Later in the year, Worthington won the state play contest with "Jacob Comes Home" as its entry, and runner-up to the state basketball championship. We closed the year by sponsoring the Junior-Senior Prom at Brookside Country Club with Ray Mund and his orchestra, and a class picnic at the Columbus Zoo.

Our senior year started out with great success when Worthington captured the Franklin County football title. Jane Hutson was Homecoming Queen and Marie Sunderland was the senior member of her court. The senior class play "Peg O' My Heart" was presented in May.

Thus the history of our class comes to a close. We proudly leave this record of activities behind us, but we will keep the memories of the good times we had with us always.


HOMECOMING



No one doubted that Jane Hutson made a pretty picture as queen of the Wash Bowl last New Year's Day. Instead of a crown, Jane wore a "ring".



HISTORY OF WORTHINGTON SCHOOLS

The history of our schools dates back to the year 1803, when the first public building was erected in the youthful settlement of Worthington. This was a large log structure standing at the approximate location of the present-day library, and was used for Spiscopalian church services and other public gatherings as well as for teaching. Two large sections of land on the western edge of the settlement were designated respectively as school property—the site of the present high school building—and church land.

This first school stood until 1808 when is was razed and a two-story brick building built in its place, directly opposte the location of St. John's Church. Classes held on the first floor and this building was known as the Worthington Academy, with Philander Chase, first rector of the Episcopal Crurch, as its first master. Philander Chase, Jr., succeeded his father in the teaching position when the latter became first bishop of the Ohio Diocese.

In 1843 a medical college was started in the old academy building, but soon afterward moved to Cincinnati, and the building was then used for a college known as the Worthington College.

In 1856 the Town Hall was erected for public school use. In 1871, when a larger building became necessary, the Town Hall was sold to the township, and the public schools returned to the Old Worthington Academy building while plans were drawn and progress on the new building was made. This new structure, the West grade school building, was finished in 1873, and the East grade school building was built twenty years later. In 1876 the old academy building was destroyed and the modern new elementary building was erected. Ouh present high school building was built in 1915.

The first class graduated from Worthington High School in 1880. Since thenover 1300 boys and girls have graduated from Worthington High School.

The school bell, which was brought from the East when the old academy building was first built, is now in the belfry of the present grade school building—a living memoir of the hardy pioneers who laid the ground work for the excellent Worthington school system of 1947.
