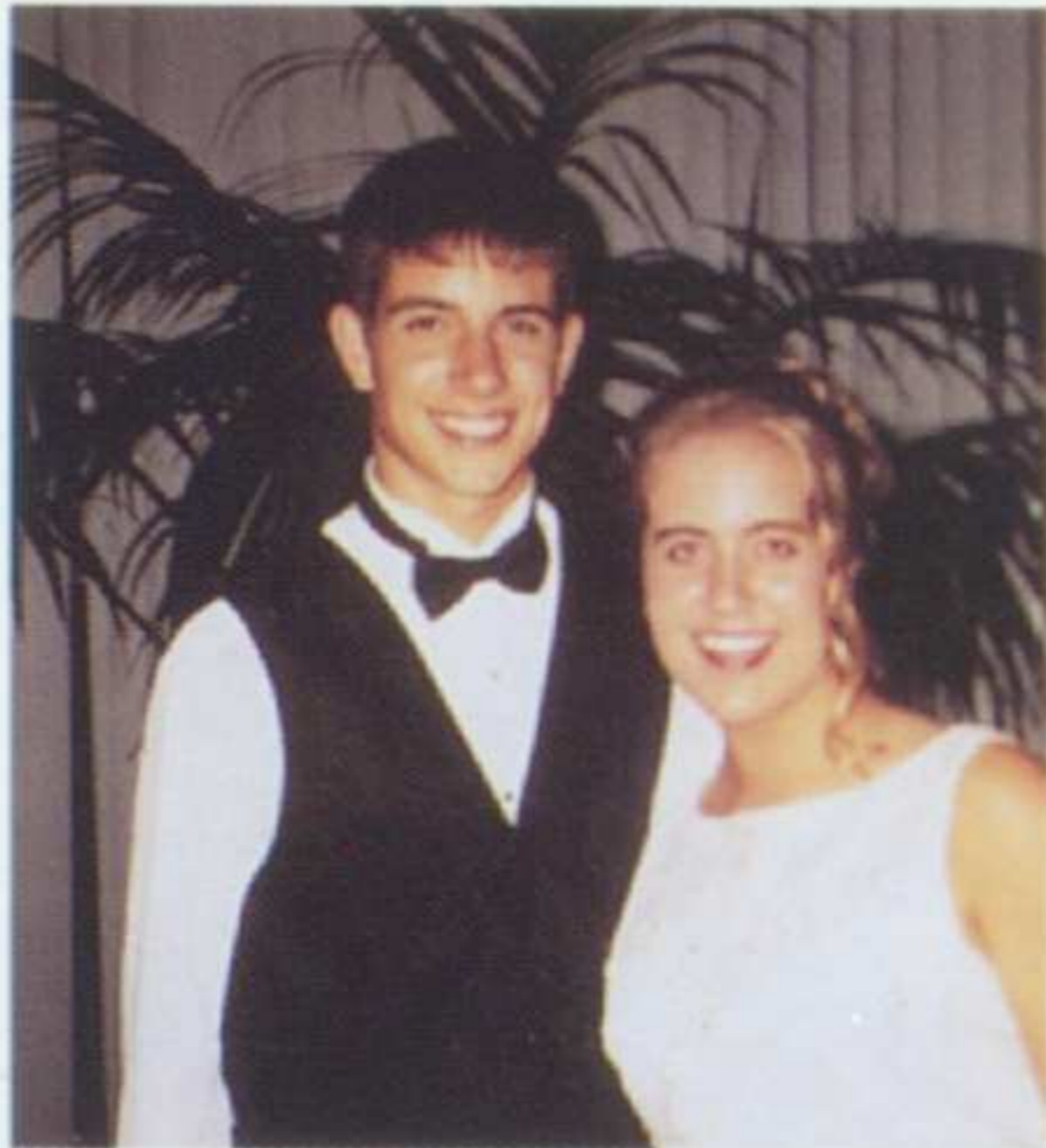

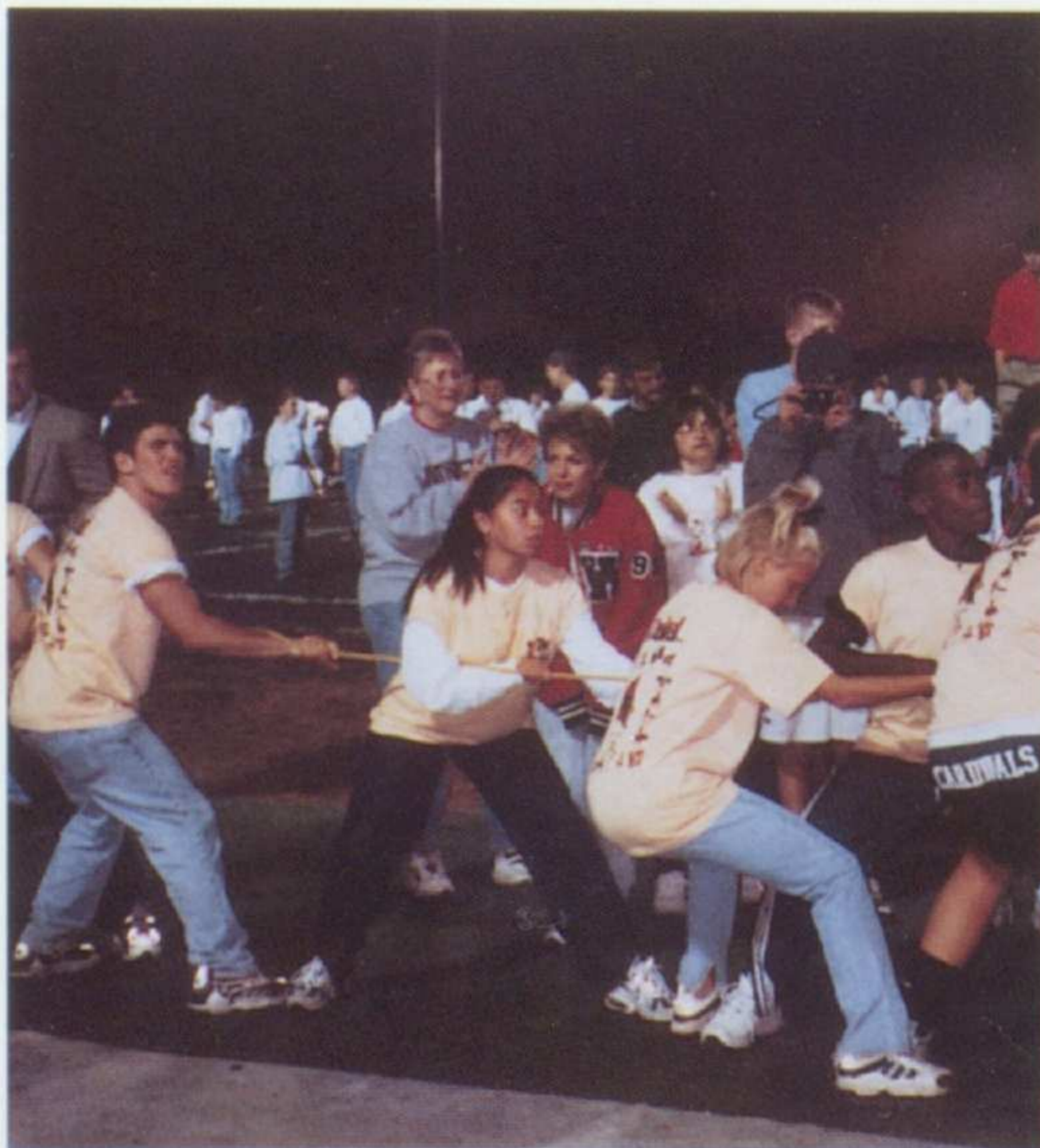

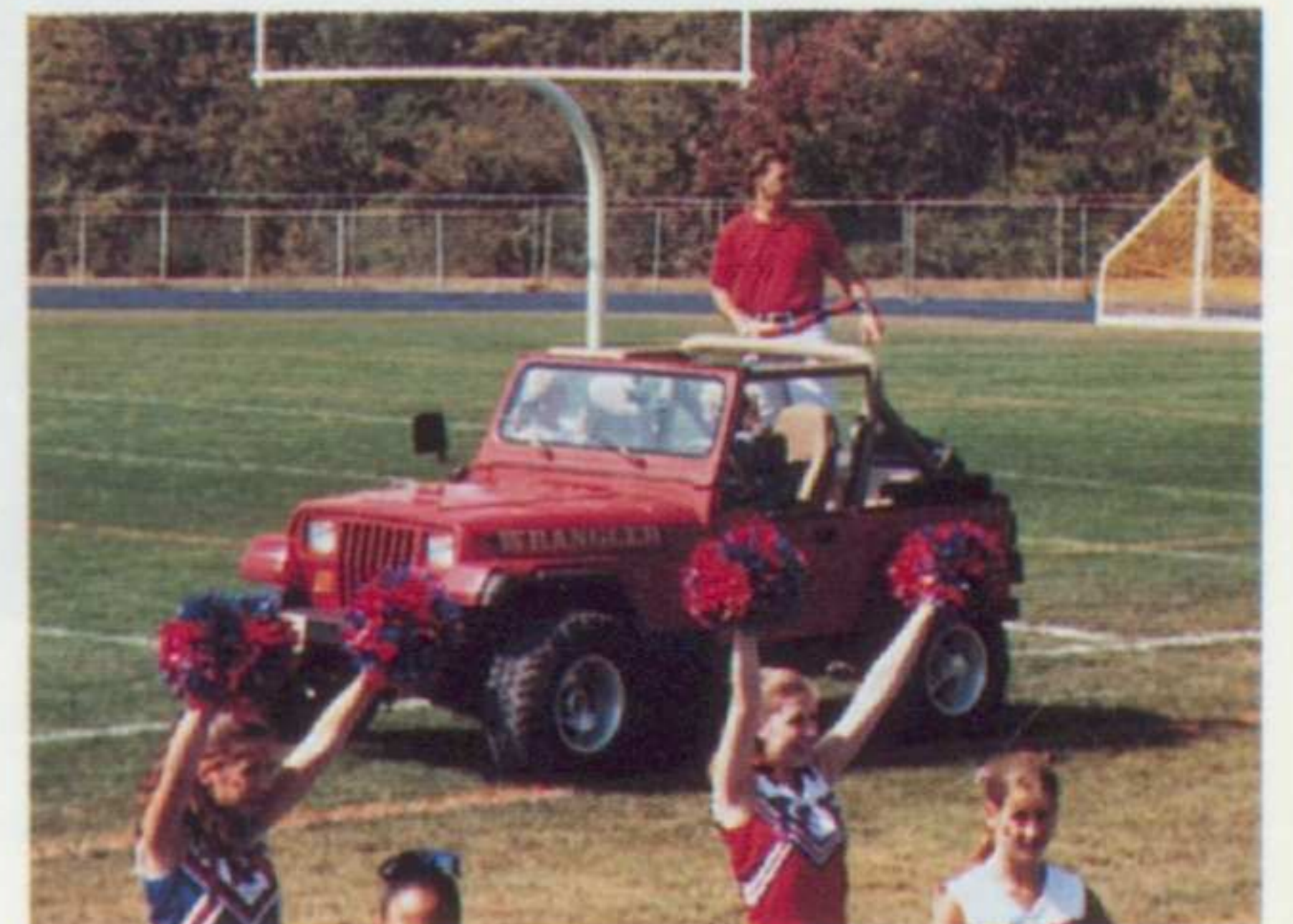

Furthermore, he startles the rest of his classmates. Keith told us that he really enjoys the class and finds it quite interesting, but he just can't get enough sleep at home.

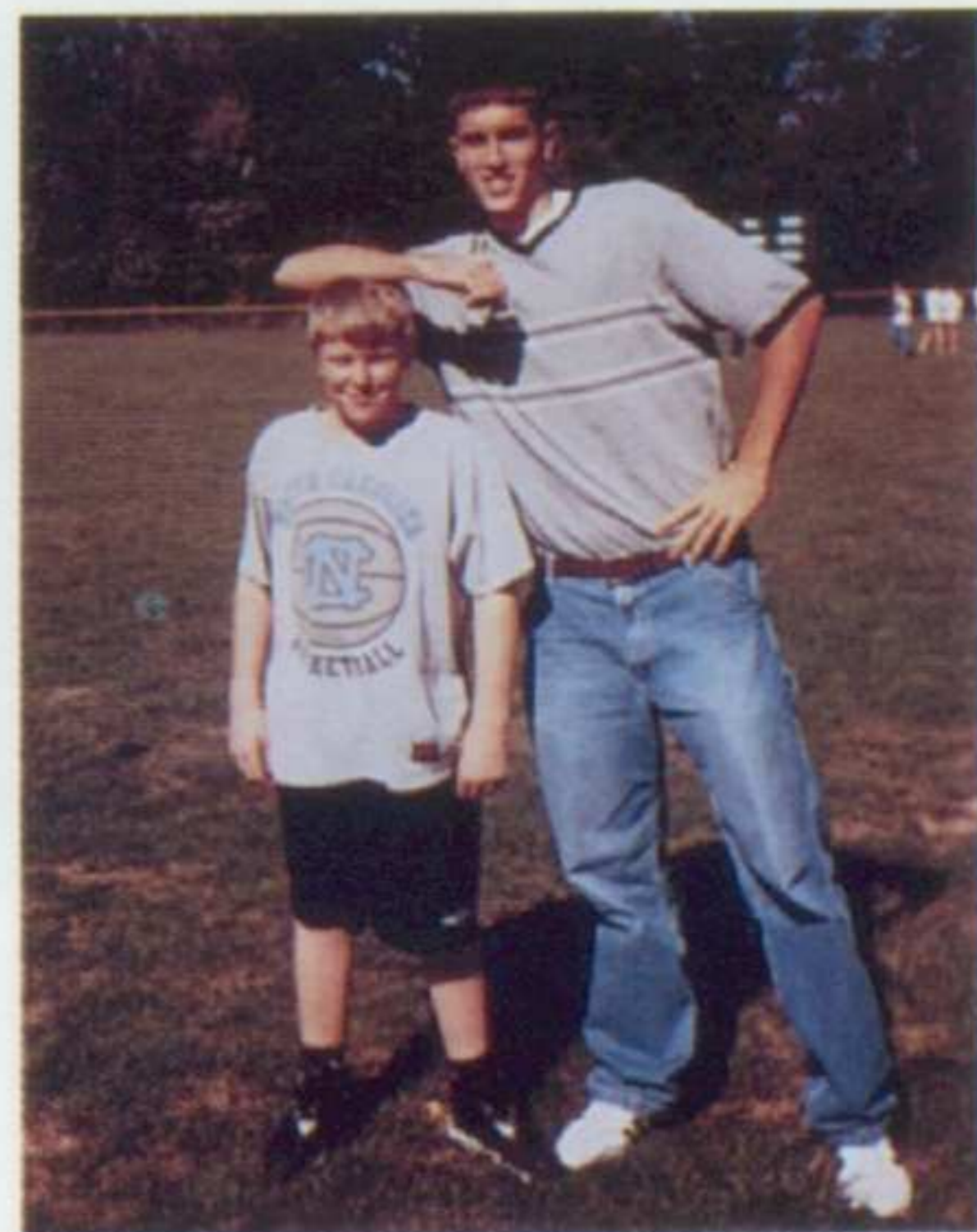

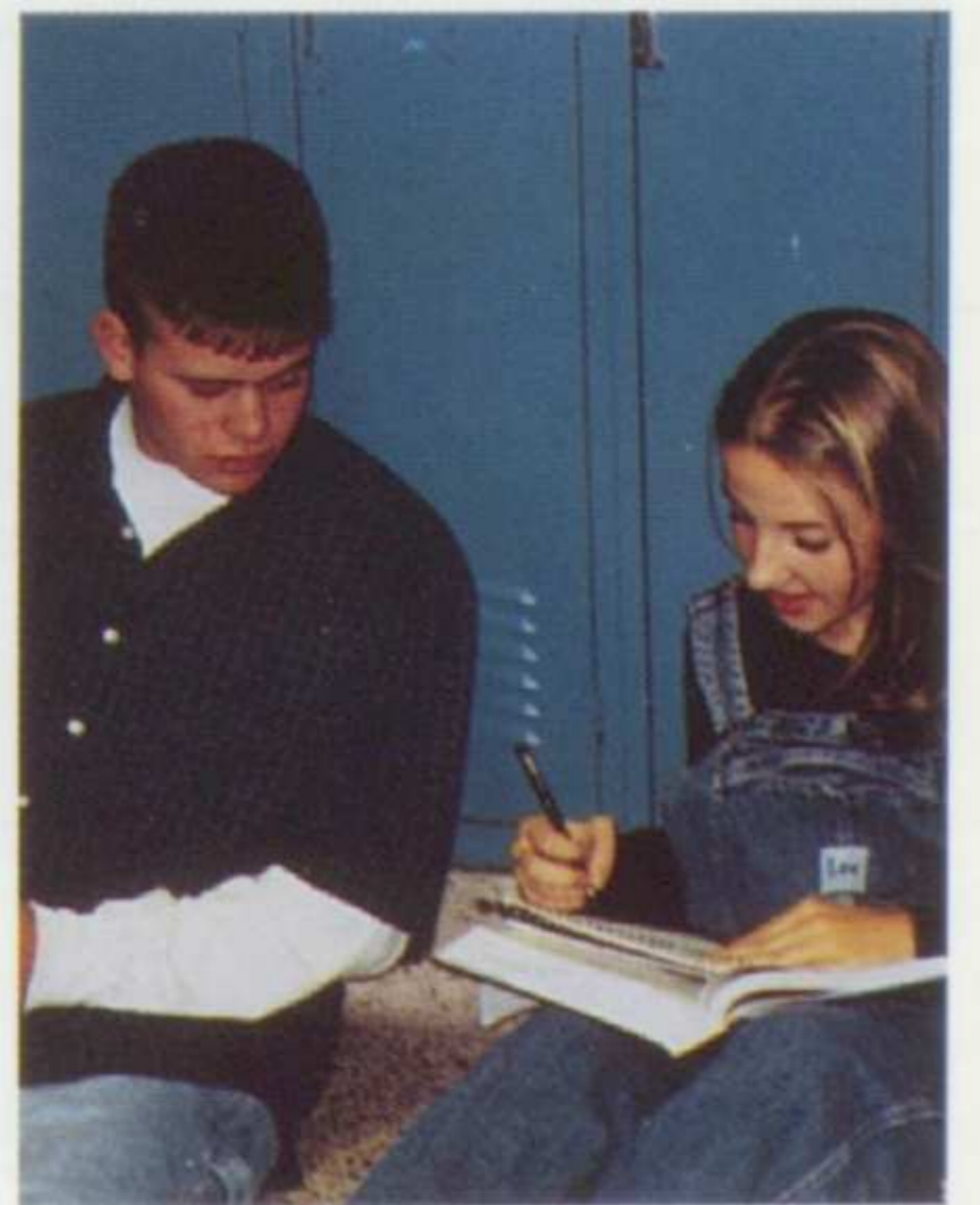

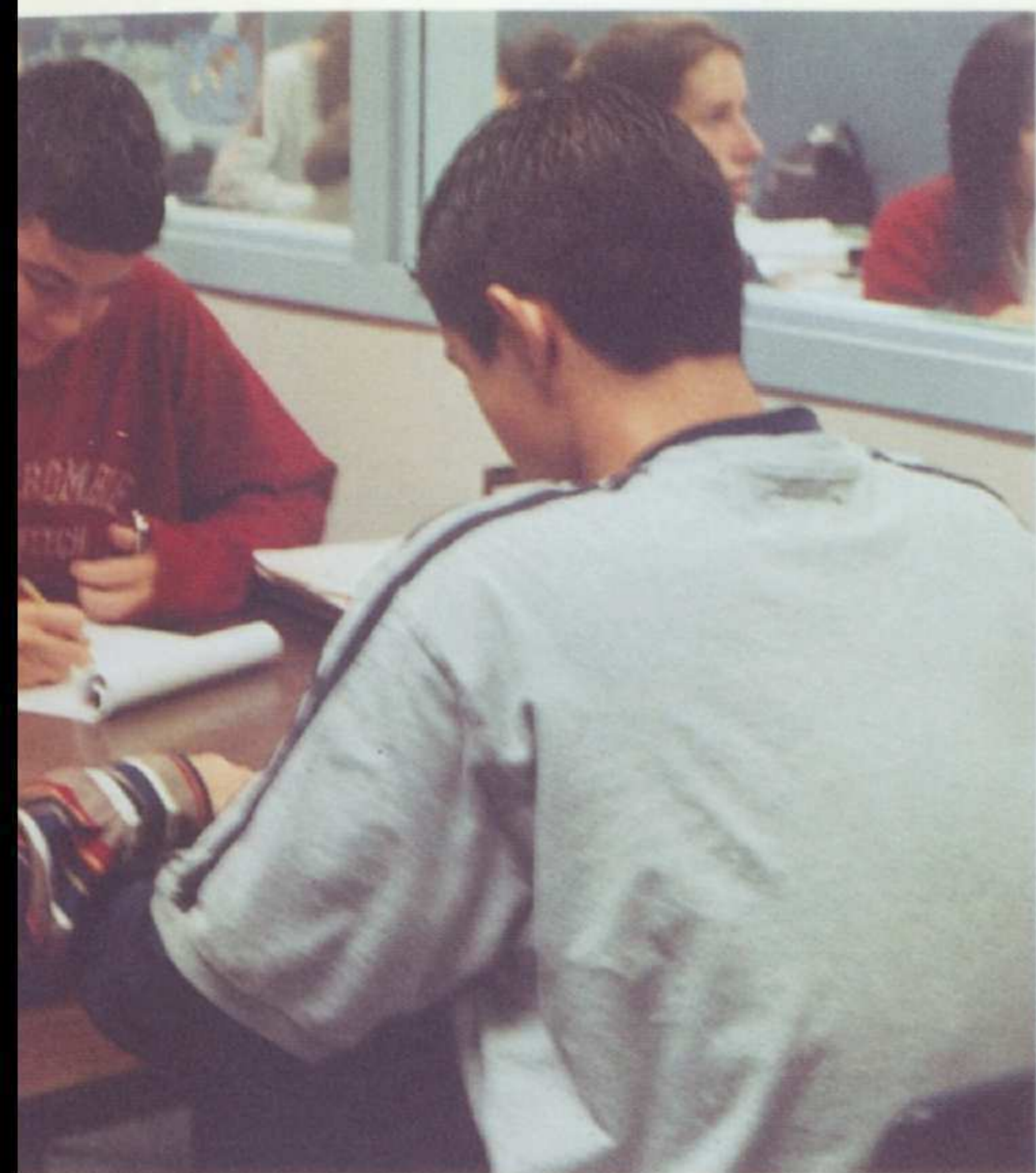

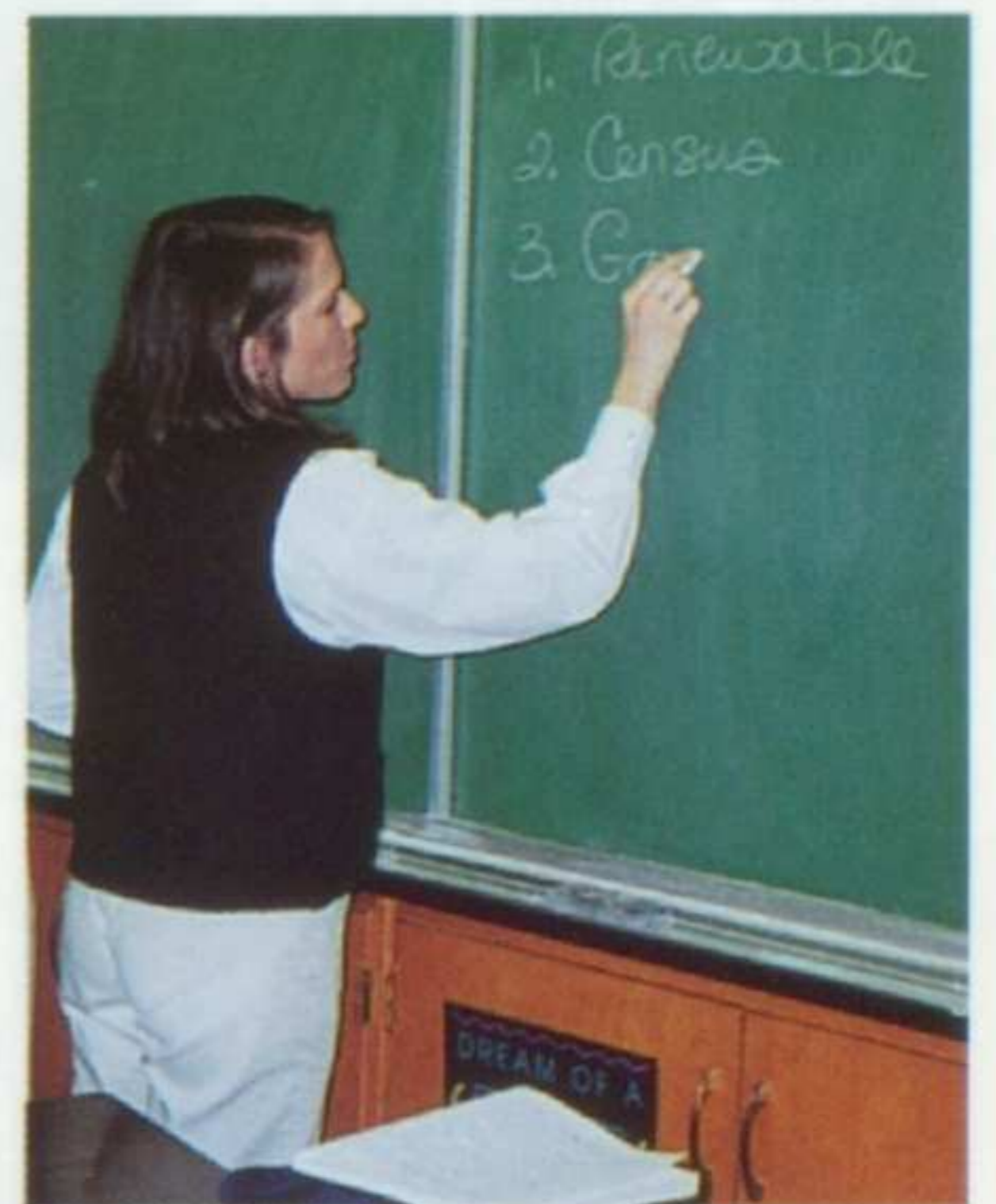

Career exploration receives great emphasis in high school. Classes at Thomas Worthington are designed to build communication skills, teach personal management, and encourage the pursuit of our dreams. We are being steadily guided into and prepared for the work force in many ways.

Some students enroll in specific job-related classes such as Career Mentorship, Jobs for Worthington Grads, Occupational Work Adjustment, or Occupational Work Experience. These classes allow students first-hand knowledge and experience in a selected career field. The DECA program runs Ye Olde School Store, teaching money management and customer relation skills. A law class even exists for prospective lawyers.

Other outlets for career exploration abound. Many students hold after school employment at area businesses. A common field for these people is in the service industry, perhaps making sandwiches at Bruegger's, dish washing at Michael Dominic's, or folding clothes at the Gap. Some jobs are seasonal, such as life guarding or lawn mowing. Other jobs can have unusual hours, such as newspaper delivery. Most employed students work part-time for minimum wage pay, and they work under twenty hours per week.

Clearly a great deal of time and effort is placed in our career exploration. These opportunities and endeavors provide students with some real world savvy. They help develop competency and confidence in young people, making them ready to face the world.

All season the boy's varsity soccer team set their sights on a state championship, and anything short of this lofty goal would have been a letdown for the senior-loaded, talented Cardinal squad. Last year, the Cards fell to Westerville South 1-0 in a shoot-out, crushing their hopes of a trip to the state finals. This year with redemption on their mind, the team was anchored by senior leadership. On the leadership this season, coach Ian Hamilton said "I was so proud of John, Andy, and Tony. They led the team wonderfully, and they played some bloody good football as well." After a third straight undefeated OCC Championship, the Cards capped off the regular season as the unanimous number one team in the state, but they knew they had accomplished nothing, and the real test was just about to start. "Everything until the tourney had just been a warm-up, and once the tournament started, all our seniors really stepped it up," said Senior John Greisberger.

After easy victories over Mifflin and Upper Arlington, the Cards were set to face their cross town rivals, Kilbourne. Goals scored by Nebbergall and Rutledge, along with staunch Cardinal defense won the game 2-0, and set up a showdown with Chillicothe. After an easy 4-0 win, the Cards then beat Westerville North 2-0 in a game starred by goalkeeper Troy Perkins, who stopped a penalty shot to keep the Warriors from taking the lead. With the victory, the Cardinals advanced to the state semi-finals, where they faced perennial state power Centerville. "We were well aware of their tradition, but we were looking to show them that Worthington is the best team in Ohio," said captain Justin Evans. Intimidated the Cards were not, and they won 2-1 on the late game heroics of Mr. Rutledge. This victory set up a final versus Hudson. In an anticlimactic end to the season, the Cards breezed to the state championship behind goals by Rutledge, Jeff Strunk, and J.C. Cunningham. "We knew since we got to Worthington that our senior year we could accomplish something special, and all these guys played hard all season to accomplish this," said First Team All-State Andrew Rutledge, who was joined by Tony Nebbergall on the All-State Team.

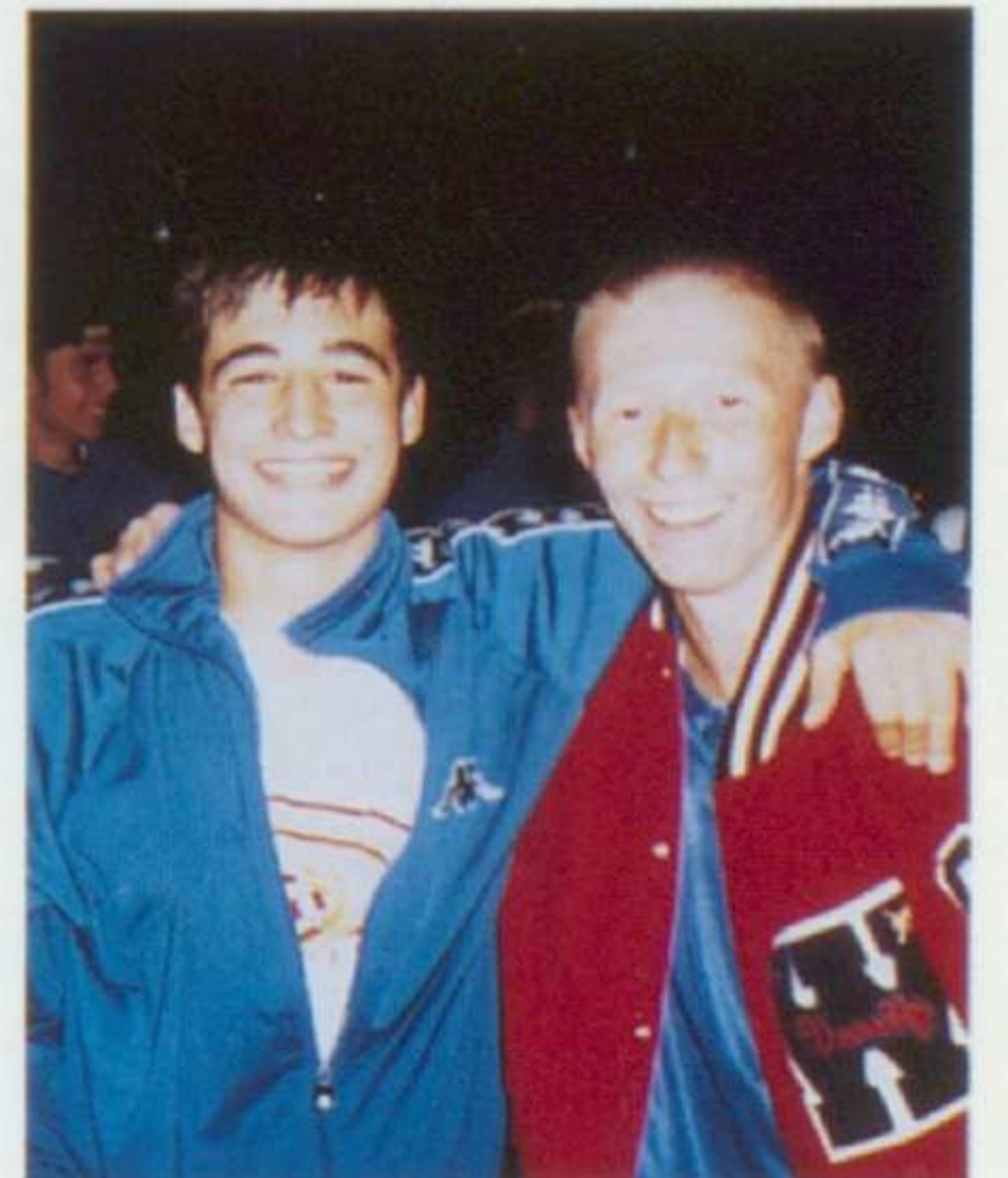

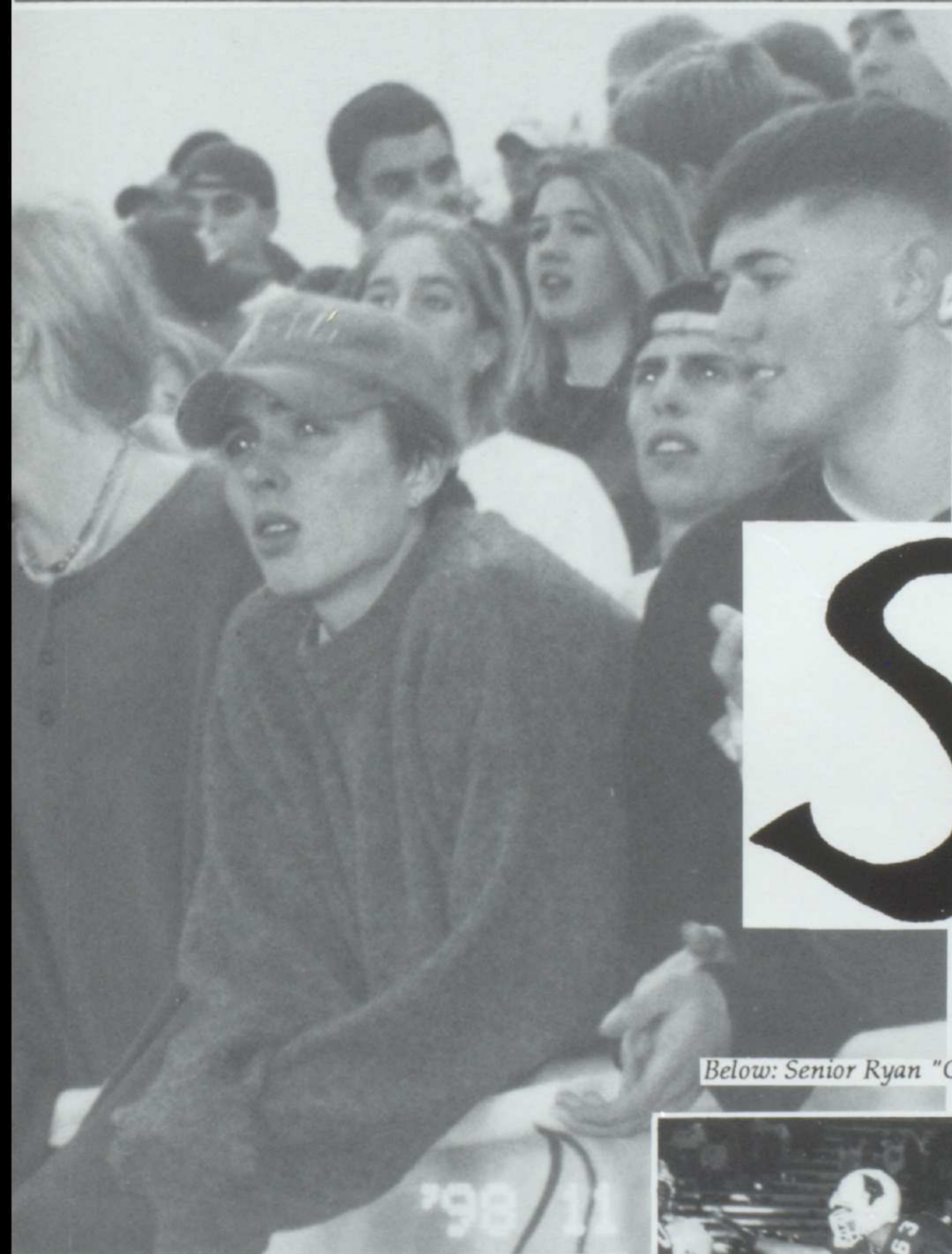

STATE FINAL

HUDSON 3-0 WIN

Every year in the state, there is a team that stands out from the rest. This year's soccer team did not just stand out, they dominated. After having an almost unprecedented regular season with a 6th place national ranking, they stormed through the tournament outscoring their opponents 77-4, including a 3-0 win in the state final game against Hudson. Anchoring the defense was the All District goalie Troy Perkins, who had 19 shutouts and a .13 goals-against average, which were two new school records. Pacing the offense was All-State player, Tony Nebbergall and All-American/State Player-of-the-Year, Andrew Rutledge. Combining for 35 of the team's 77 goals, they were a threat to any team they played. Also being a key contributor to the team was Captain John Greisberger, who was named to the All-District team. Being named to the All OCC second team was Jonathan Cunningham, Jeff Strunk, Jeff Deitrich, and Chet Ridenour. Being named to the OCC Honorable Mention team was Sean Ferris.

The team this year was loaded with talent and the will to win. Yet a team cannot be victorious if it is not led to victory by a great coach. Named the District Coach of the Year, Ian Hamilton is one of the most renowned coaches in the history of Ohio high school soccer with an overall career record of 310- 53- 34. Yet, by far, this was the best year he has ever had as a coach. He had to say this about the team, "They came together and played when they were injured or sick. There was great team spirit from the bench and they wanted it all just as bad."

This was a team to remember and one that the state would always talk about. Everyone agrees that this team deserves to be the State Champions.

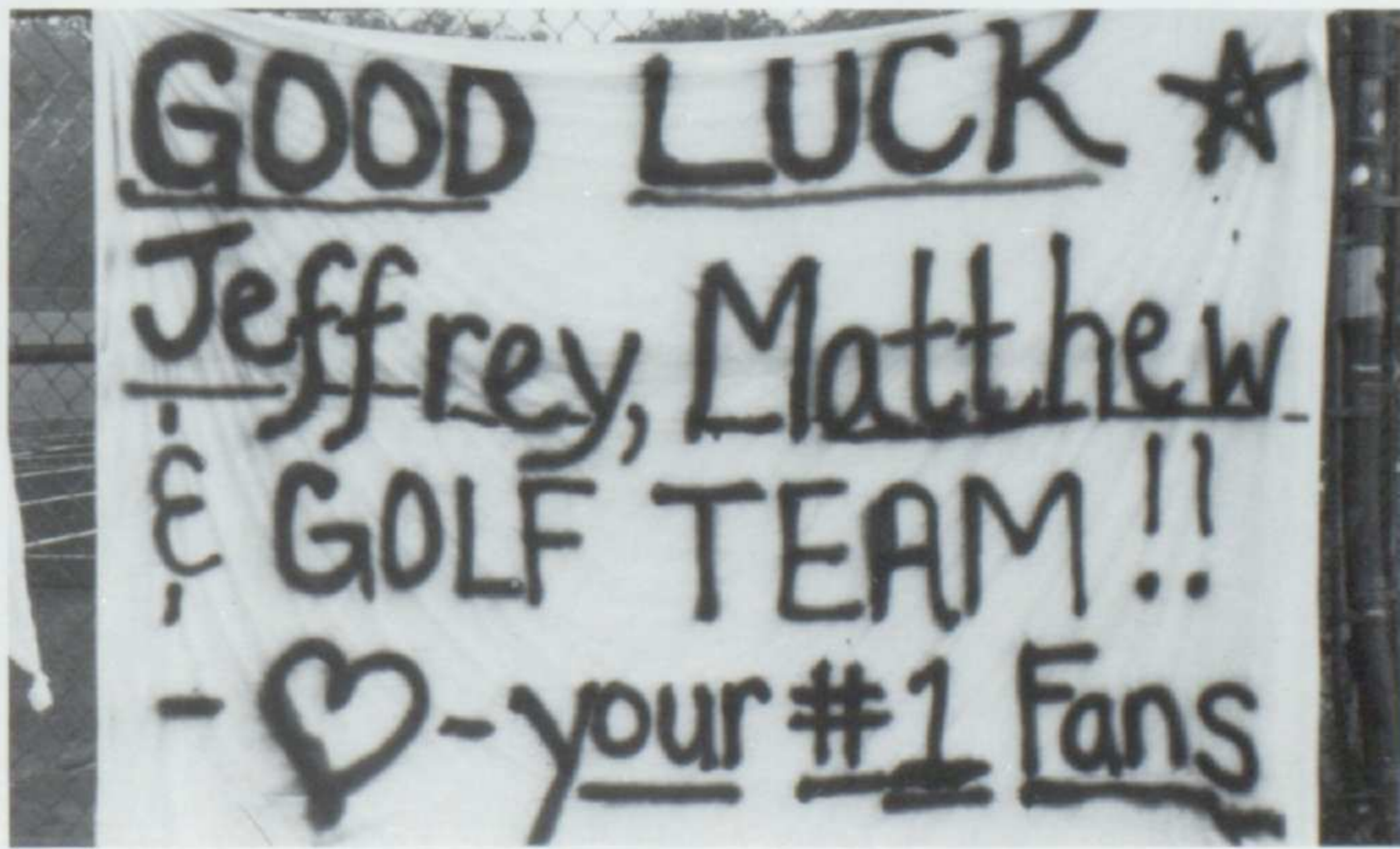

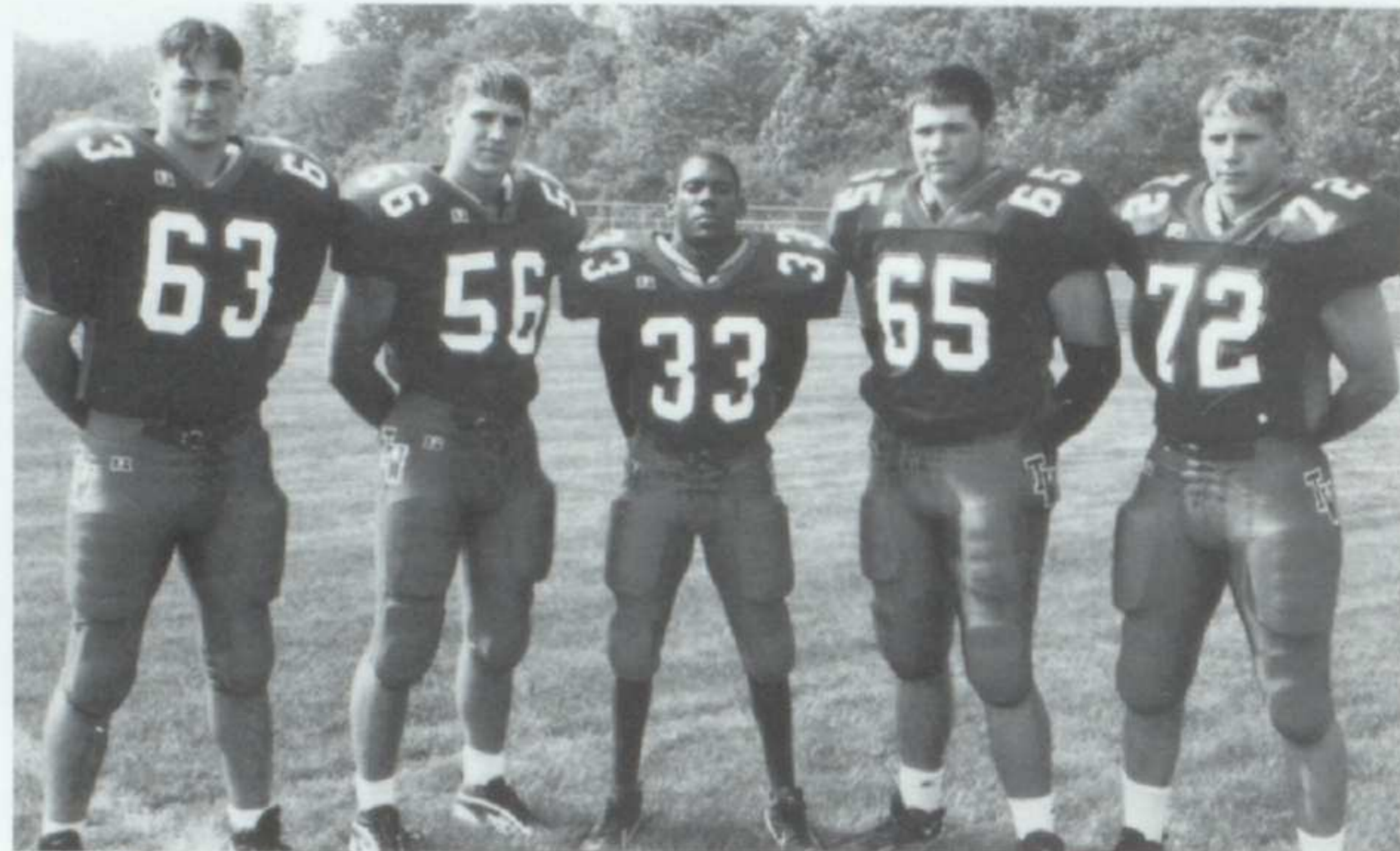
Football

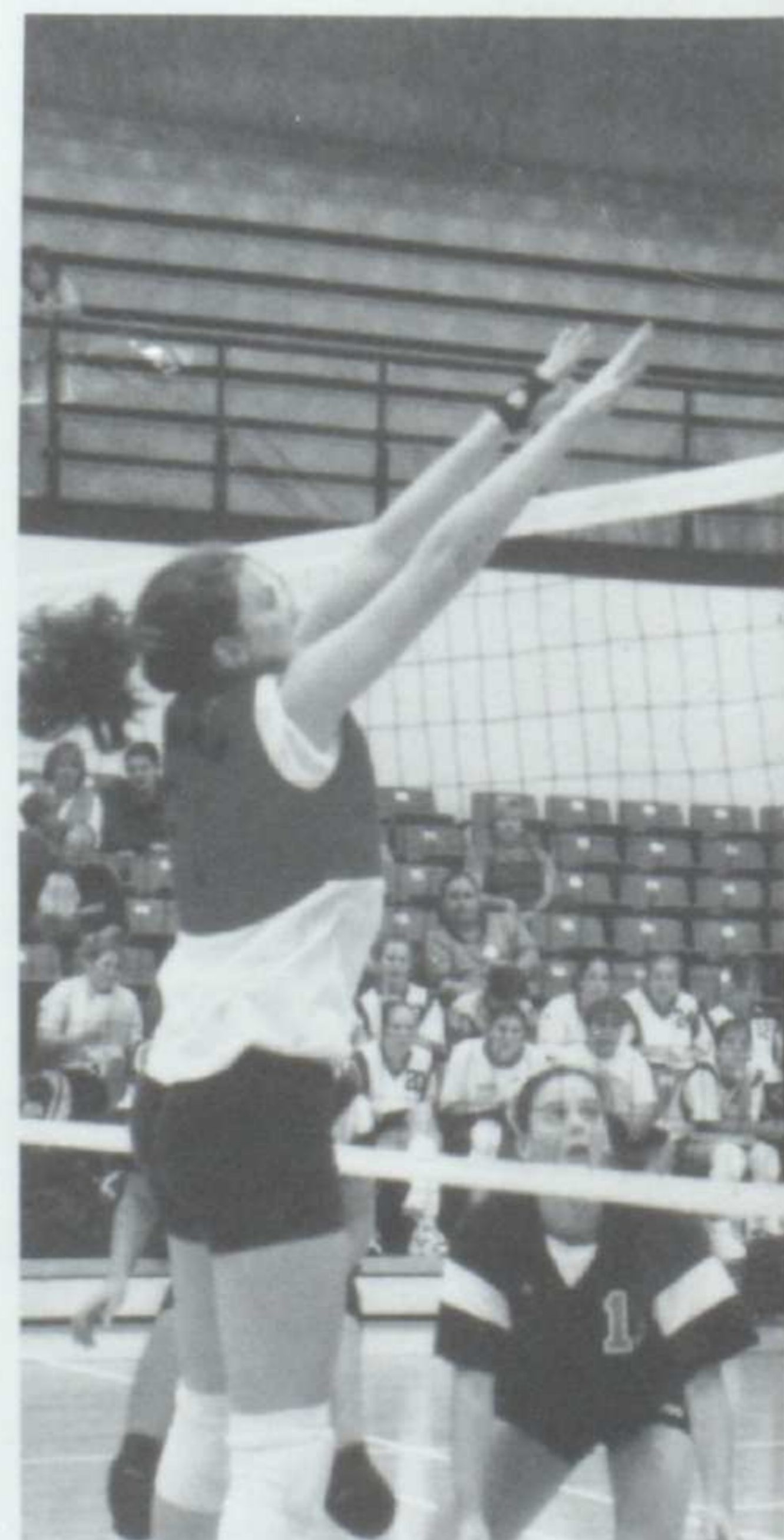

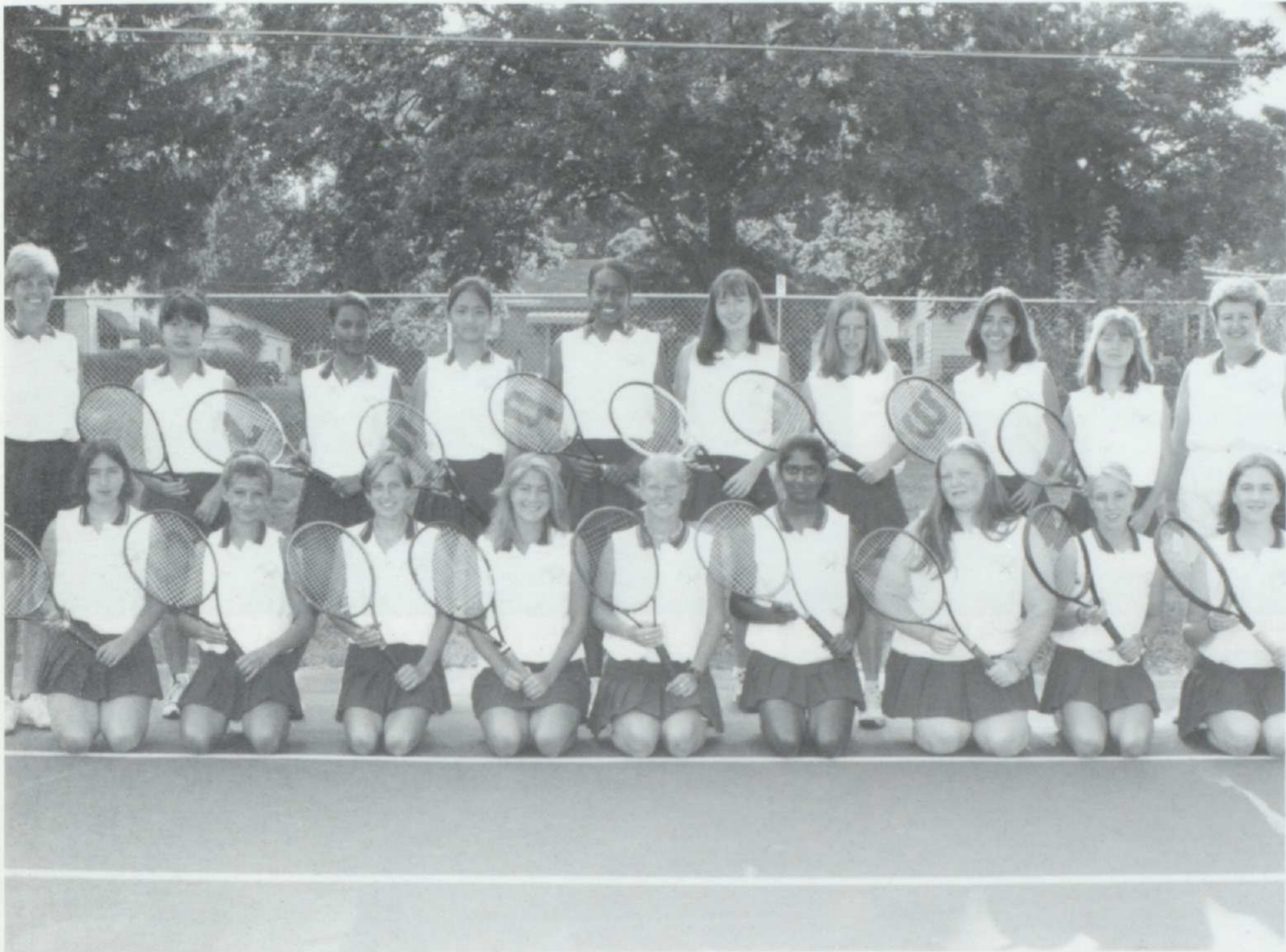

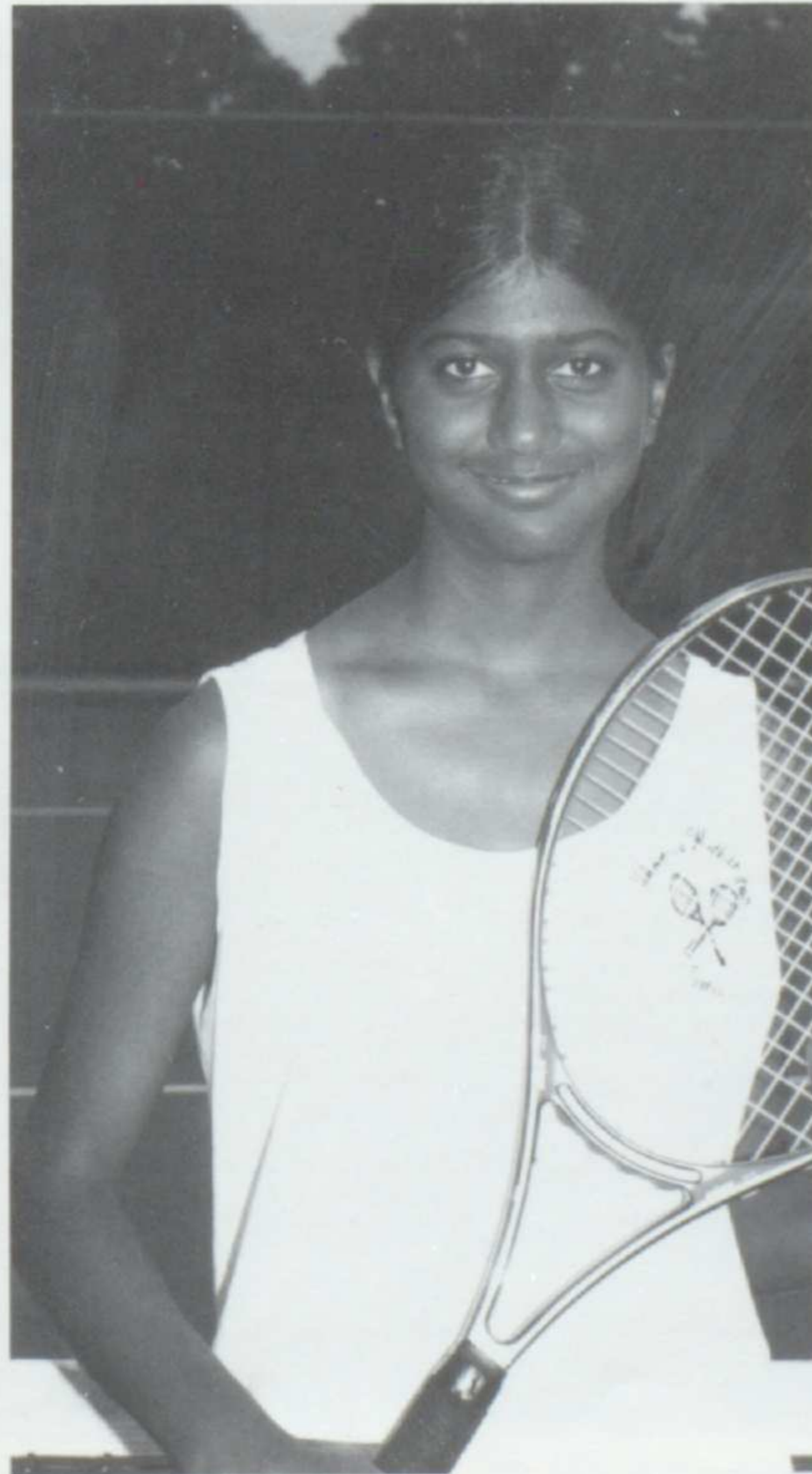

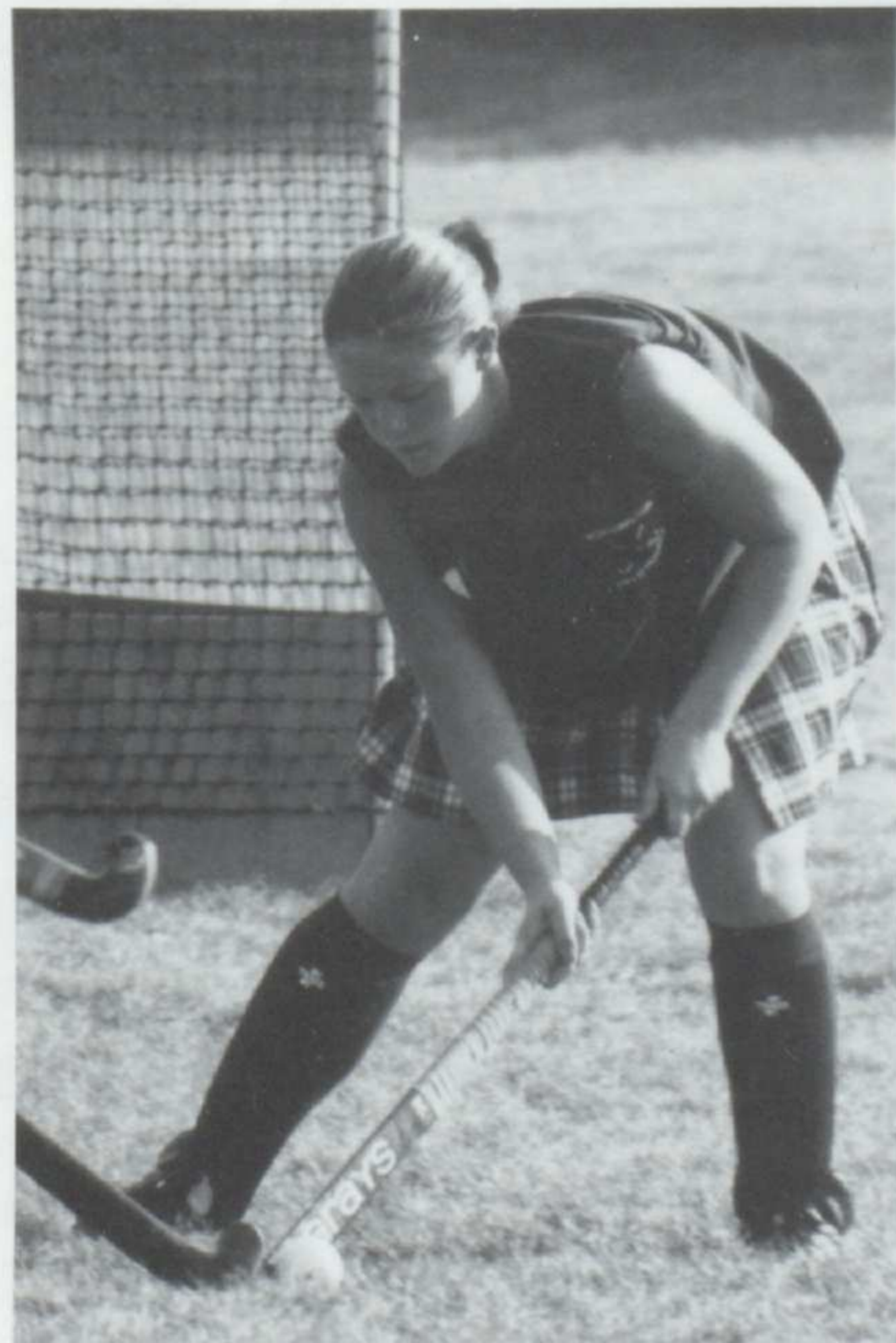

Cheerleading

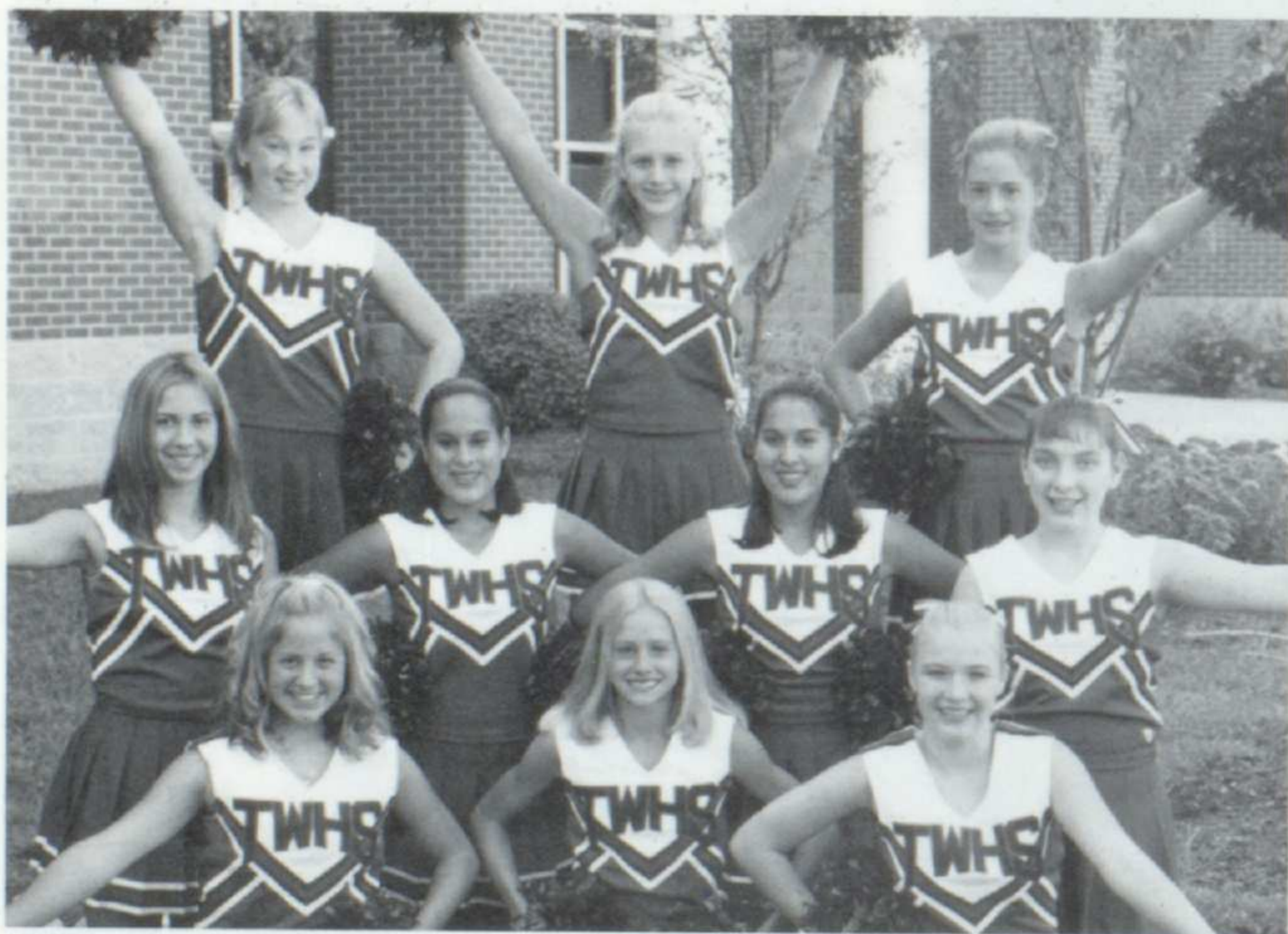

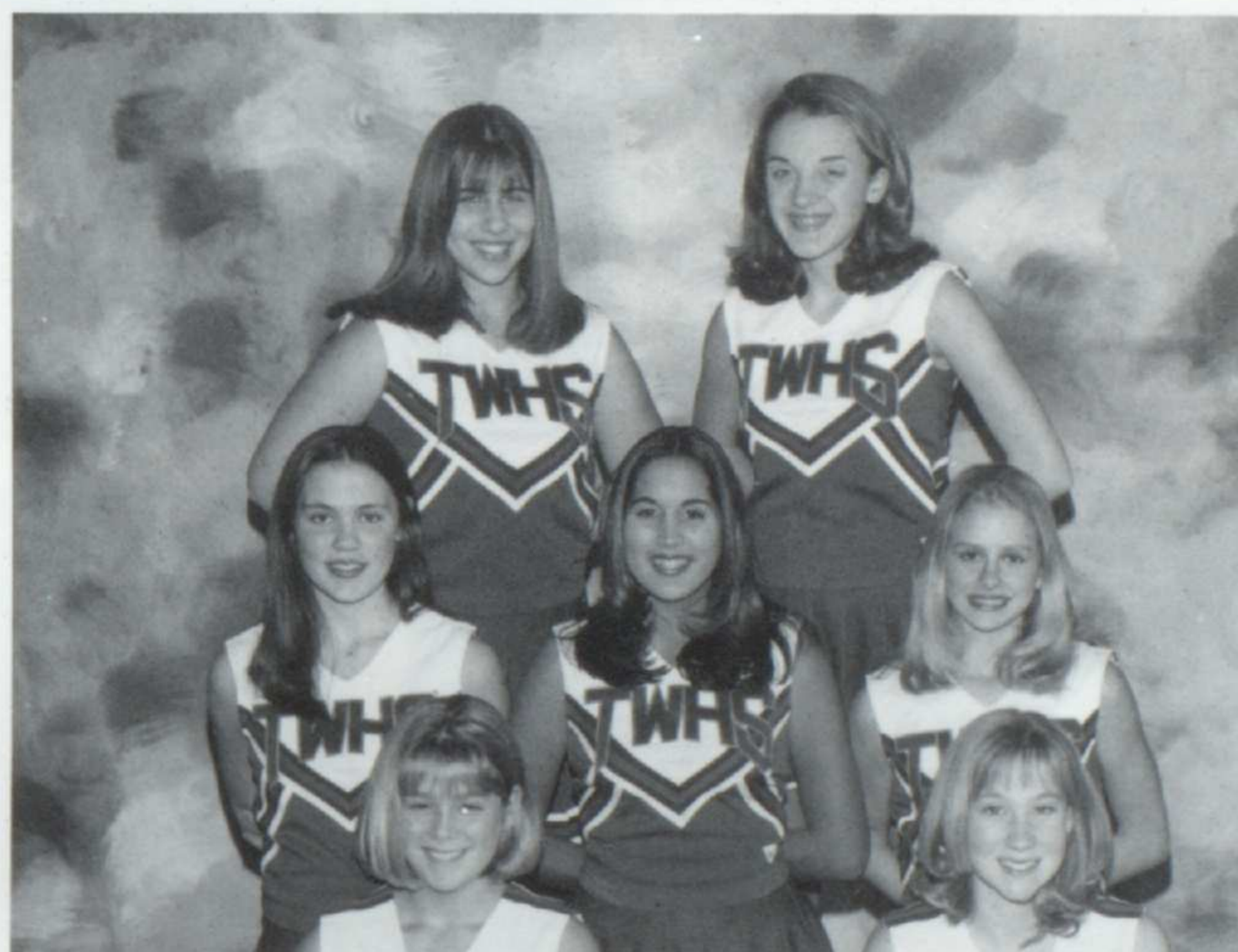

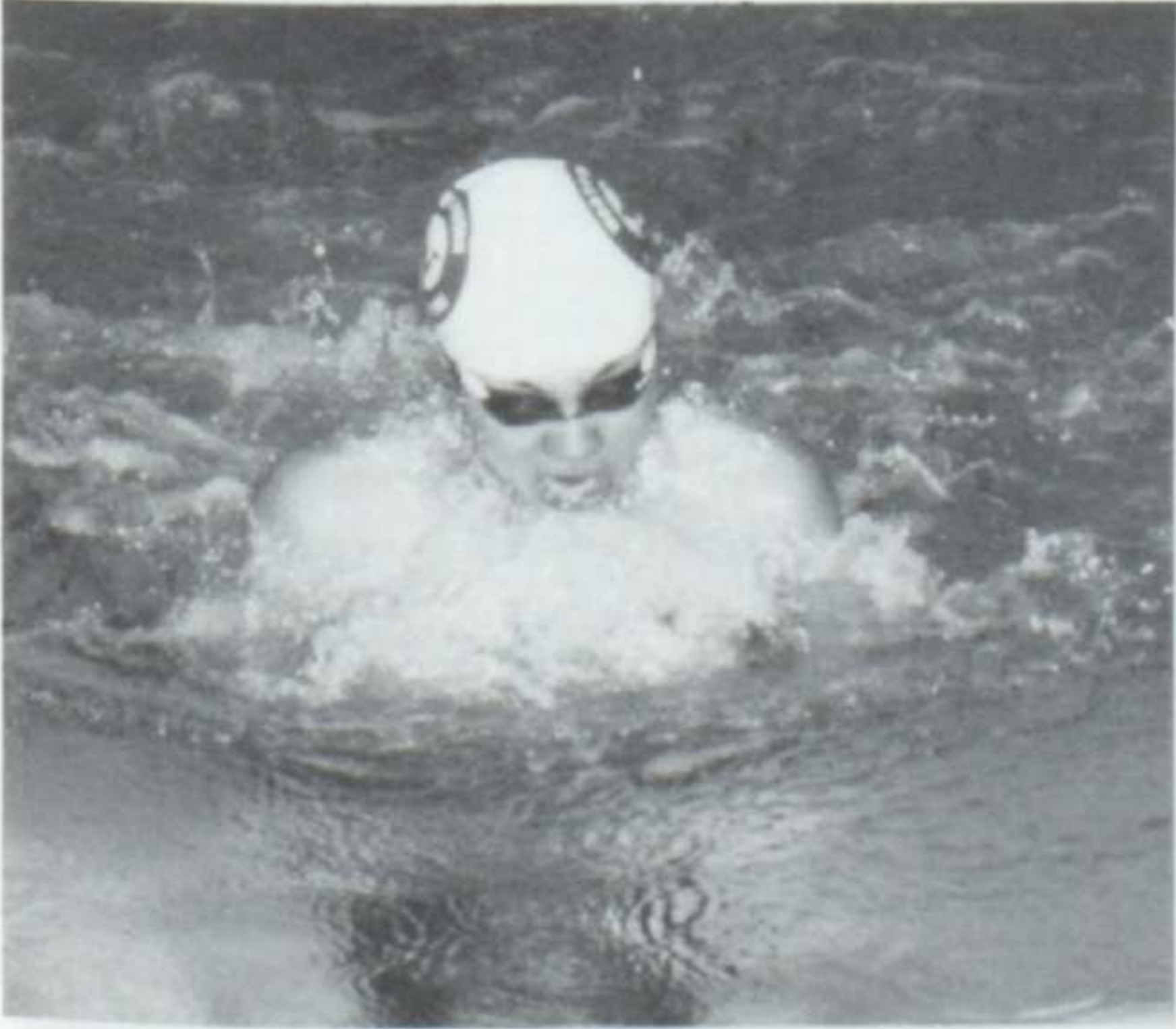

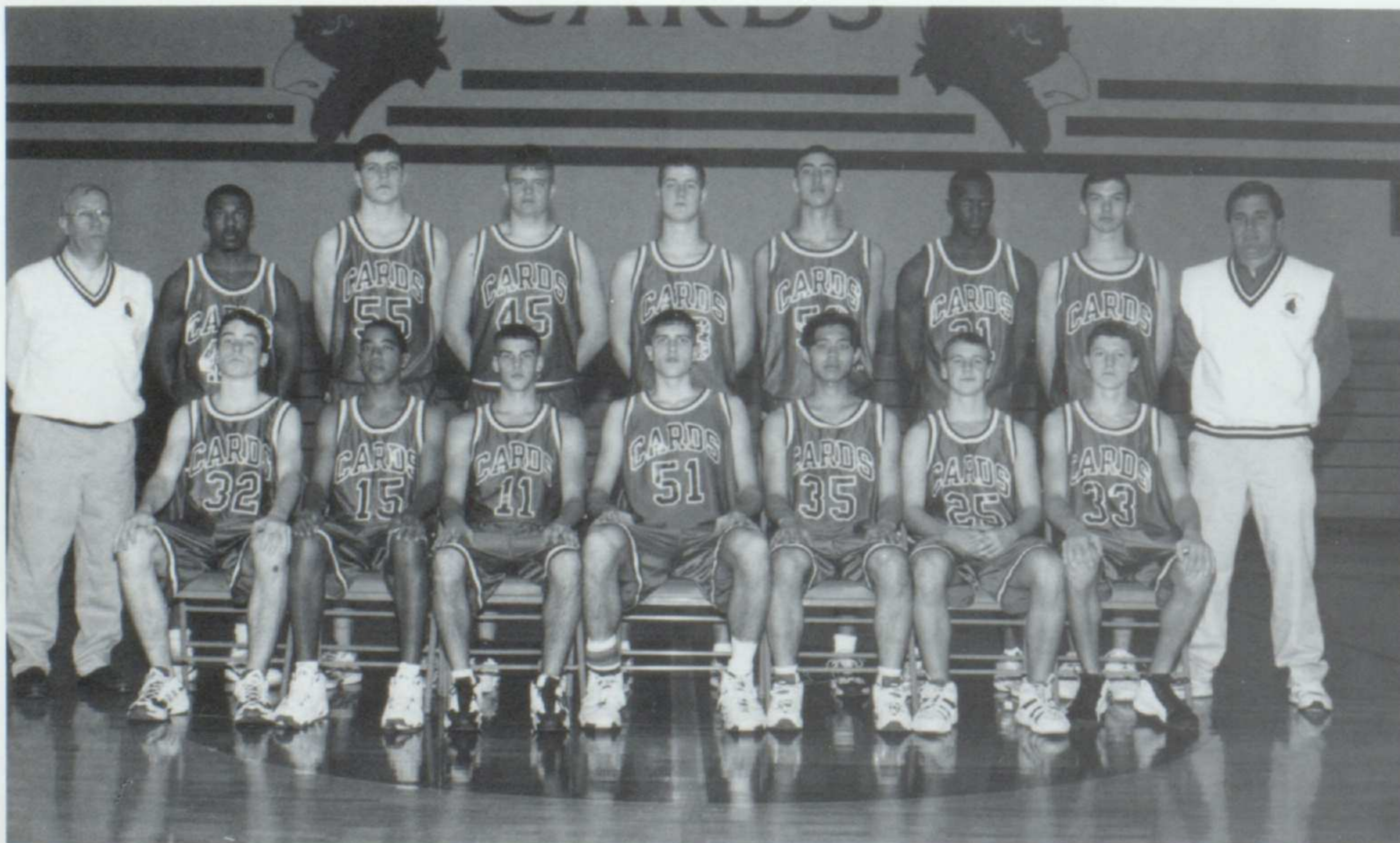

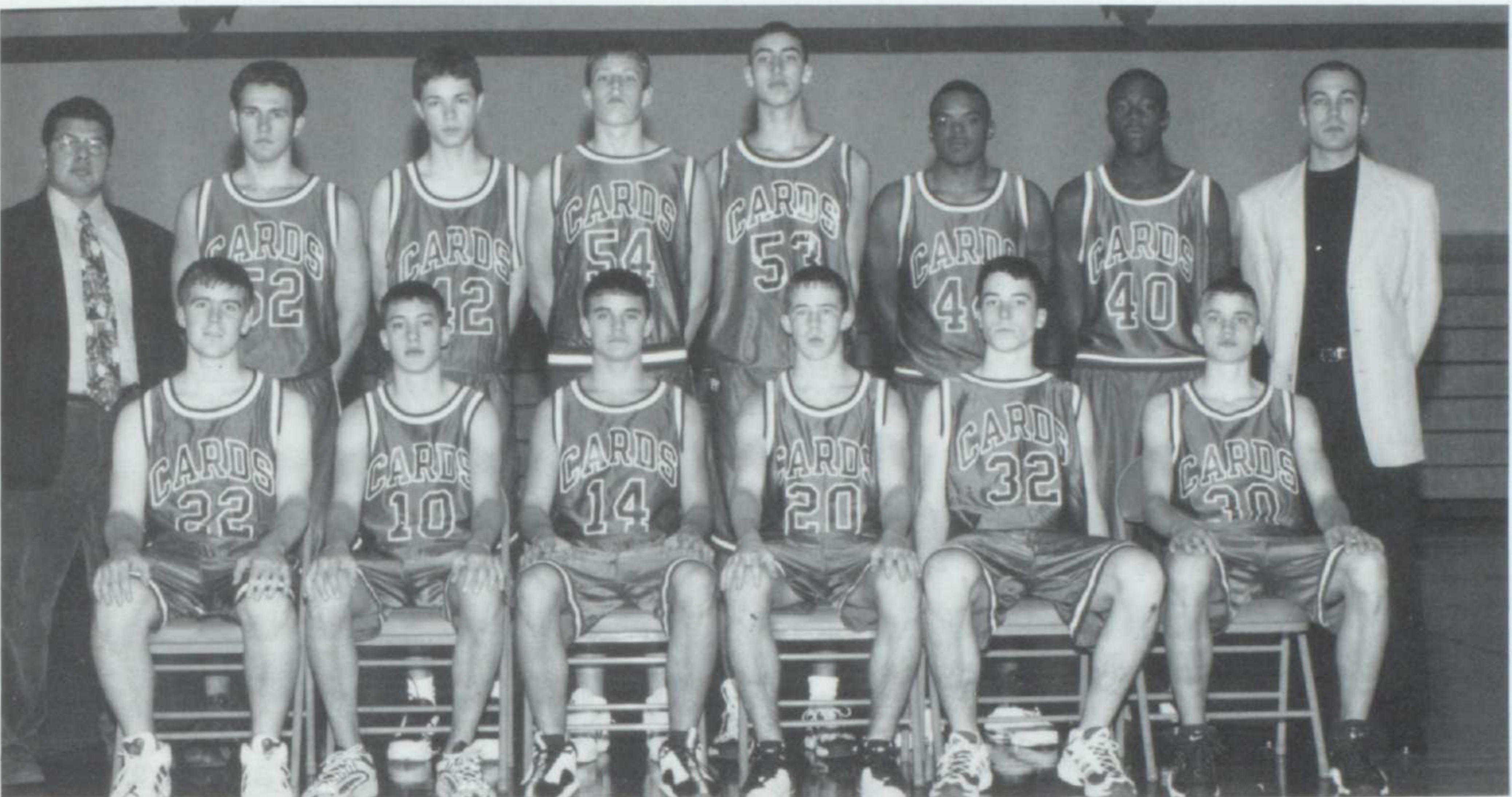

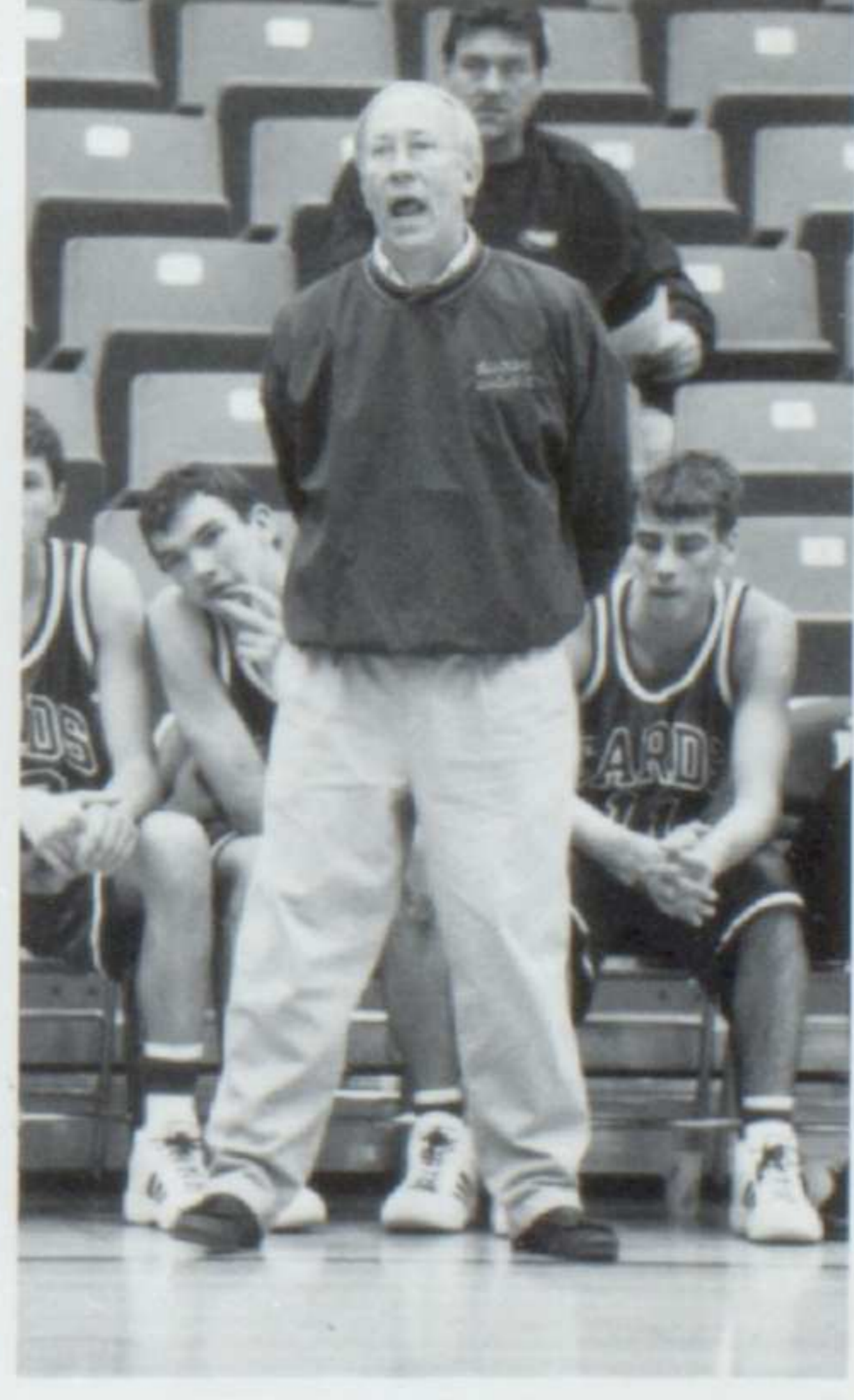

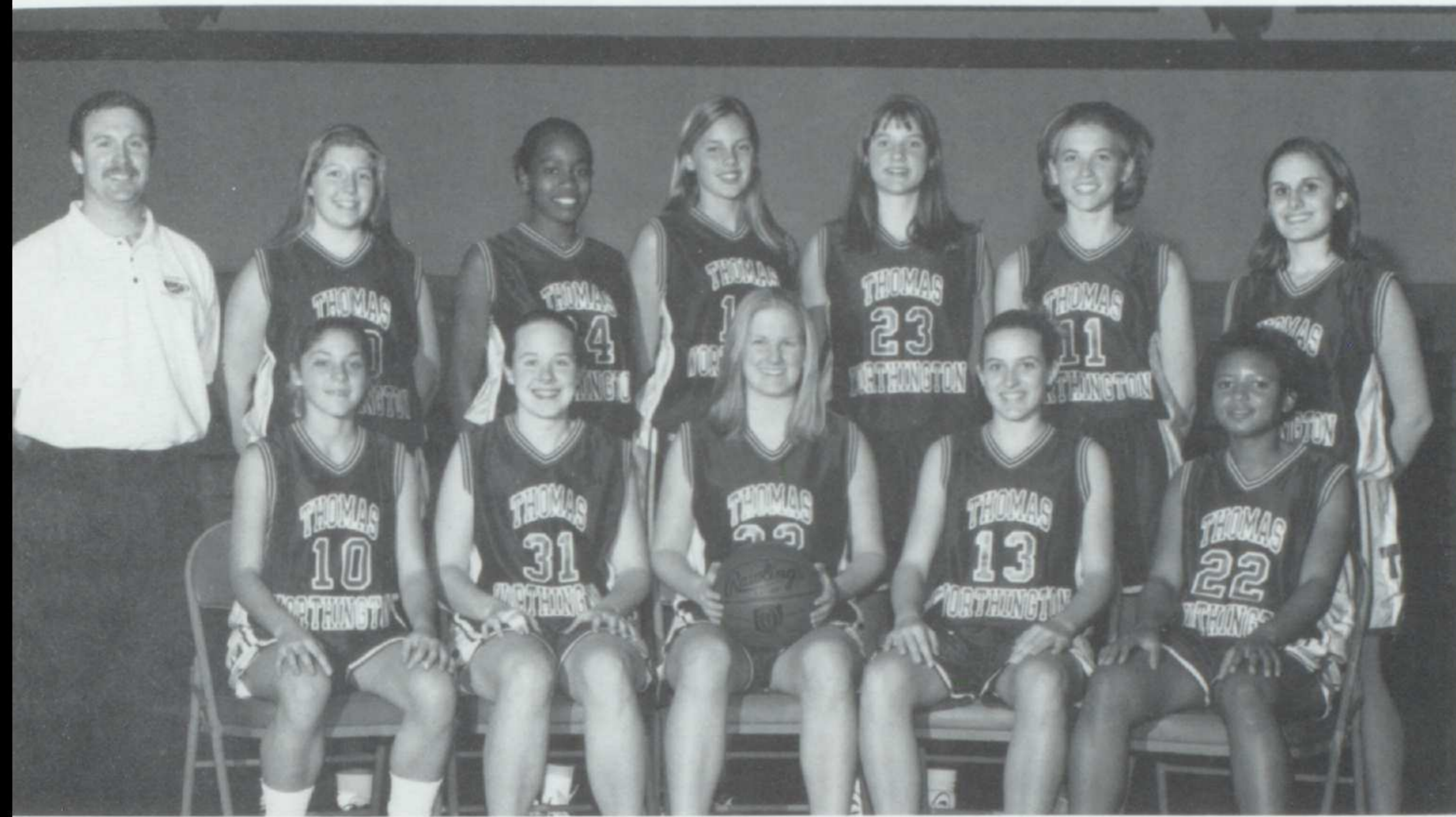

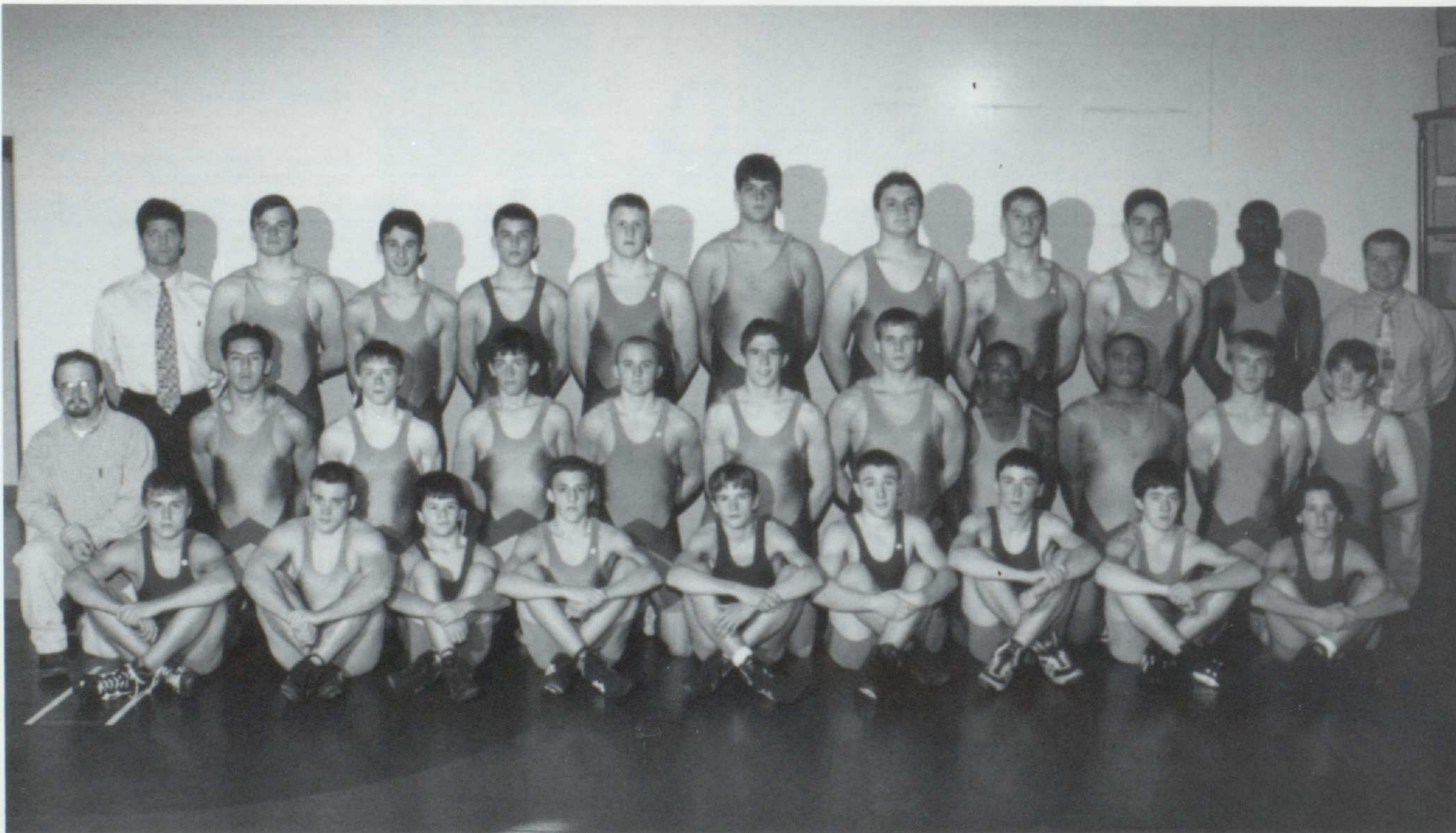
Thomas Worthington has always had a strong wrestling program.

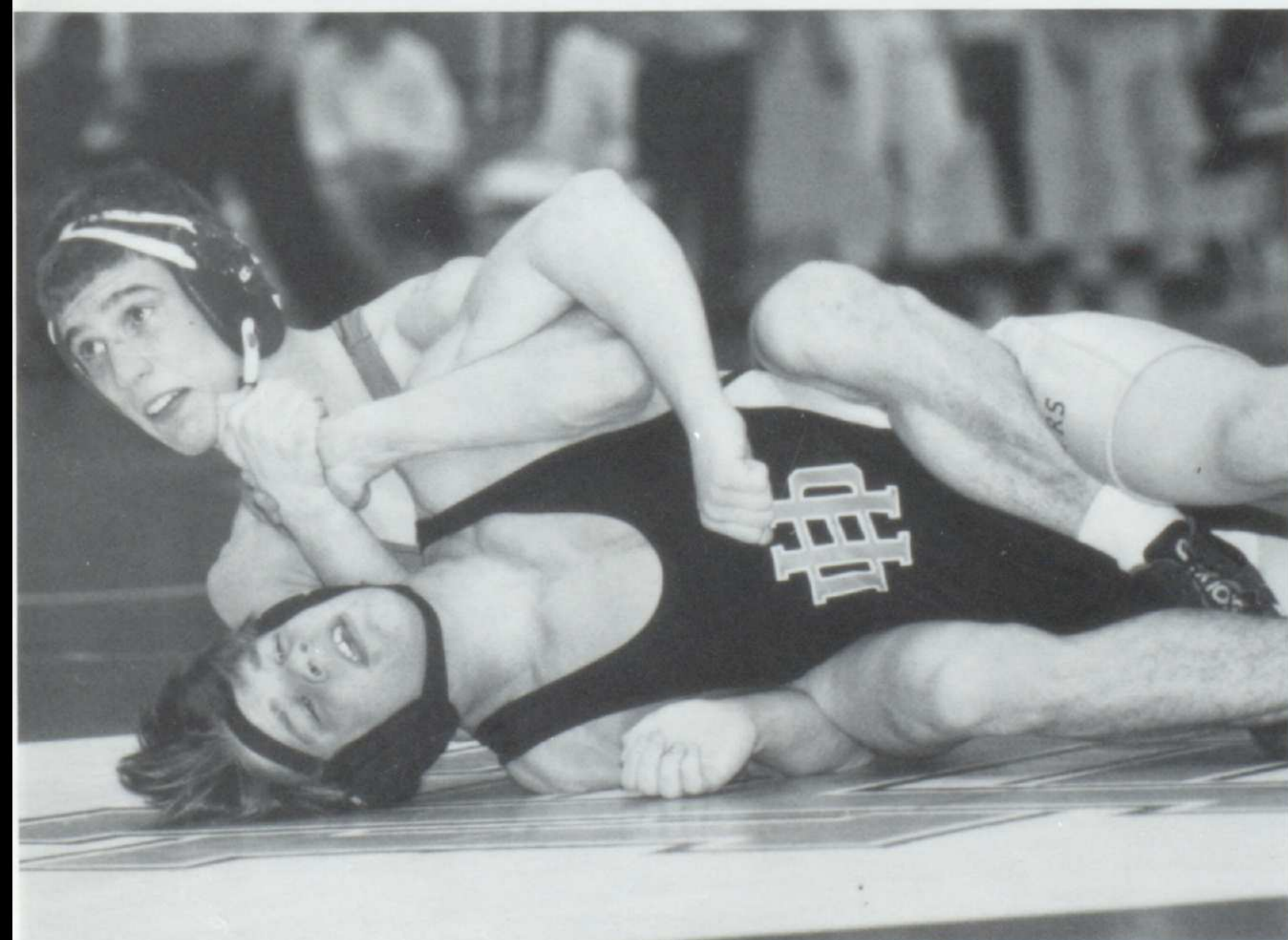

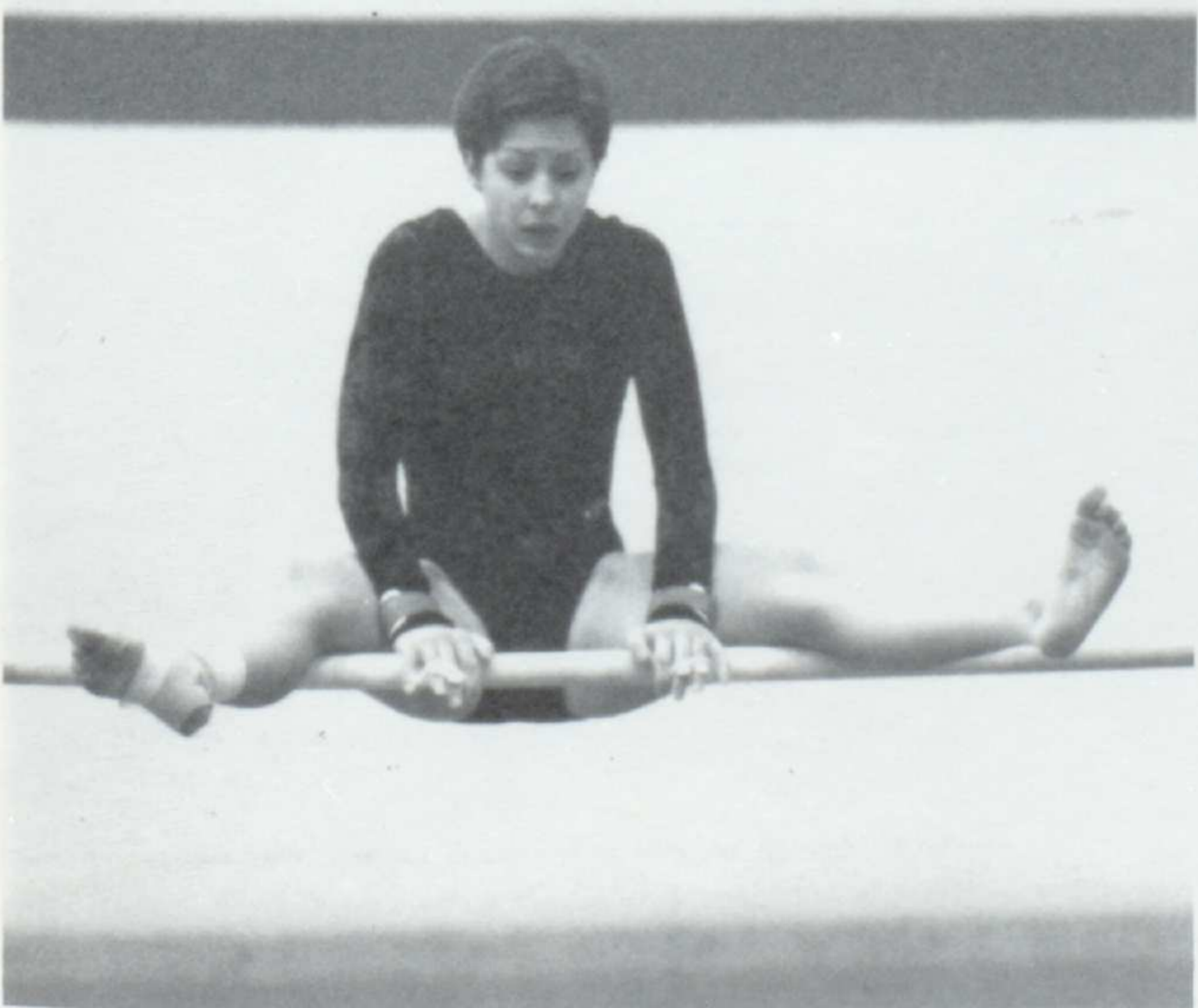
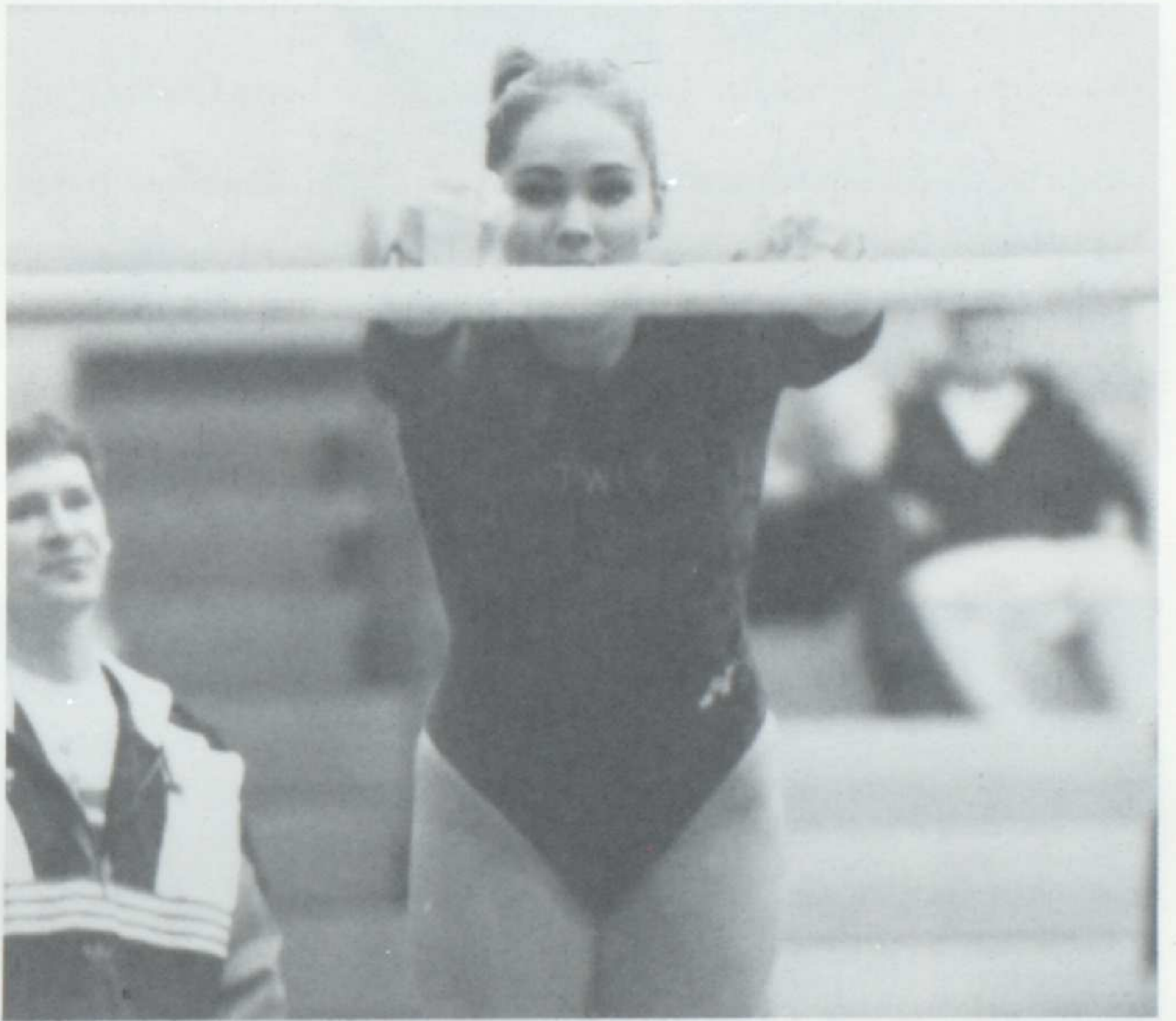

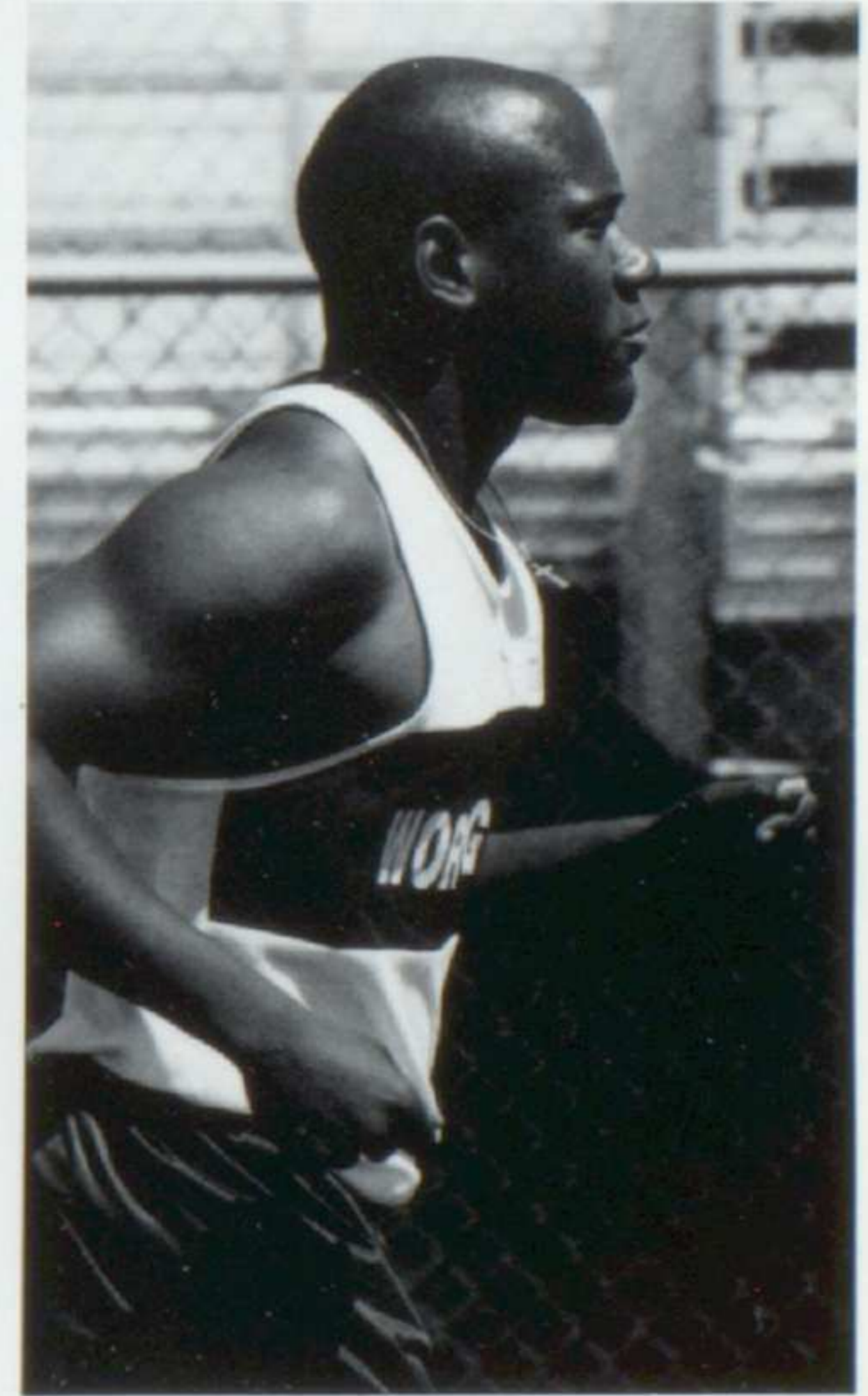

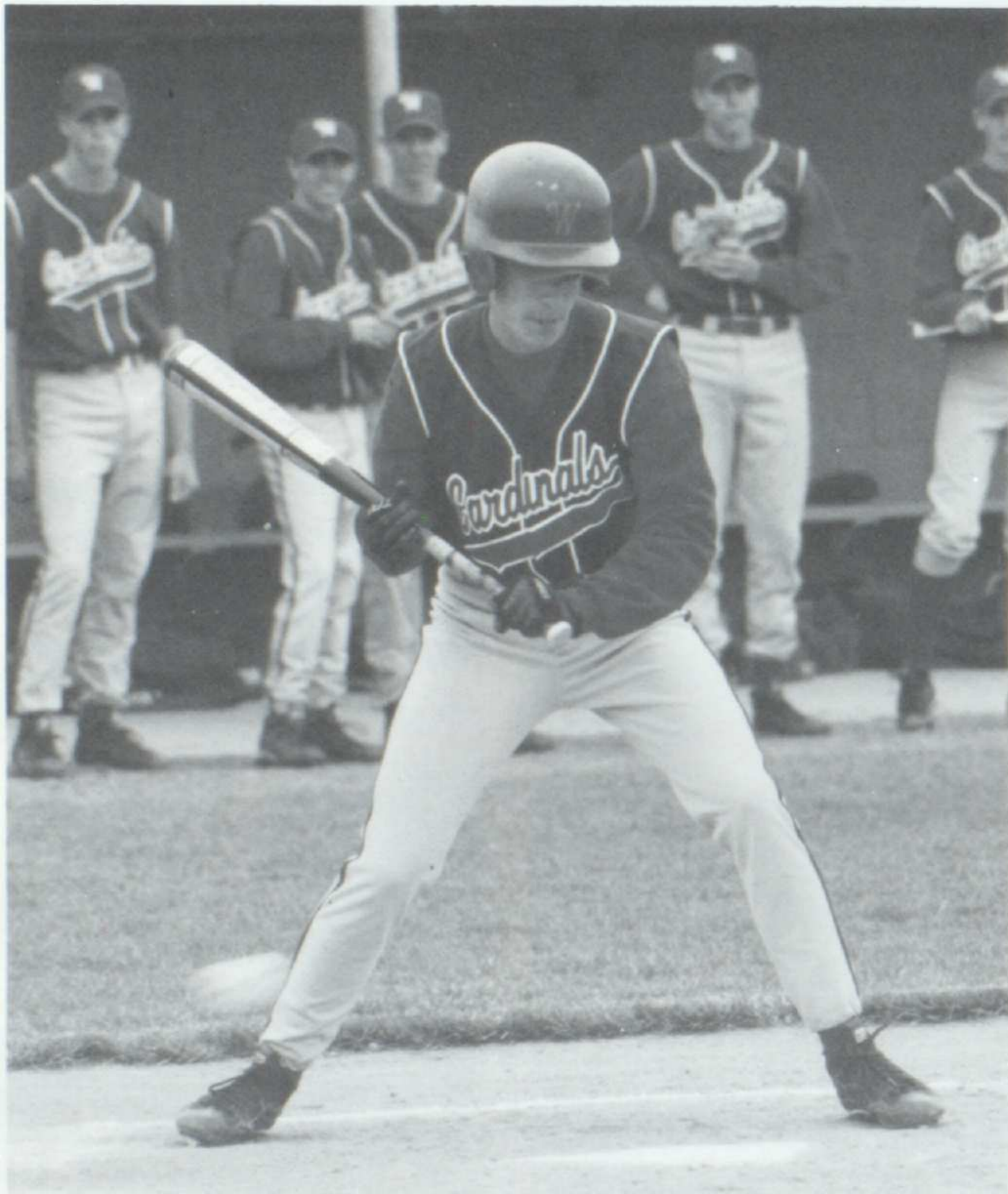

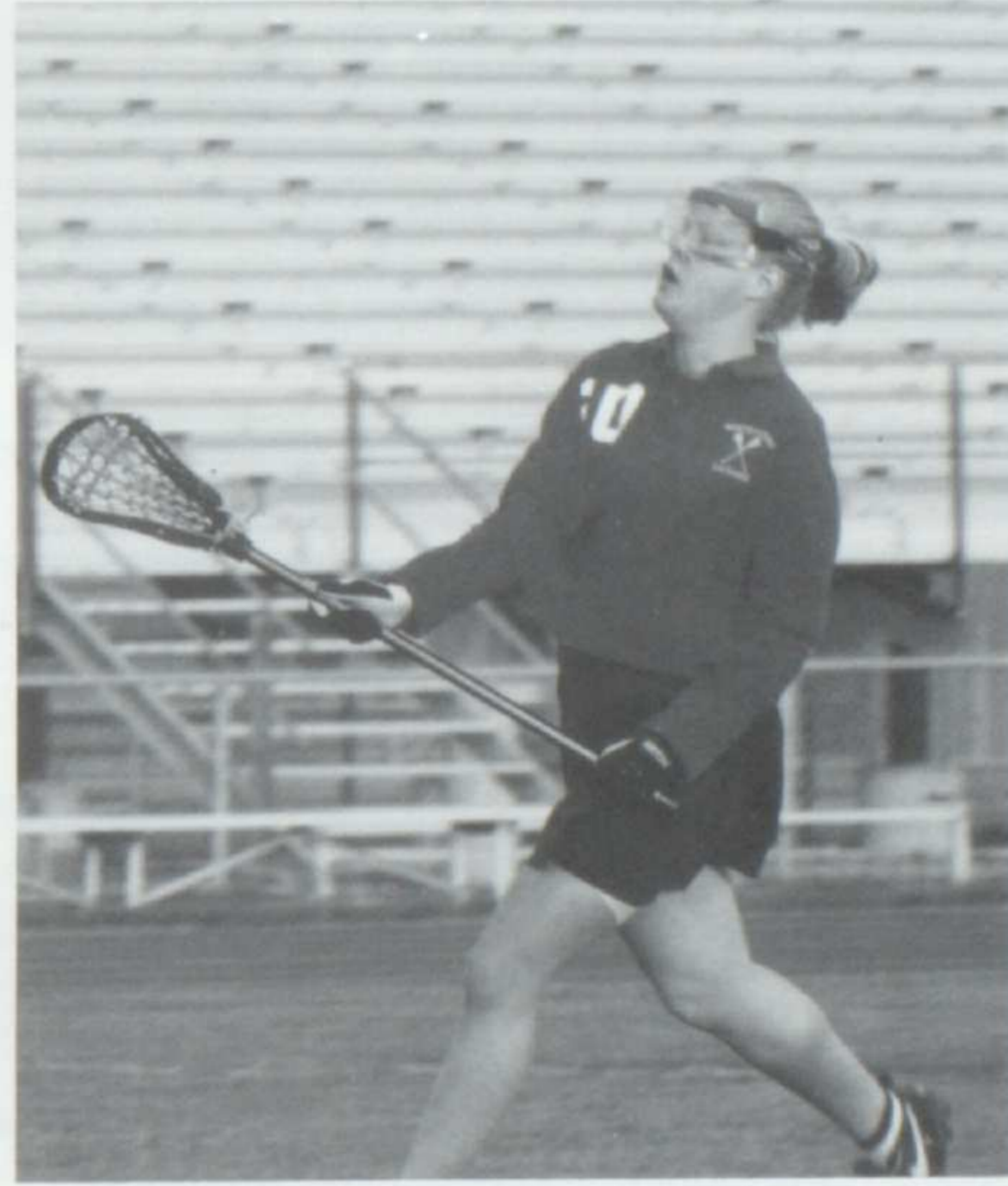

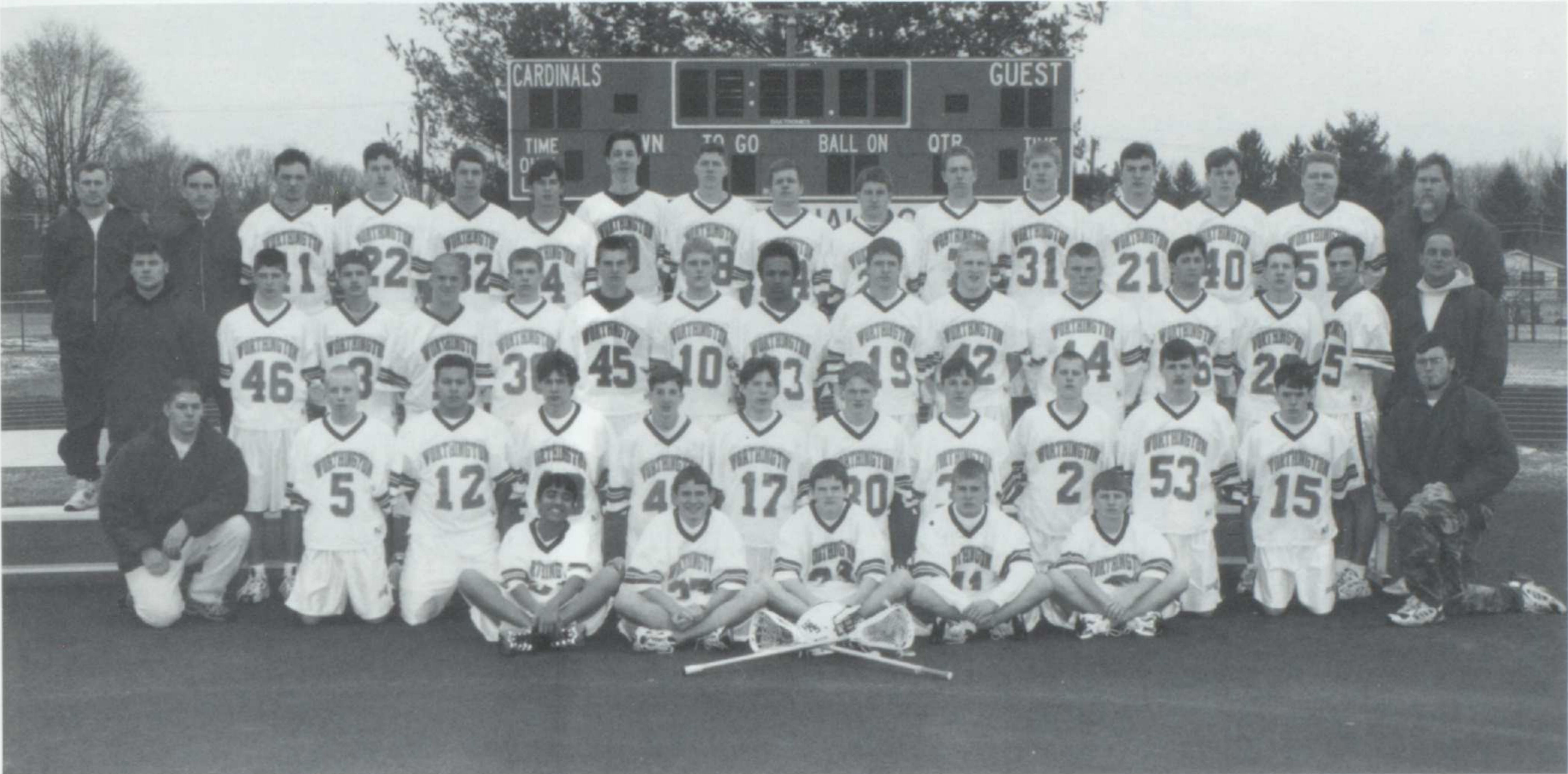

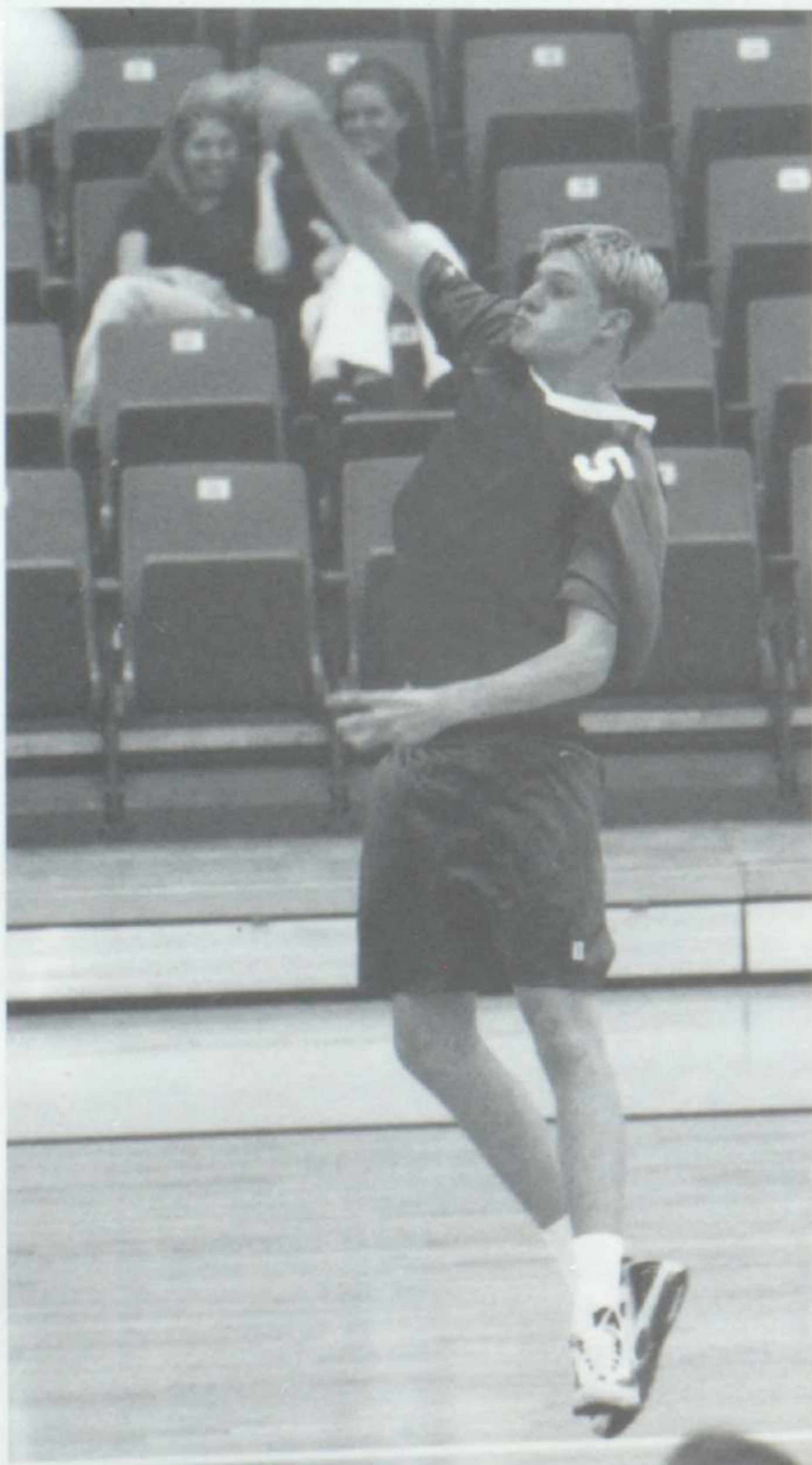

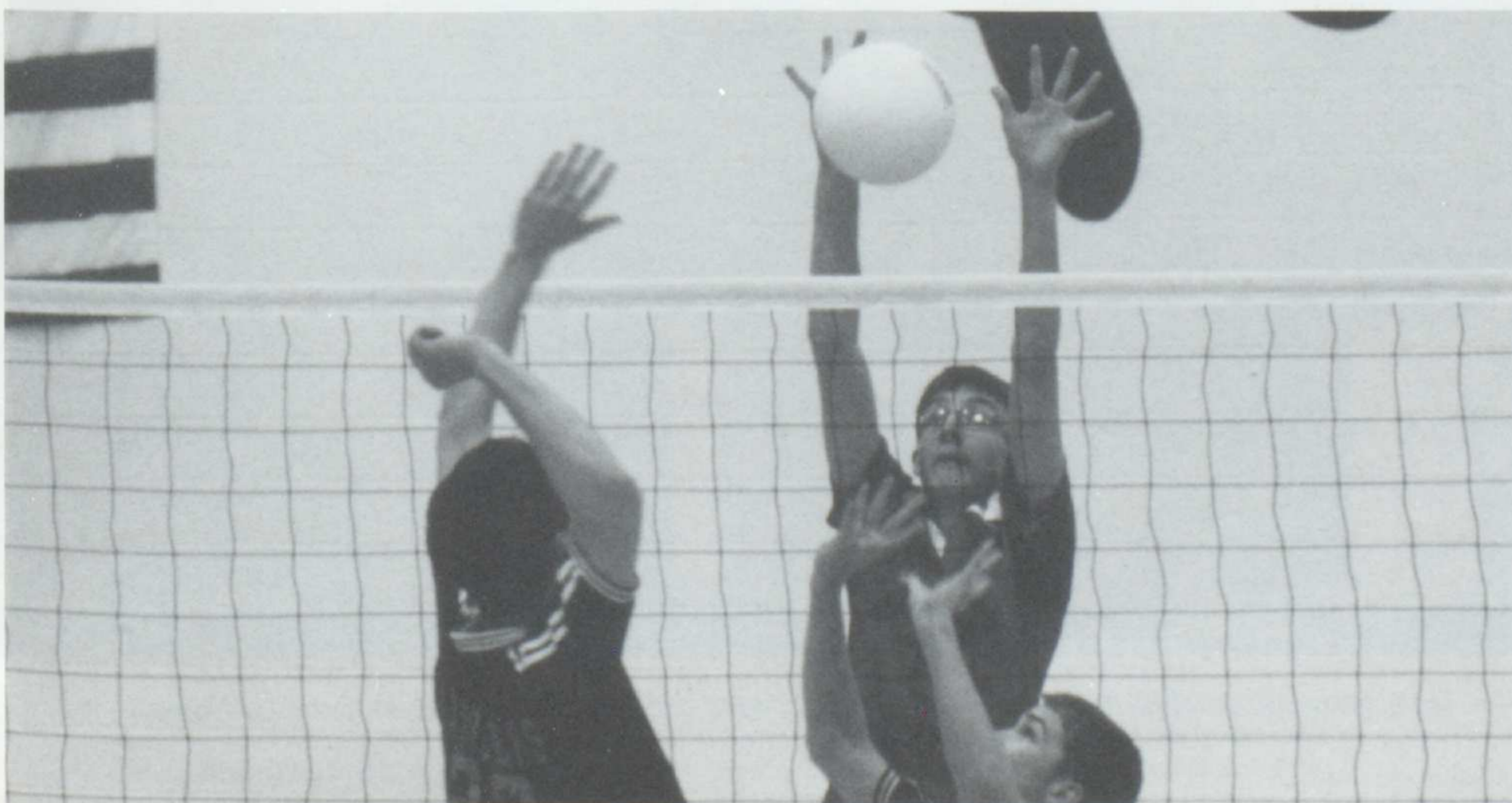

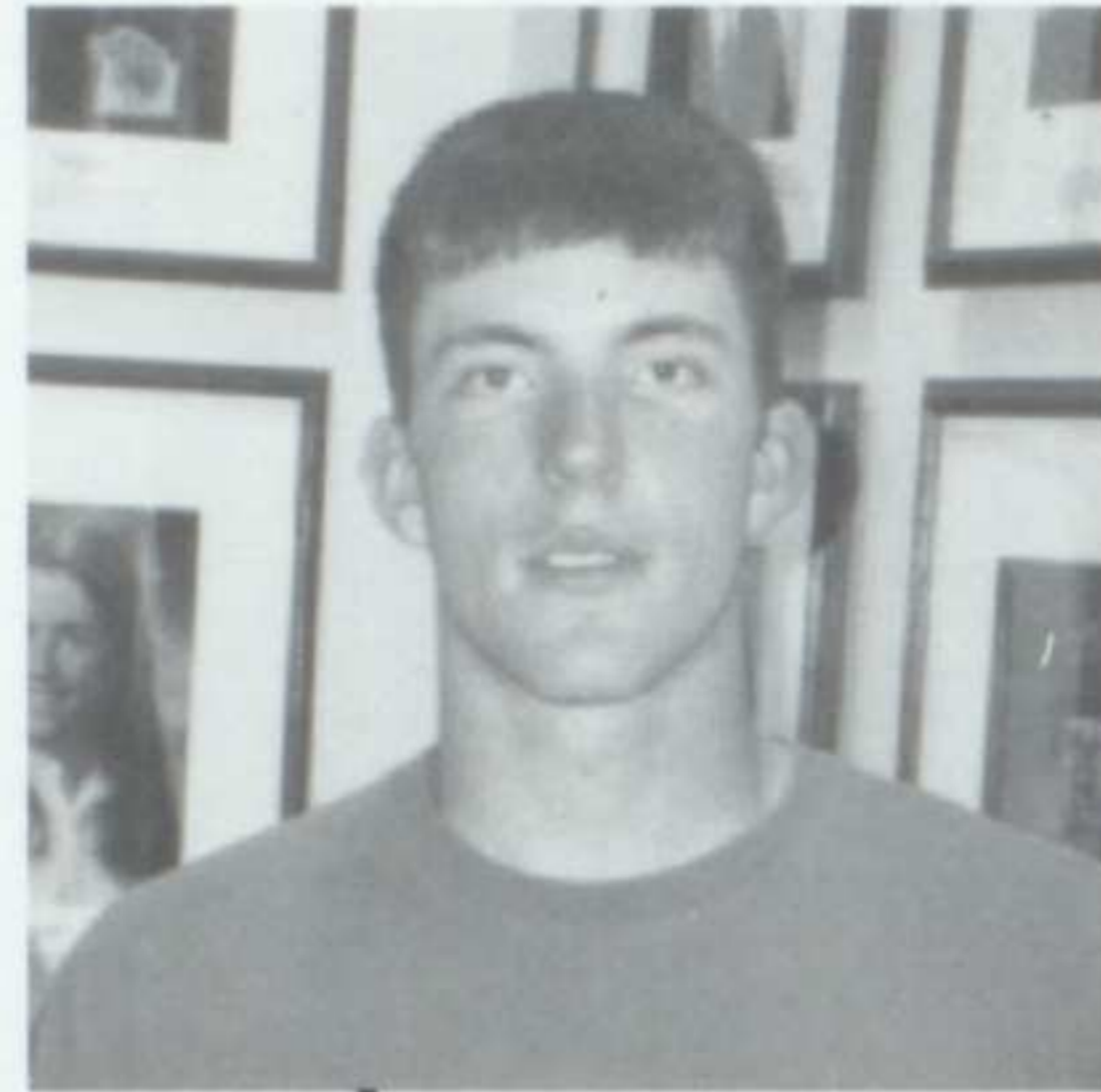


Boys Tennis

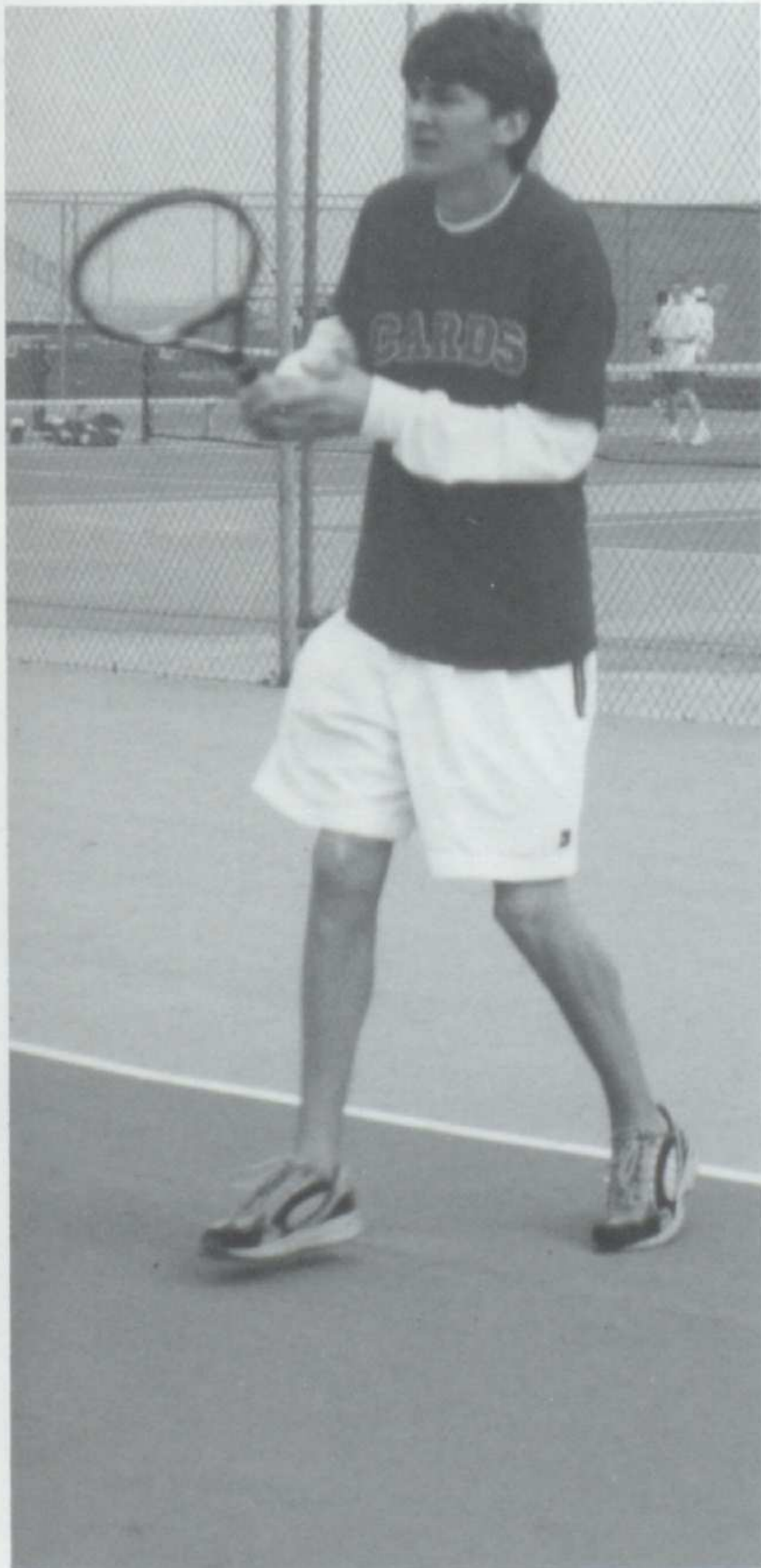

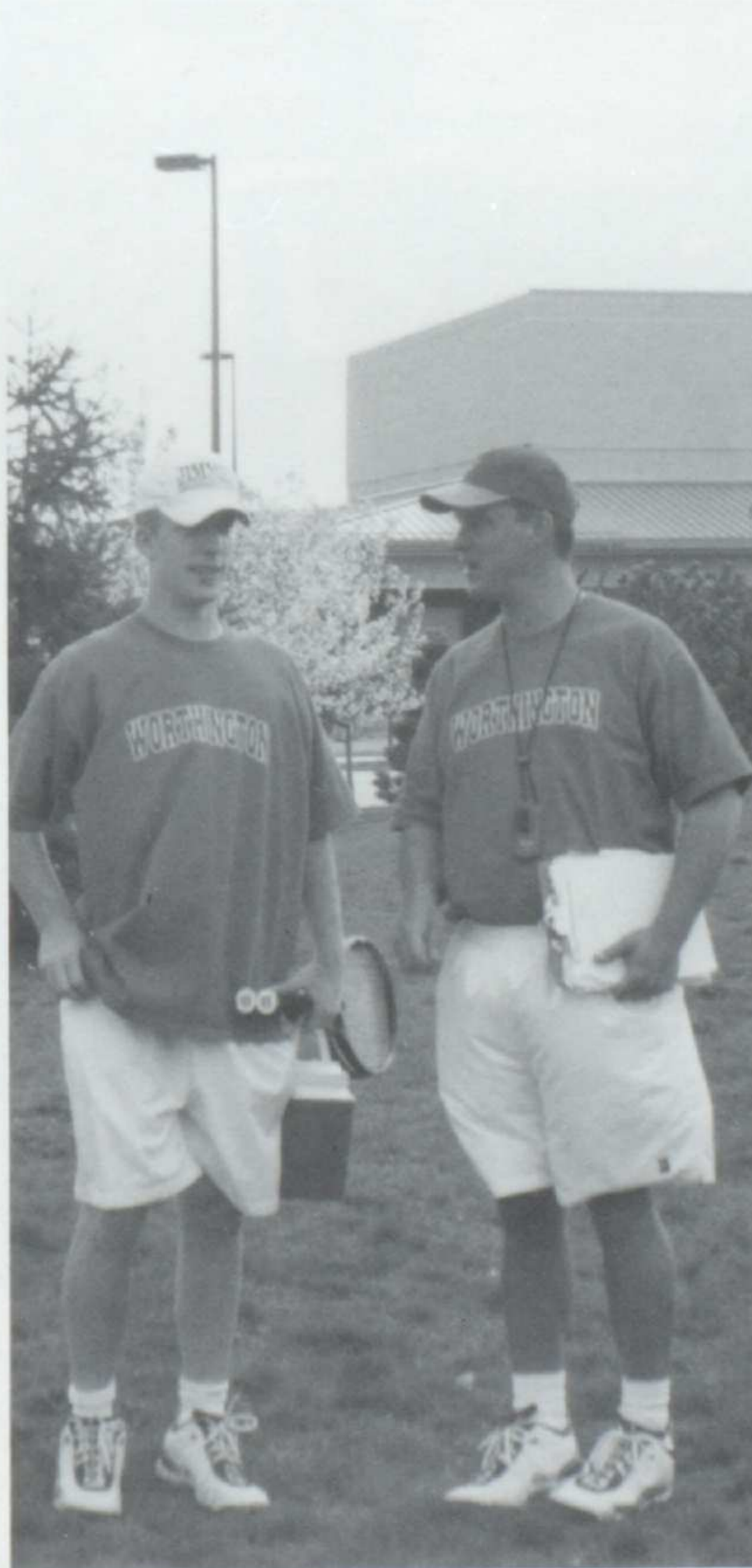

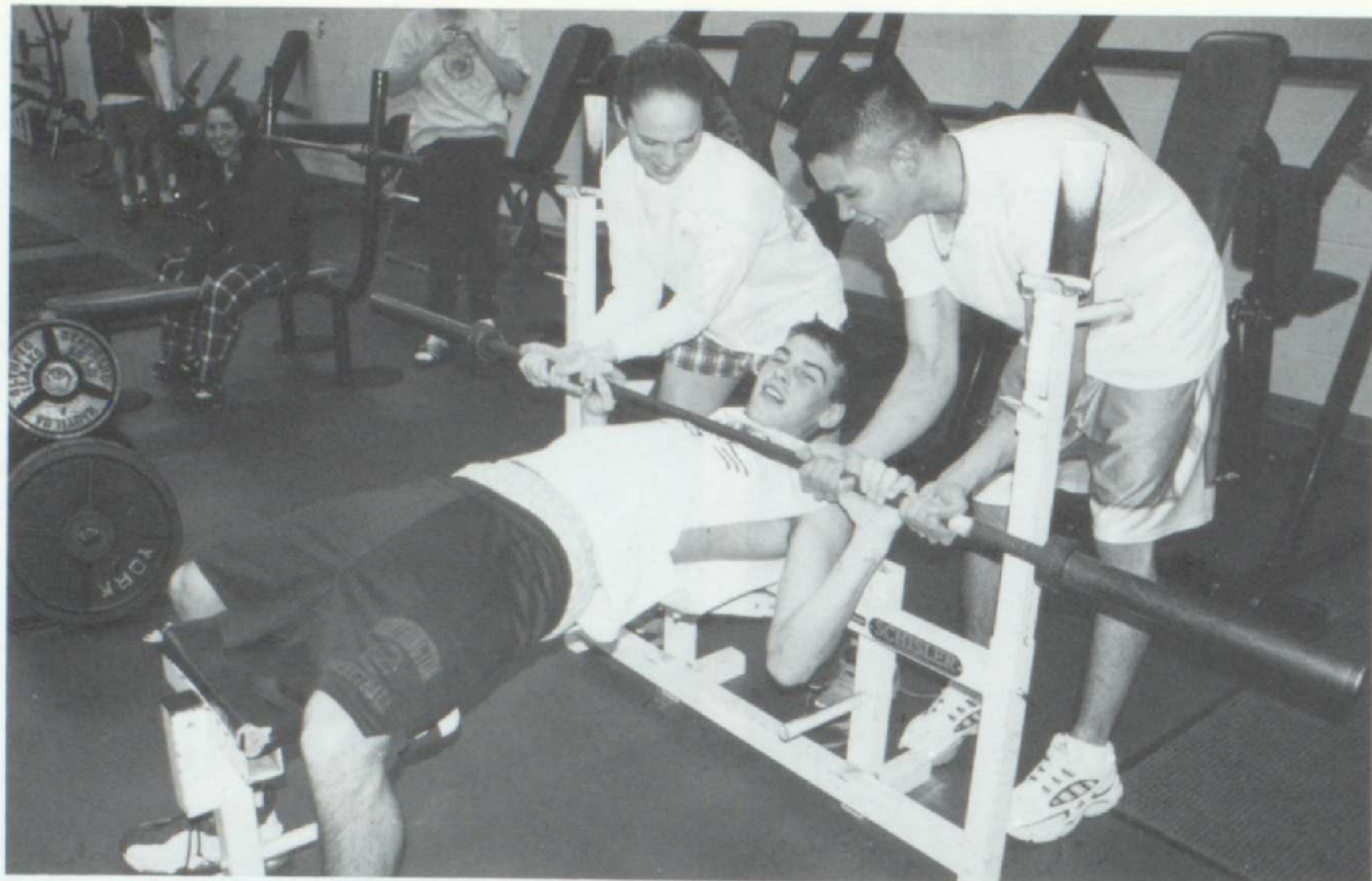

Linworth

The Linworth Alternative Program, commonly referred to as the AP, displays an environment that most students at Thomas Worthington High School have never before understood. This small school is home to approximately one hundred students who seek a more artistic and creative approach to education. Inside the Linworth building the walls are decorated with artwork and posters. The lockers are covered with painted boards on which each student has the opportunity to reflect their individuality by displaying drawings, paintings, magazine clippings, and pictures. The main room, or "Big Room", is also decorated with artwork and provides a place for students to relax, study, read or socialize.

Aside from appearance, there are other ways that the Alternative Program is unique. The absence of locks on the student lockers teaches each person to trust and respect their peers. During school meetings, the students are given a chance to share their opinions on issues and complaints on campus which gives everyone the opportunity to get involved with the running of the school. The AP also provides students with flexible schedules and blocked classes. Each day involves four classes, instead of the traditional eight periods, which meet every other day. This allows students more hands-on time with their teachers and more free time during the school day.

The Linworth Program teaches students respect, individuality and responsibility in a more laid back environment. It's a place where students are given the chance to express themselves positively and be individuals without worrying what others think. "Linworth is cool because you can be who you are and no one will give you flak for it. They worry about what's important and not dumb little rules," explains Chris Palcsak, a Linworth student. The Alternative Program is a different and unique approach to education.

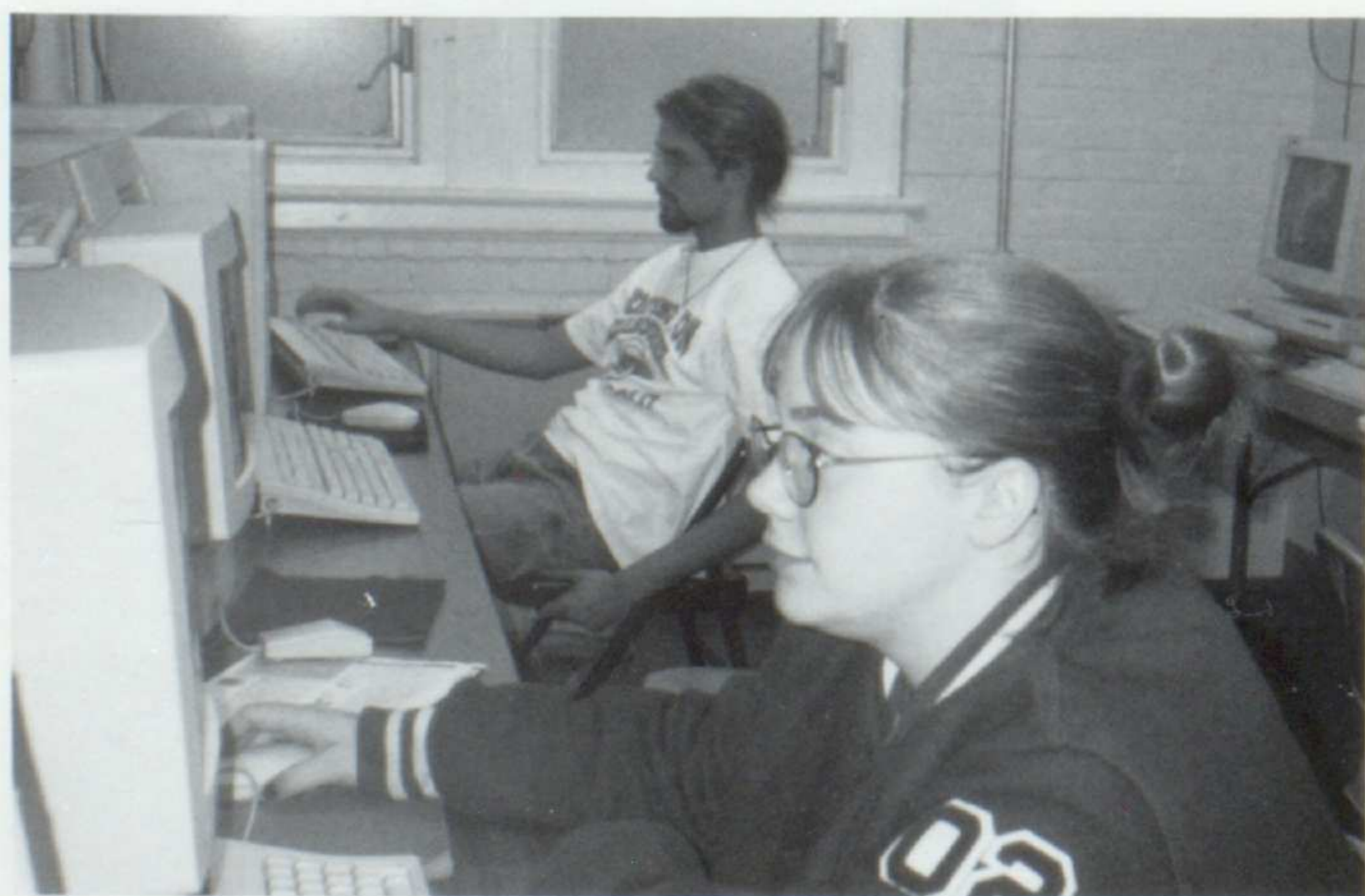
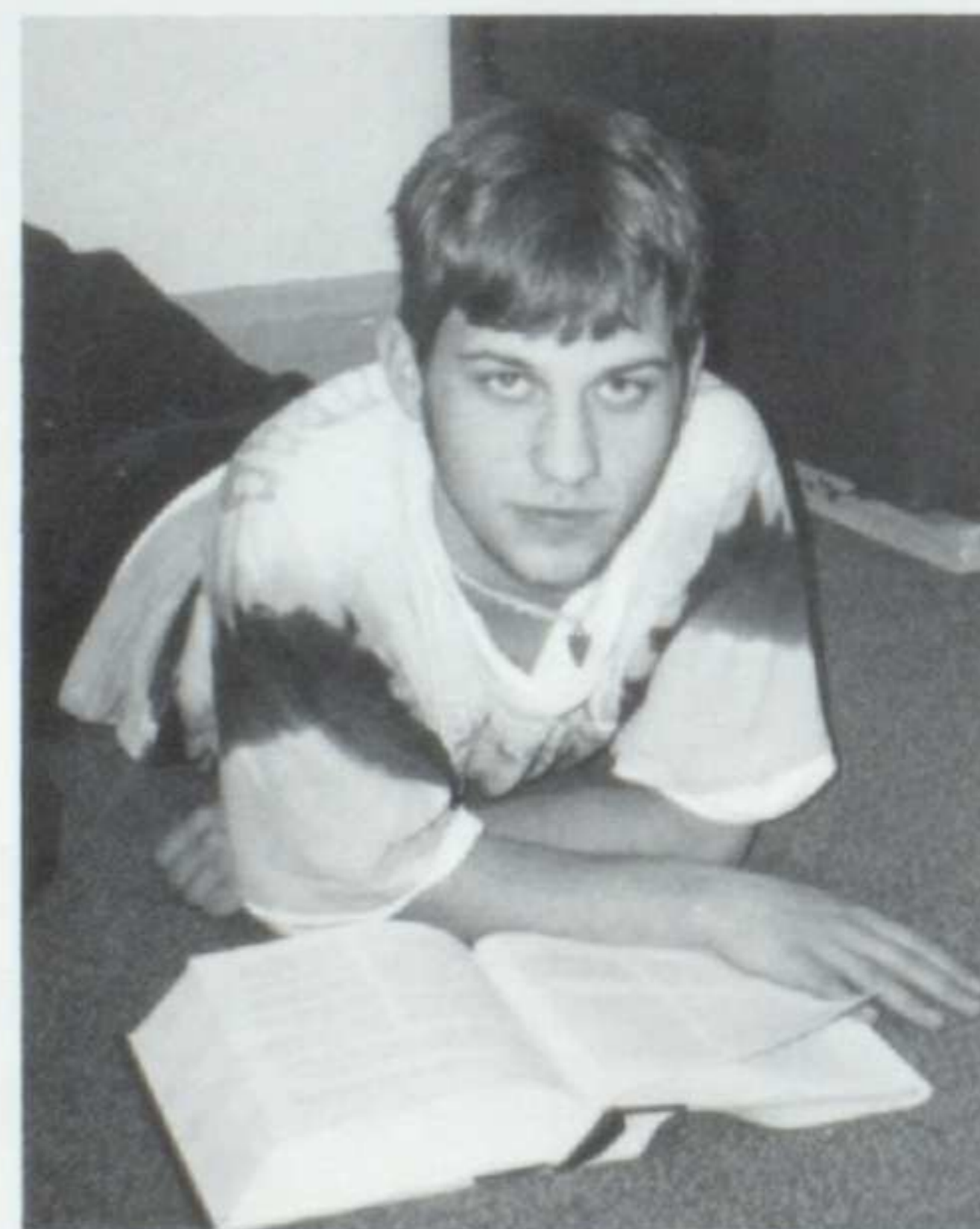

Happily Ever After

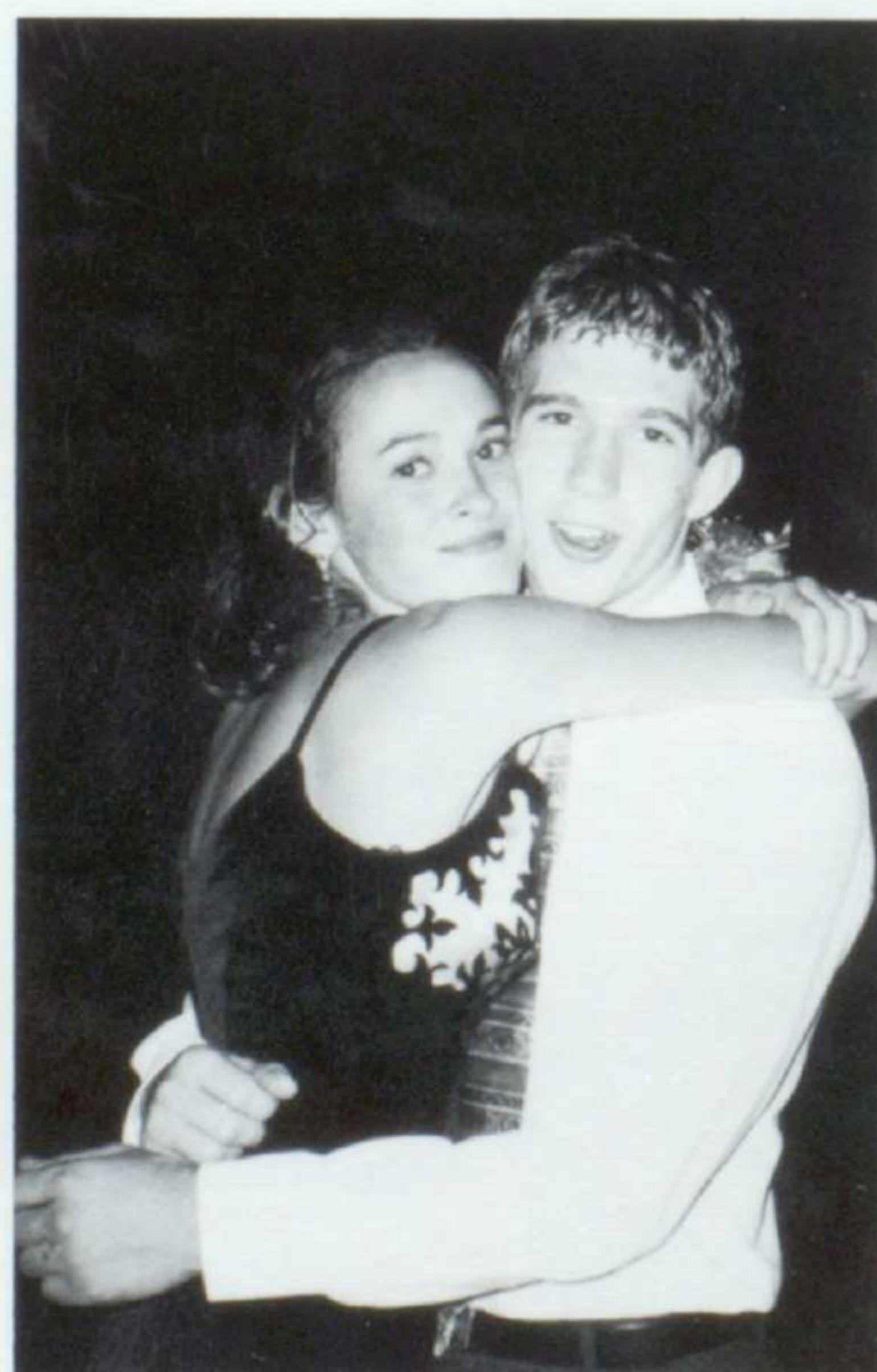

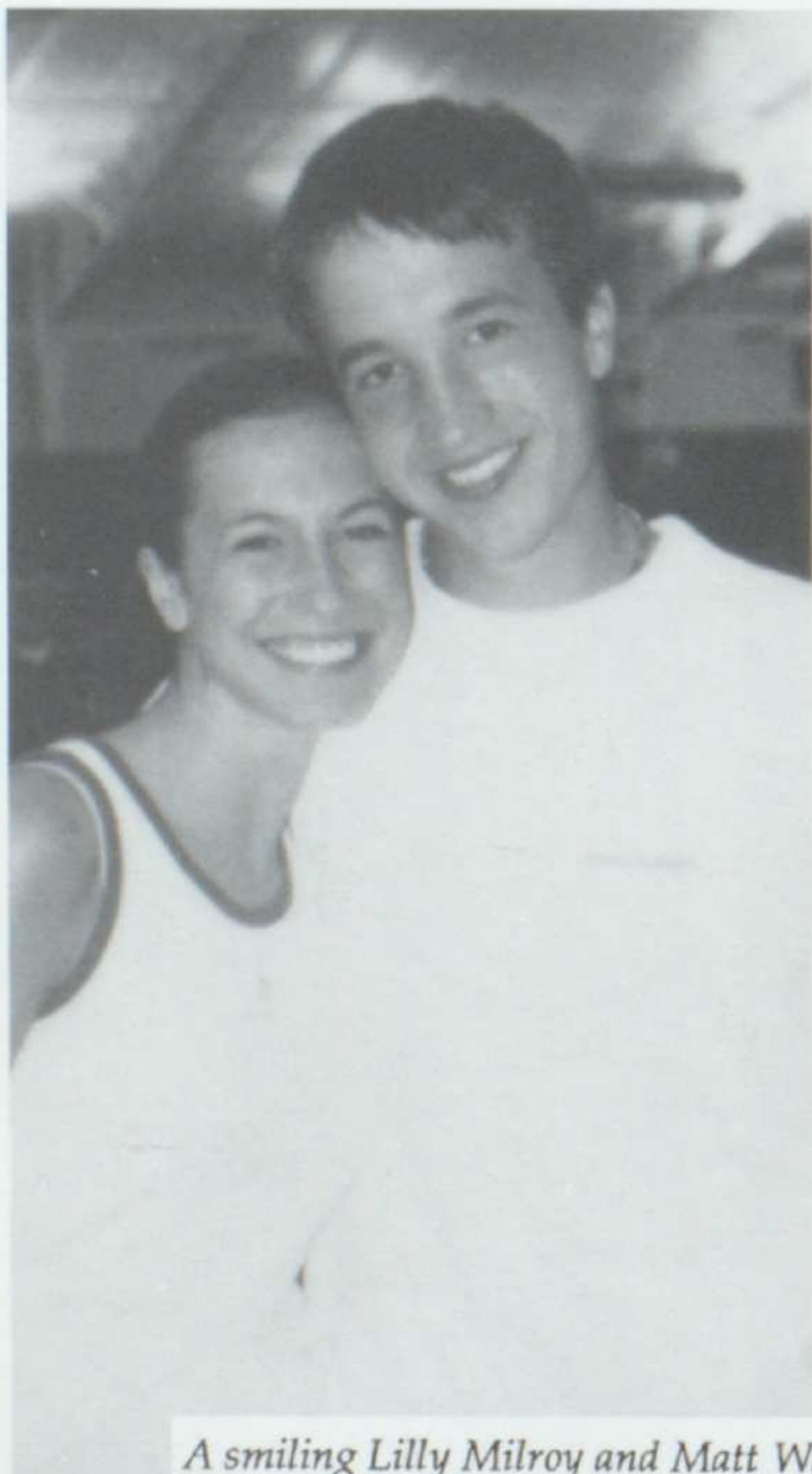
Post From Party

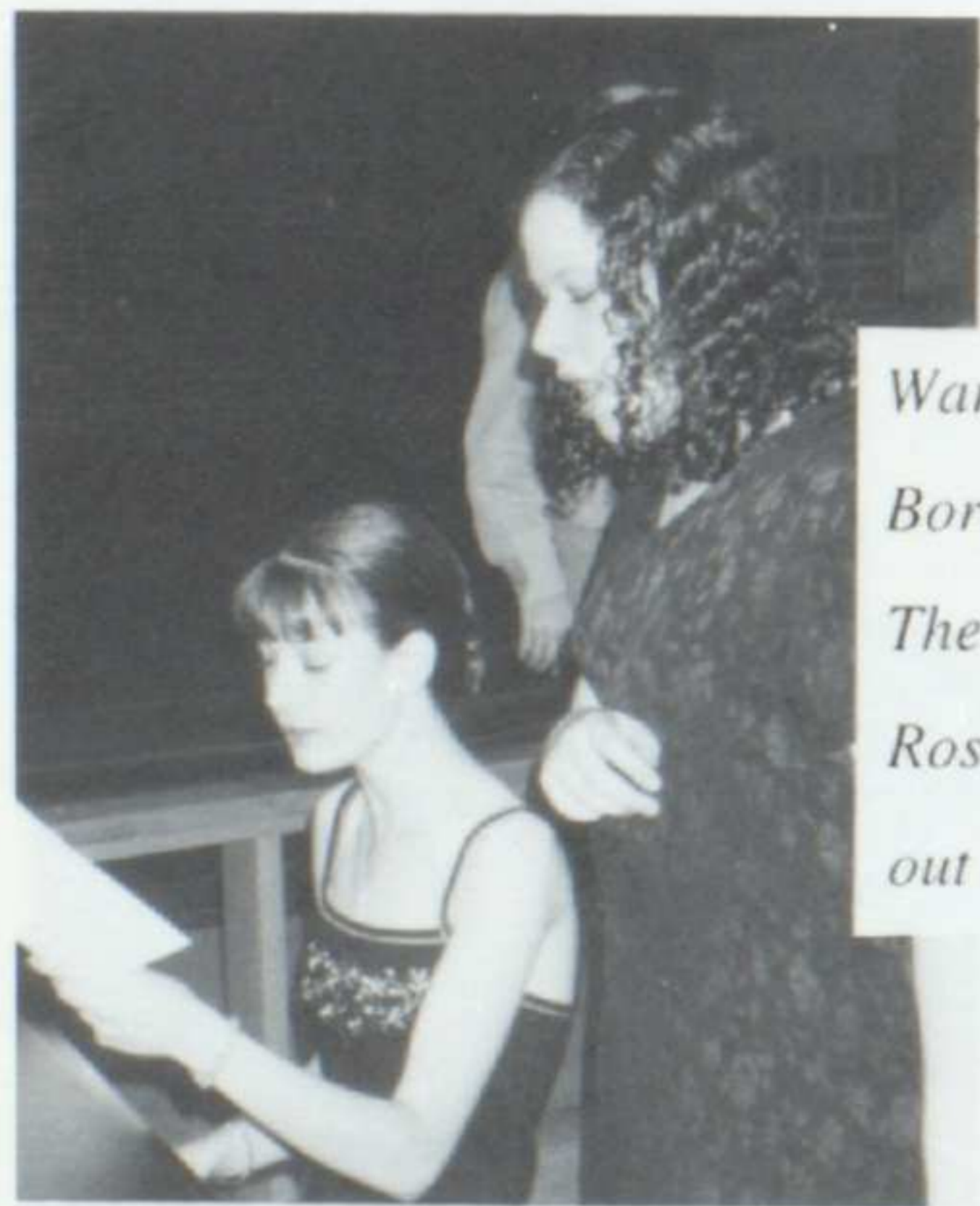
Friendship and Spirit

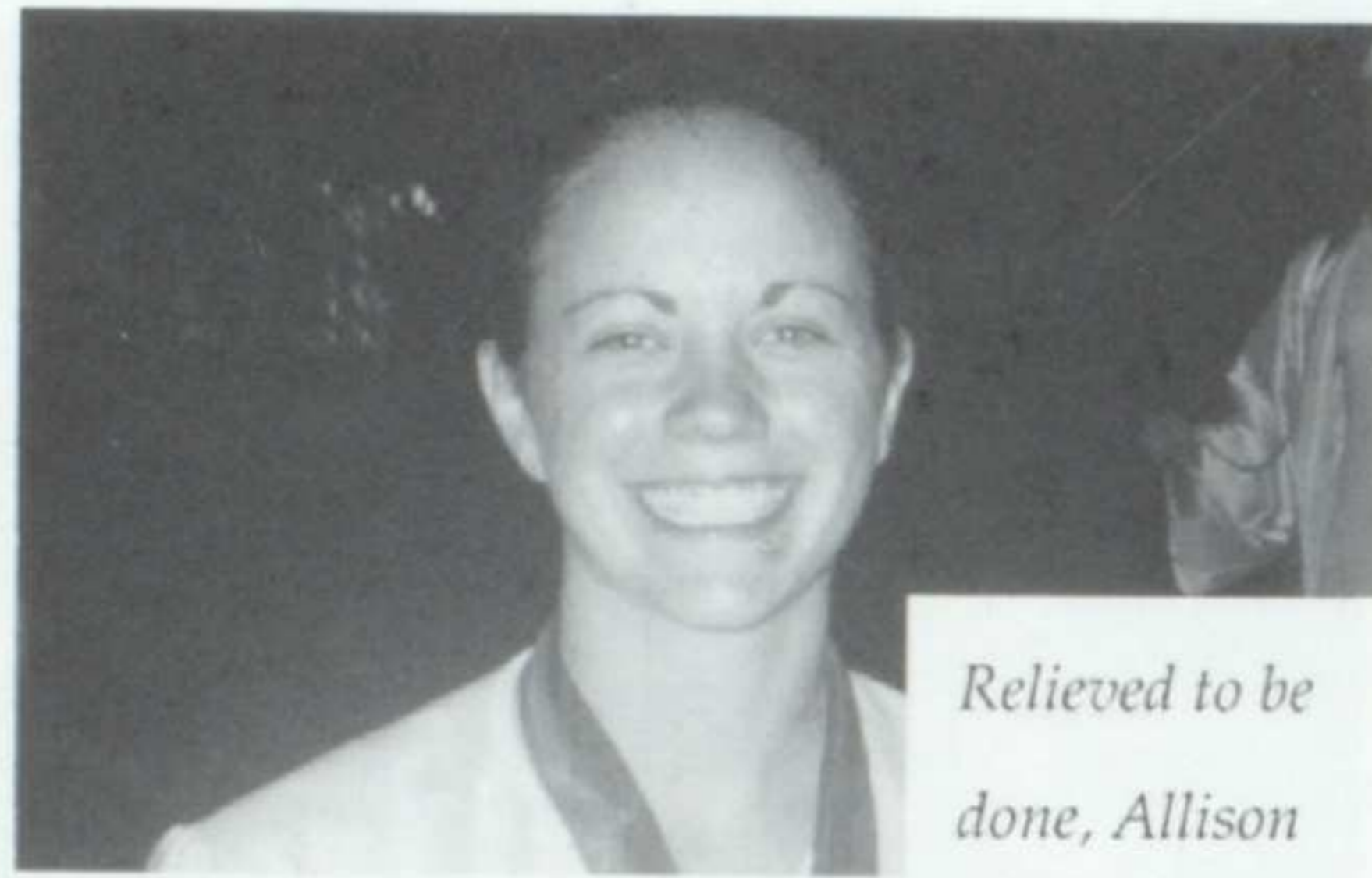


Graduation

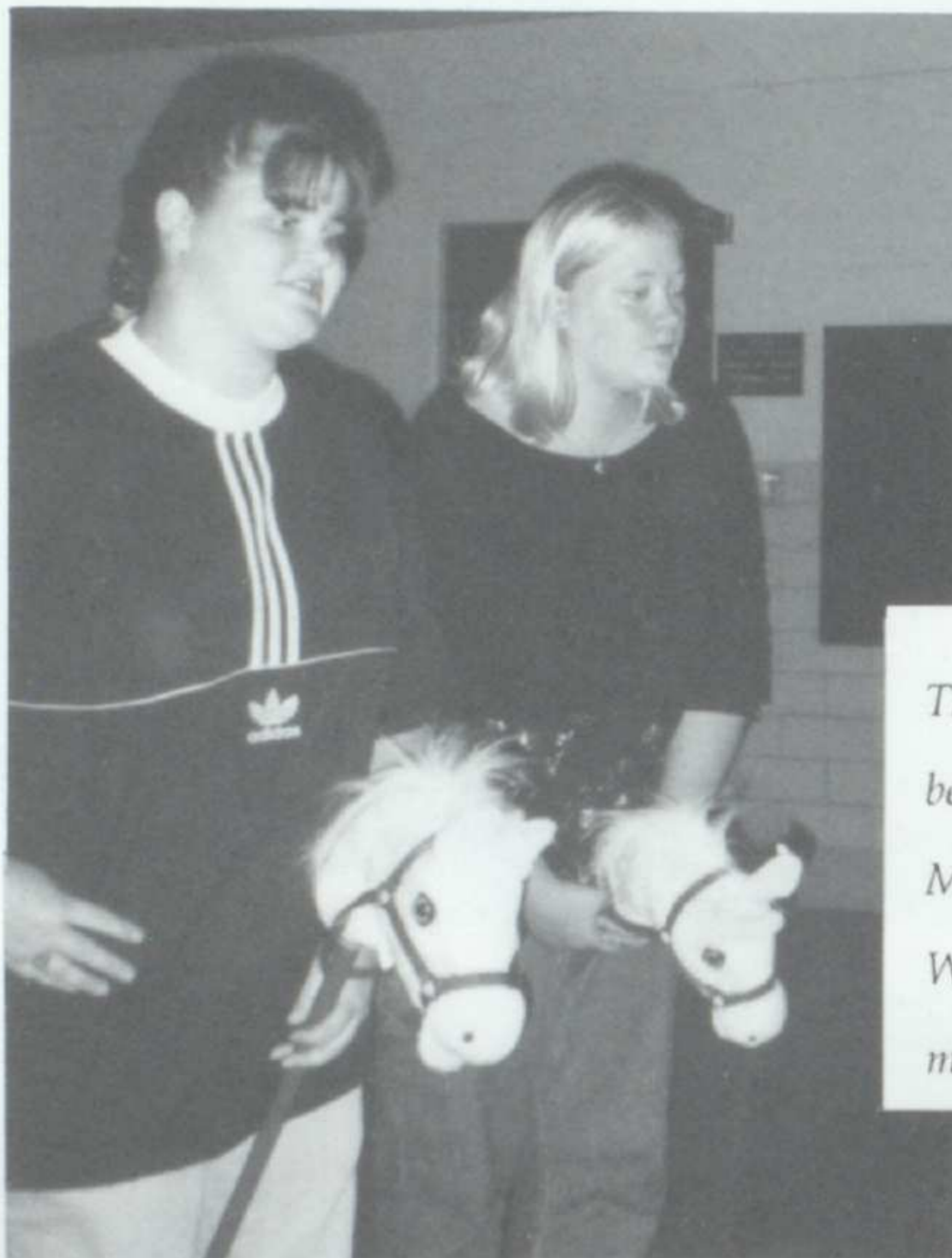
AfterGrad Party Graduation Party '99

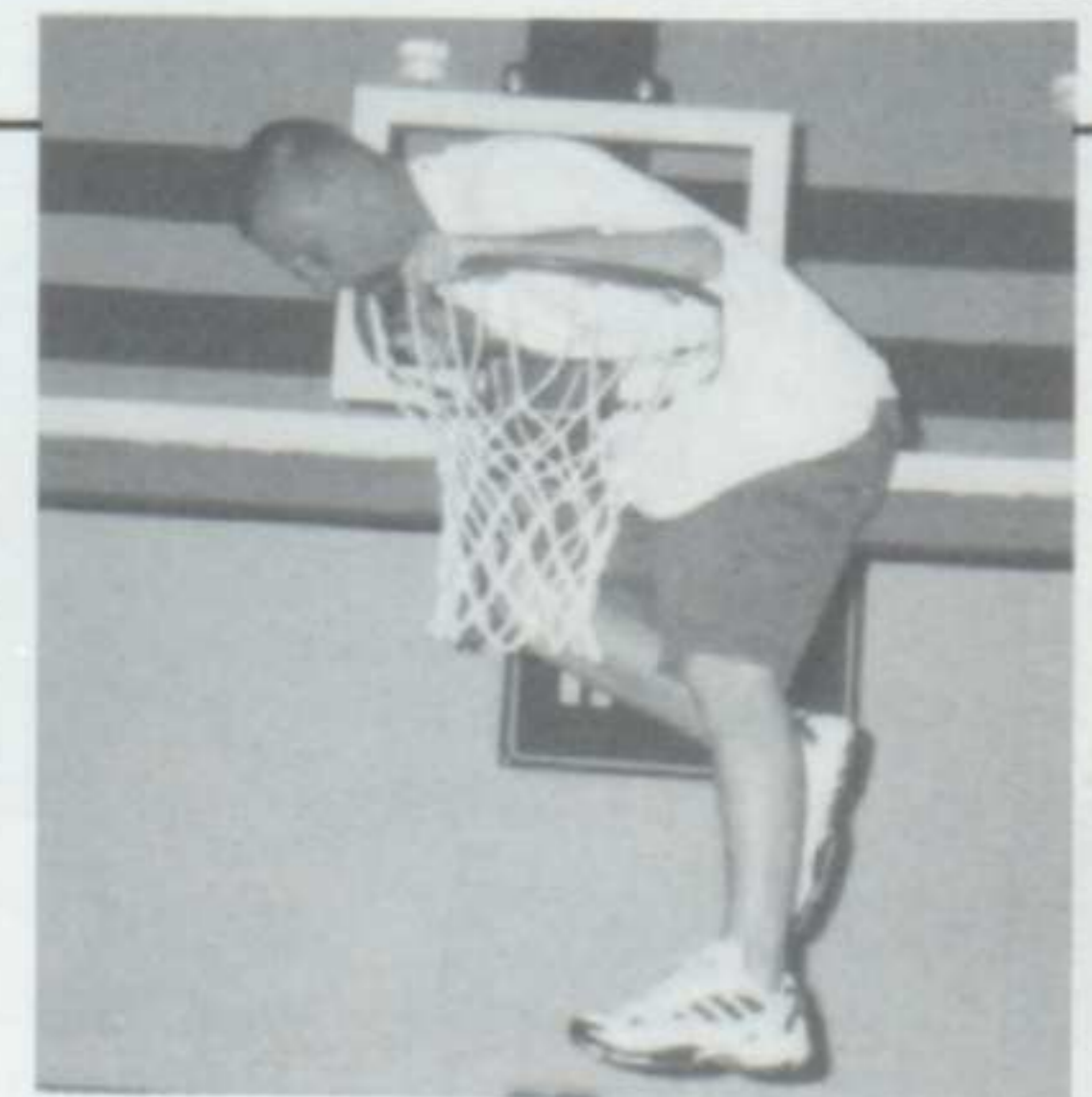

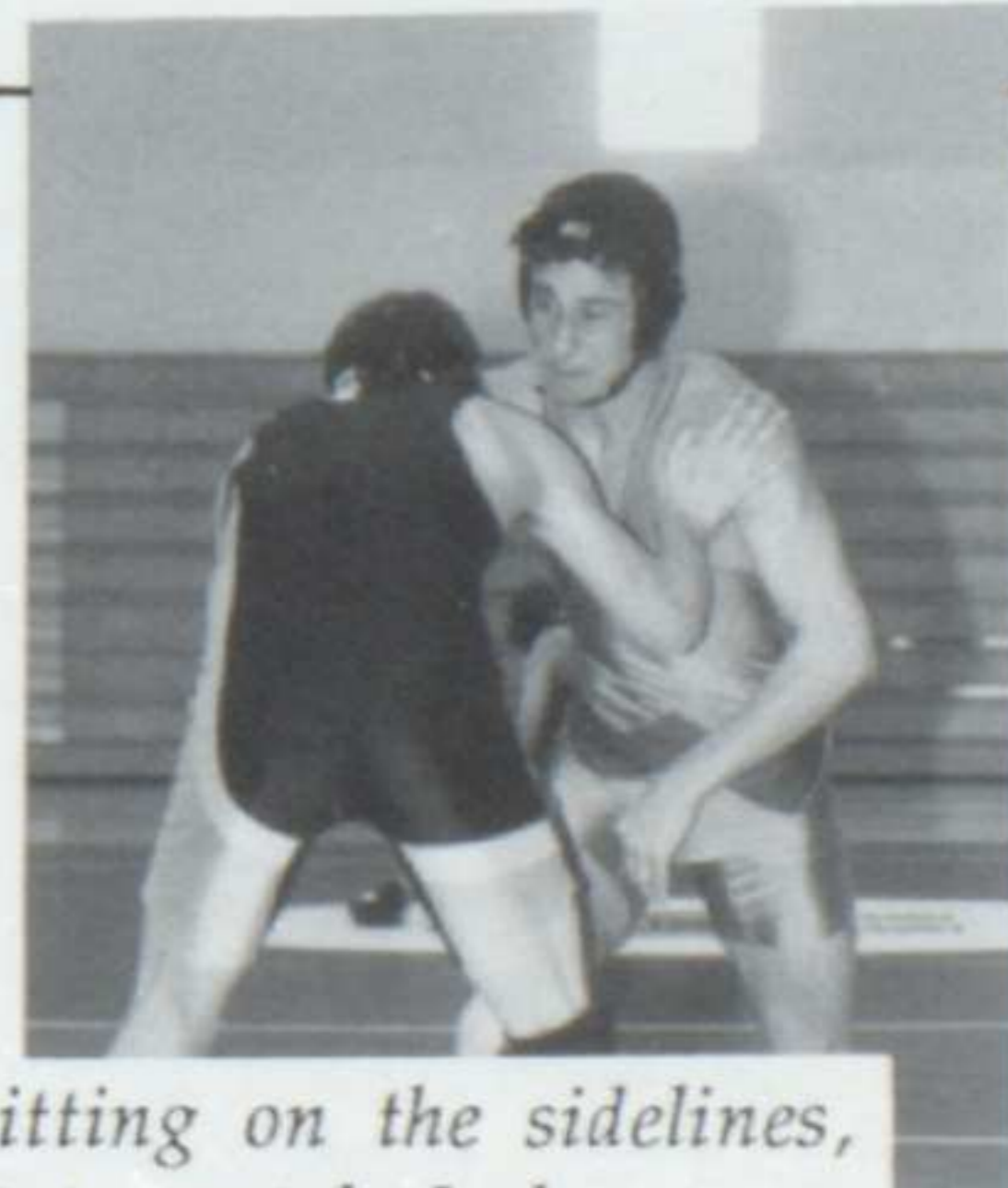

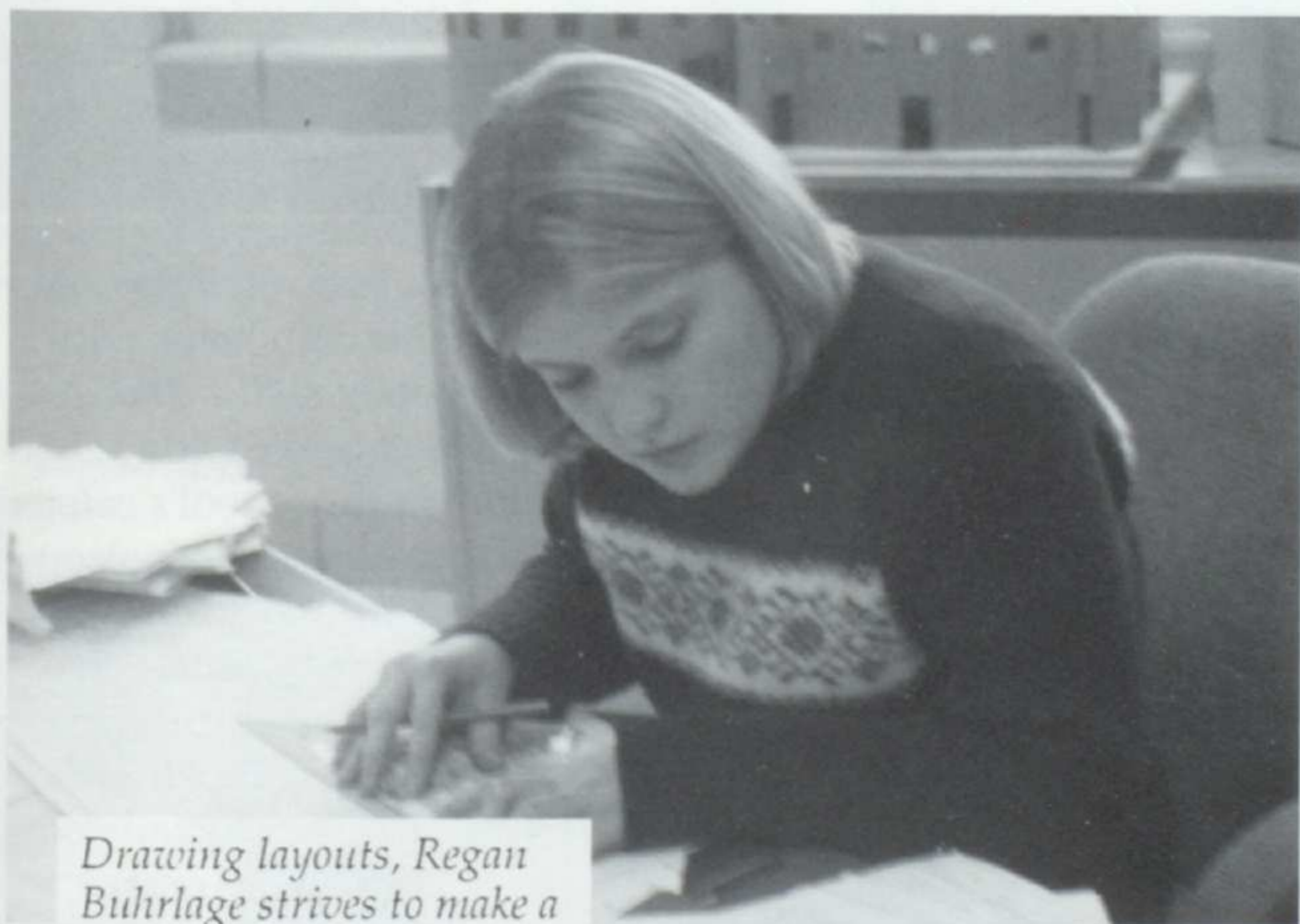

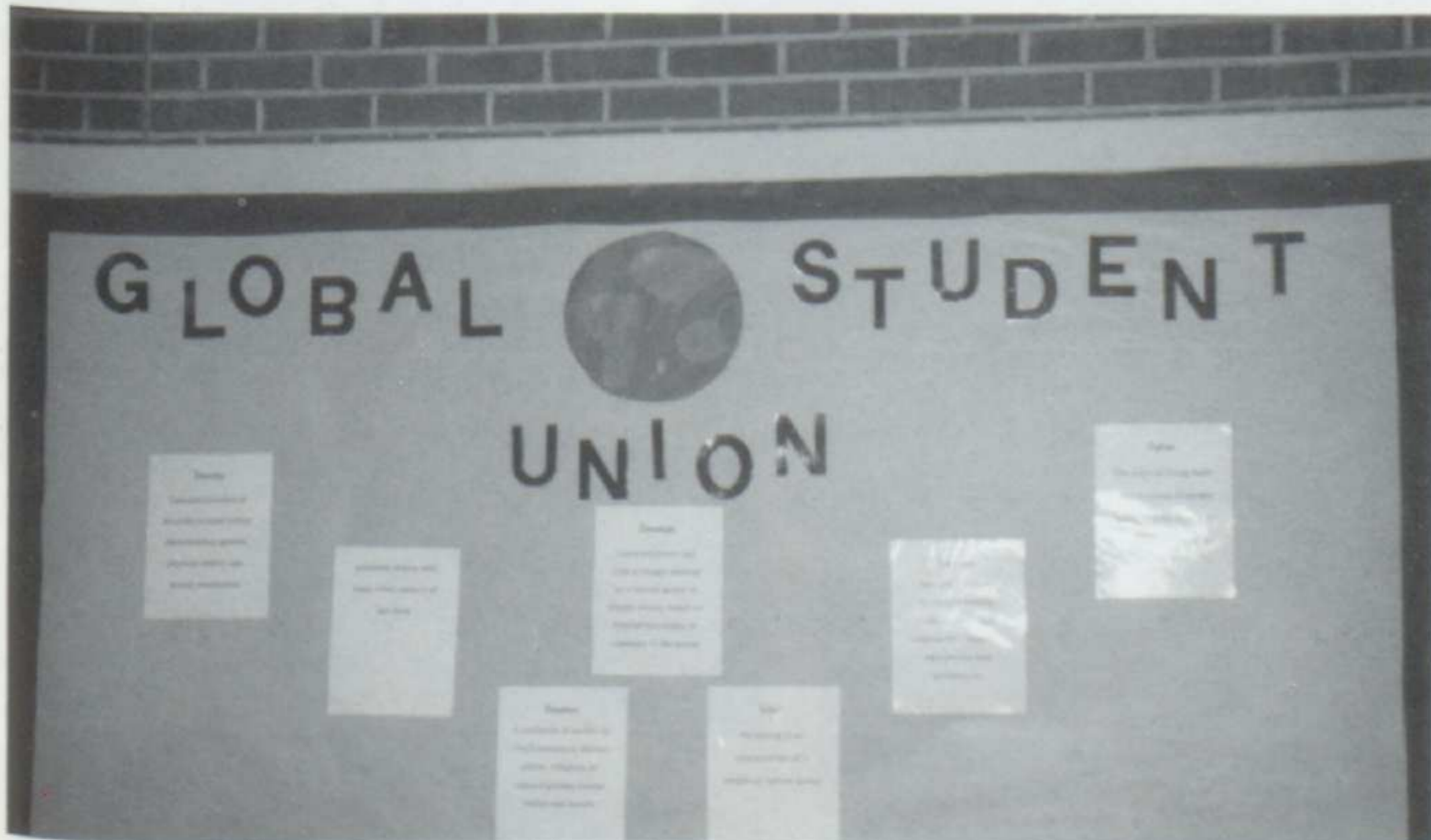

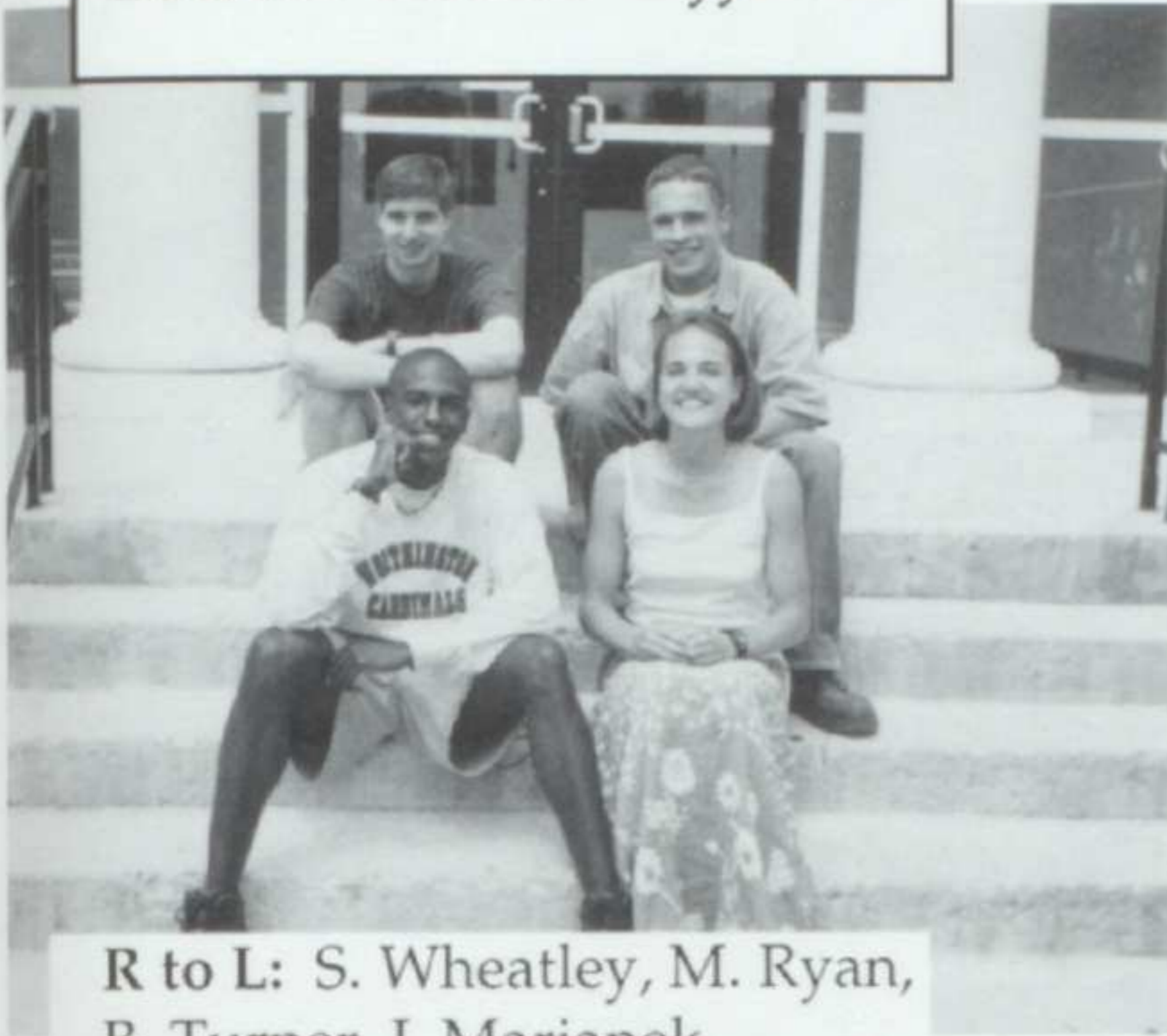

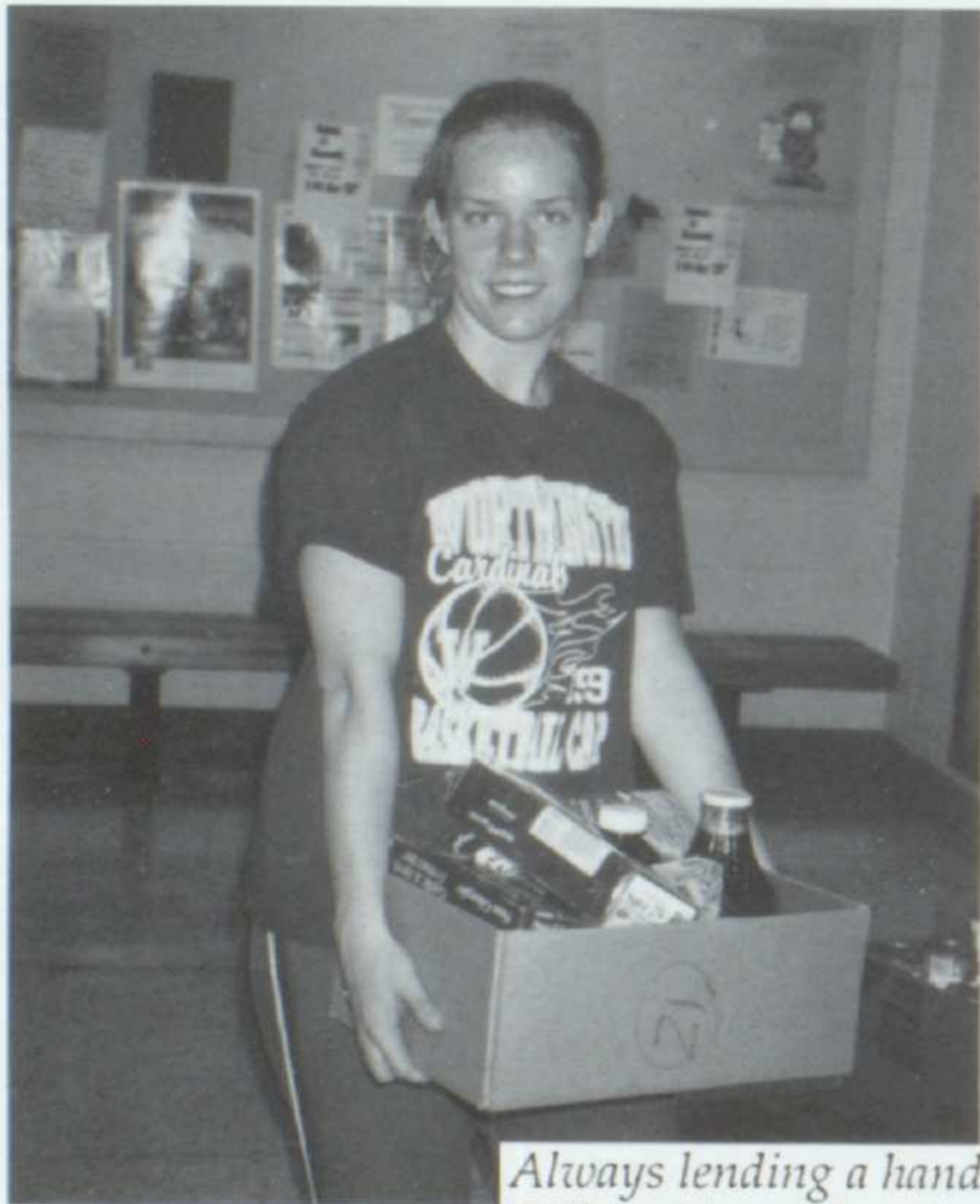


Student Council Helps Out

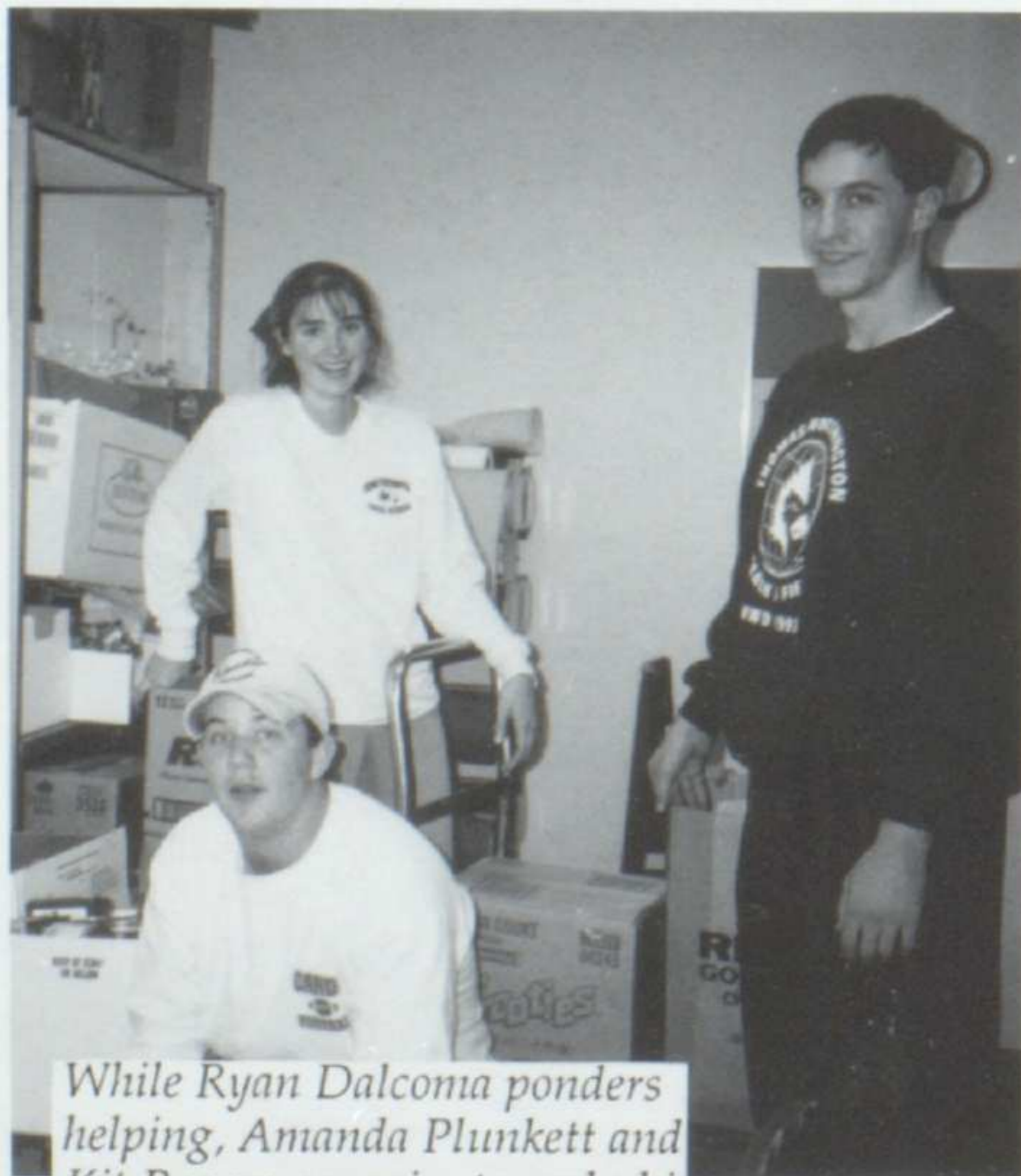

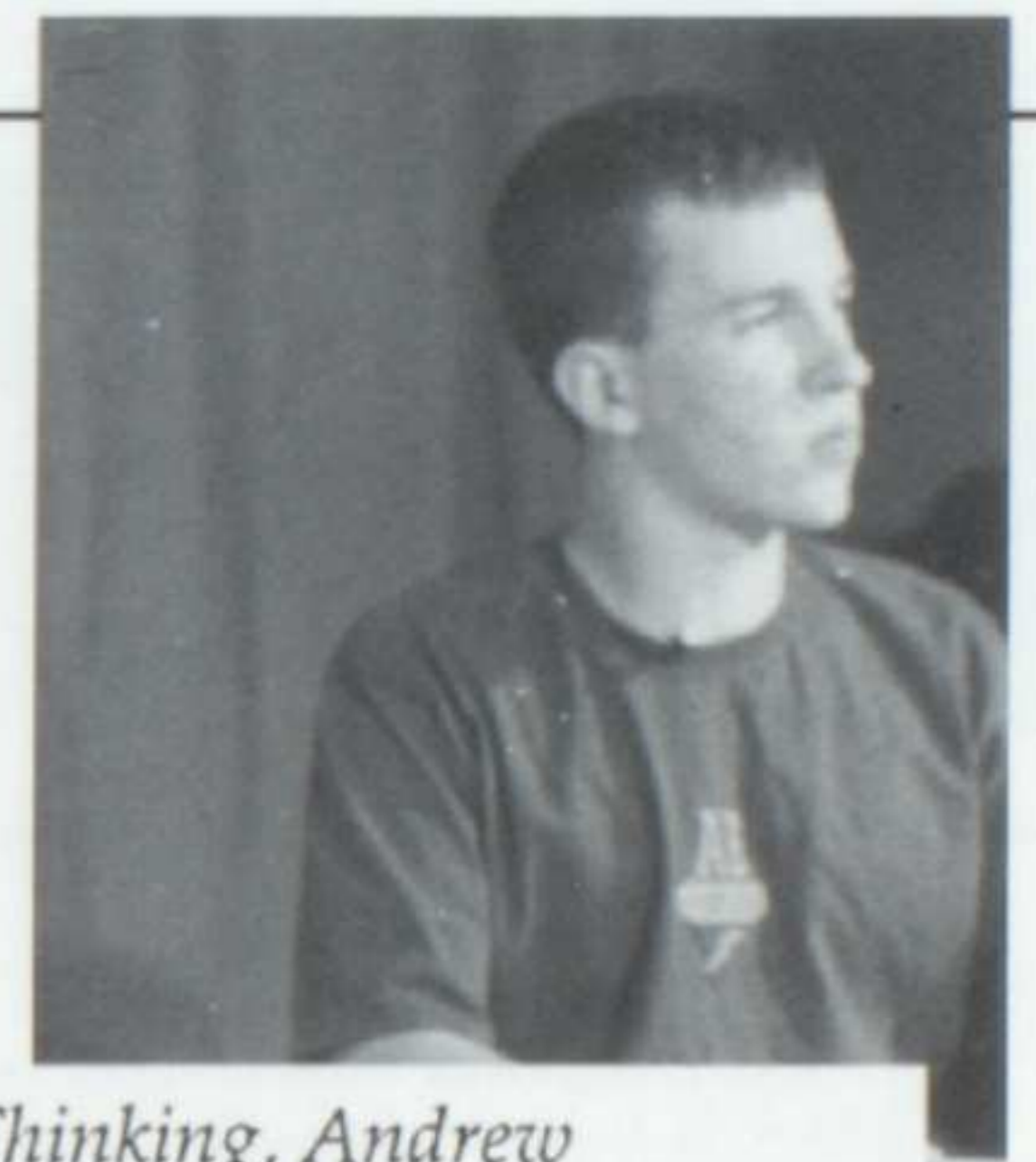

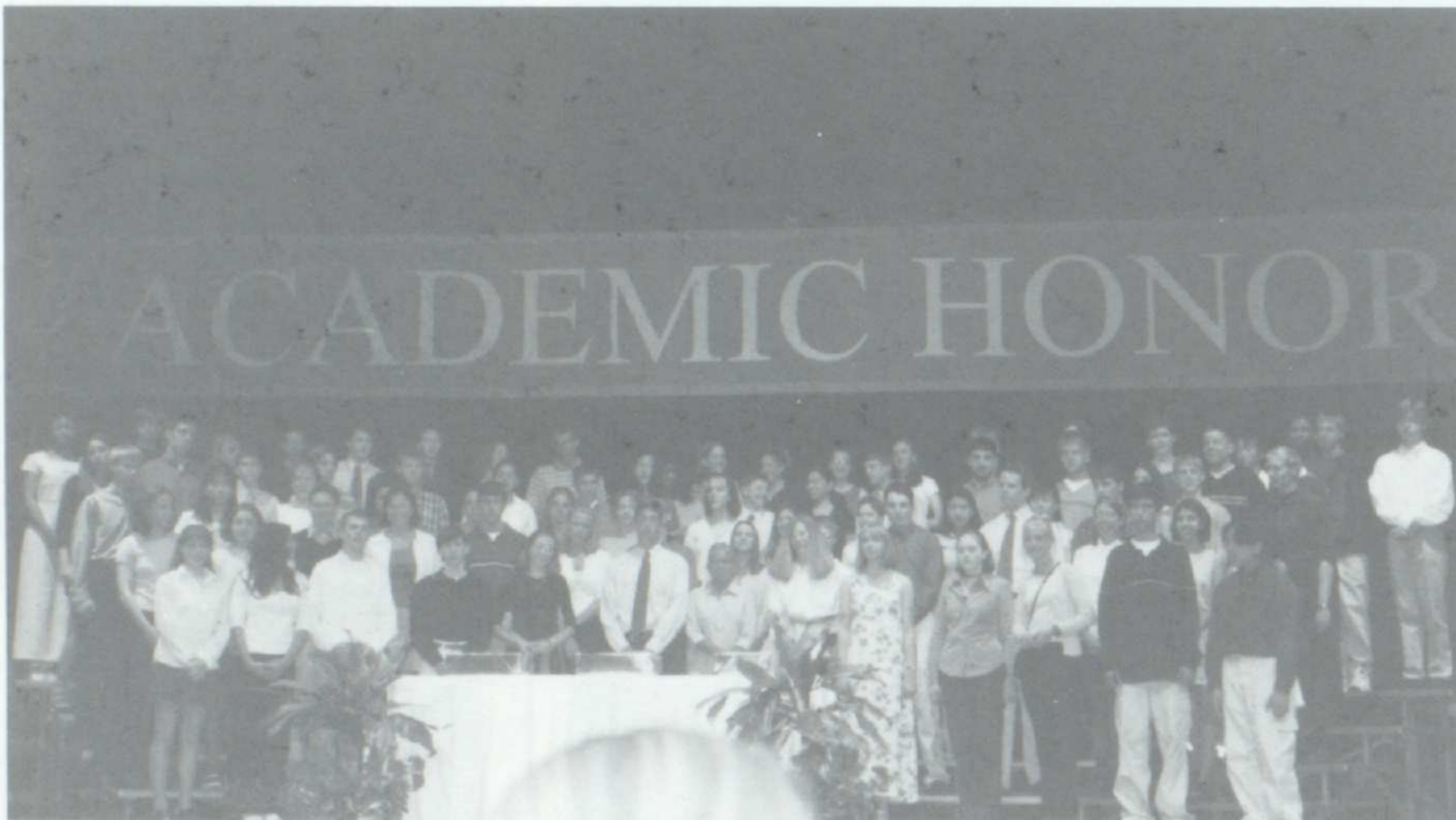

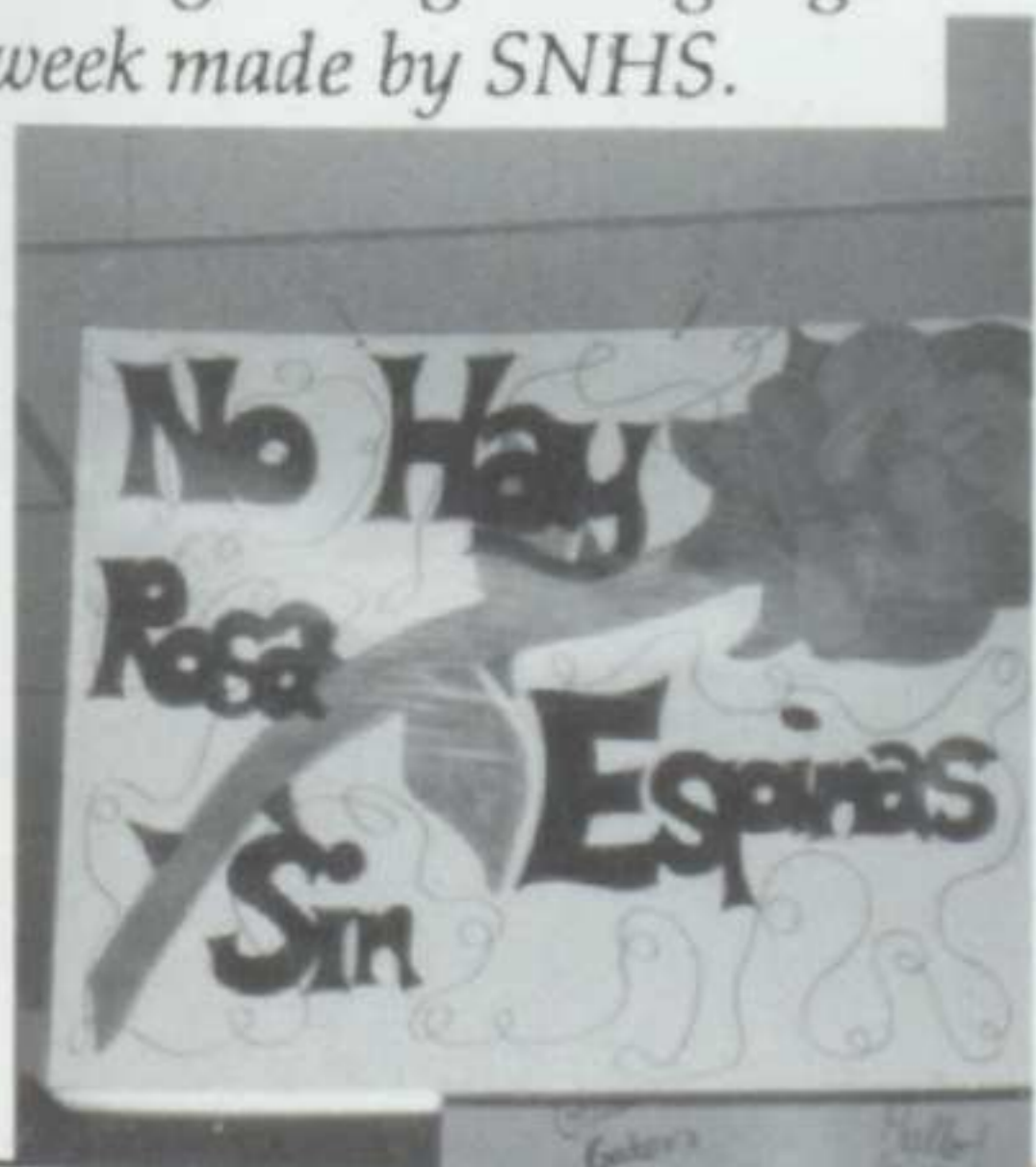

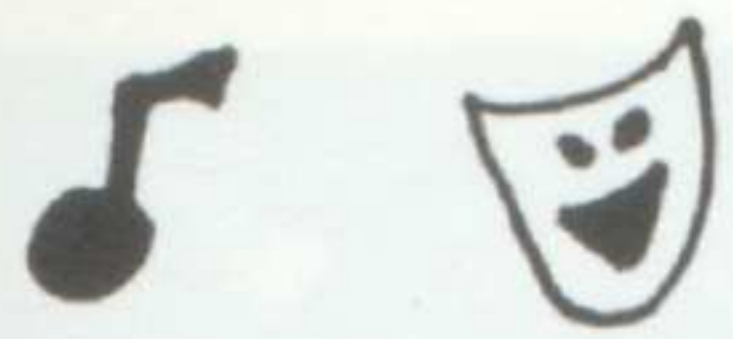

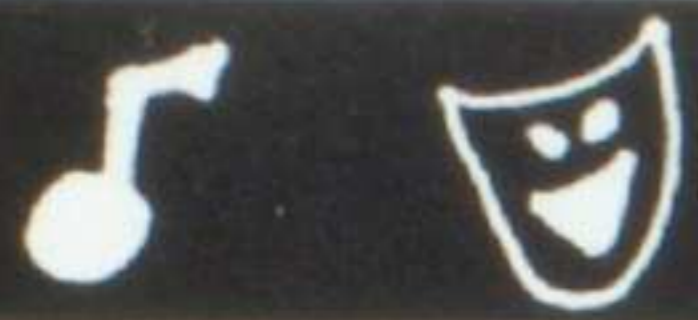

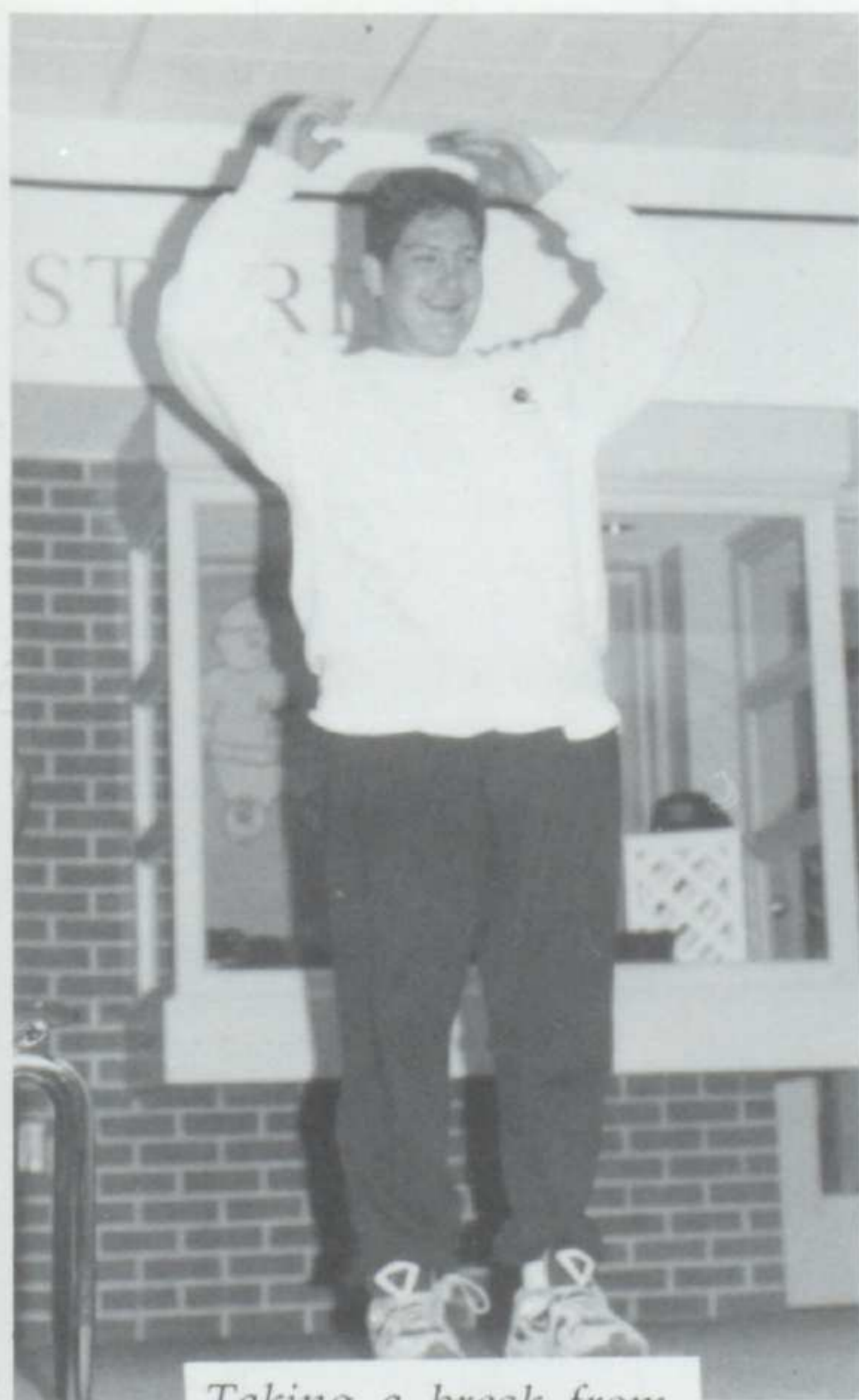

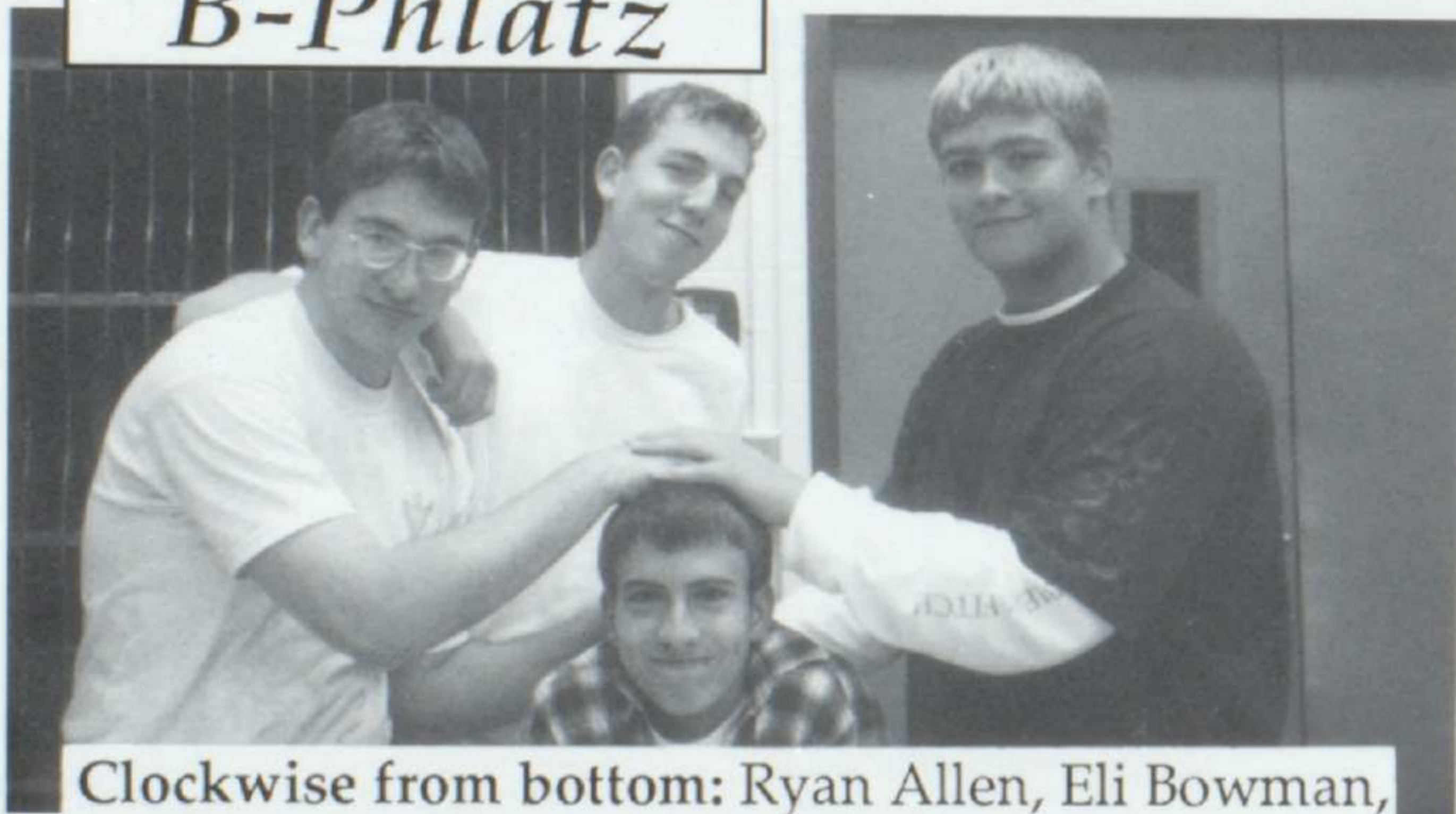

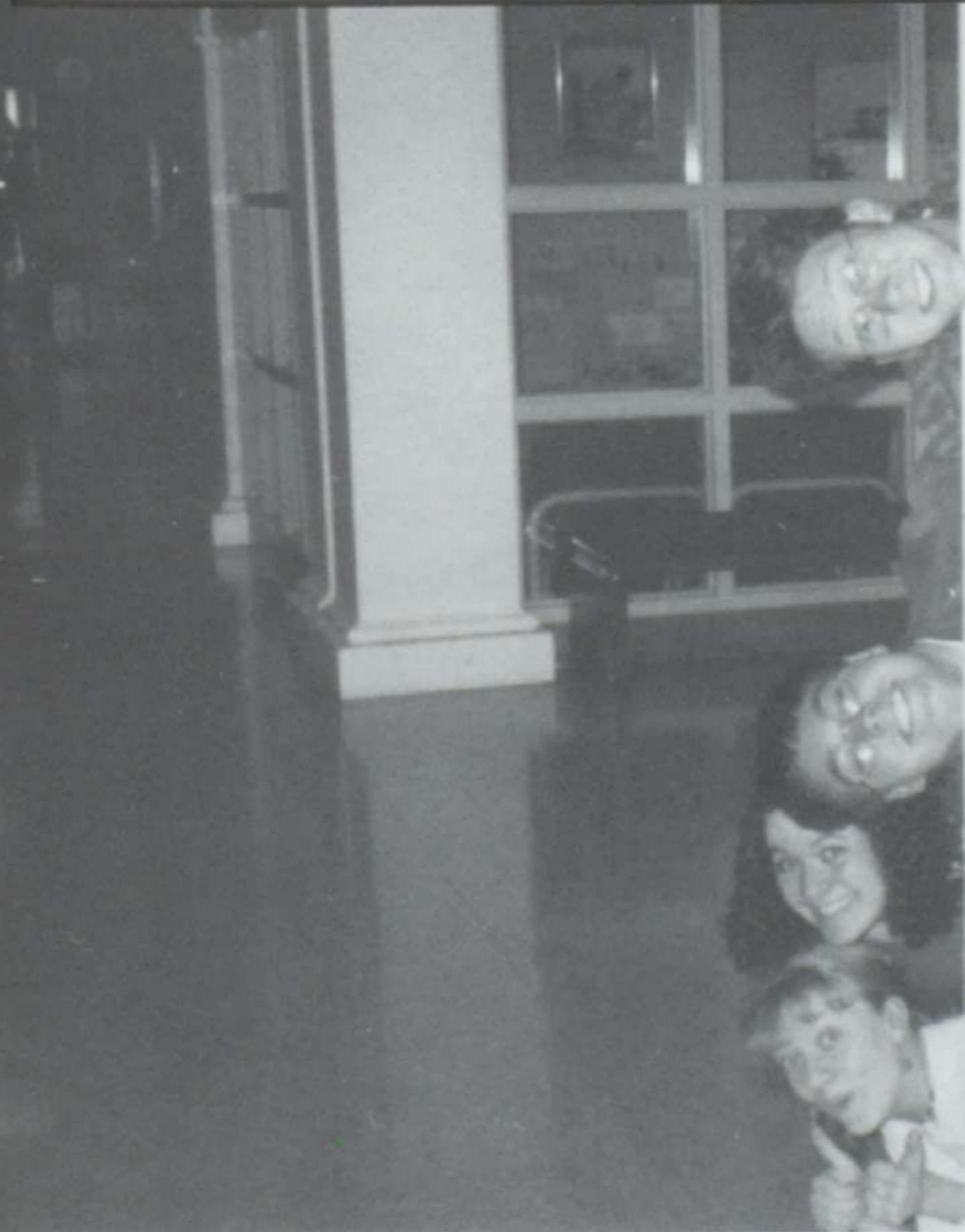

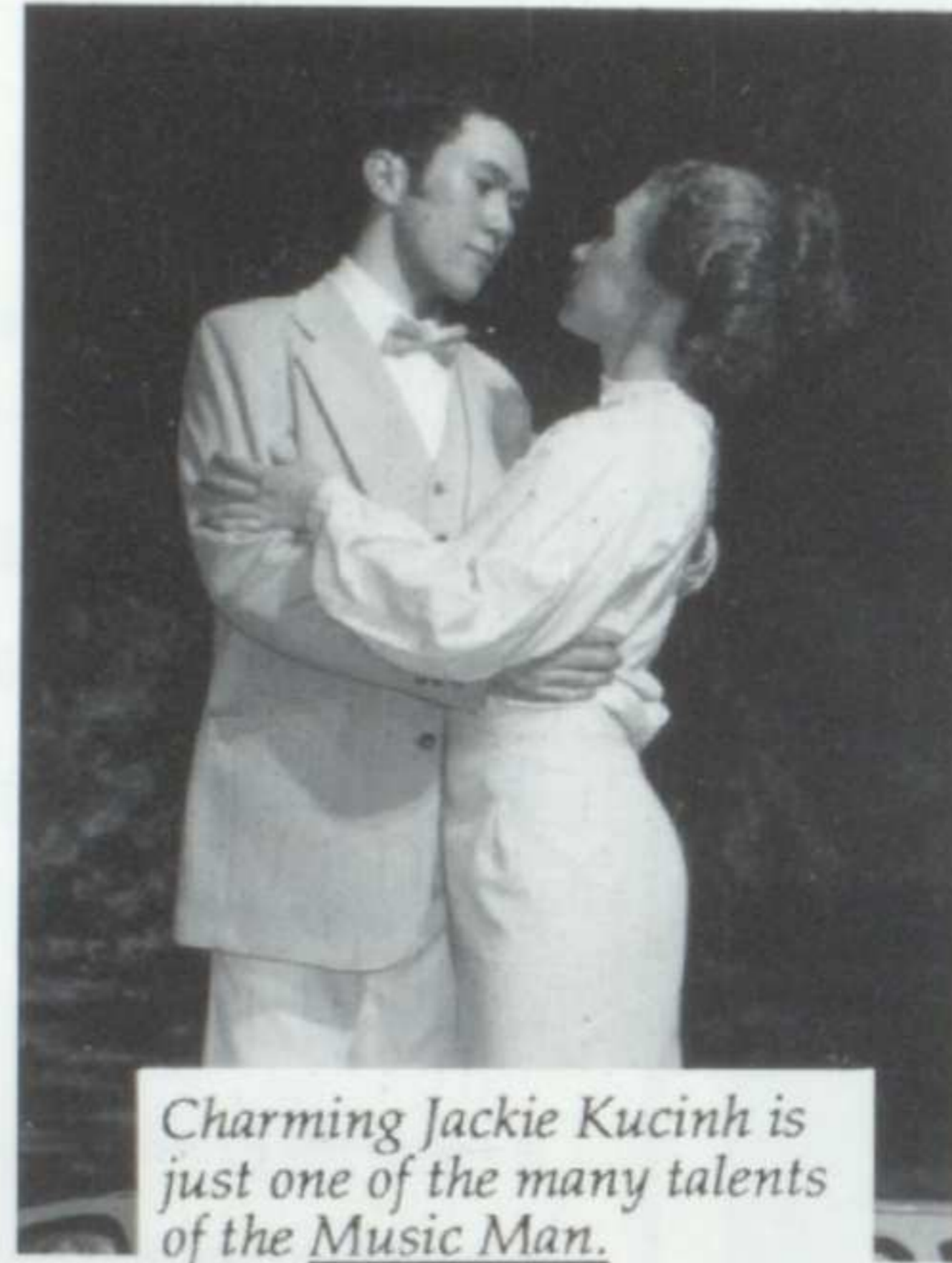

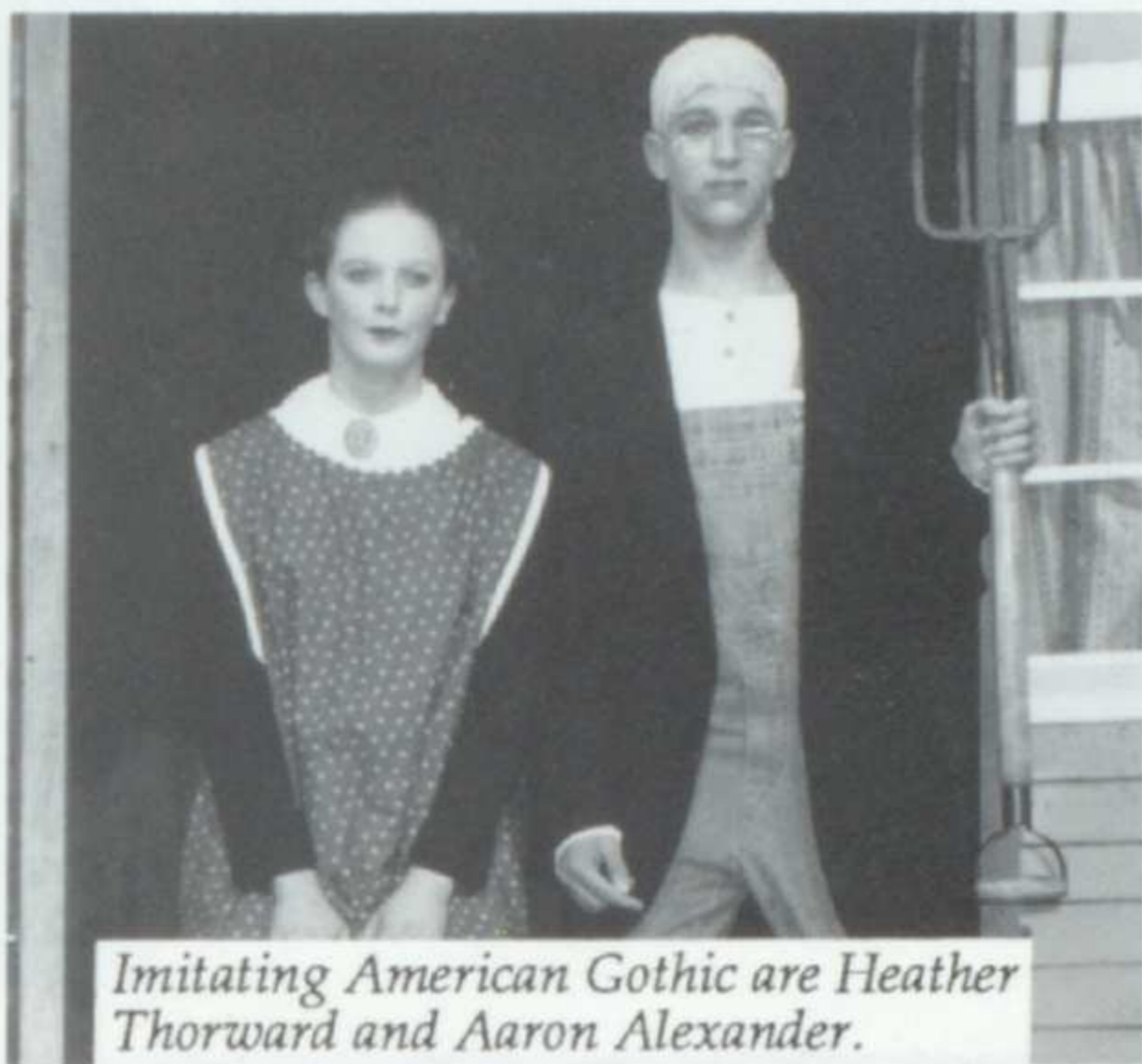

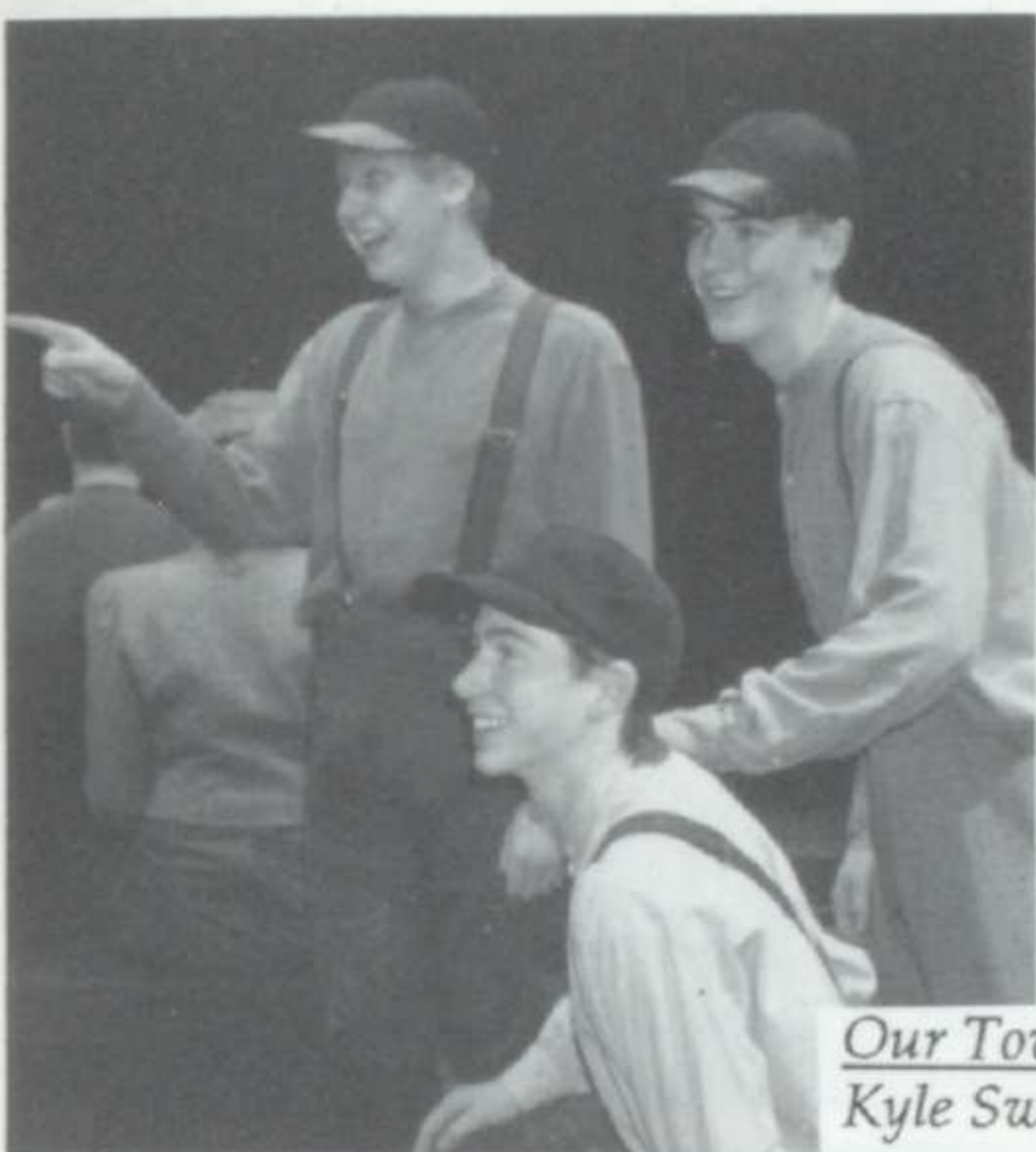

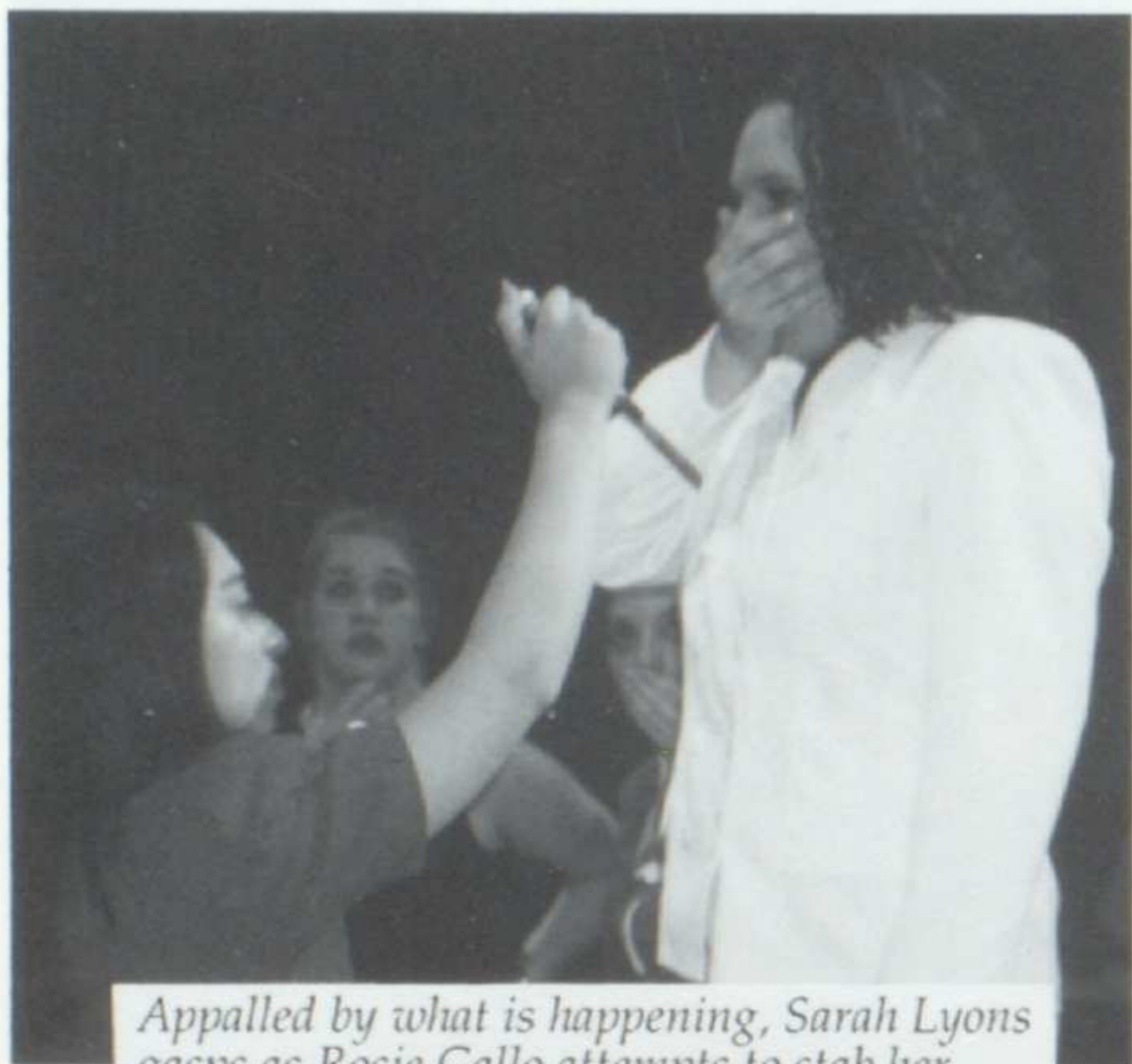

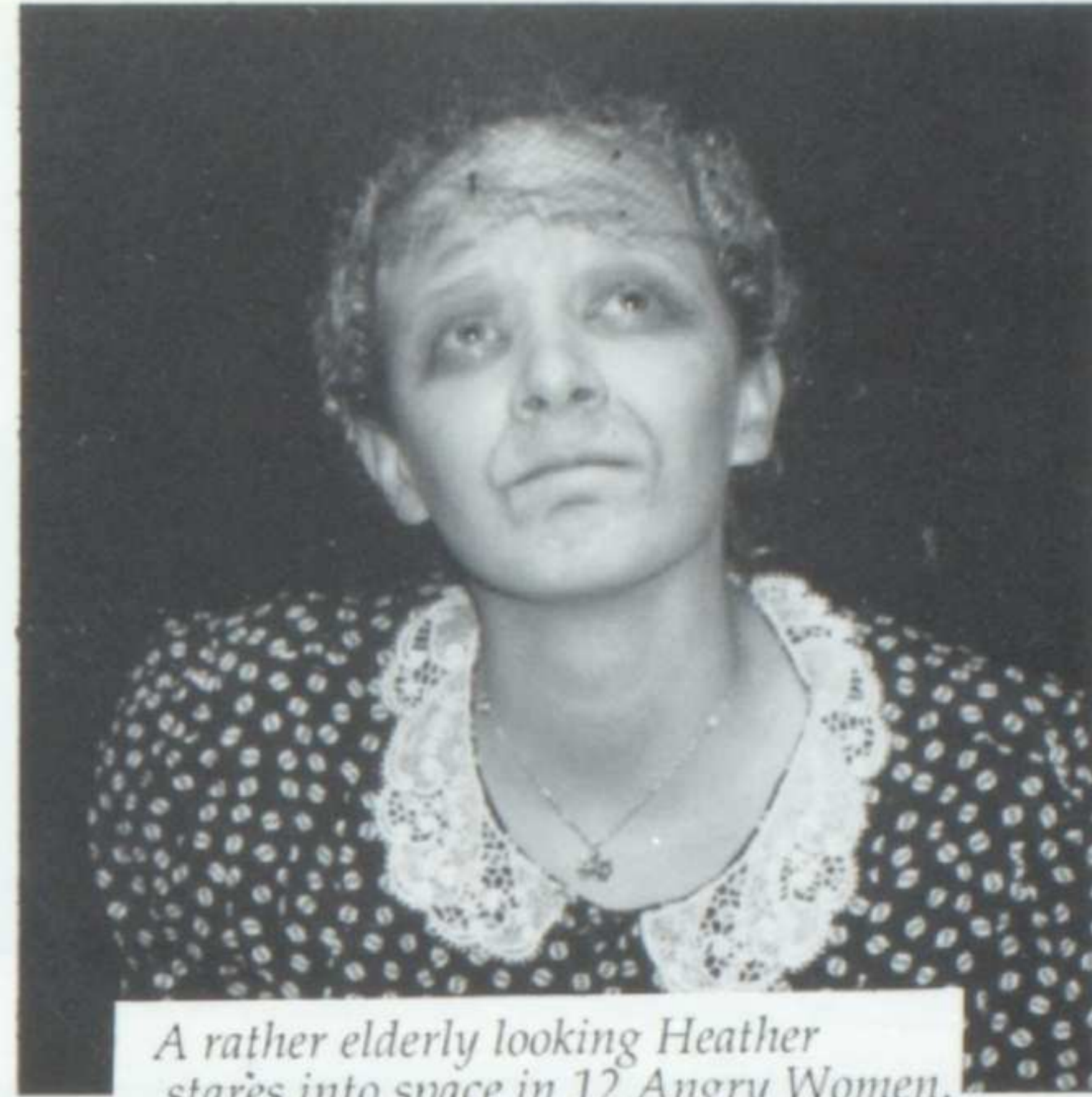

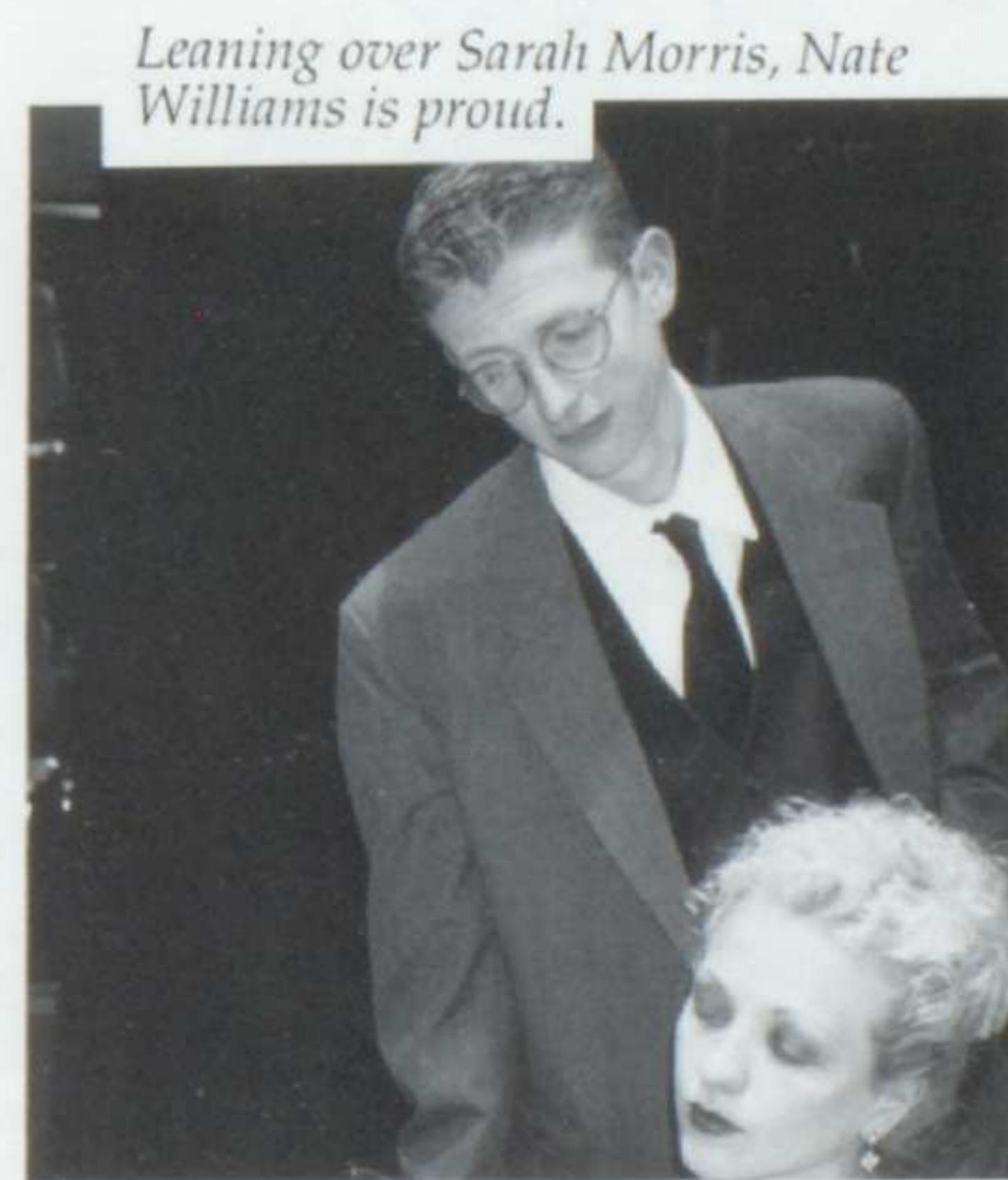

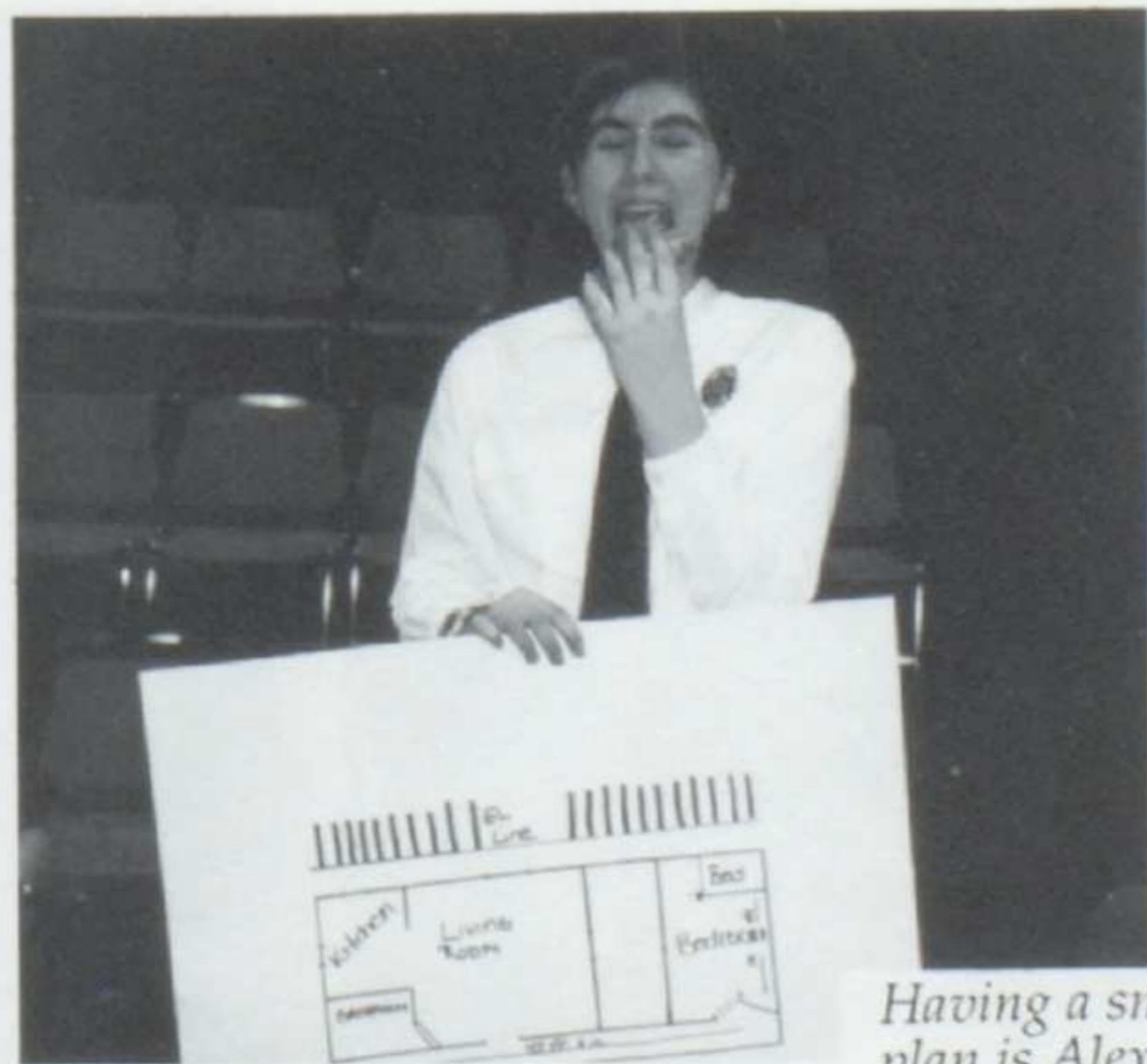

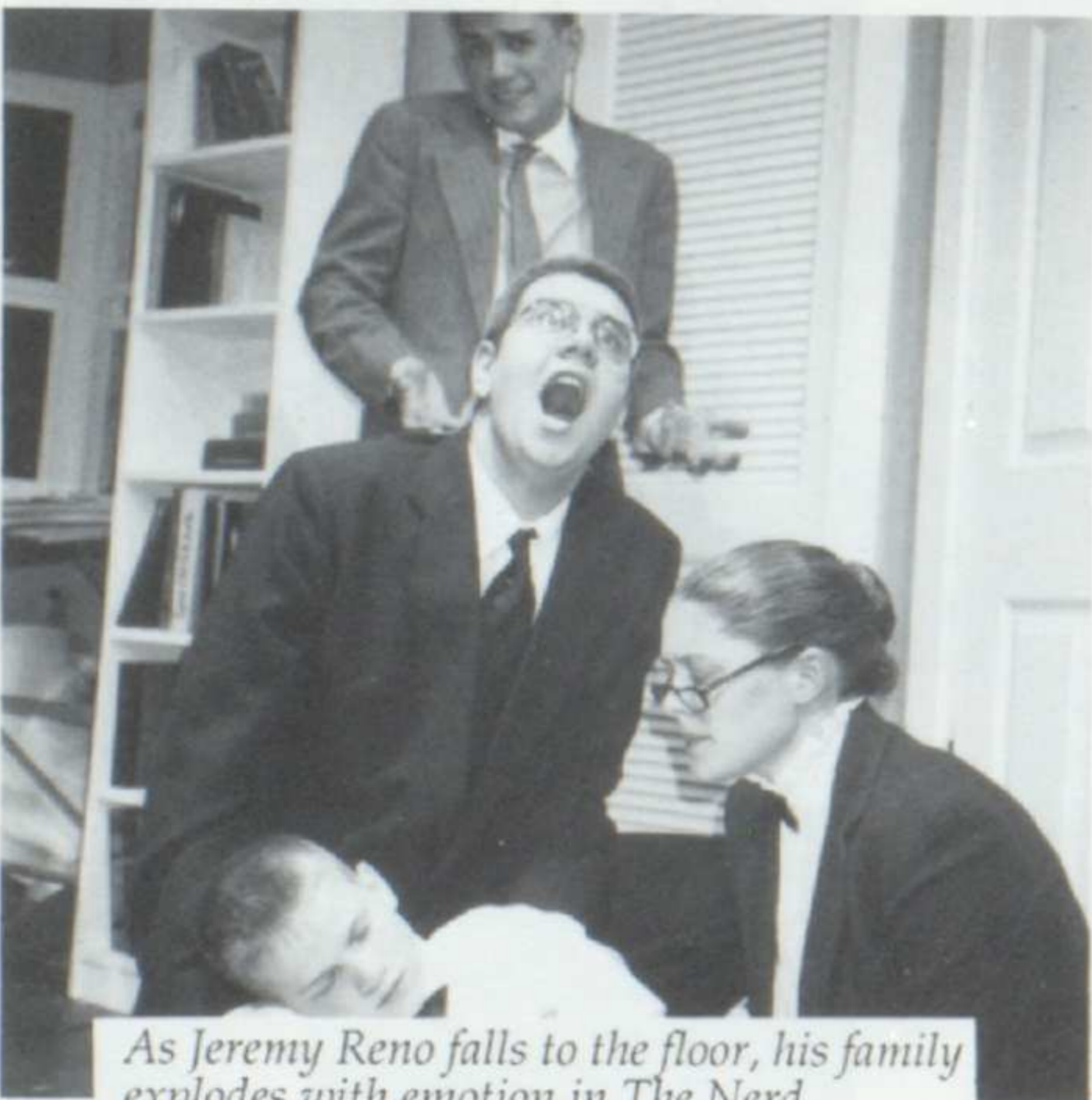

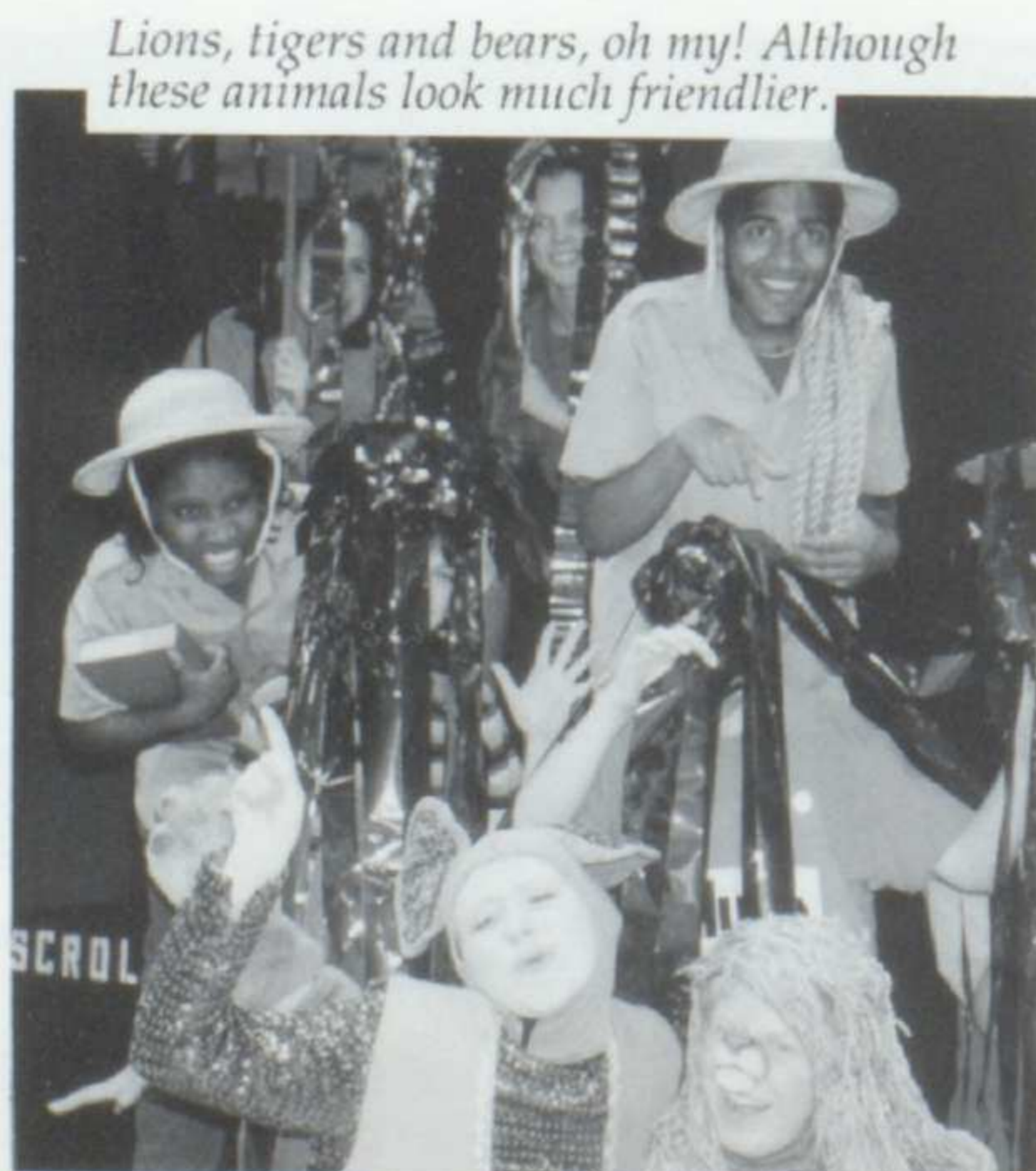

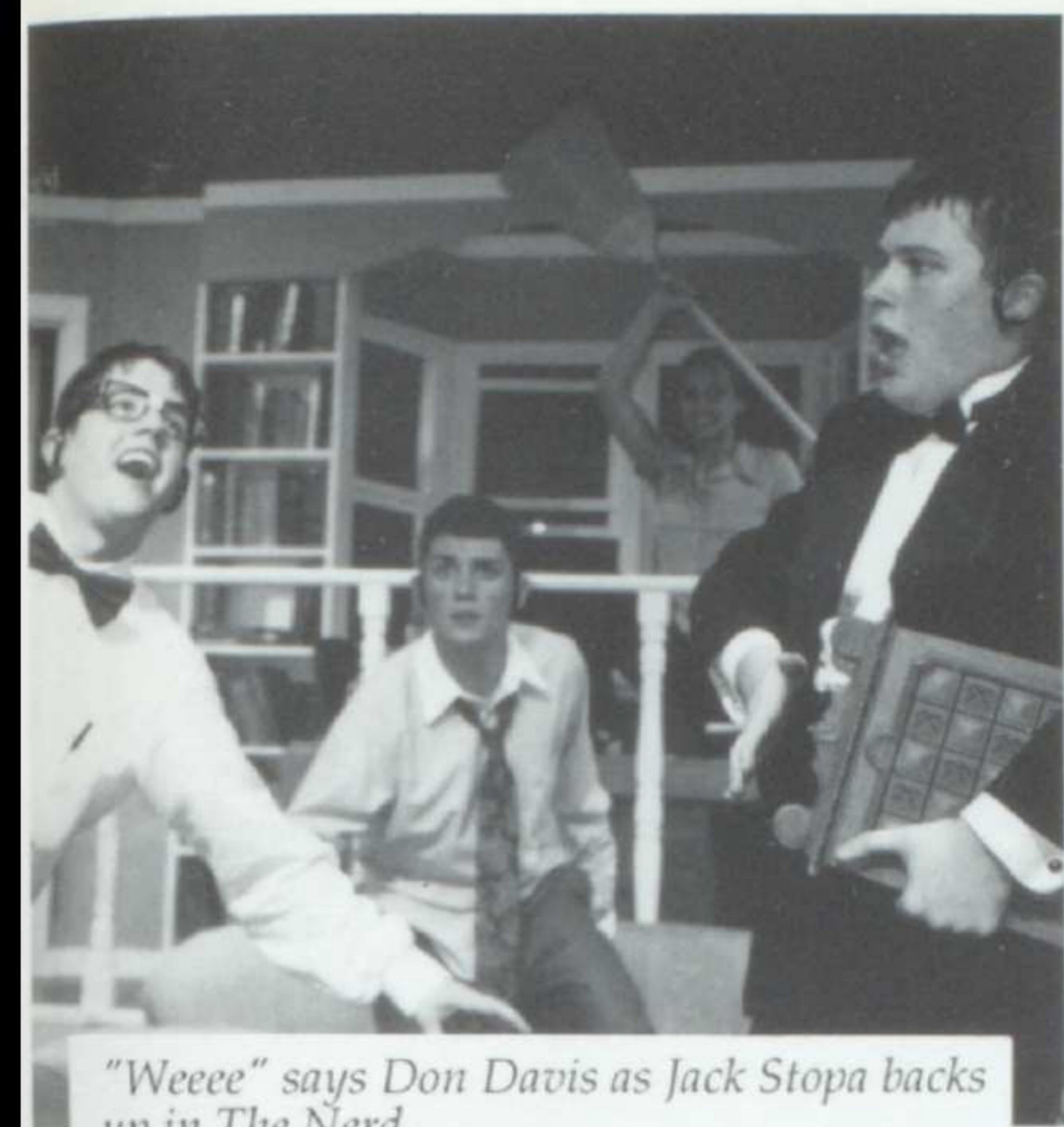

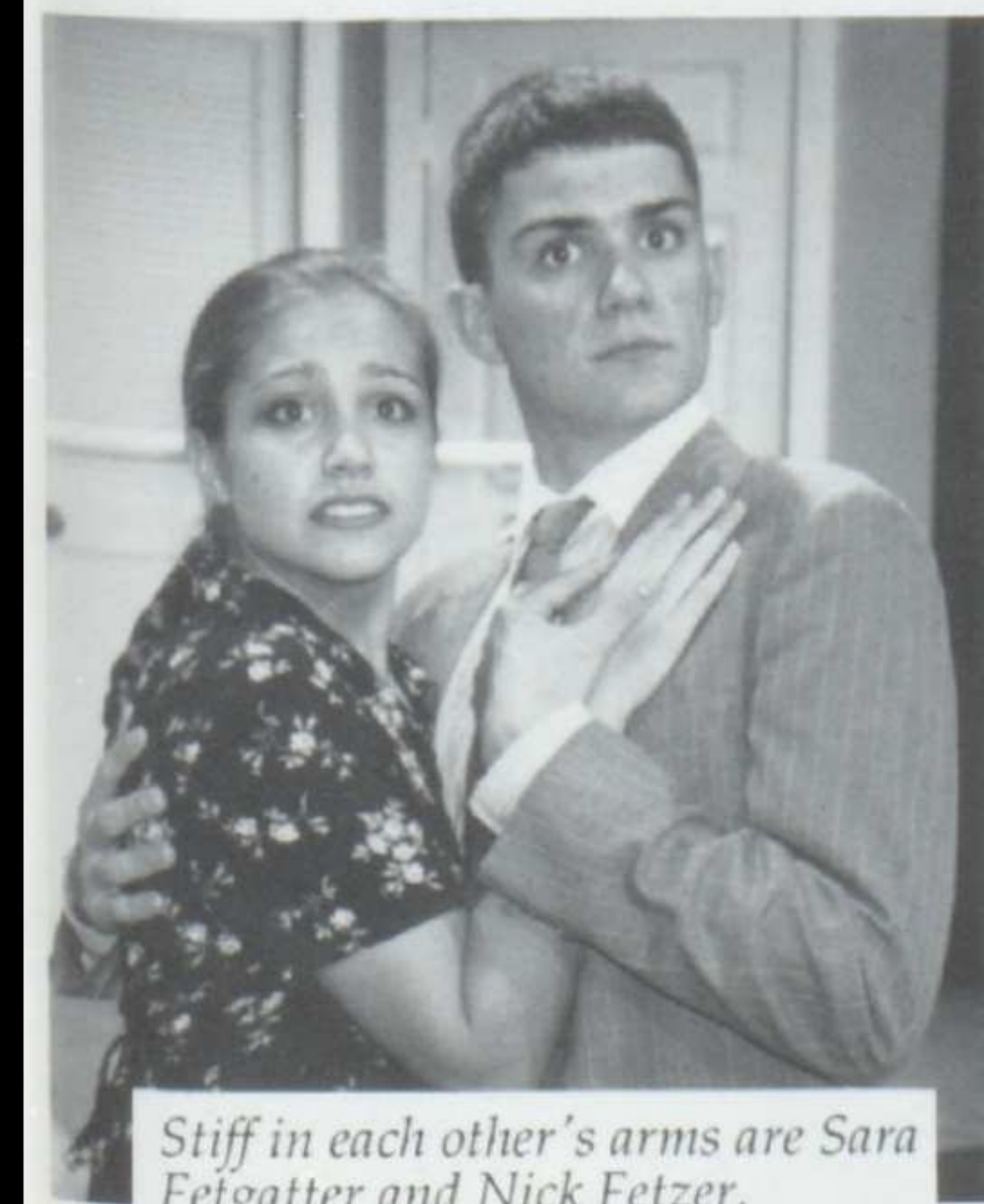
