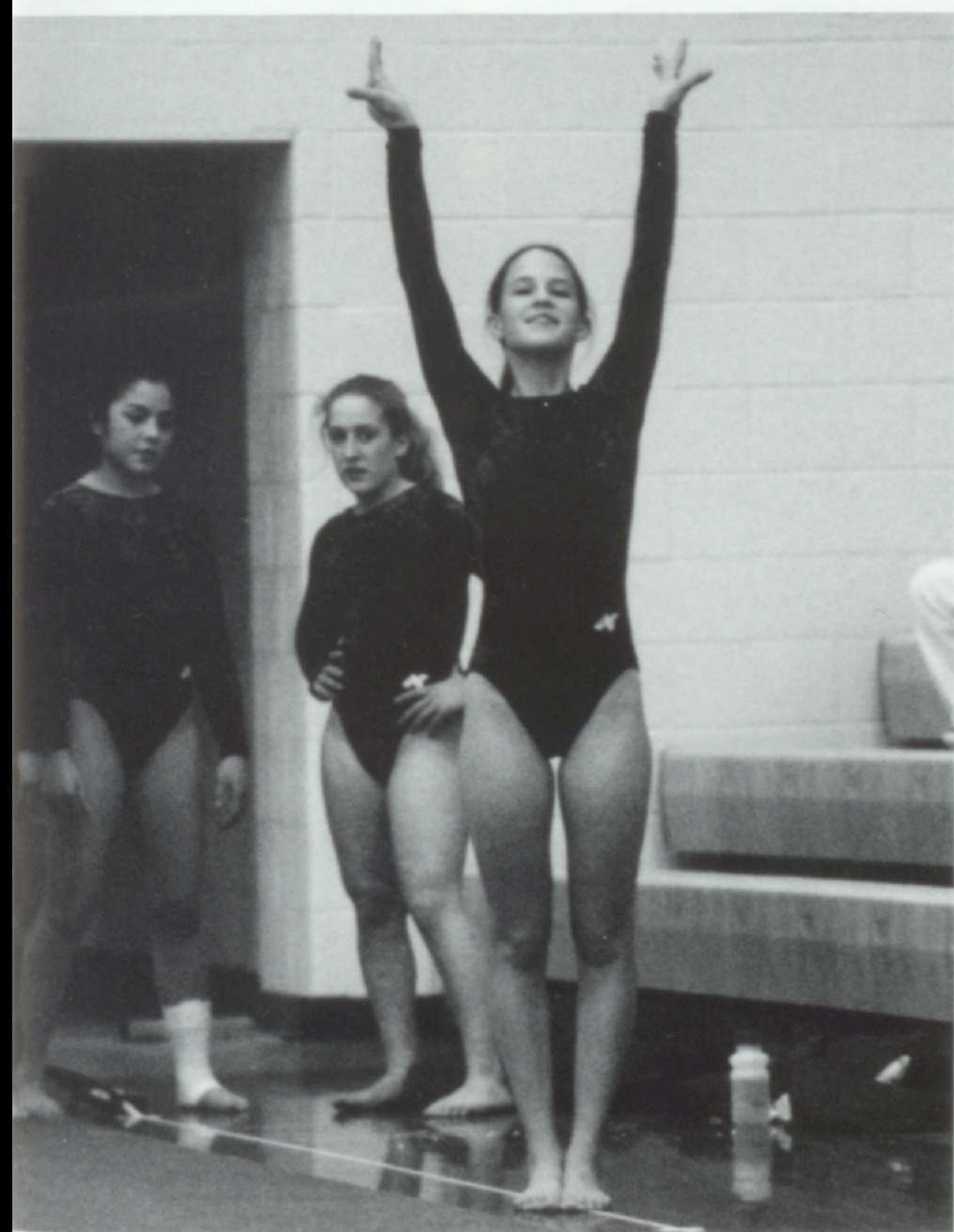

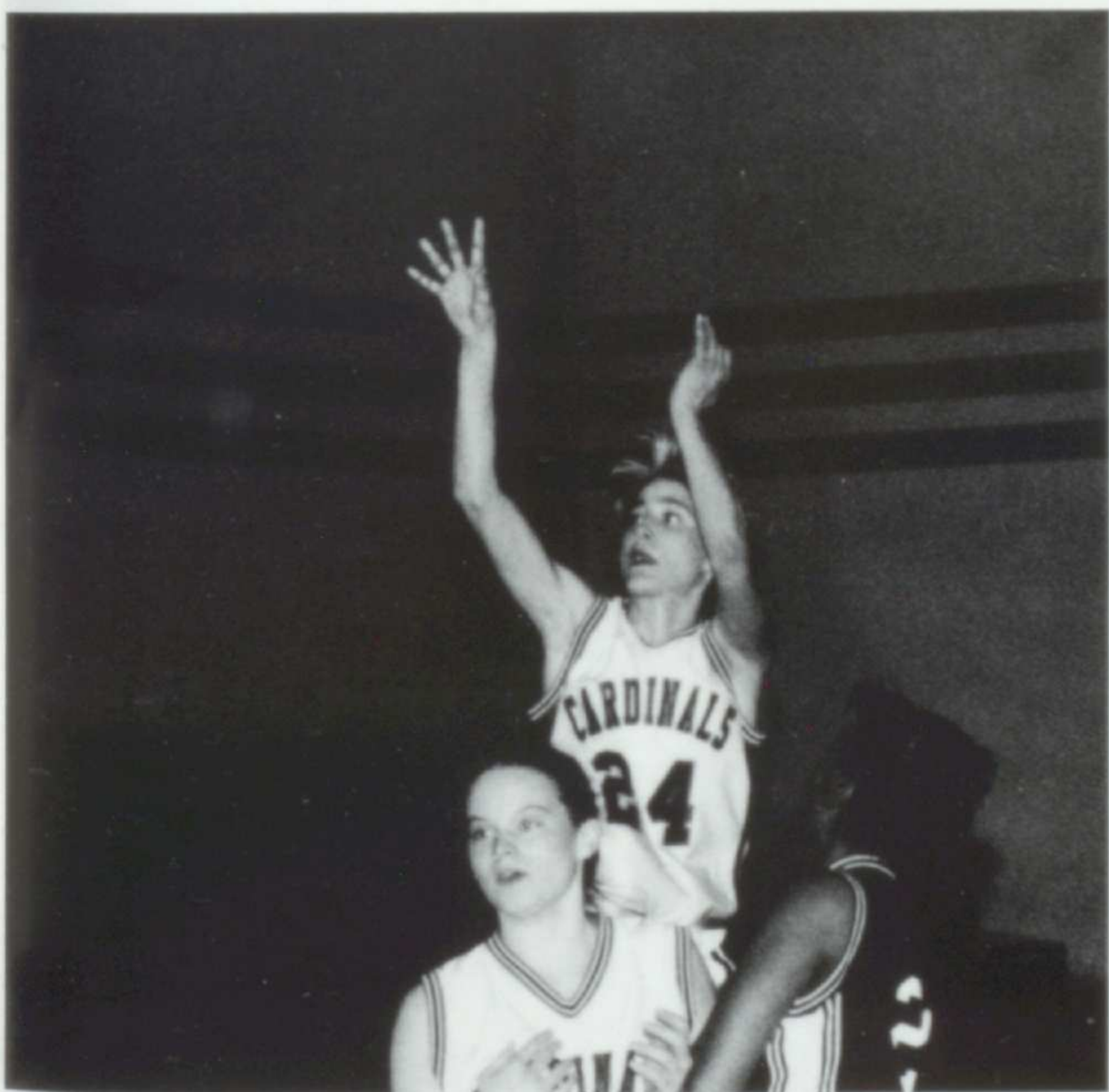

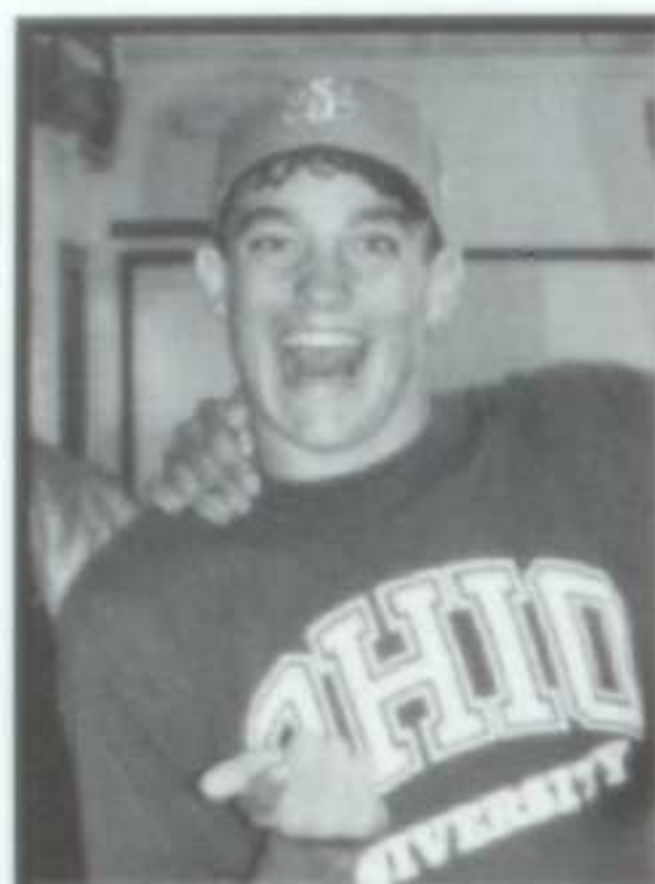
Boys' Swimming

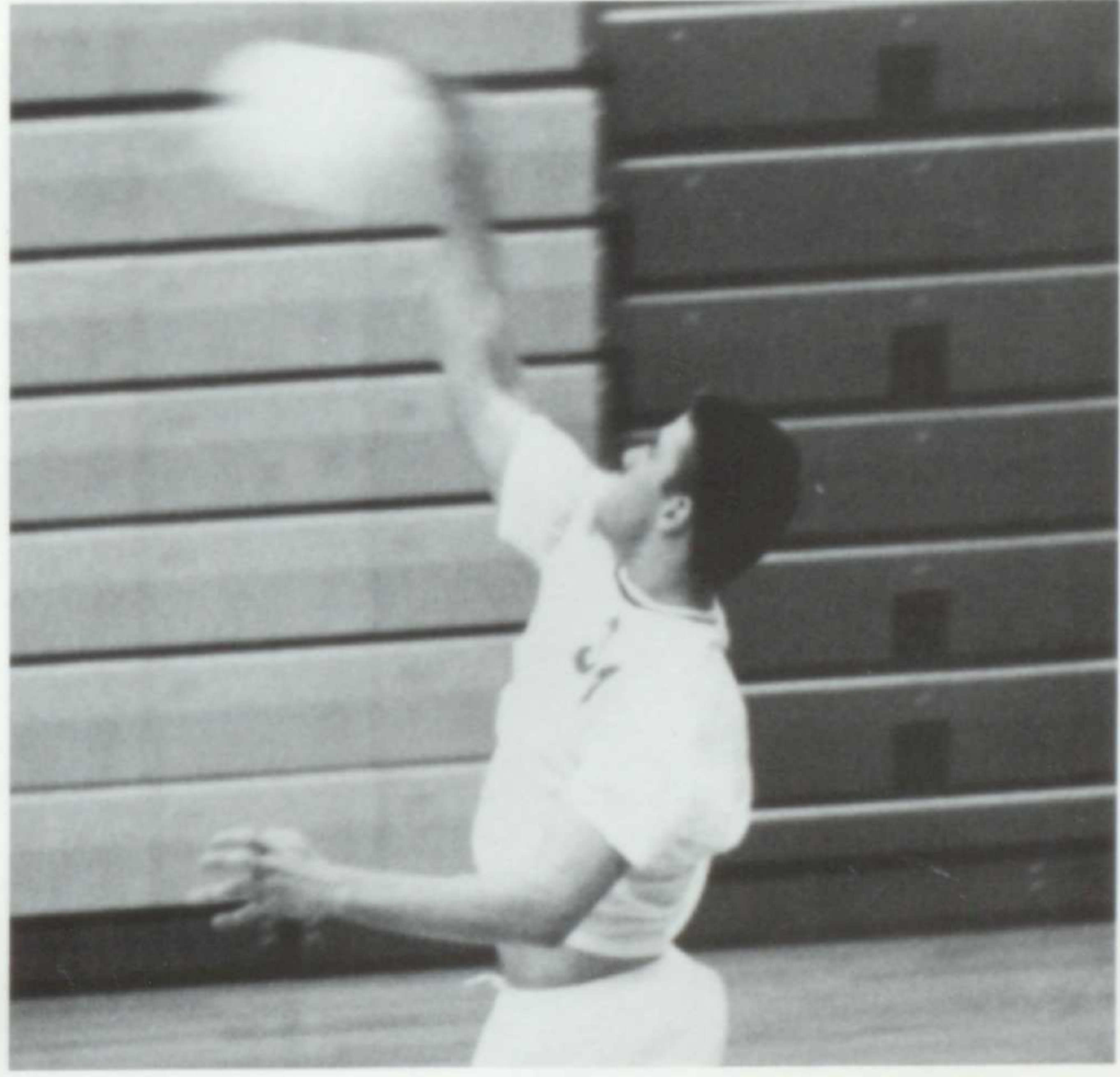
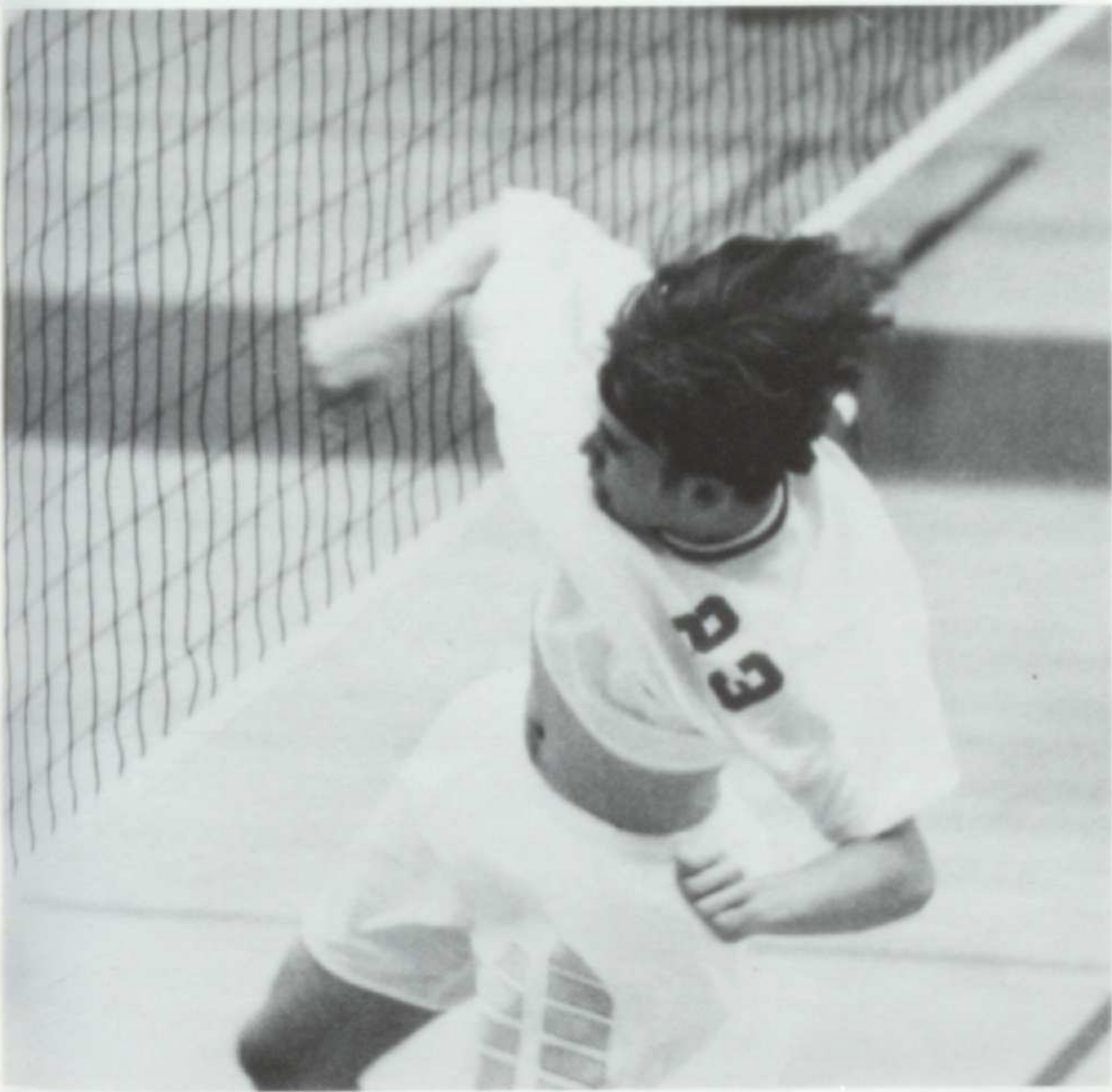

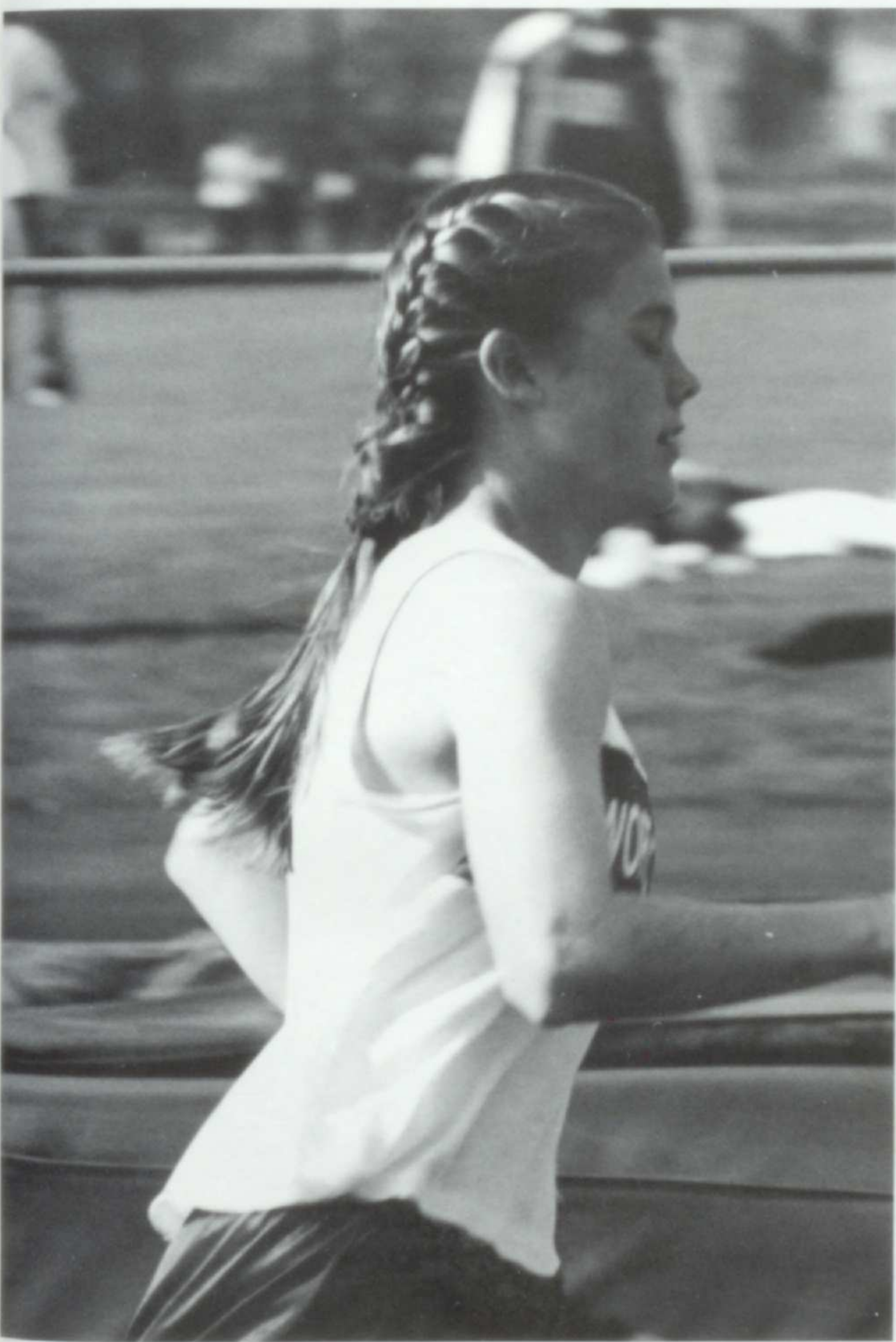

These are just a few of the many talented freshmen who competed at the varsity level this year, and hopefully this talent will be carried on for the next three years at TWHS.

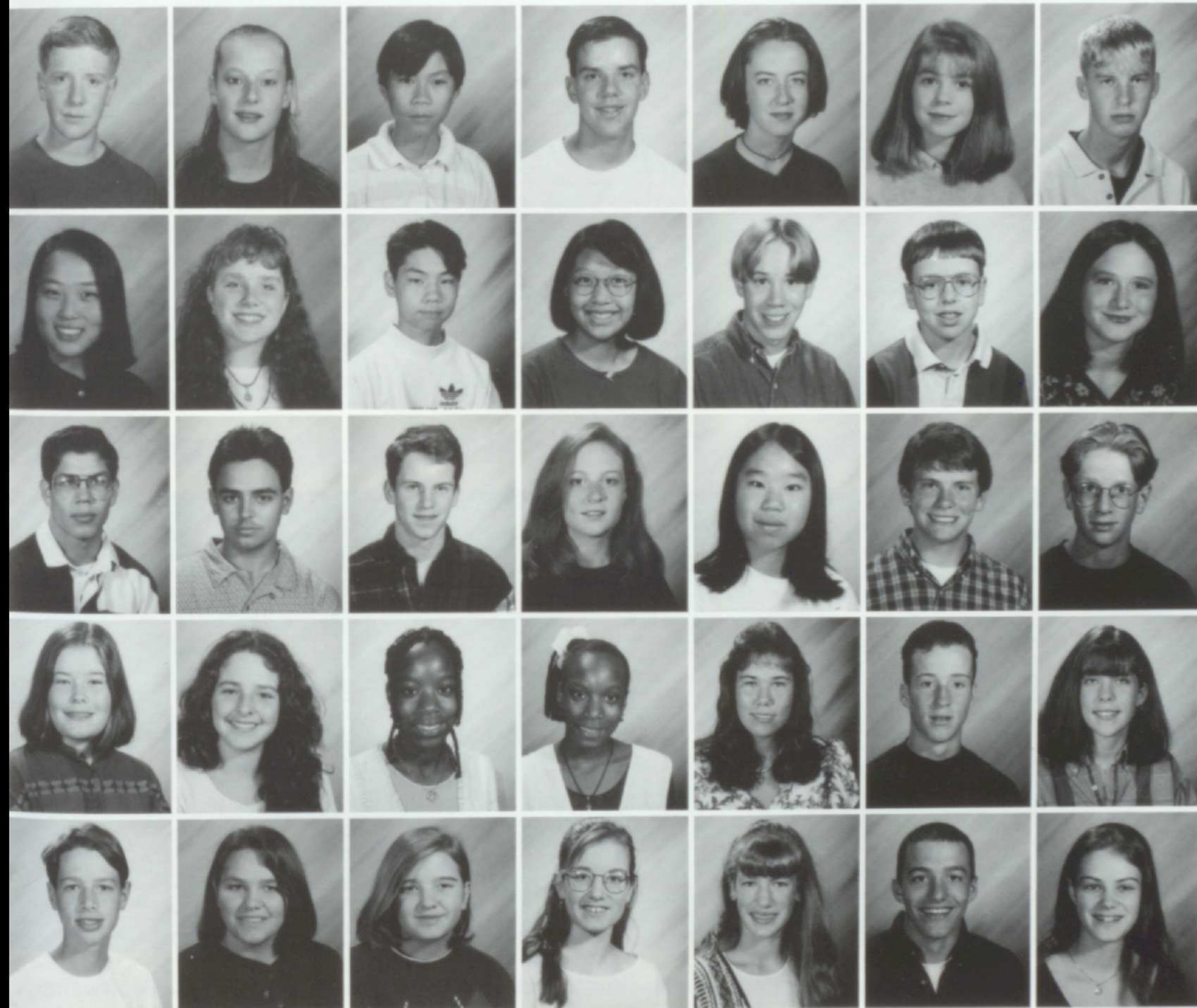

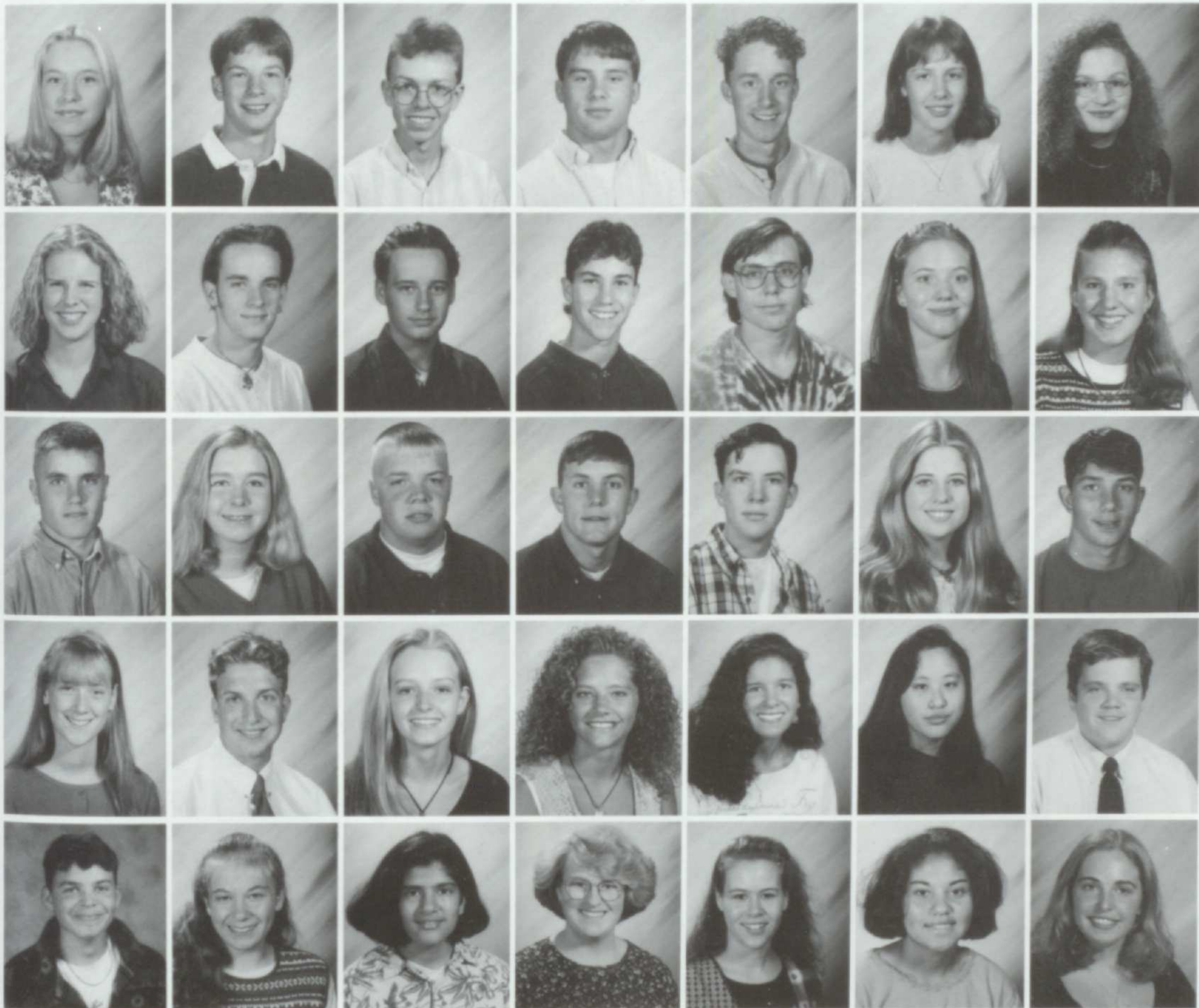


Dear Juniors,

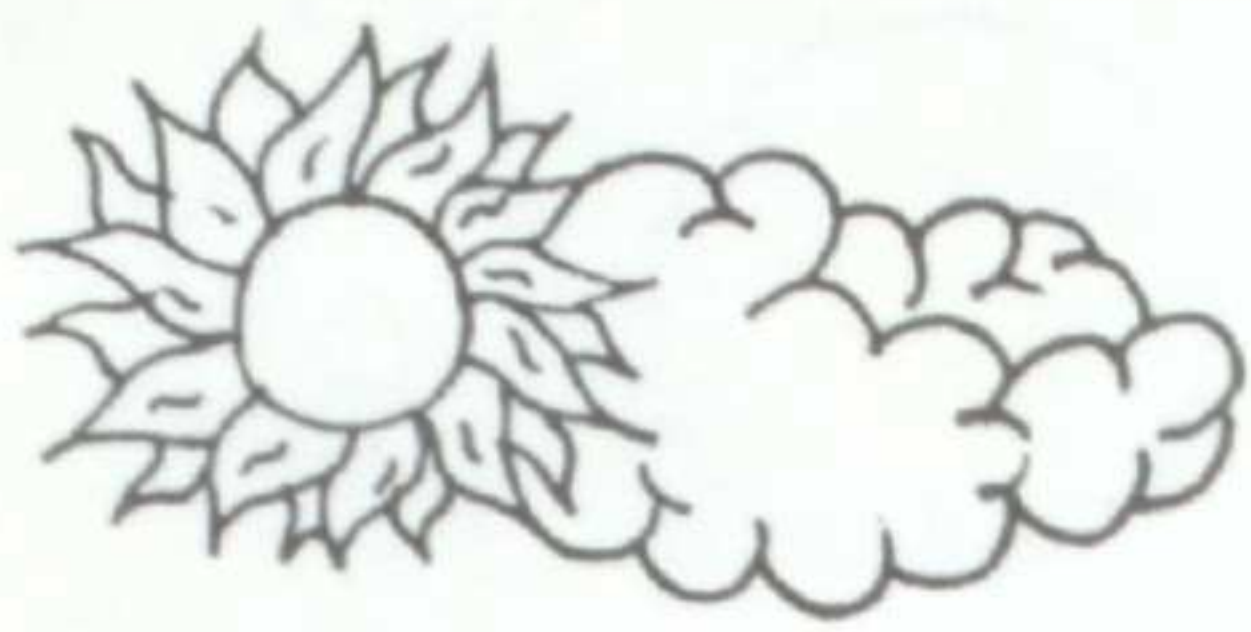

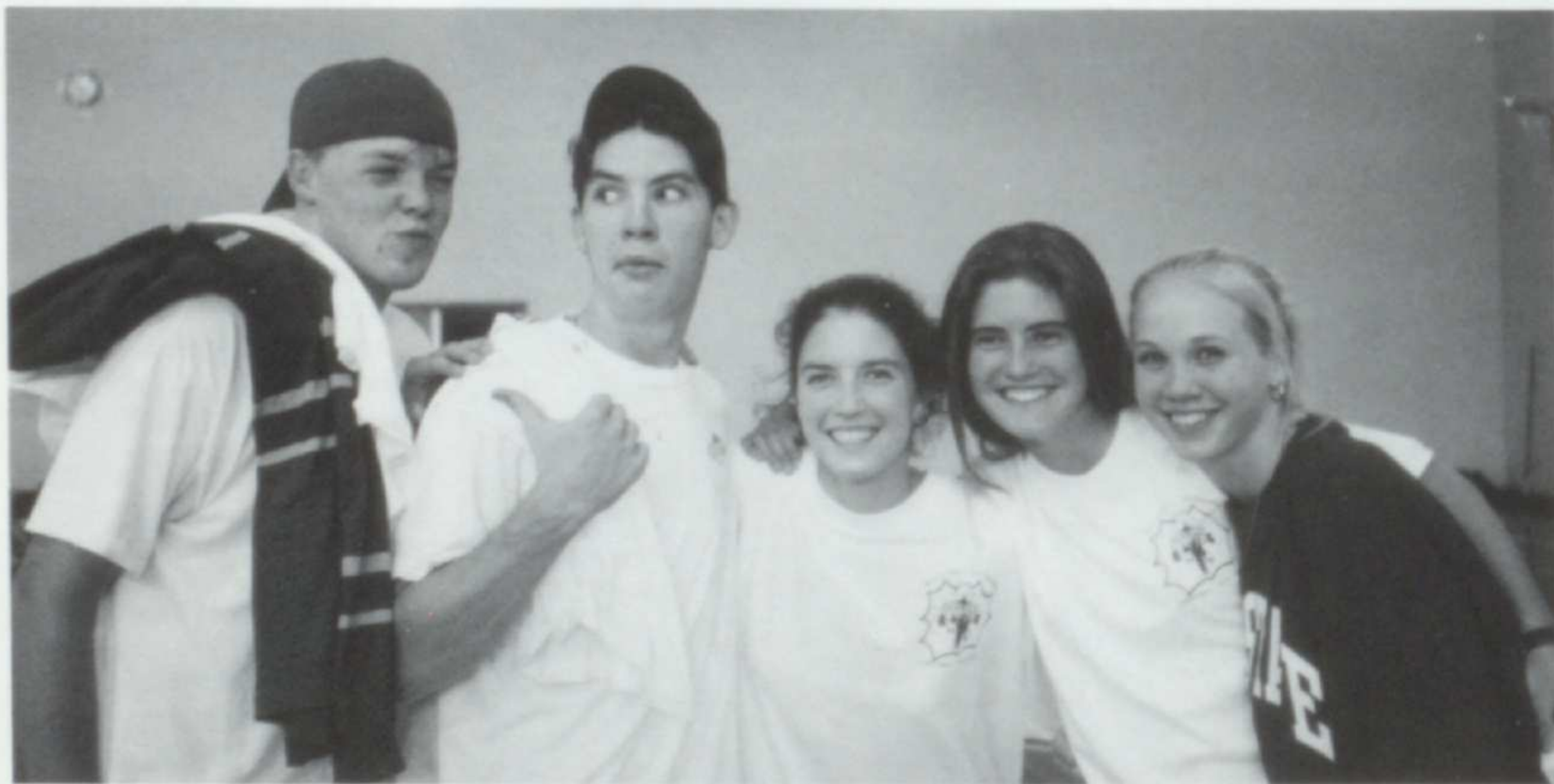

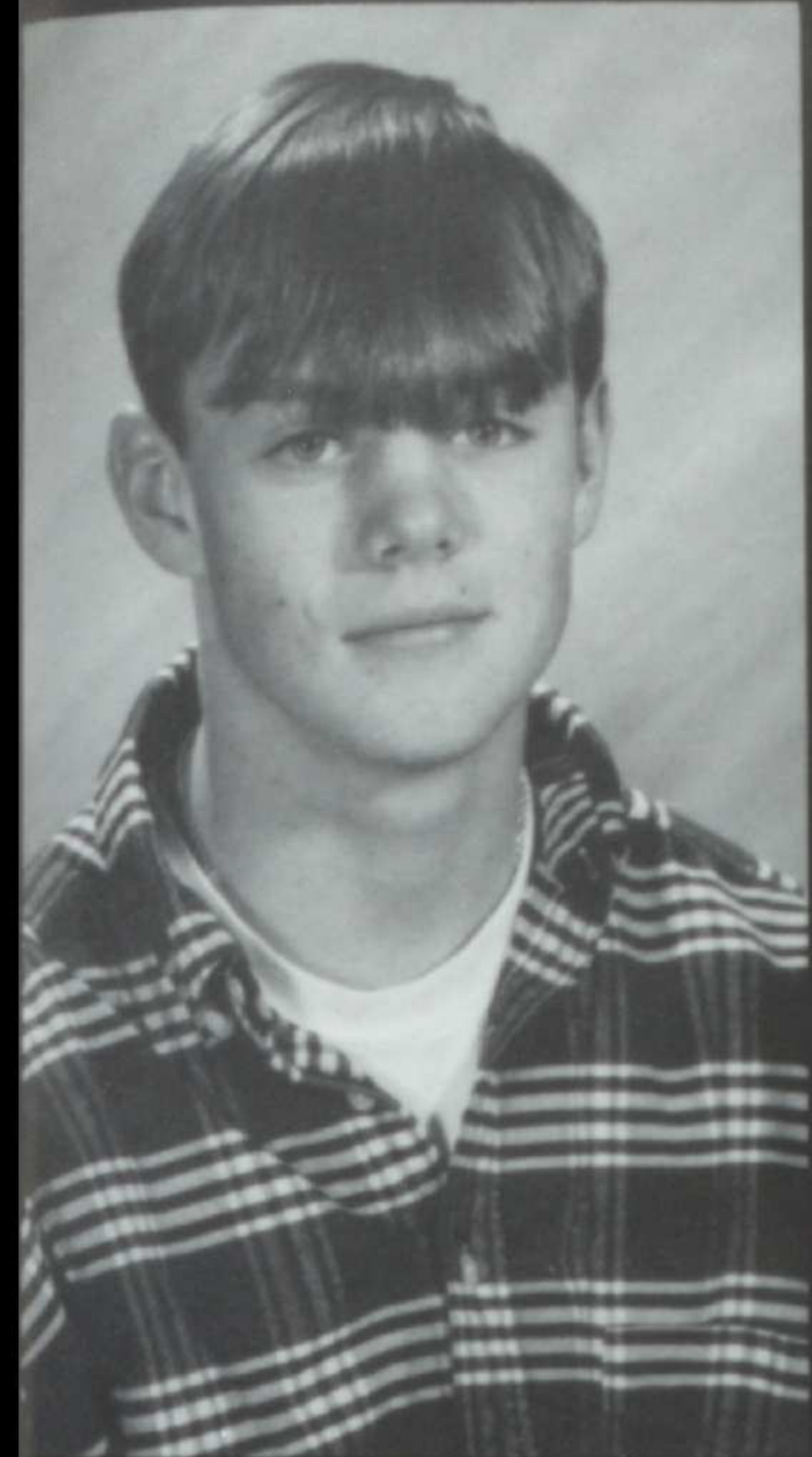

In Memory of Mike Wanko

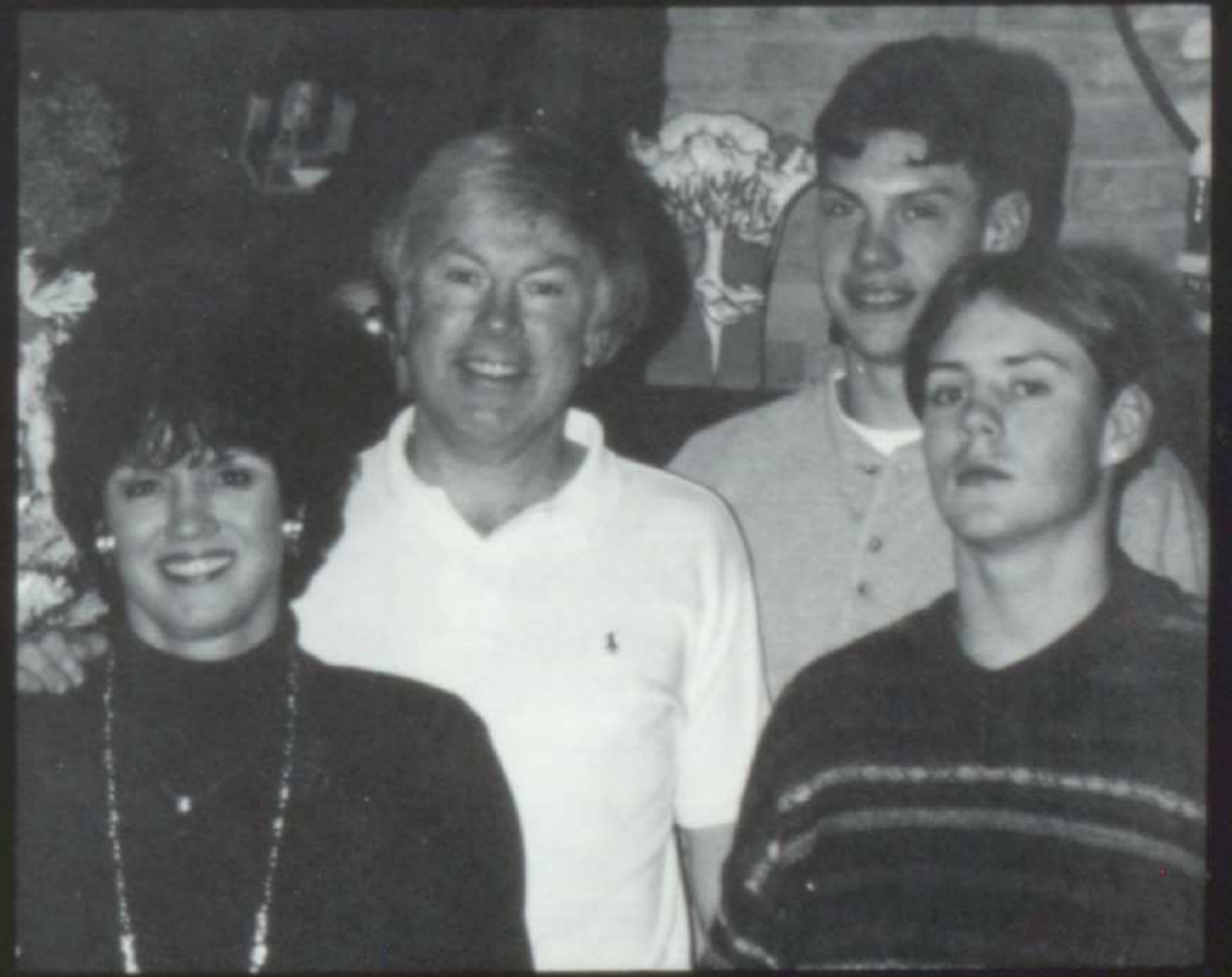
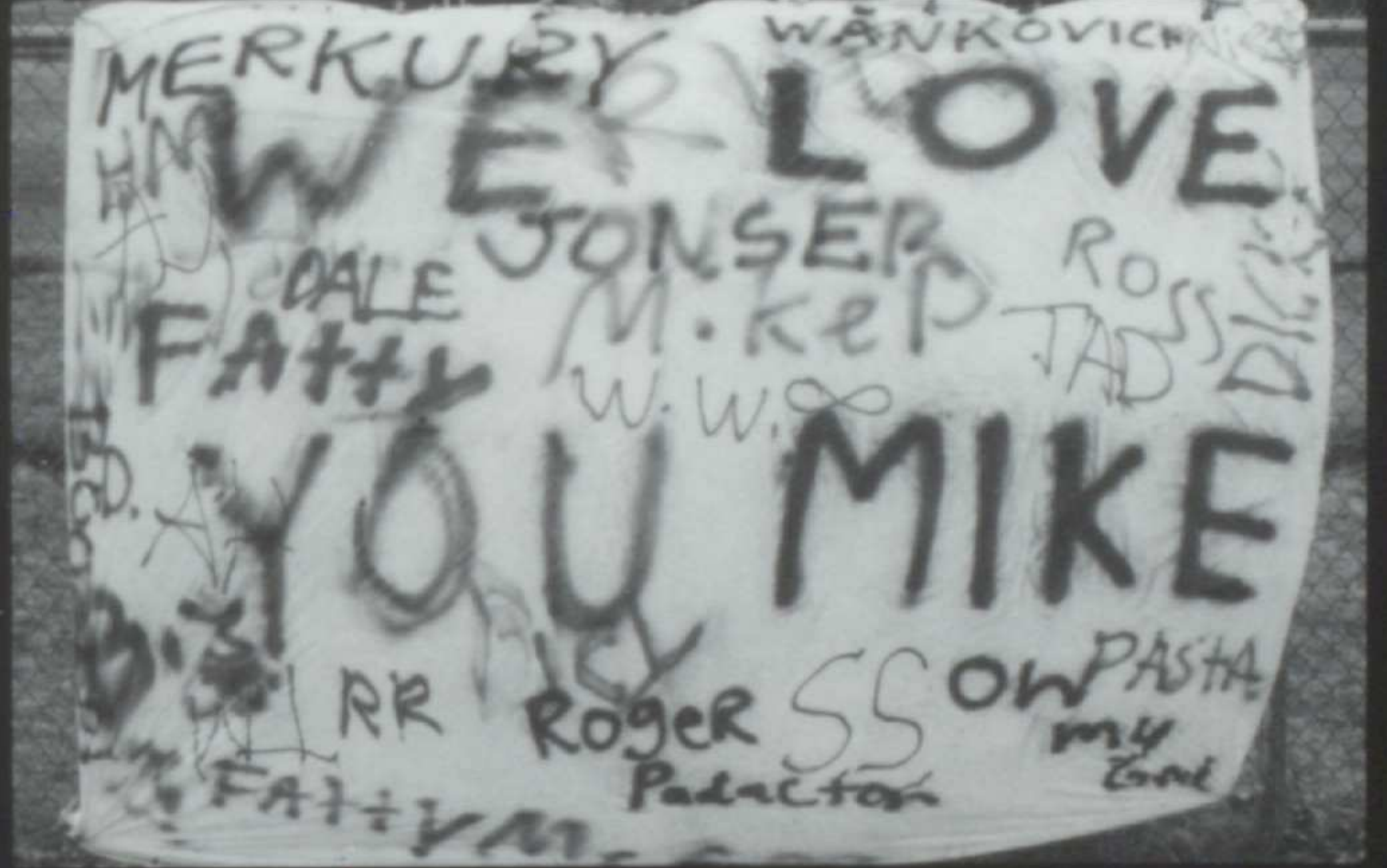

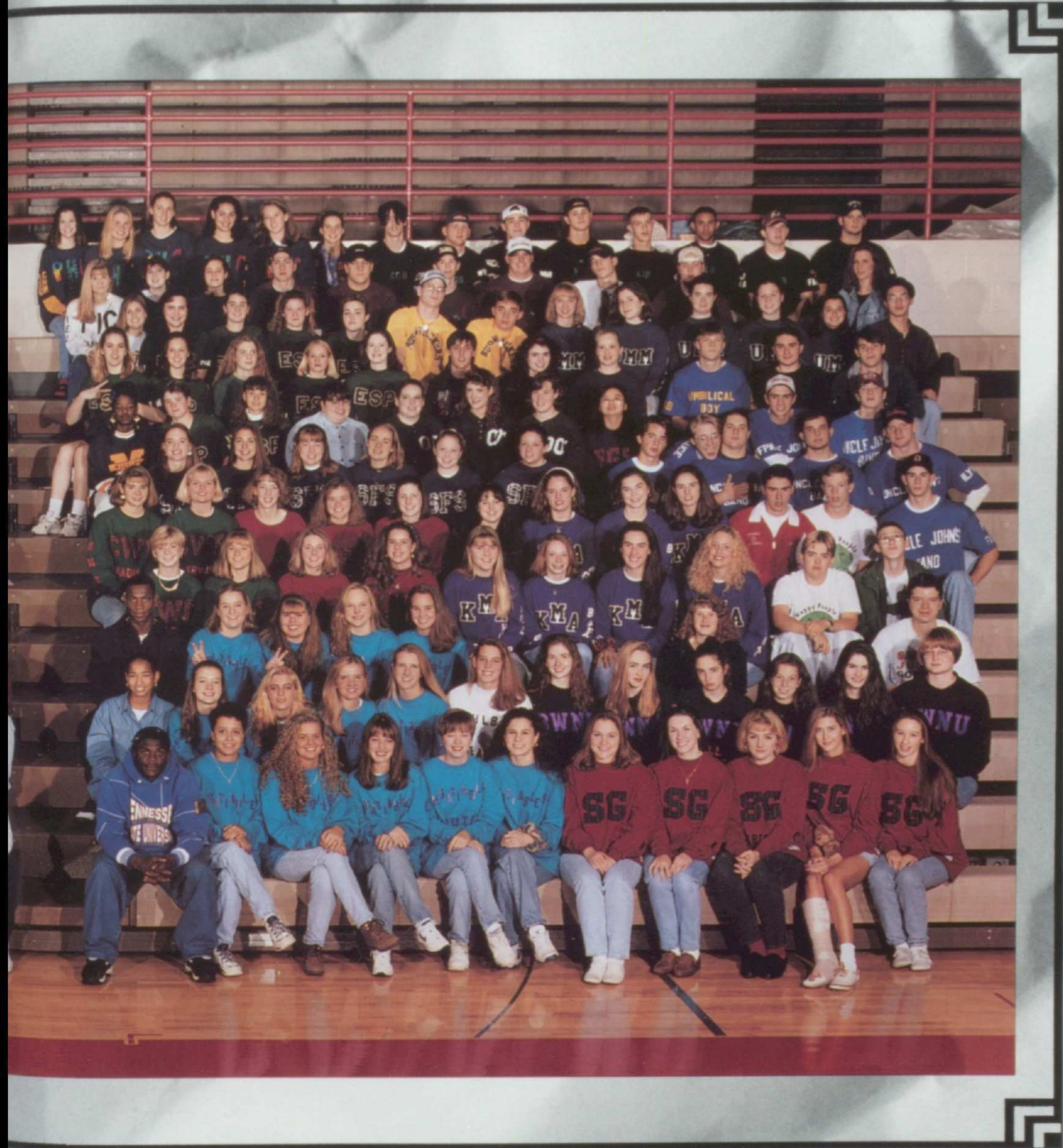

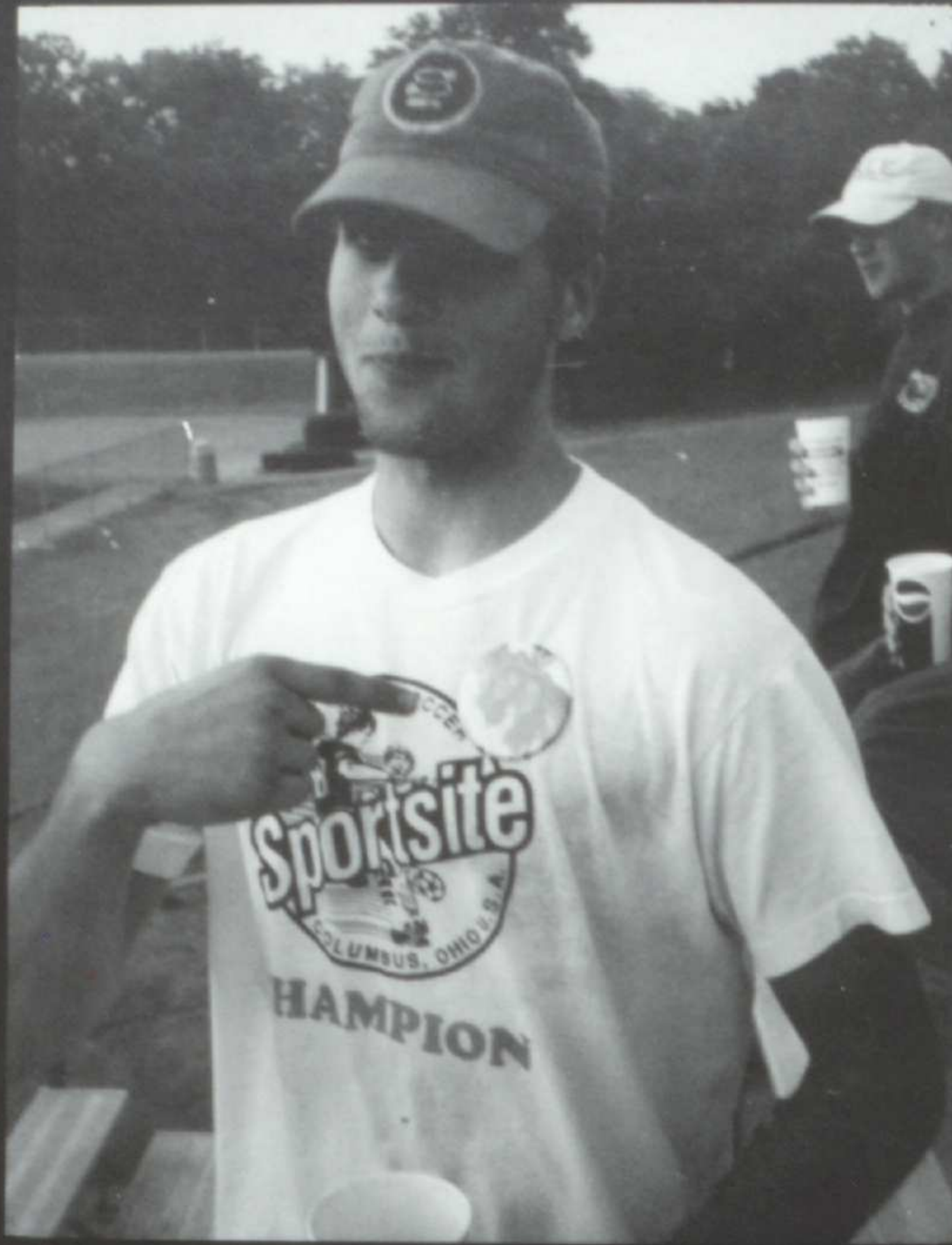
