


FOOTBALL





in Franklin County.

Starting well, the Cardinals topped New Albany 66-27, tough Delaware Willis 35-27, Reynoldsburg 57-27, and Granville 32-28. The Cards suffered their first defeat as Arlington won 33-23, put on a splendid performance in downing Mount Vernon 52-33, got stopped by Marysville 31-29, and easily rolled over Grandview 39-22. Then, they battled Canal Winchester, toughest contenders for the county crown, and though they fought on even terms throughout, a Winchester basket in the last eight seconds gave them the ball, 41-39.

The Cards set a scoring record in defeating Dublin 74-28. Then, Bexley tripped the Cards 44-39. Gahanna Lincoln was downed 62-27. The Grove City game offered thrills aplenty but we came away with it, 28-25. Then Worthington let out the stops as it beat Westerville 64-44, and Groveport 61-48. Hamilton Township fell 43-31. The Cardinals

clicked perfectly against a once-defeated Plain City team, trouncing the Scotties 45-29. In a thrill-packed finish with four first stringers on the bench, the "shock troops" had their moment of glory as they lasted out Hilliards to win by one point 49 to 48.

Beginning the county tournament, Reynoldsburg was bowled over 55-33. Then Hilliards fell 43-34. Groveport in the finals, put up stiff resistance but went down 49-46.







VOLLEYBALL



Another new sport introduced by Mrs. Custis was deck tennis. A mixed class tournament was completed which caused much friendly rivalry between the classes.


All the girls who participated in deck tennis enjoyed it very much and Mrs. Custis hopes to have more girls participating in this new sport next year.

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

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
