H. C. McCORD

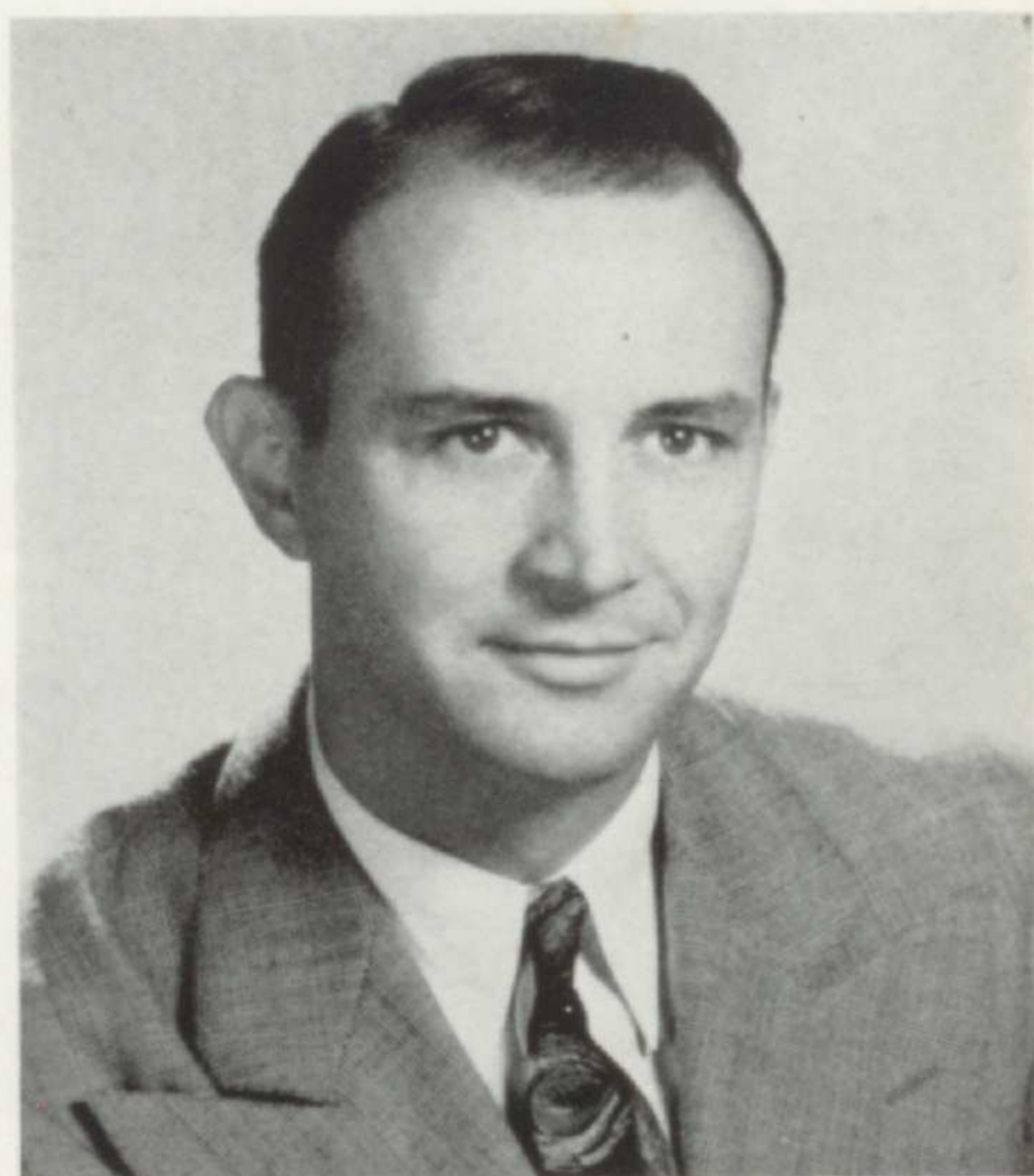
SUPERINTENDENT

The team got off to a good start when they whipped Gahanna 52-27, but went down to defeat in their fourth encounter, when Grove City turned the tables on them 38-37.

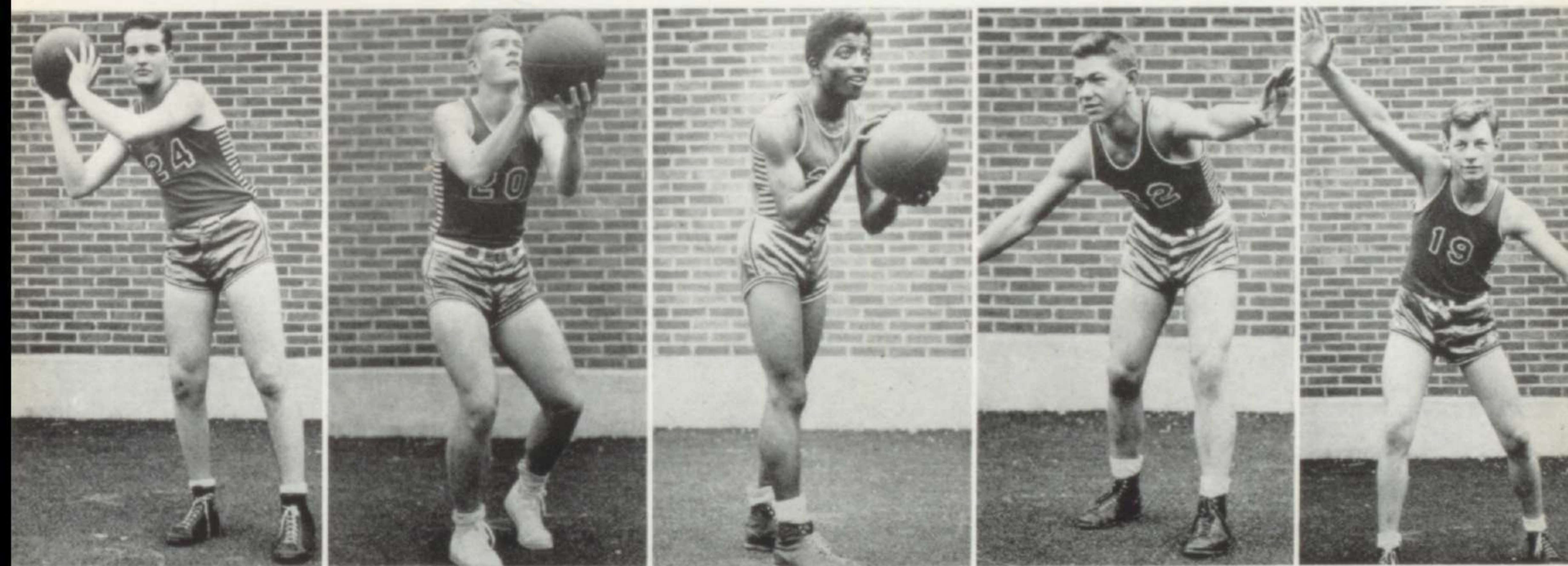
