In September 1951, the students of Worthington Senior High entered into their new school, which was to house some two-hundred and fifty students.

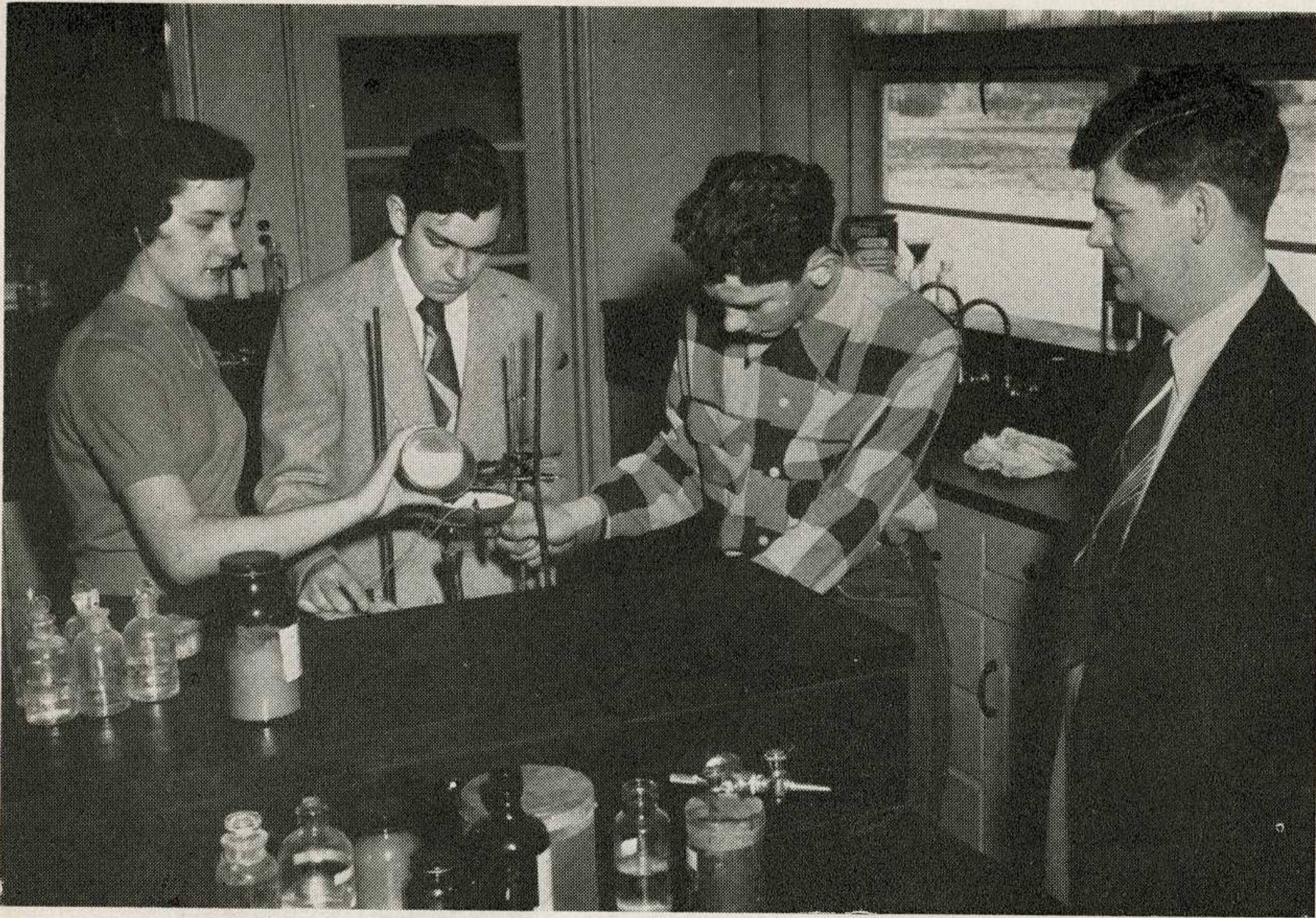

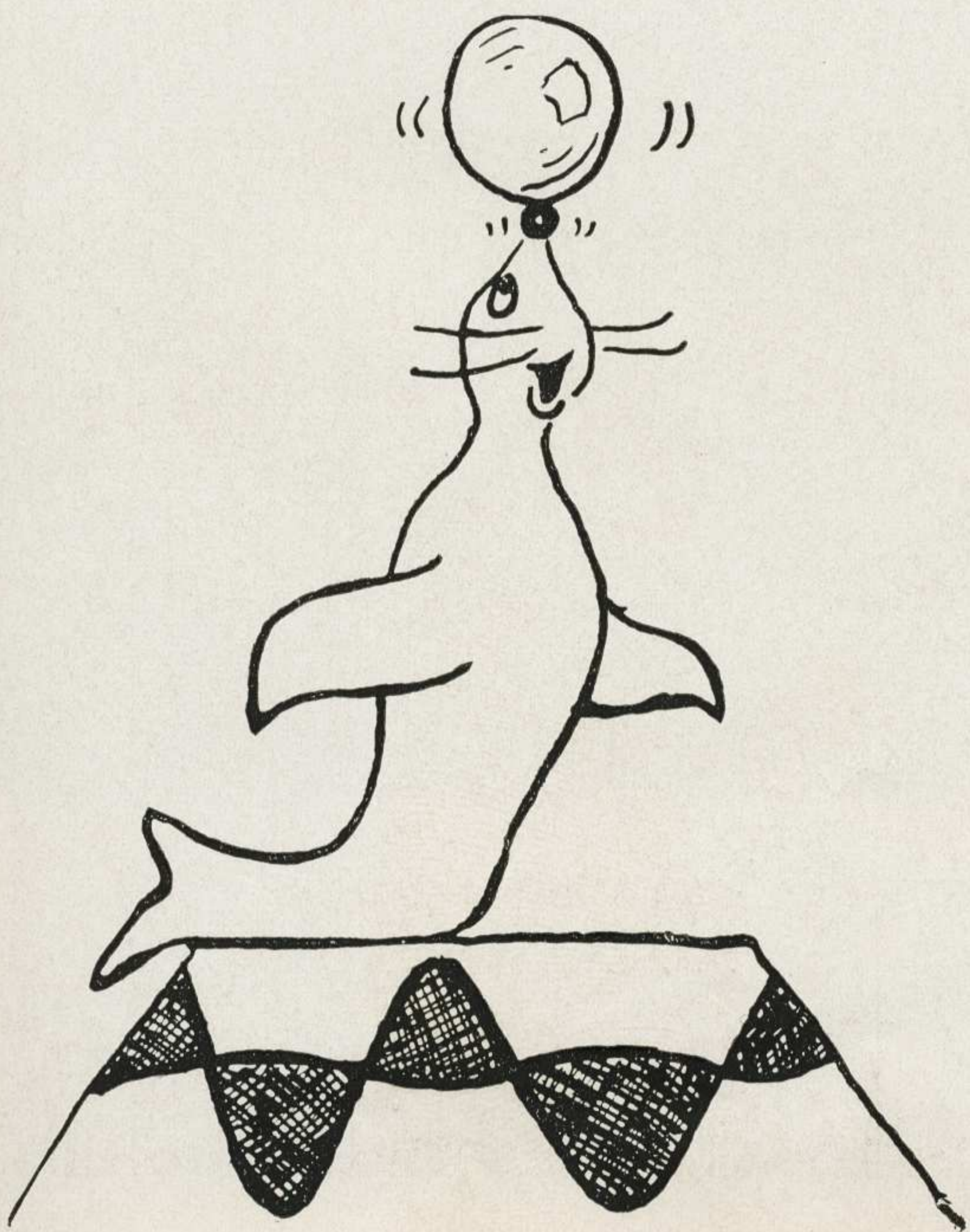

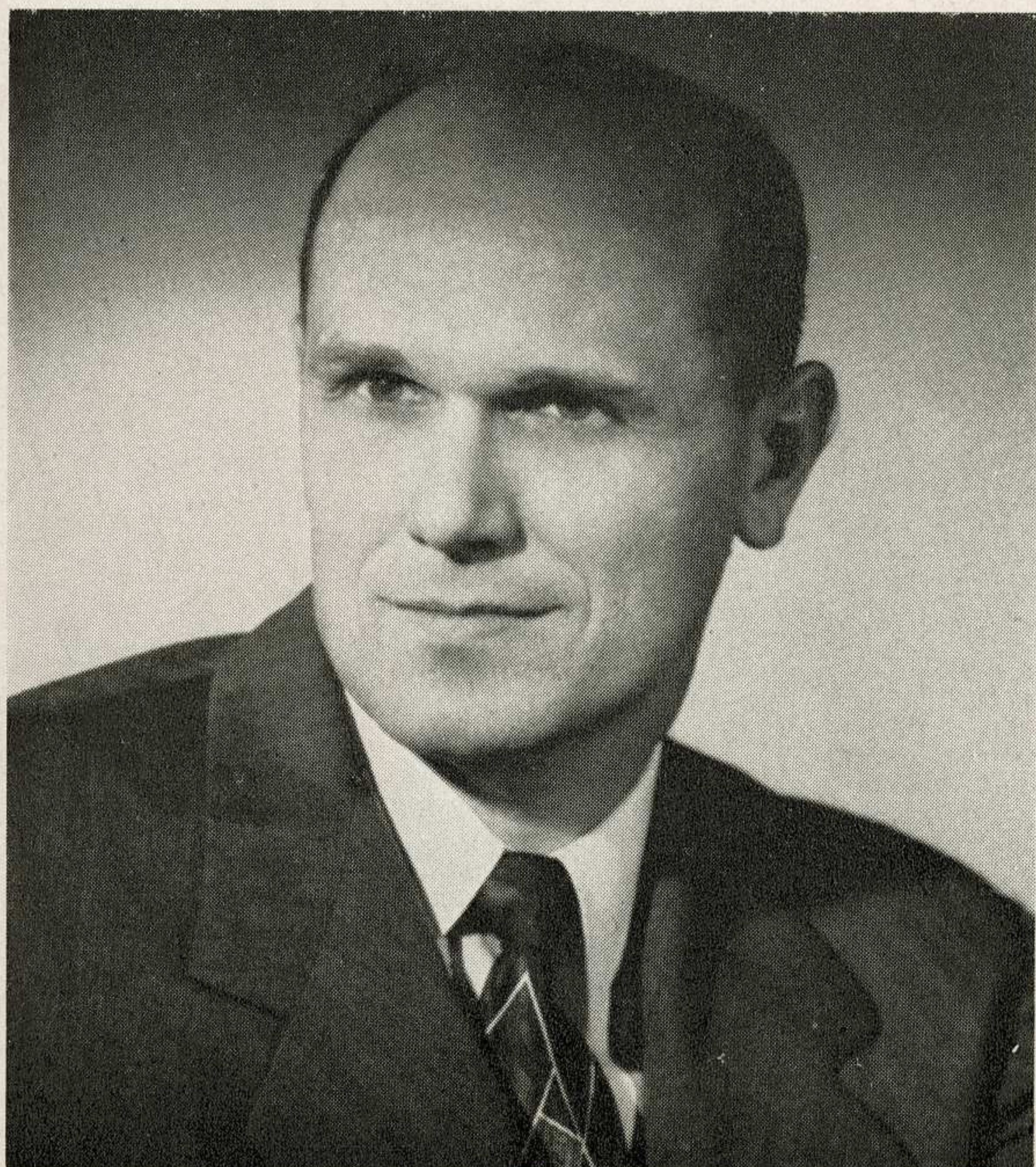


PRINCIPAL

SUPERINTENDENT

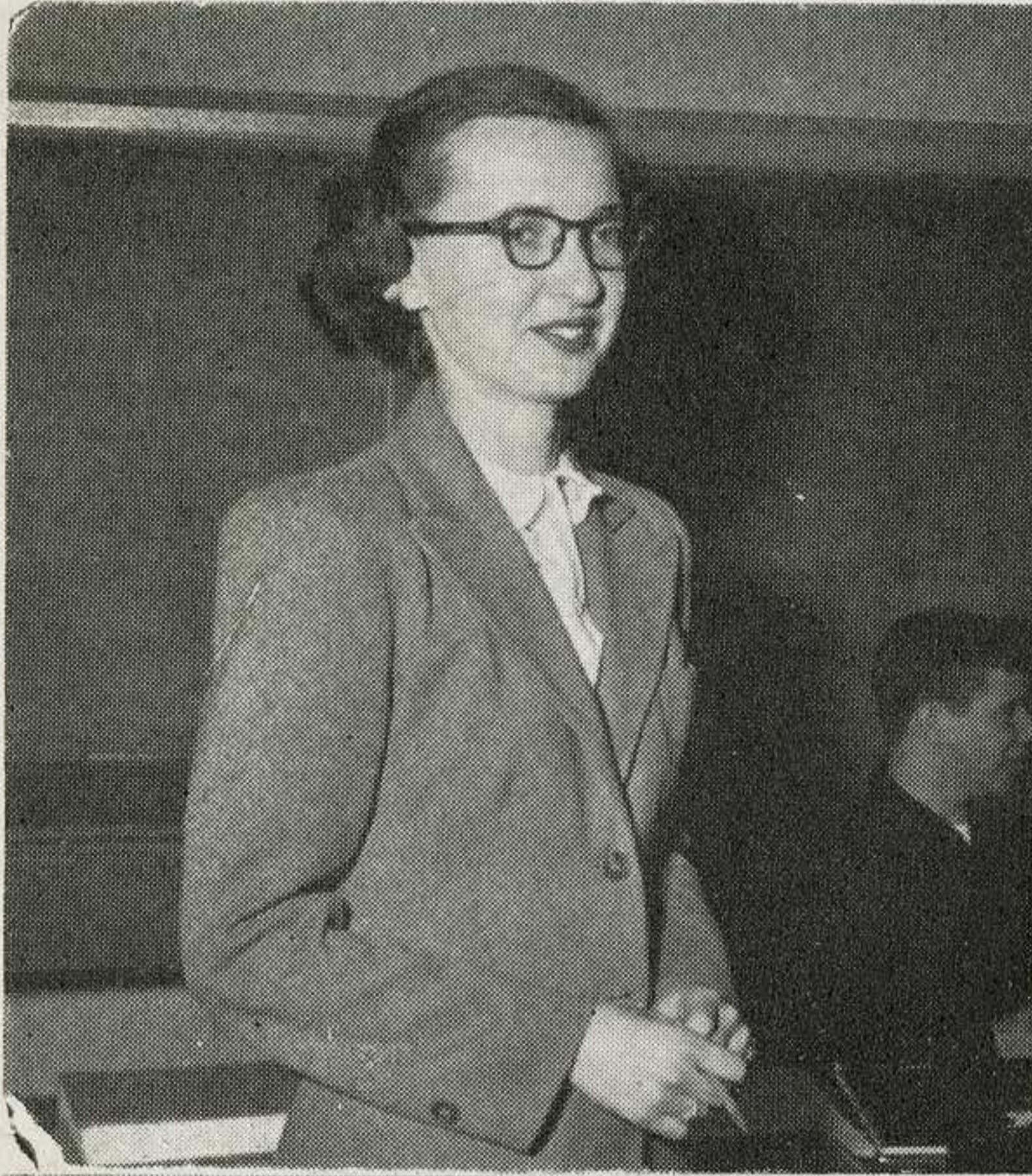

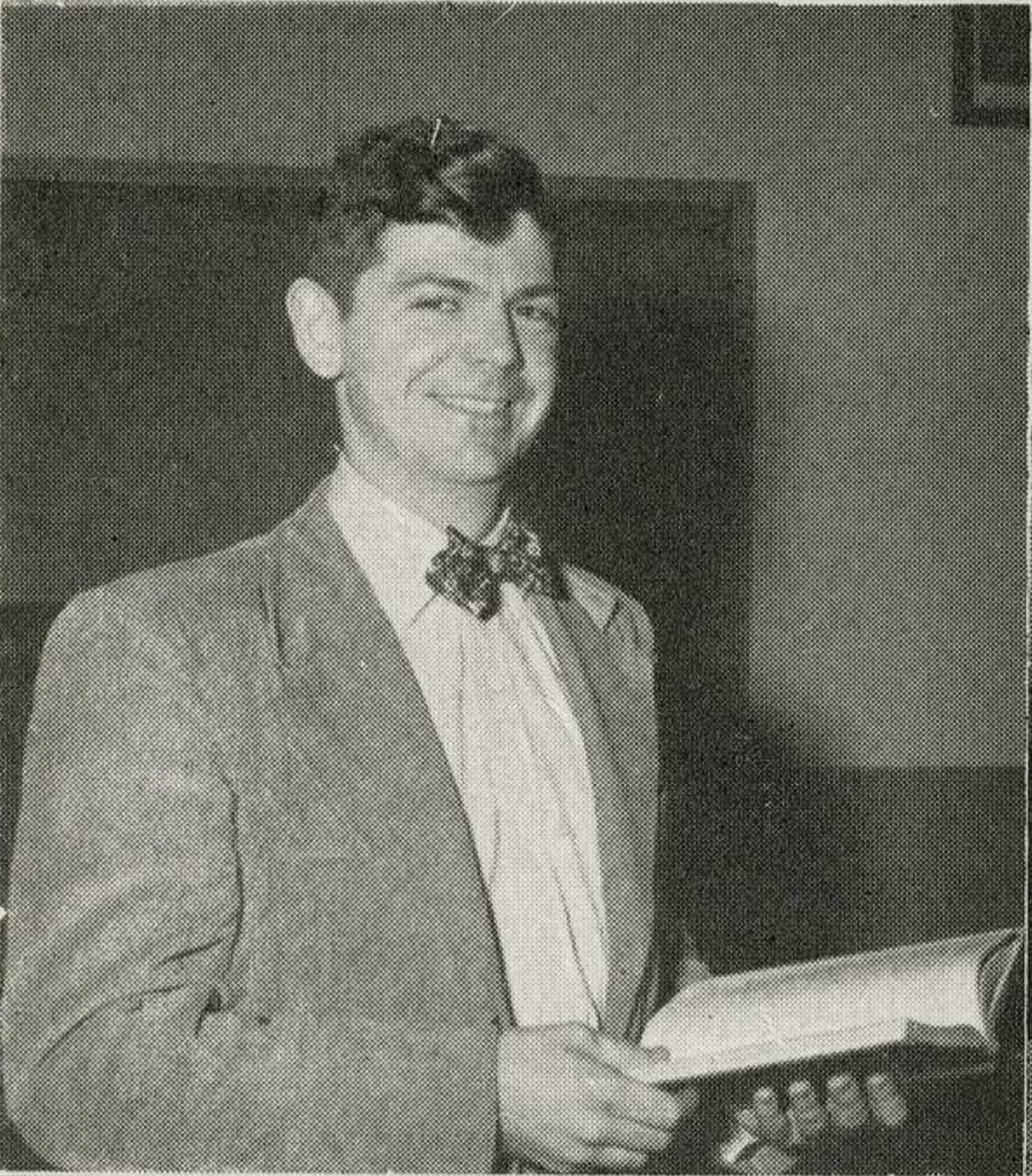
JR. HIGH PRINCIPAL

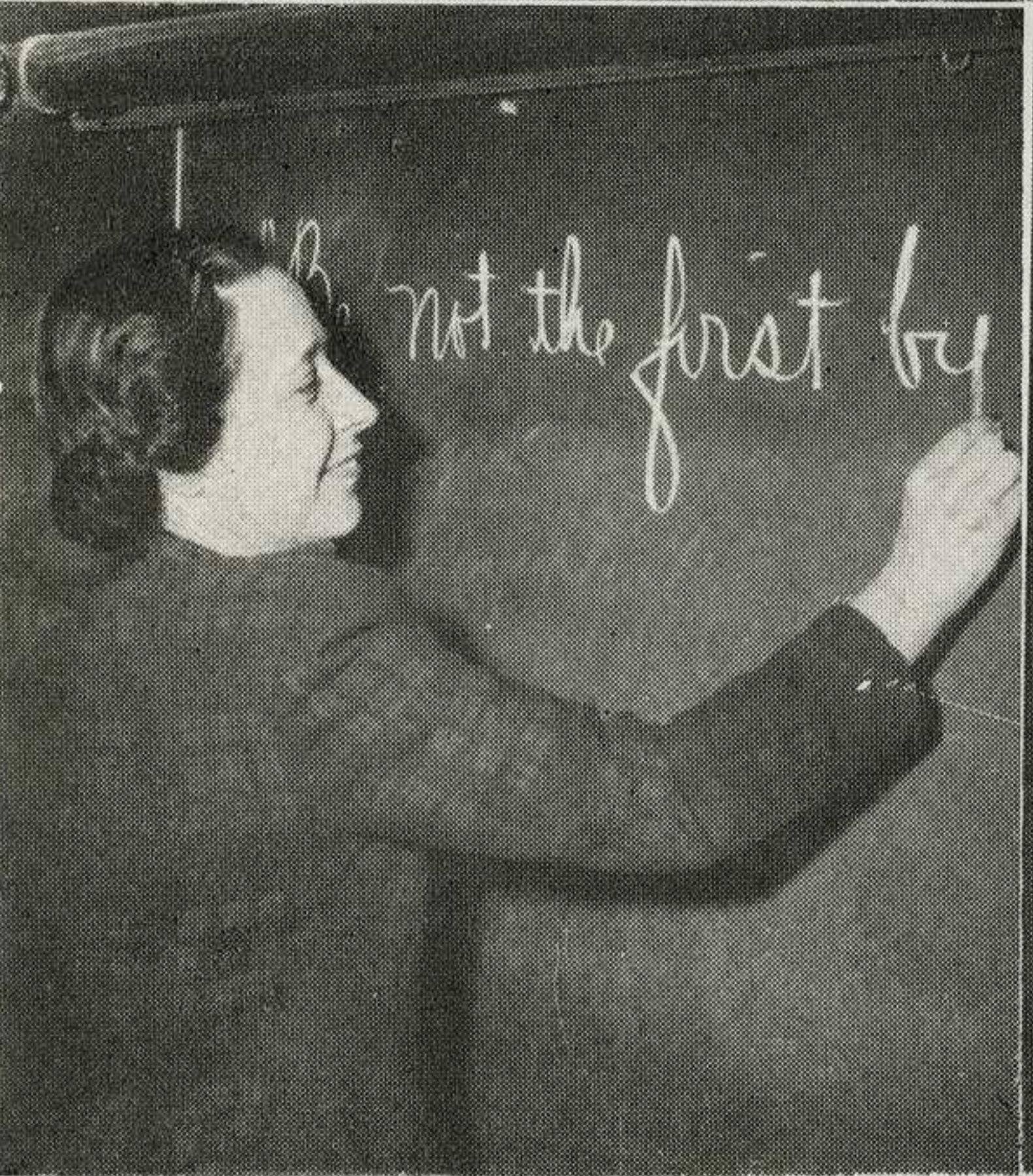

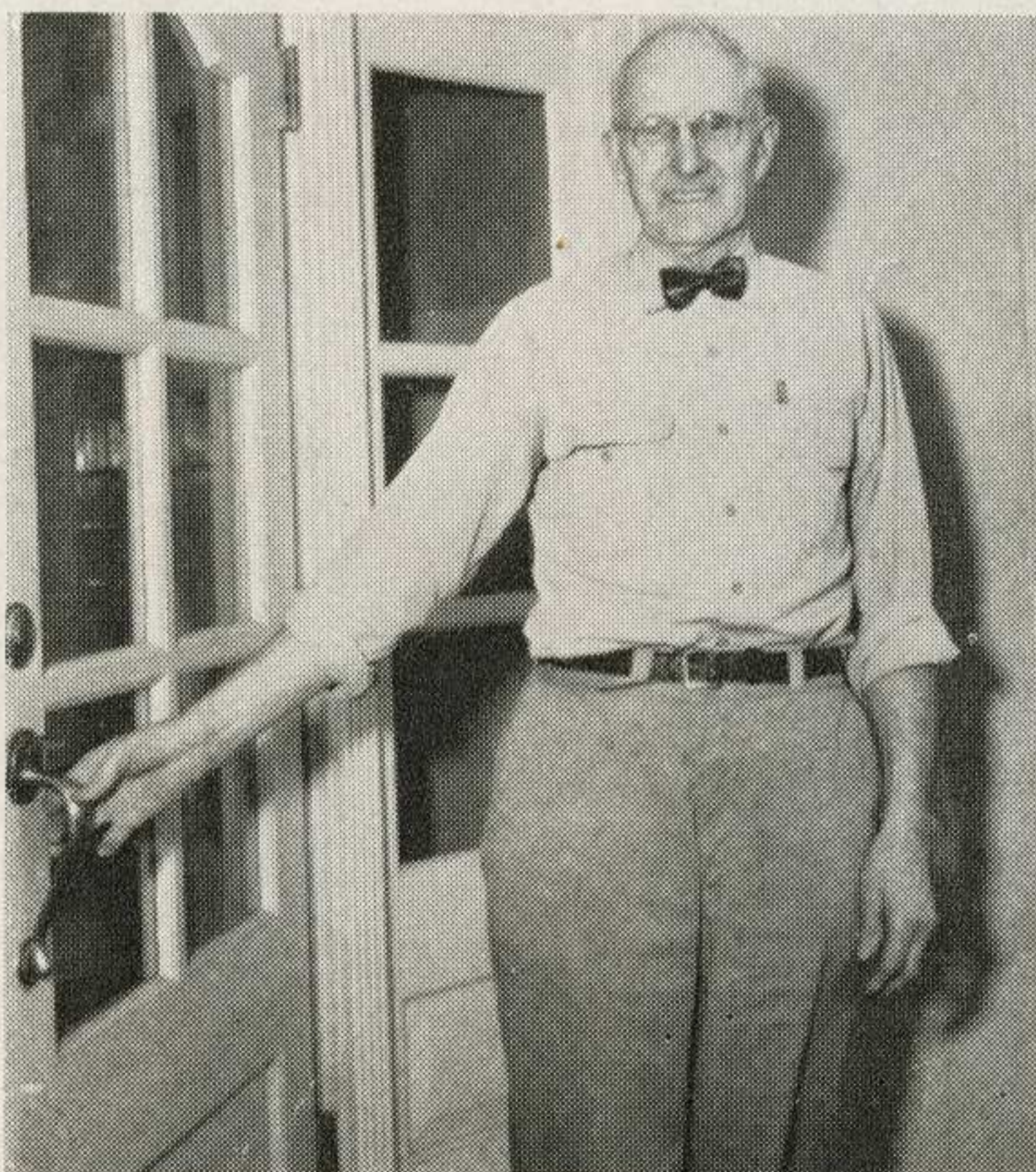

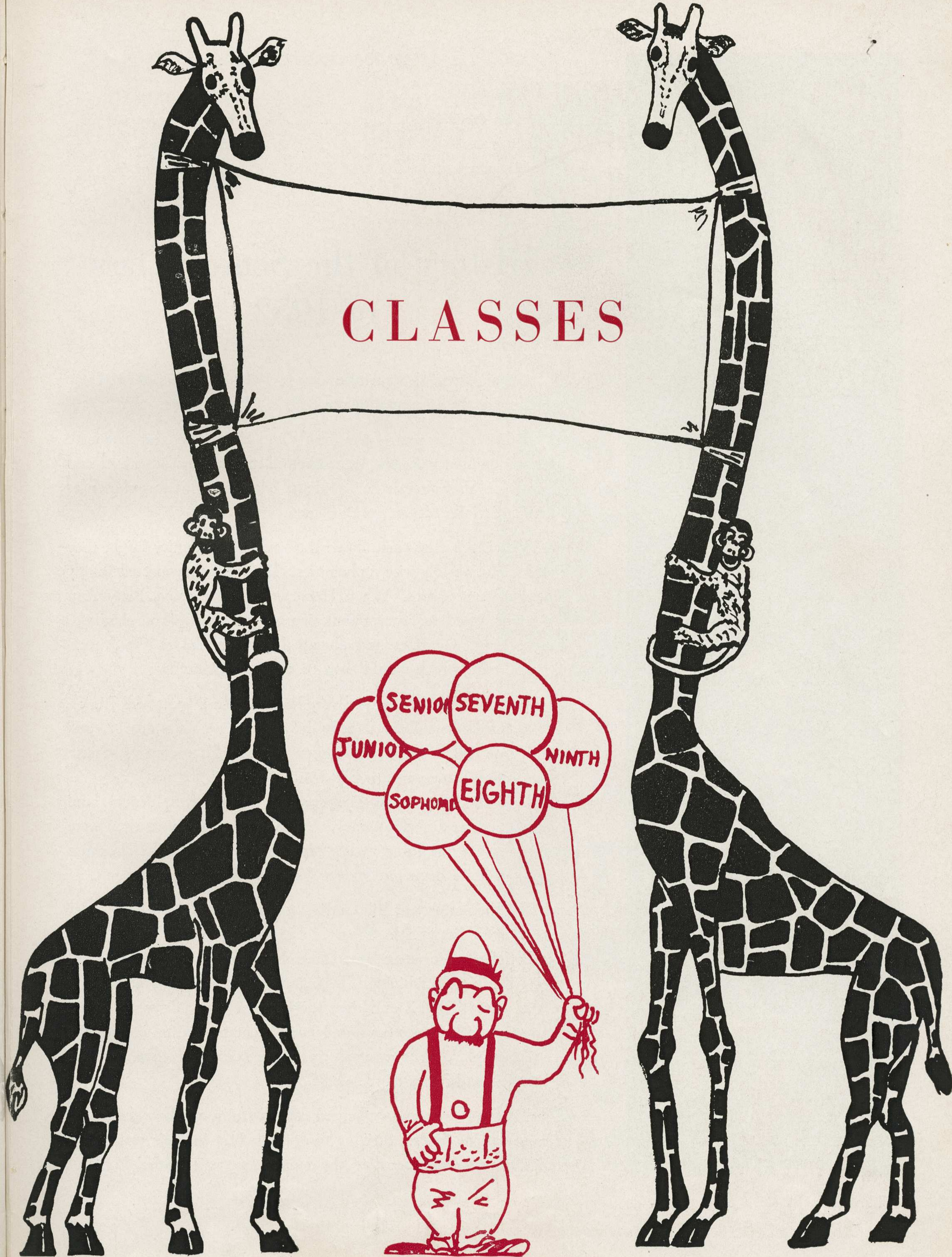

On an eventful September day in 1948, the Class of '52 came together for the first time in the halls of Worthington.

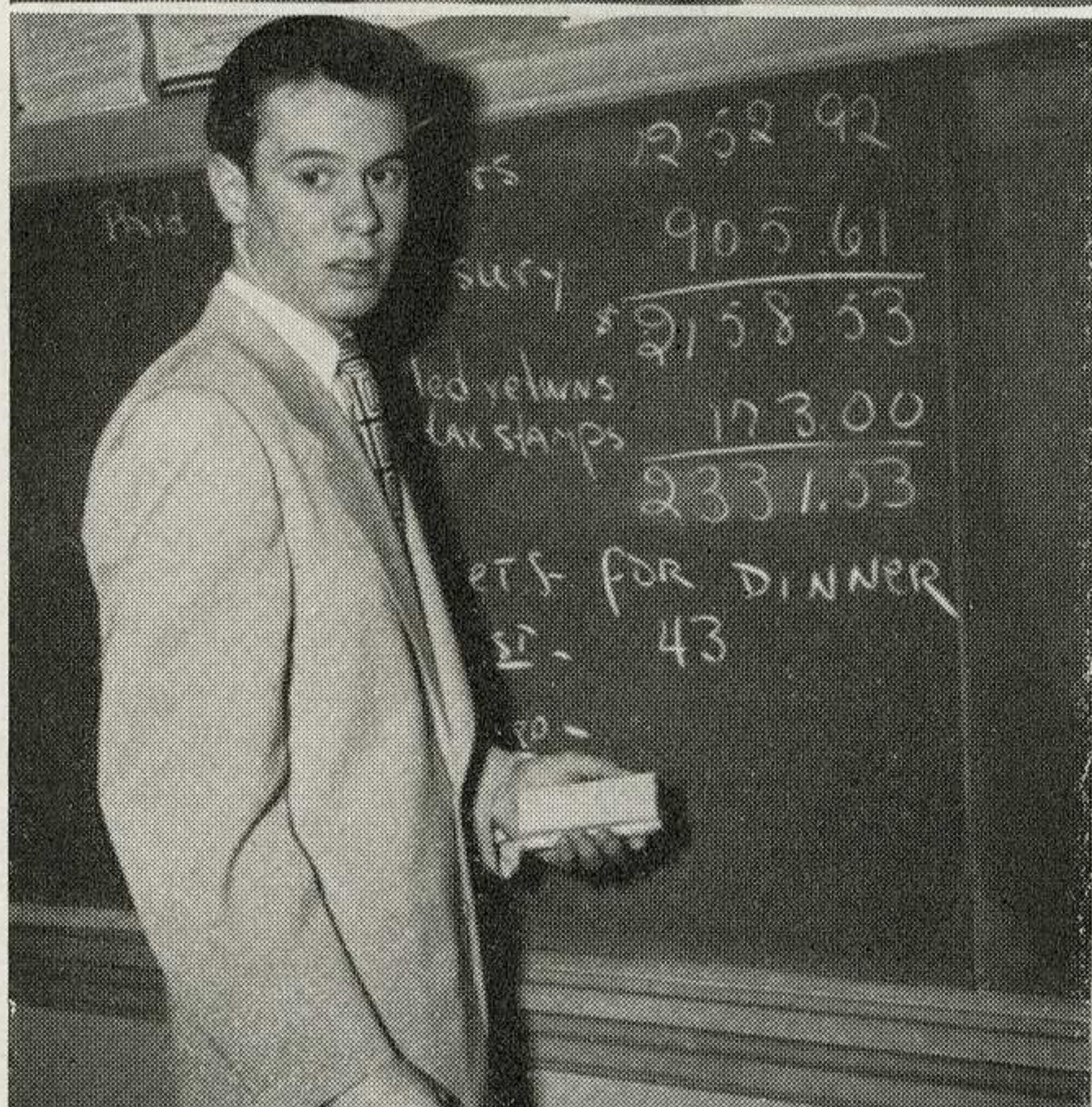

When the class came down the long hill to Senior High, they had become worldly-wise sophomores. That year they elected Buddy Butler class president. When Homecoming time came, Betty Ann Price was voted to be representative on the court. The class was busy selling magazines and already looking ahead to the Junior-Senior Prom, which would soon be their responsibility.

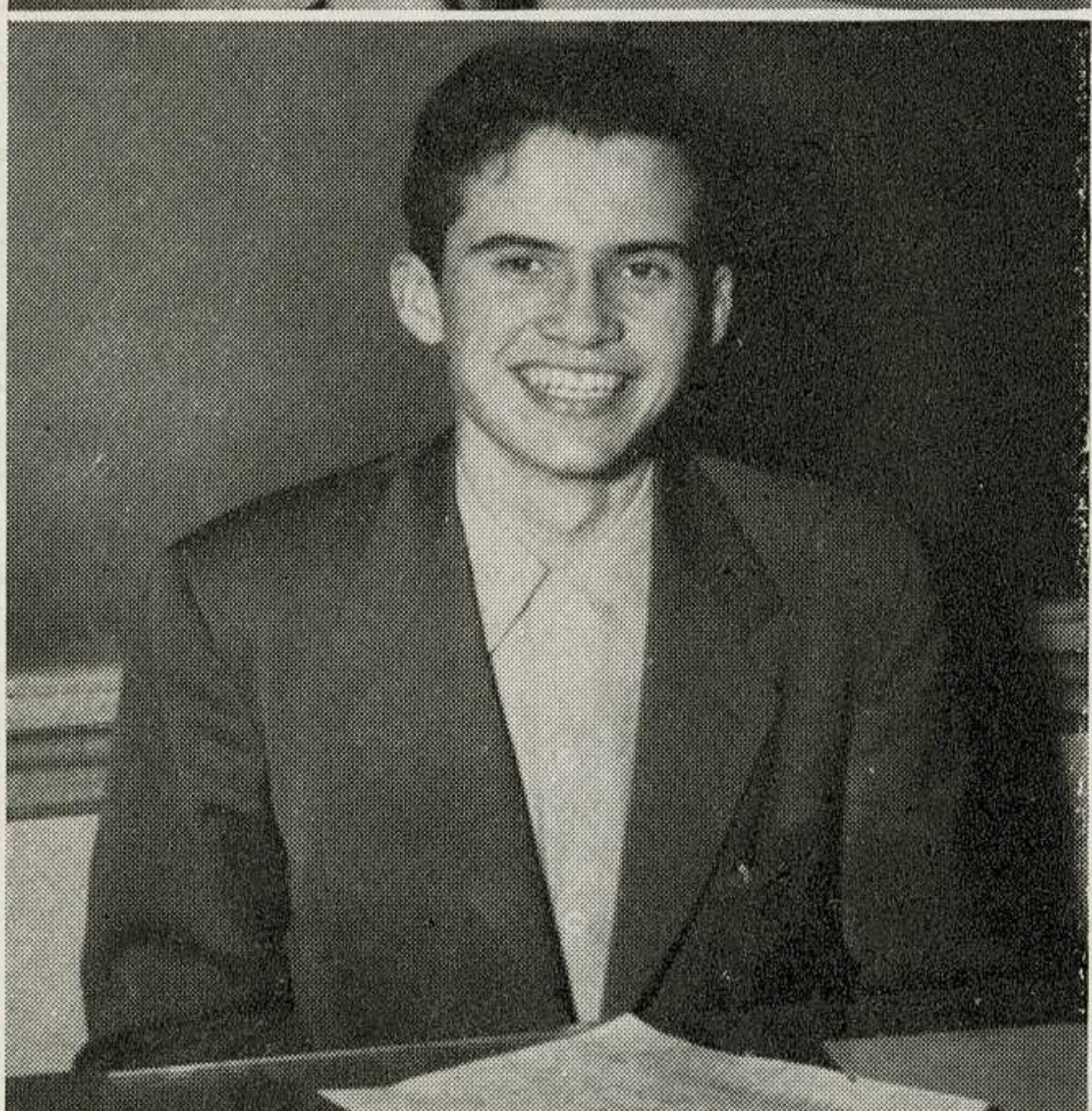
In 1951, the class worked very hard to plan a successful Junior-Senior. President Dave Moody led them in this endeavor, and Betty Ann Price was again chosen for the Homecoming Court. The Junior-Senior was really worth their best efforts, they decided, so the class members sponsored paper drives, dances, and other functions to make money. At the end of the year they were able to have a fine Prom with a Mardi Gras theme. The class also presented "Life Begins at Sixteen", a comedy play in three acts.

For the senior year Bill Cuddy was class president. The popular vote elected Betty Ann Price Homecoming Queen, and Shirley Egelhoff her senior attendant. The class directed its efforts toward taking a trip to Washington, D. C. and New York City at the end of the year. To this end they sponsored a paper drive, spaghetti dinners, collected sales tax stamps, and accomplished other projects. The class play, "Mignonette," gave the seniors a chance to be gentlemen and ladies of the Old South.

Many of the seniors planned college study, while others chose jobs in various fields. Striving to do their best in their work, they would always remember that "the door to success is labeled PUSH."

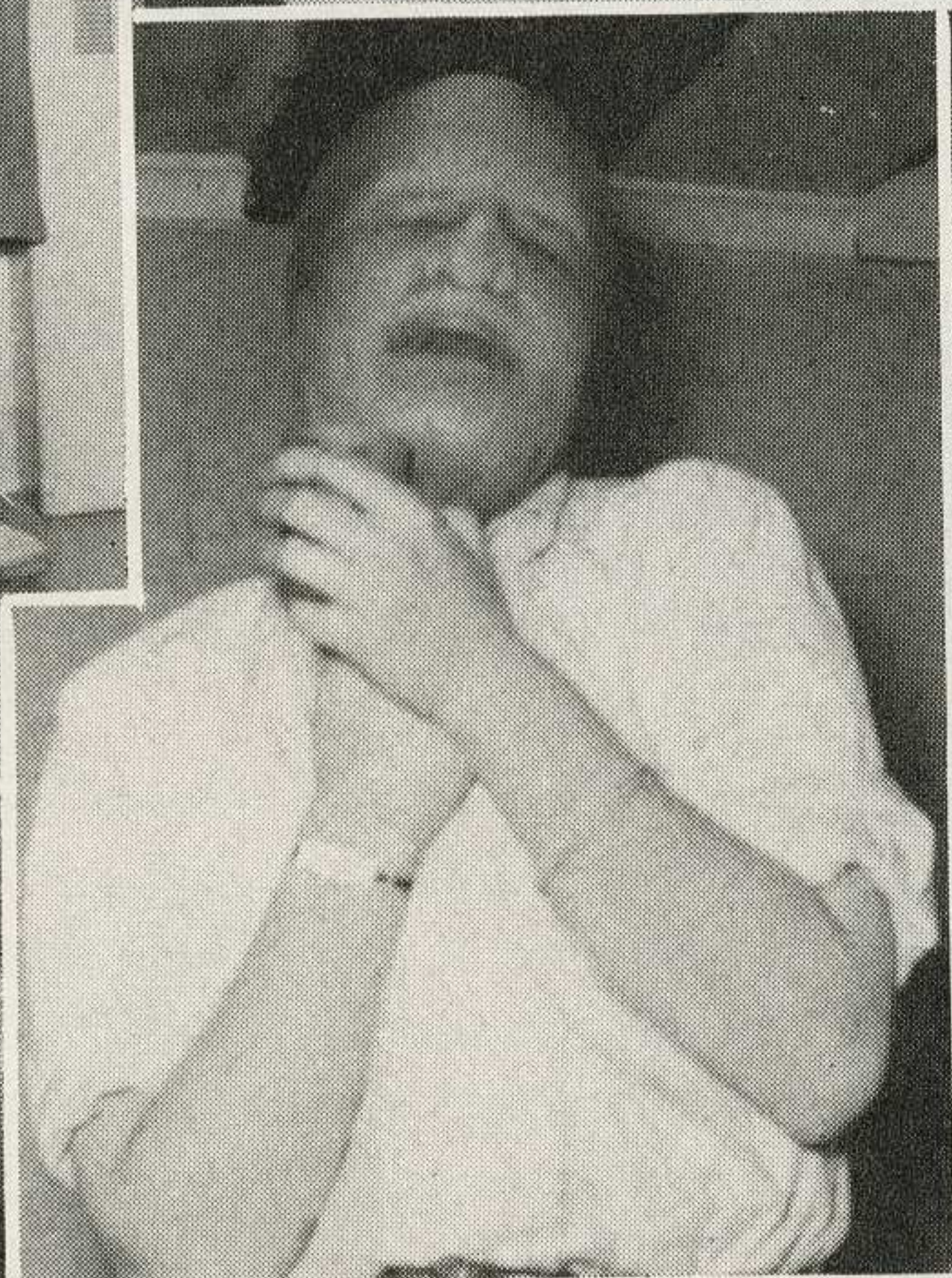
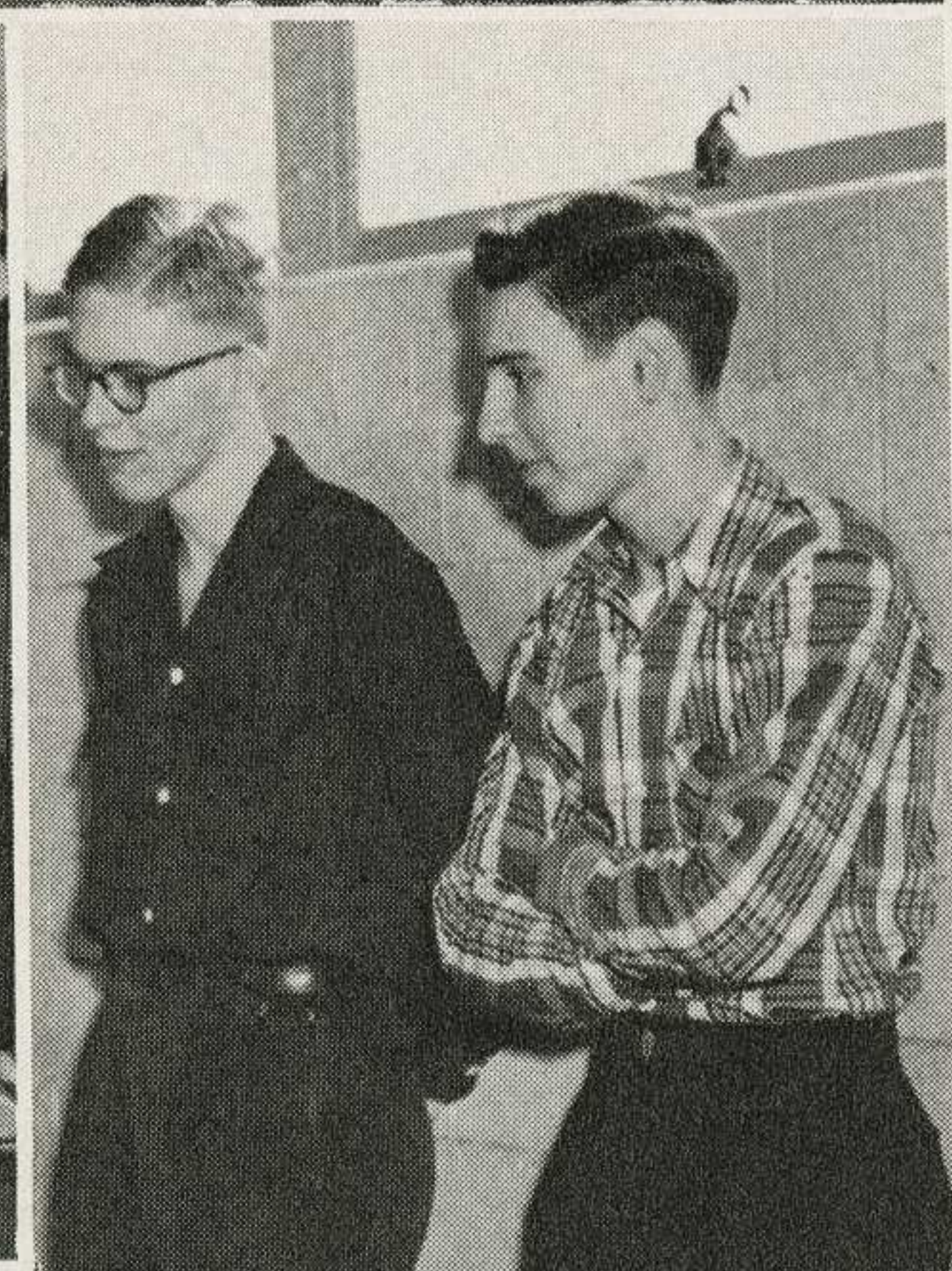
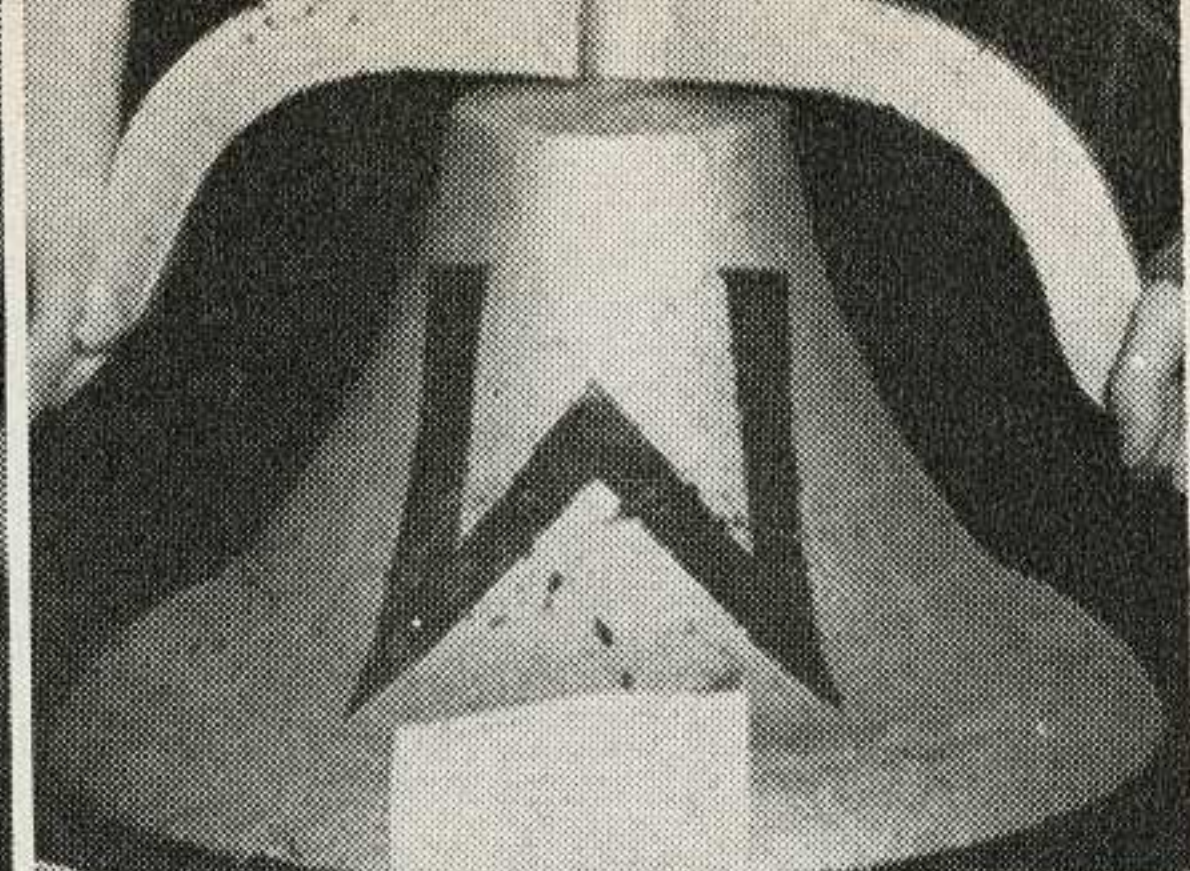
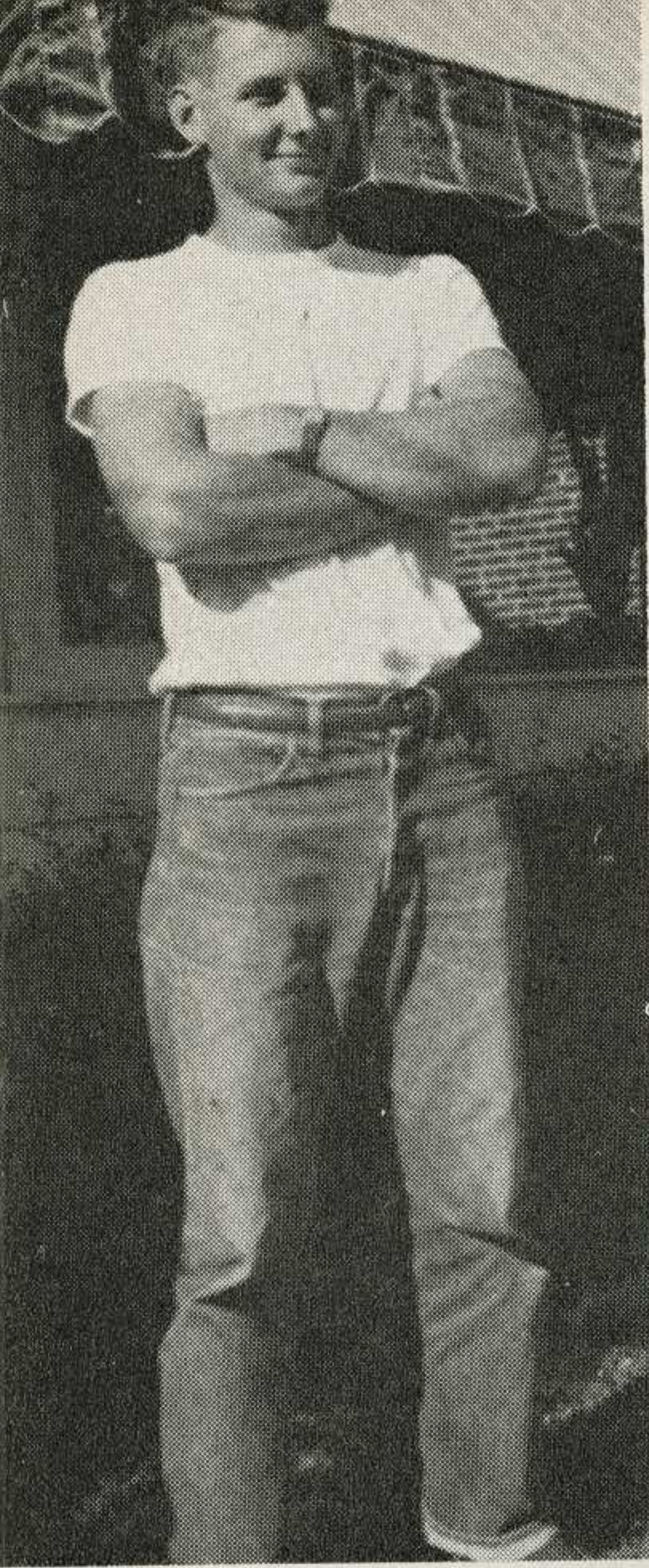
It is rather unusual that the two top ranking seniors are girls, however, these two girls lead a very active life, not only in their school work, but they are very busy with extra curricular activities.

Coach Heischman's 1951 golf squad found considerably rougher going in their first year of Class A and Mid Six competition.

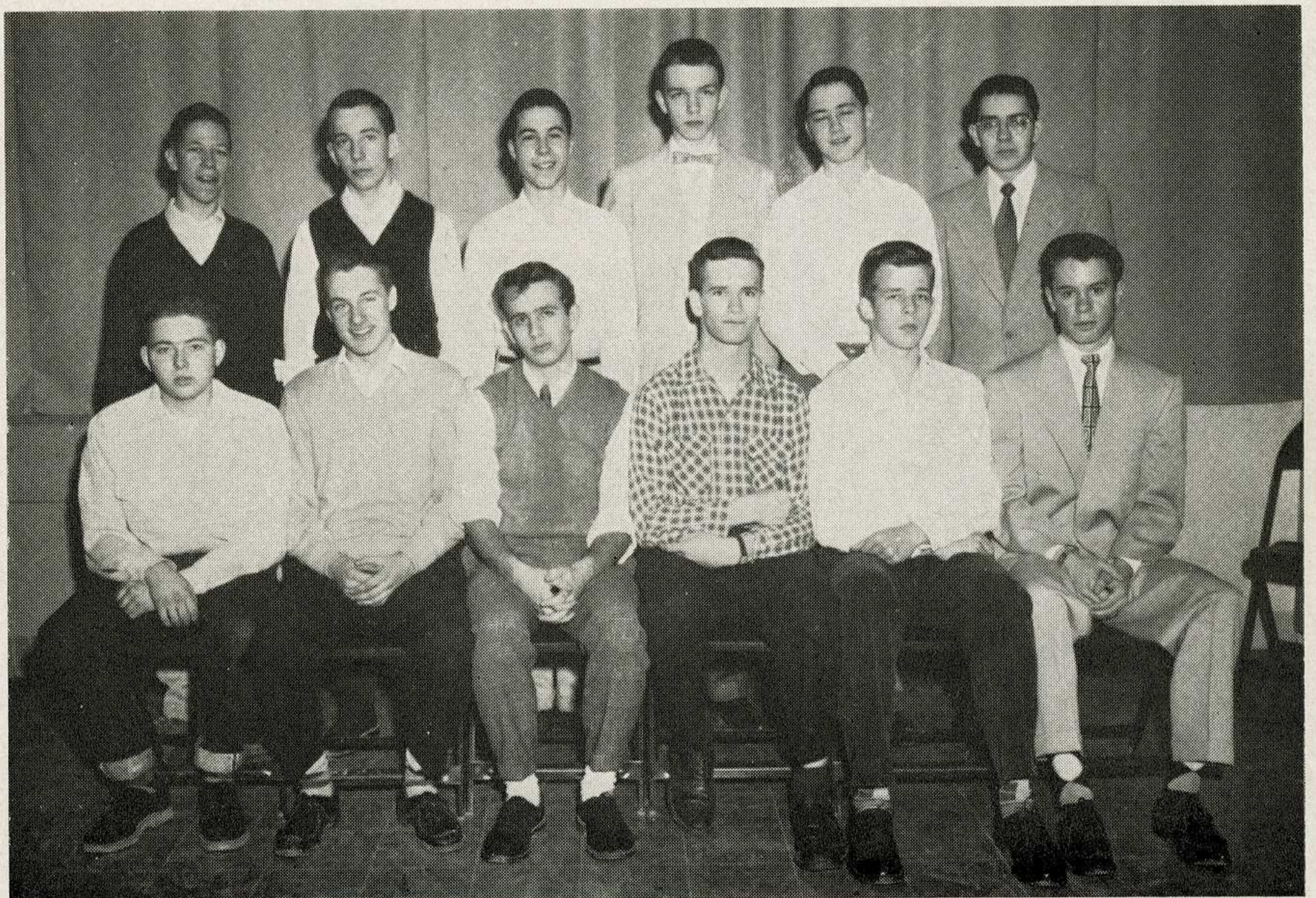

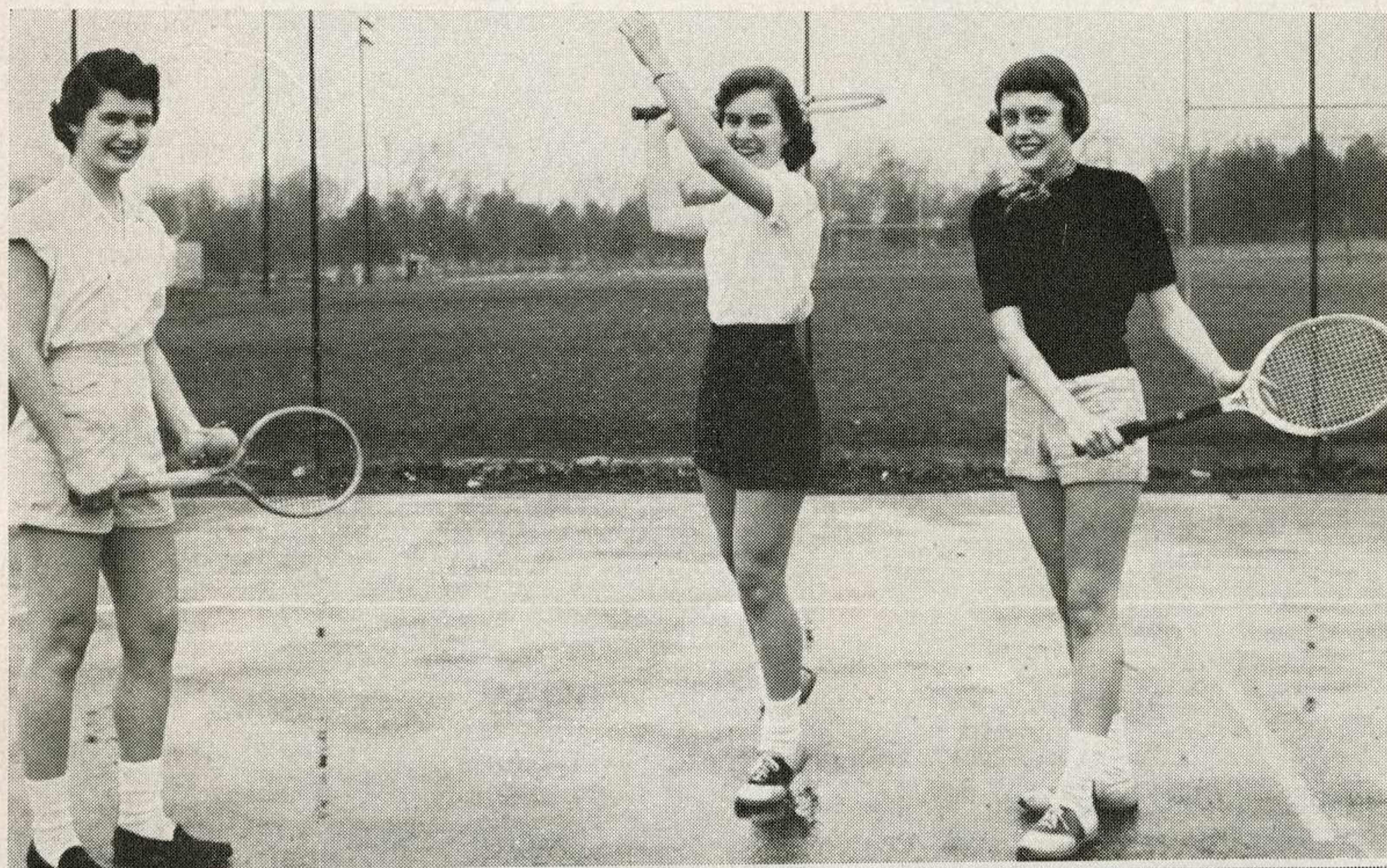

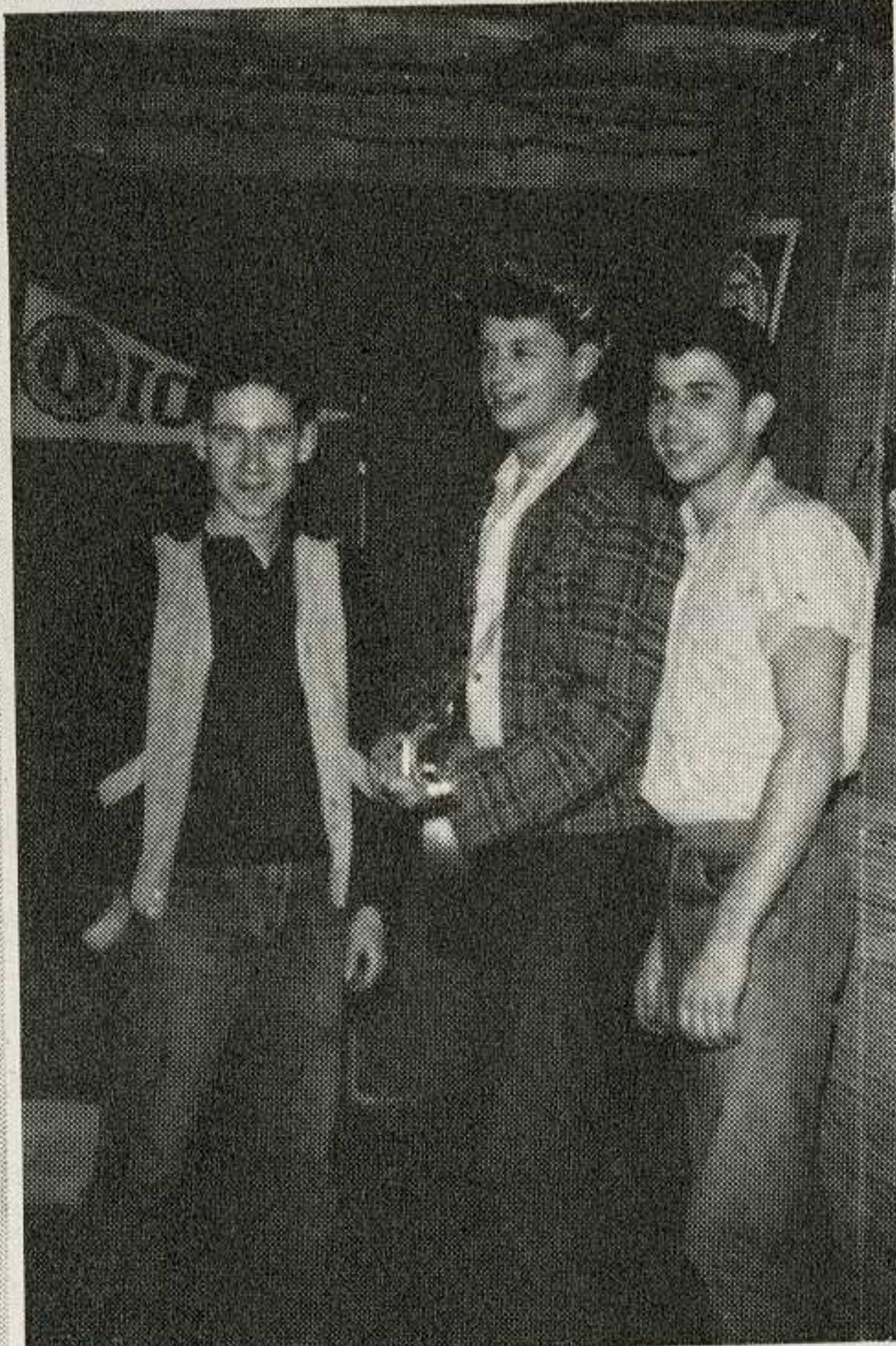
VARIETY SHOW

The class as a whole leaves its sincere thanks to the faculty of W. H. S. for the time, patience and consideration they have shown us throughout our high school days.

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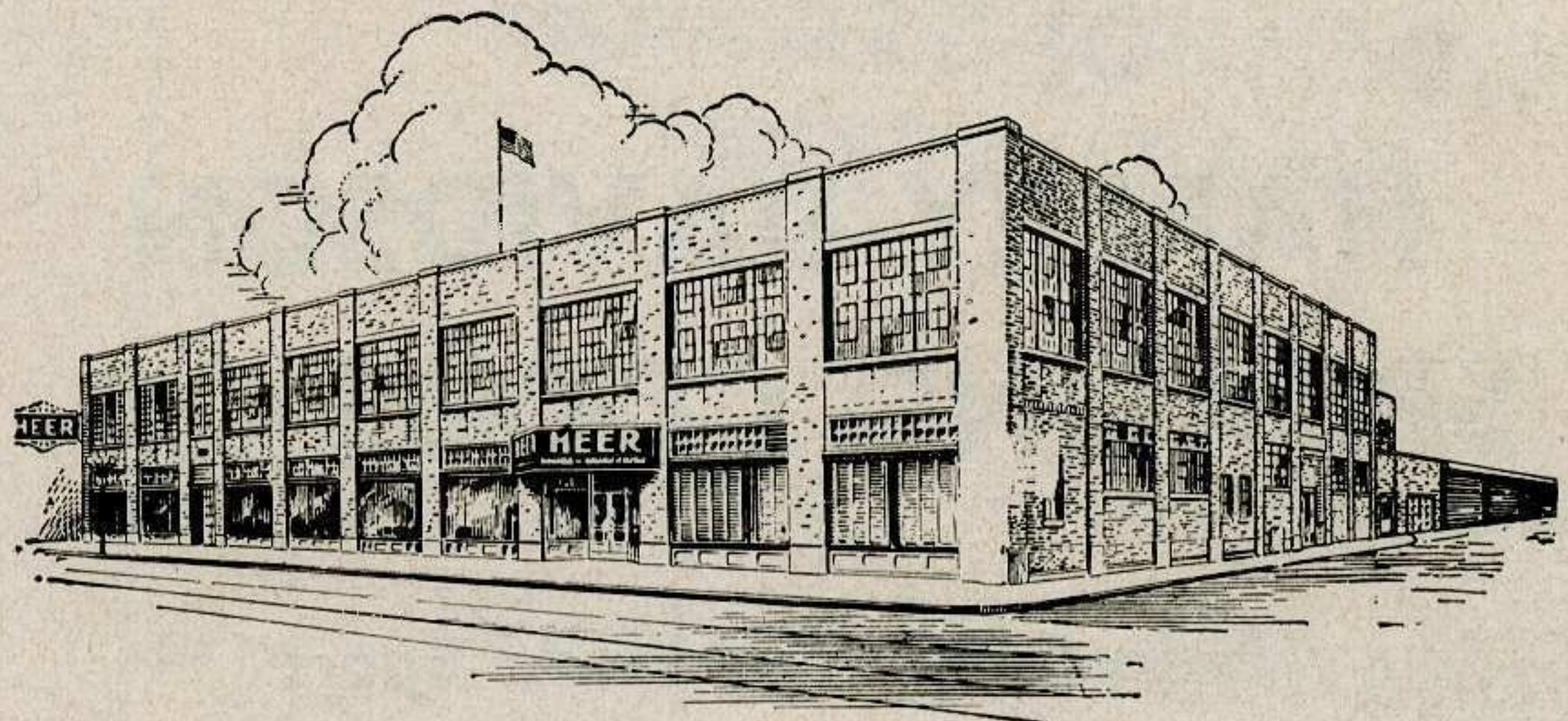
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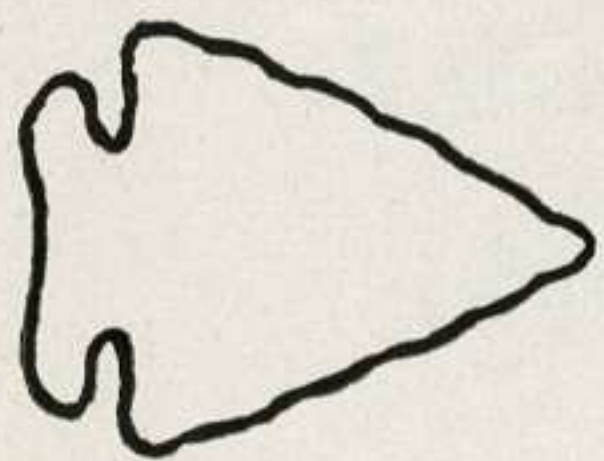
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
