Quality Time Pays Off for Five Seniors

Five Kilbourne students were named scholarship finalists by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. These students include seniors Malcolm Durkin, Michael Fu, Joshua Jaffe, Andrew Kissel and Kailin Liu.

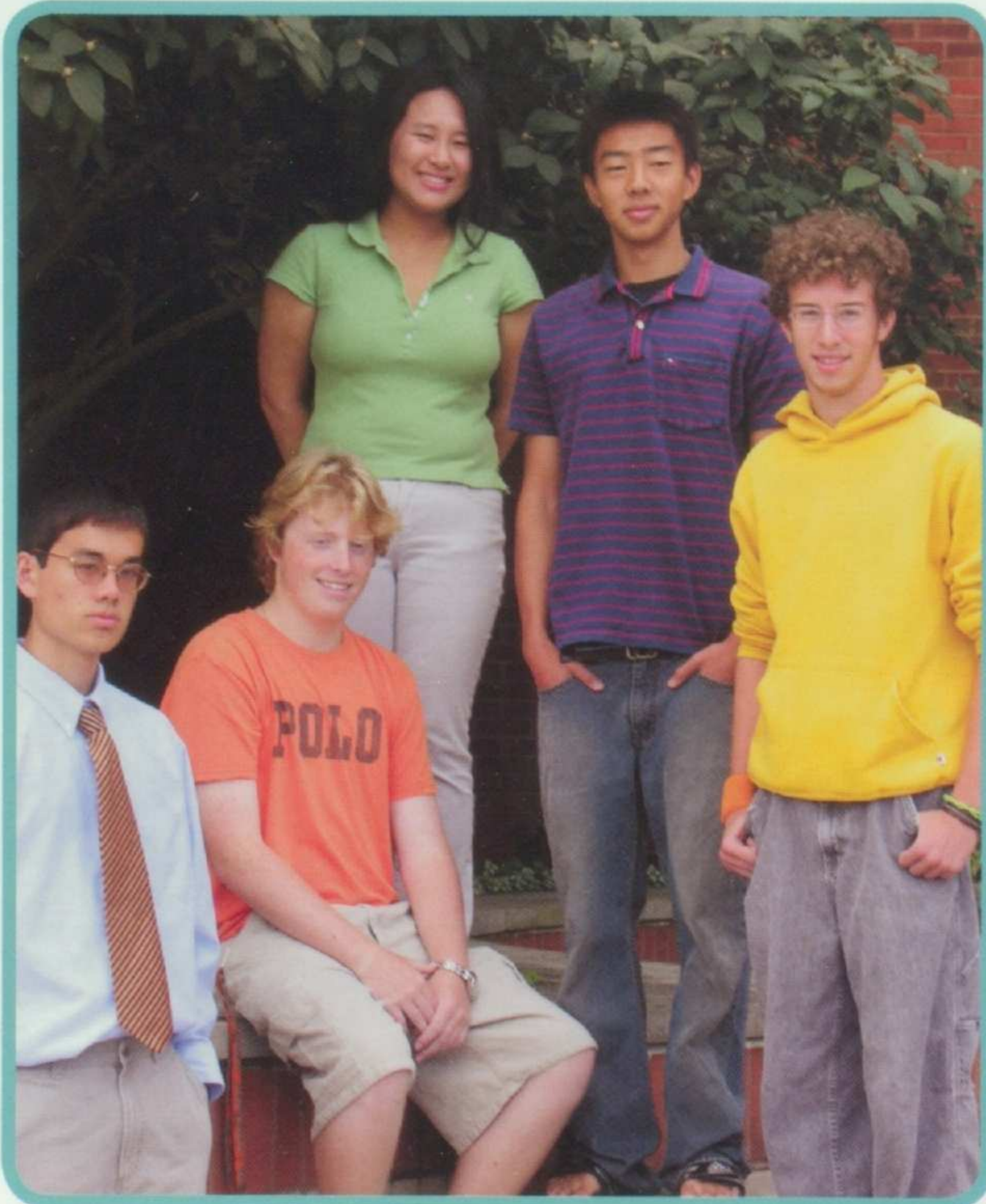
"The surprise came to me when I was qualified as a semi-finalist, which is a step before you become a finalist," says Kissel. "I didn't expect I did that well on the PSAT, but I guess I did."

The PSAT, also used as the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, is a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT Reasoning Test; the backbone for college acceptance. The test also gives students a chance to enter the National Merit Scholarship Corporation scholarship program as a junior.

The NMSC scholarship program began in 1955, and each year approximately 1.3 million junior test takers qualify.

"The number of students who qualify for the semi-finalists is the top half percent of the students who take the PSAT," says Cathie Walker, one of the Kilbourne guidance counselors. "Once the qualifications have been made, the application process begins with the input of scores, the GPAs, activities, recommendations and so on. Finally, by March, the finalists are notified through mail." Nationwide, only about 15,000 students qualify as finalists each year. "It is an incredible honor," said Walker.

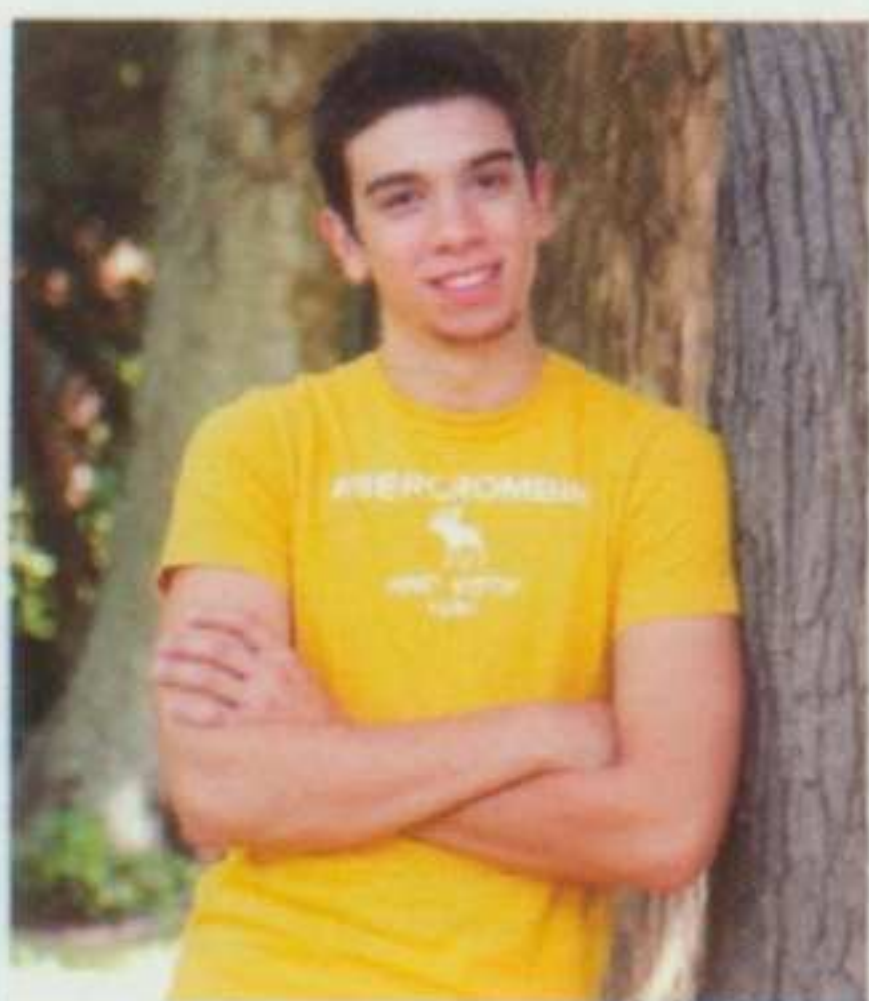
In order to qualify as a finalist, semi-finalists have to write essays about themselves in order to convince the sponsors that they should be selected as finalists. In addition, they must take the SAT before the finalist application process is due to verify their PSAT scores. Finalists can receive \$2,500 to \$5,000 depending on the college of choice and career.

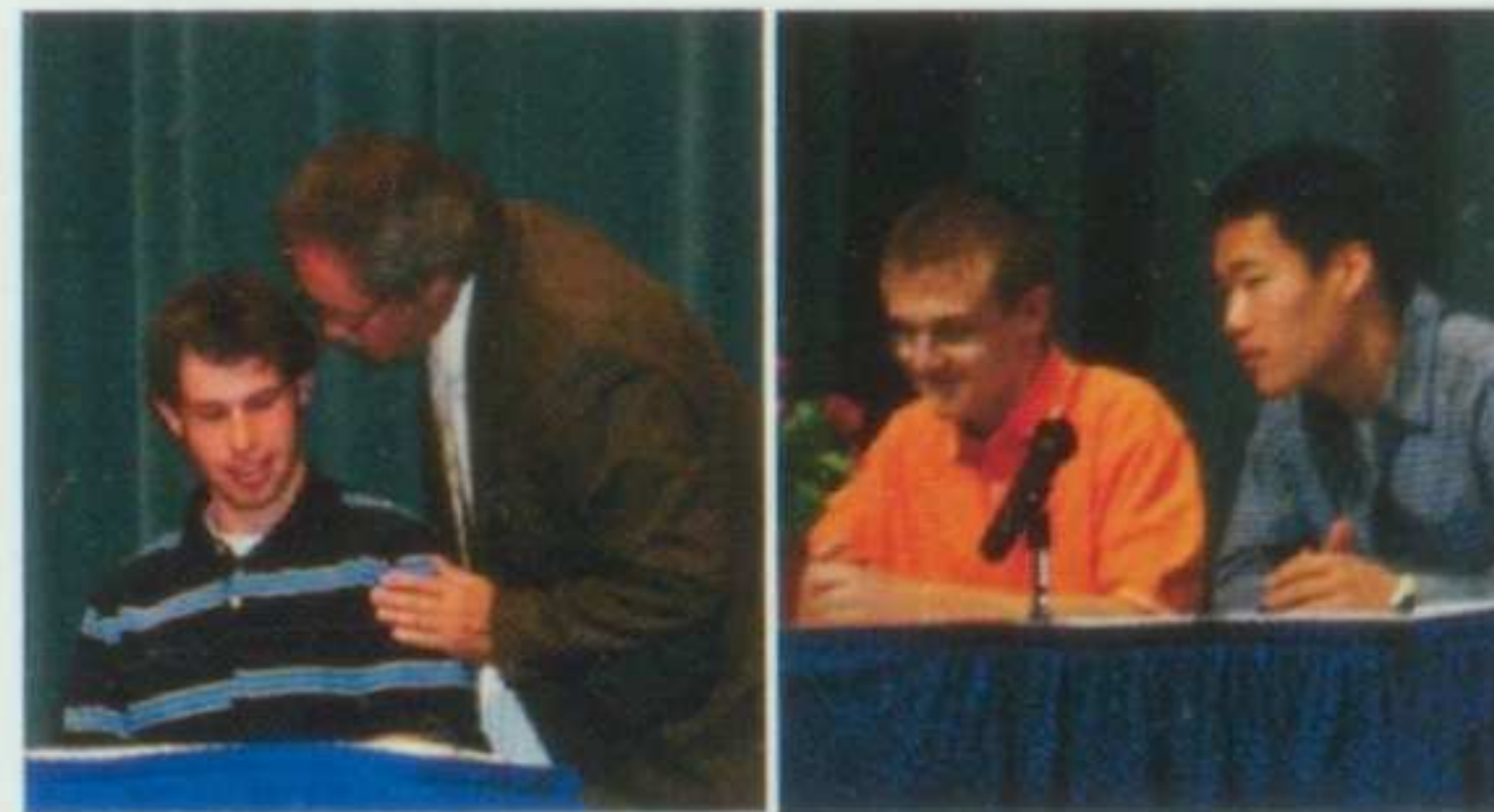
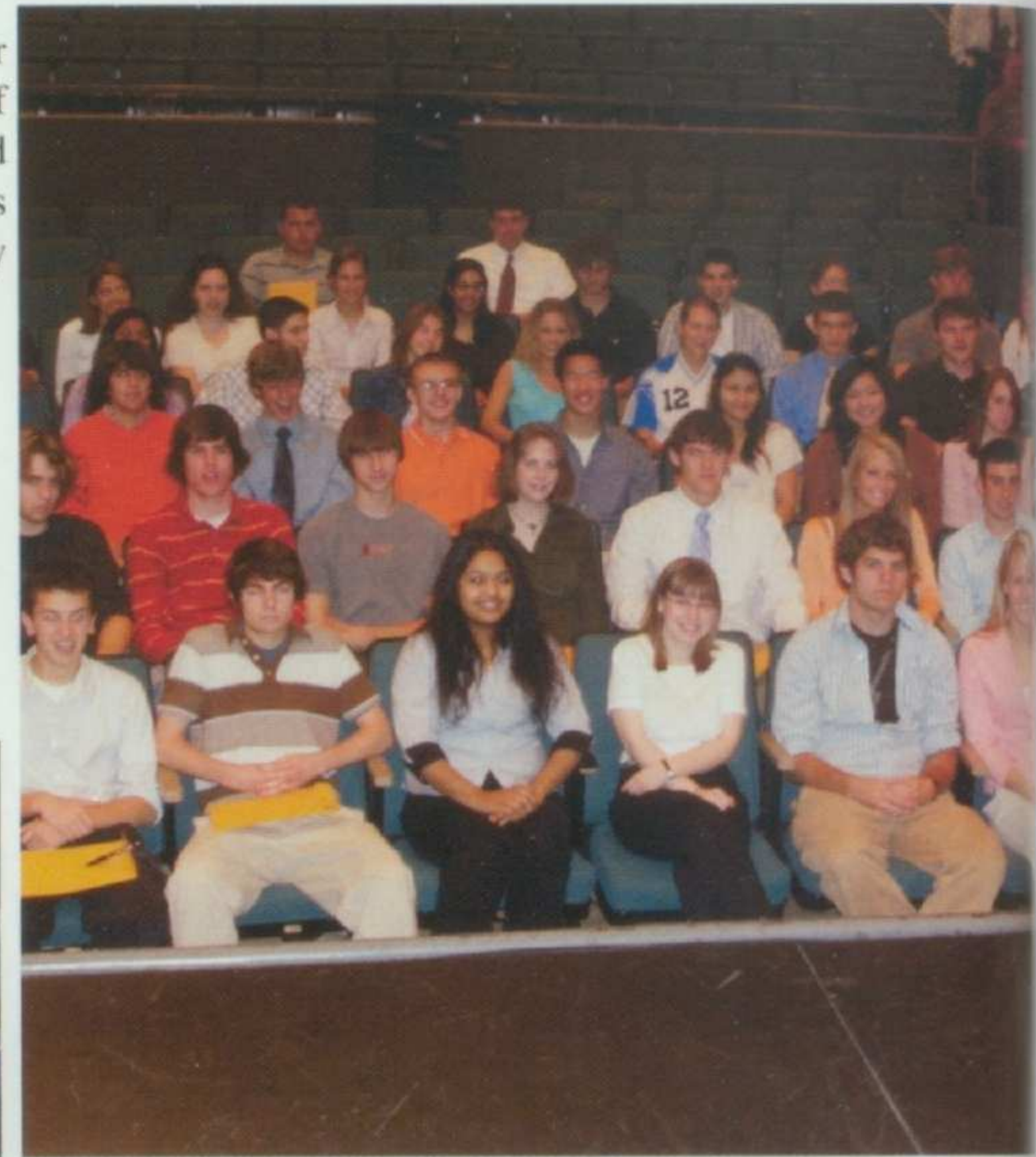
Academic Boosters, a group of parents, have sponsored this event for three years. The Superintendent, parents, honorees, school and district officials and the press are invited to attend.

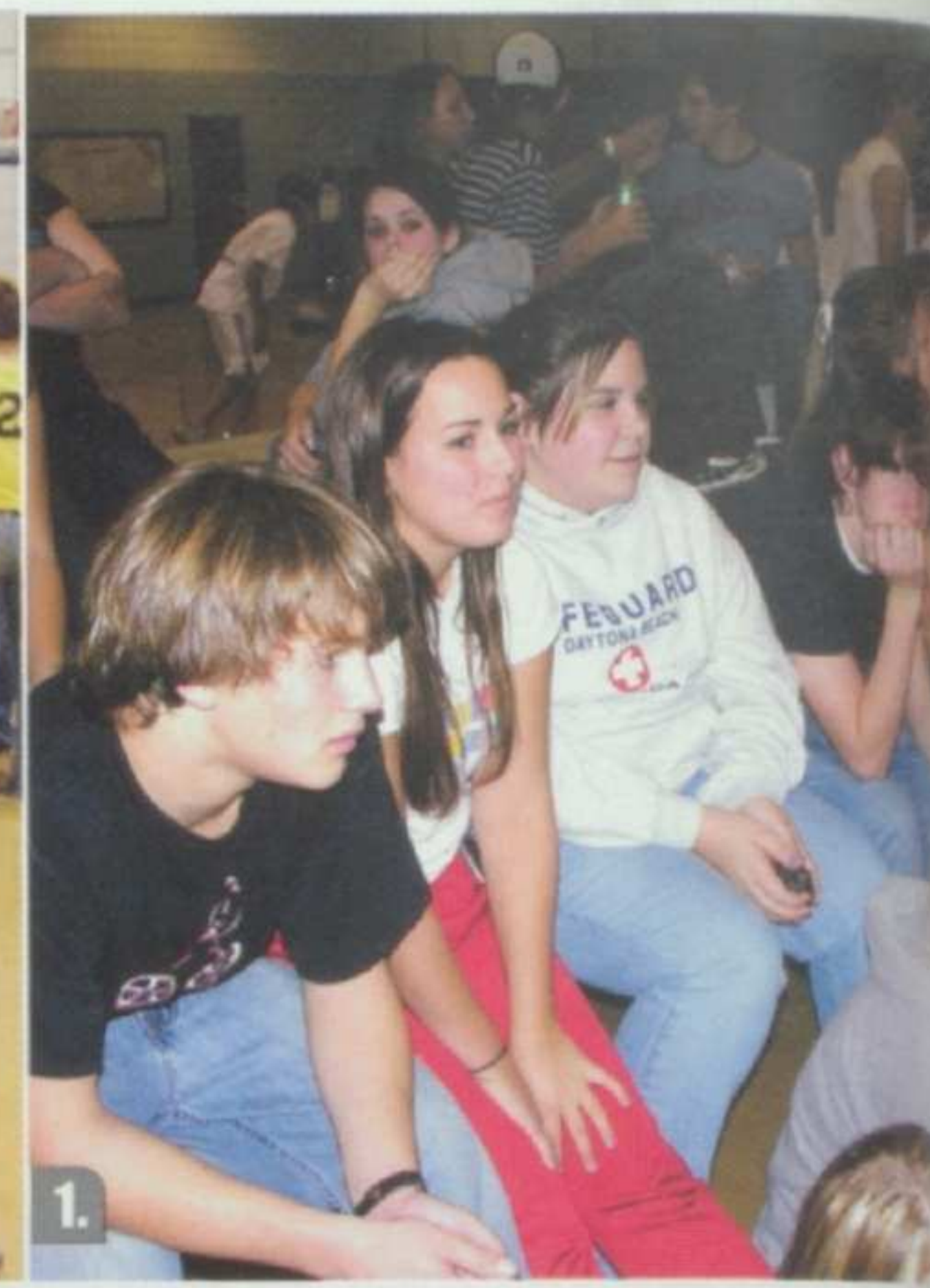

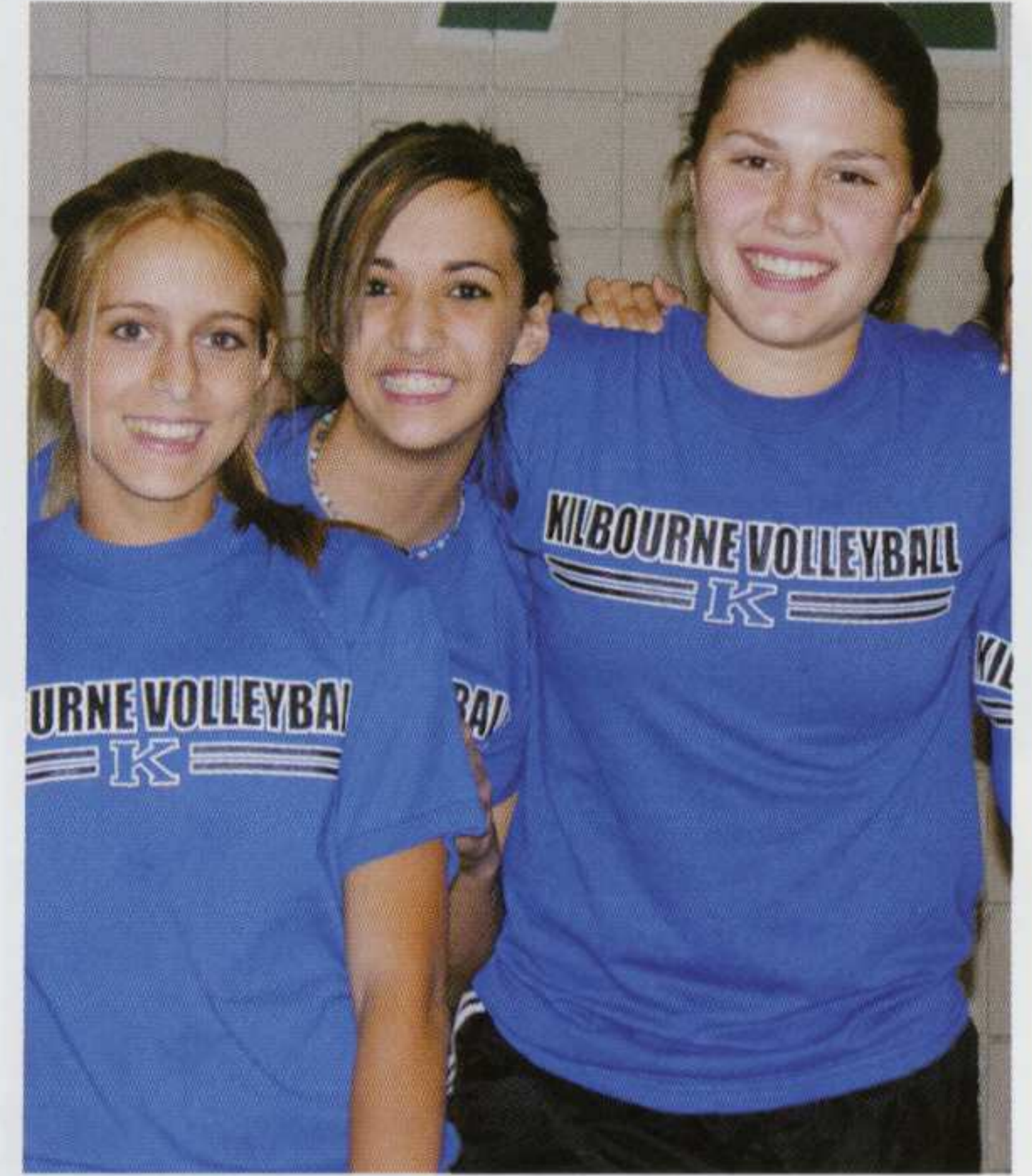

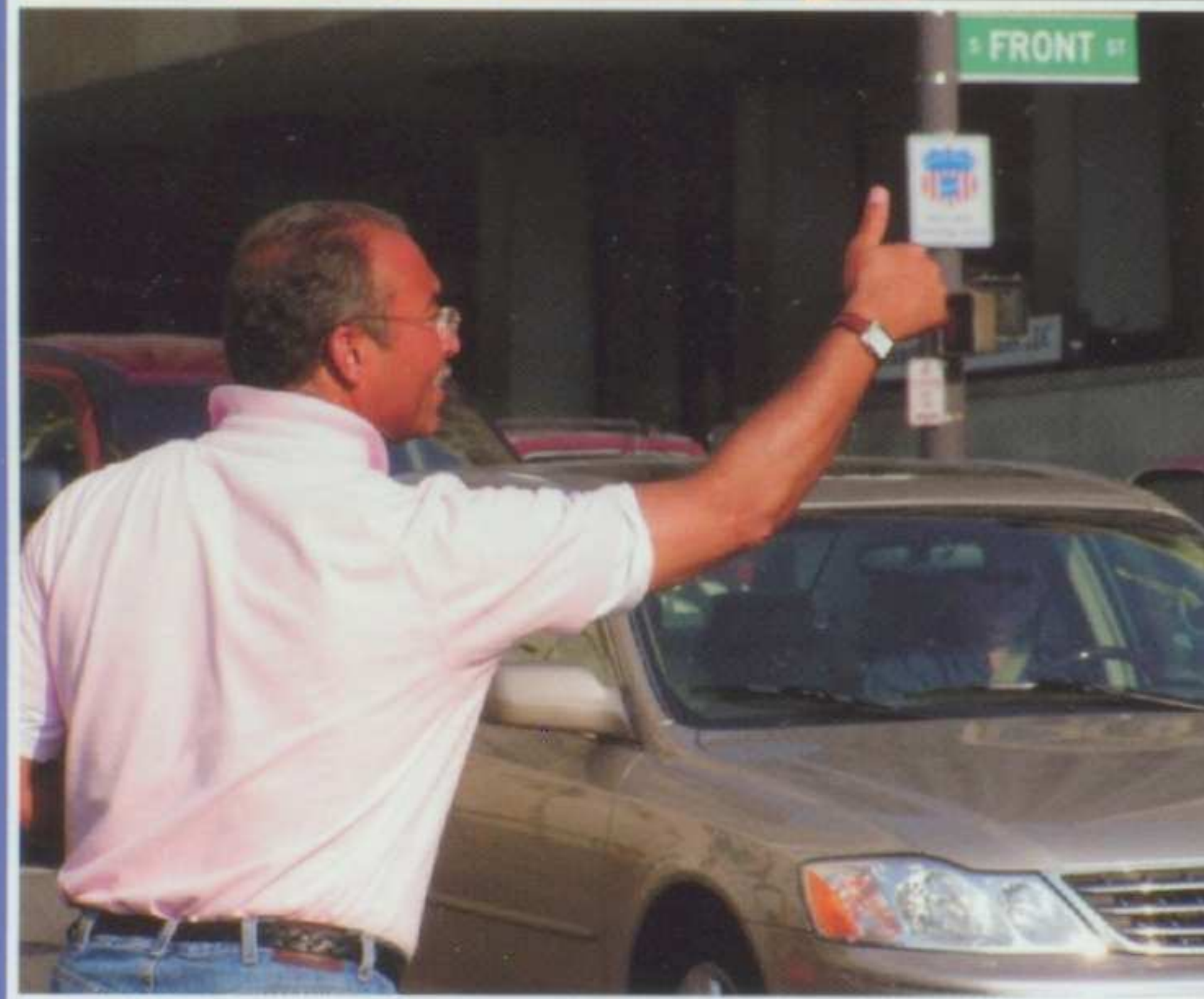

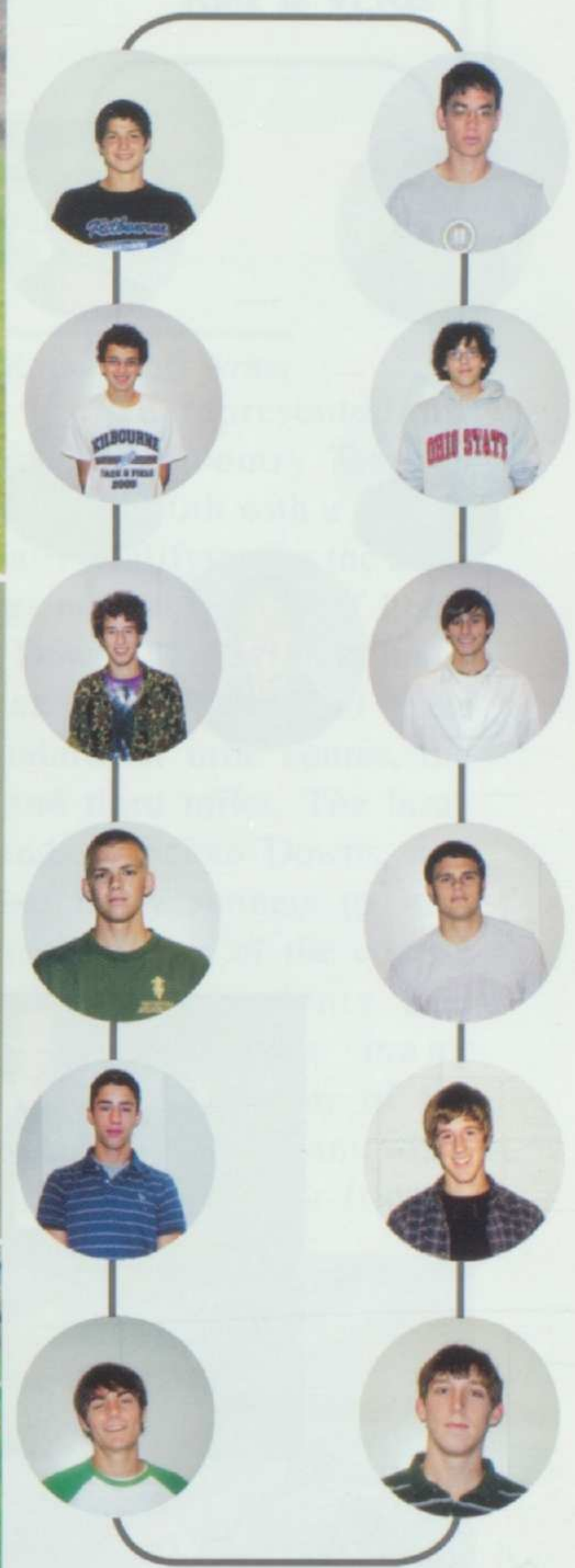

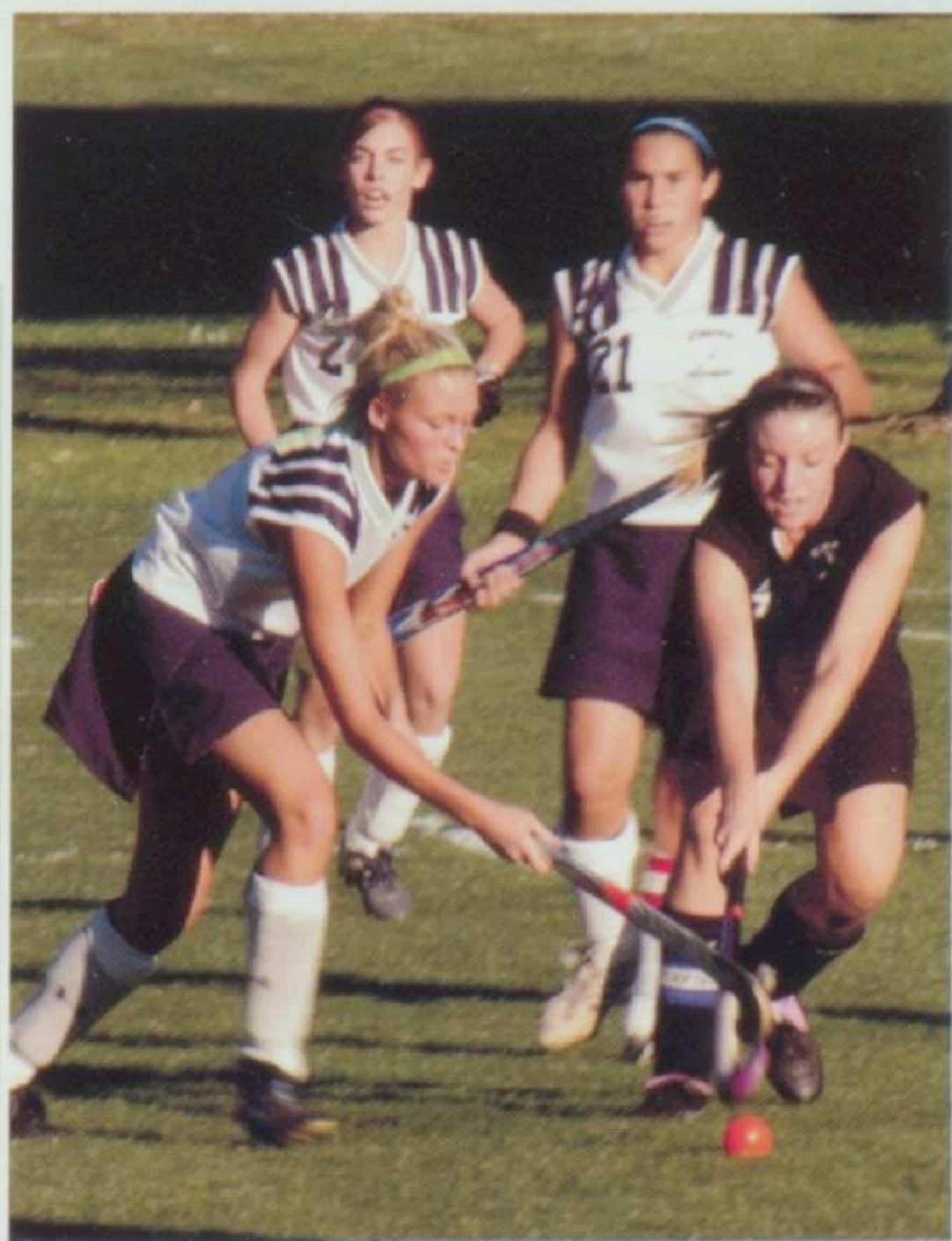

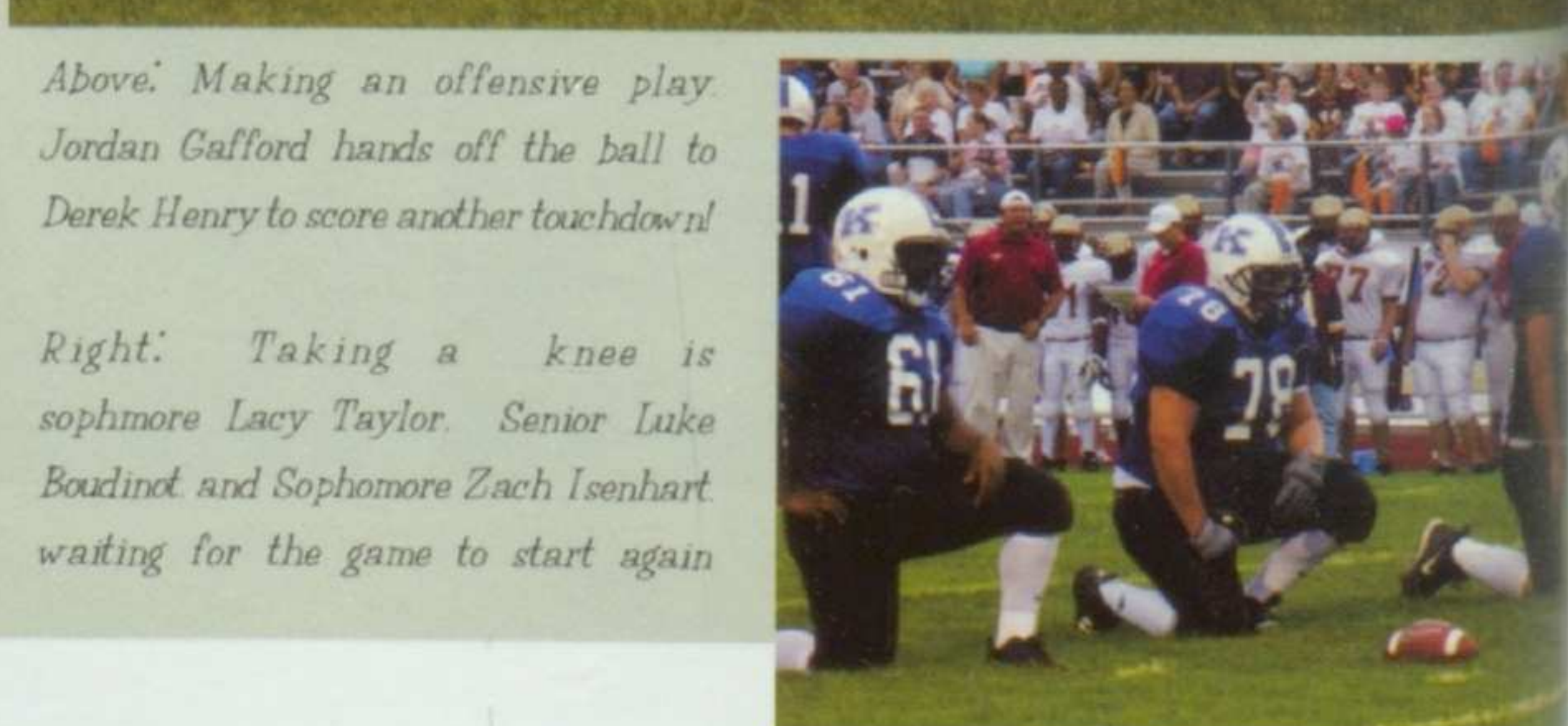

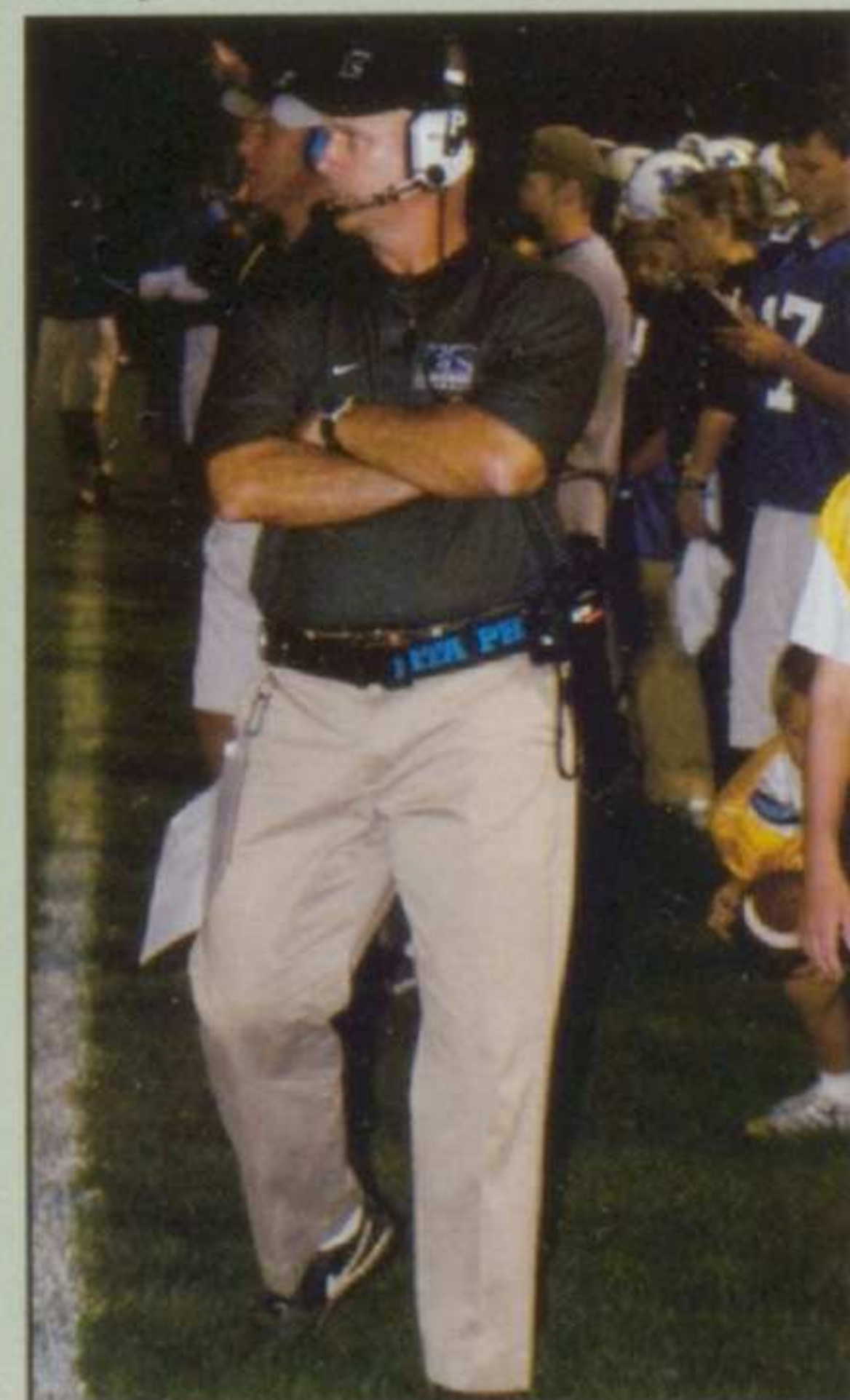

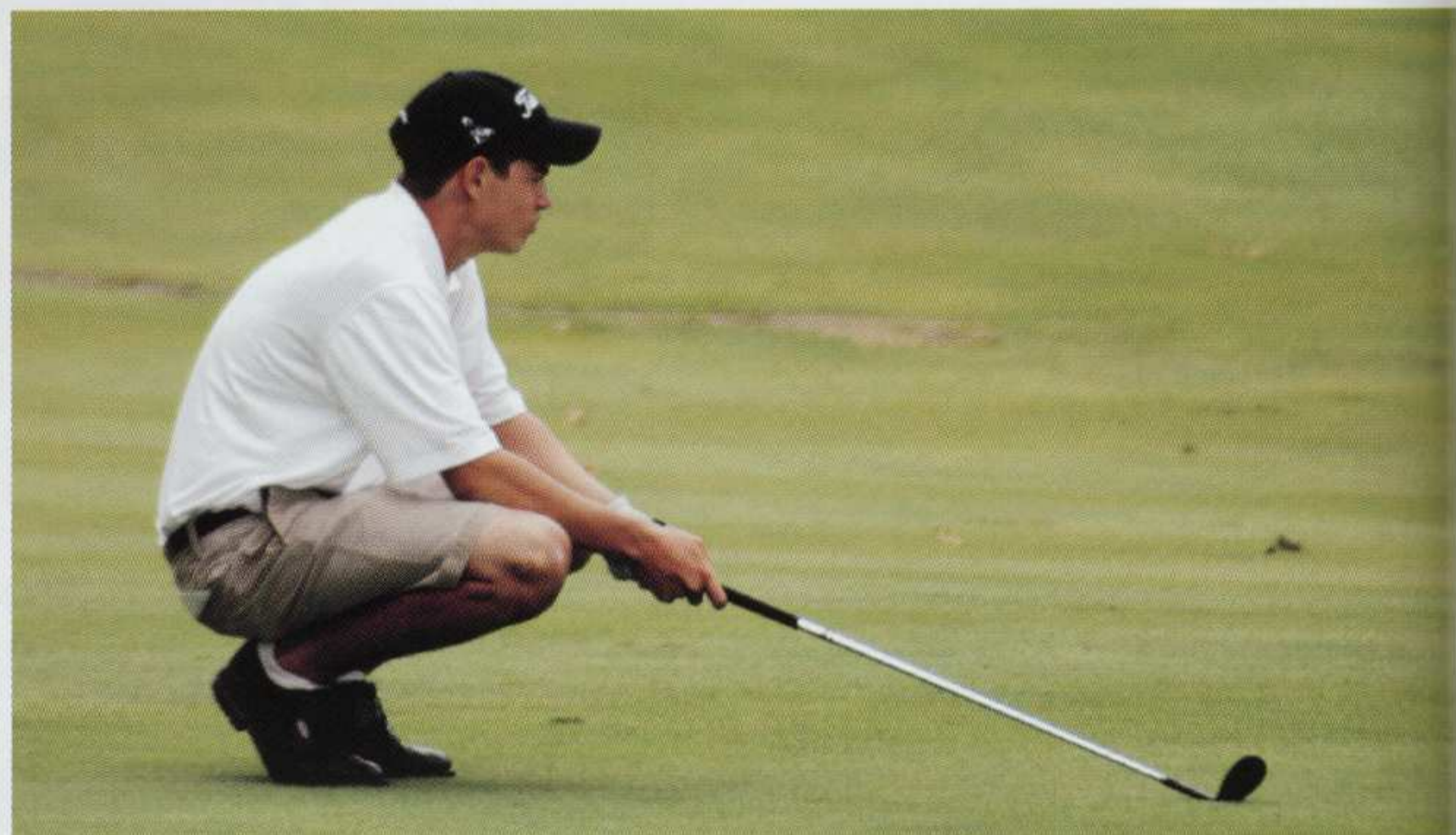

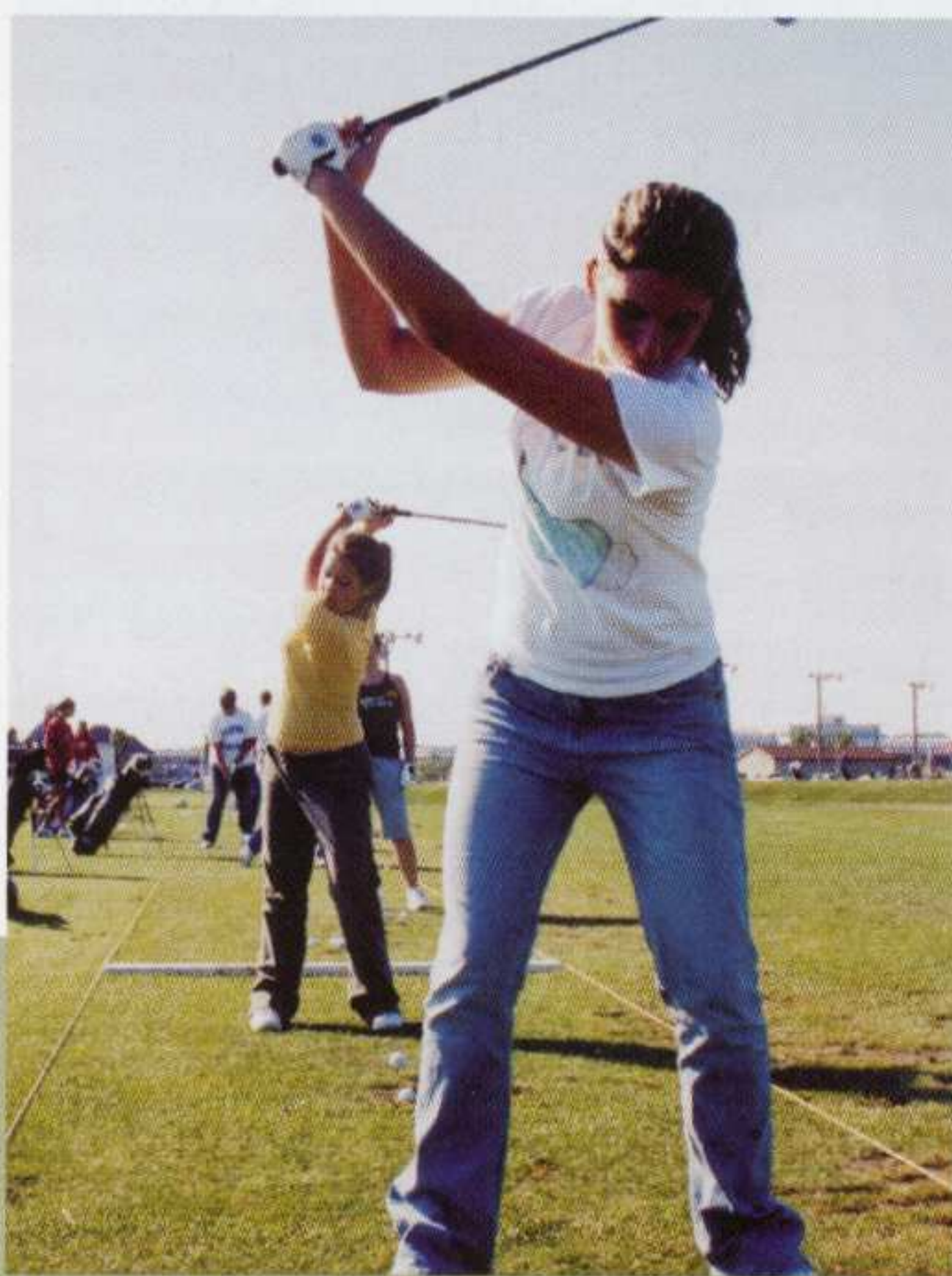

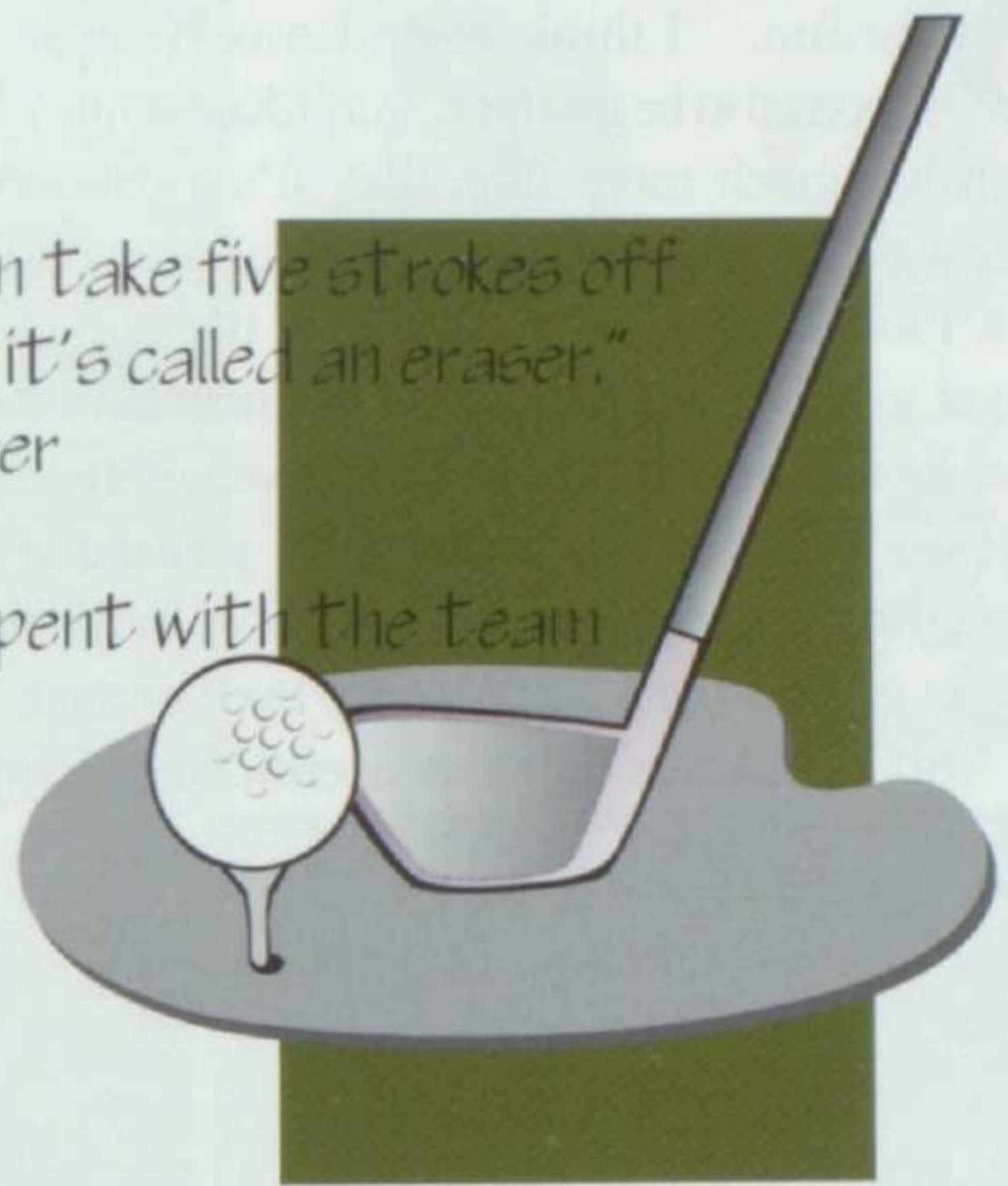

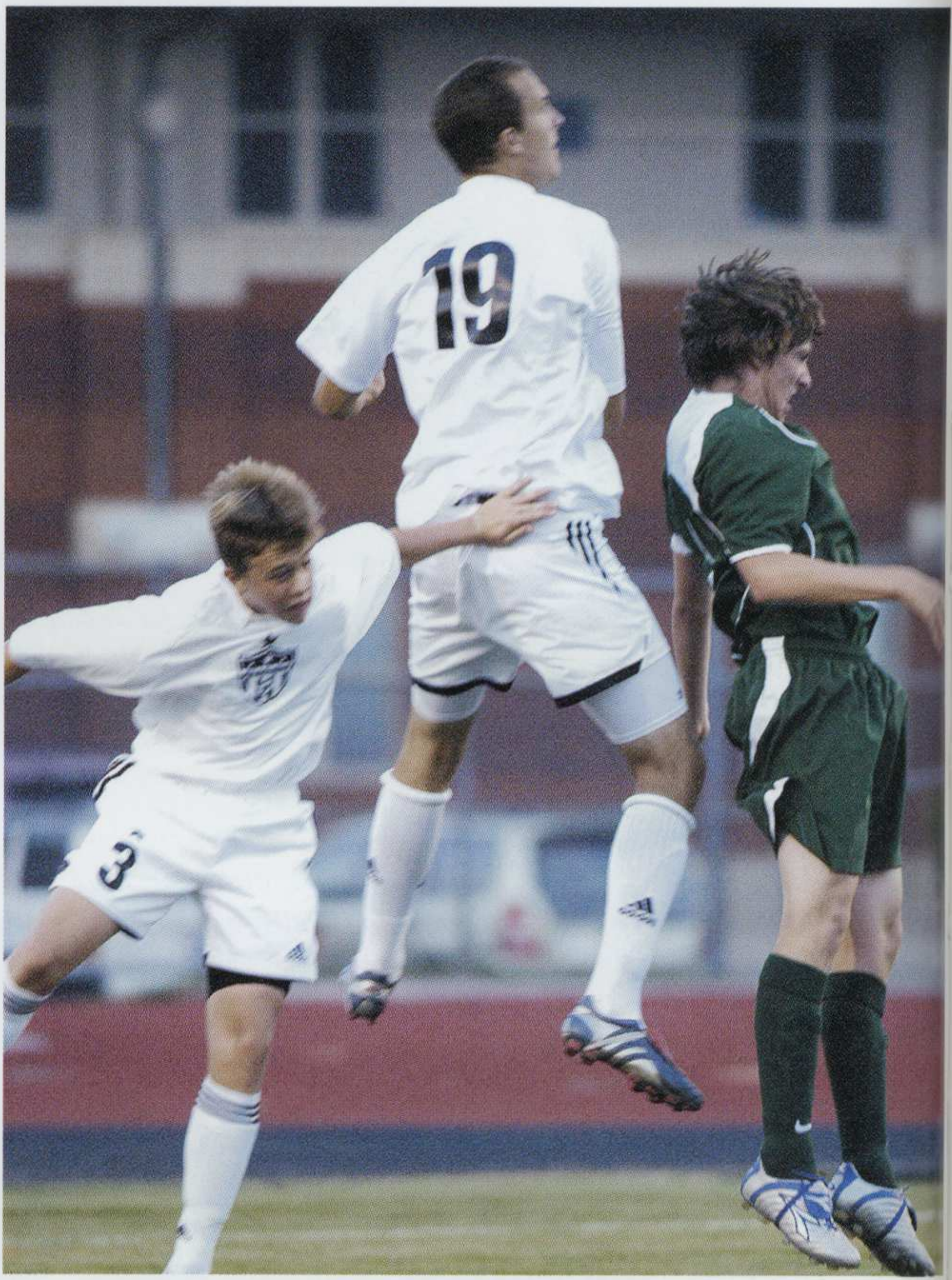

"Once we put in the first goal, we knew that things were probably going to go our way," said Michael Fu, commenting on the state championship game.

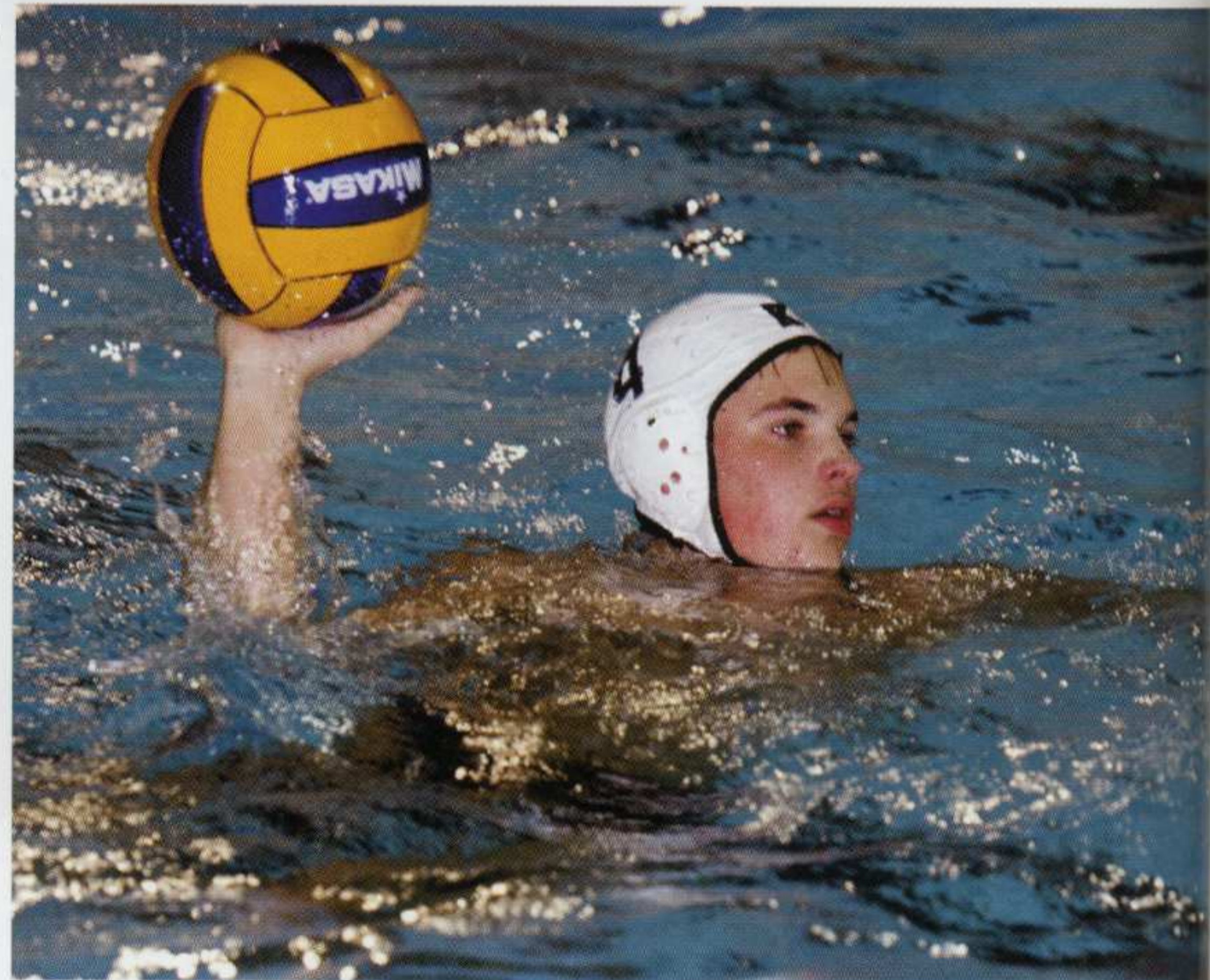

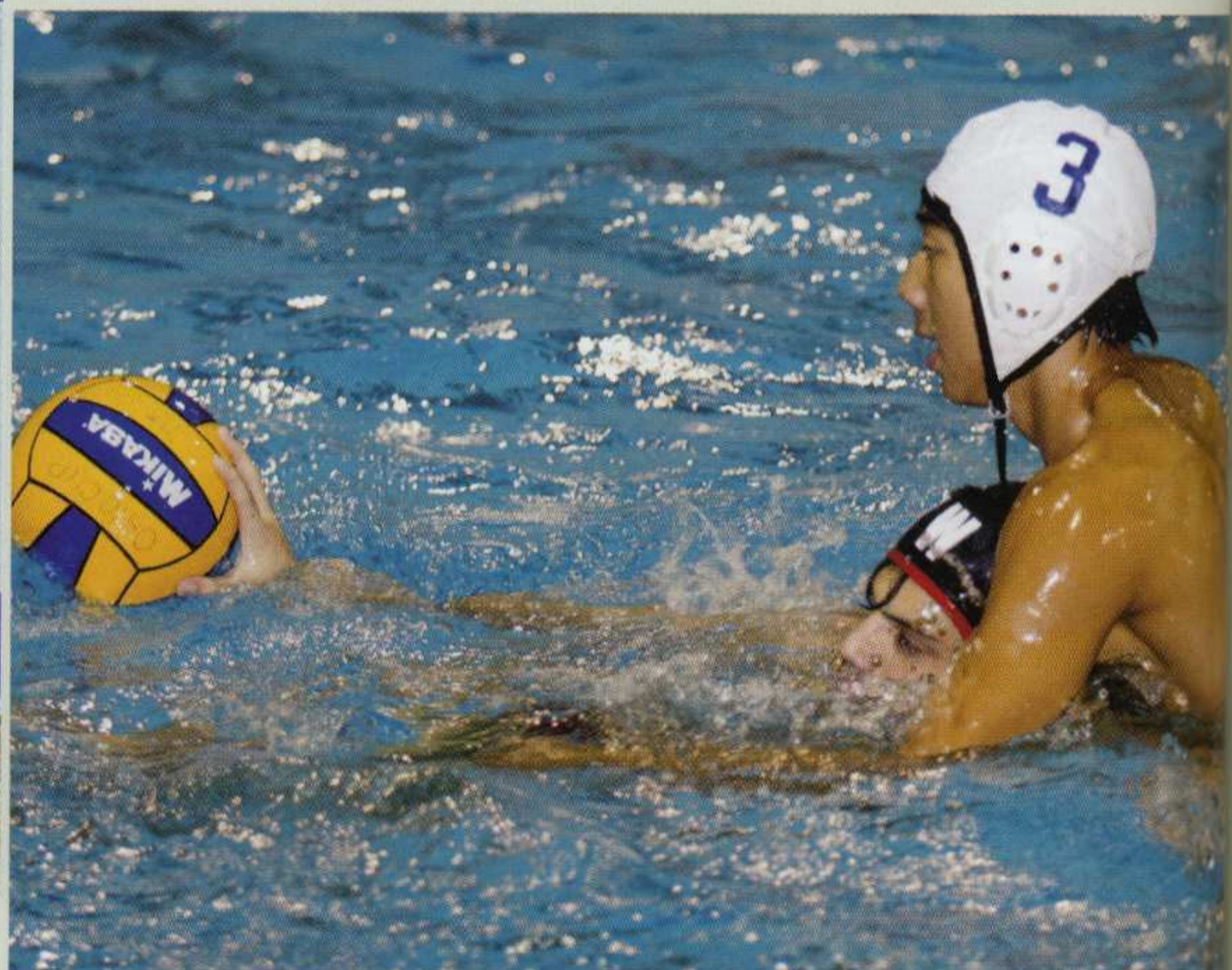

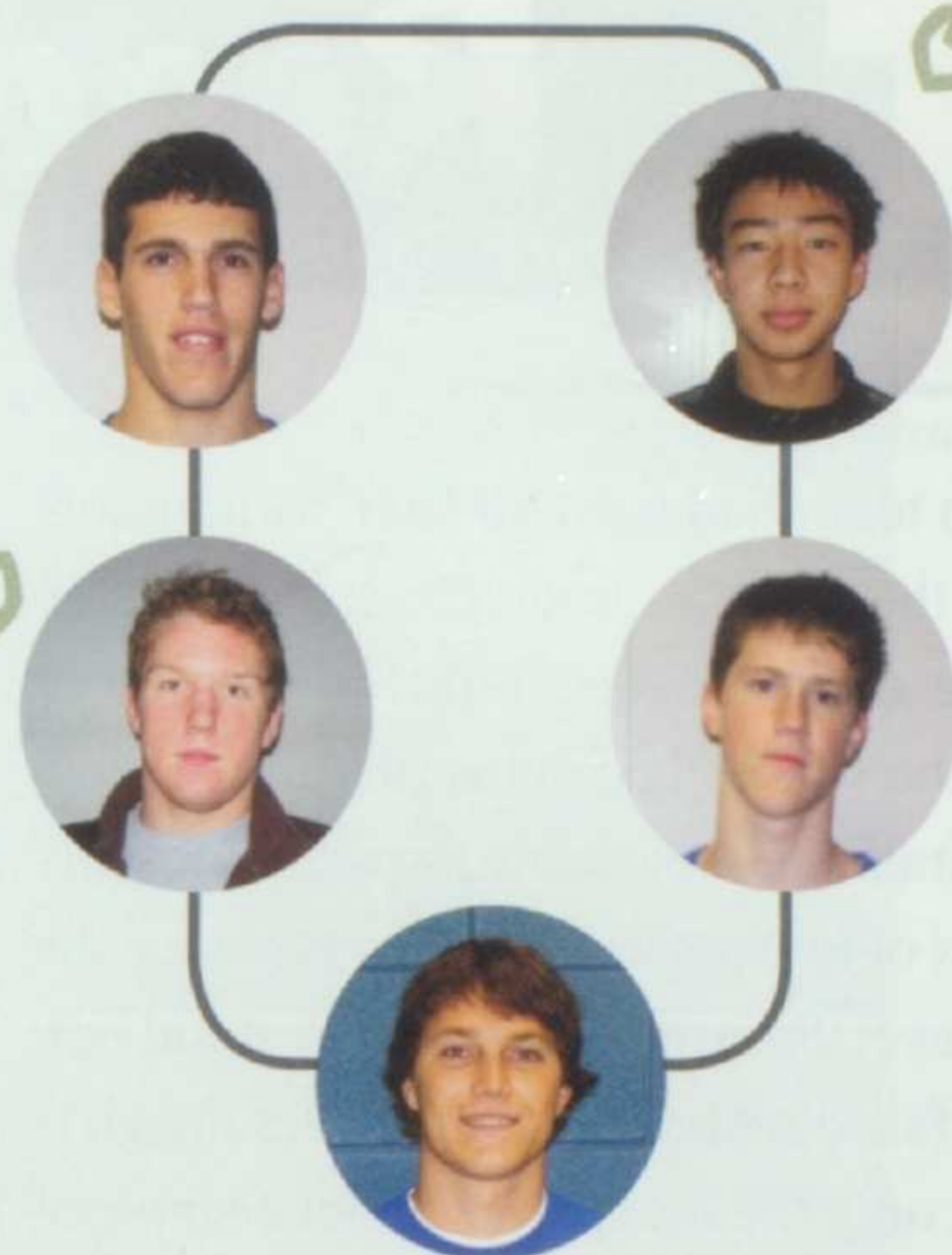

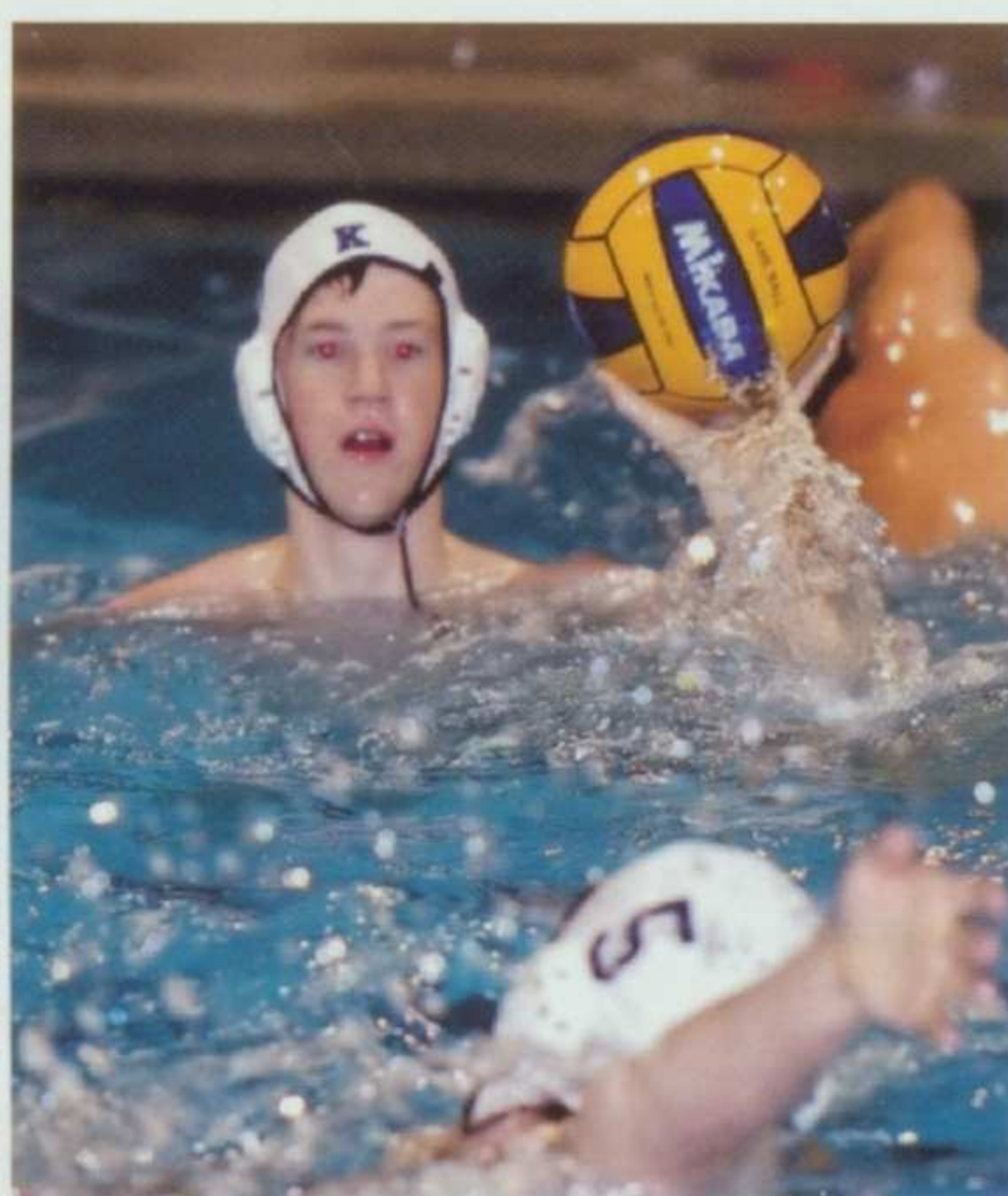

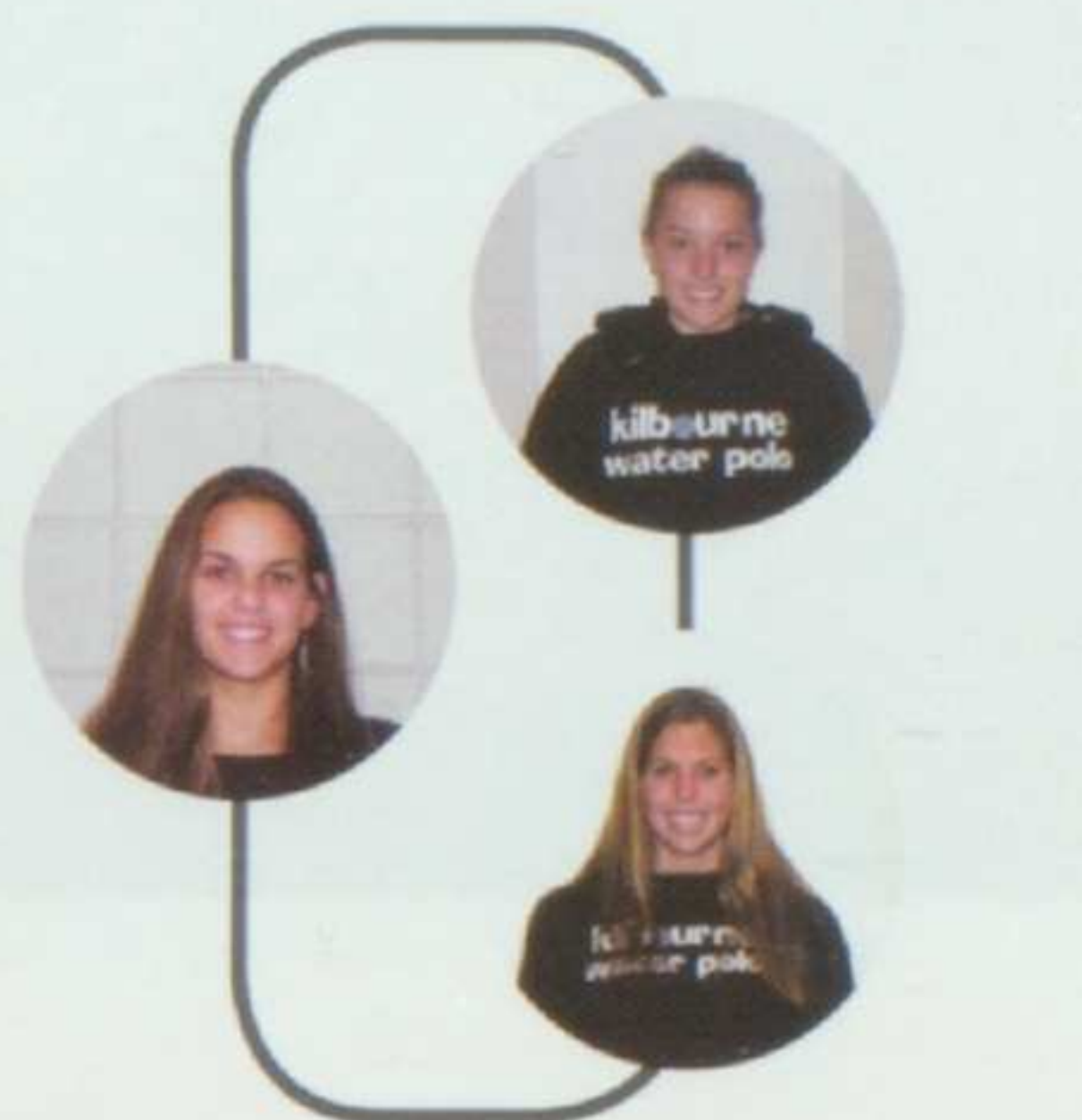

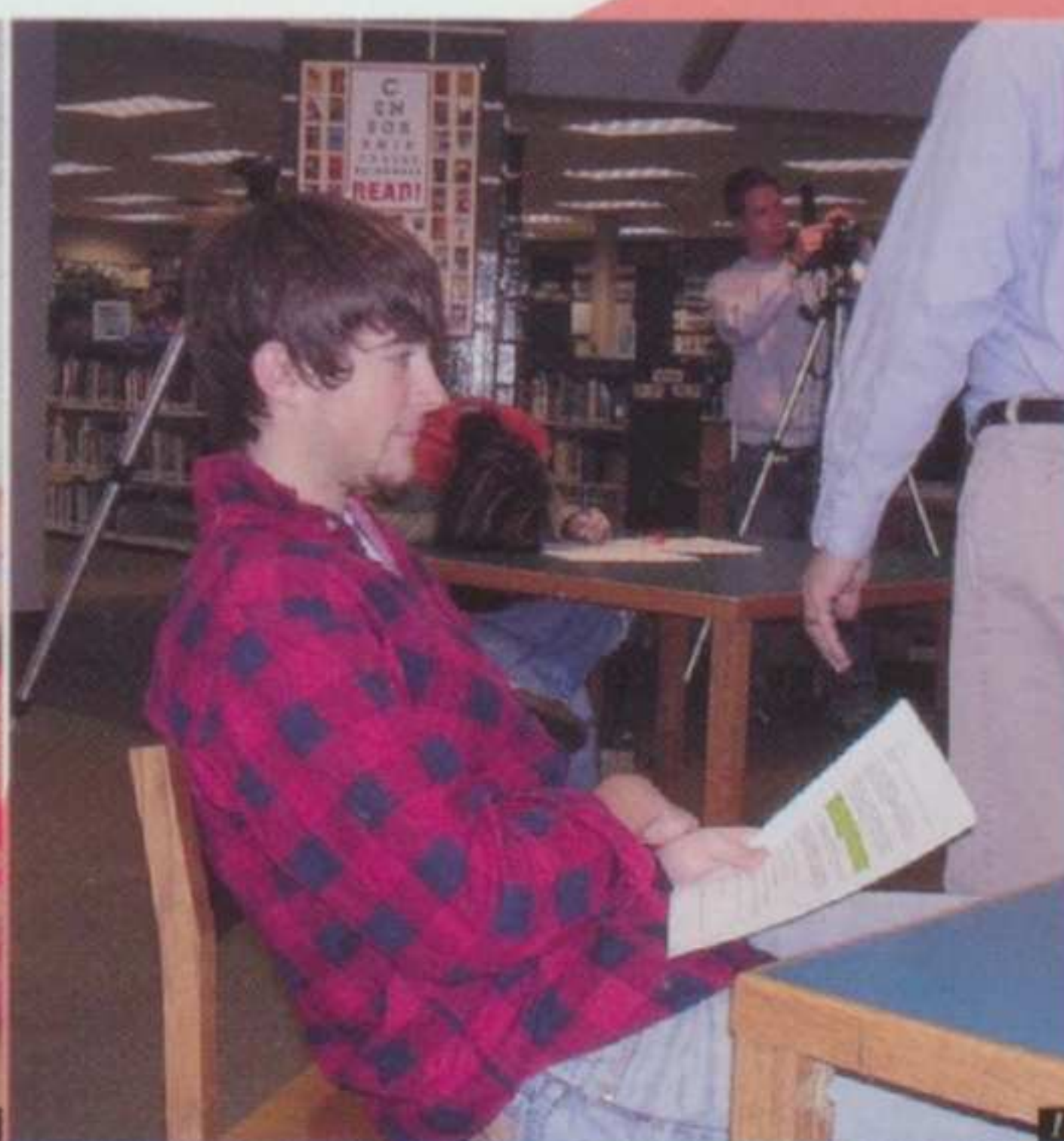


A Time to Get Festive

"There were no ATOD violations or arrests, but I would have liked to see more people there," said activities director Ralph King.

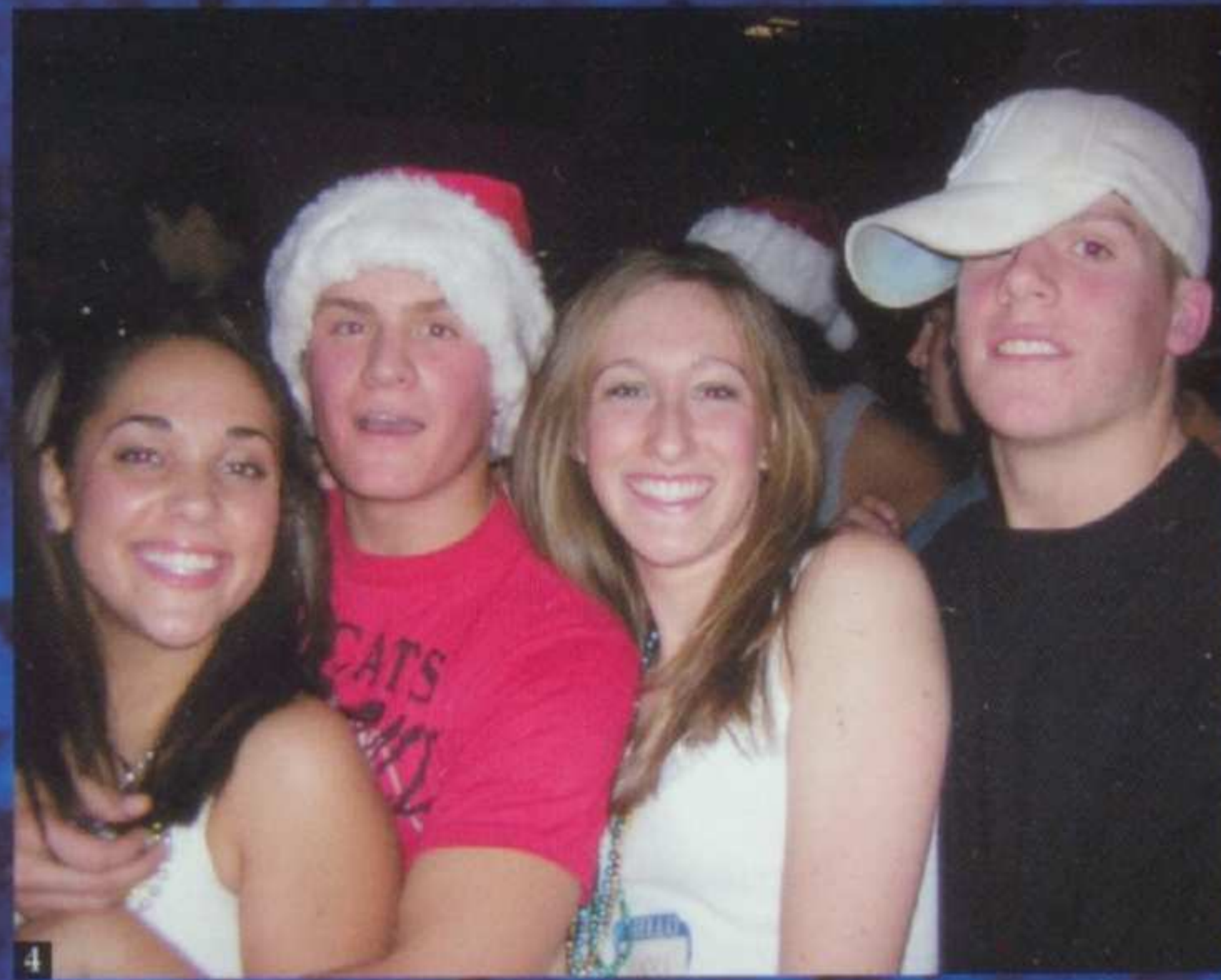
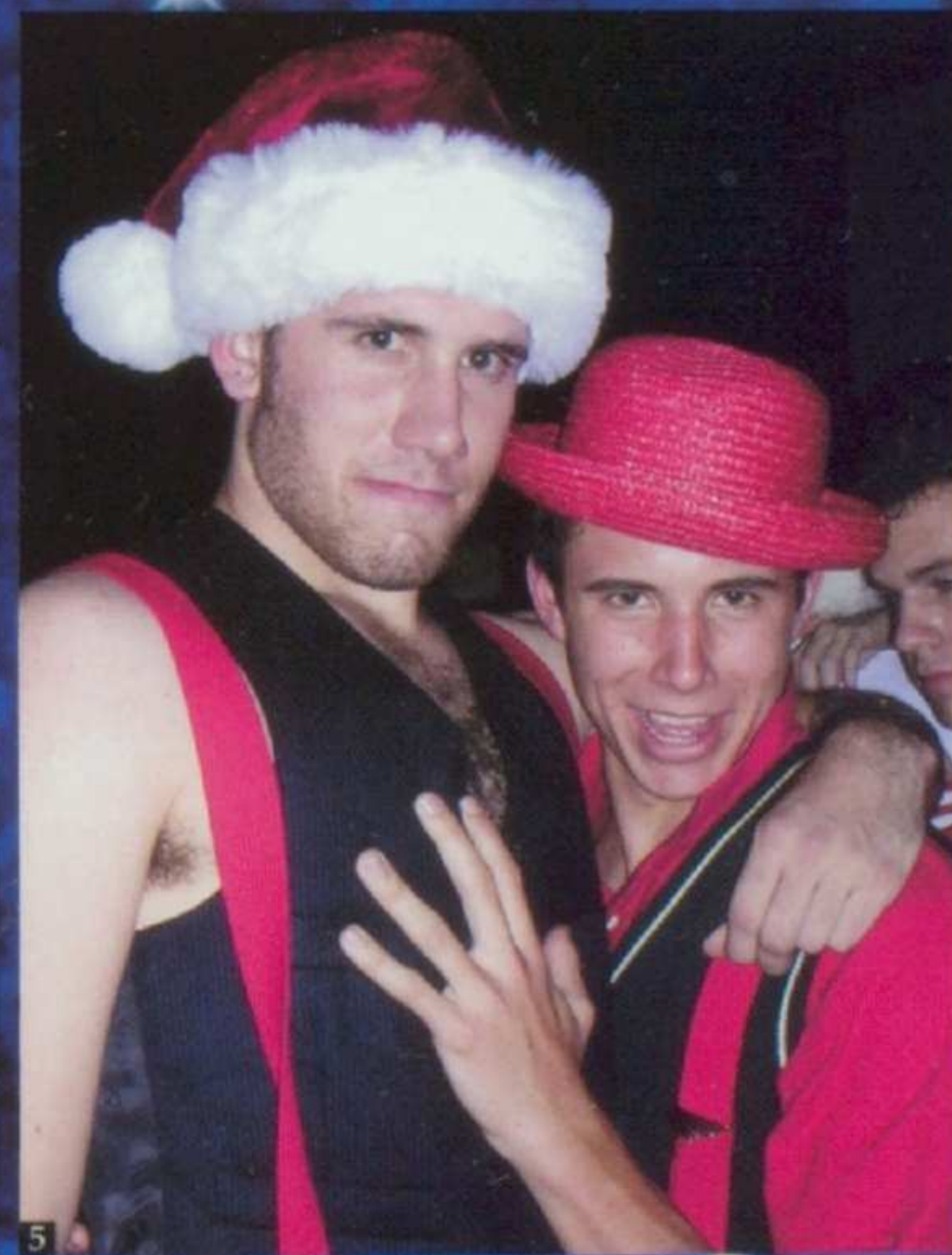
The new dress code guidelines did not seem to be a problem either—the dance was filled with appropriate santa hats, matching holiday tee shirts, and glow necklaces.

"I thought that there were some really cute outfits, like matching socks," said dance chaperone Lisa Mullen.

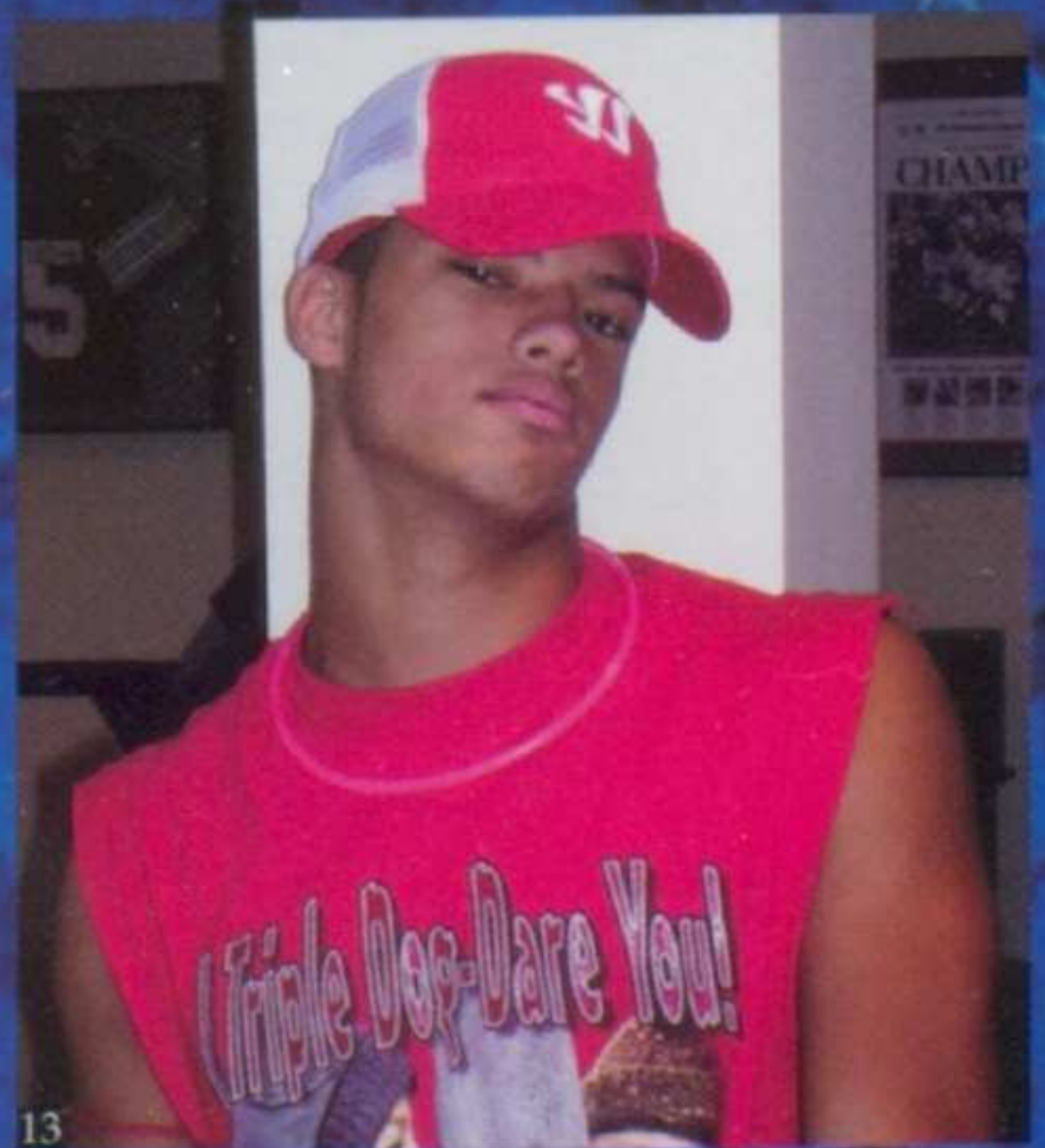

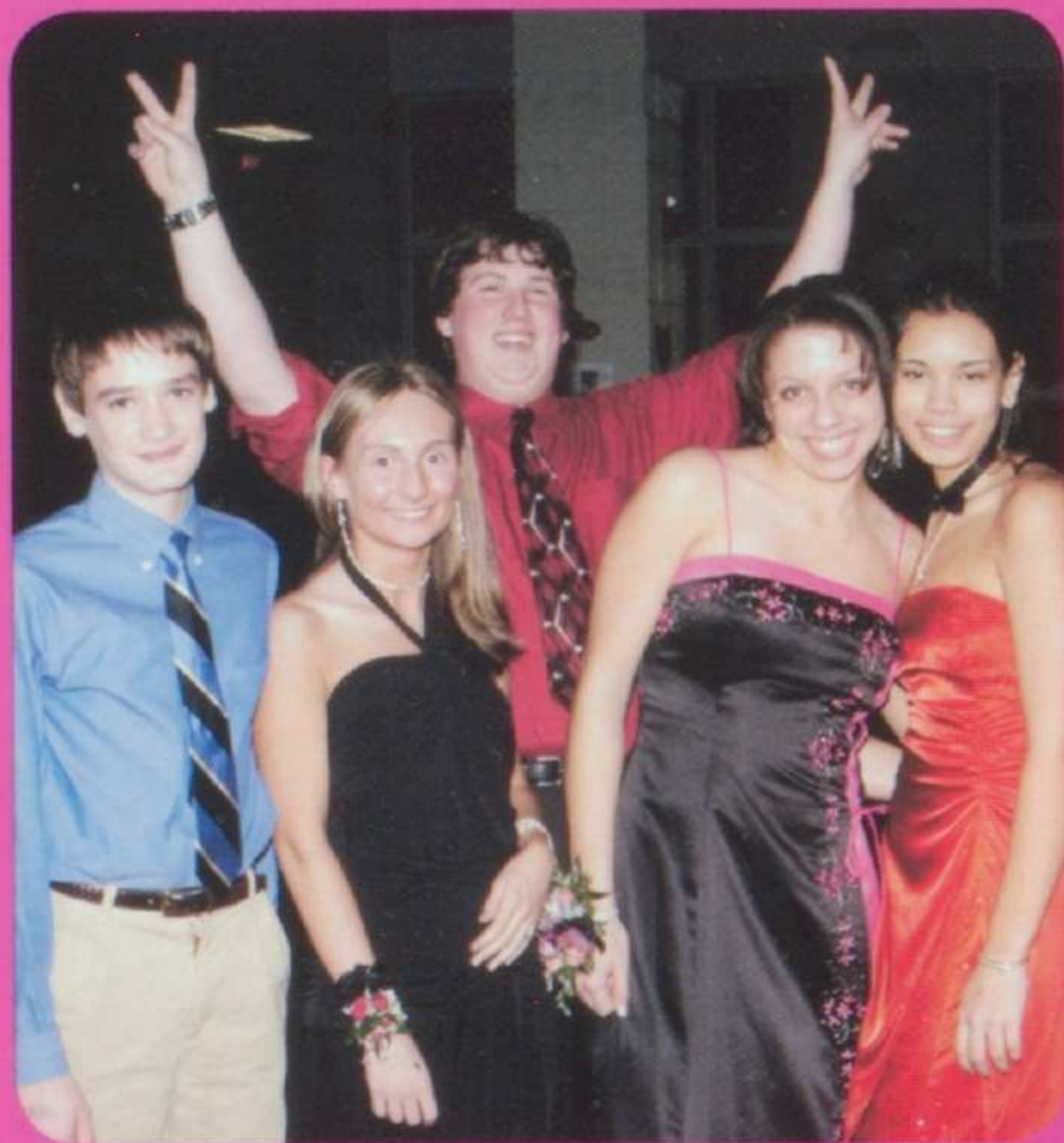


The Forcast Calls For Babies

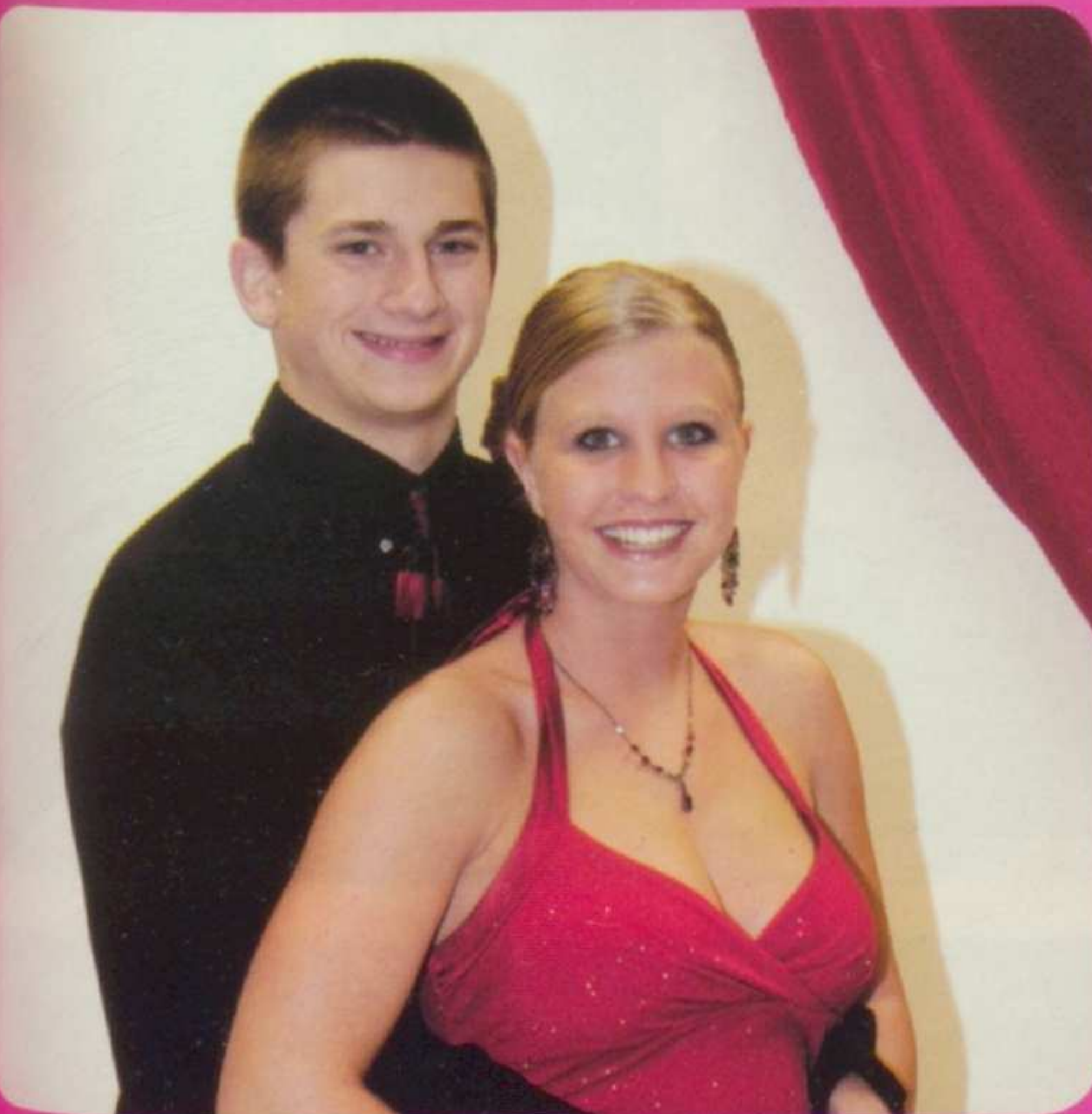

"The seniors got everyone excited and stepped it up," said senior captain Tina Fry. "It was important to do well because we were the defending champs from last year."

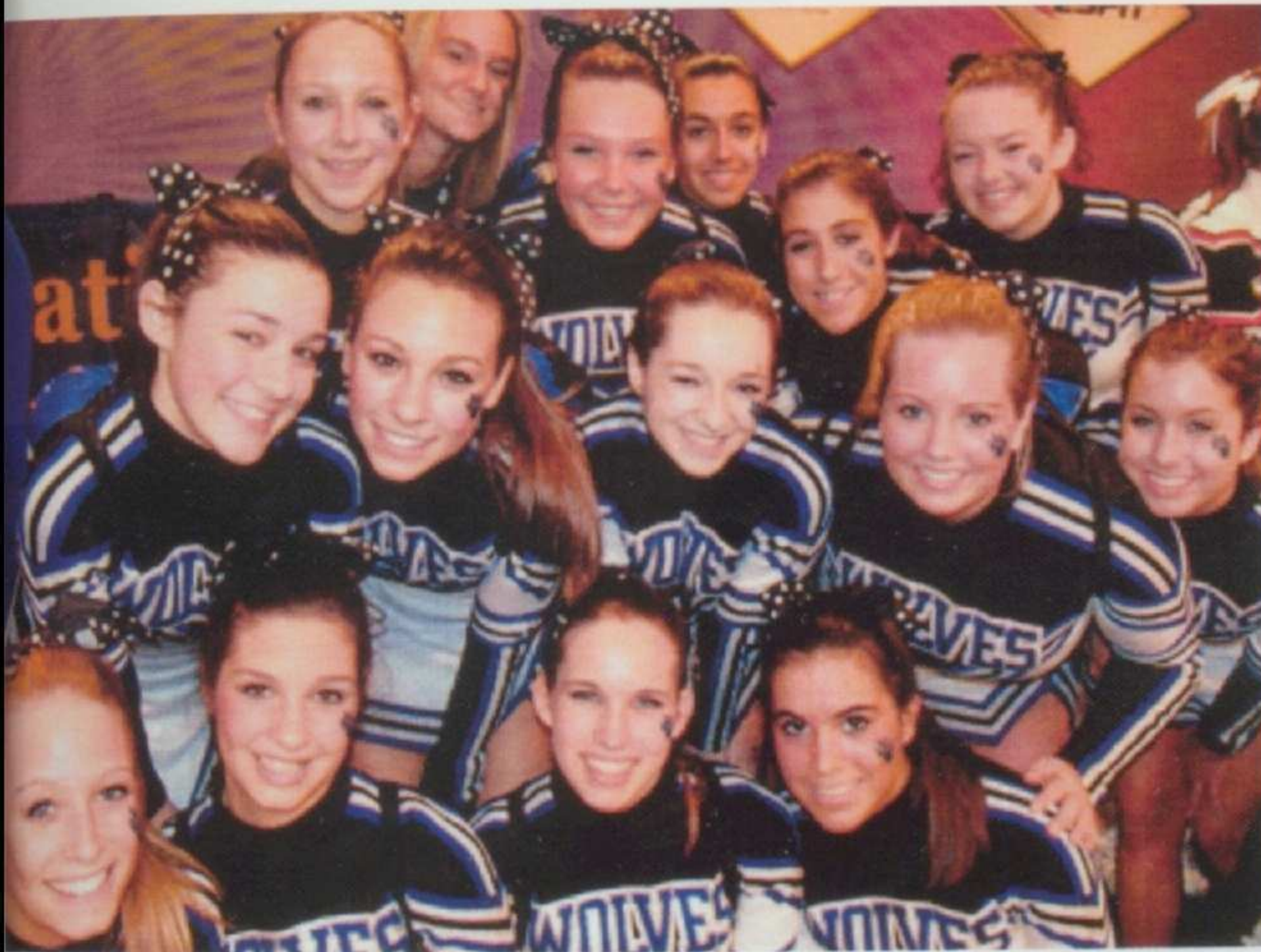
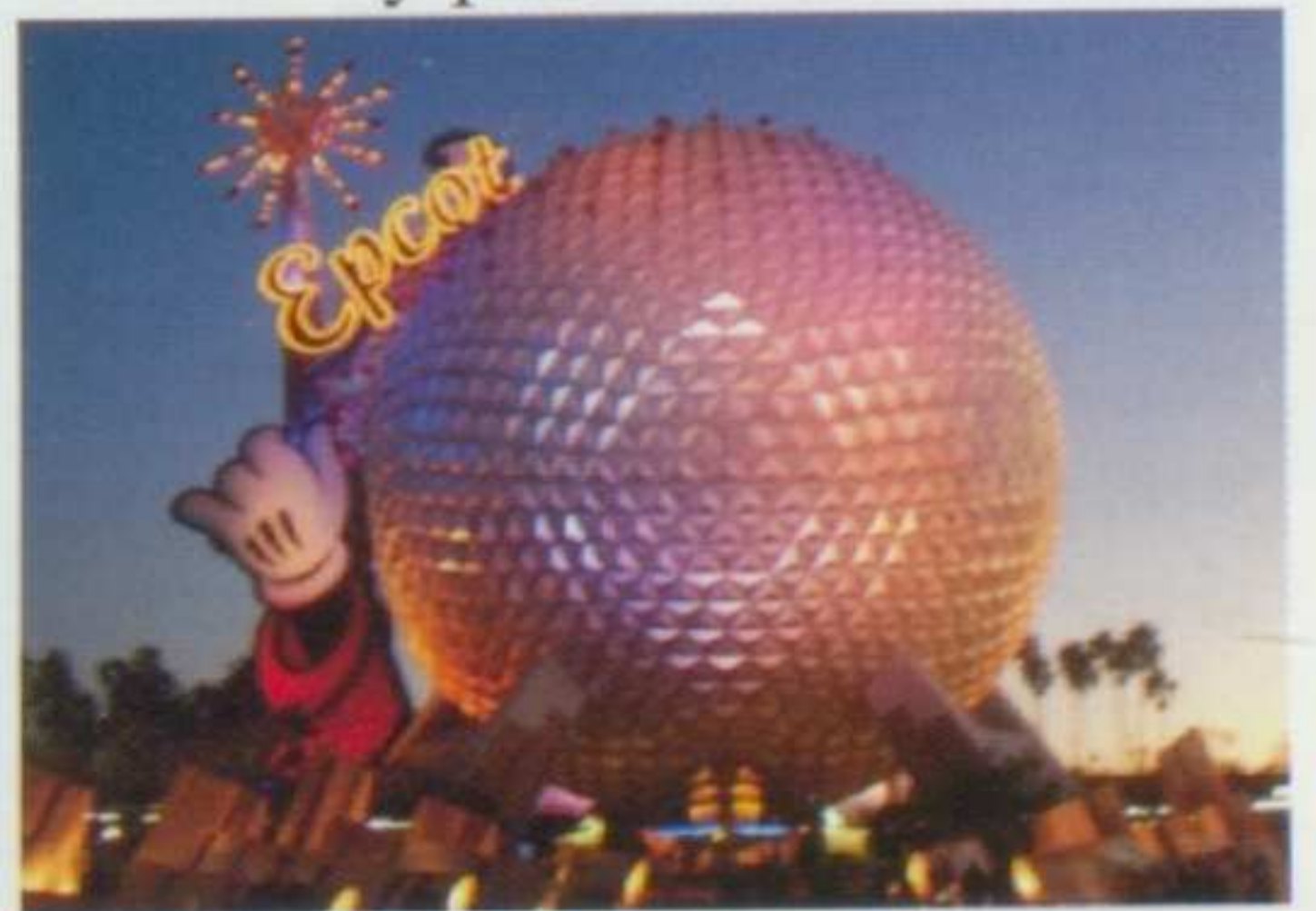

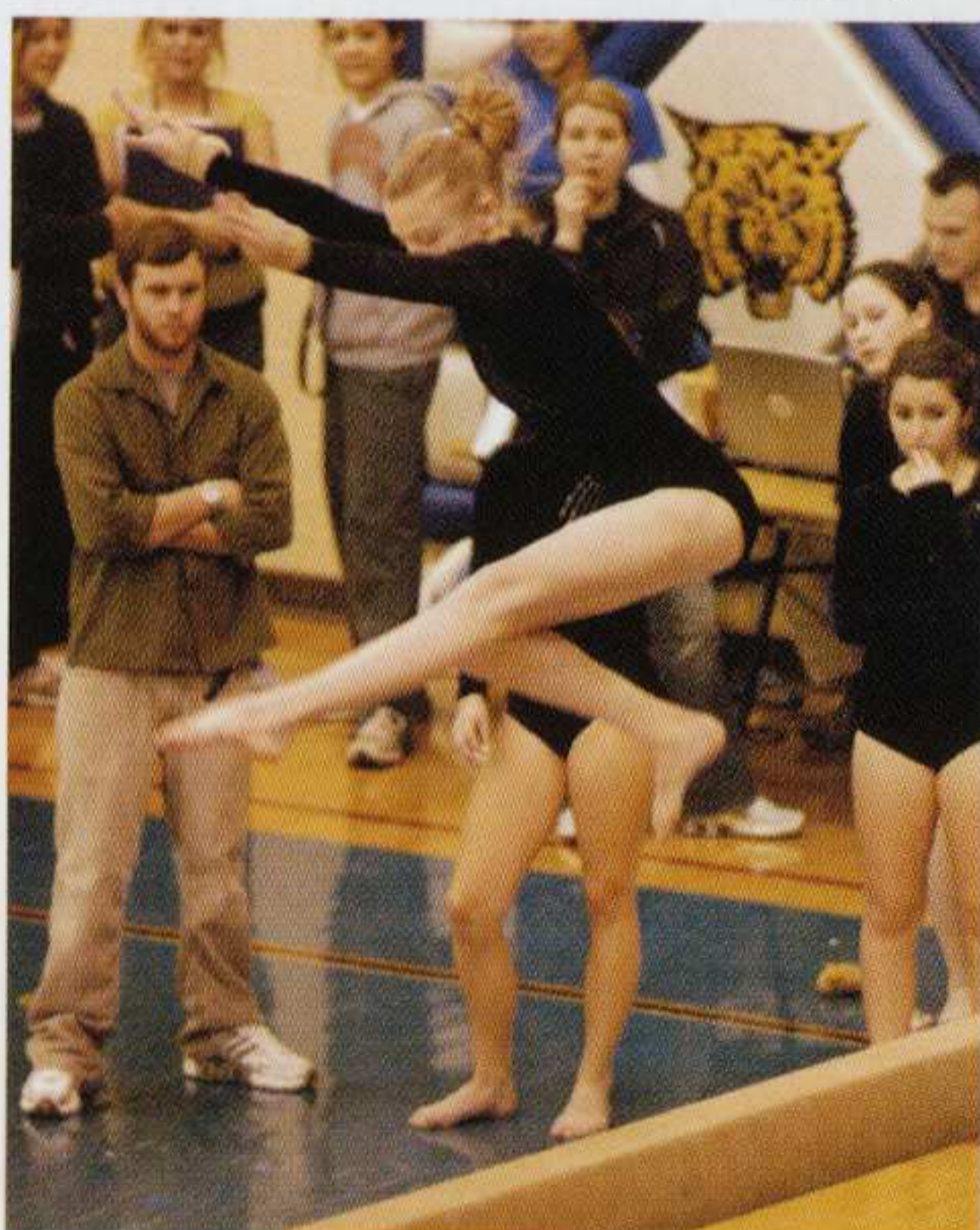
"I'm really pleased with how our season is going so far, everyone has been working extremely hard both inside and outside the gym," said Coach Cindy Fushimi.

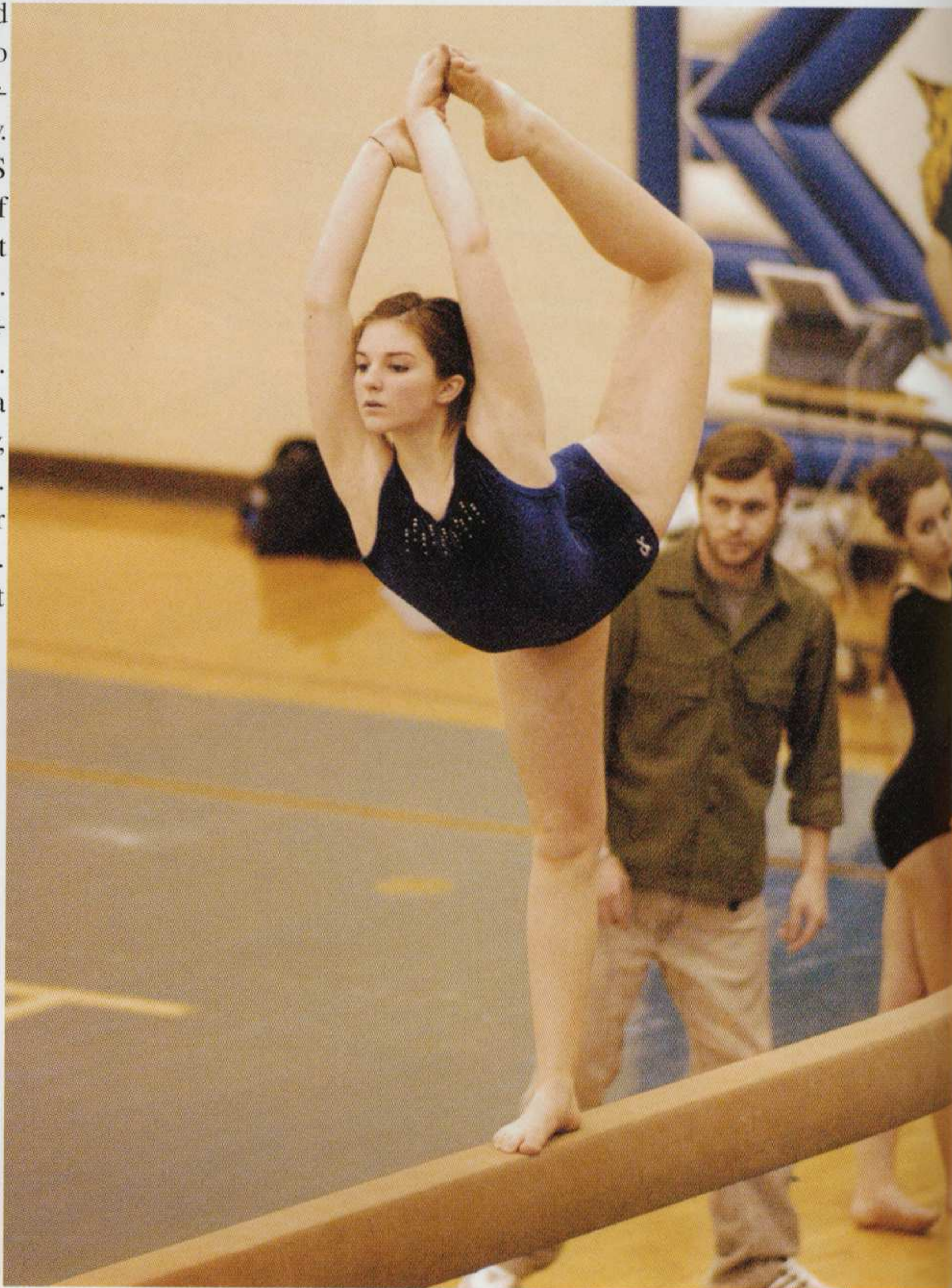

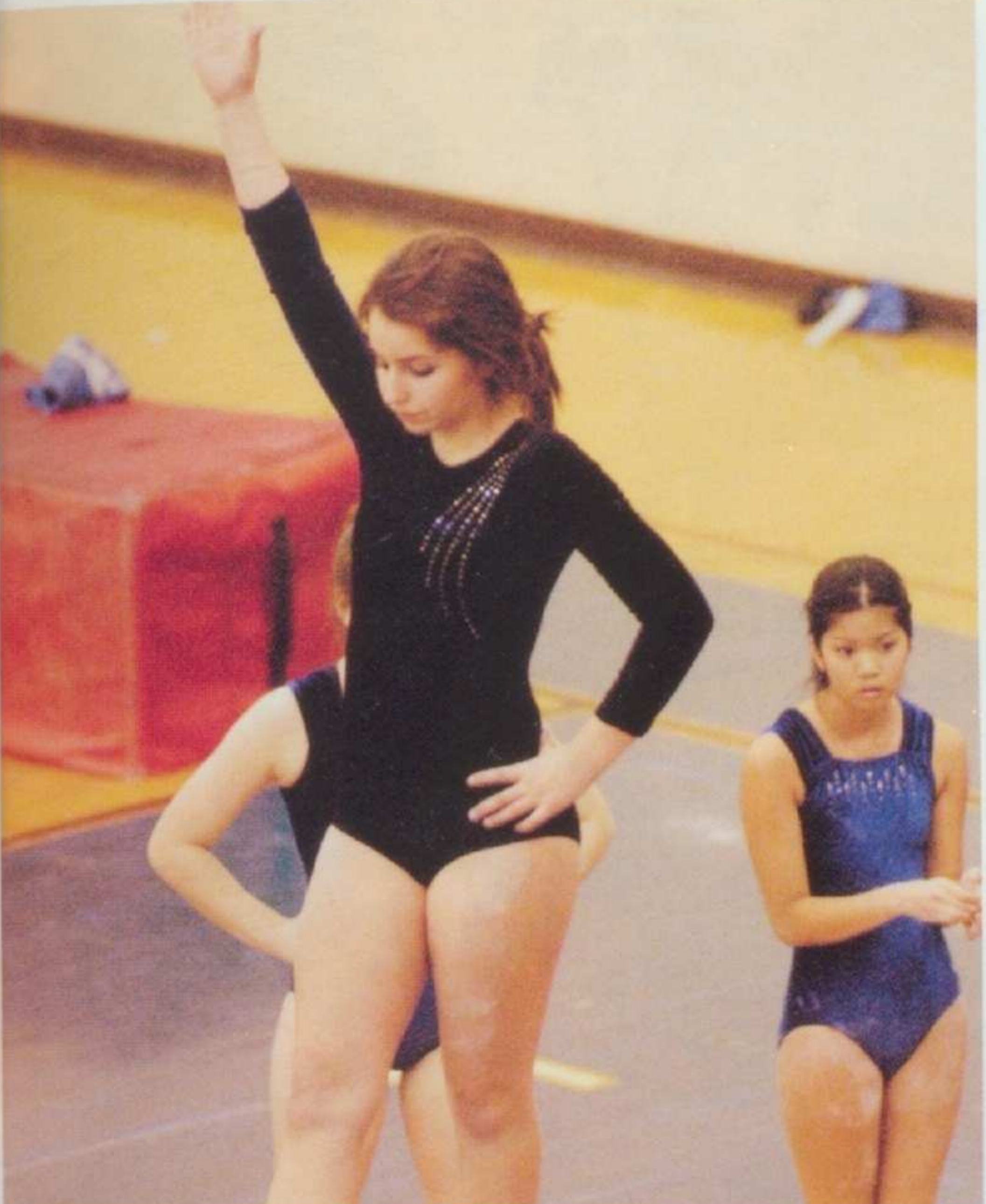

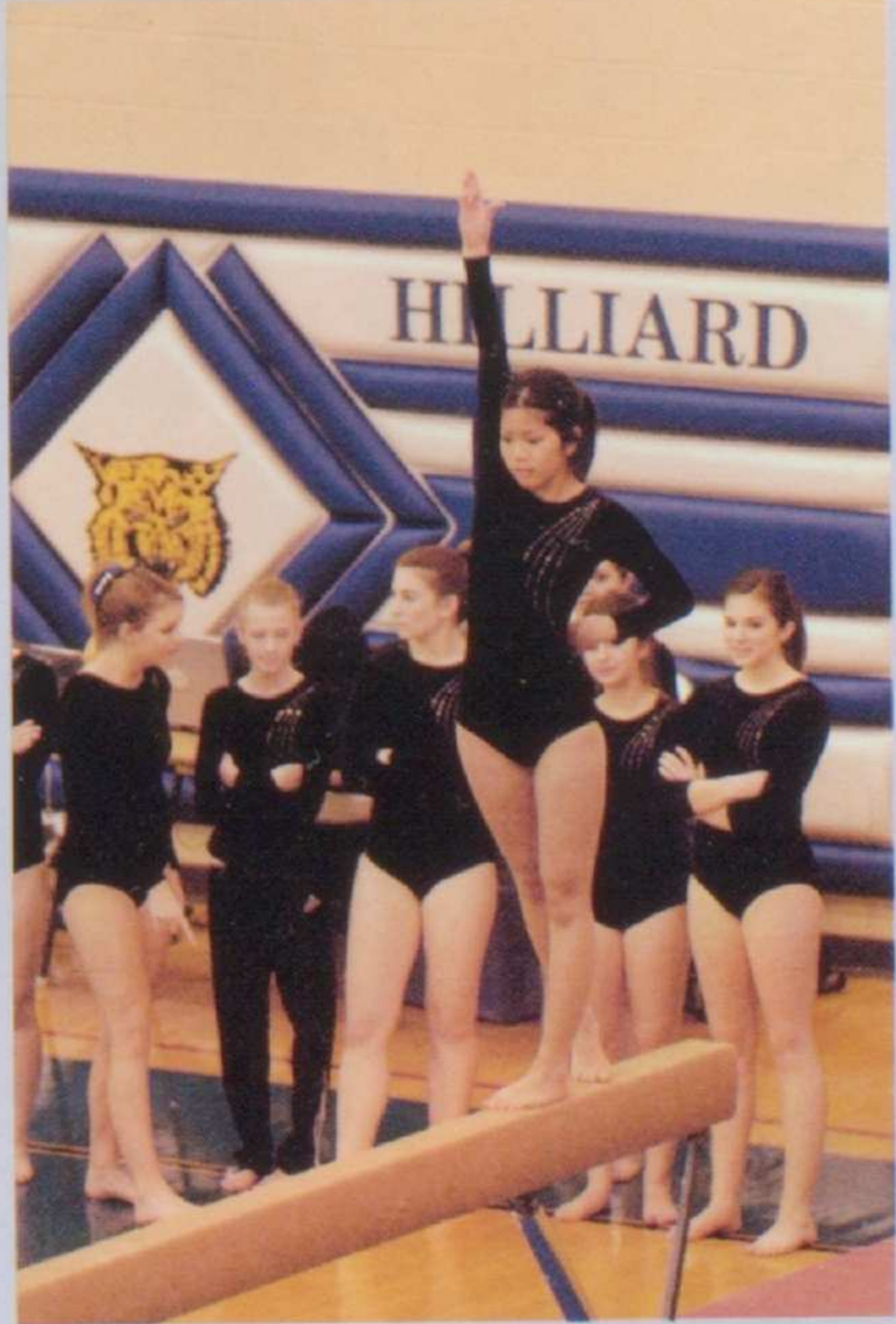
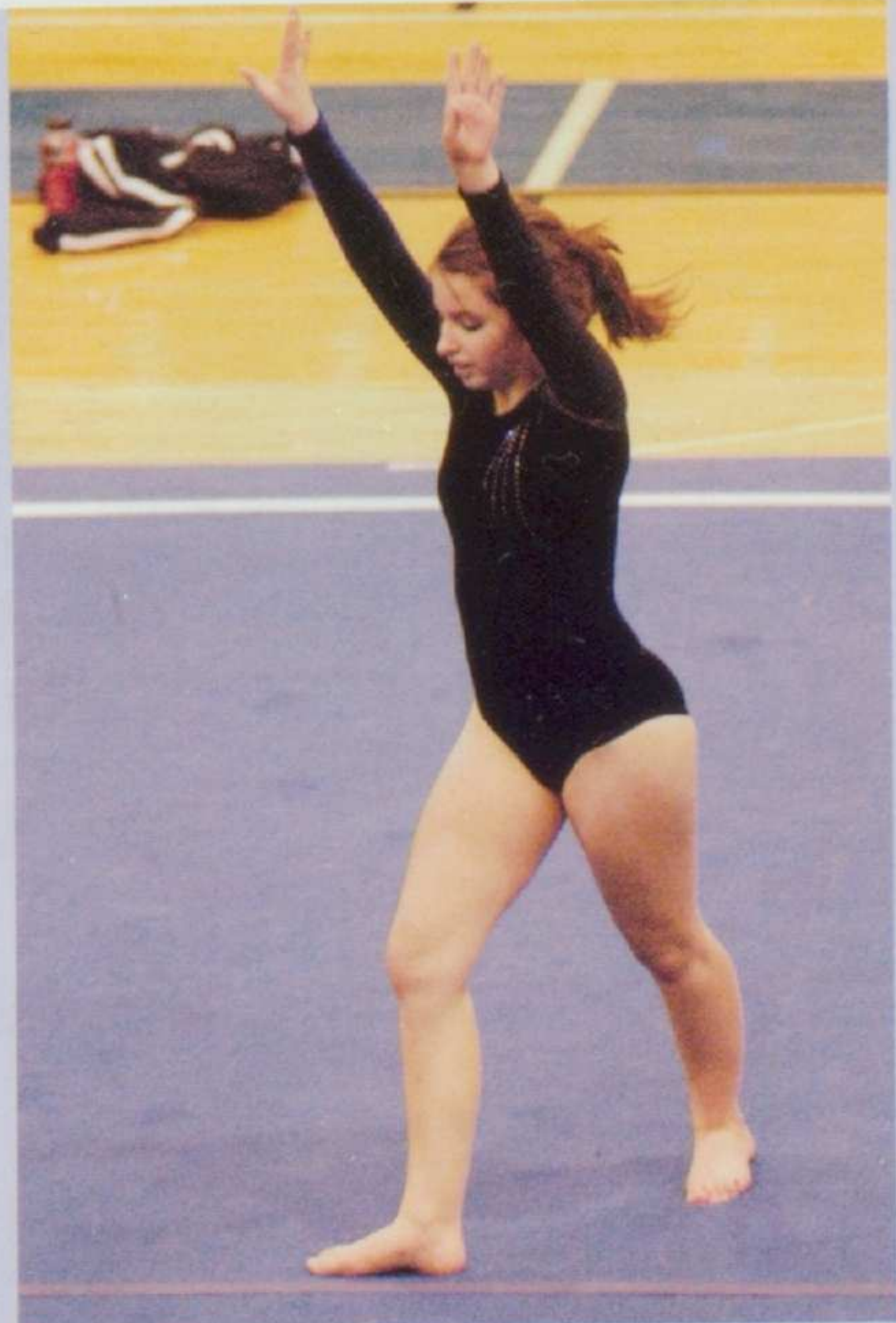

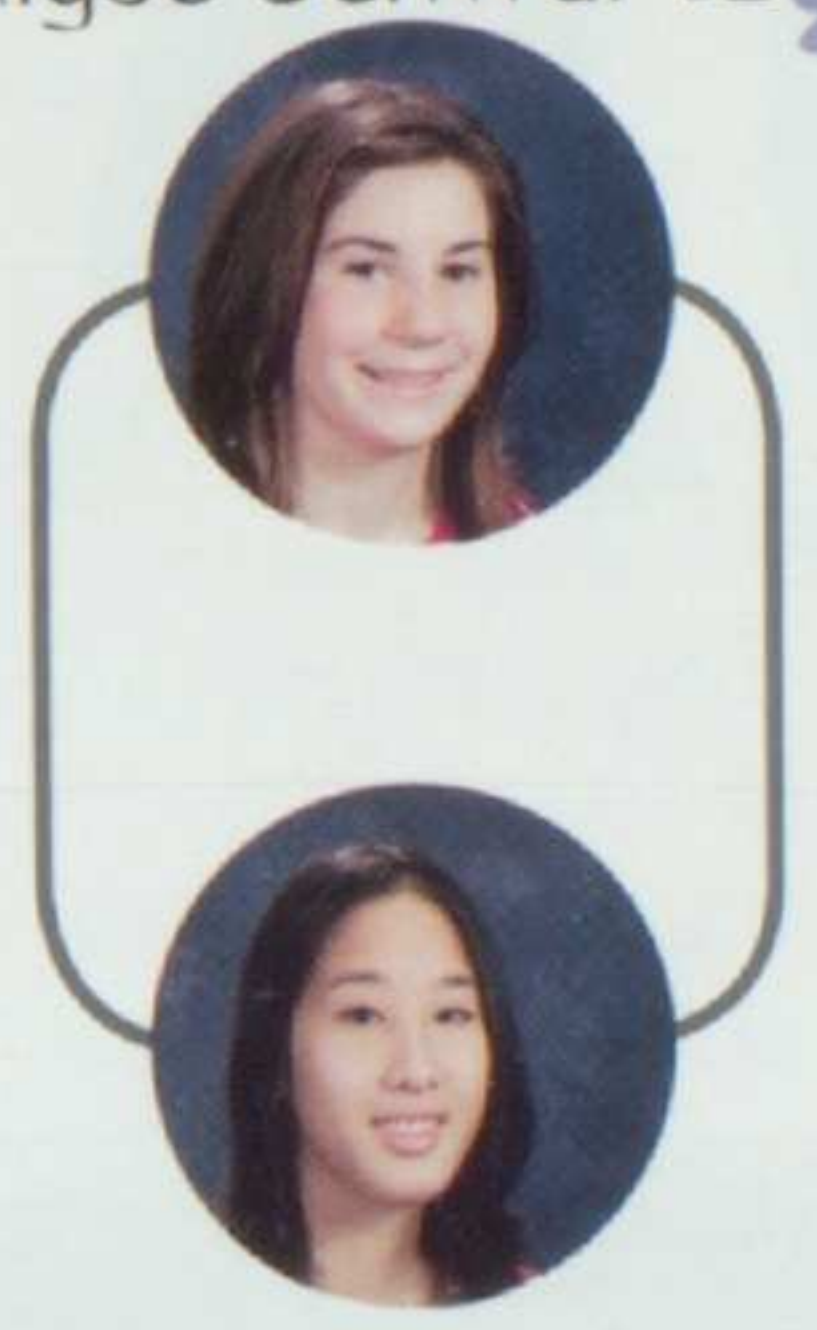

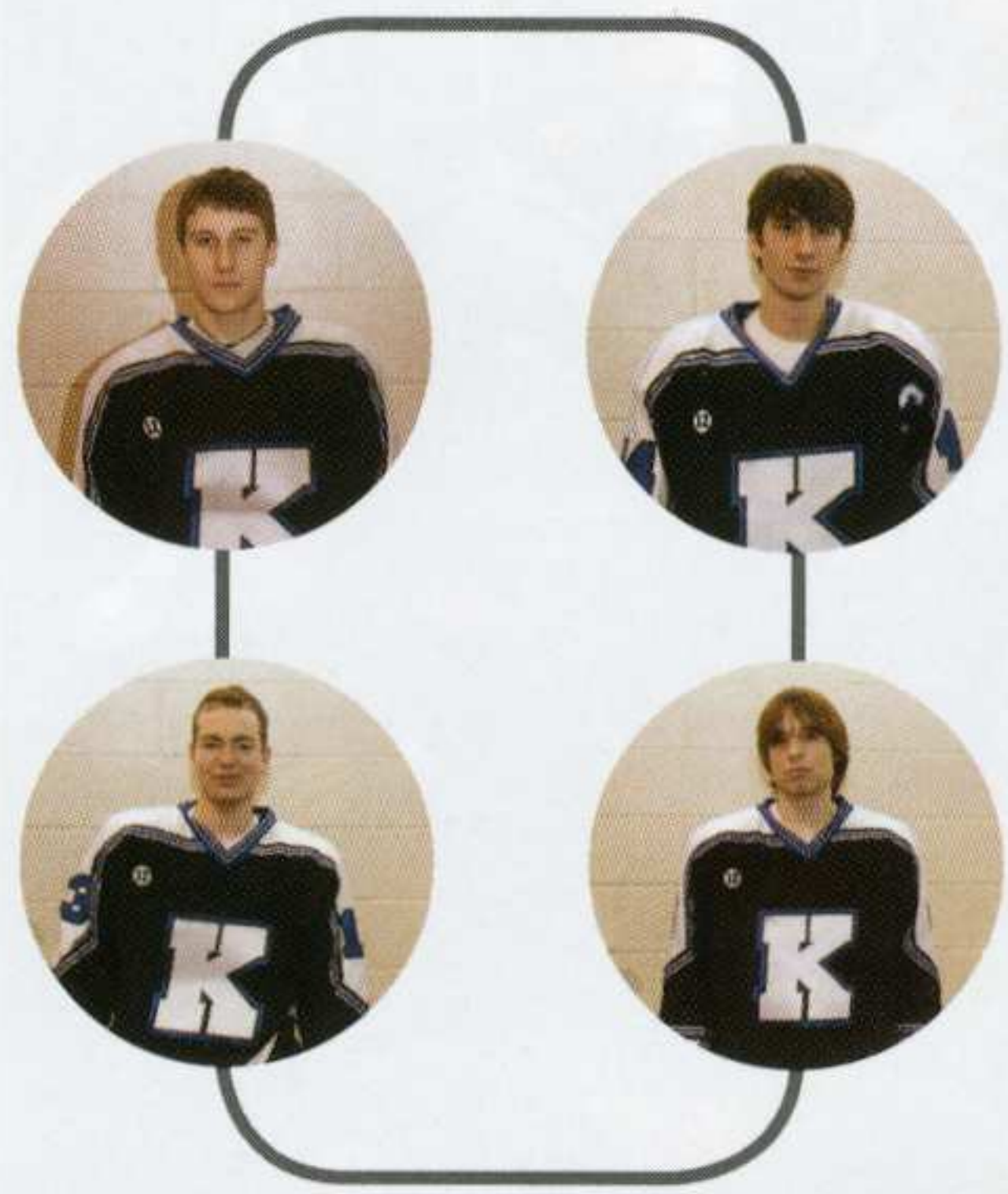

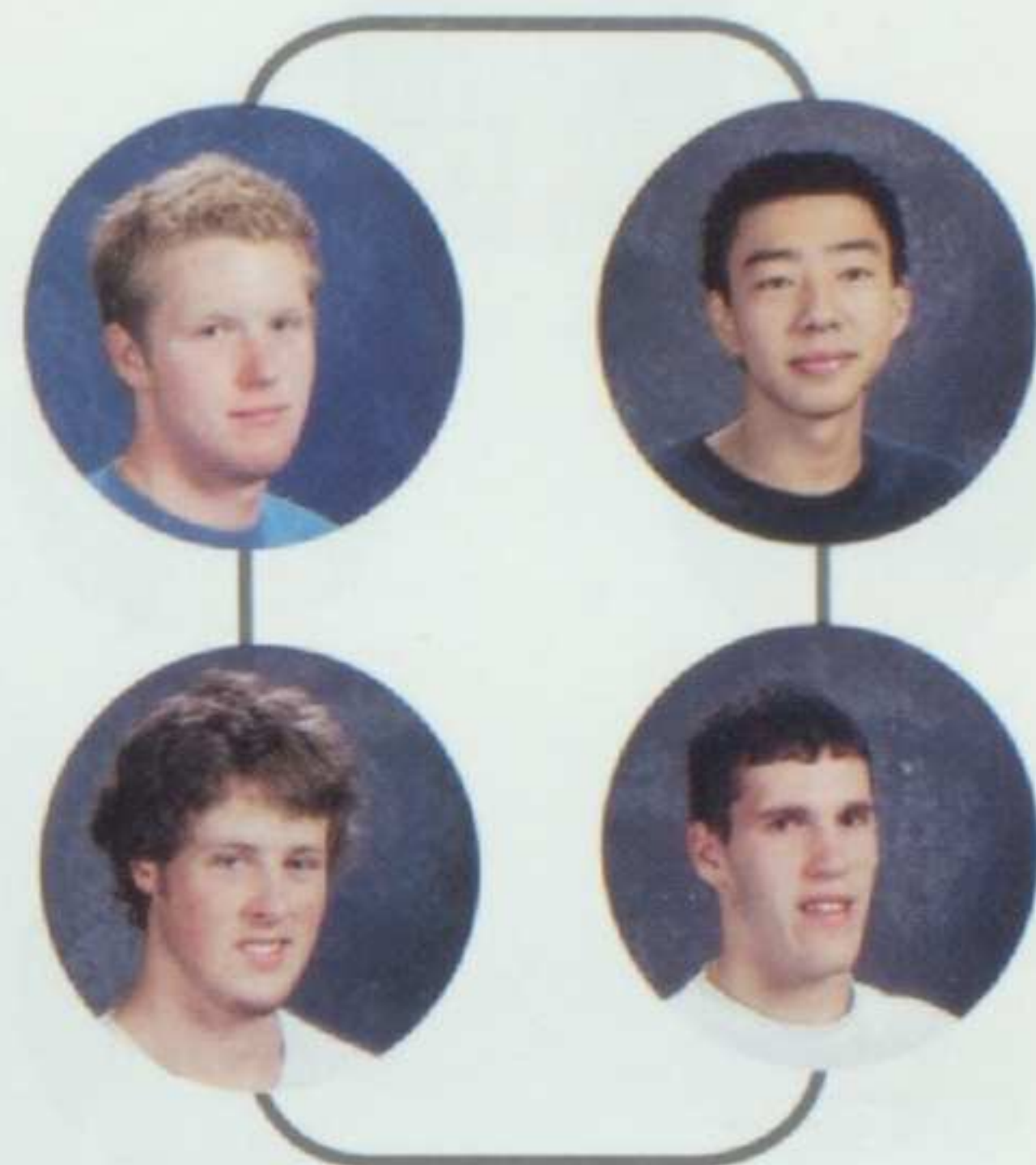

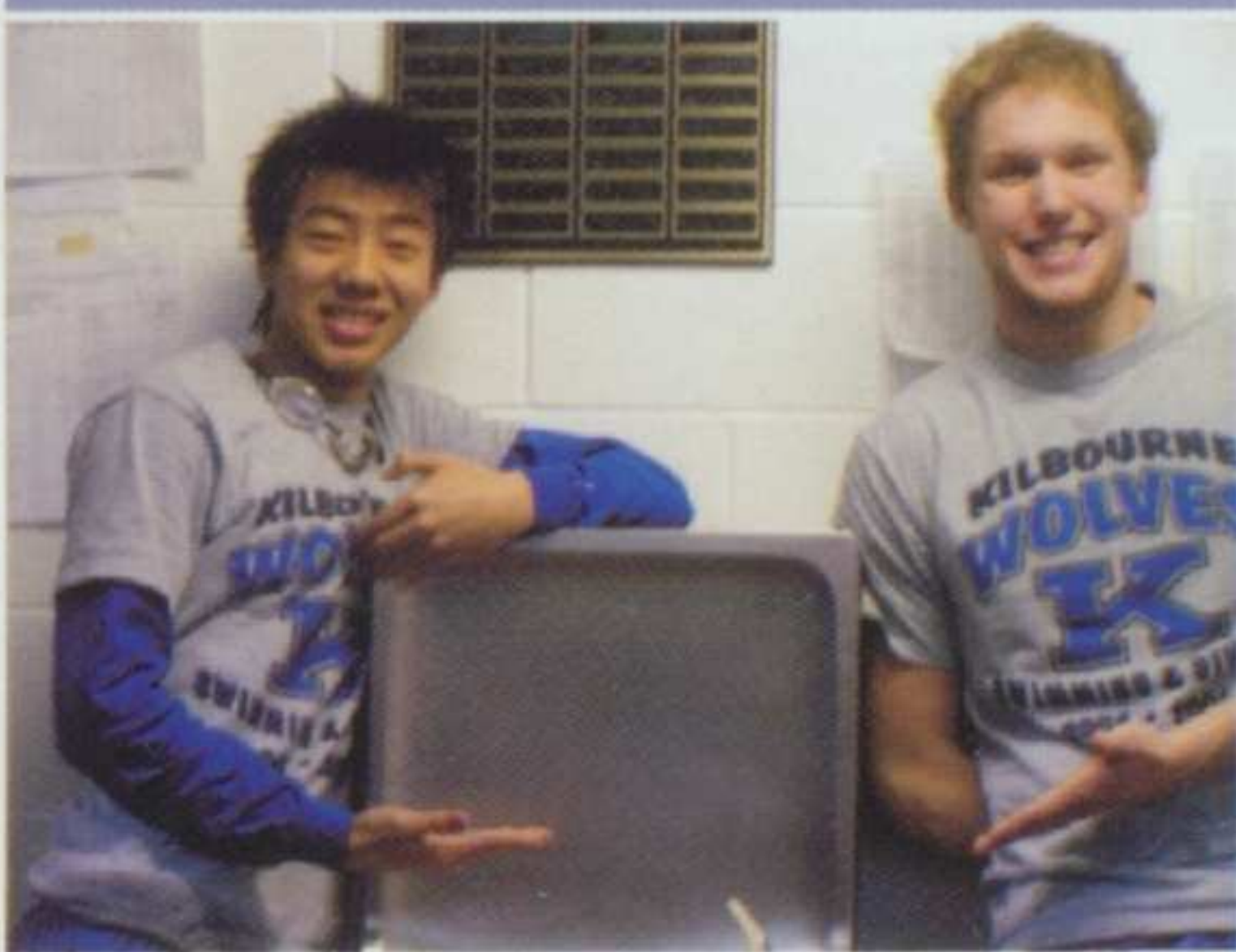

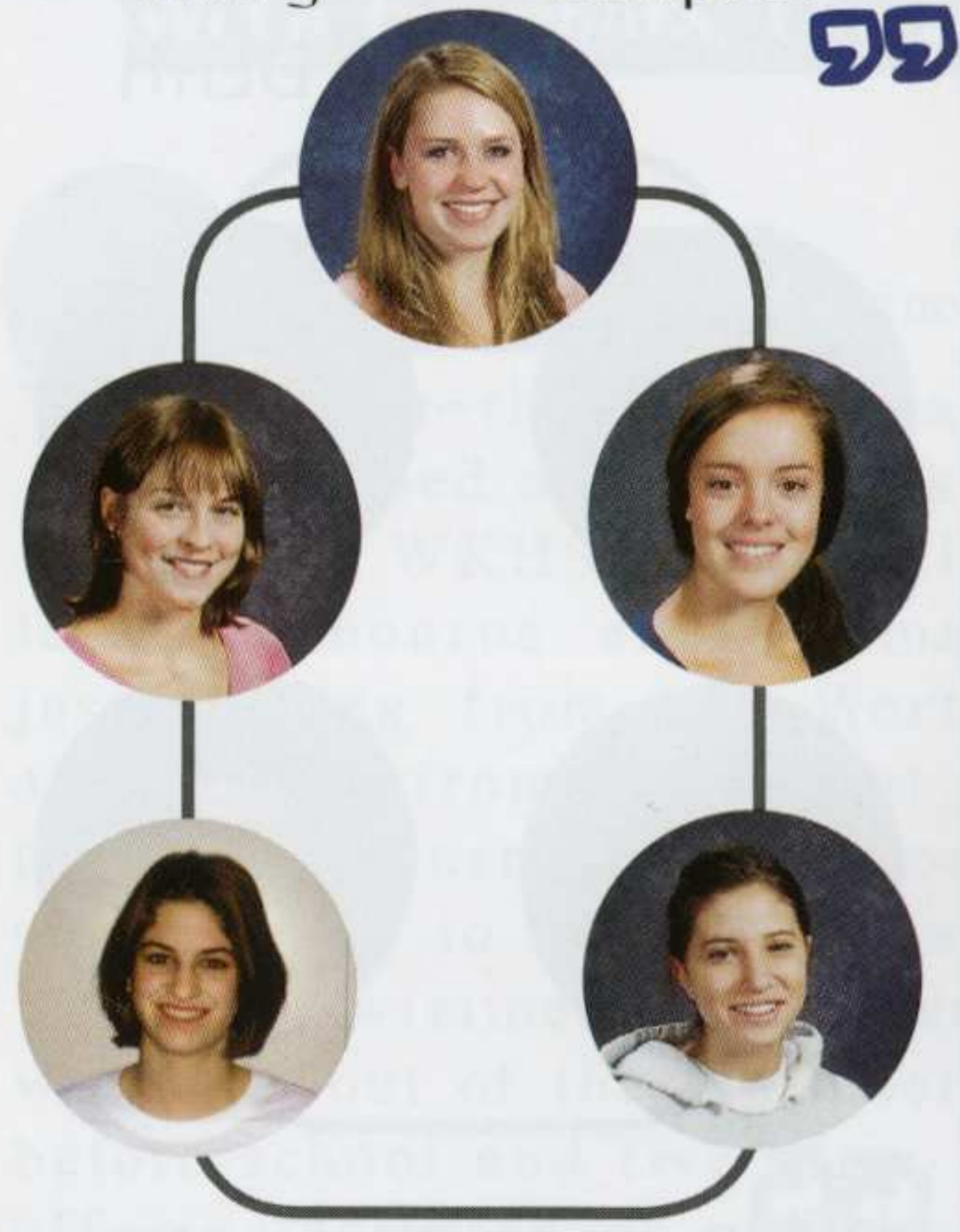

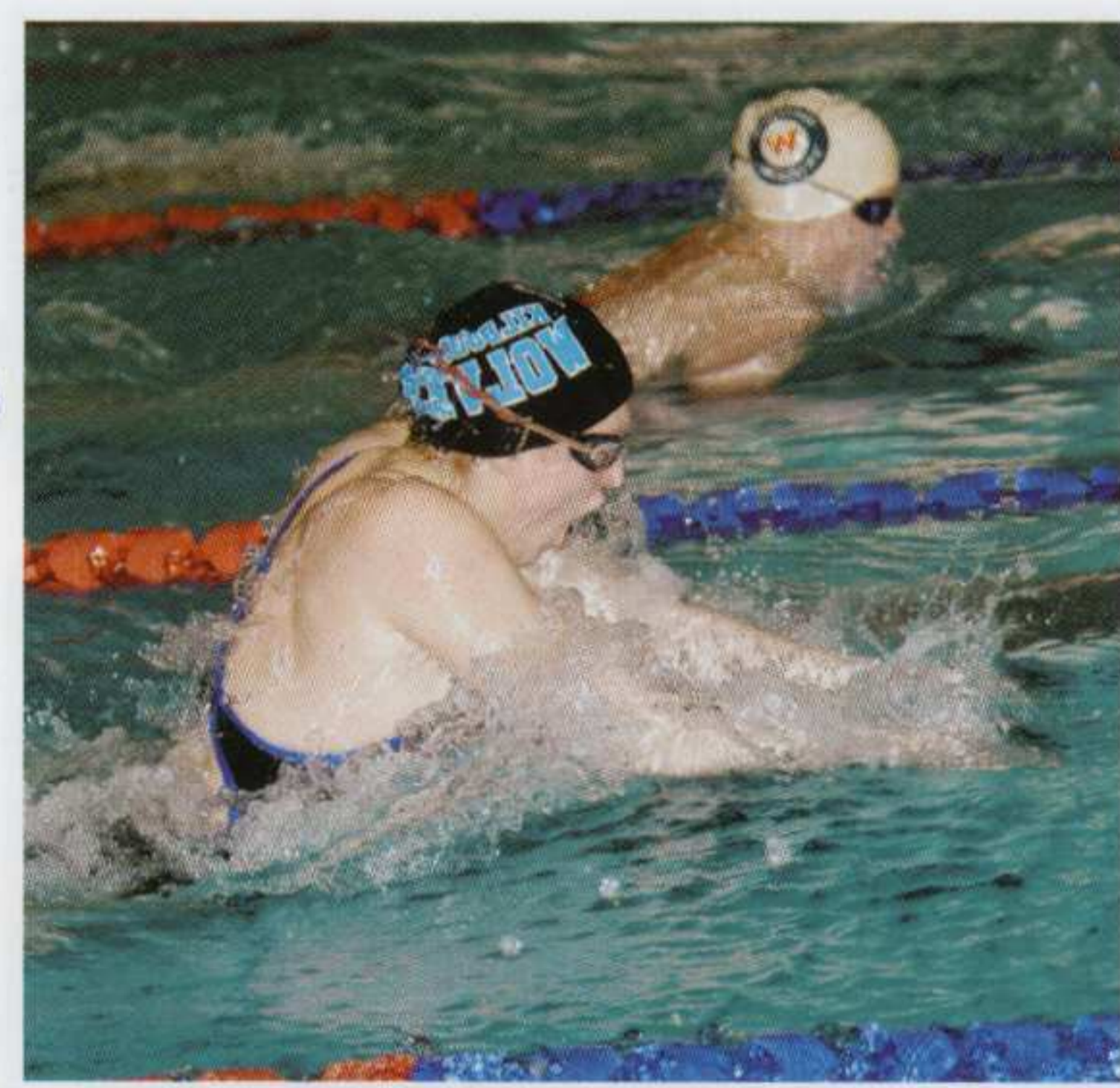

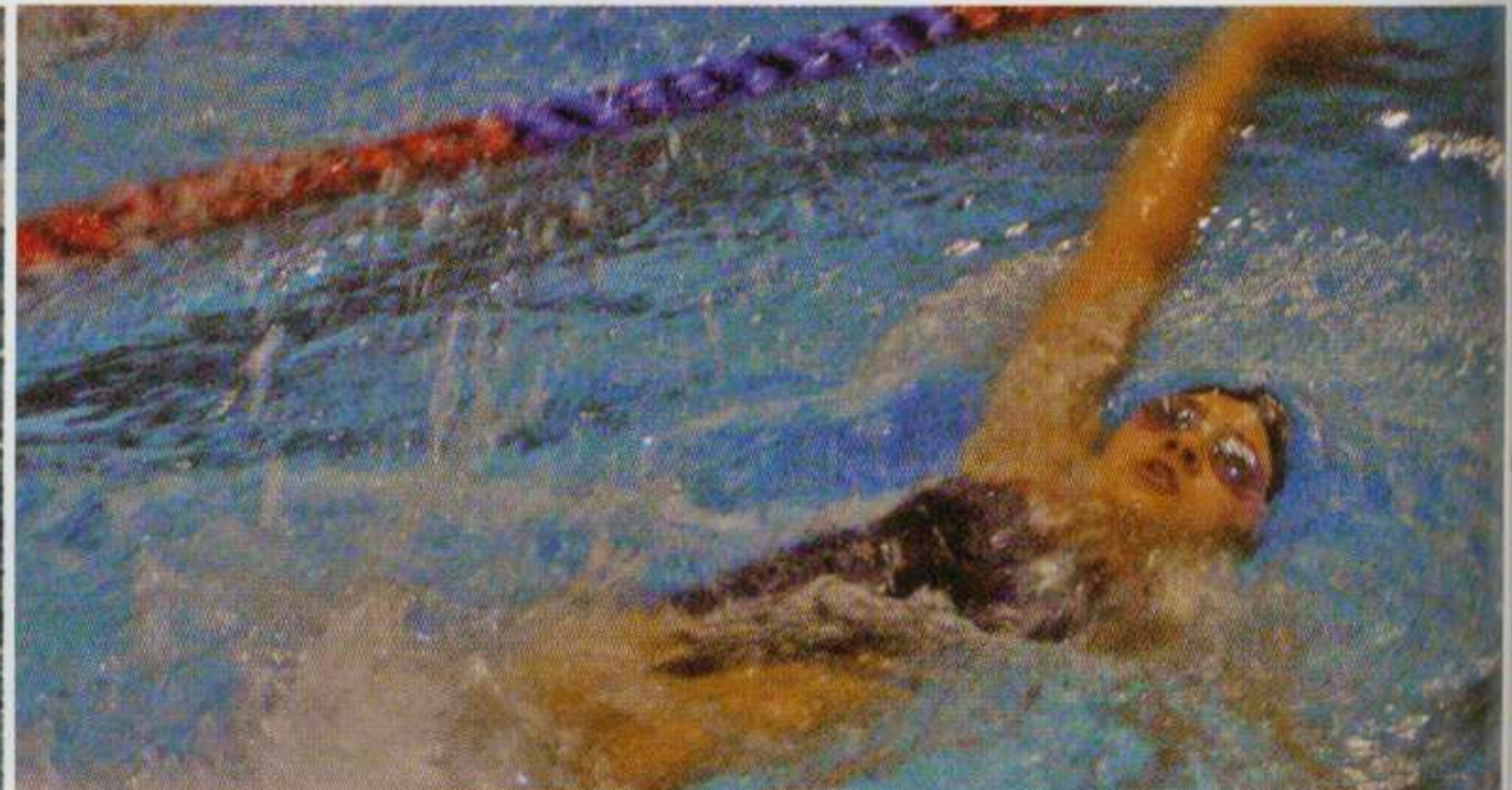

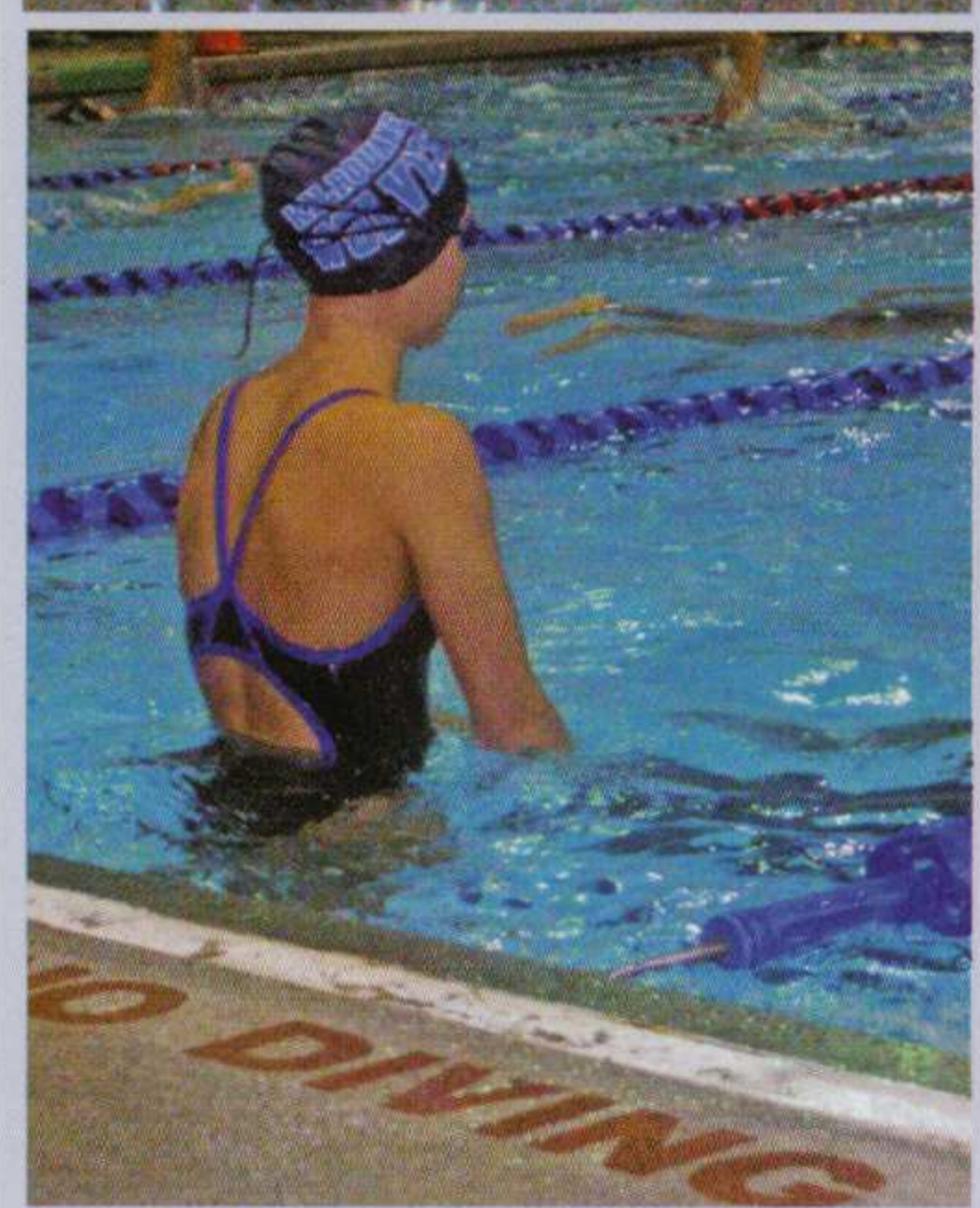

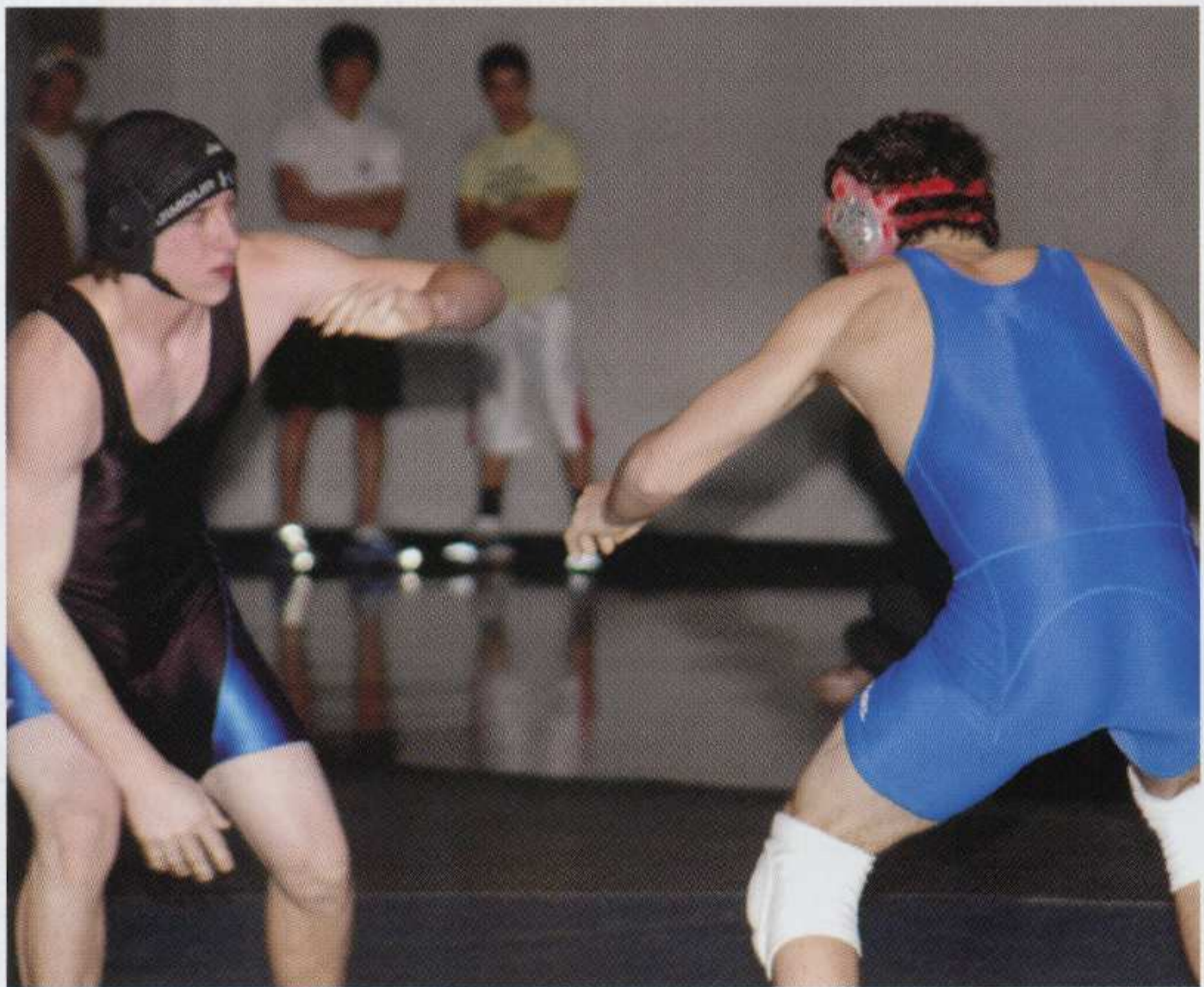
Wolfpack. The team finished 3rd in the Wolfpack and 7th out of 16 in the St. Charles tournament.

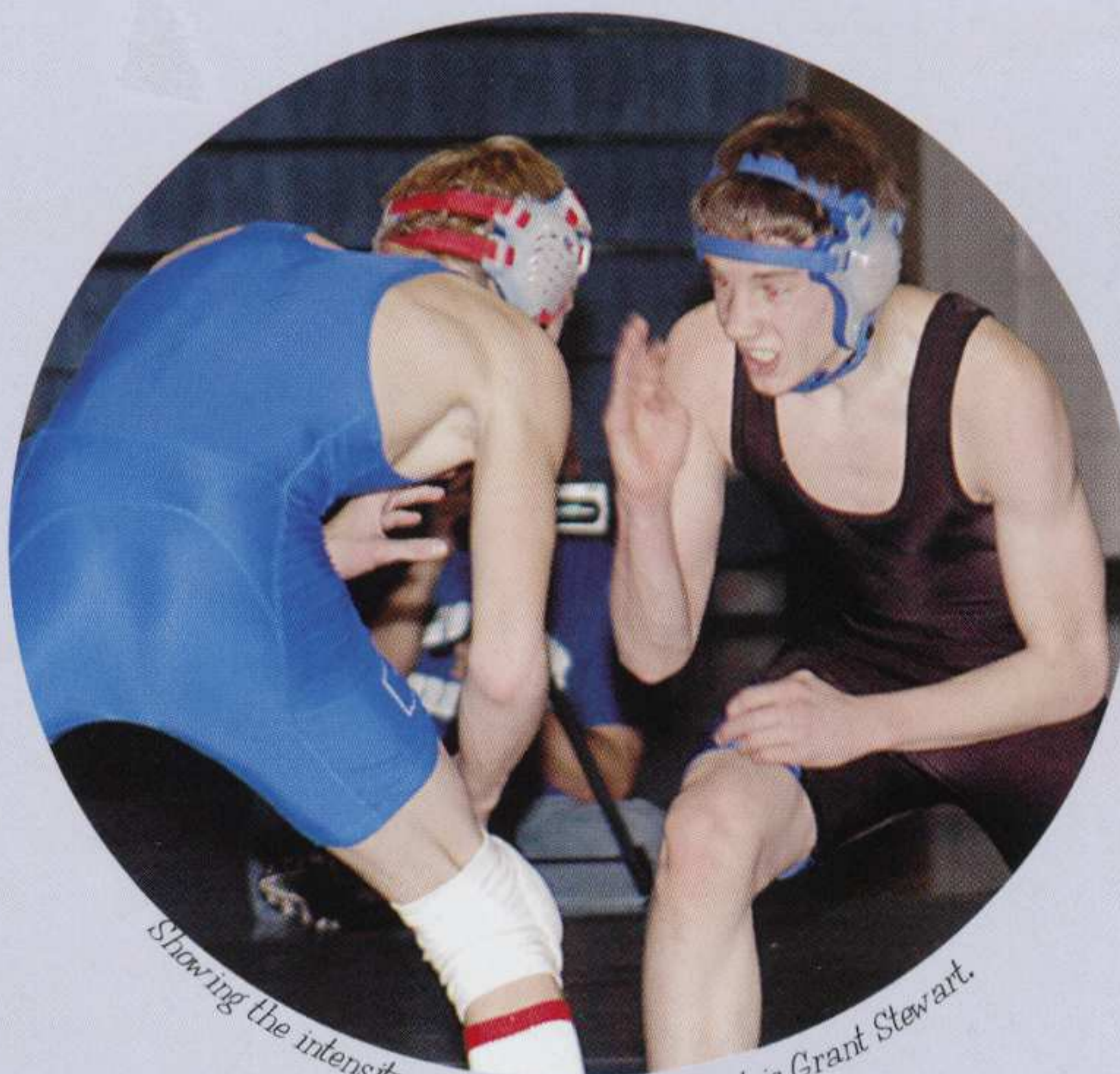

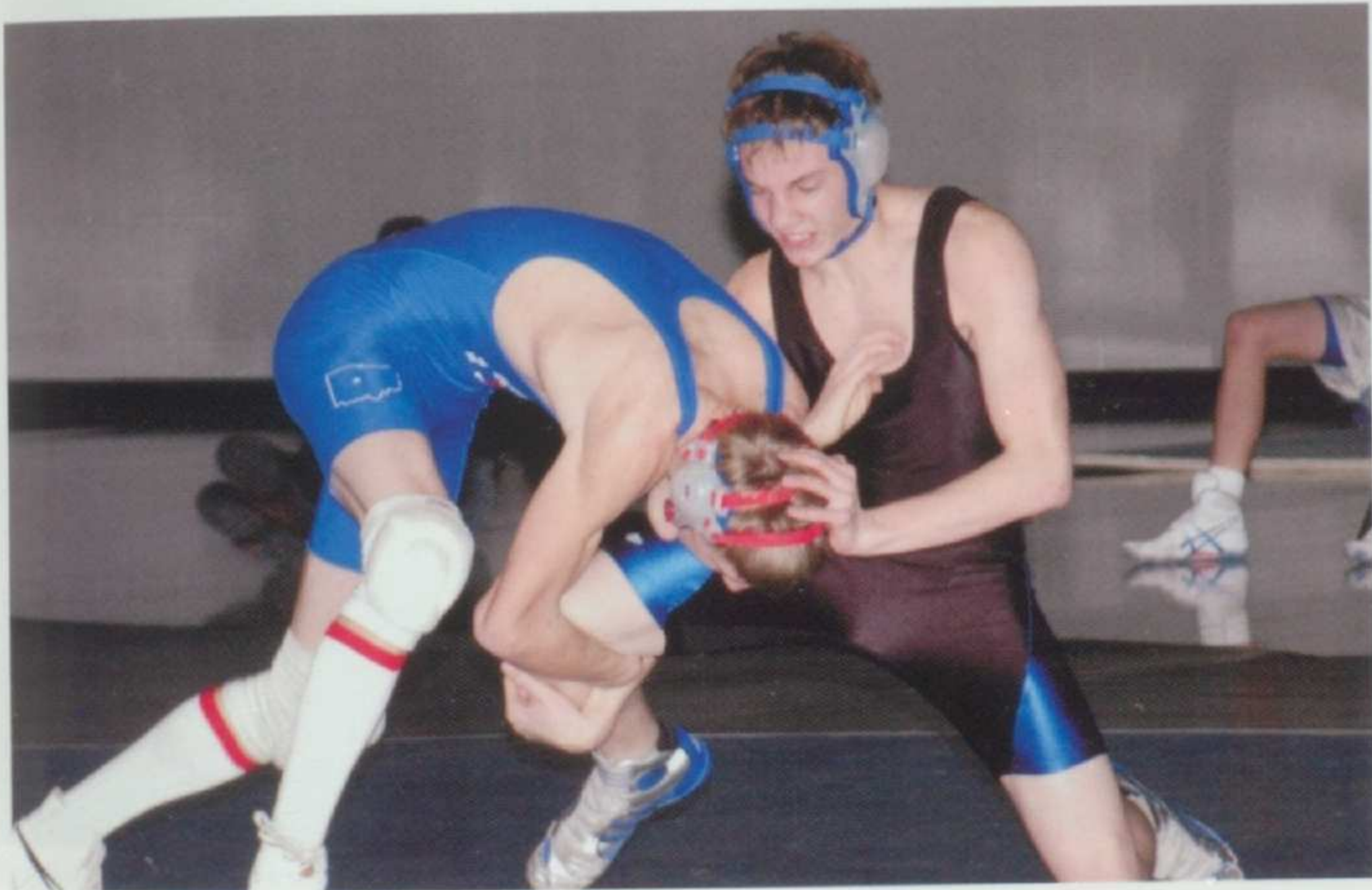

Kilbourne Students Unite to Help One of Their Own

Ellise Jones, the granddaughter of Kilbourne's custodian Junior Jones suffers from a disease known as Biliary Atresia, which attacks the liver and necessitates her to have a liver transplant.

Nurse Beegle and student council have been working close with Jones in order to raise the \$50,000 needed for her liver transplant.

"Junior had mentioned to me that she had to have a liver transplant," explained Beegle, who worked together with Mrs. DeGarmo, Mr. Dunaway, Mrs. Maddox and many others to start raising the needed money.

"Together we immediately started to brainstorm how we at WKHS could help," said Beegle. "Mr. Dunaway told us to 'make it happen.'"

Together, many fundraisers began collecting money in a variety of different ways. Student Council recently decided to donate \$2,000 of their budget to Ellise's fund, as well as the proceeds from the upcoming dodge ball tournament.

"We wanted to do as much as we can," said Senior Class President Gabz Ciofani.

Money will also come from a pizza sale sponsored by Science teacher Mrs. Vance, who sells pizza to her class and donates the money to Ellise's fund.

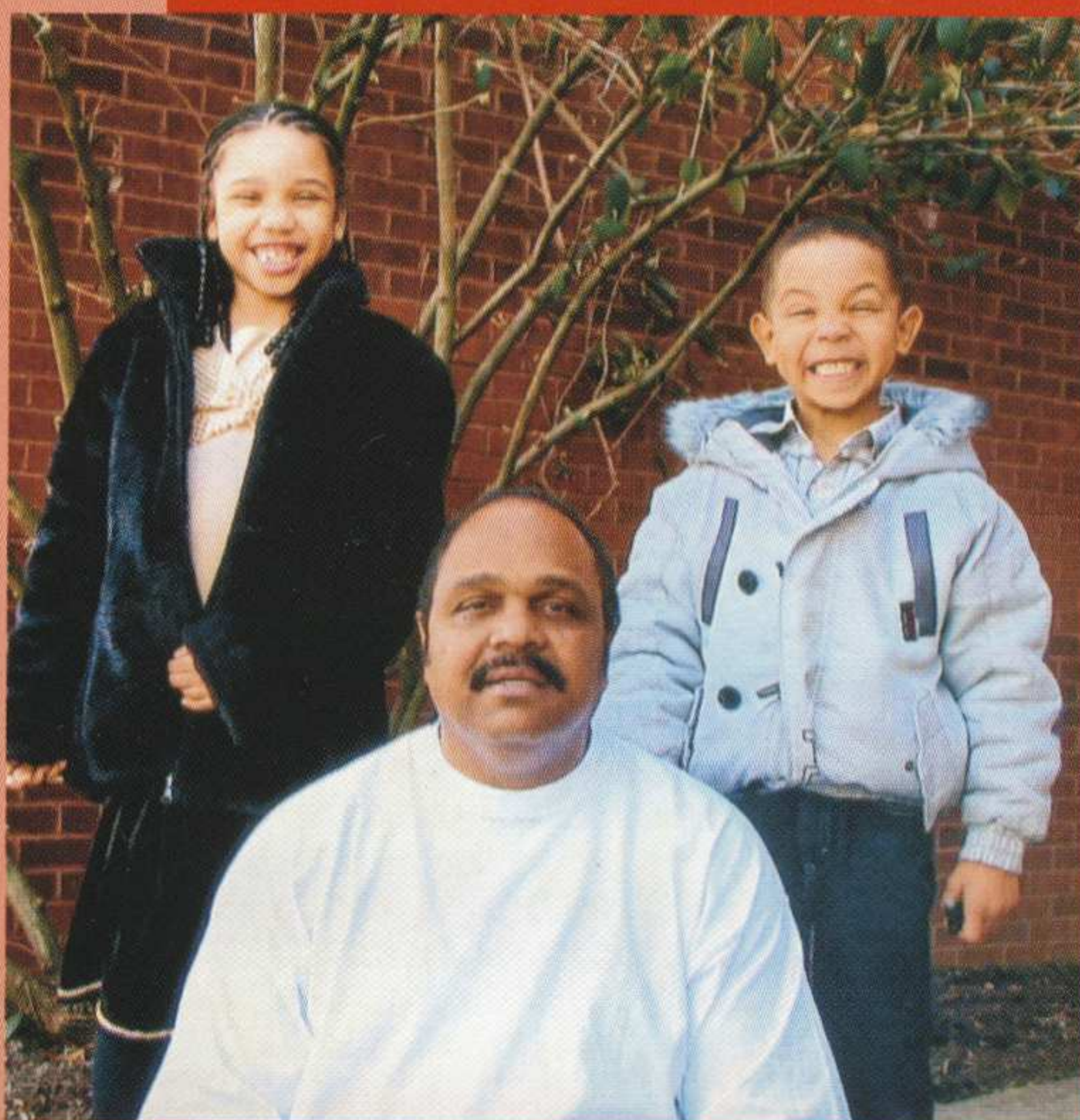
Additional custodians from other buildings will hold collections as well as SMOOT Inc., through Ted Beegle.

Ellise's disease, Biliary Atresia can strike patients shortly after birth and cause tubes from the liver to not work properly, trapping a fluid known as bile. Bile aids in digestion by carrying waste products from the liver to the intestines and kidneys. When the bile does not drain, the liver becomes damaged and many vital bodily functions become affected. The disease is often fatal without the proper treatment.

The main treatments for Biliary Atresia range from an operation known as Kasai portoenterostomy to a liver transplant. Although Kasai portoenterostomy may appear as a simple solution to a liver transplant, the operation requires a patient to be younger than eight weeks old. In addition, eighty percent of those who receive the operation still will require a transplant later in life, leaving a transplant as the only solution for many, like Ellise Jones.

Two models, Samantha Joseph and Liz Bare commnted that their favorite part of being in the show was 'being able to wear the newest fasons, and of course the free pizza!'

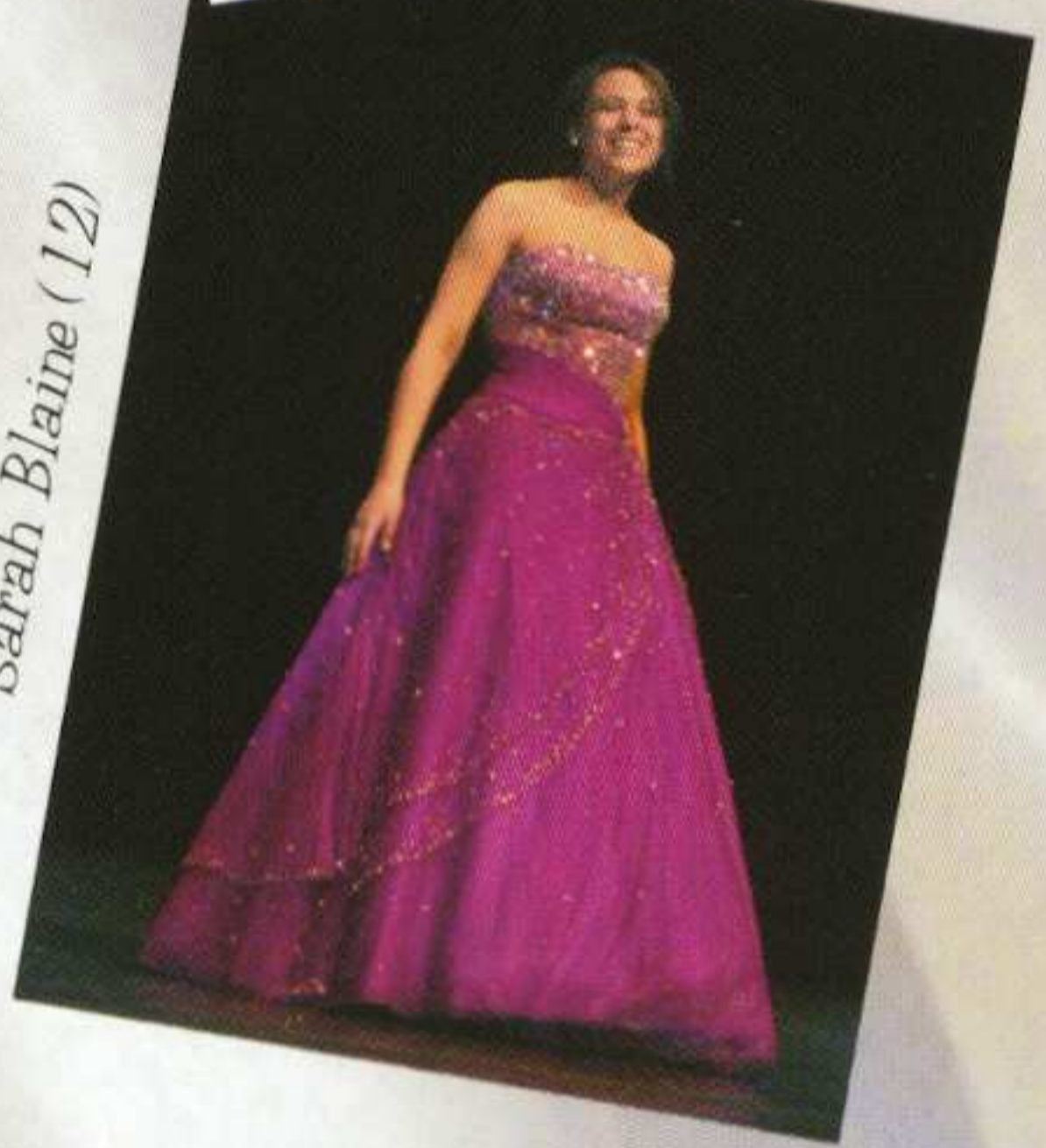

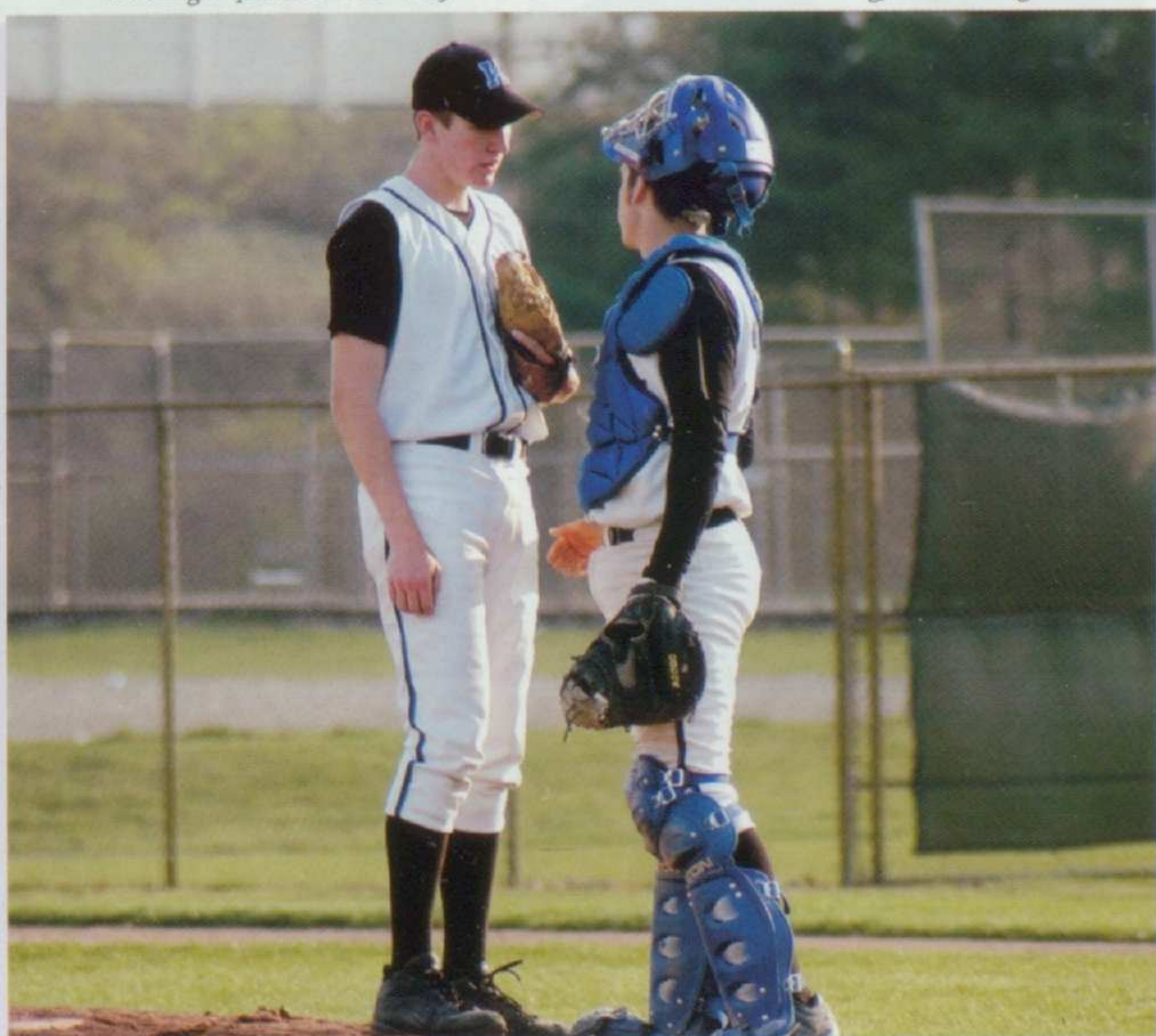

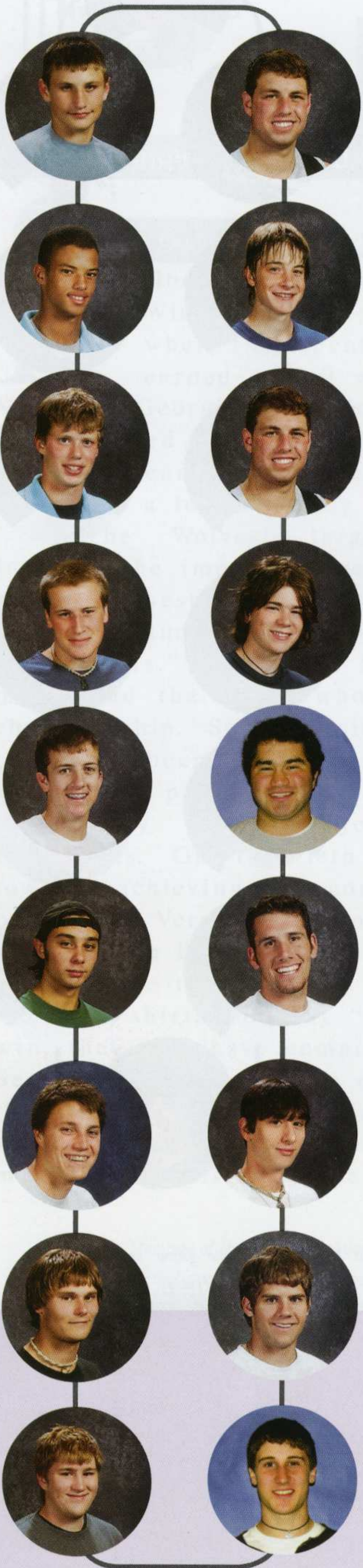

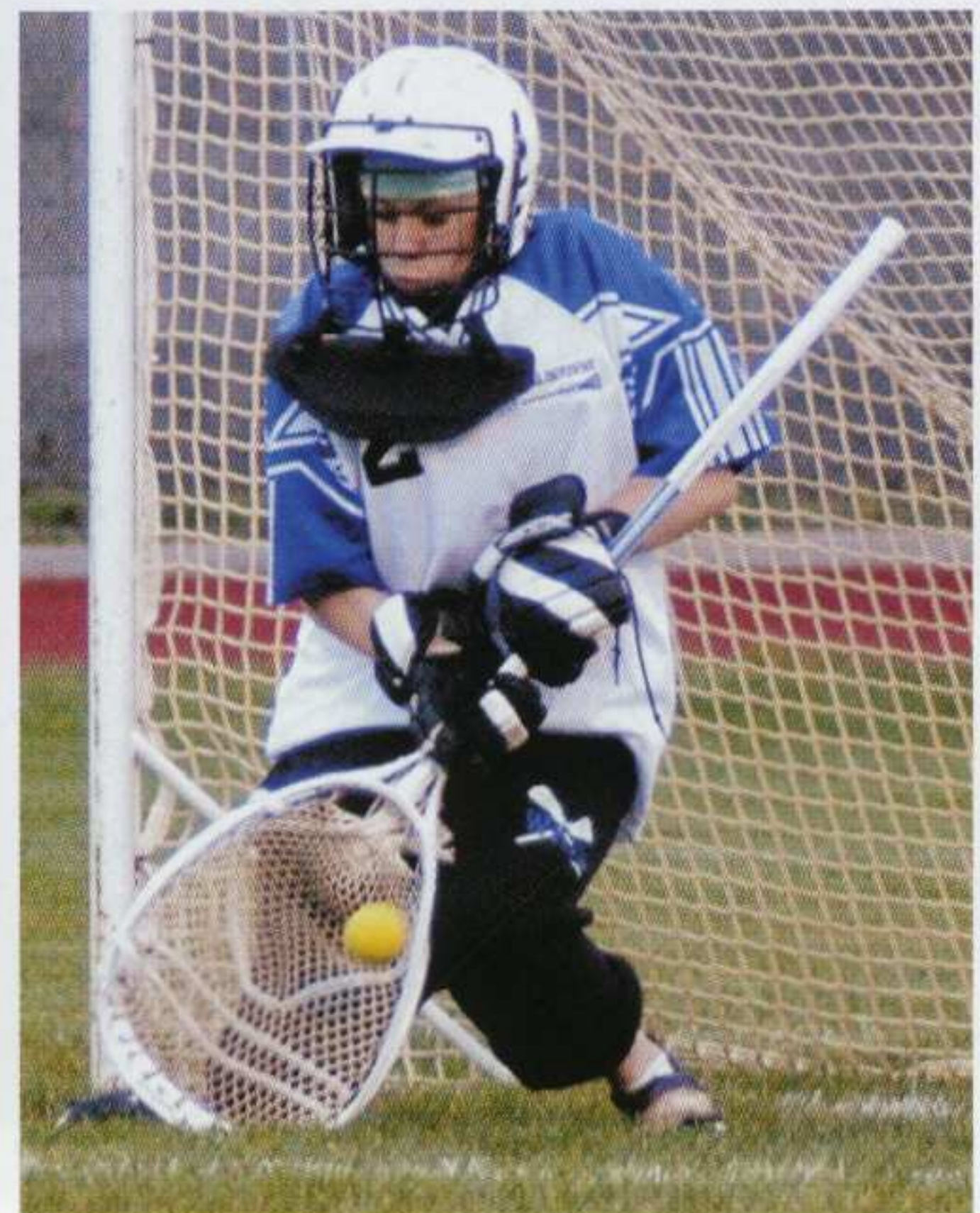

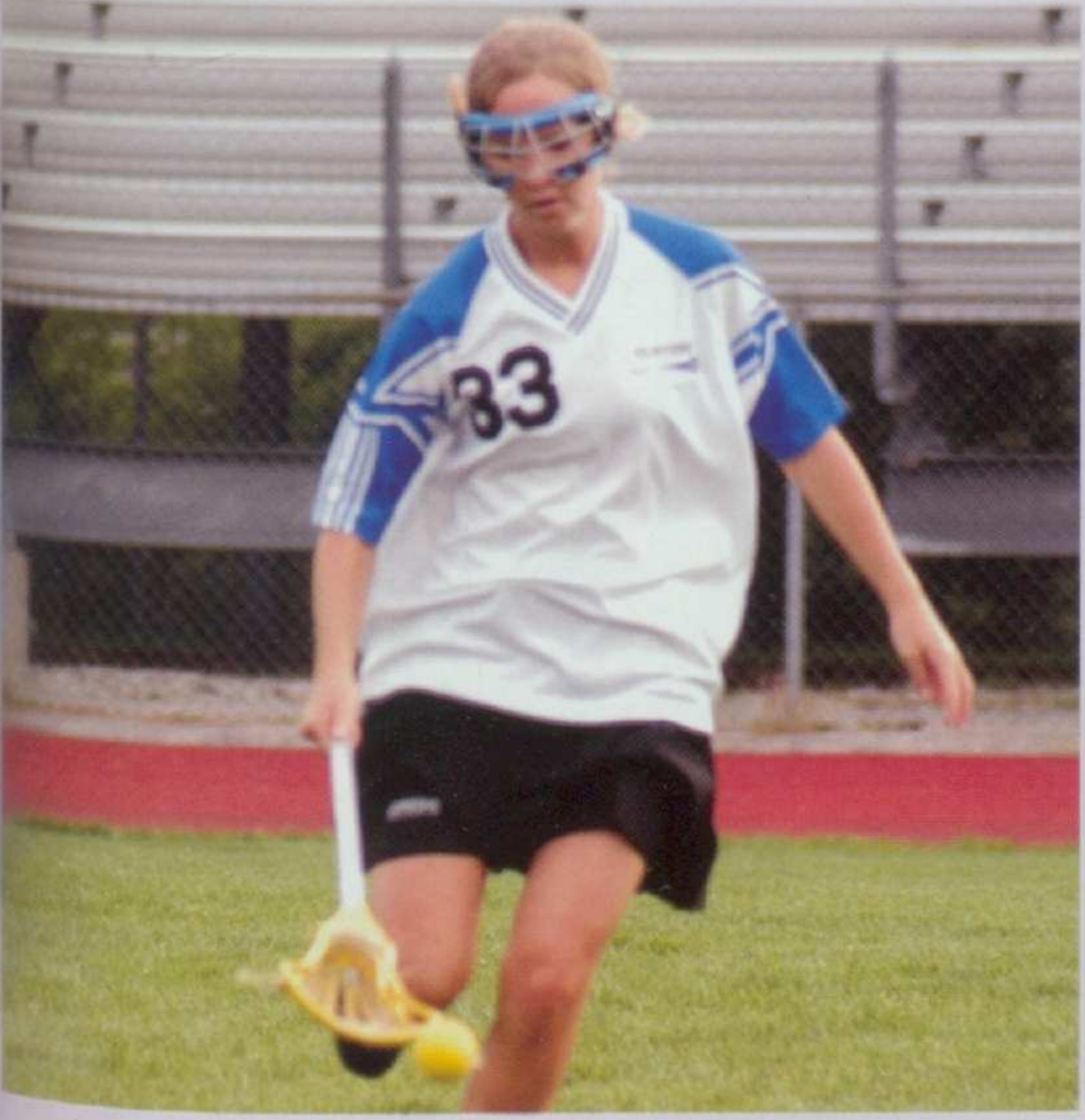

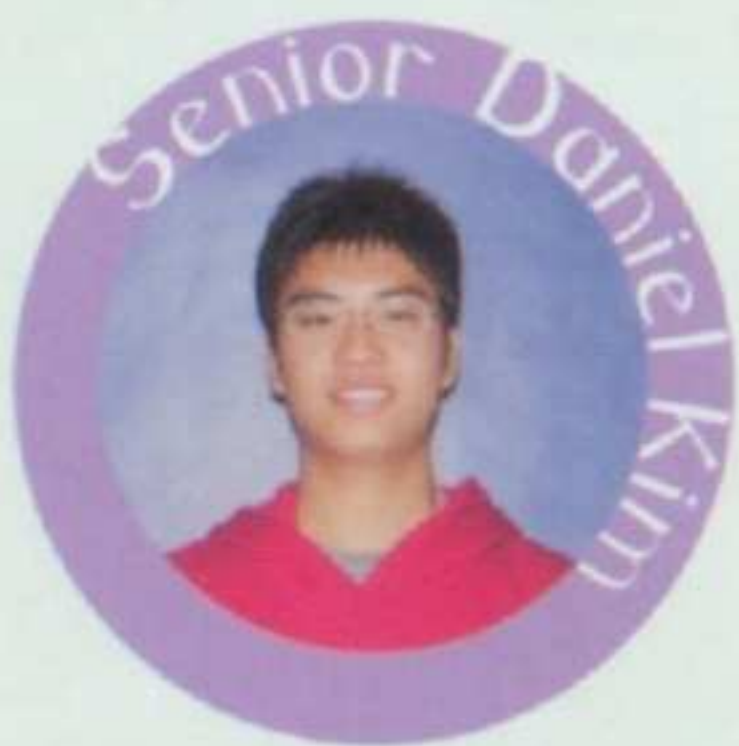

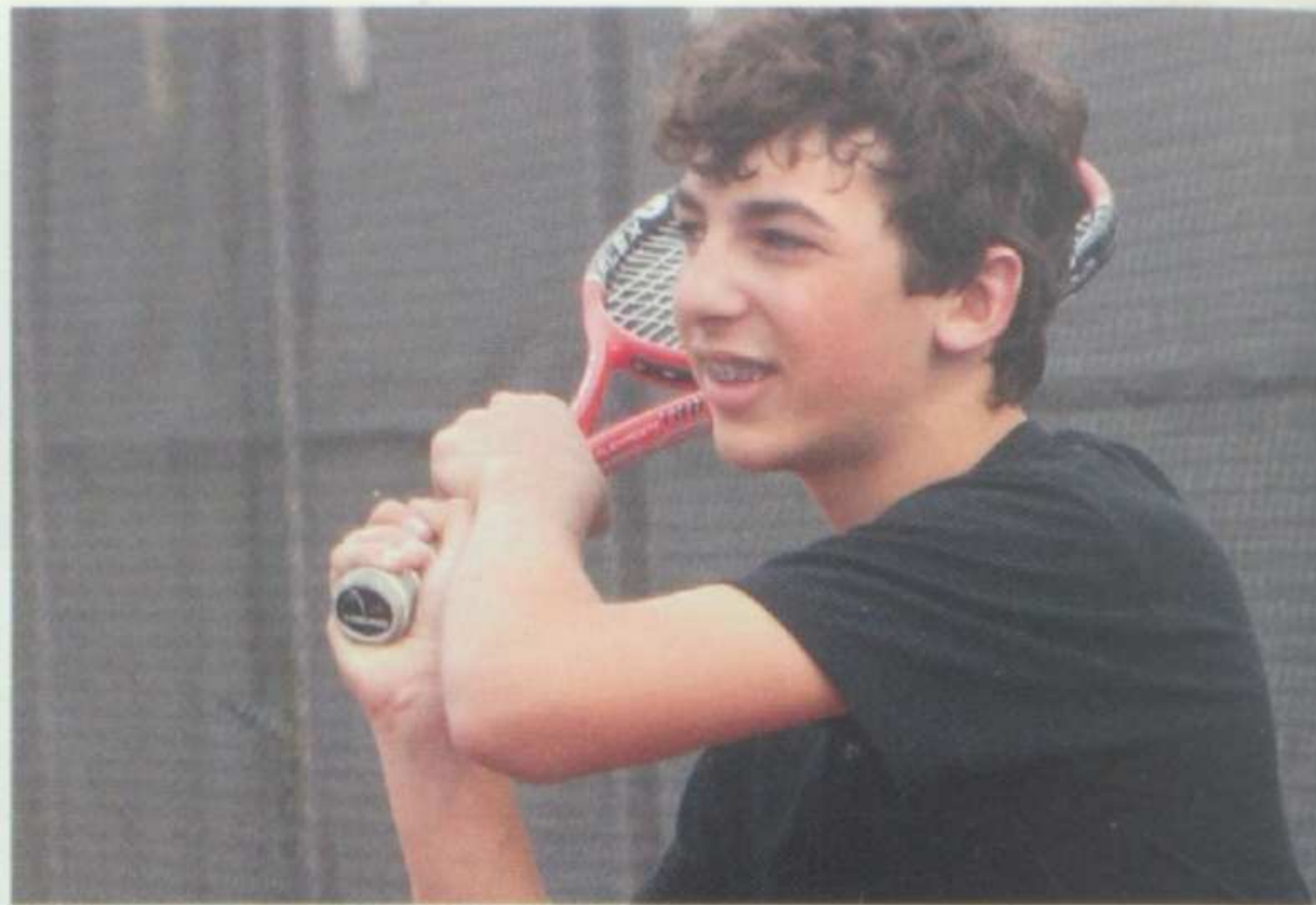

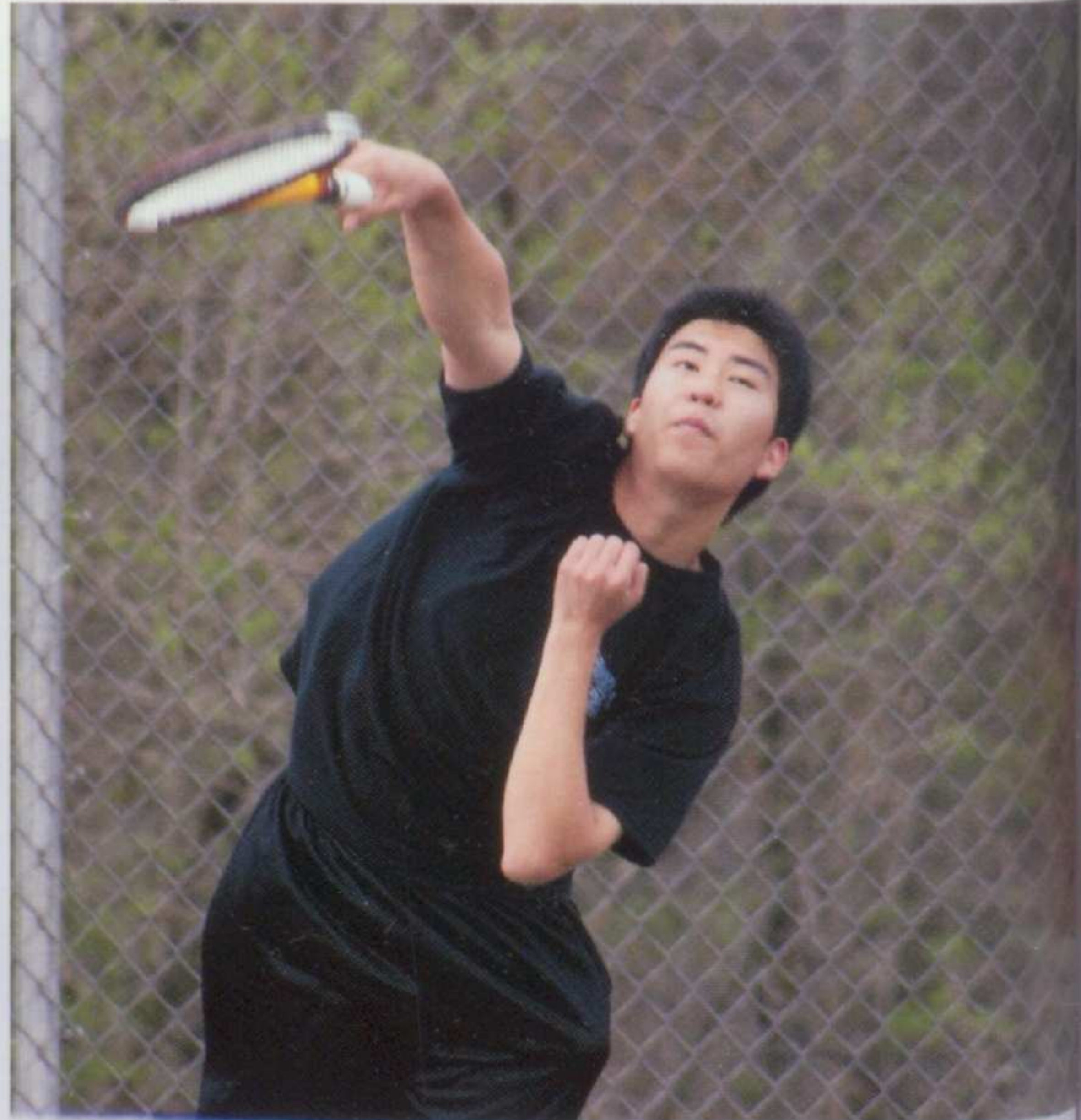

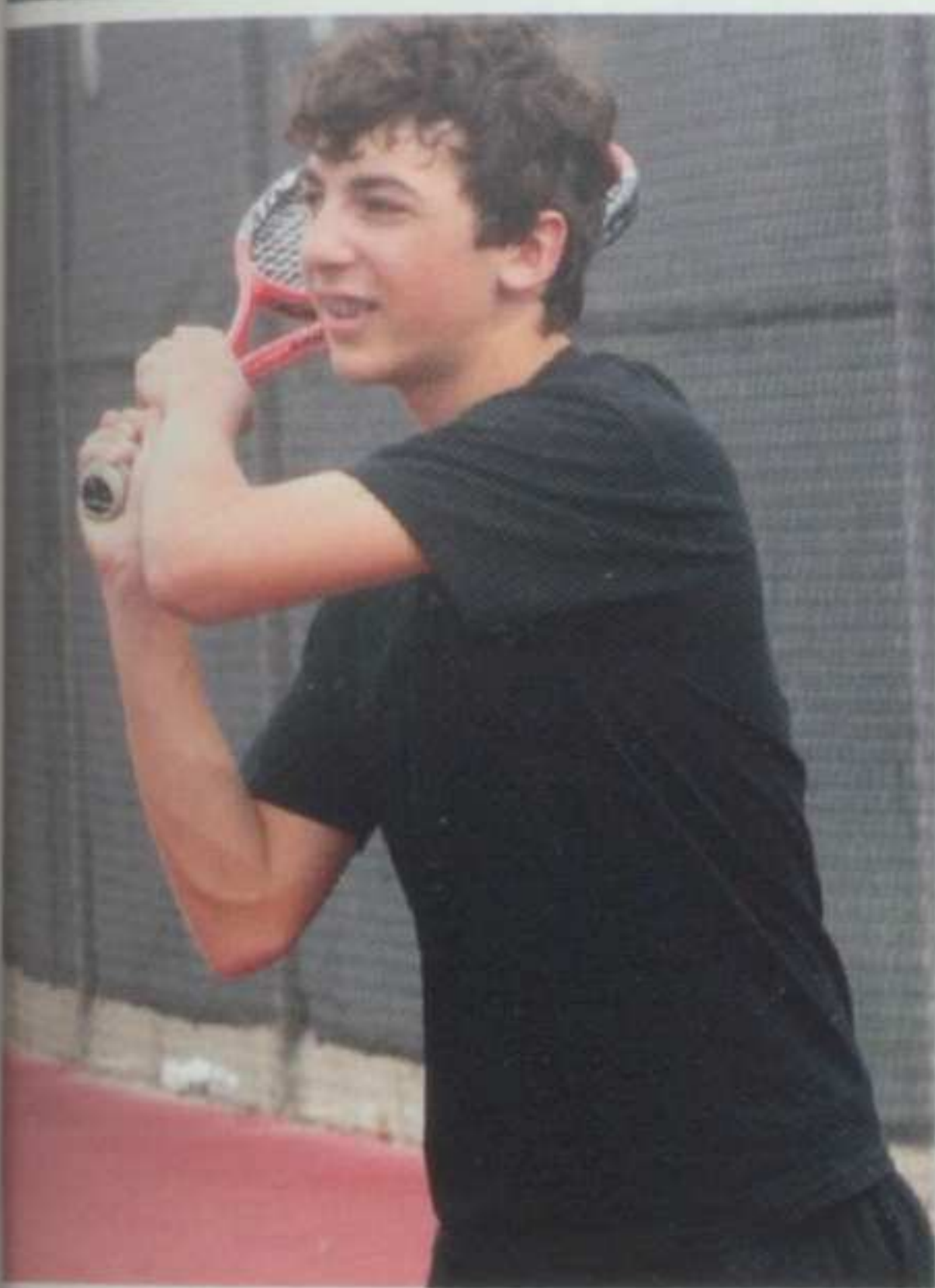

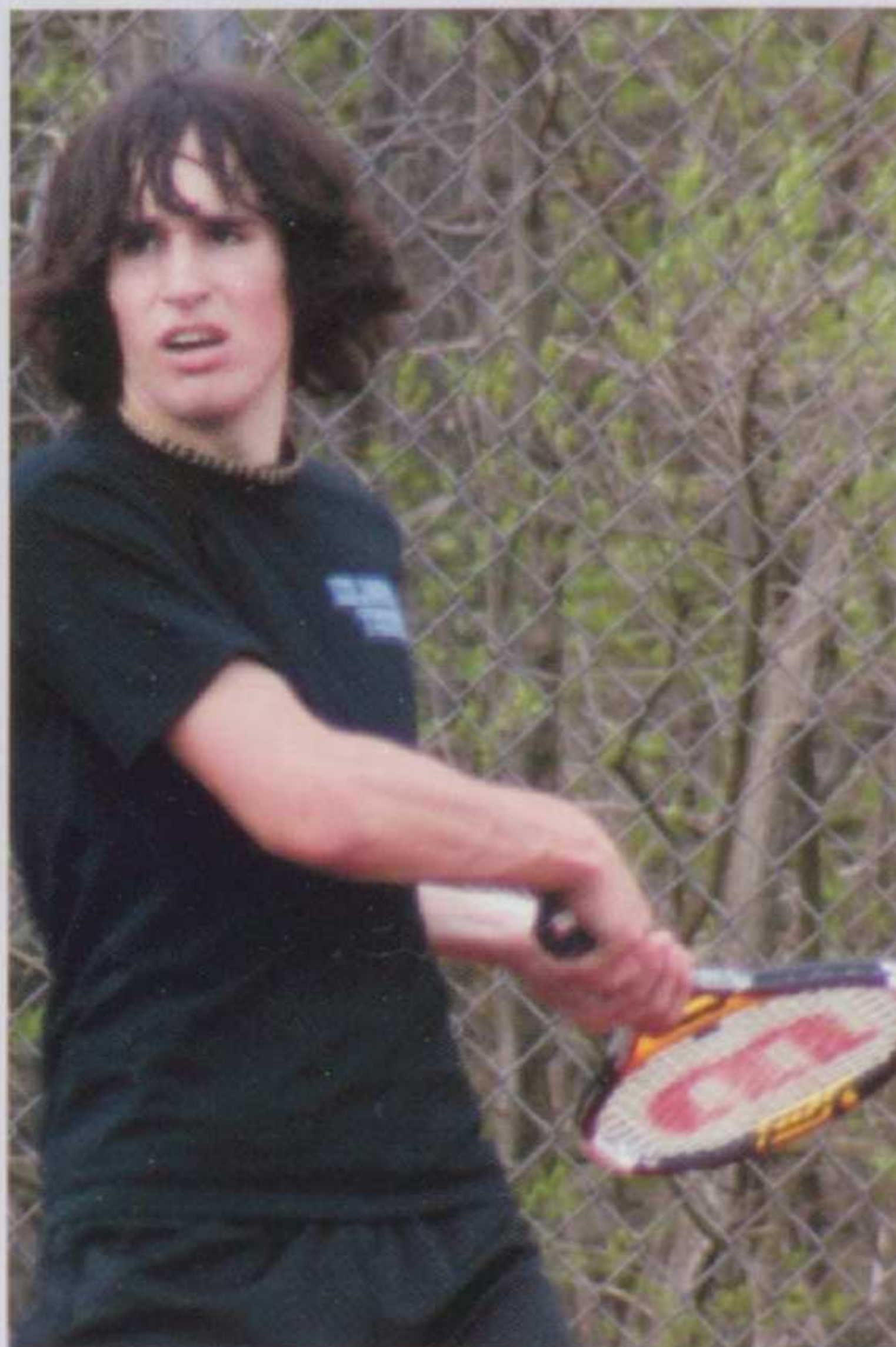

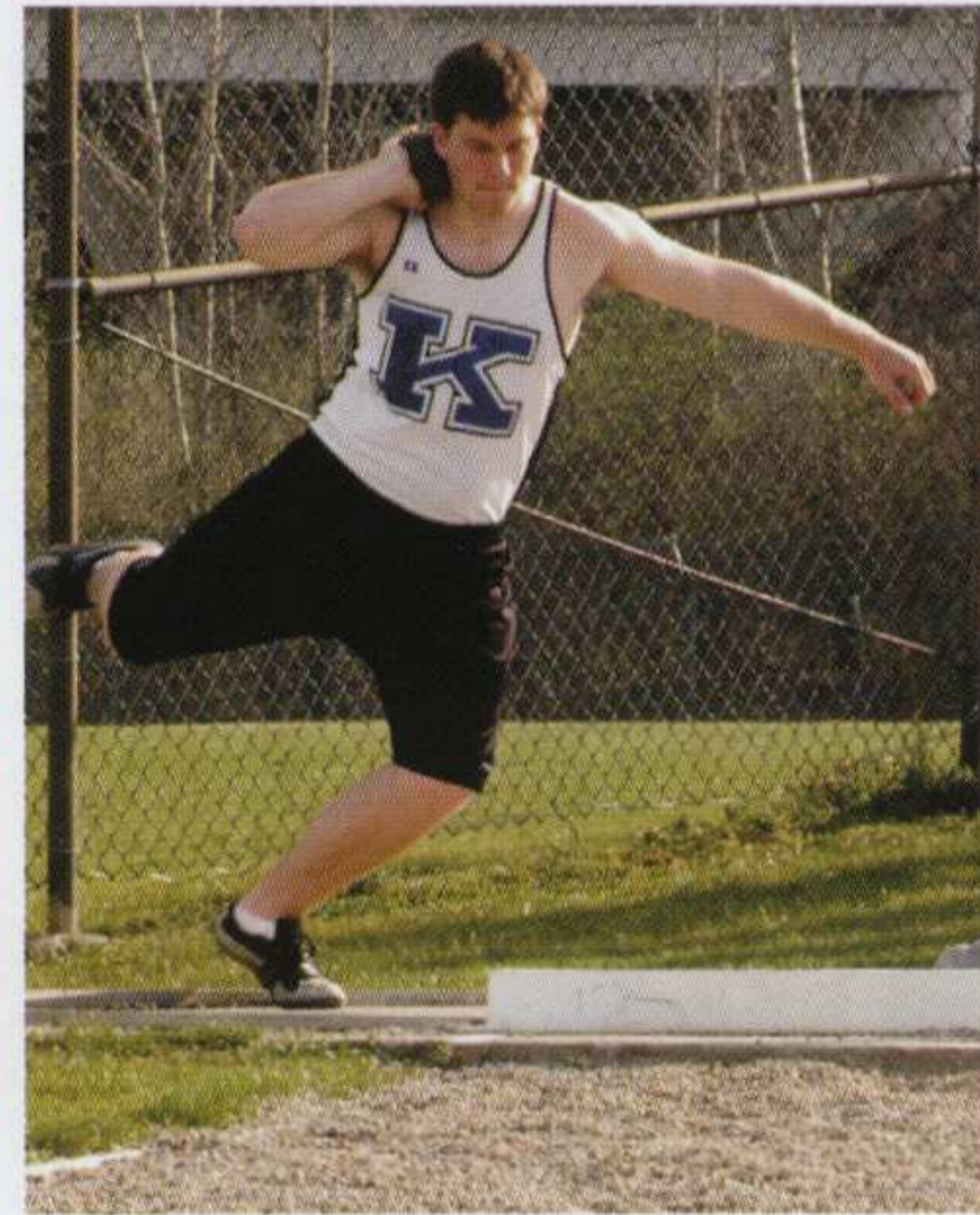

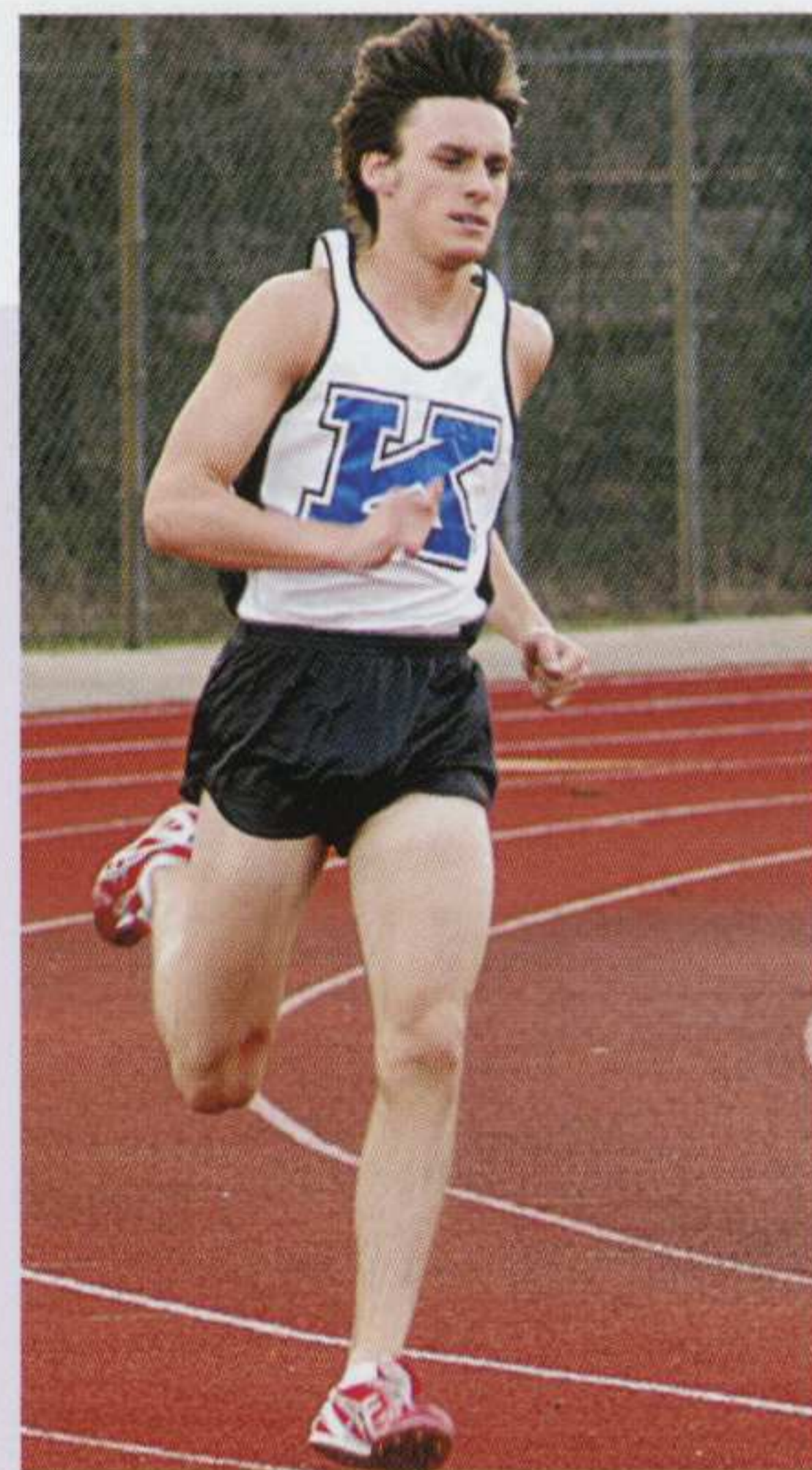

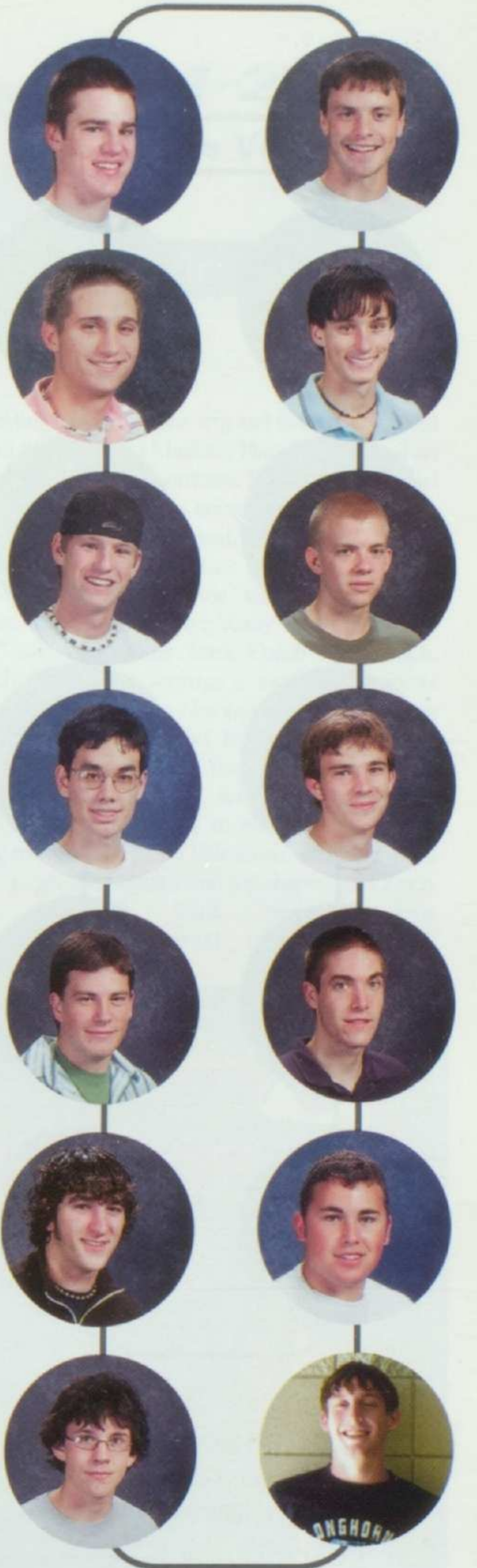

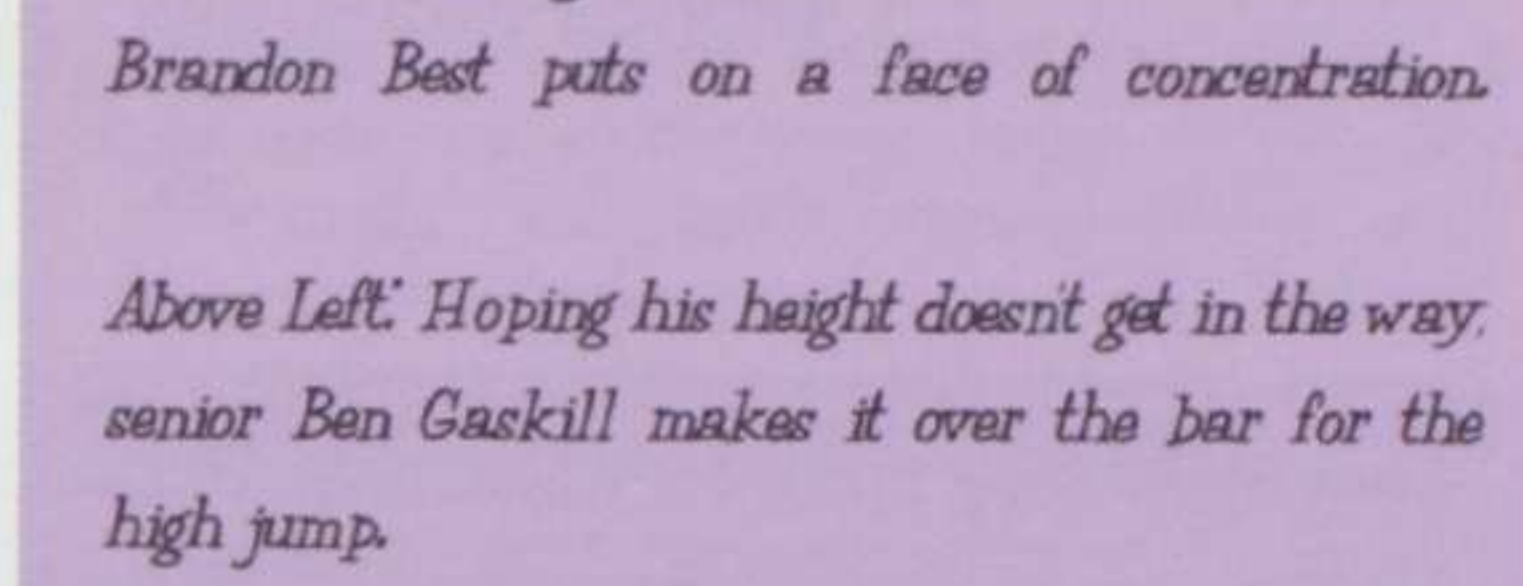

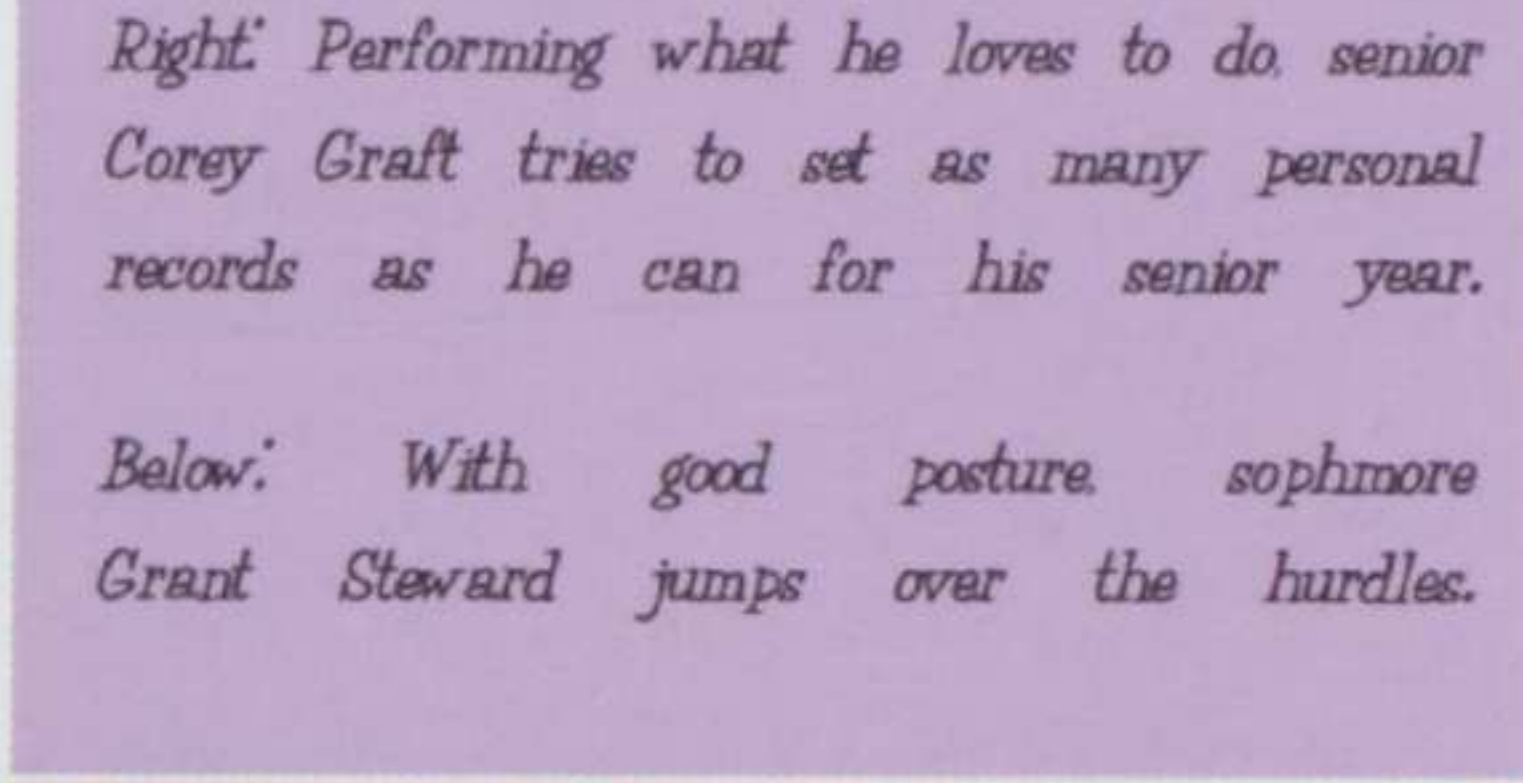

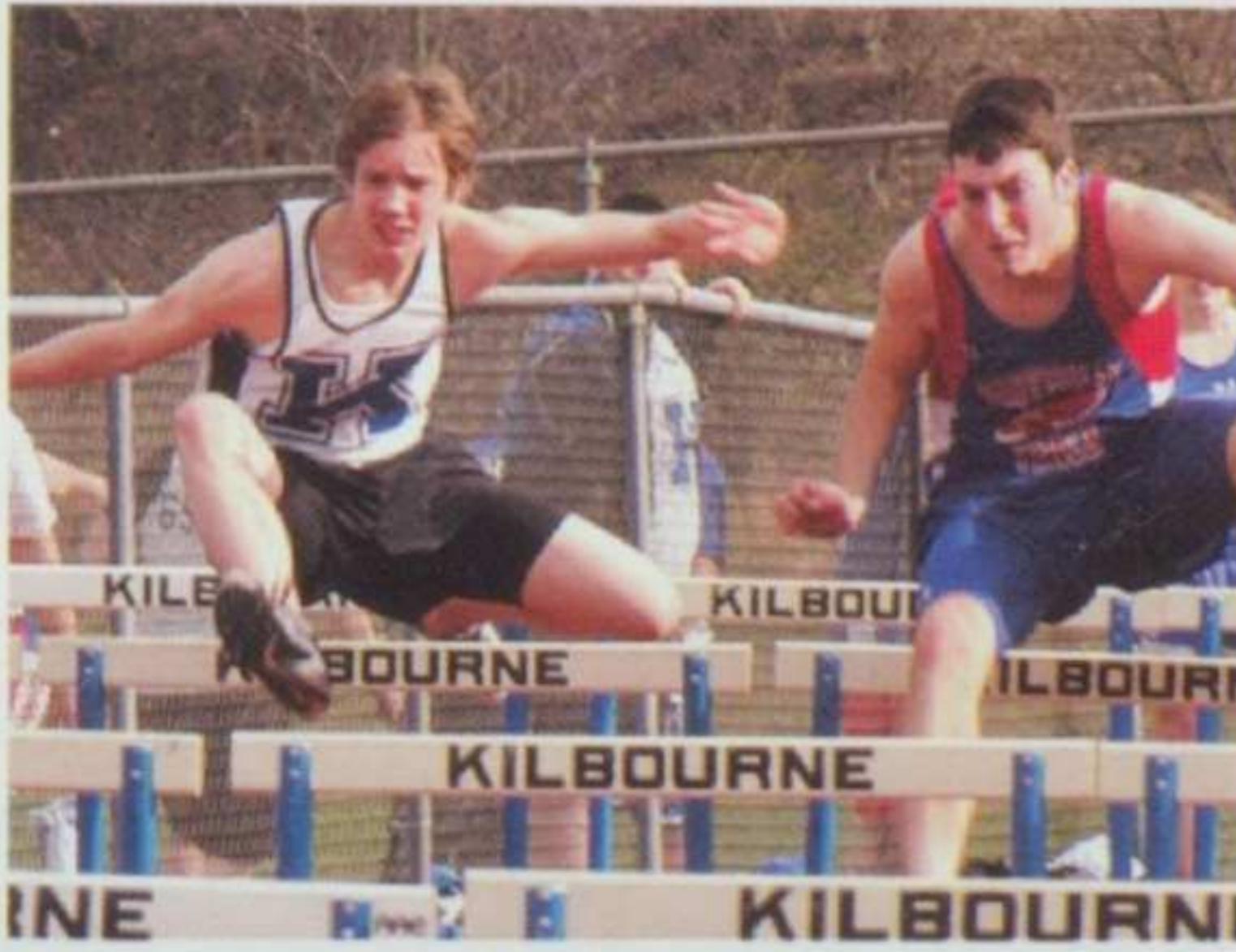

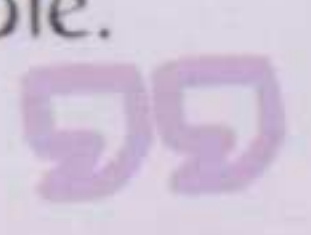

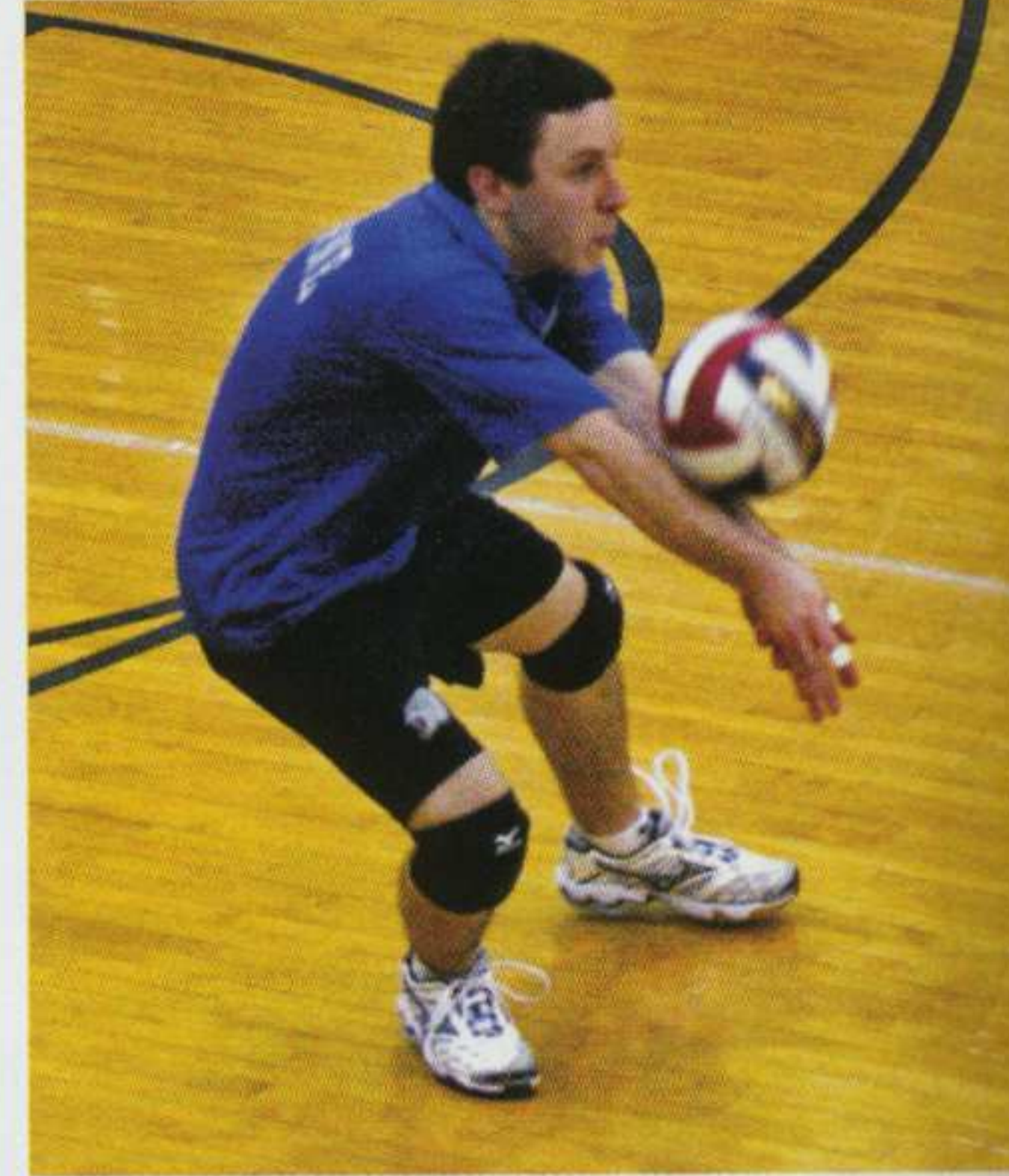
The boys volleyball team set their way to victory!

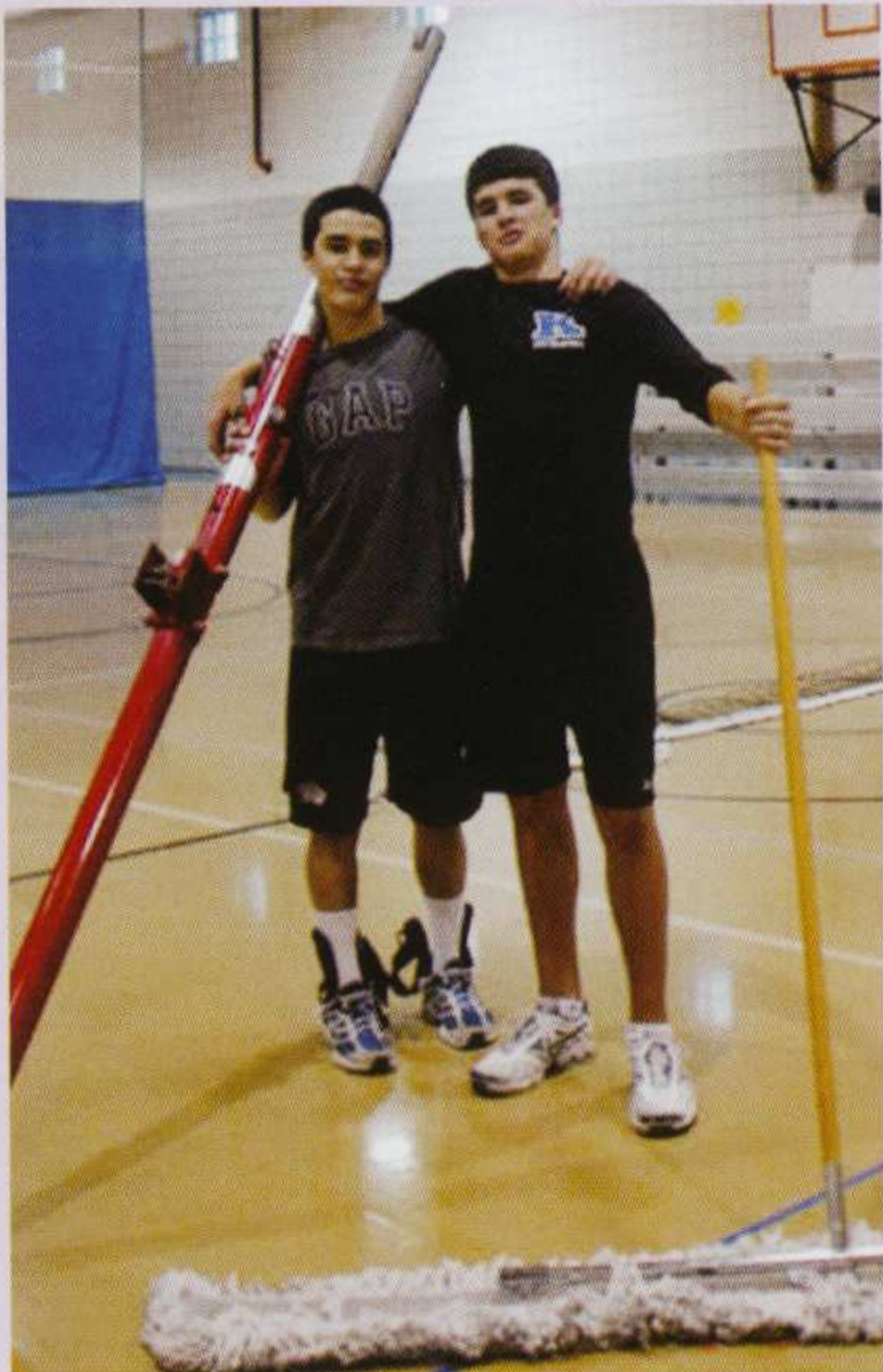

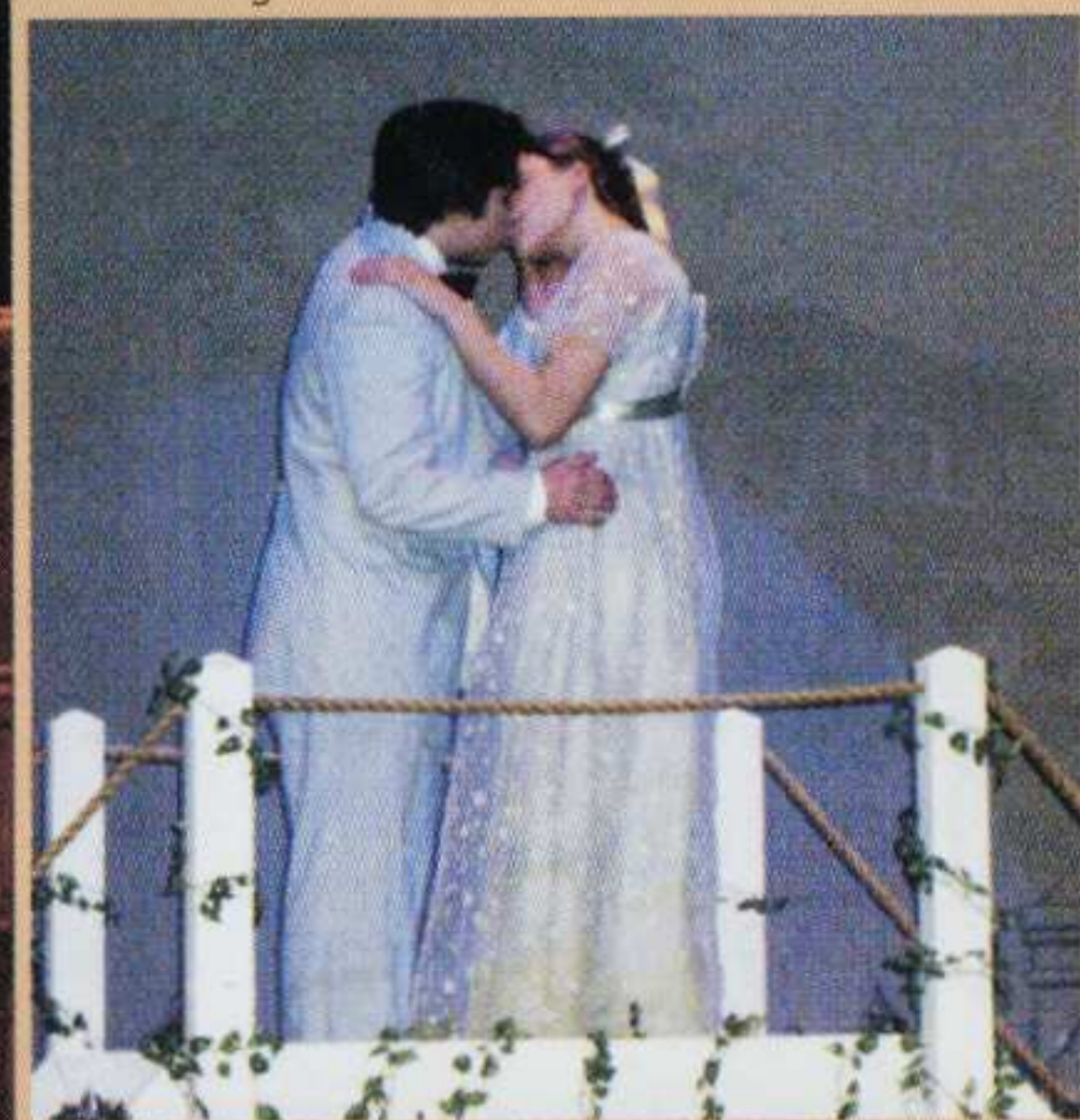

After brainstorming for a way to raise money, they decided upon an idea that would unify the student body. The slogan 'join hands save lives' was more than a literal concept during this fundraiser, students actually joined their hands together. Using colored paper, they cut out thousands of hand shaped pieces to sell for one dollar each. Every cent of the money collected would go to the organization UNICEF for the earthquake relief. After purchasing a 'hand' the student was able to write their name or any other statement they wished. Raising over four hundred dollars, our school was able to help many families oversea, thanks to the numerous students

who donated their money to this event. In the end, all of the completed hands were connected by yarn, and hung around the commons and through the halls so everyone could see how many people joined together to help one another.

Both of these clubs have each held many fundraisers and meetings throughout the year to help out the community. Roots and Shoots created a booth to promote animal awareness, selling cookies, and taking donations that went to the Delaware Animal shelter. They also spent a week raising money for the group Partners in Conservation selling hand crafted items made directly from the hands of Rwandan people. The Global Aid Commission held a benefit concert in March for Save the Children, an organization that helps children in poverty and crisis around the world.

77 and still Protesting

On Wednesday, October 4th, Lutheran Minister Bob Greatz and his wife came to Kilbourne to discuss Civil Rights during 4th and 5th period in the auditorium. Greatz's lifelong dedication to the Civil Rights movement introduced him to activists such as Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King Jr., and made him a main target for persecution in Montgomery, Alabama during the 1950's.

Greatz was a white Minister in a black Lutheran church when Rosa Parks was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on the bus. This December marks the 50th year anniversary of the bus boycott sparked by Parks' strength, which puts back into perspective that the fall of slavery and discrimination is still a relatively new concept to the United States.

"I knew Rosa Parks because she was the youth advisor of the NAACP, which held its meetings in our church," said Greatz.

Of all the segregation going on at the time, the one form that irritated Greatz the most was bus segregation.

"The black people would have to pay their money at the front of the bus, then get off and walk around the bus to get on at the back. The drivers would use horrible language with them, and if the bus got full, the whole row of black people had to get up and stand. This made me so angry because it was usually the black women that were giving up their seats for white men," said Greatz.

"Before Rosa Parks was arrested, there had been many other black people arrested for refusing their seat, but none of them like Rosa Parks. She was a kind lady to everyone she knew, and she was very influential. The day she was arrested, she had finished a hard day's work as a seamstress, got on the bus in the back and two stops later, one white person came on the bus," said Greatz. The bus driver demanded the whole row of seats and 3 of the women got up, but Rosa Parks stayed. The bus driver threatened to beat her and she was arrested even though she wasn't sitting in the wrong area and the law wasn't on the driver's side. Parks's arrest was the final straw-flyers were handed out the next day and the following Monday started the Montgomery, Alabama bus boycott that lasted over a year and sparked the Civil Rights movement. Greatz helped spread the word about the boycott to

his church and gave rides to anyone who needed them.

"Segregation was the rule in the South and practiced in the North," said Greatz. "Black and white people weren't allowed to even be together unless they were in a situation where it was evident that blacks were inferior. In the North, there weren't laws against blacks, but practices ensured the same result".

It's a common misconception that things were much happier for slaves in the North at this time, but according to Greatz, there was equal, if not more segregation in the North than the South. In the 1950's, Columbus, Ohio was the 2nd most segregated city in the United States, and Chicago, Illinois was the 1st.

"All over the United States, black people weren't allowed to go to the front door of a restaurant if they wanted to go out to eat. They'd have to get their food at the back door where the trash is taken out and find a tree to sit under and have their meal," said Greatz. "If they wanted to go to the theater or see a show, they would only allow the black people balcony seats, or seats off to the side where they couldn't see what was going on," said Greatz.

"During those times, in both the North and the South, black people were dehumanized and put in a 2nd class relationship to whites," said Greatz.

77 year old Greatz became actively involved in the Civil Rights movement during the fall of 1948, when he wrote a term paper on the discrimination against Jewish people in America. During the course of his research Greatz stumbled across information on a group that was even more widely discriminated against than the jews- the black people in the United States. "My life from then until now has been dedicated to the Civil Rights movement," said Greatz. Greatz is currently working on the AIDS Revolution Project, an operation trying to resolve issues dealing with homosexual discrimination. He has 26 multicultural/multiracial grandchildren and is currently working on his second book, A White Preacher's Message of Race and Relations.

Although Rosa Parks is now 92 and suffering from severe Dimensia she is still alive in Detroit, Michigan and has The Rosa Parks Museum in Montgomery, Alabama and friends like Greatz to keep her inspiring memories alive.

The Case of the Disappearing Funds

In 2000, school levies passed at a rate of 70%, but according to data compiled by the Ohio School Boards Association, passing rates have declined to just 35% in the past year. With the failure of the third levy request in five years, Worthington joined the growing ranks of districts struggling to pay the bills. While some levy opponents argued the school board must be more responsible with its finances rather than rely on higher taxes to repay deficits, the state legislature is also to blame for schools receiving less money because of a bizarre and complicated system called "phantom revenue."

Educate Worthington, a website established by two community members, Mike Alfred and John Herrington, posted information to support their opposition to repeated levy requests. They sought to convince voters of the need to stop the cycle of increased spending and higher property taxes. The site focused on the numbers, mainly those referring to the problem of declining enrollment of 1,200 total students since 1995, growing teacher salaries, and increased spending per pupil. While two board members came to Educate Worthington meetings to investigate some of the claims, the organization did not examine the root of the problem: state funding.

In reality, schools are not necessarily spending more on students. They are receiving less from the state so levies are necessary to maintain services, not add them. As inflation continues, the same amount of funding cannot buy the same amount of supplies, or adequately pay teachers. To compensate for the loss of funds, even the most fiscally-responsible districts are forced to ask voters for a tax increase. The finger should be pointed at the state because of a state law passed in 1976, House Bill 920. At the height of the inflation crisis, when the yearly rate was 23%, the Ohio House of Representatives passed a law to prevent school funding from increasing too rapidly.

Now that the inflation rate has scaled back down to a healthy 1-2%, HB 920 is actually harming Ohio school districts by limiting growth of funds in proportion to inflation. State funding to schools has decreased because HB 920 prevents taxes from growing at the same rate as the value of one's house.

State funding for schools derives from the difference between two equations, shown in the box at the right. In the first equation, \$5,186

refers to the determined cost of educating a child. The .023 assumes that the school district receives 23 mills of revenue from property taxes. One mill is 1/1000 of the assessed value of a house which is only 35% of its market value. For example, one mill on a \$100,000 market-value house would be 1/1000 of \$35,000 (35% of the market value), or \$35.

"The state has determined the cost of educating a child (\$5180), but because Worthington has higher total property values than Delaware, for example, the homeowners are expected to pay more for education. The state may only pay for 26% of Worthington's cost while Delaware would get 51% of that cost," said Assistant Principal Vicki Hartley.

Every 3 years, the state reevaluates assessed home values of the district, but the problem arises because the state assumes the home owners will pass levies. If the value of homes has increased, the state continues to defer the burden of funding schools to the homeowners. The state's financial help is unrelated to whether or not levies are passed in the district. Property values have to decrease for the state to pay more of the bill.

Although the Ohio Supreme Court has deemed schools funding is "inequitable," the problem persists.

"New officials have to be educated about the problem, and even when they design new plans to fund the schools, Worthington is hurt by its classification as a wealthy school," said Hartley.

"A consortium of schools has tried to change the school funding laws, which the courts have considered 'inequitable.' [The process is slow] because when new officials are reelected, they have to be educated about the problems. And even under the new plans to fund schools, Worthington still loses money because that money goes to poorer districts," said Hartley.

Worthington spending is not to blame for repeated levy requests. Rather, the blame falls on a convoluted, unstable system of school funding set up to transfer responsibility from the state to property owners.

Although citizens of districts should hold their schools to a standard of fiscal responsibility, blaming funding shortfalls on district overspending or teacher salaries is unfair and incorrect.

Upon the retirement of old Superintendent Rick Fenton, Worthington school district selected a new superintendent to carry on the tradition of success. On January 1, Melissa Conrath officially became the Superintendent of Worthington Schools.

Conrath is no stranger to educational leadership. A graduate of the Ohio State University, she acted as the Superintendent of the Big Walnut school district for the last ten years and has also held several central office positions relating to curriculum. At the beginning of her teaching career, Conrath taught high school biology and physics and also coached volleyball, basketball, and track. Conrath says that she decided to pursue a career in education in college. "I've always enjoyed working with people. Even as a kid in high school, I spent summers as a camp counselor at a horse riding camp and taught horseriding...I decided that I would enjoy going into the field of education because I could help children develop their understanding of the world," said Conrath.

Selecting Conrath as Superintendent, however, required an involved process. When Fenton announced his retirement, Worthington Schools hired a consulting firm called the Ohio School Board Association to conduct a search for Superintendent candidates. Those interested submitted an application, resume, cover letter, several letters of recommendation, and their college transcript. About forty applied and of

those, seven moved on to the interview process. Following interviews, two candidates (including Conrath) spent a day at the board office meeting with communications staff, administrators, and other officials. They also participated in an open community forum to talk about their plans for the district. "It was an exhausting day," said Conrath. "But it gave the candidates the opportunity to learn about the school district and see if it was a good match for us."

Evidently, Worthington Schools proved to be a good match for Conrath, who described the district as "exemplary" and "one of the top districts in Ohio, if not the country." Her plan for her first few months as Superintendent is to establish relationships with members of the communications staff in order to gain a good sense of what is going on in the district. Also, in addition to retaining the district's strengths, she wants to challenge the district to strive toward a vision of an even more exemplary school district. "Many people have their own ideas of what an exemplary school district is, so we will collectively work together," said Conrath.

In her goal of taking Worthington Schools to new levels of excellence, she also welcomes student input. "If I'm in the building, I would welcome anyone to introduce themselves to me. I would also like to hear from student representatives on reasons why they feel this is a good school district, as well as suggestions for improvement."

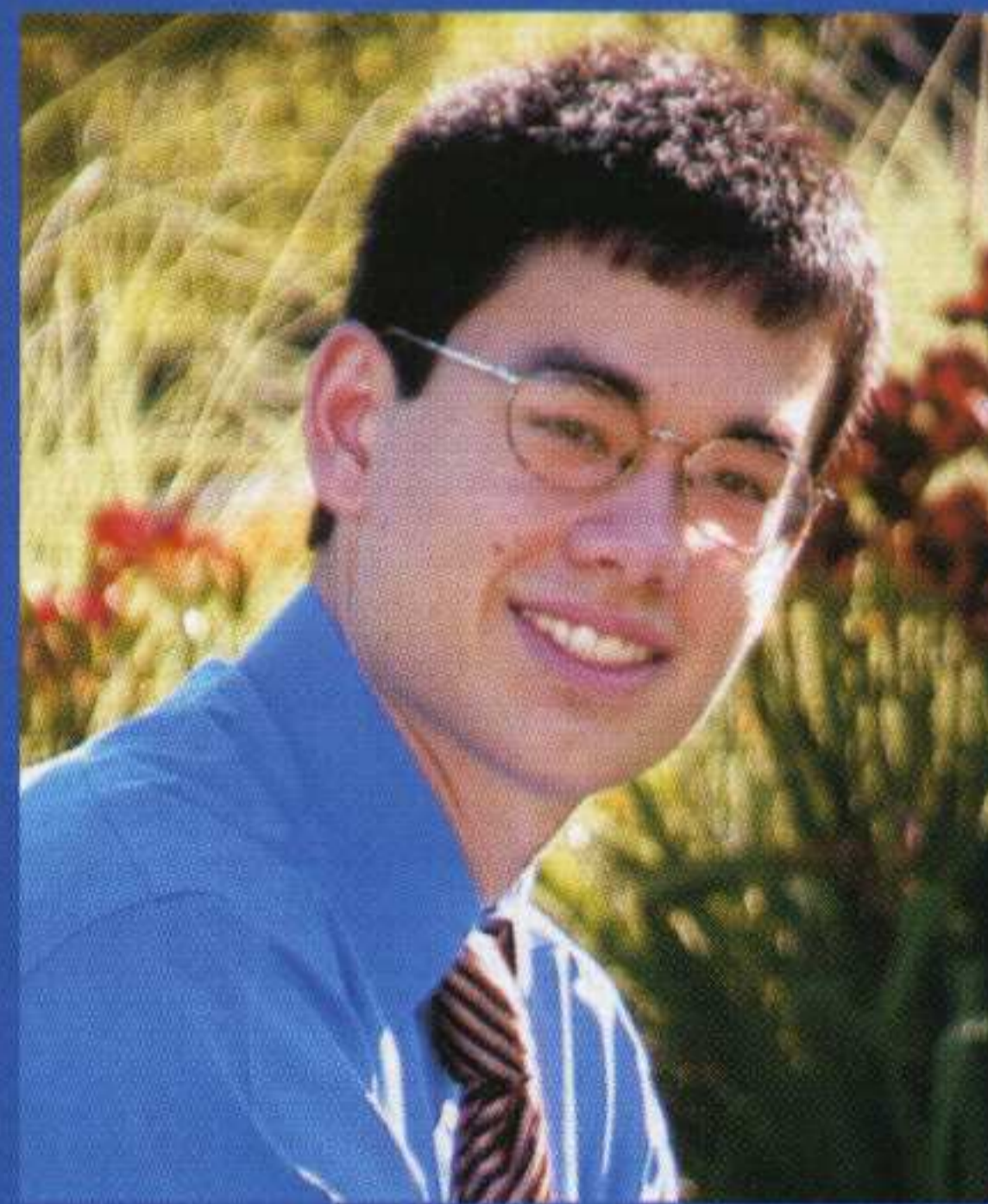
Students from Kilbourne and Thomas earned high honors in the Ohio Science Olympiad Tournament on April 29th at Ohio State University.

A Day of Silence comes to WKHS

Worthington Kilbourne High School students and many members of the Gay Straight Alliance took part in The Day of Silence on April 26th, 2006, as part of a project of The Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network (GLSEN). Students lead the nationally recognized day in which those who support making anti-LGBT bullying and harassment unacceptable in schools remain silent for an entire day. The silent protest recognizes the prejudice and harassment many lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students experience.

"The overall turnout was great," said Gabz Ciofani one of the students who coordinated the event. "We had many supporters who weren't in the club and everything went smoothly. To my knowledge, no one caused any disturbances and everyone got the message across peacefully."

The Day of Silence started in 1996 at the University of Virginia, where over 150 students participated. In 1997 many organizers took the event to a national level where approximately 100 universities participated. In 2001, GLSEN became the official organizational sponsor of the national event.

WKHS students, many of whom are members of the GSA, sold over sixty t-shirts (\$5.00 a piece) that stated "What will you do to stop the silence?" with the date "4-26-06" on the back.
