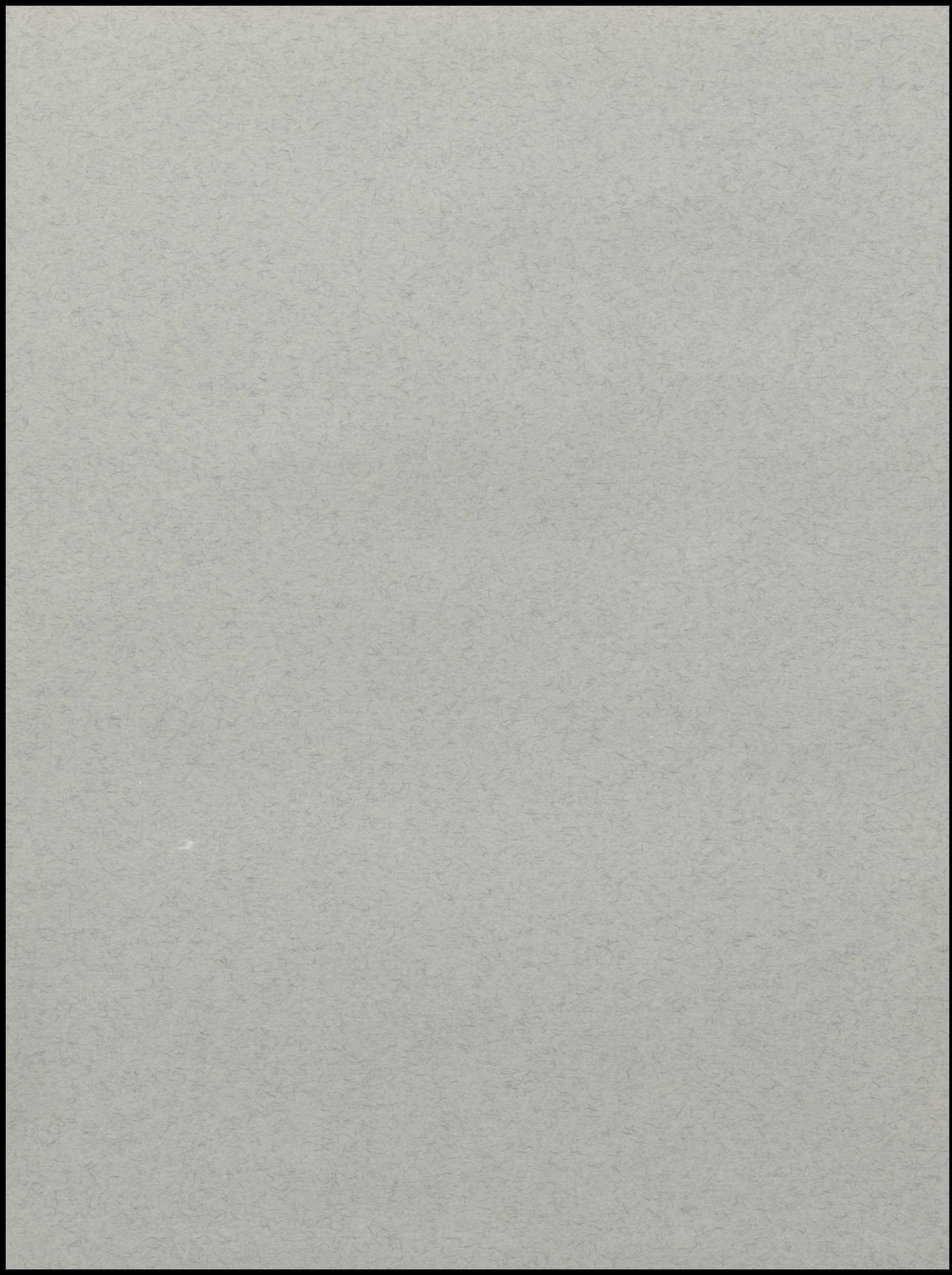

# Block Scheduling

## A Time to Excel

Confusion fills the halls of Worthington Kilbourne as the students ask the typical question, "Is today an A day or a B day?" Everyone, students and faculty alike, have a variety of opinions about the new experiences of block scheduling and options. Senior John Bullard says, "Although block scheduling does give students two days to complete assignments, it can make you bored and disinterested in what you're learning." On the other hand, junior Amy Marsh likes block classes because "I think 100 minutes of one topic makes it a lot easier to comprehend."

Kilbourne is using the seven hour school day in a unique way. We are different from any other school in central Ohio because we are trying to combine a schedule that has both blocked and single classes. Assistant principal Mr. Johnson feels that this type of schedule "gives the older students the opportunity to manage their time well while still taking the same number of classes. The schedule also lets teachers build better relationships with their students because they spend

more time together." Faculty member Mr. Strohl explains, "I like block scheduling because I don't have to rush through labs, and the students have time to understand the concepts. It's like having a personal tutor for free."

Kilbourne has also given the upperclassmen more responsibility this year through options in place of study halls. The students have their choice of coming in late, leaving early, or socializing with their friends in the commons during the time they would normally be sitting in study hall with the underclassmen. The new options system also gives the students more opportunities to take advantage of the upperclassmen work room located in old academic prep room. Students can also seek one-on-one help from teachers, or they can spend their time studying in the library. If upperclassmen don't make the grade, they are assigned to study hall. Junior Sara Potter feels, "Options are a great way to give freedom to upperclassmen and also teach responsibility."

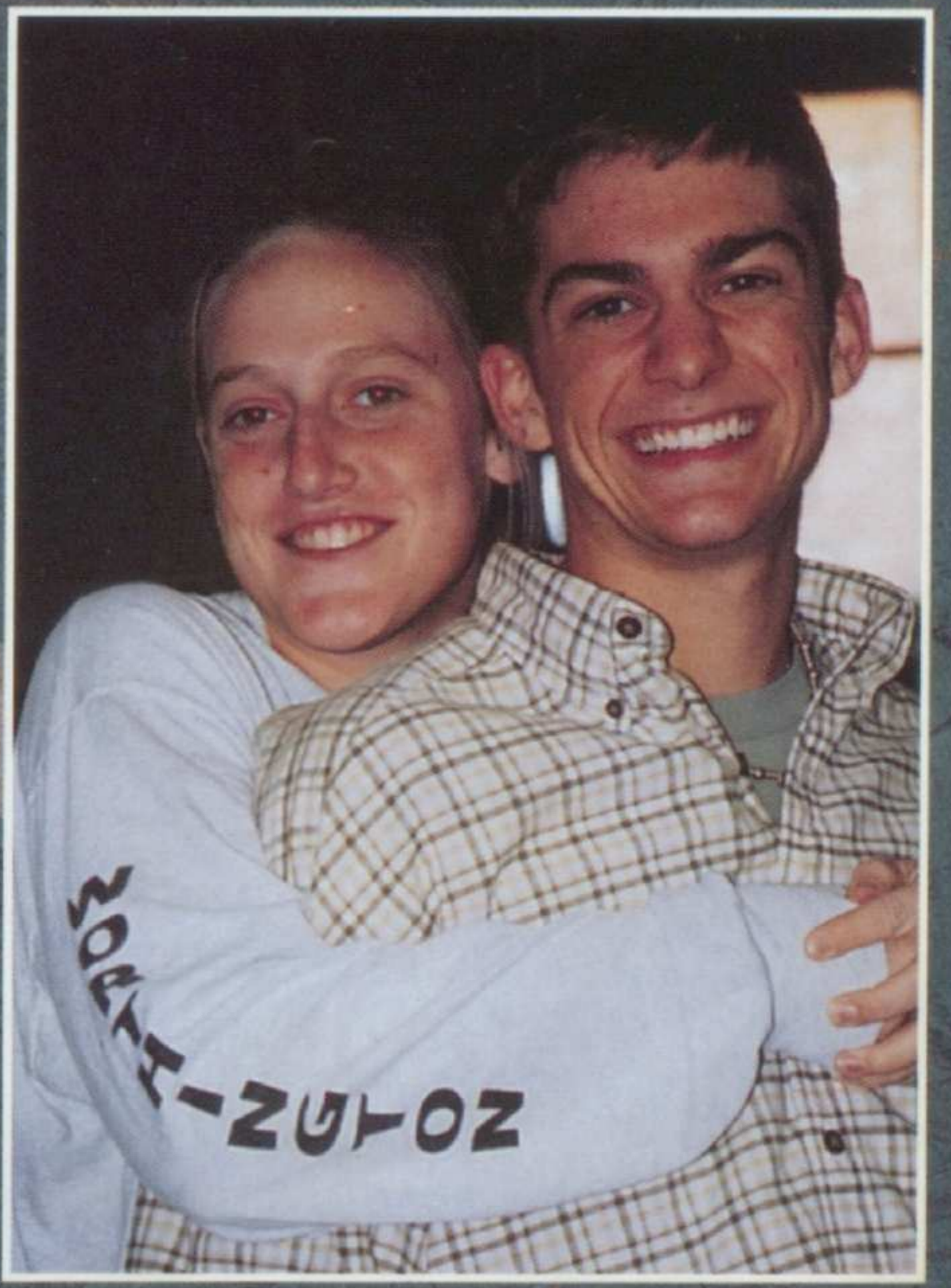

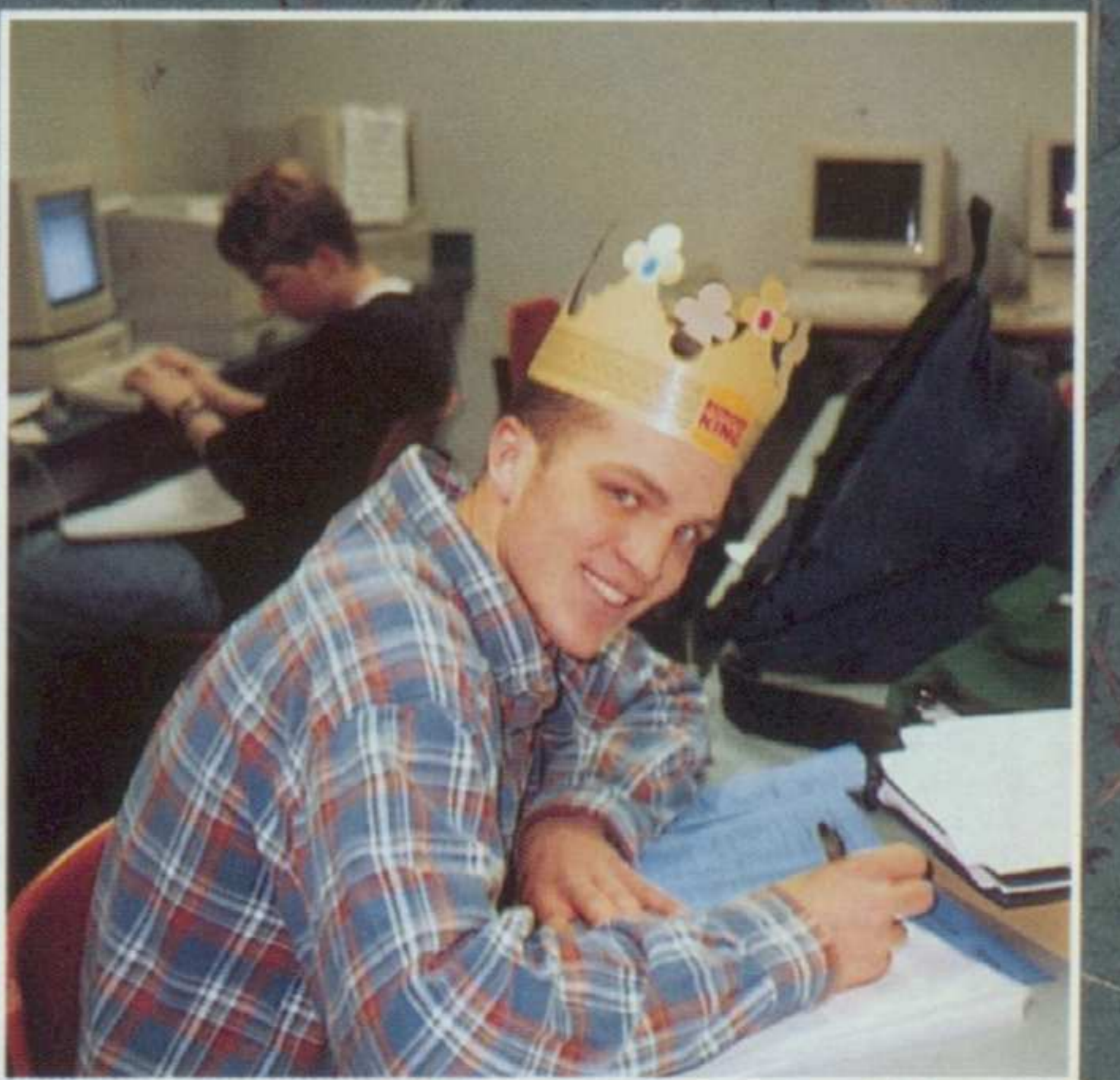

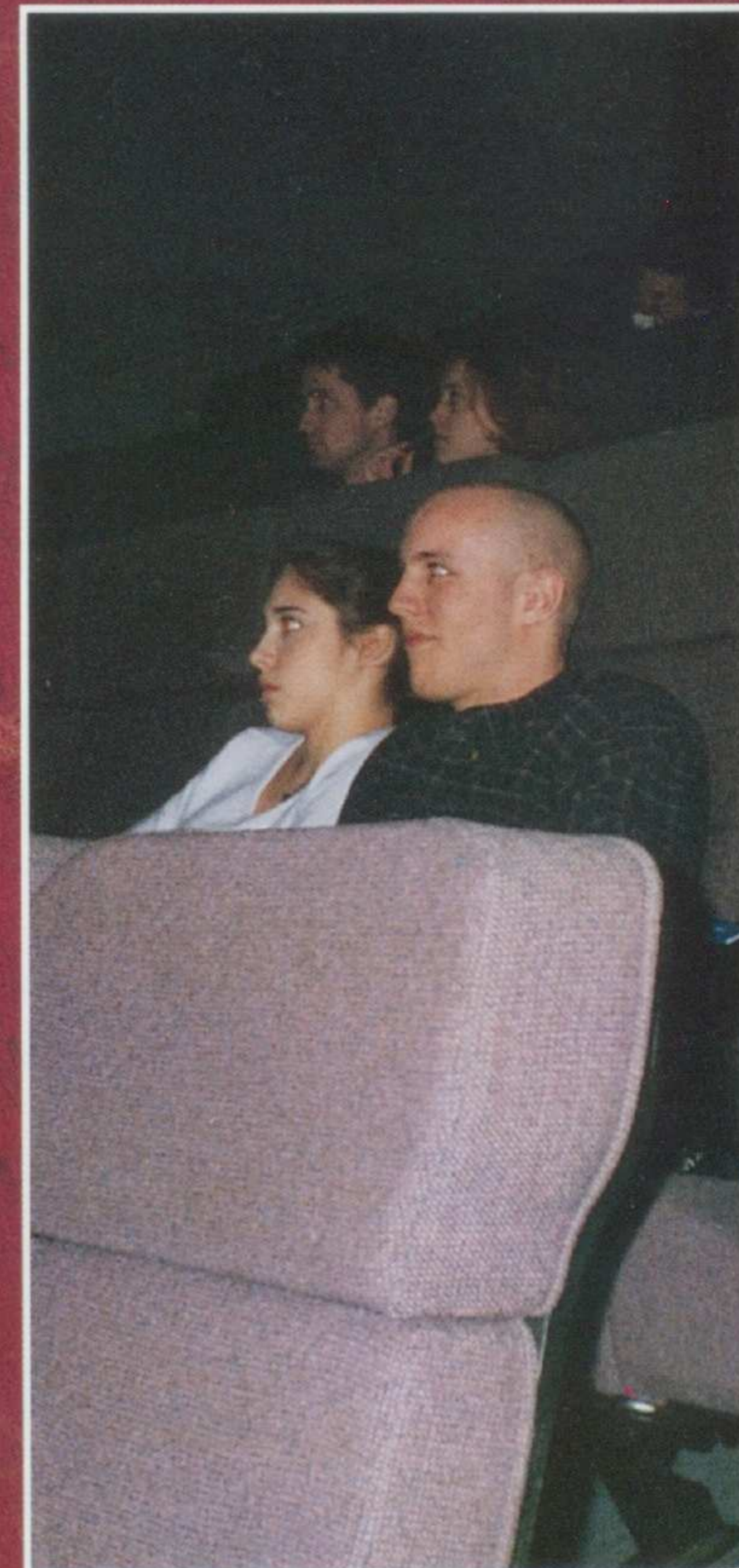

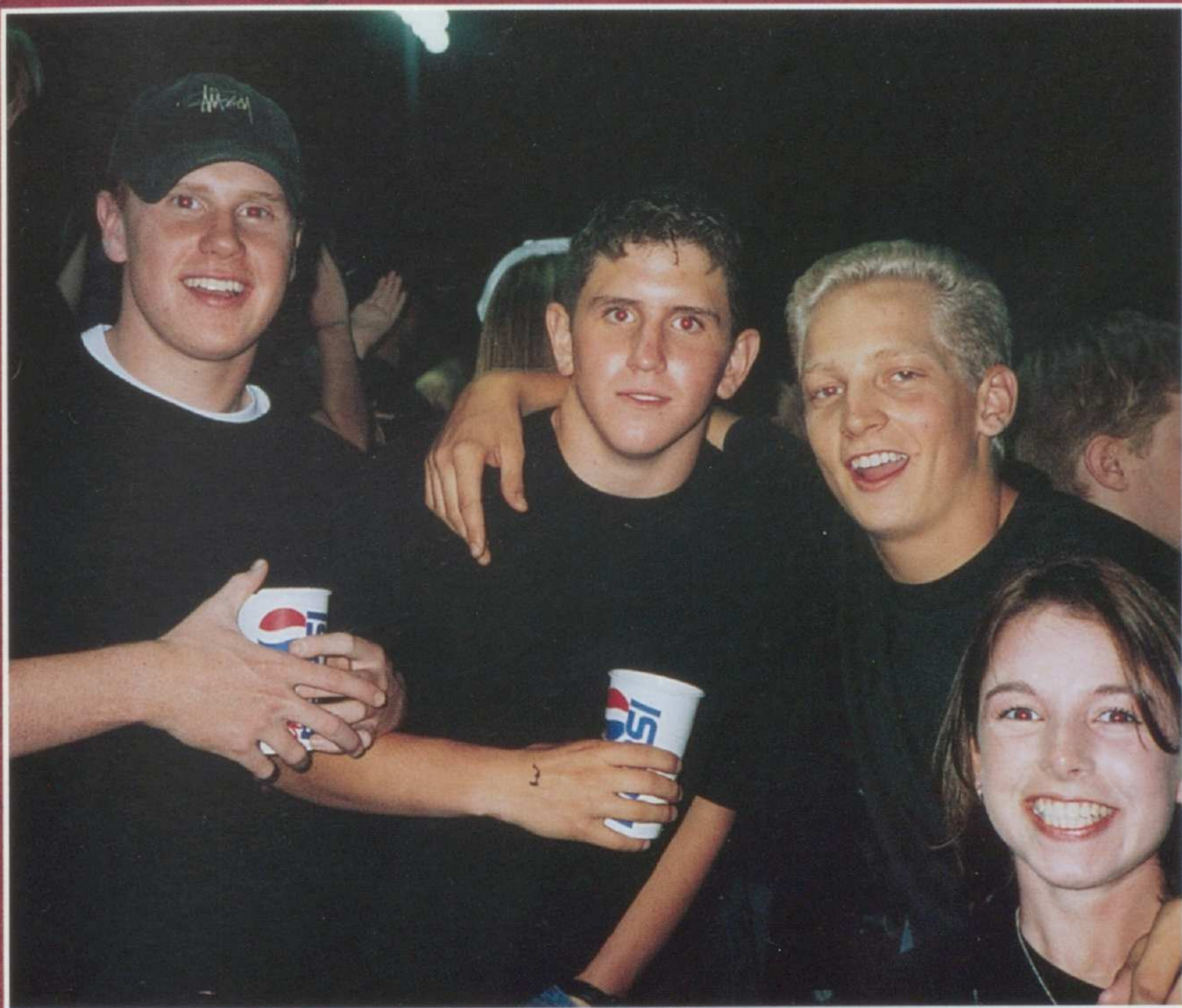

## A Time To Show Our Pride & Spirit

Our deep-rooted traditions come alive with the beginning of every school year. Some have existed for several years, and others have just started. However old they are, our traditions are rich and will stay with us for a lifetime. They occur even before the first day of school with Freshman Day. As the school year continues, we experience standing at football games, participating in homecoming spirit week, competing in the Scioto vs. Kilbourne canned food drive, fundraising for the King & Queen of Hearts, dancing at Prom, creating for Arts-in-Action, and, of course, designing our senior shirts and painting the Rock.

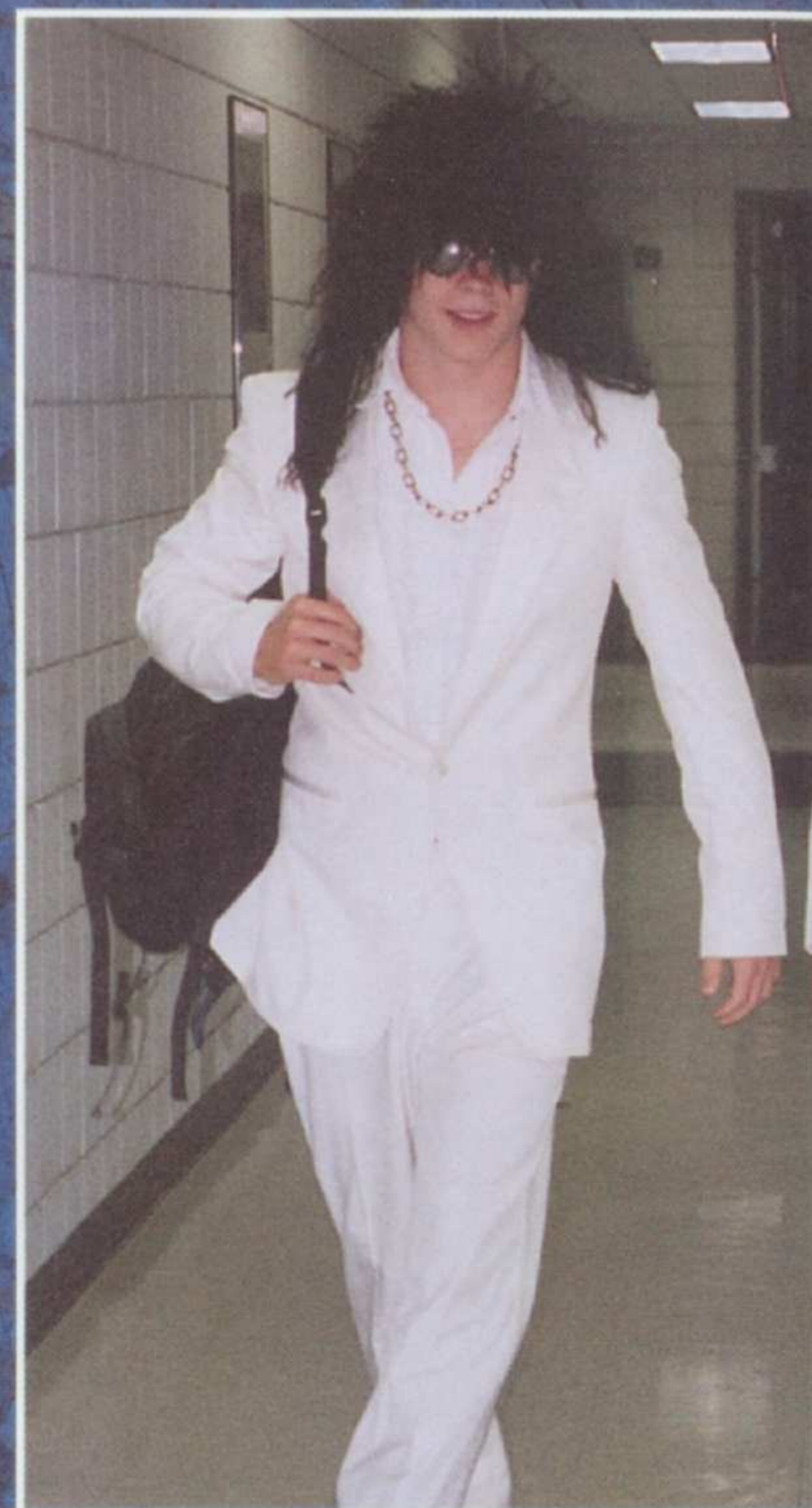
These traditions affect us all in some way. As our school grows up, we value them more and more. Traditions are there not only to create a history and background for Kilbourne but memories as well.

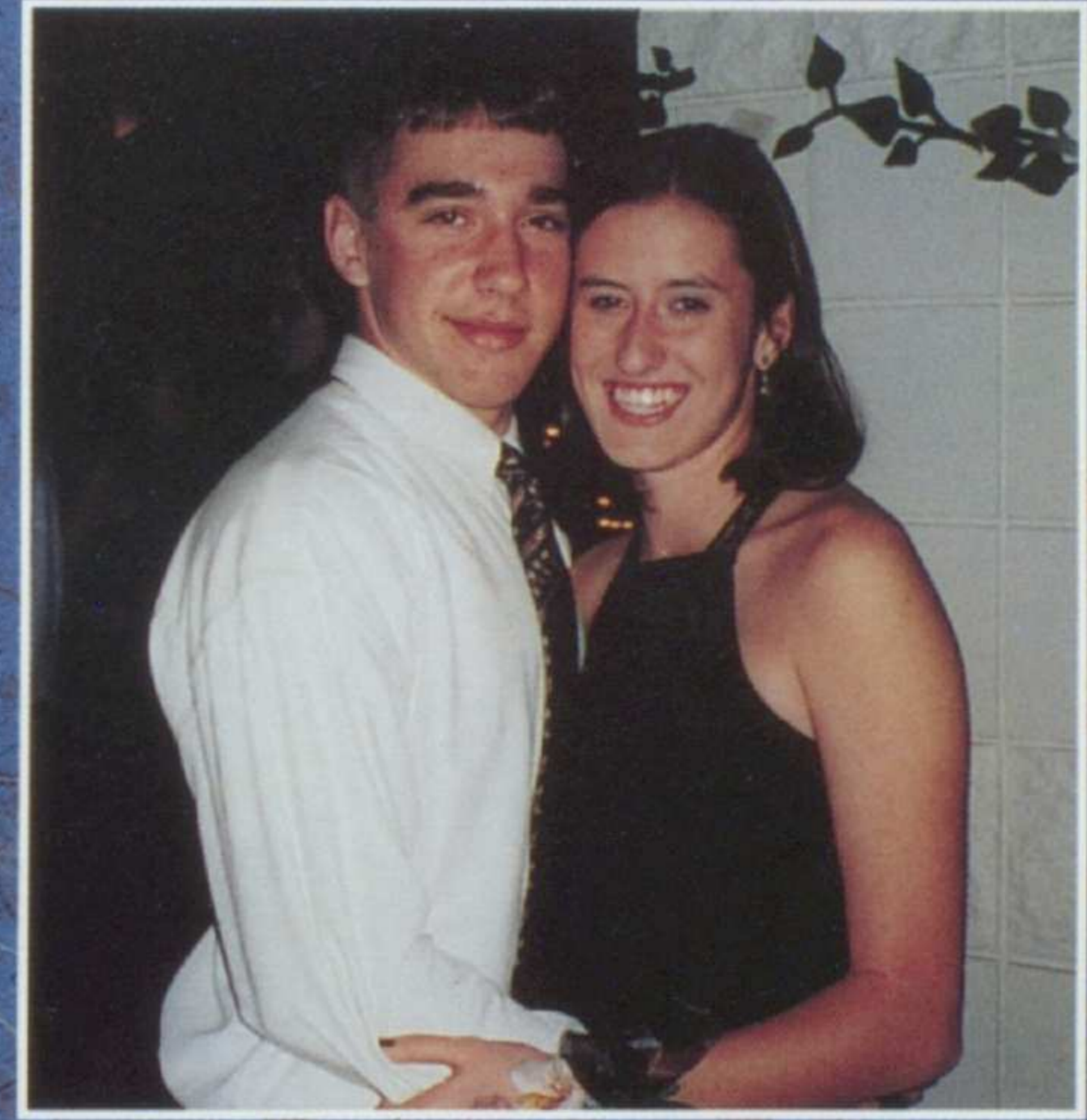

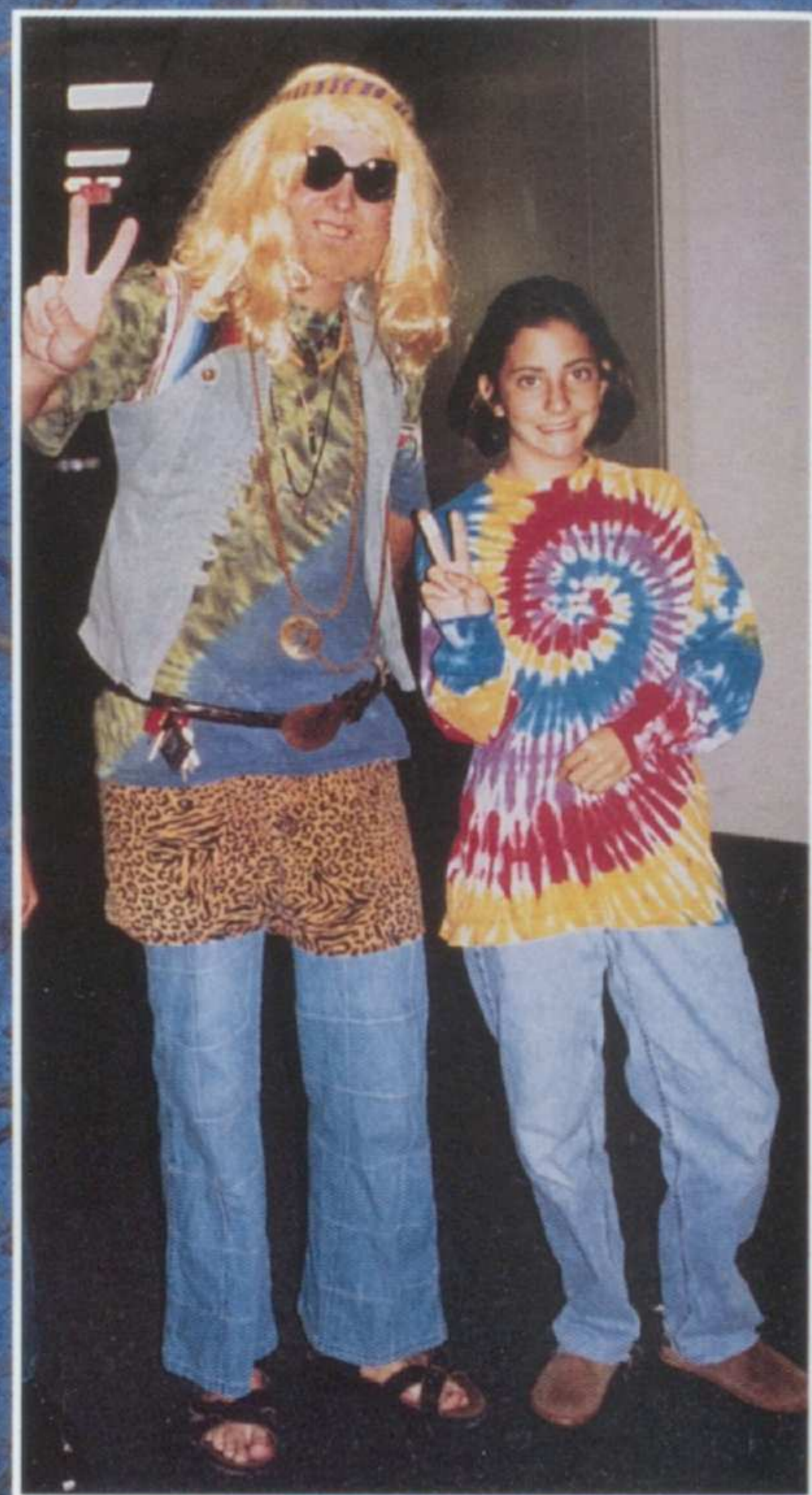

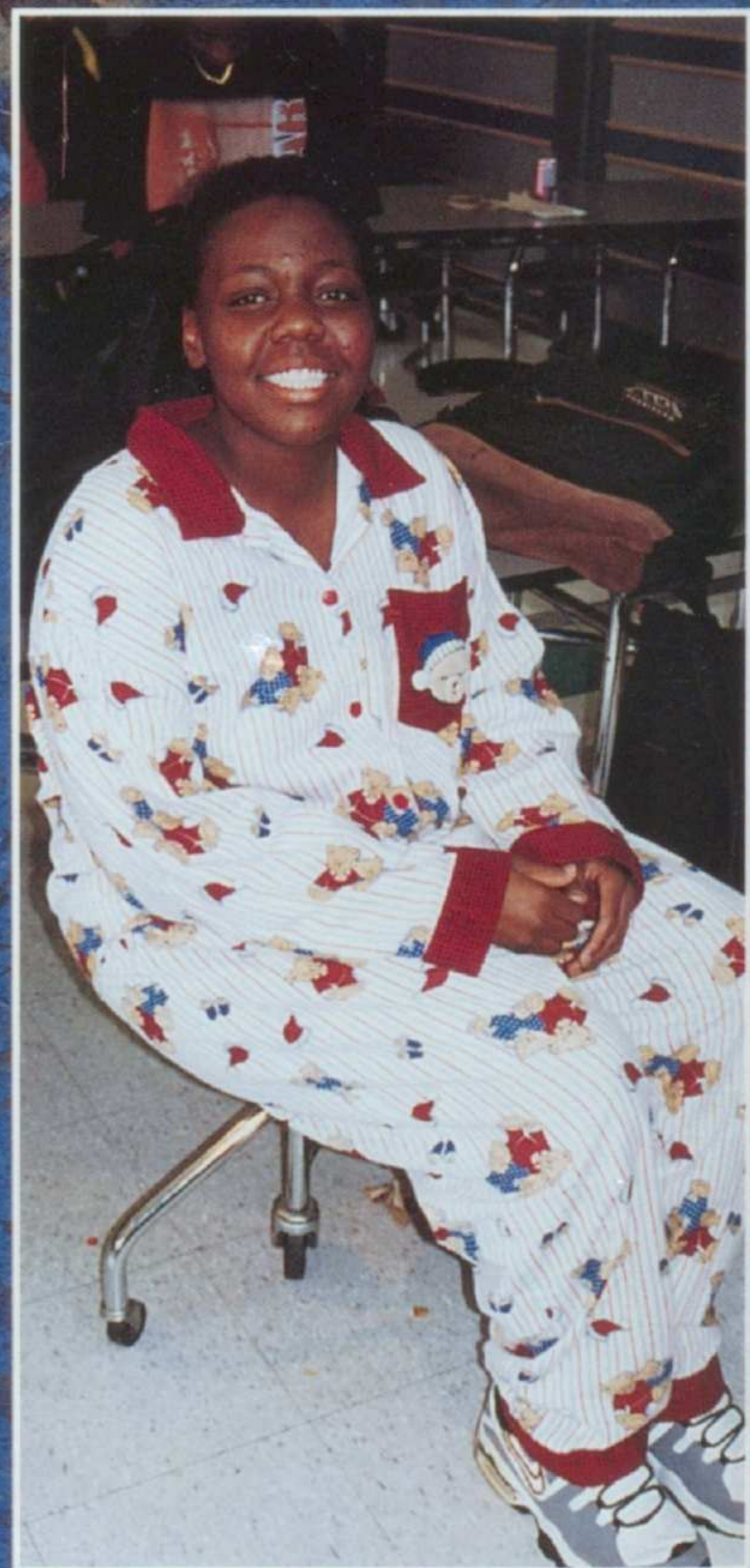

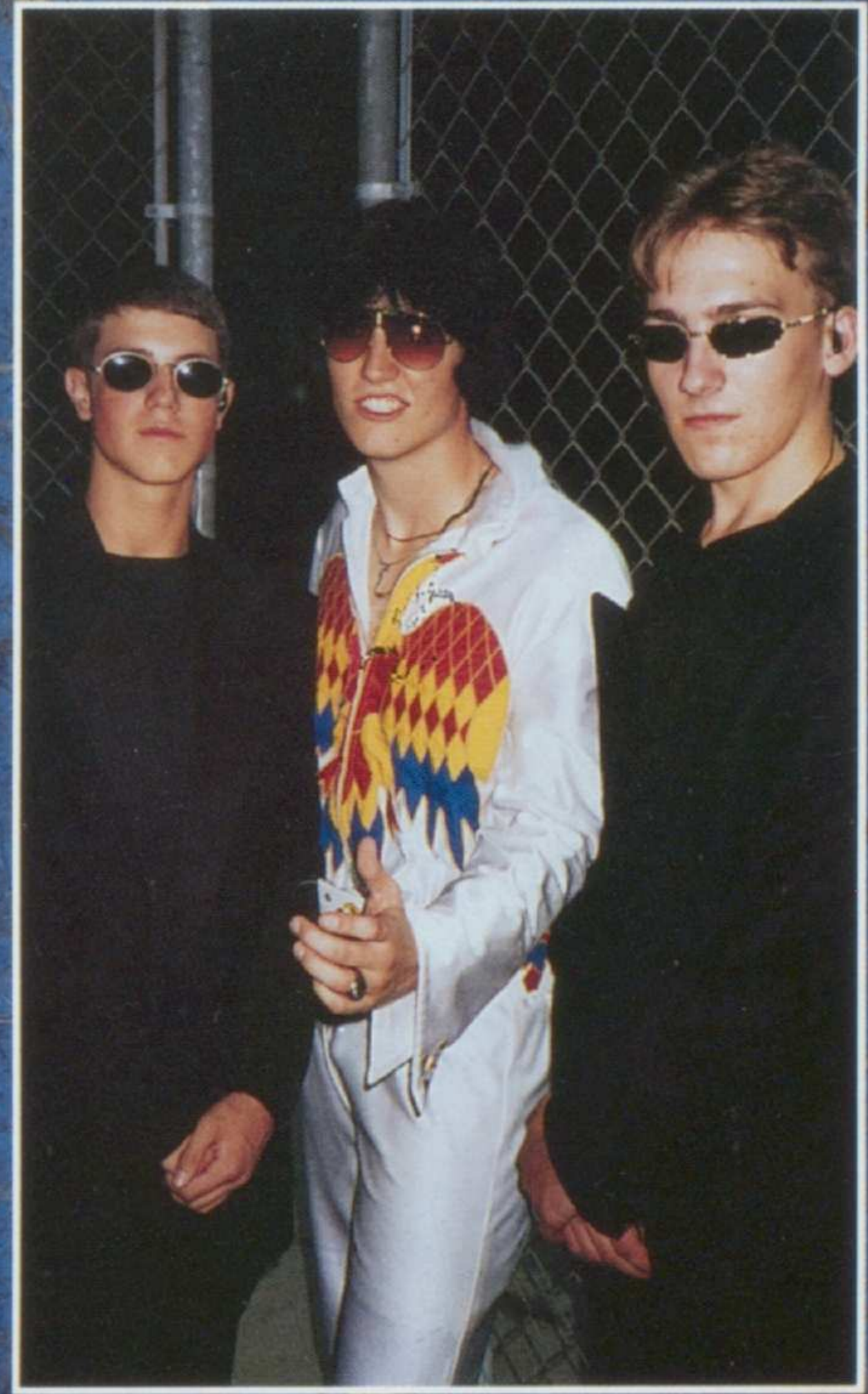

## A Time To Get Acquainted

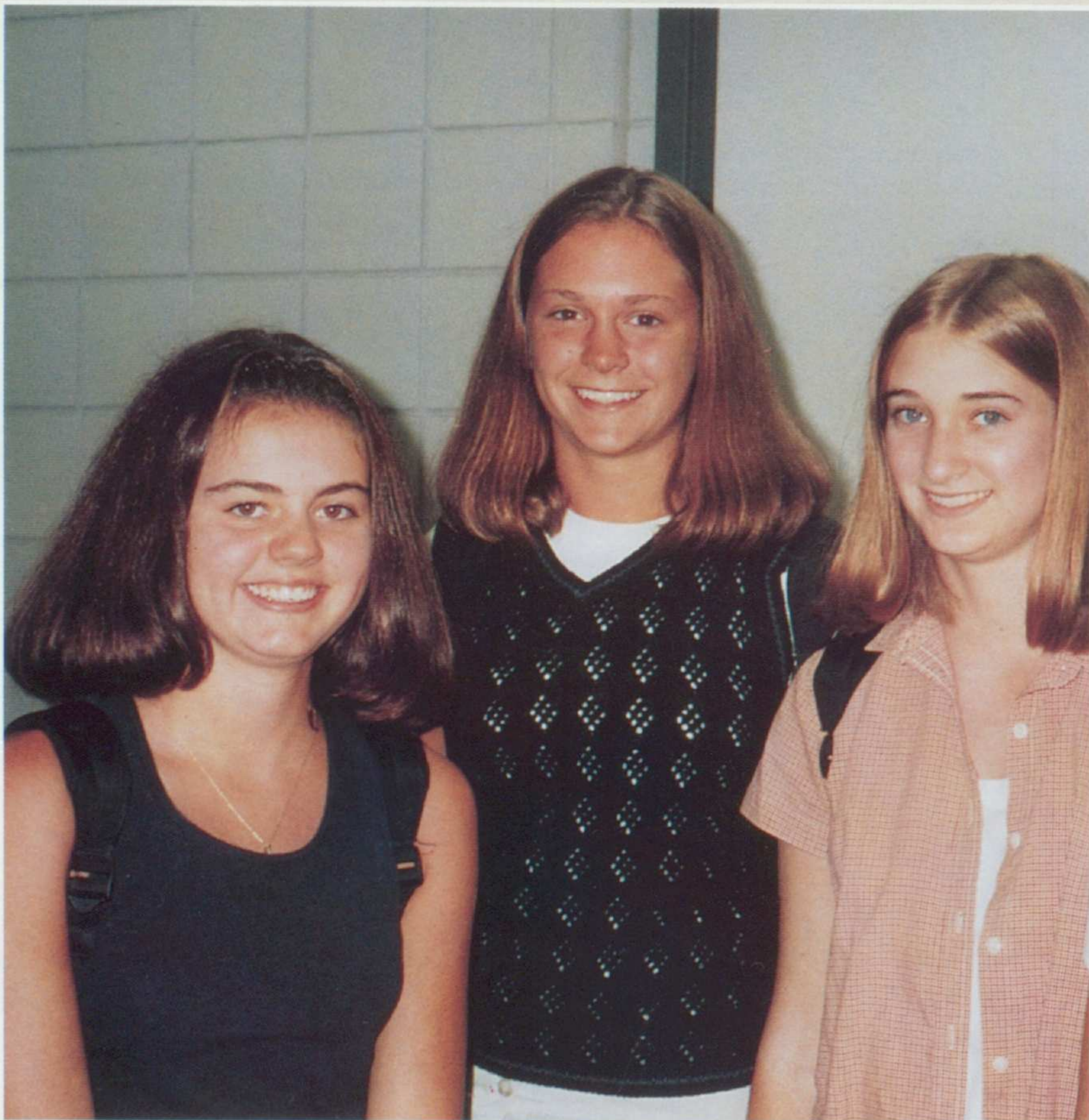

Sweeney suggested, "Even though it was a good experience, I could have managed just fine without it."

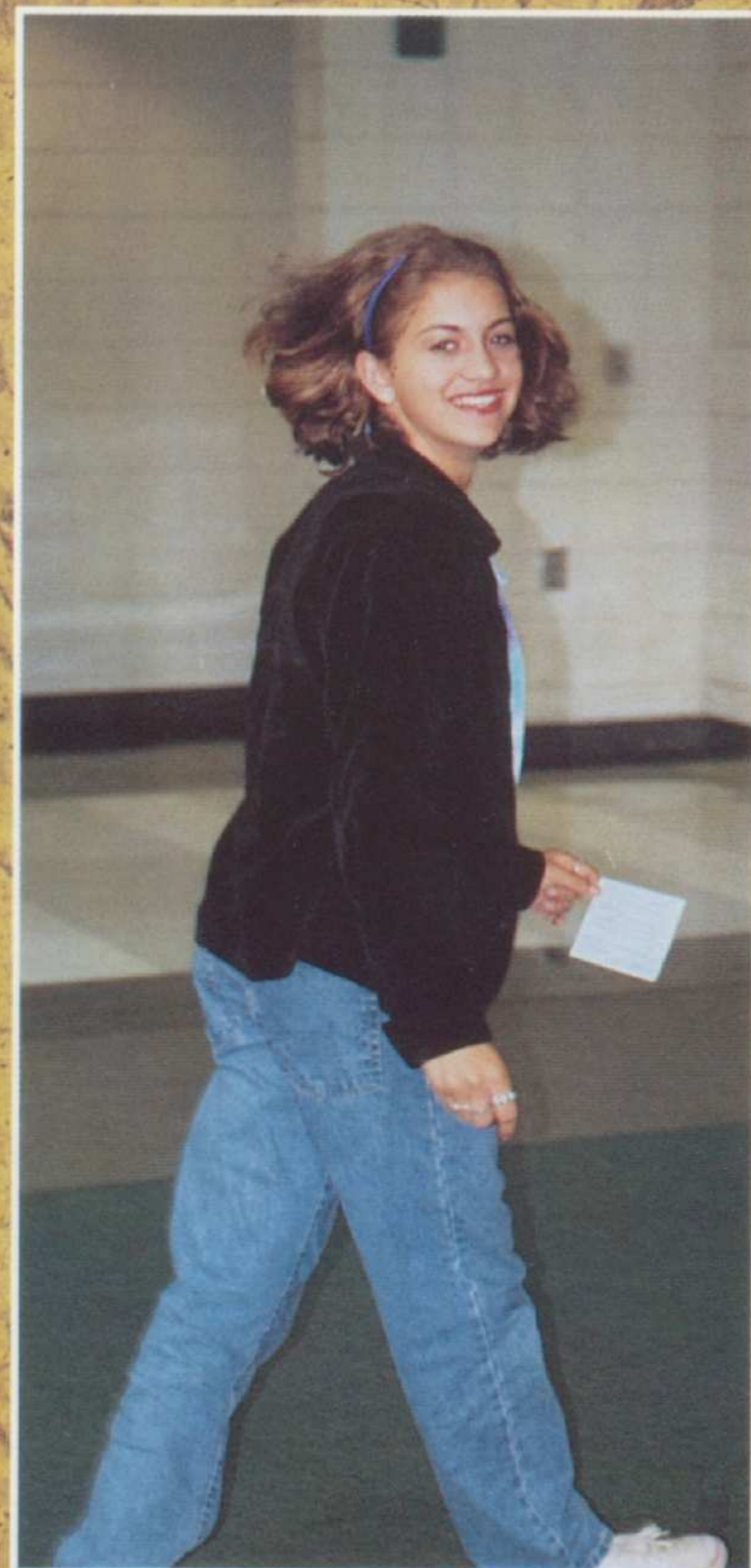
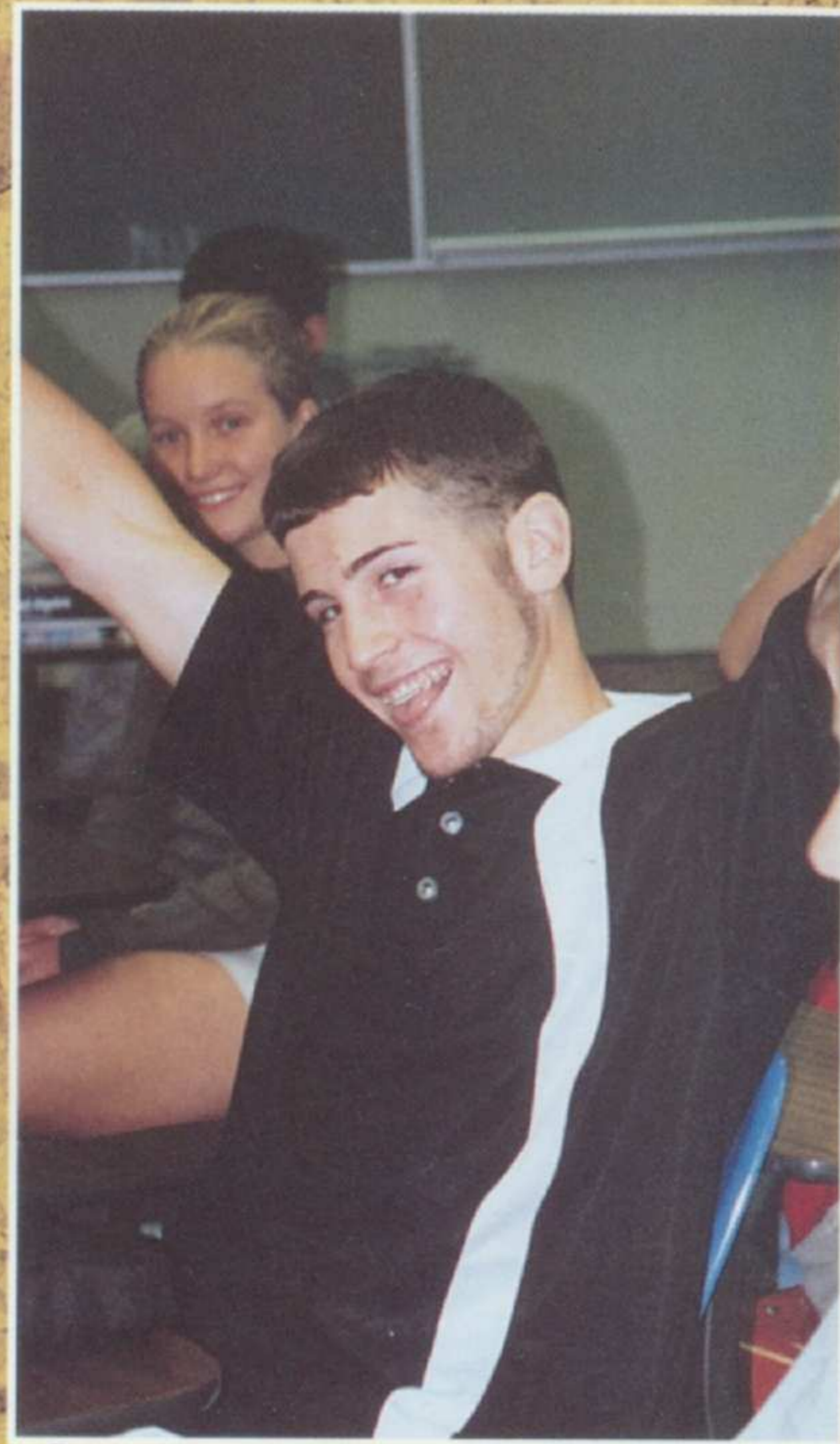

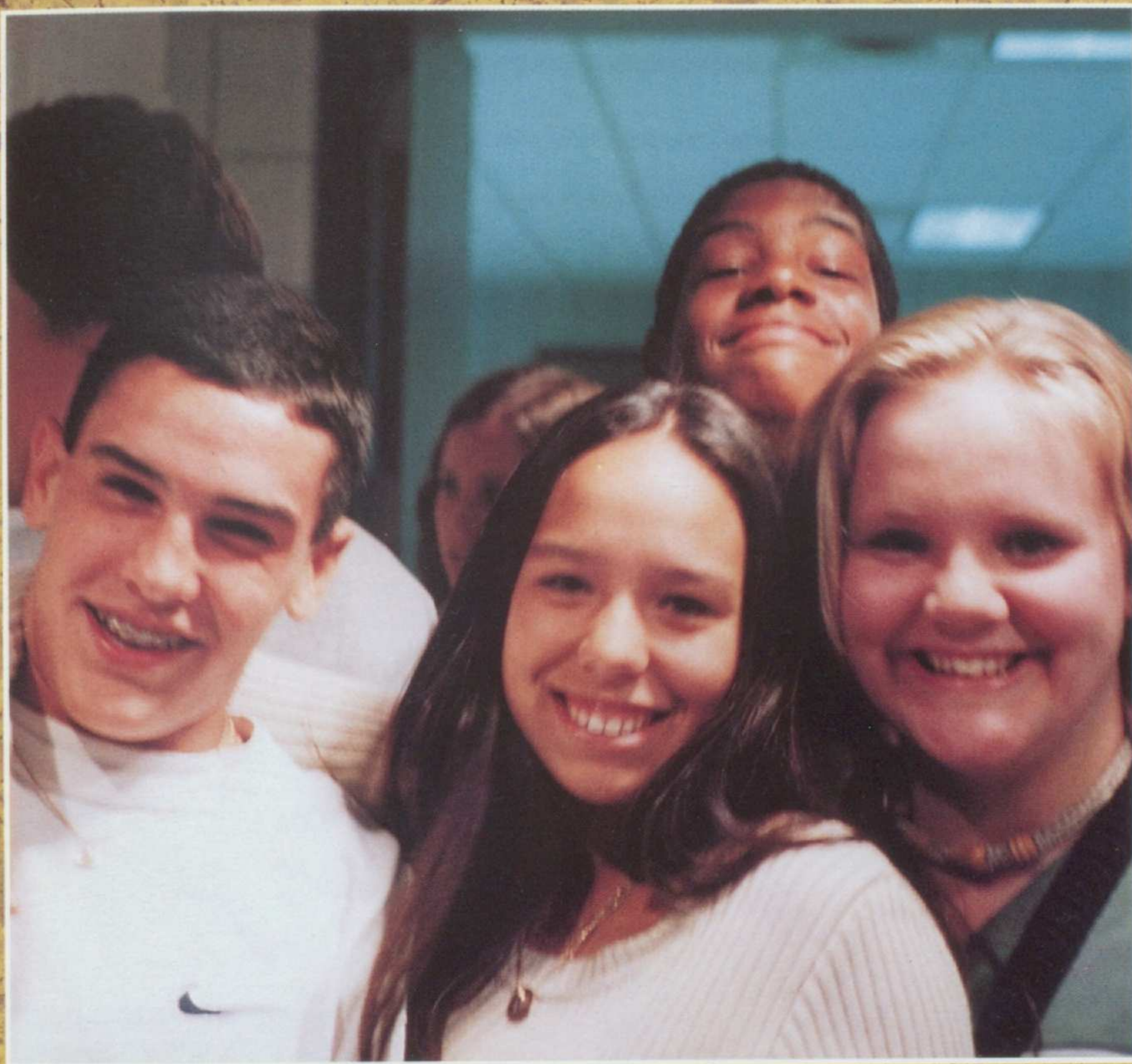

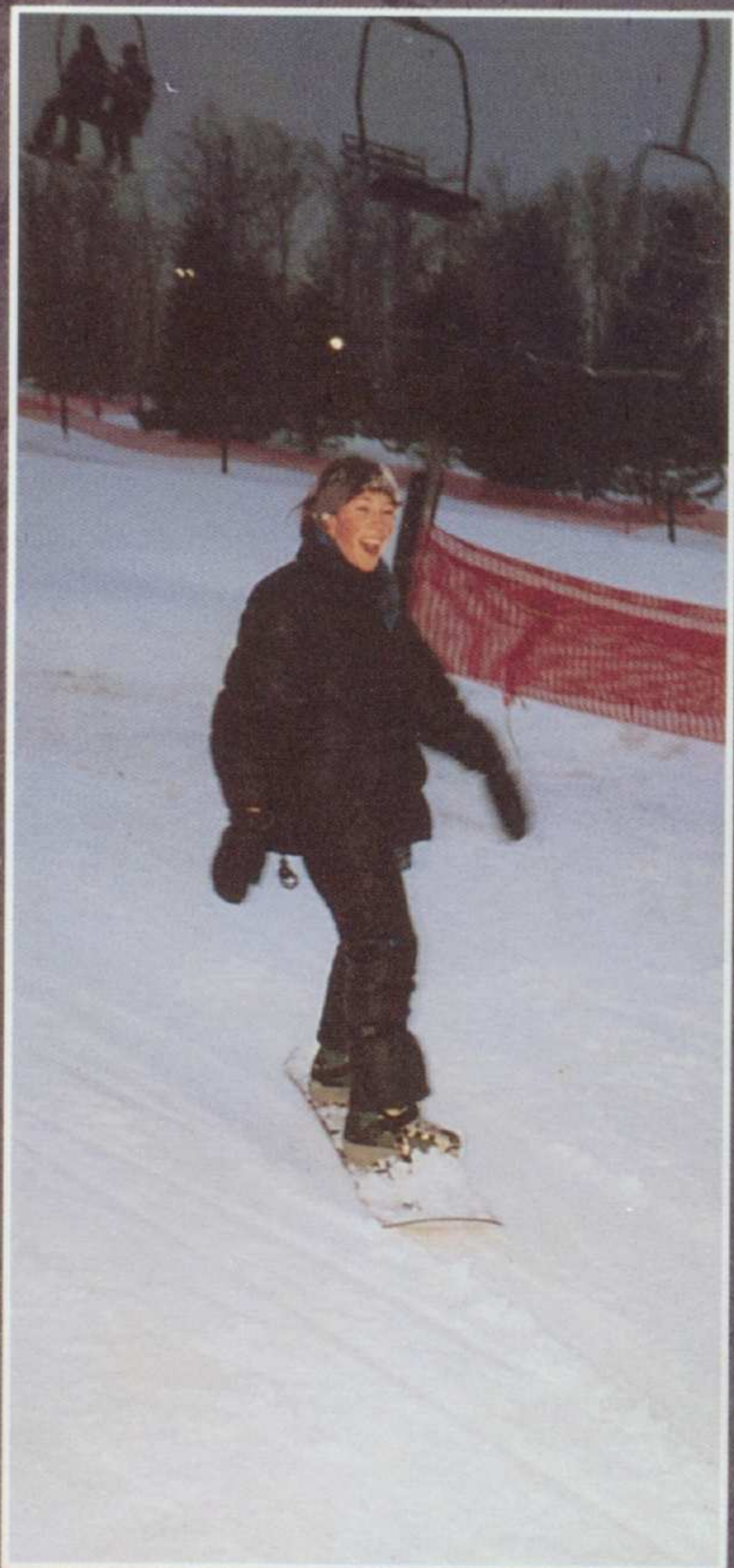

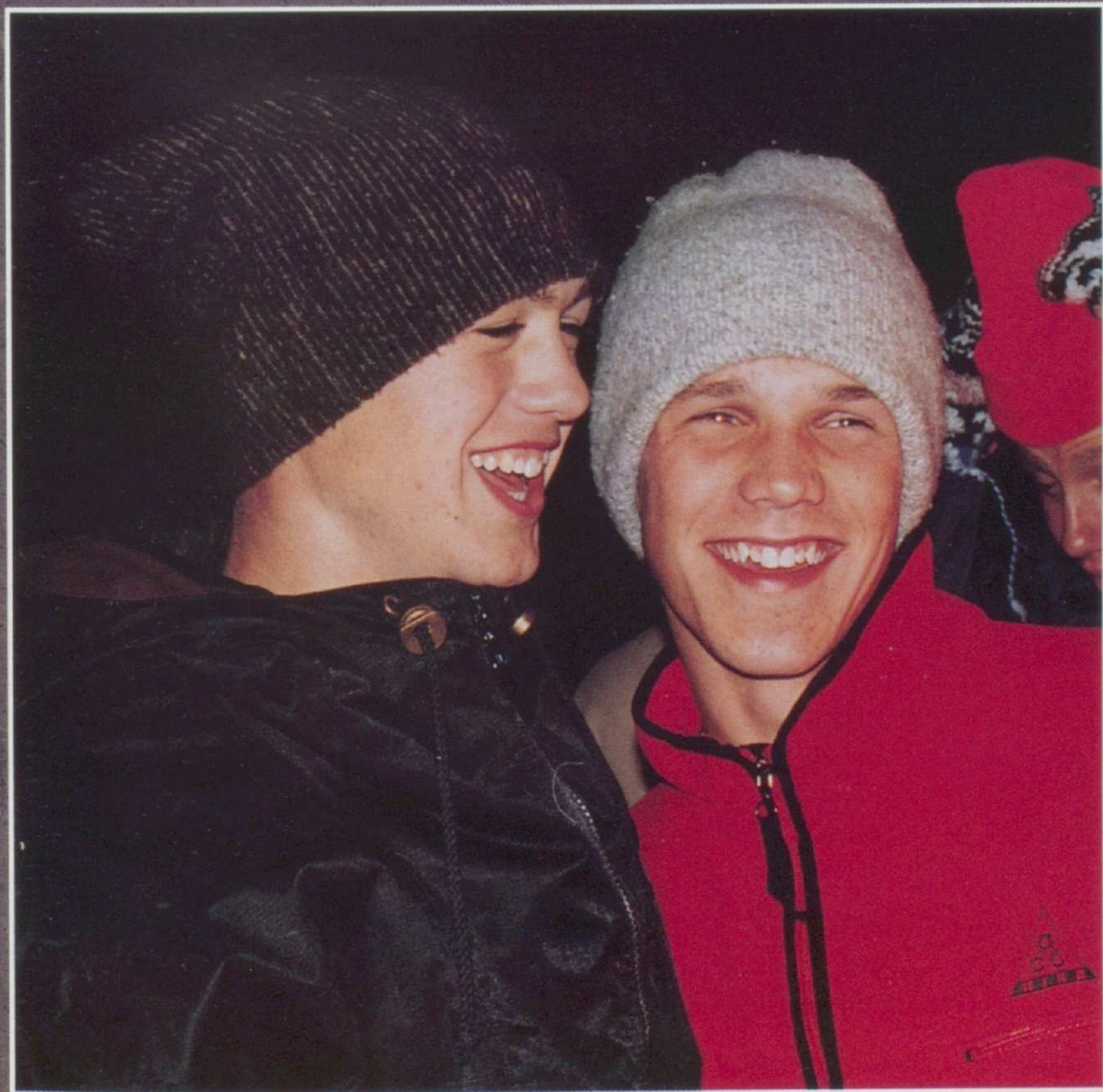

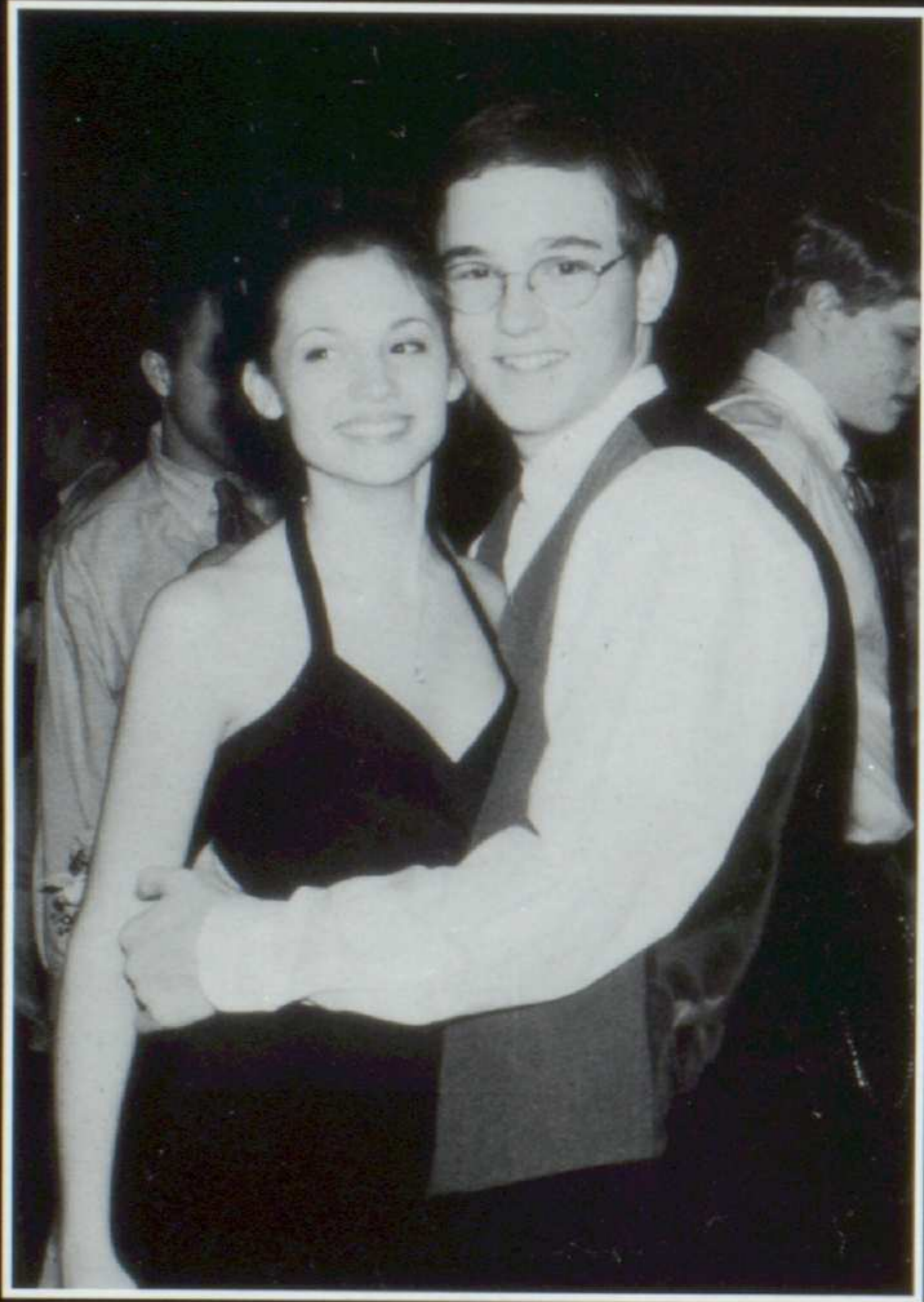

# Celebrating Homecoming Time After Time

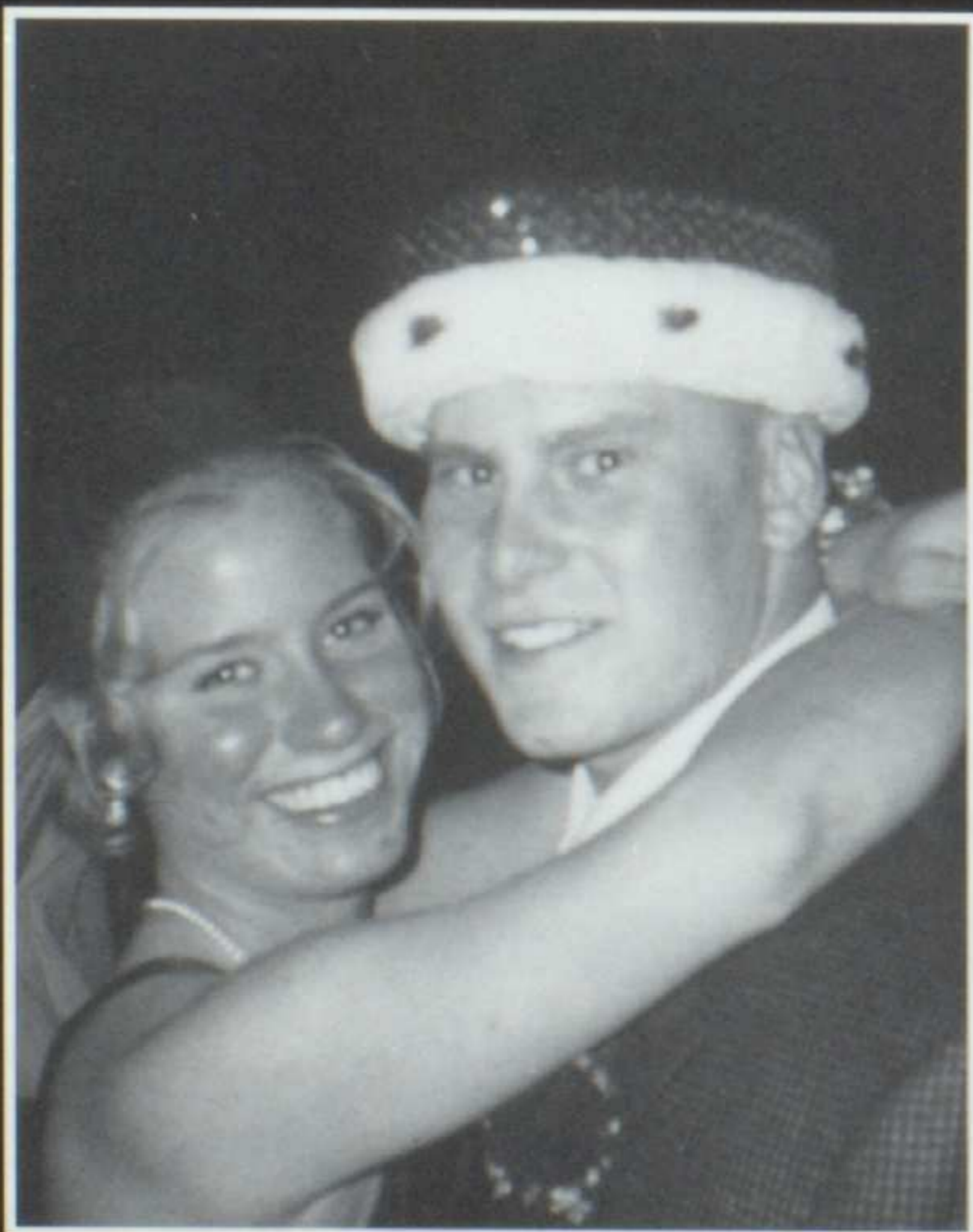

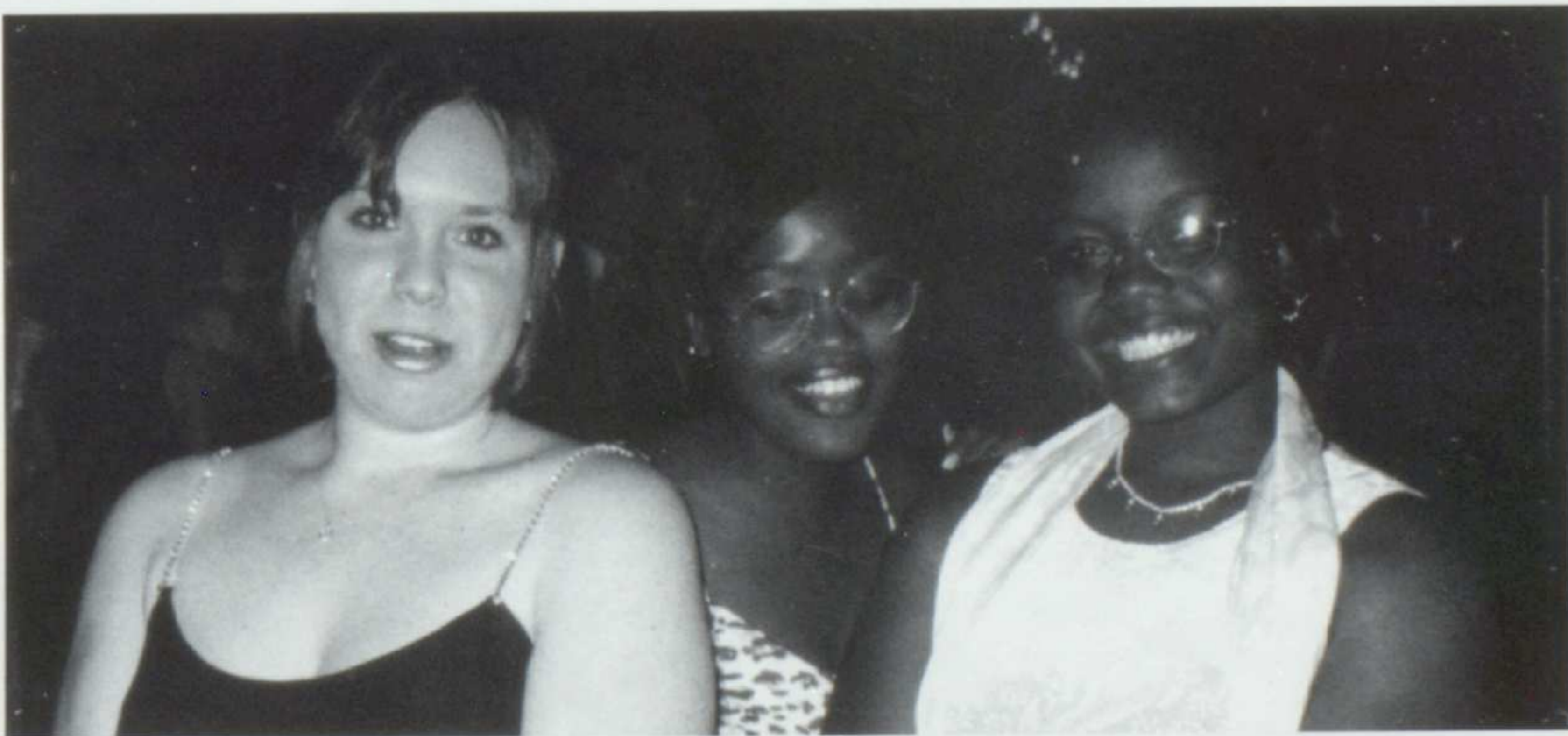

# Holiday Kissing Fest

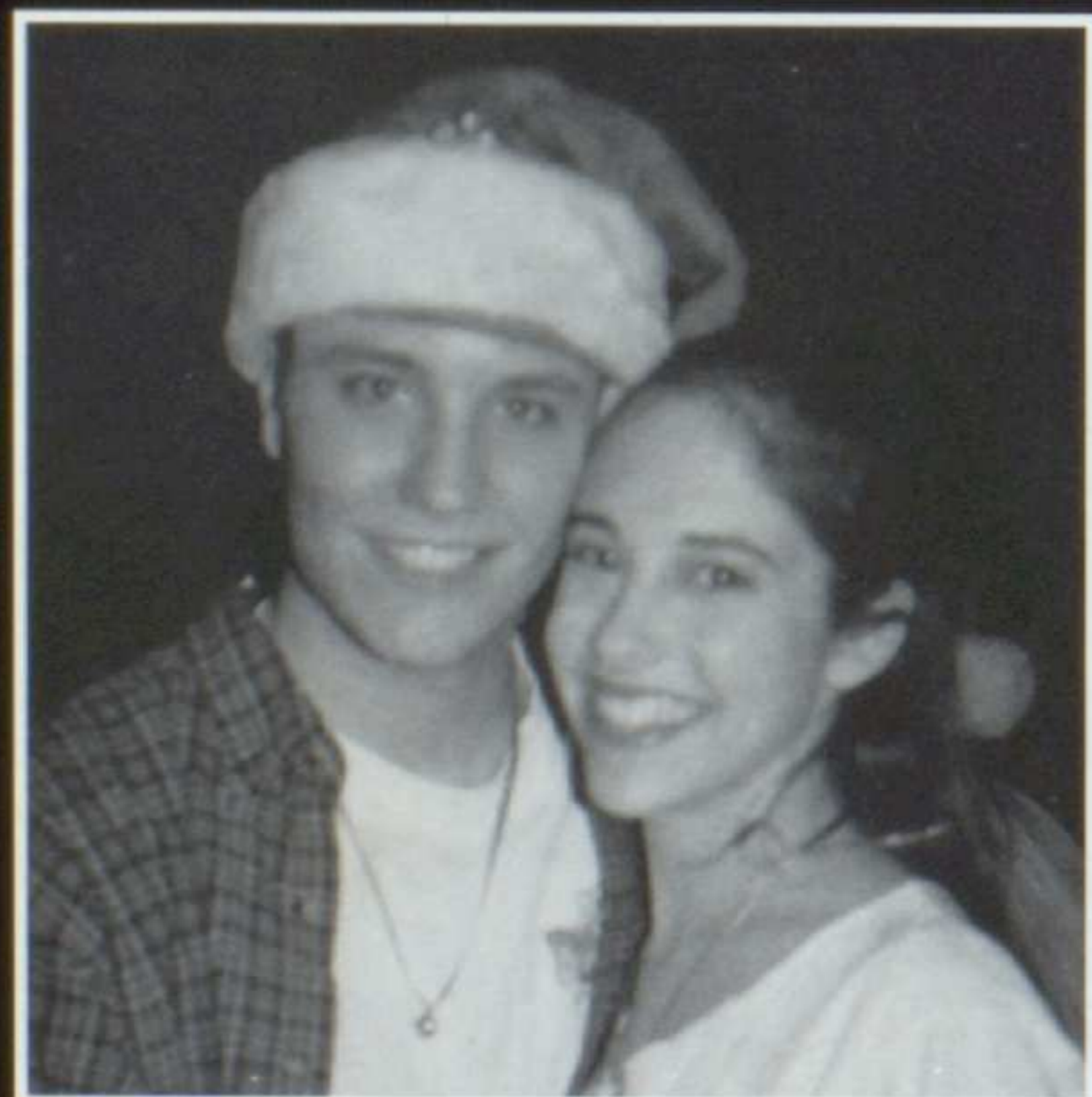
## Jingle Jam

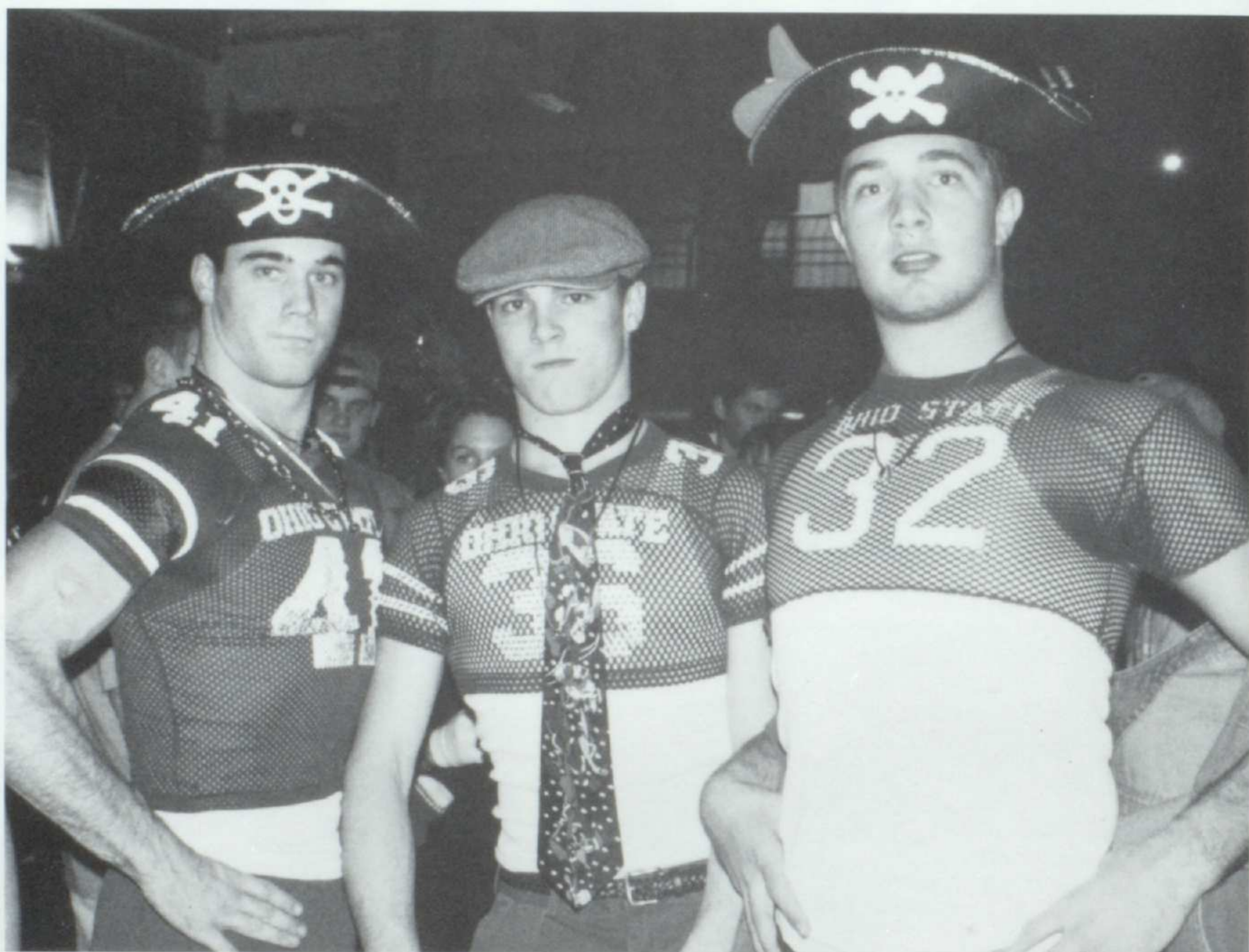

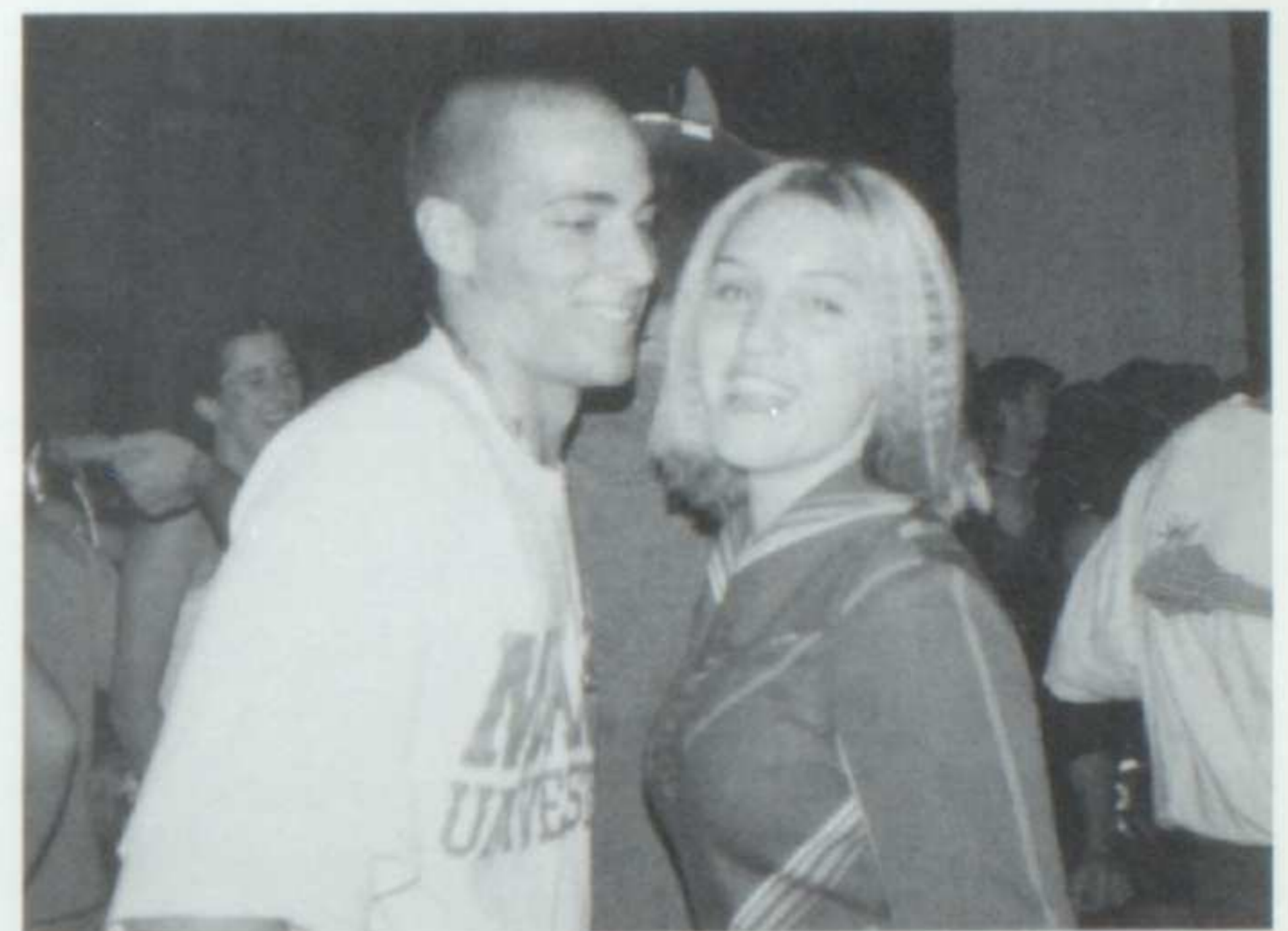

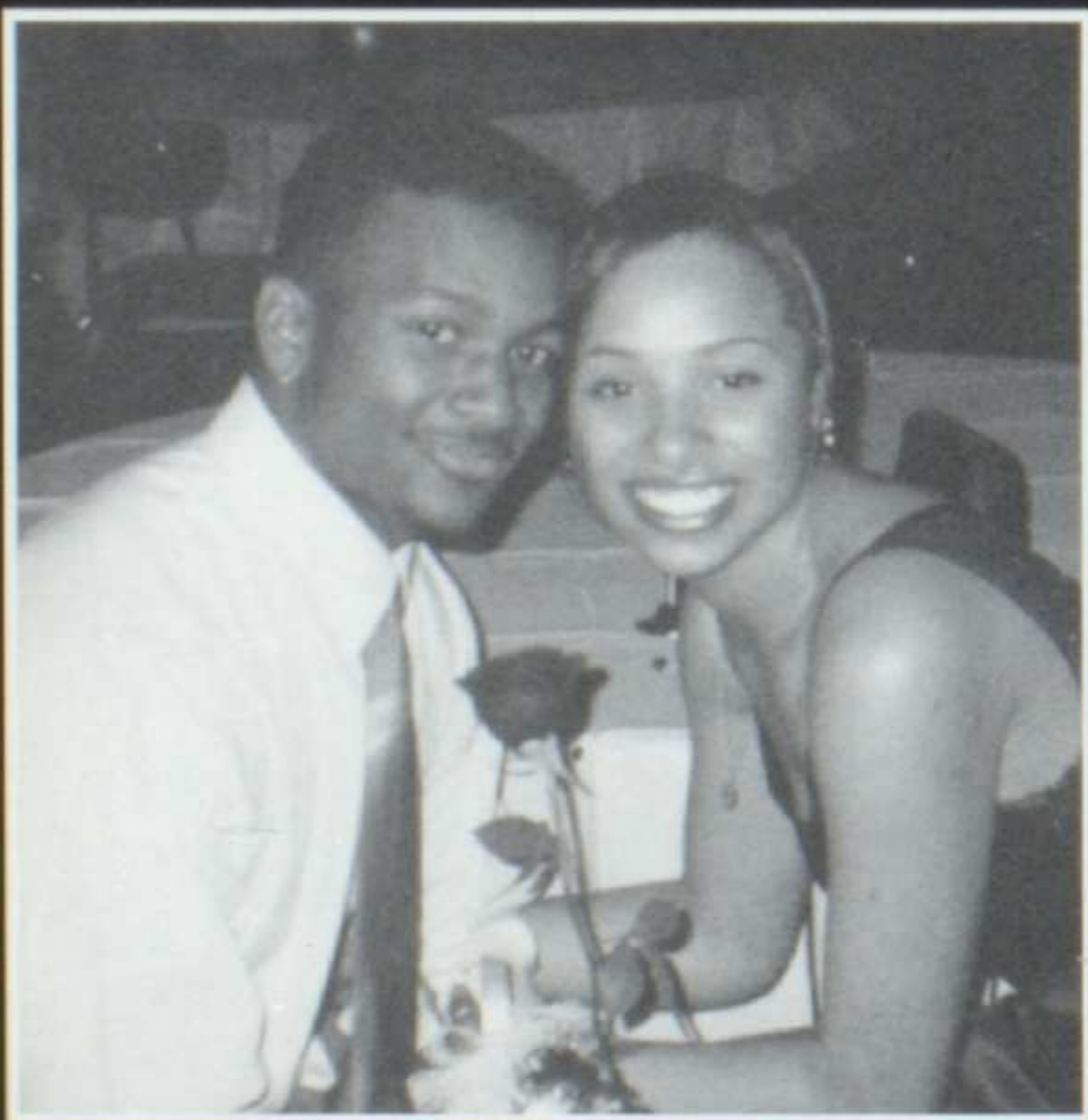

## Bed of Roses

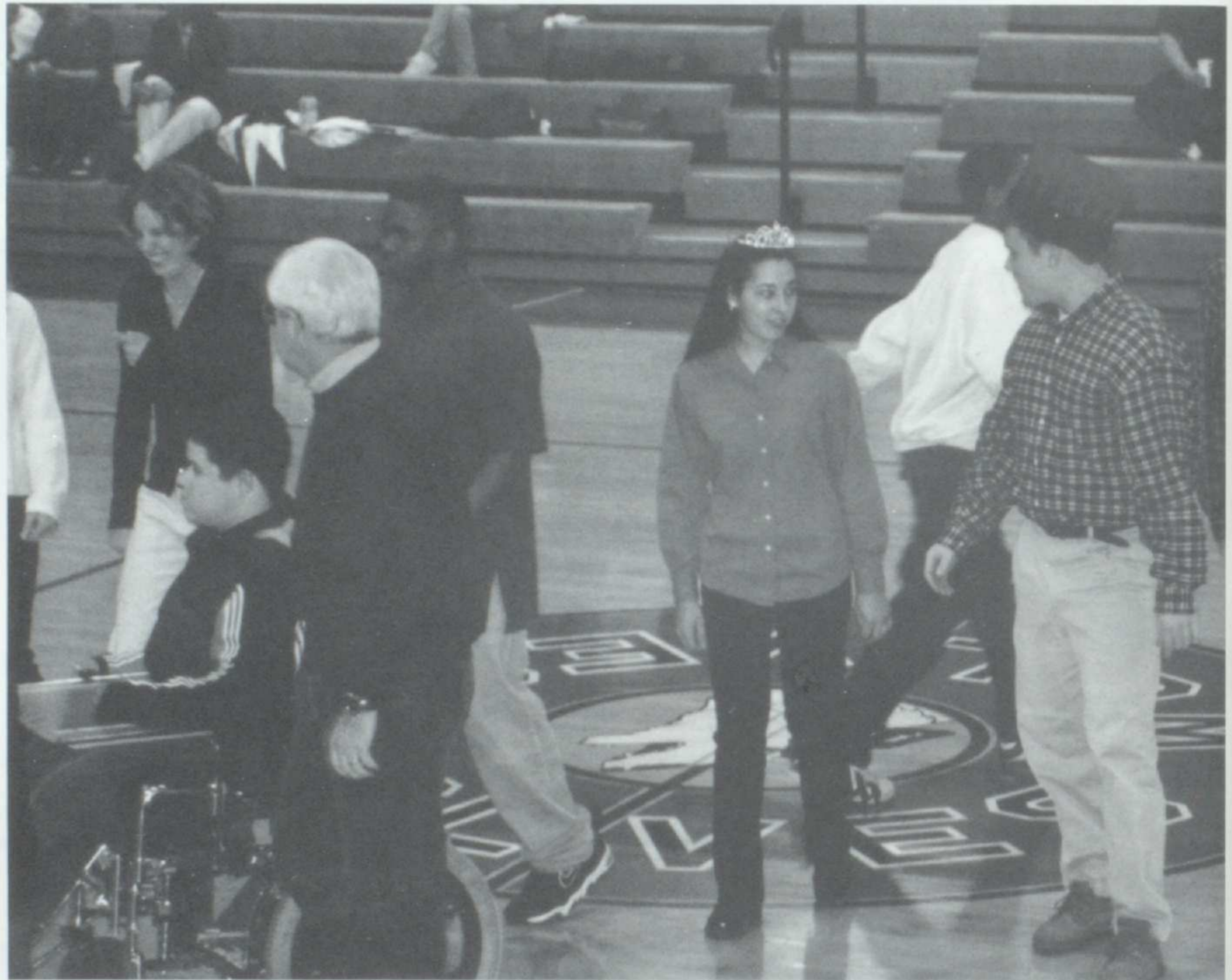

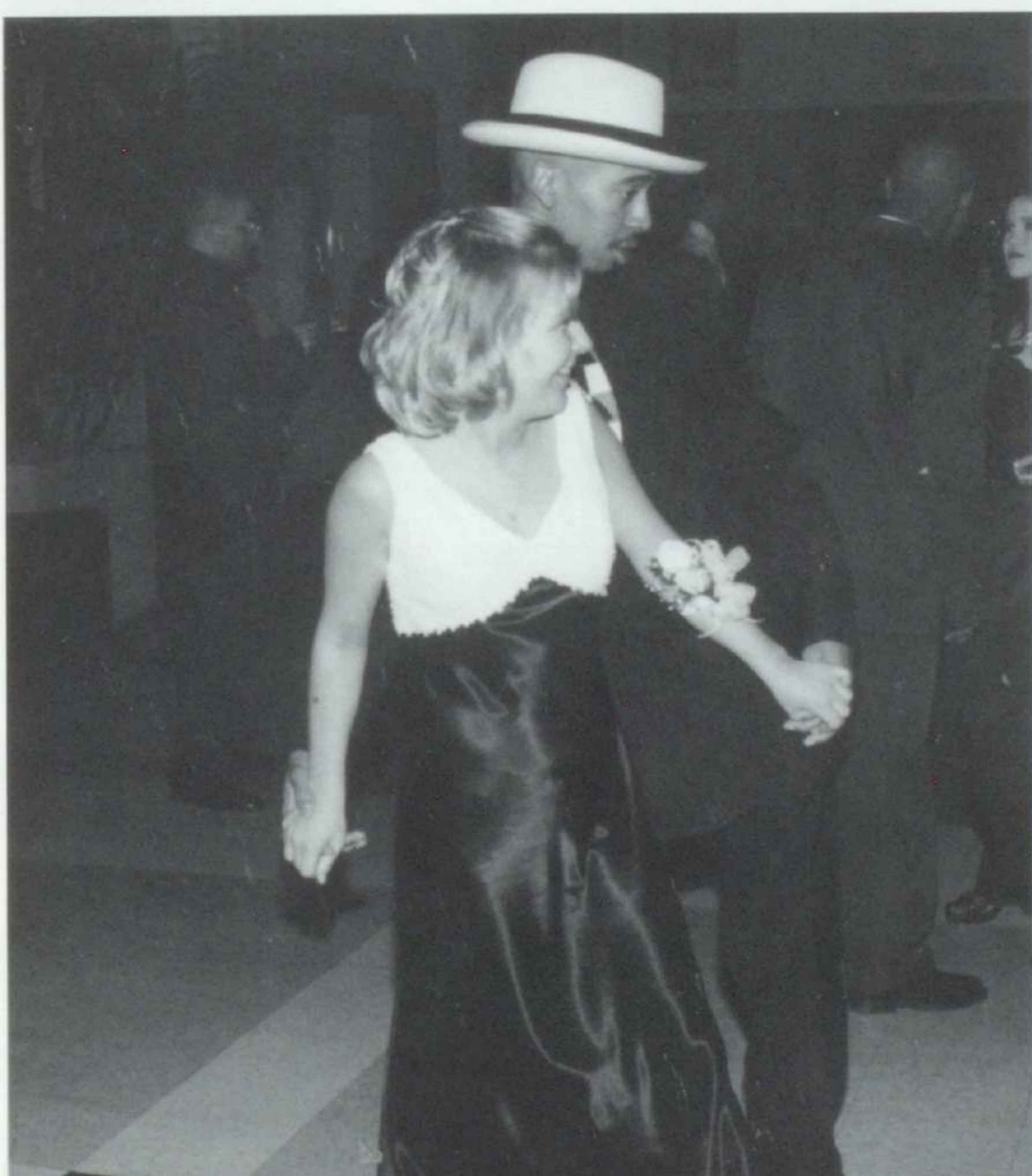

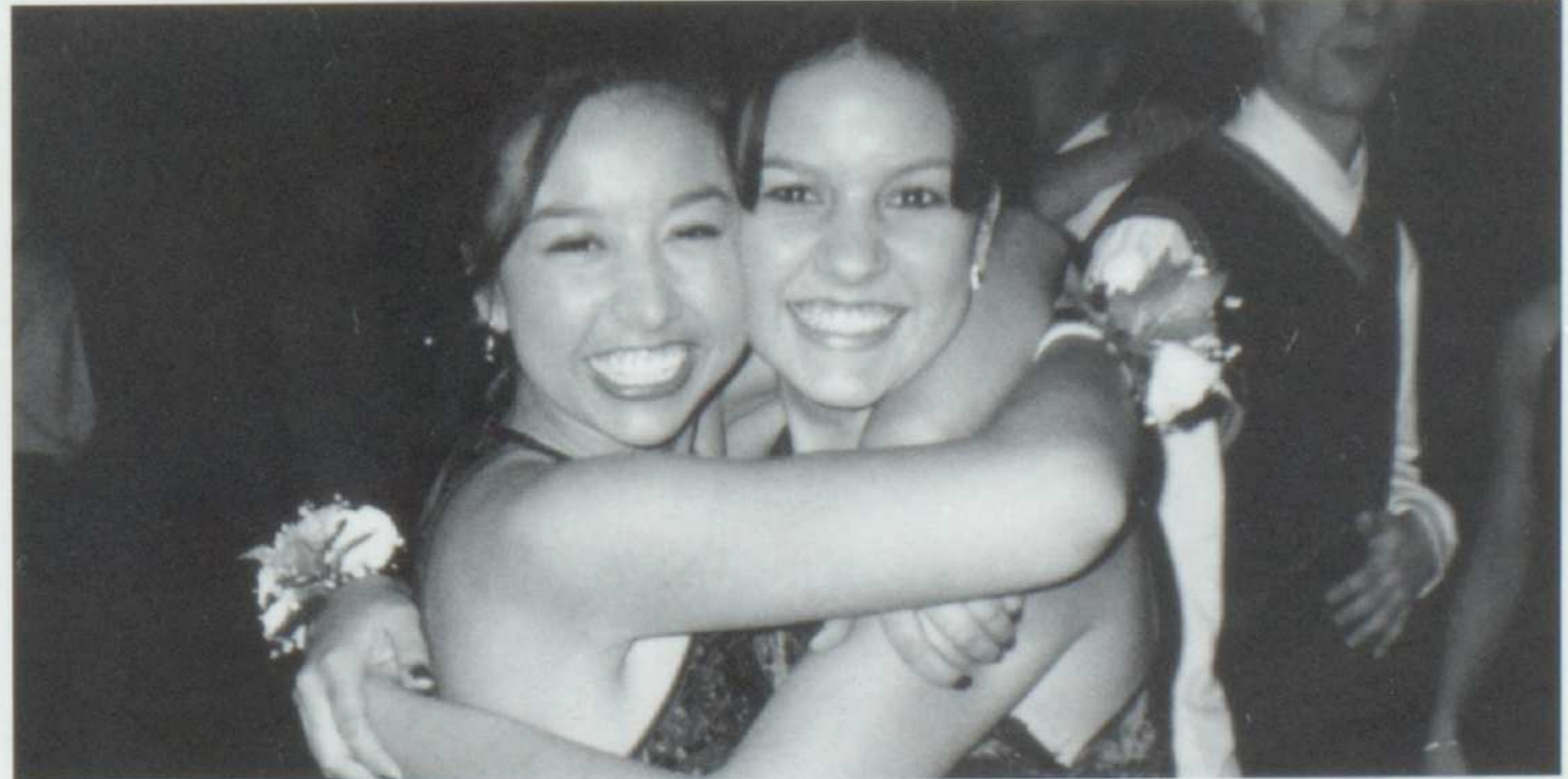

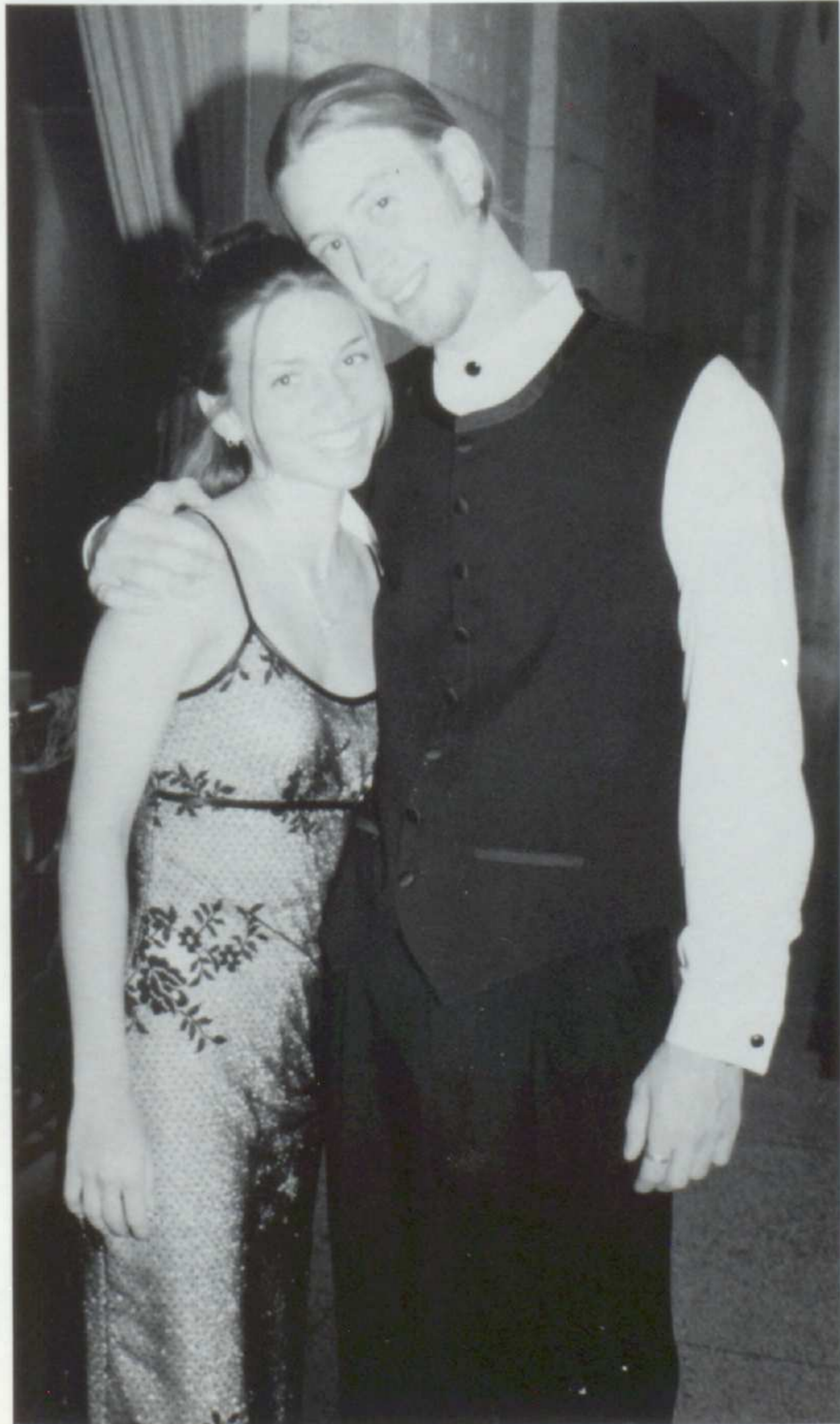
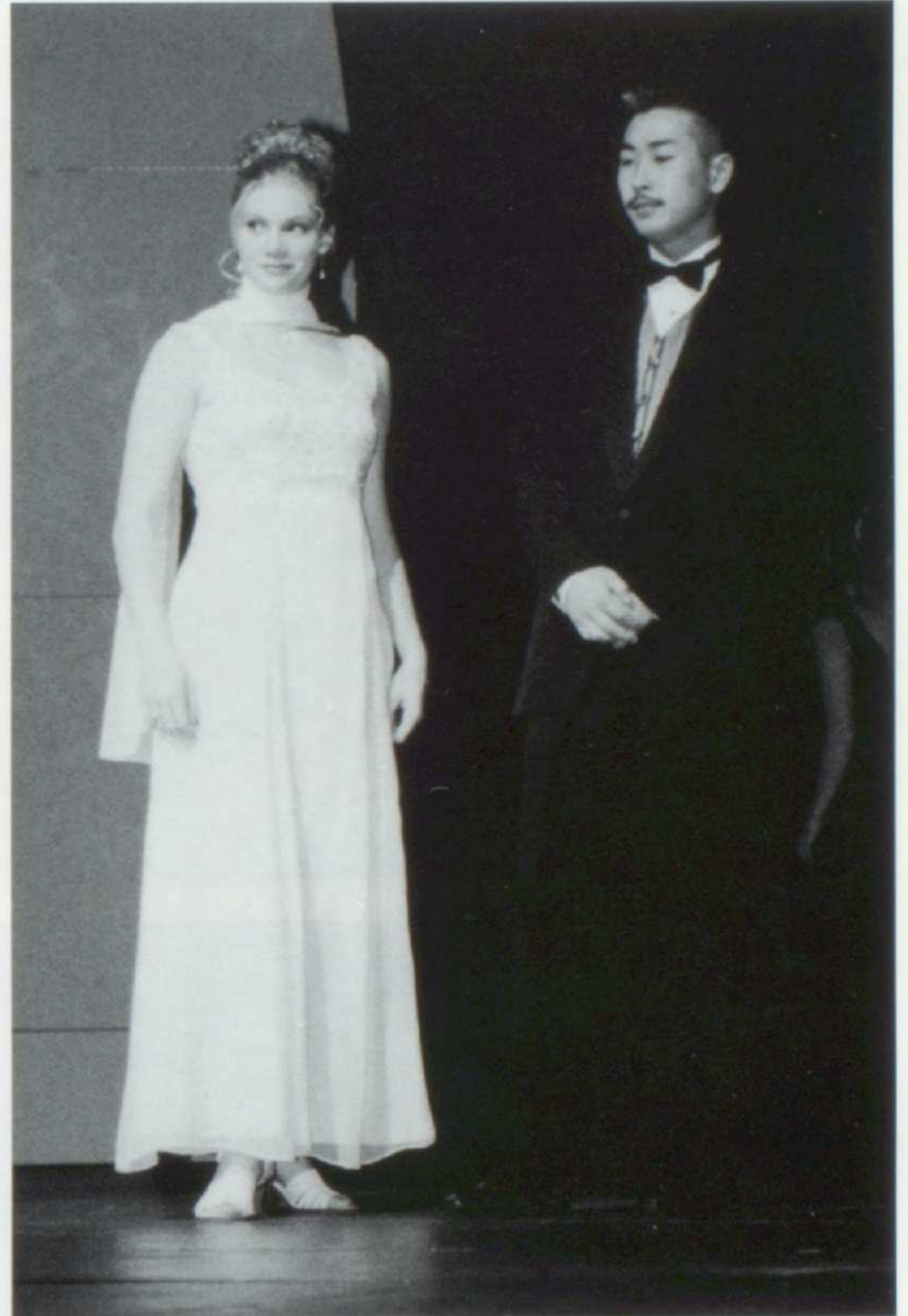

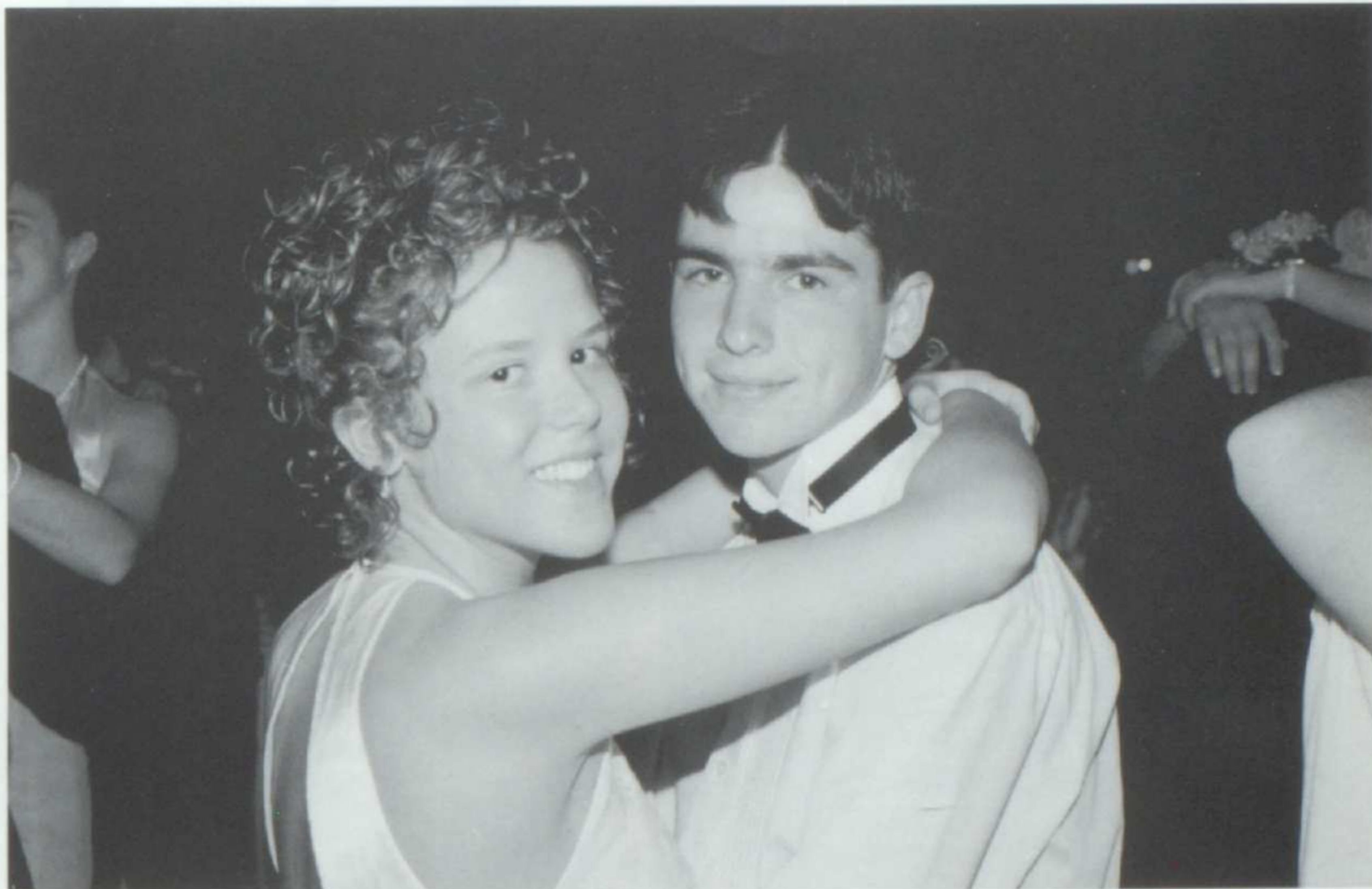

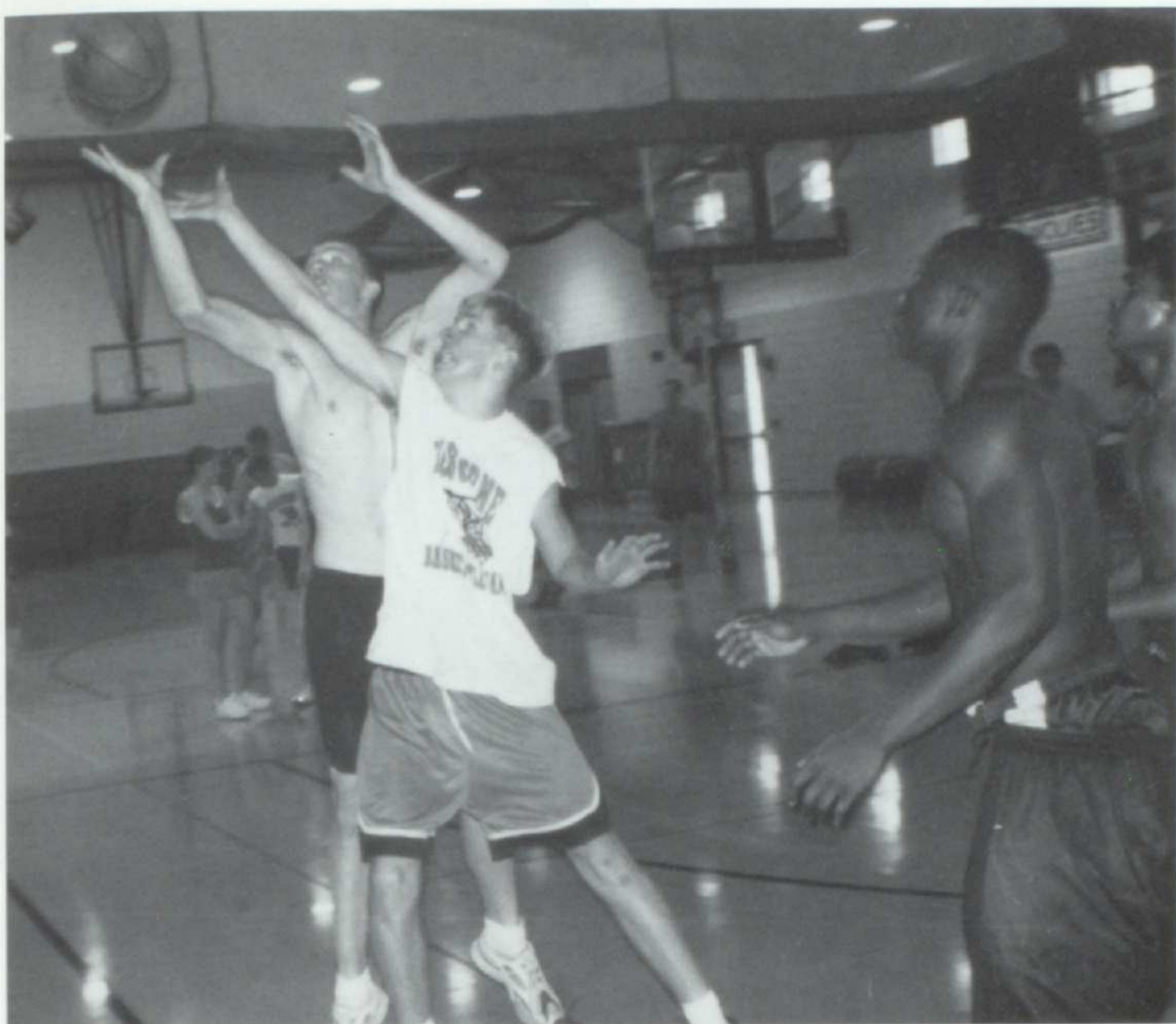

## Arts-in-Action

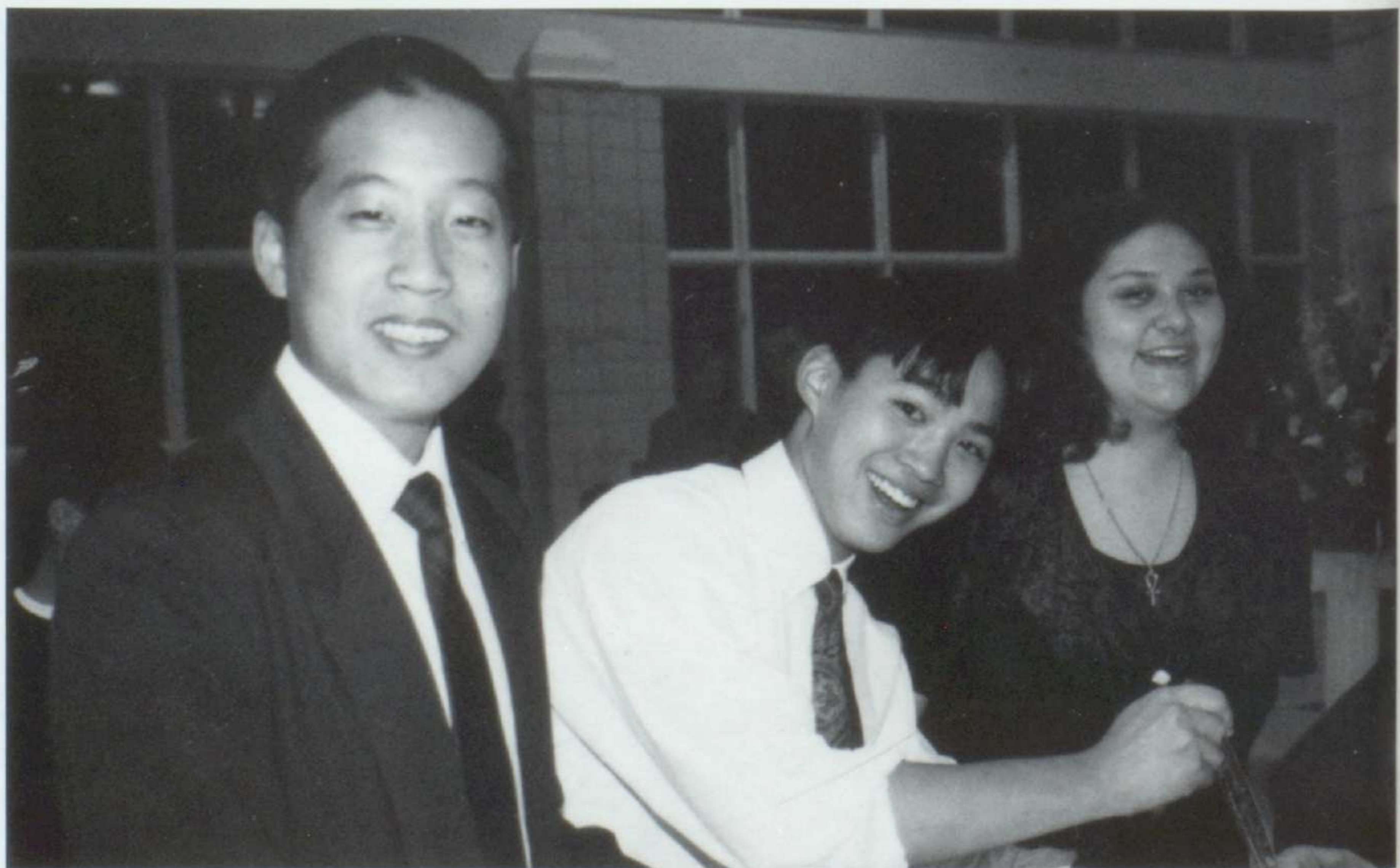
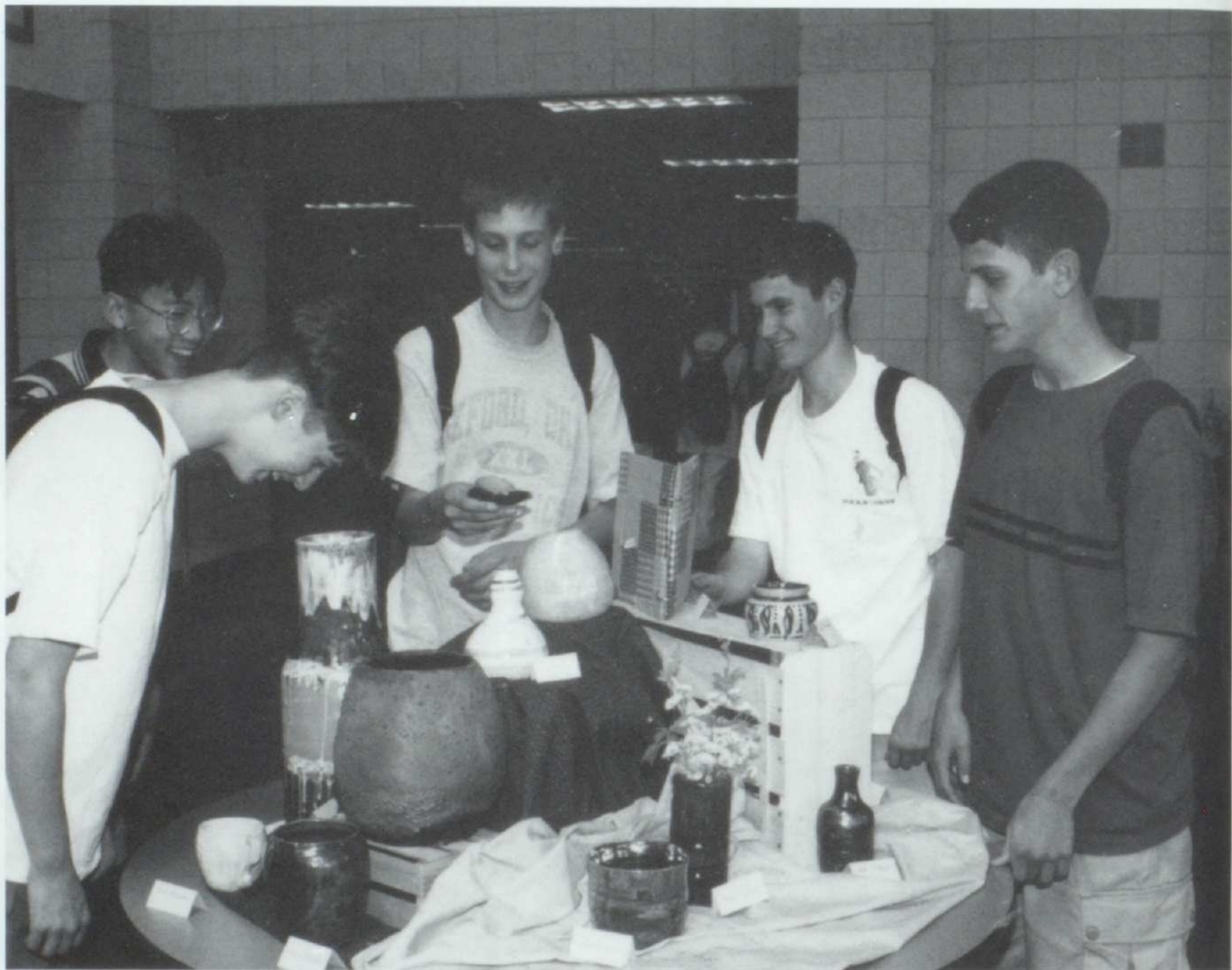

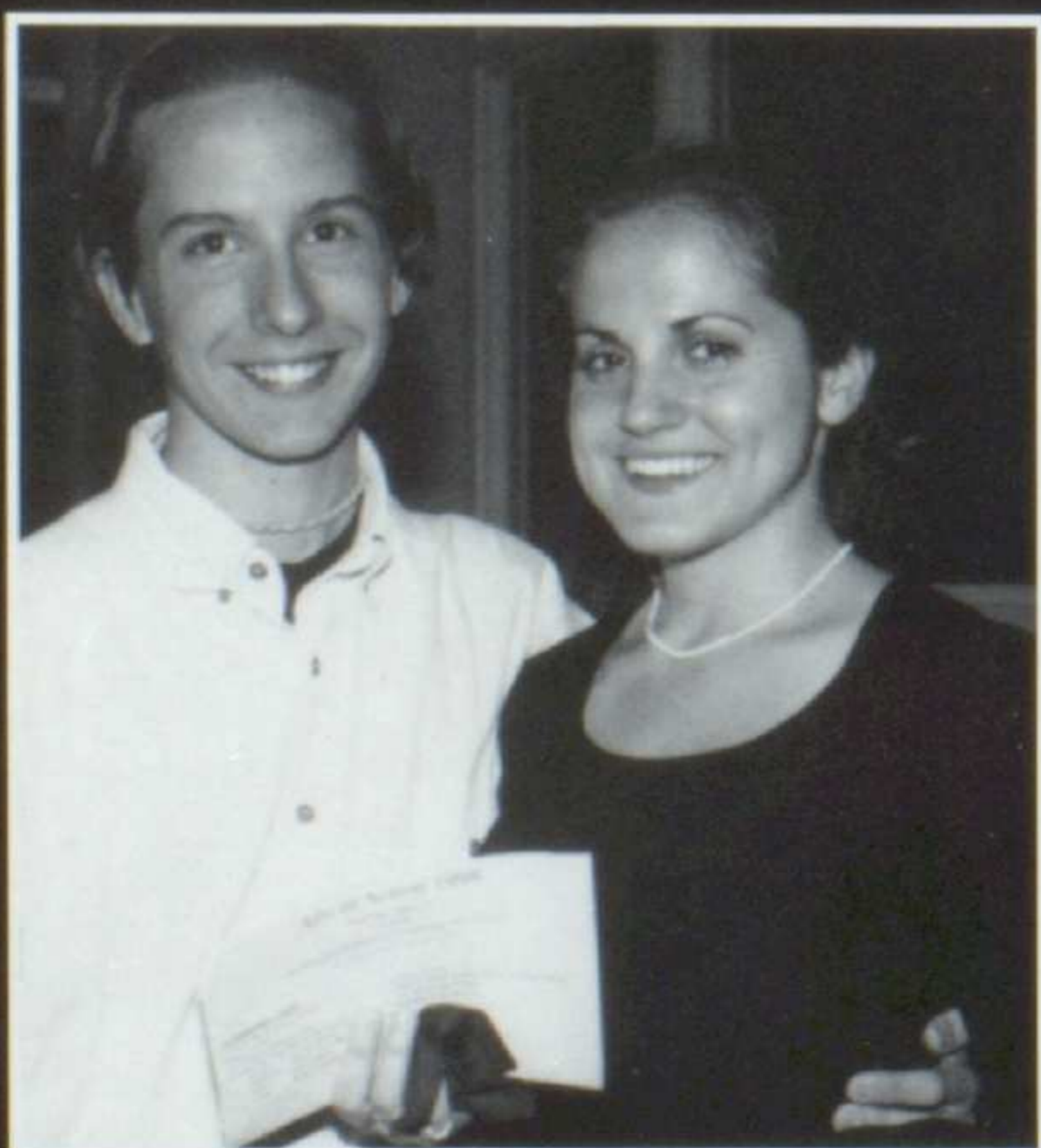

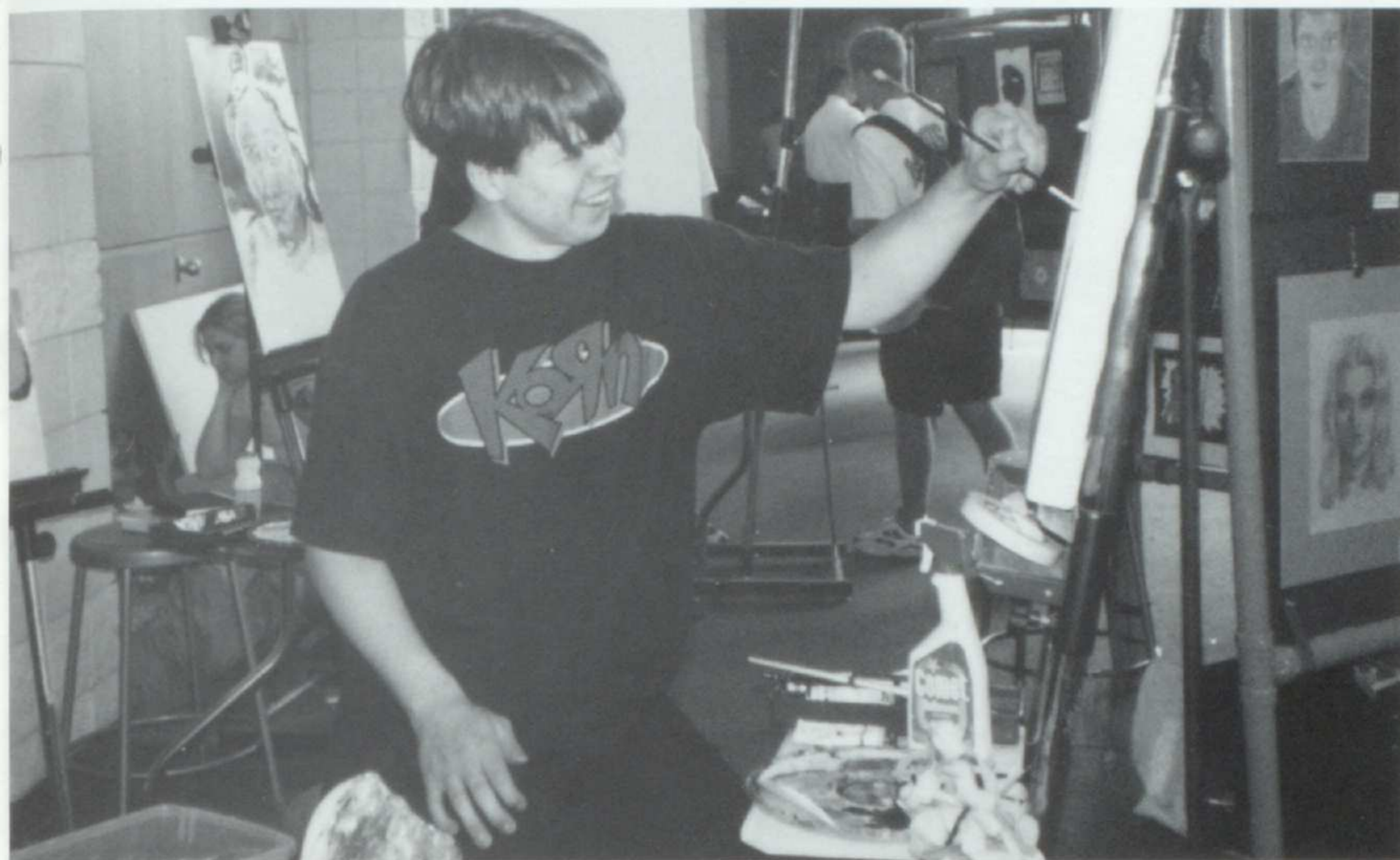

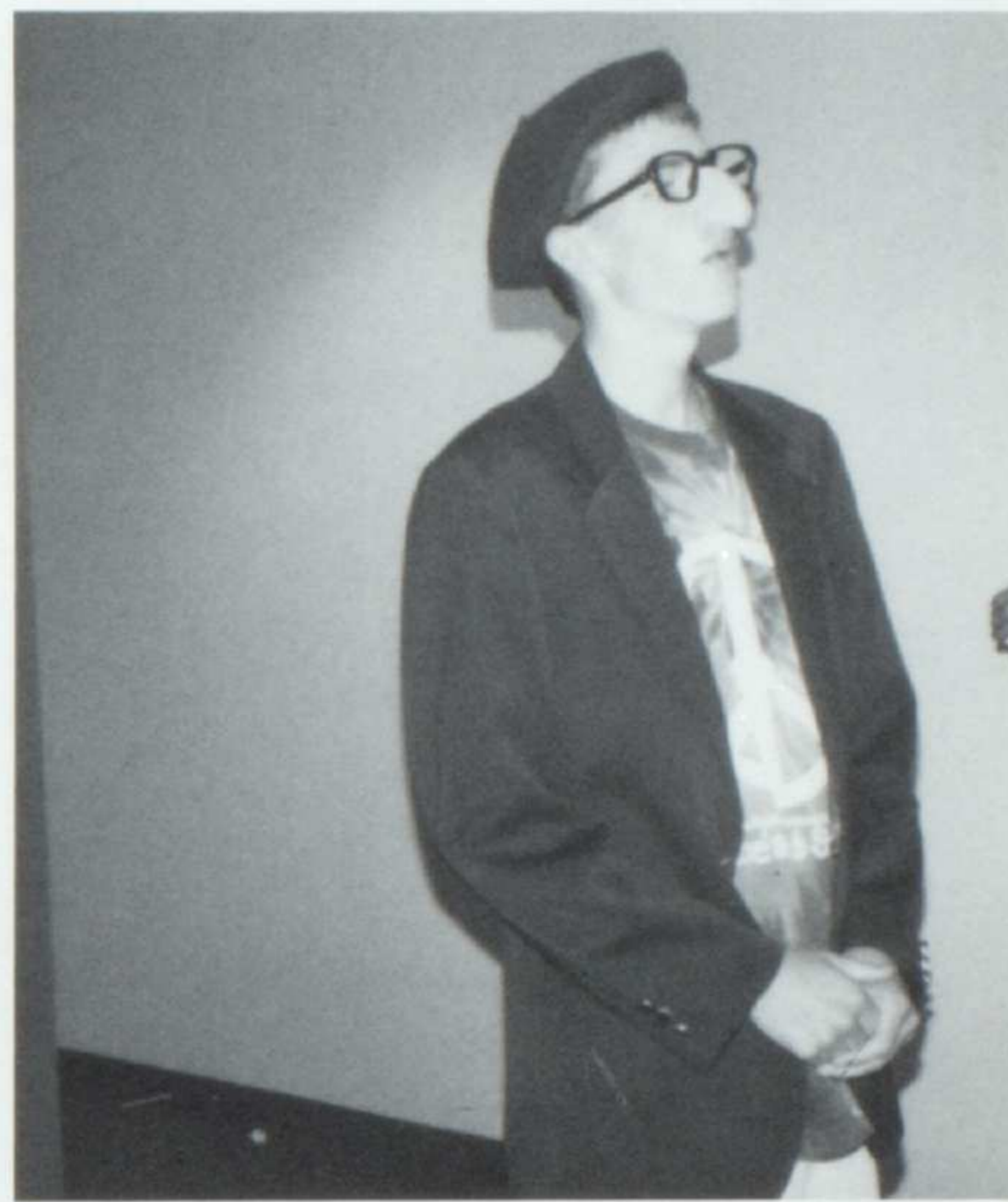

## Celebration of Excellence

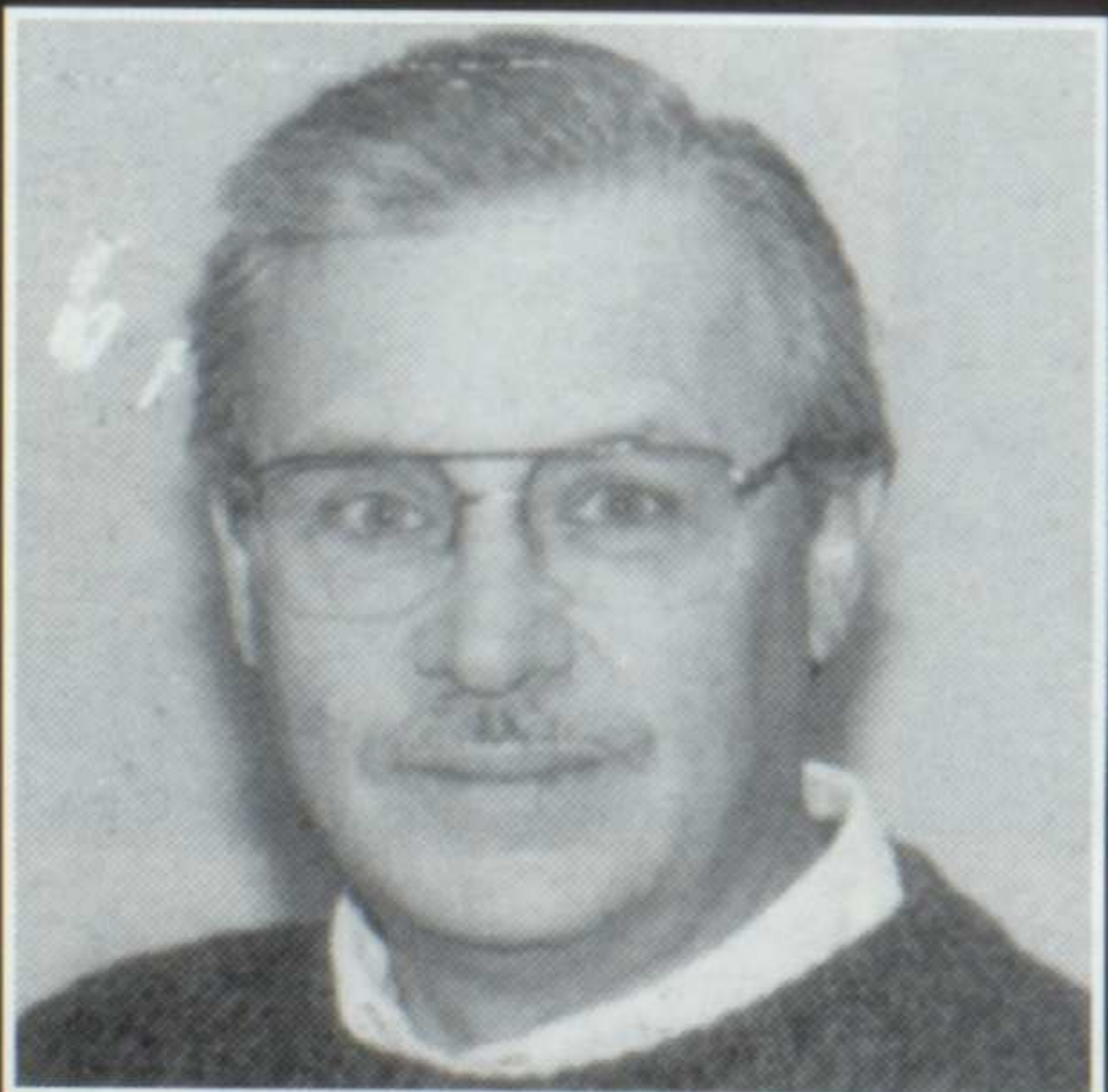

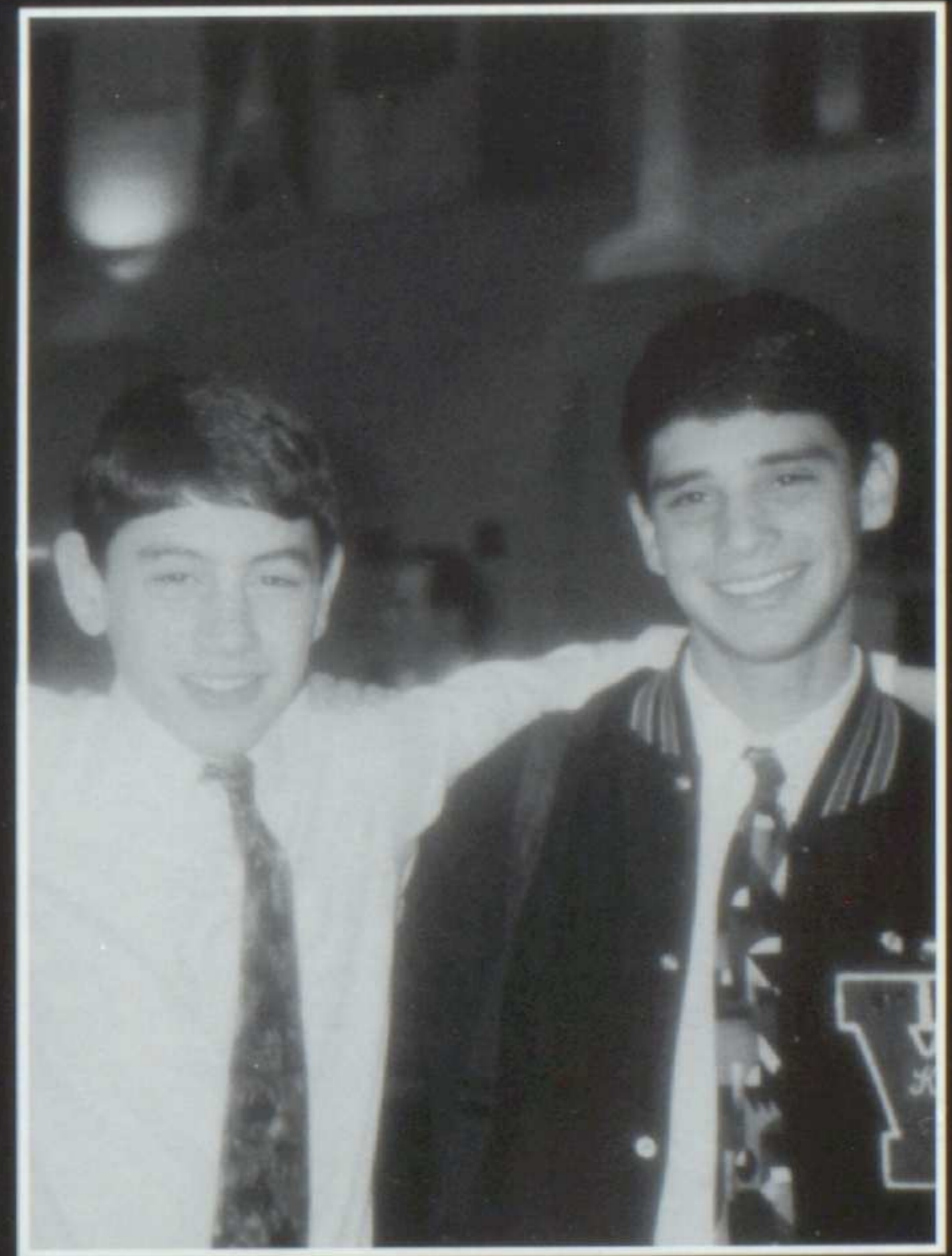

Together, all four stories combined into one humorous evening of theatre.

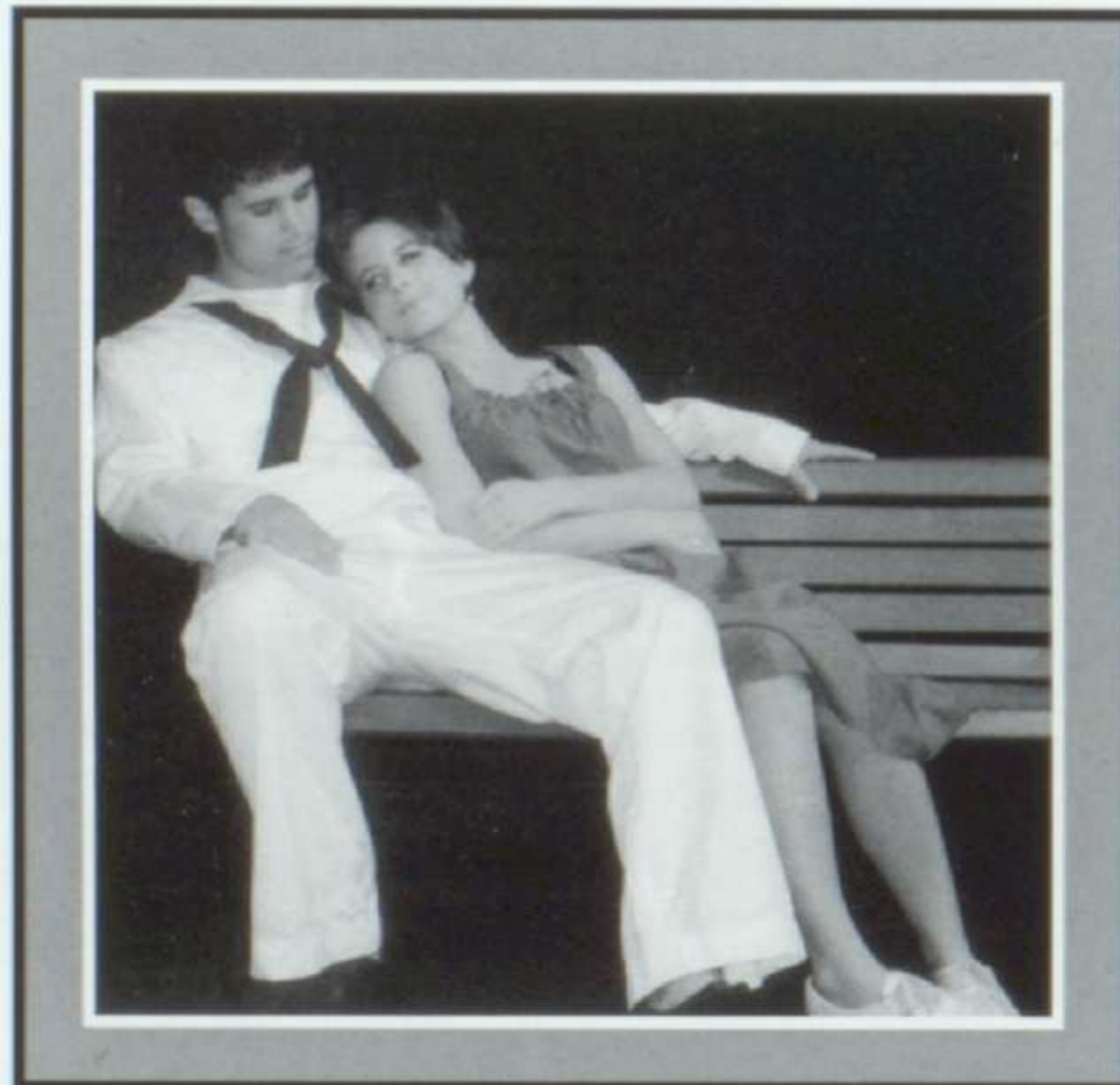

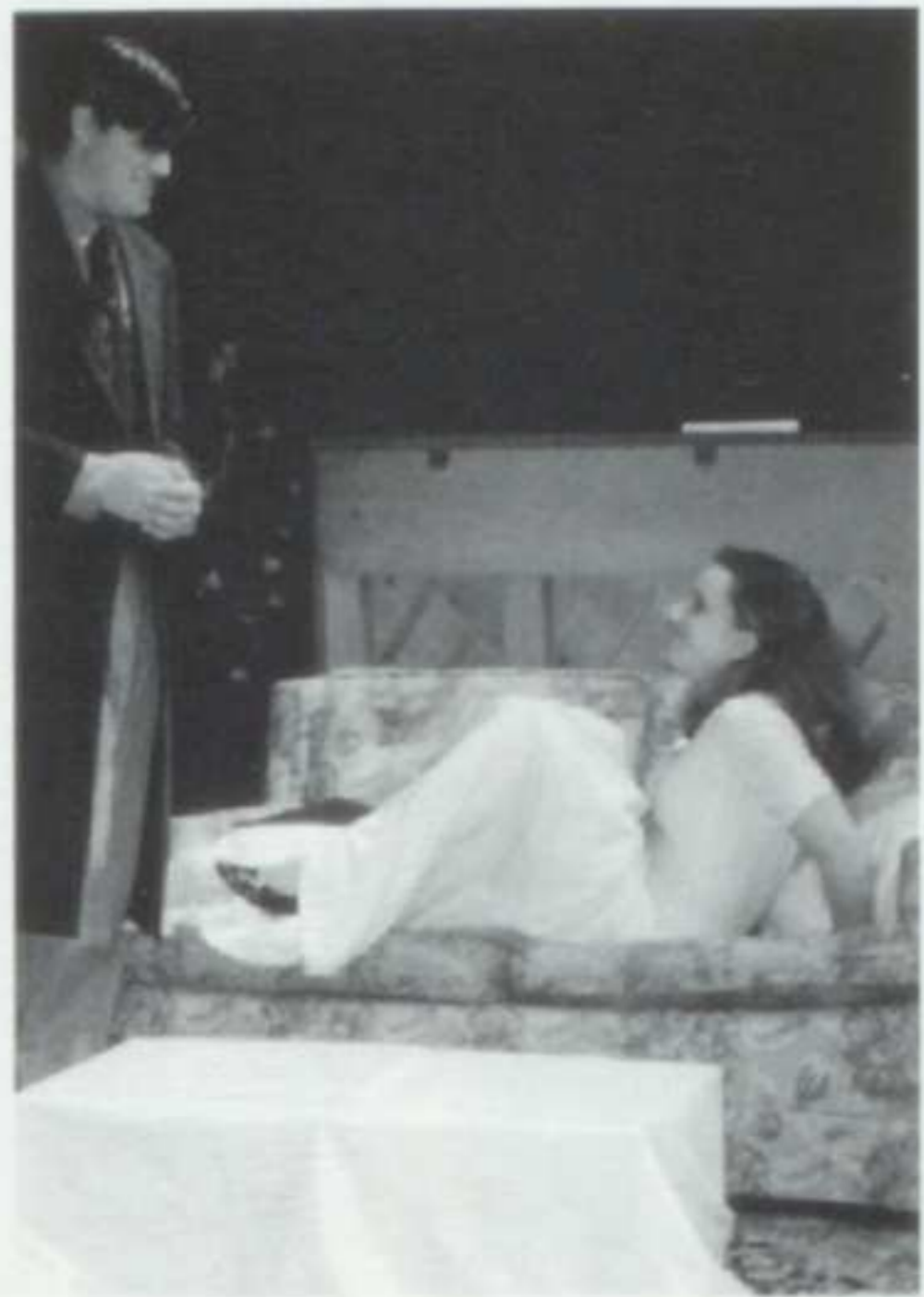

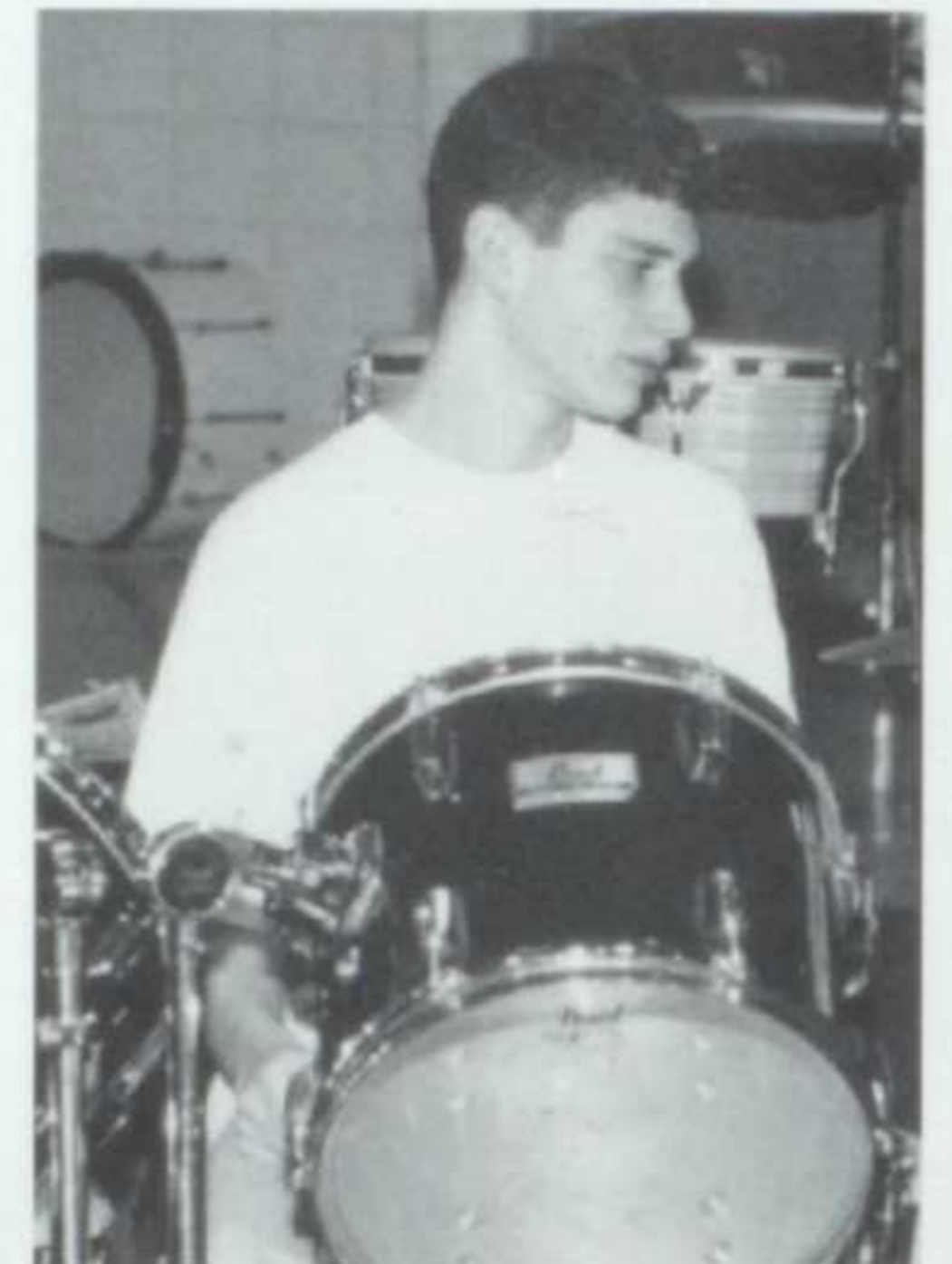

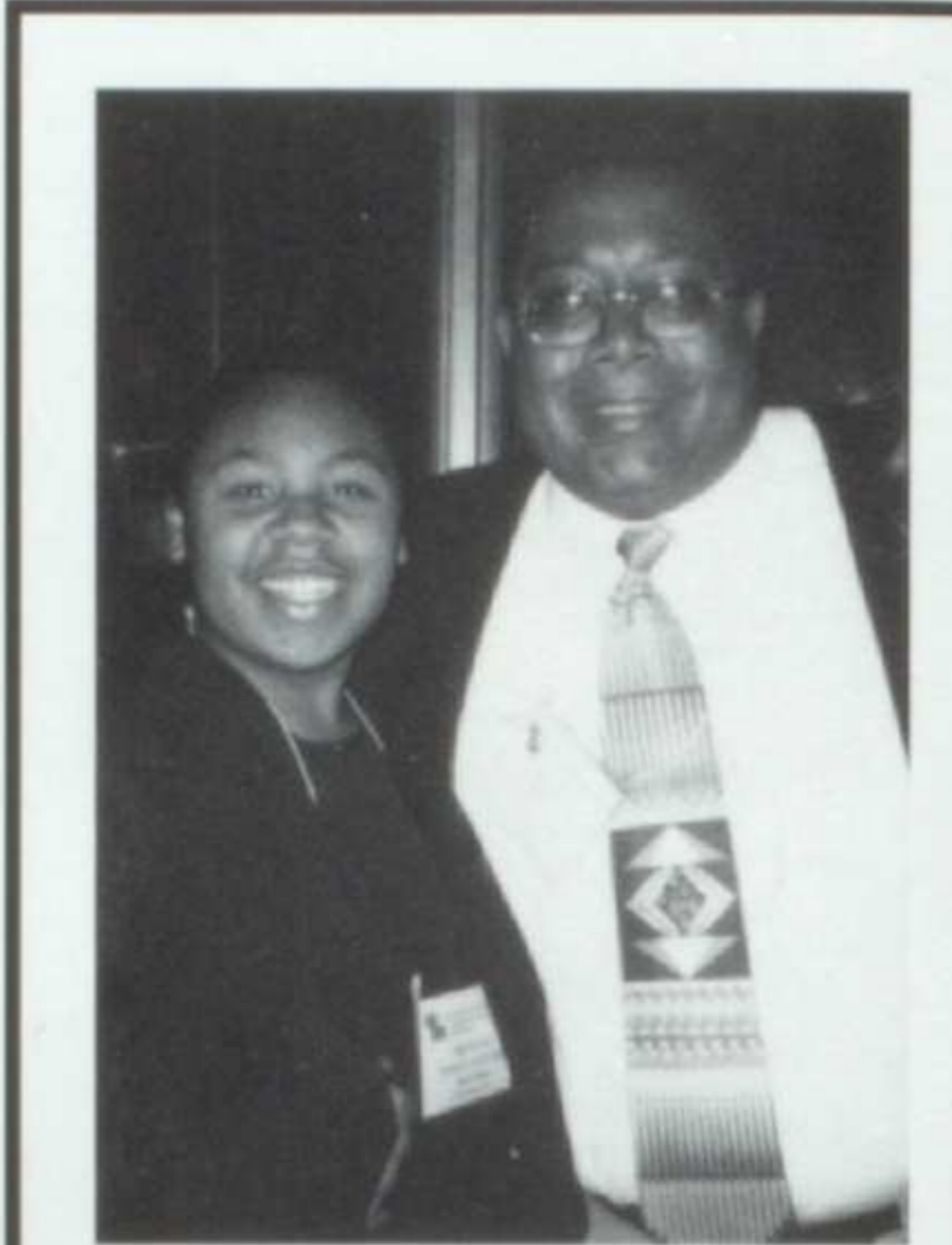

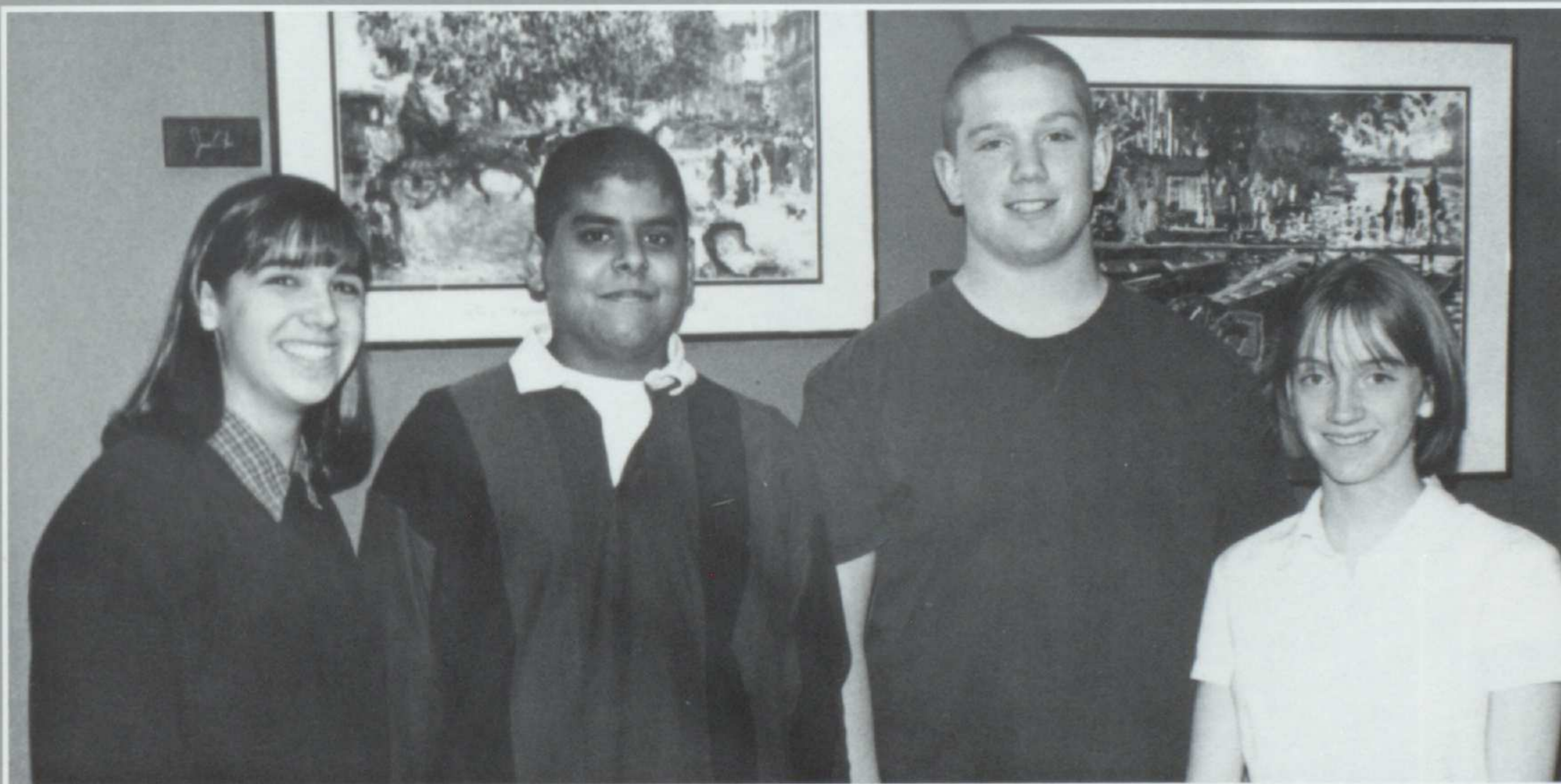

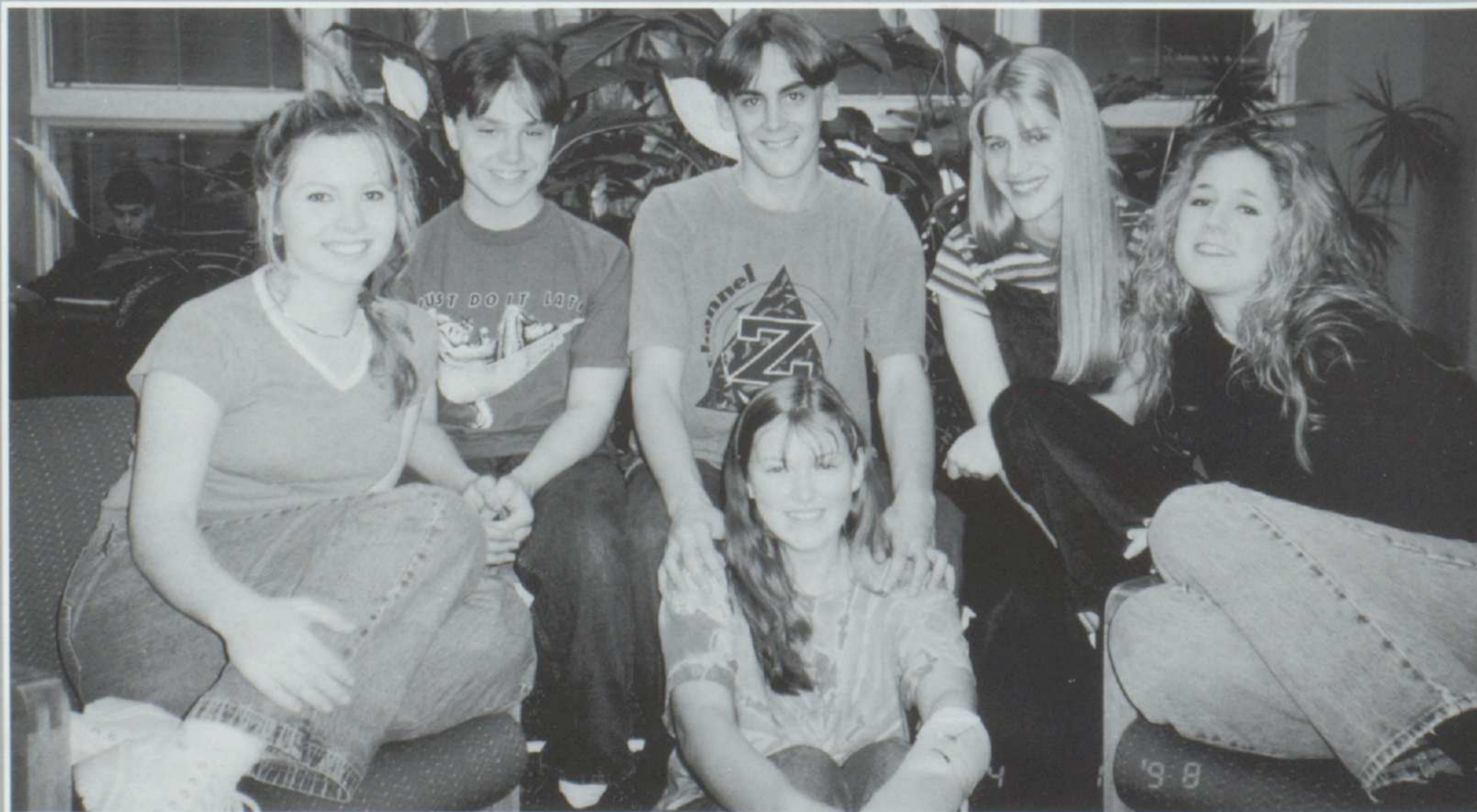

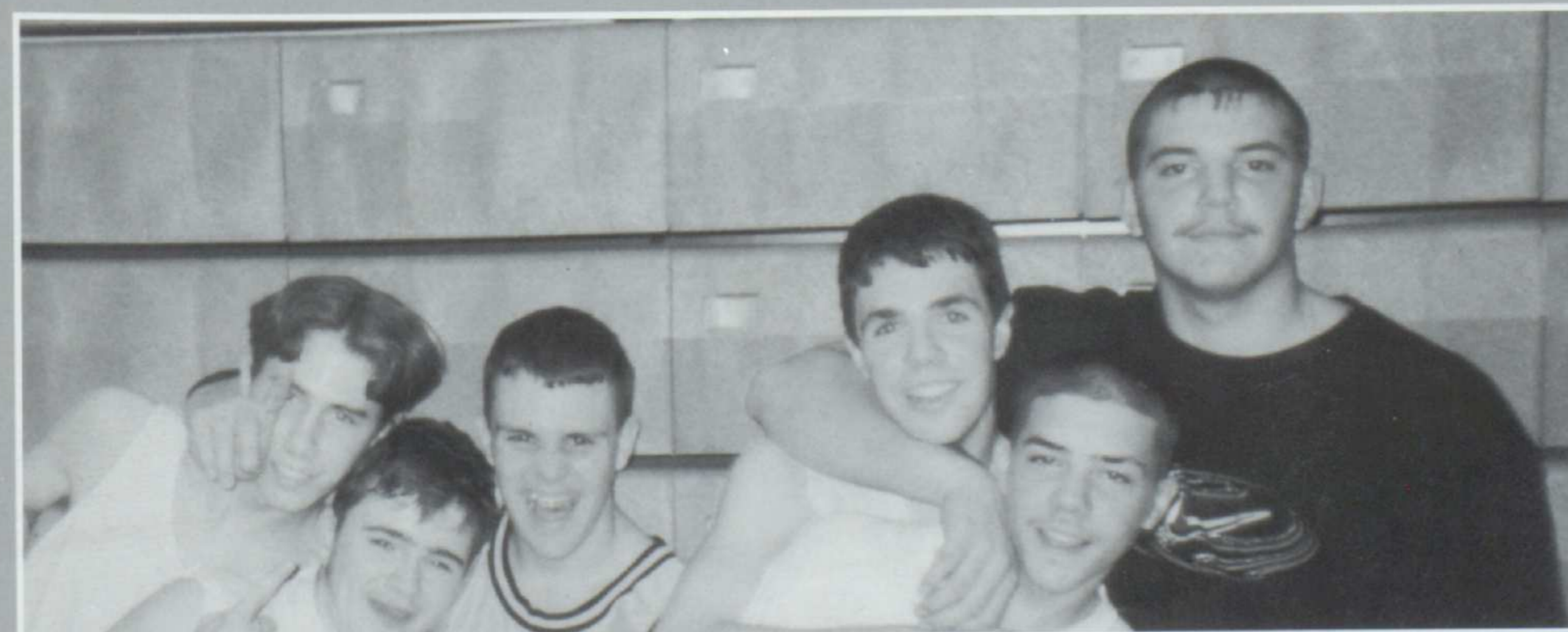

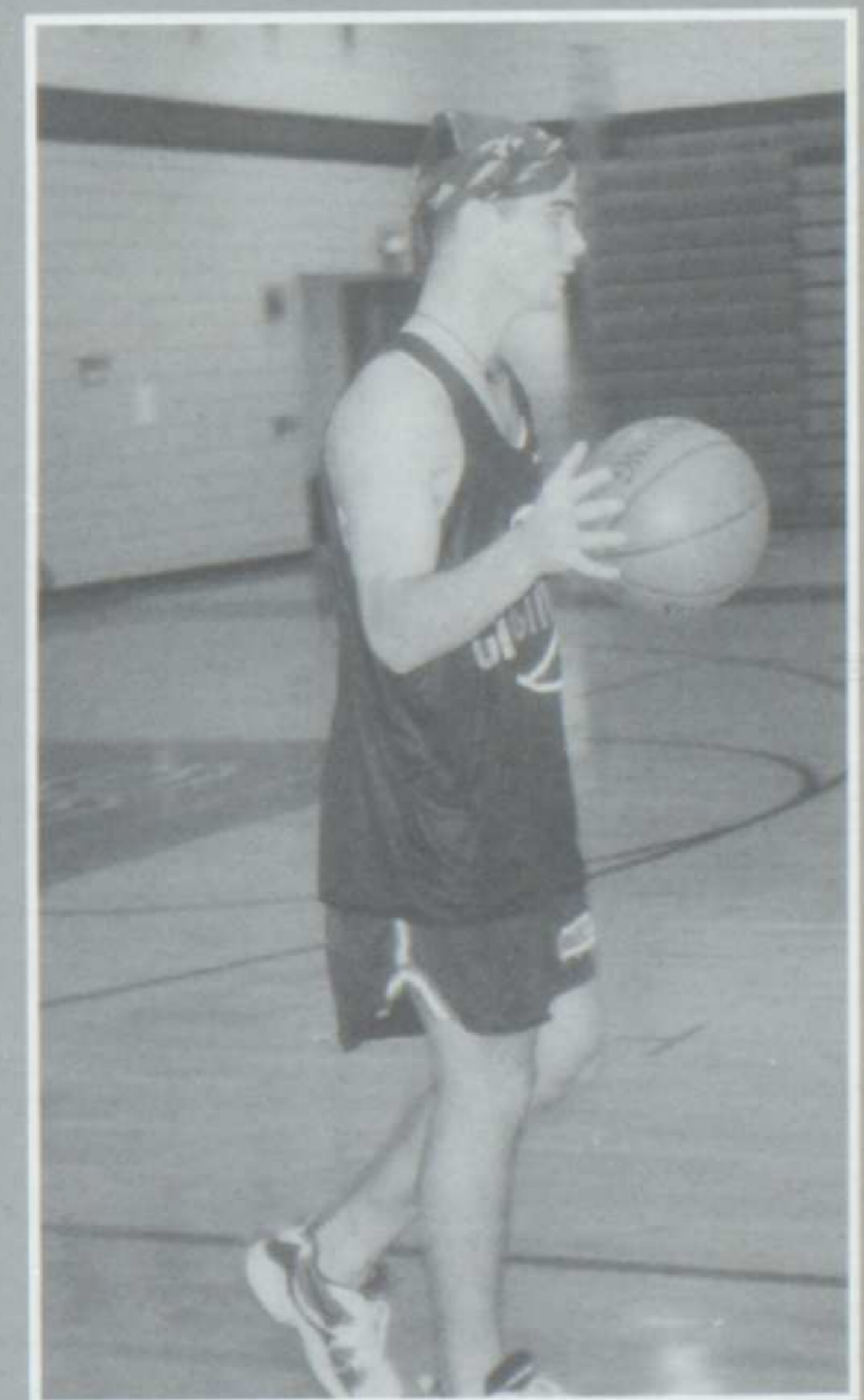

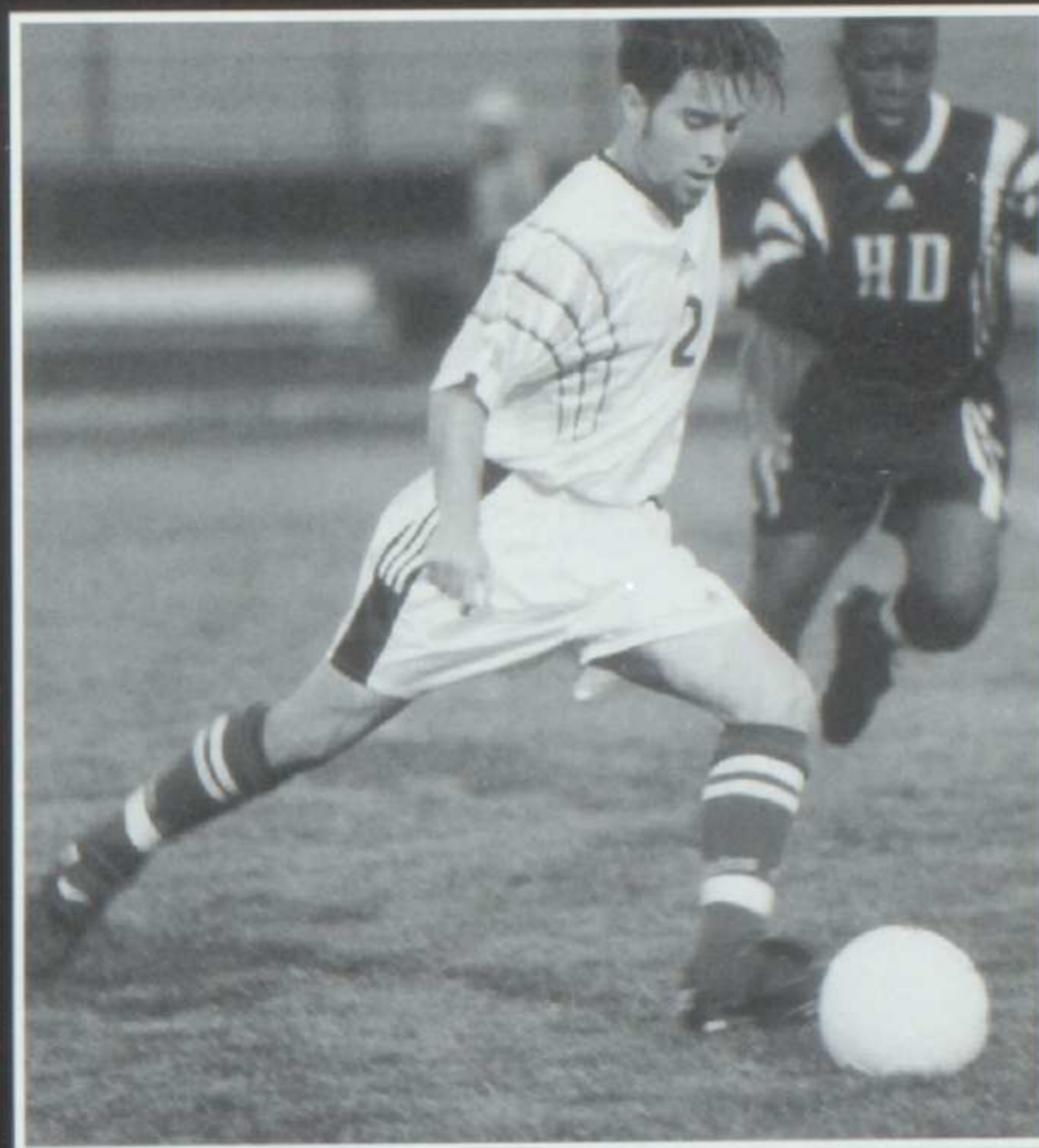




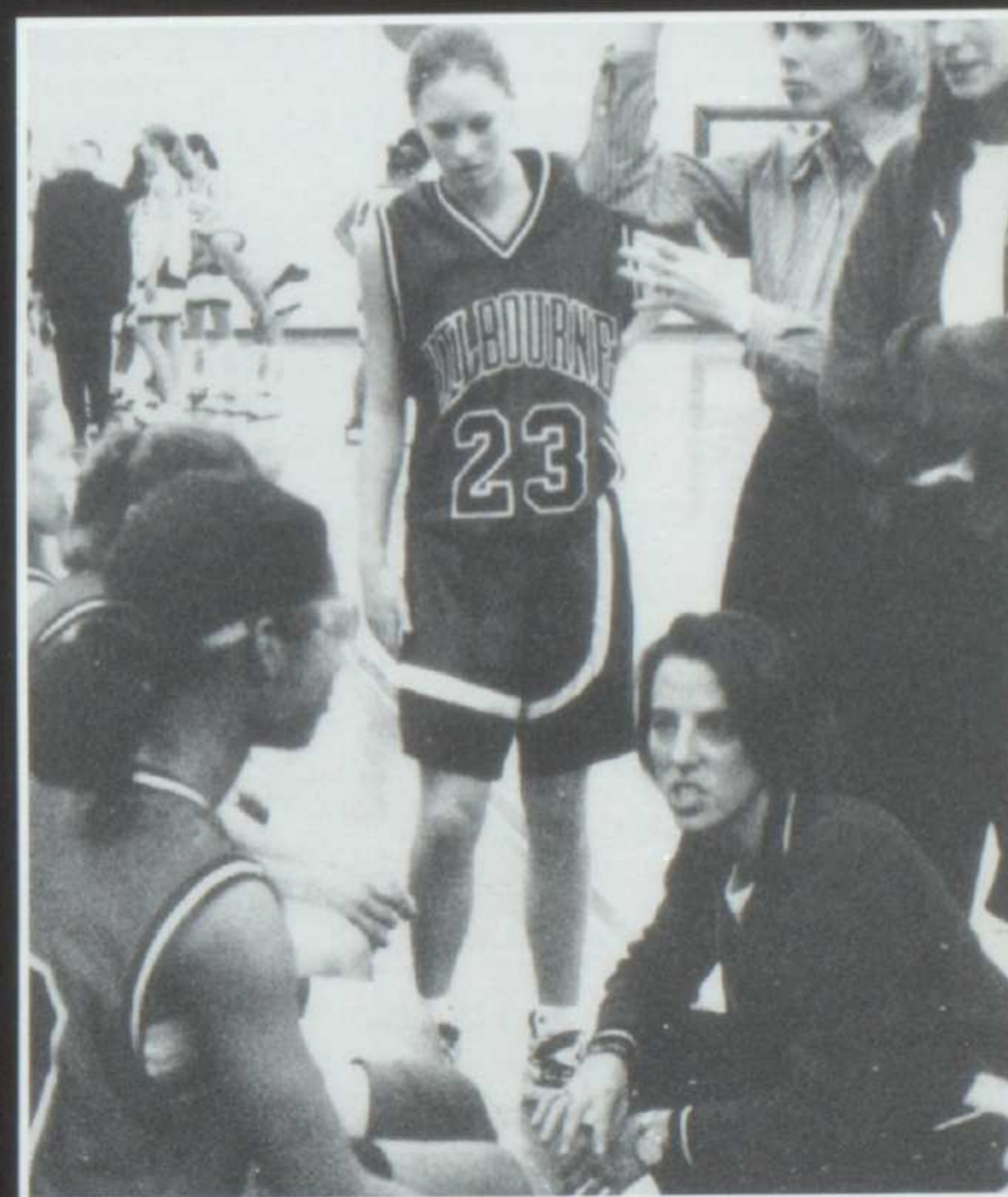

Picked to finish fifth in their division, only the players, coaches, and fans believed in this team. When we blew away London, 78-8, we knew this season would be something special. Obi Chukwumah said, "We had a great season. It was great because we did it with no one believing in us but ourselves."

With a potent offense led by a diverse running attack of breakaway artists Keith Warren and Ryan Sprague, followed by bulldozer Ben Roewer, the Wolves broke many rushing records. To balance the attack was a prolific passing game with Micah Faler throwing to the dynamic duo of John Bullard and Darren Hicks. This was made possible with the dominating blocking of tackles Kevin Morris and Kevin West, guards John Stobart and Eric Noel, and center Jamie Romano. However, it was the defense that held the Wolves together. Corners Keith Warren and Obi Chukwumah along with safety Justin Dauer kept opponents' passing in check, while the rest of the defense focused on the run. Tackles Joe Craig and Jordan Stockwell plugged the middle, leaving ends Nate Jackson, Mike Leahy and Dwayne Myers to attack from the outside. With such a strong defensive line, the linebackers were able to make many spectacular plays. Inside Linebackers Andy Londergan and Sean Edgell stuffed up the inside run, and outside linebackers Mike Marks, Joel Kovacs, and Joel Miller destroyed anything outside.

With such a powerful offense and stingy defense, the Wolves devoured their opponents: they destroyed fifth ranked Hilliard Davidson, 35-14, and seventh ranked Mansfield Madison, 53-32. The Wolves completed the regular season as OCC champs with a 10-0 record and achieved the first playoff win in Kilbourne history. Outweighed by more than fifty pounds per man on the line, the Wolves overcame a 14-3 halftime deficit and won, 38-20. Said senior Kevin Morris, "You can measure someone's height, weight, and speed, but the most important thing that can't be measured is heart. And this team has more heart than any other." Facing muddy, cold, and windy conditions, the team lost the next playoff game, 38-6, to Upper Arlington, ending their winning streak.

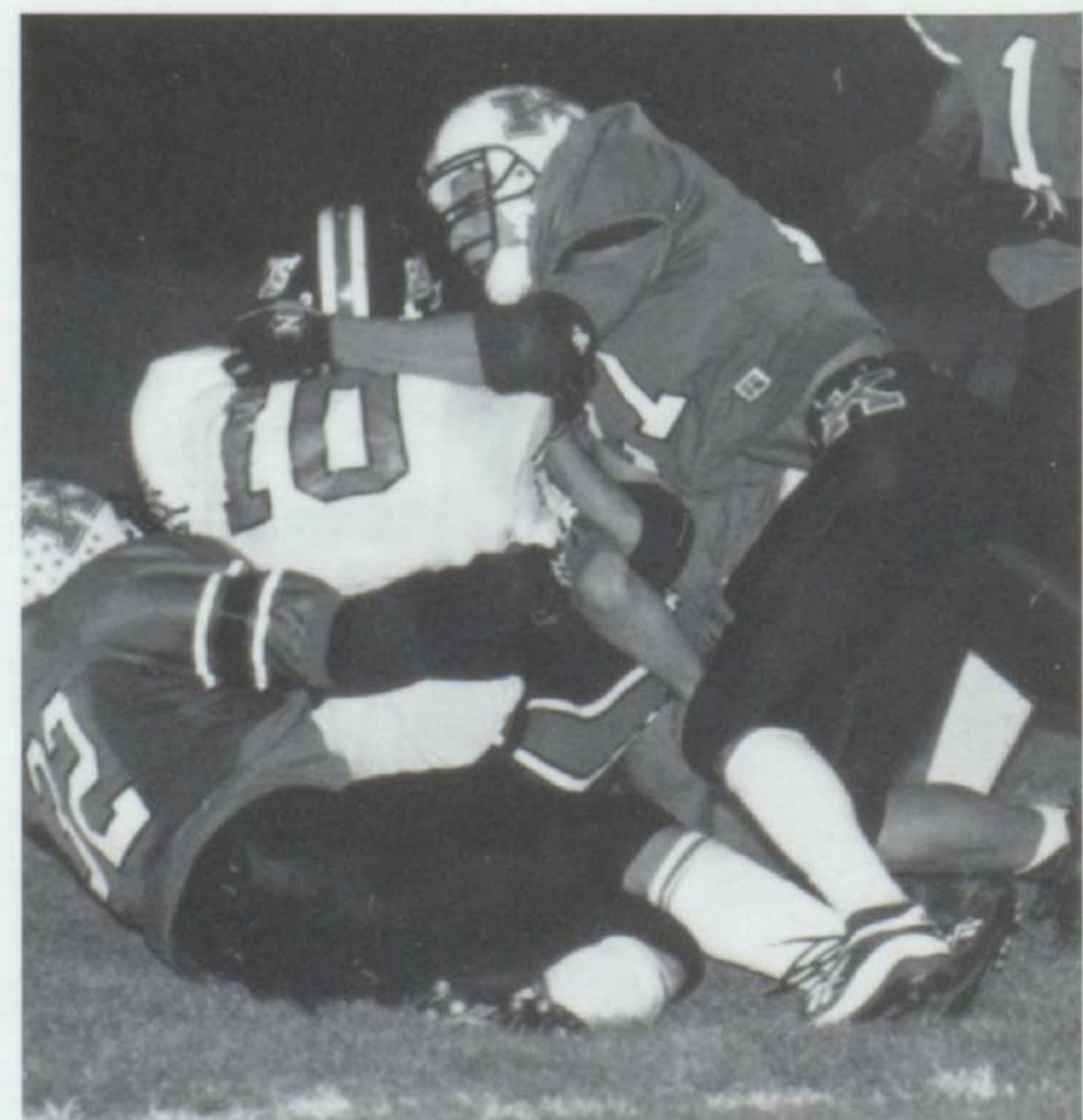
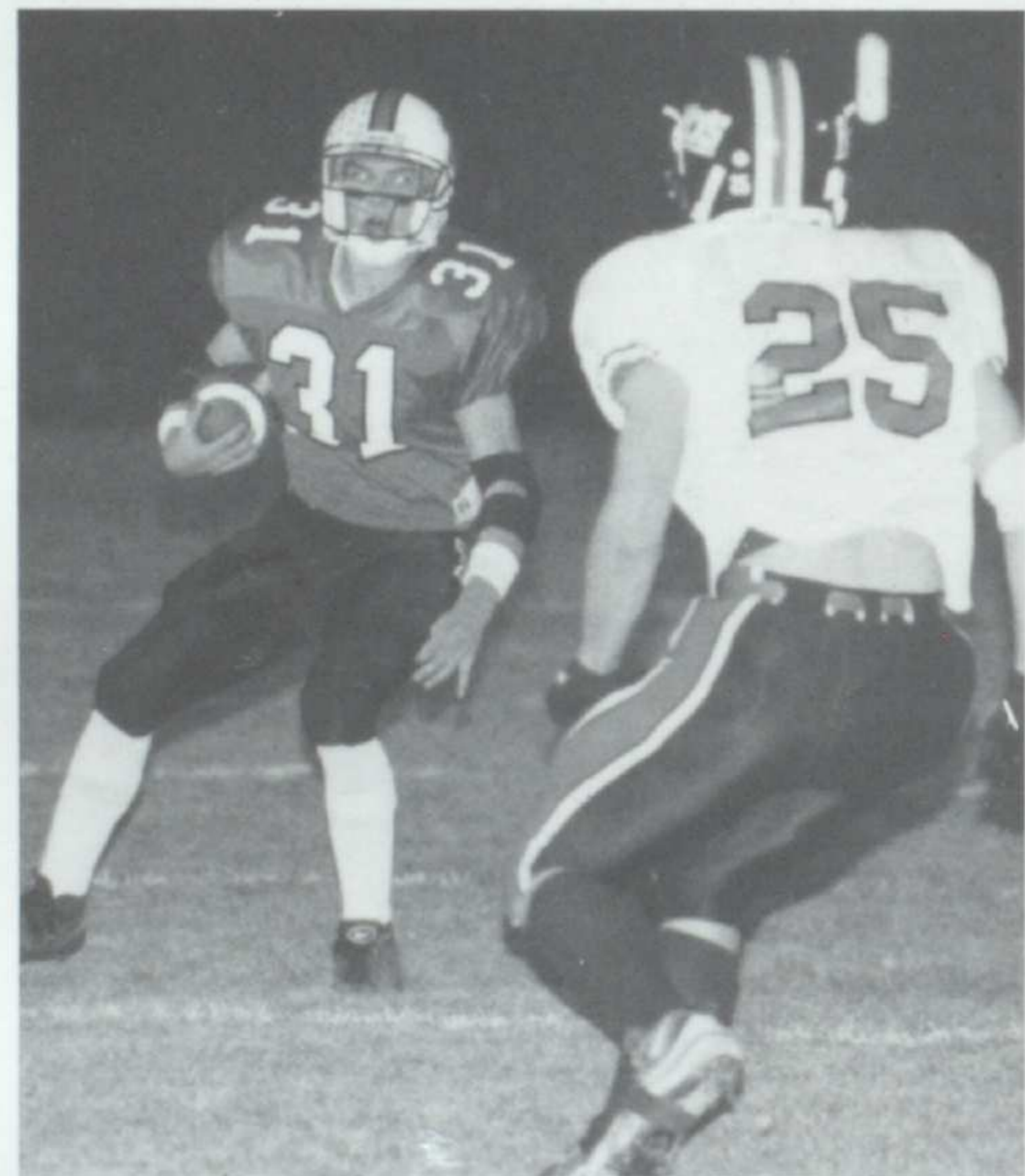
The football team had many individual standouts. Micah Faler was Second Team all State, First Team all District, and OCC Player of the Year. Special Mention all District awards went to John Bullard, Sean Edgell, Joel Miller, Ryan Sprague, Keith Warren, and Kevin West. Honorable Mention went to Ben Roewer, Jordan Stockwell, and Kyle Turano. By winning the OCC championship, the Wolves garnered many places on the all OCC team. First Team OCC went to Micah Faler, John Bullard, Kevin West, Sean Edgell, Keith Warren, and Joel Miller. Ben Roewer, Ryan Sprague, Kevin Morris, Nate Jackson, and Jordan Stockwell captured Second Team OCC and Obi Chukwumah earned Honorable Mention OCC. Kyle Turano received Kicking Specialist, and Jamie Romano was OCC Scholar Athlete.

The players were not the only ones to win individual awards. Coach Jeff Gafford was named Co-Coach of the Year in Ohio and OCC Coach of the Year. Modestly, Coach Gafford responded, "The seniors did a great job this year. They really held the team together." The Wolves, led by next year's captains Justin Dauer, Ben Roewer, Micah Faler, and Ryan Sprague, plan on going even farther in the playoffs next year.

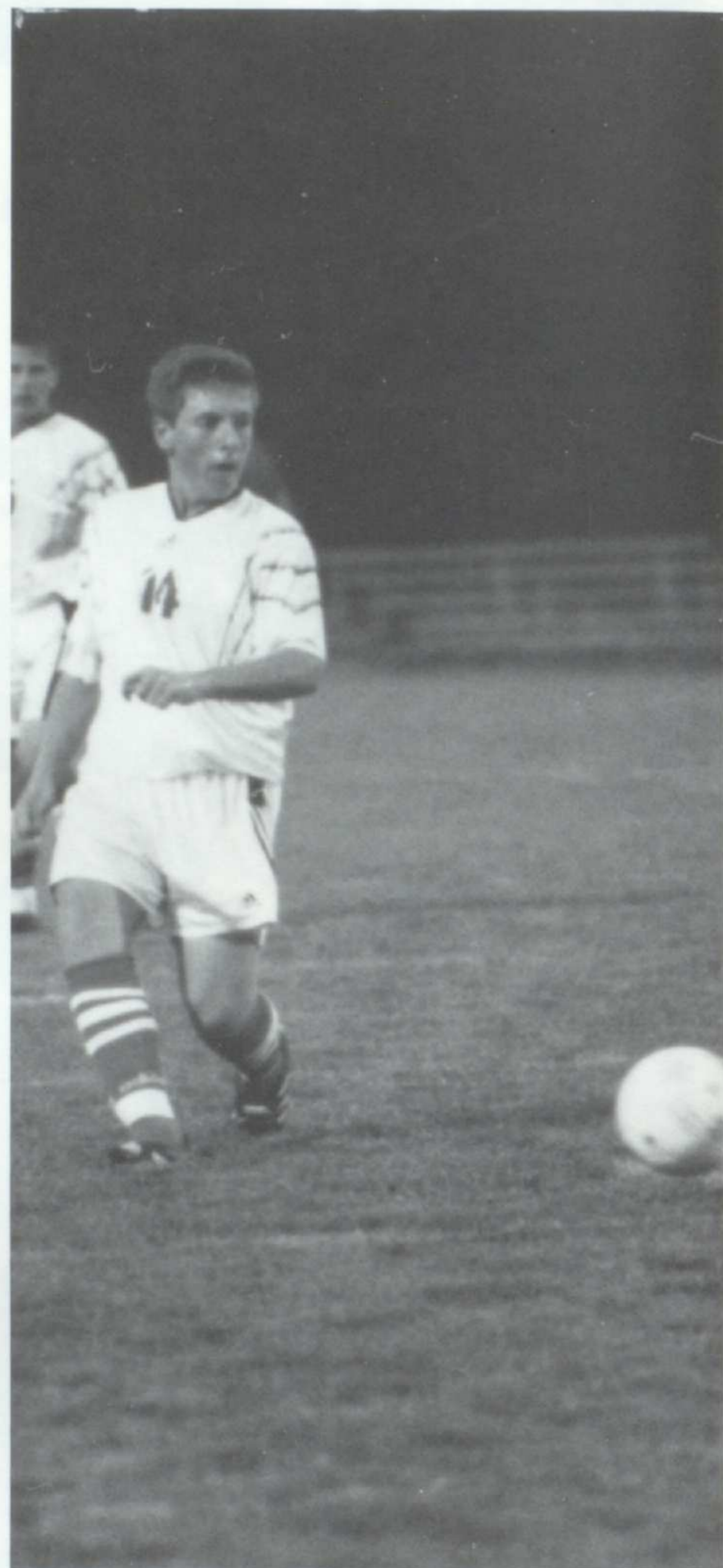

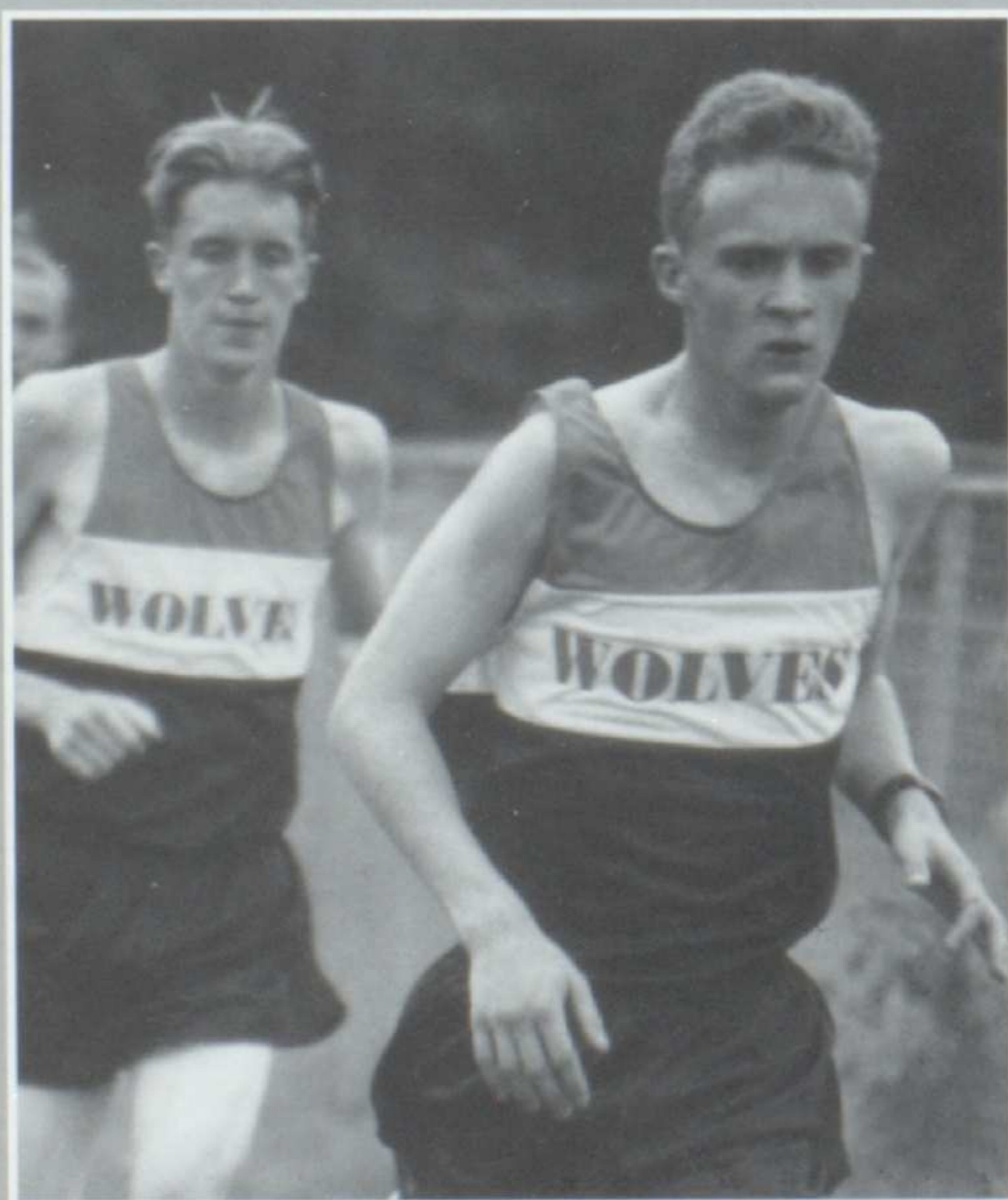

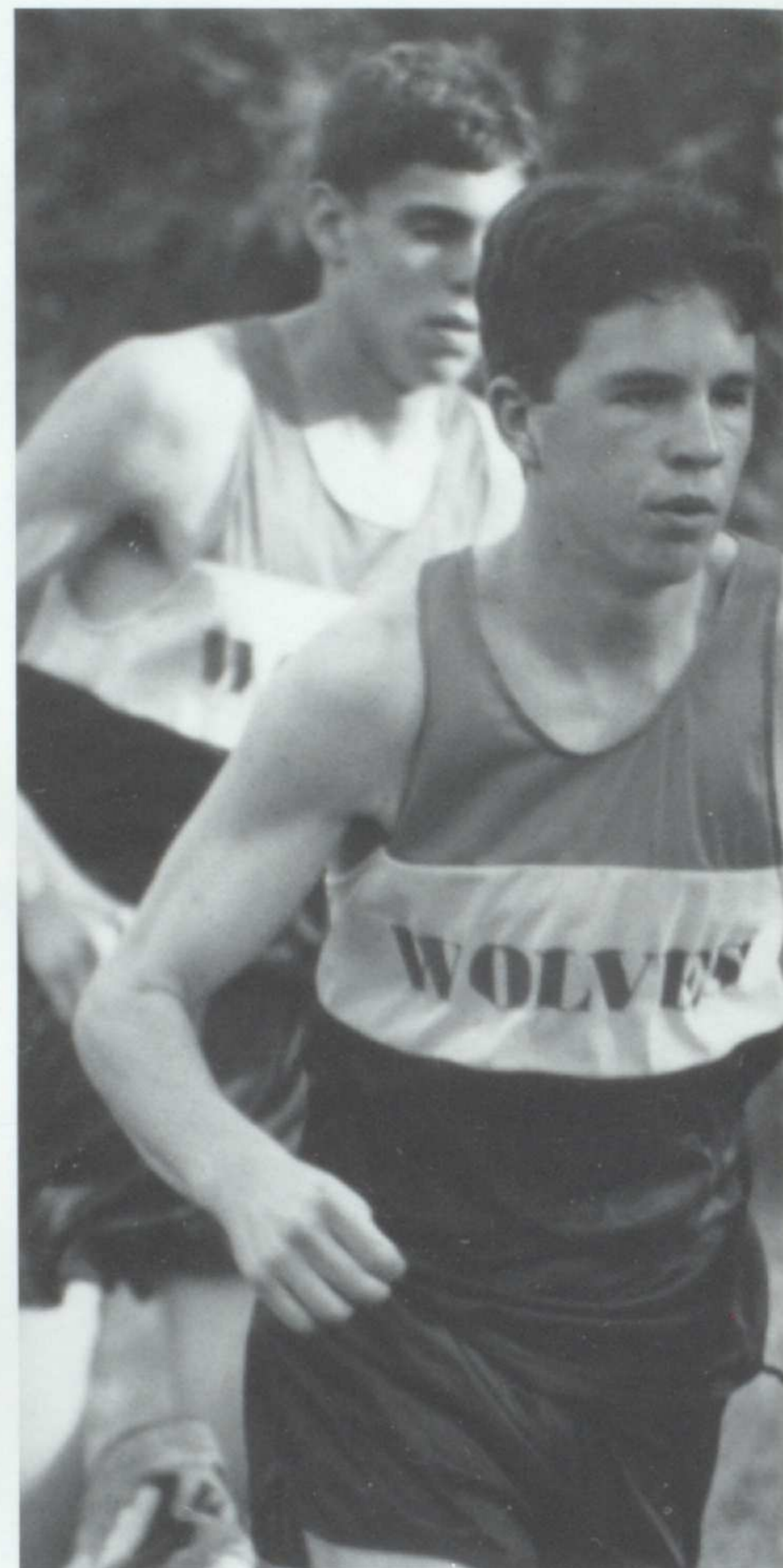

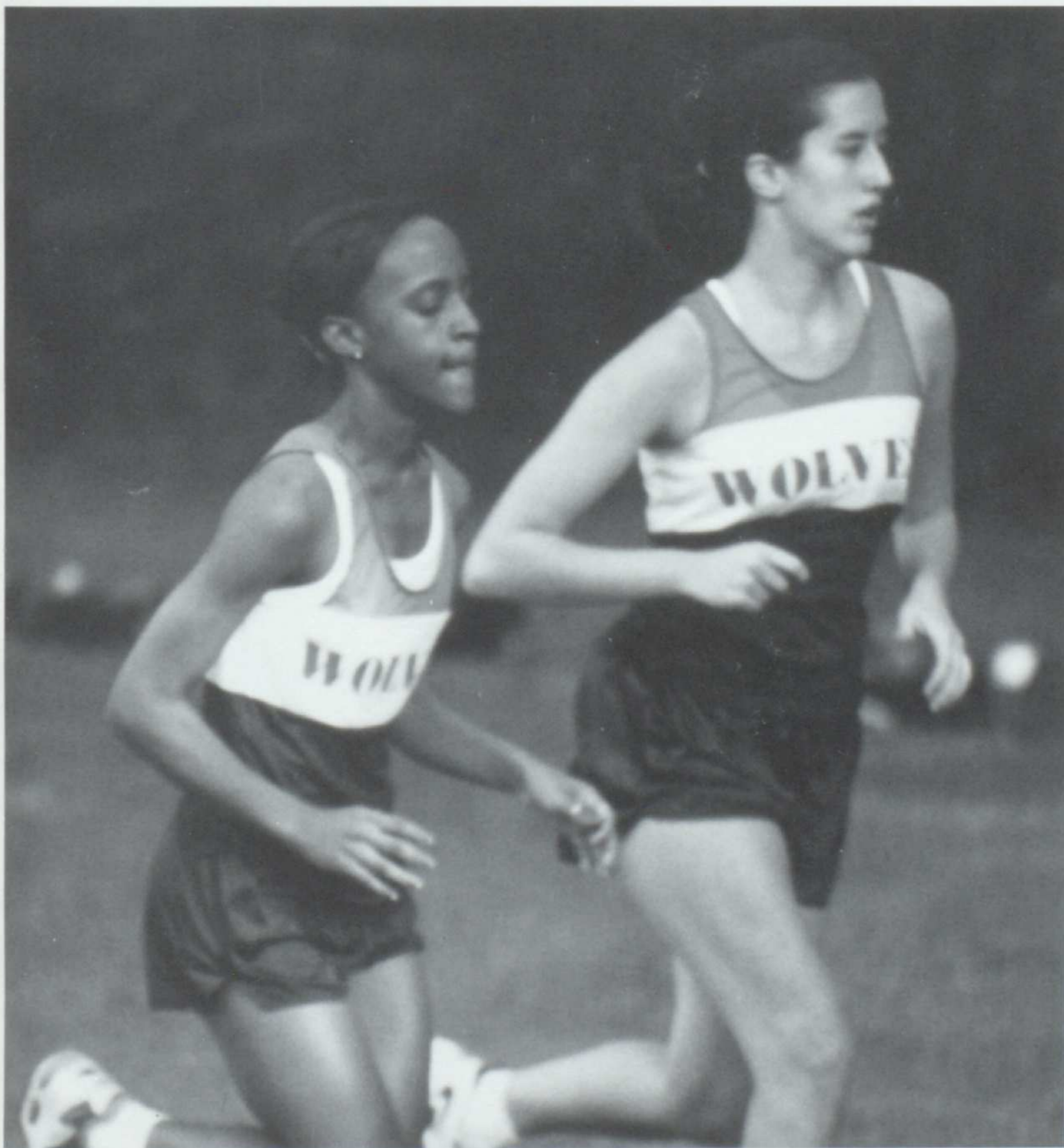

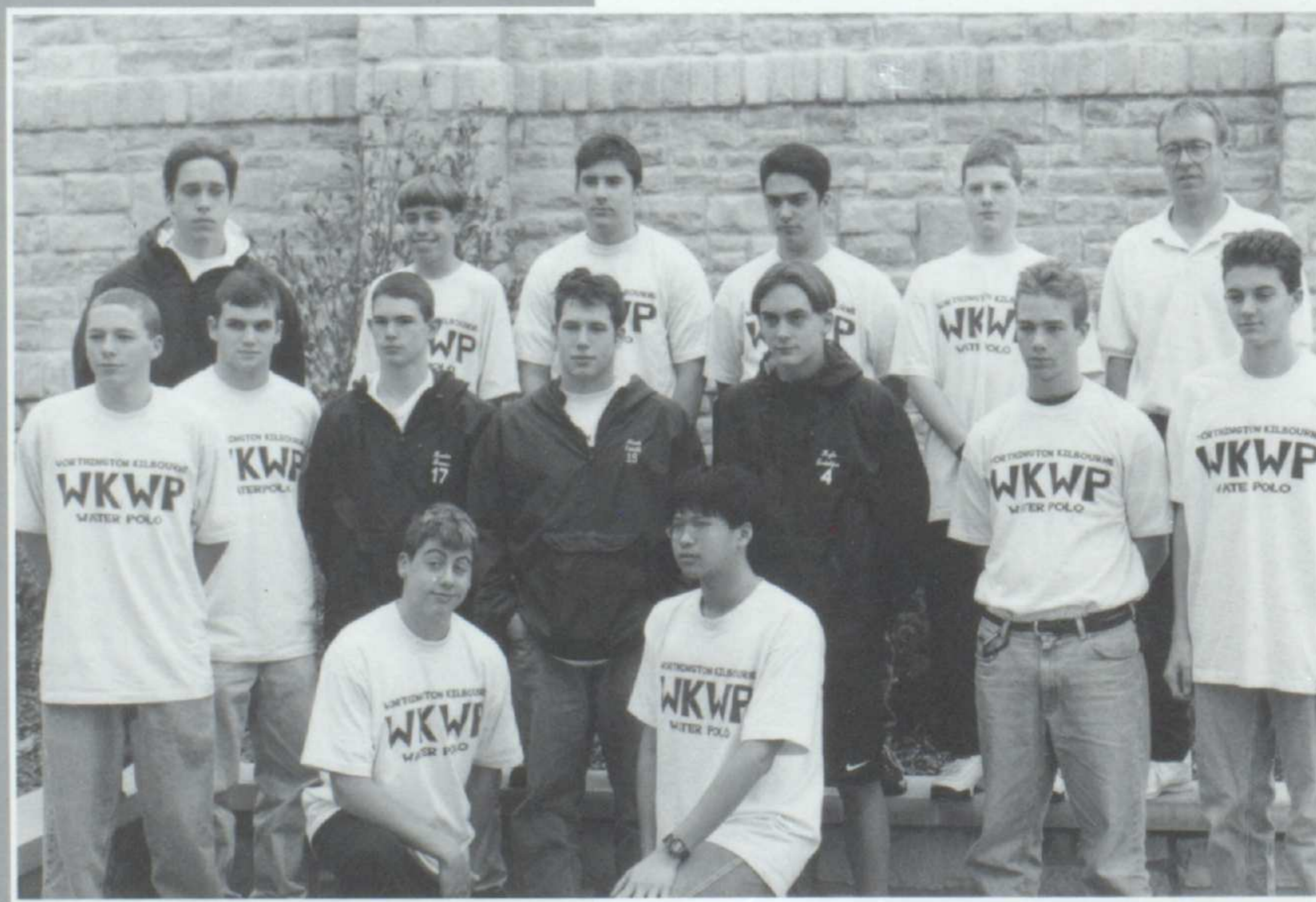

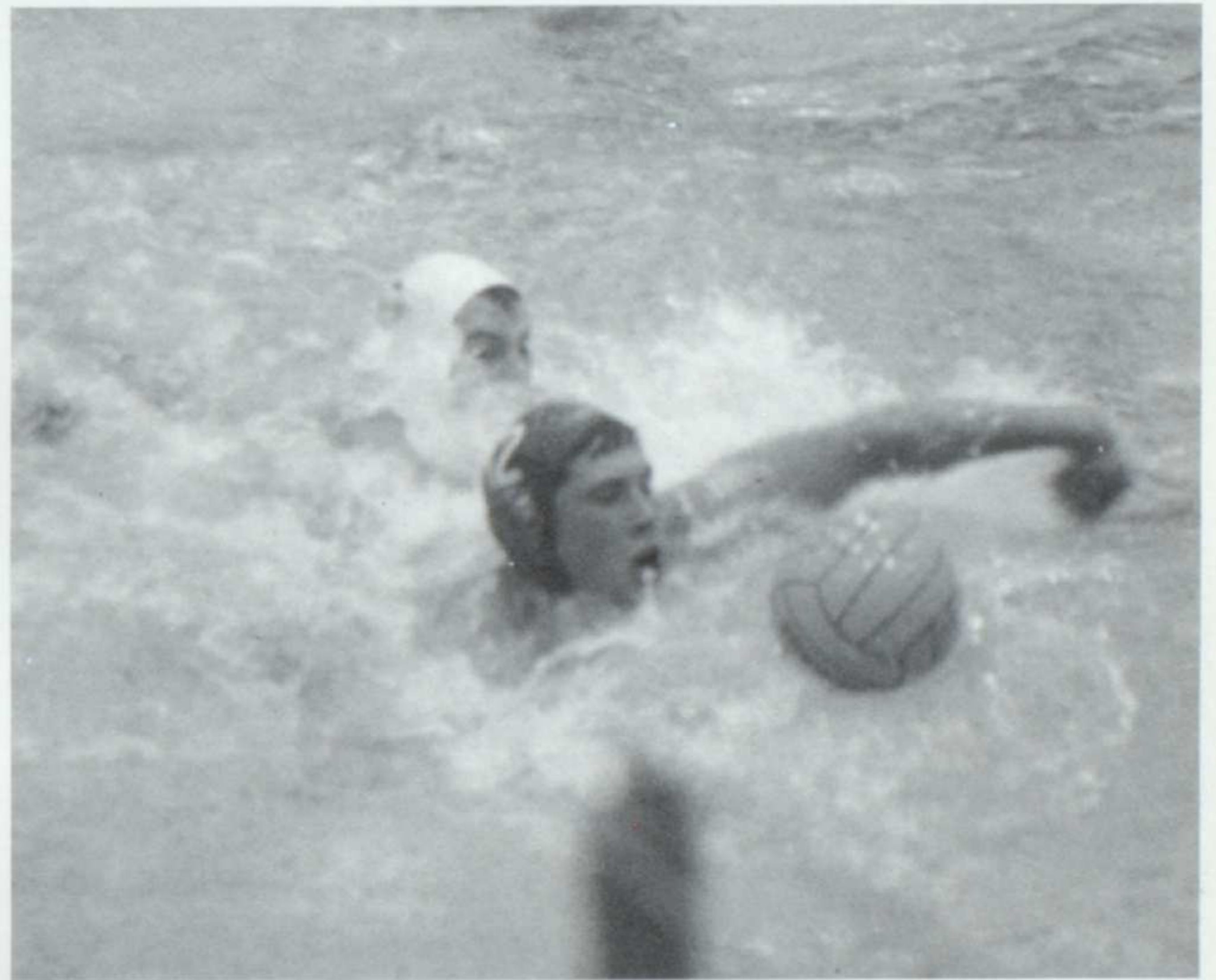

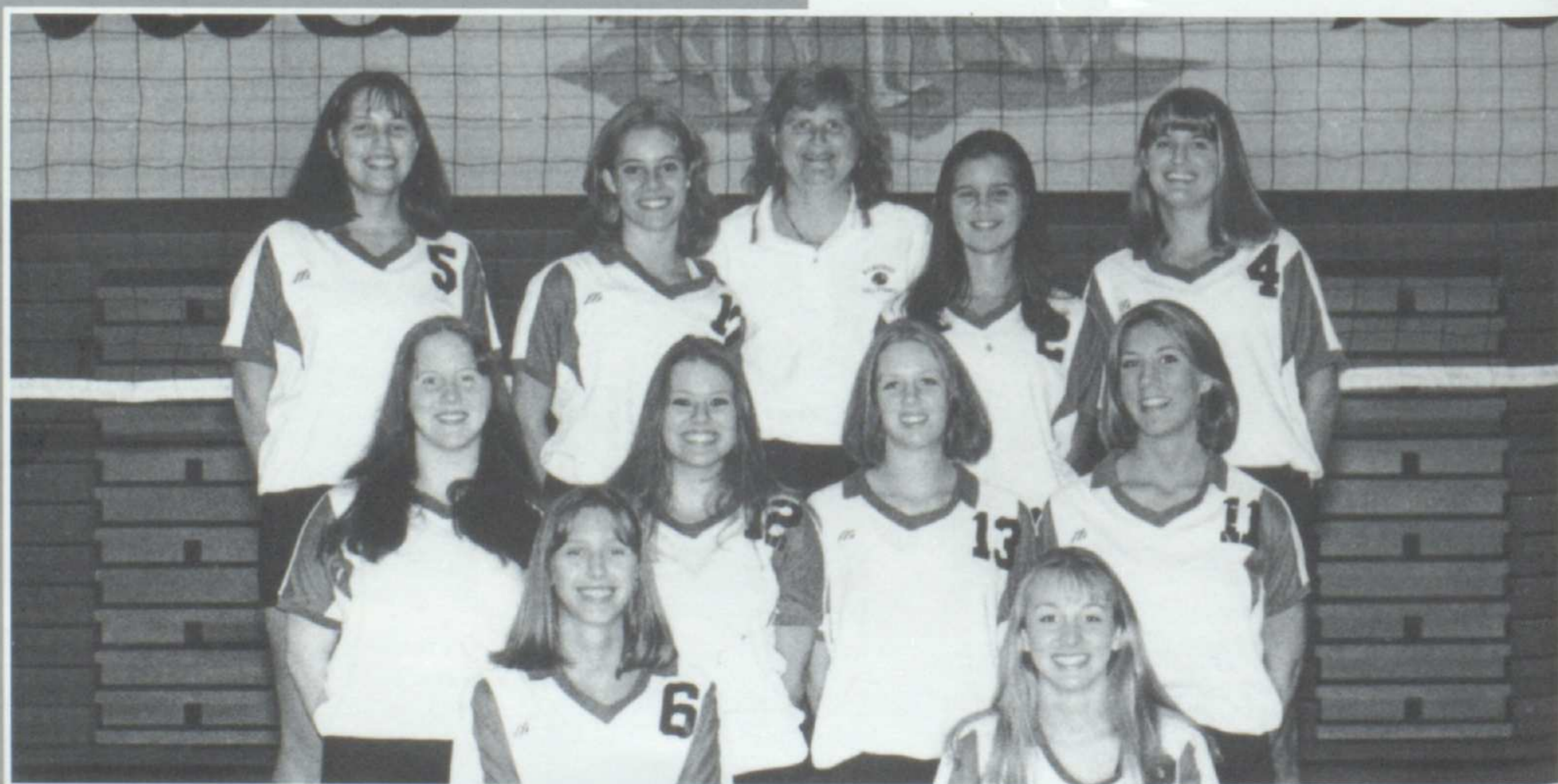

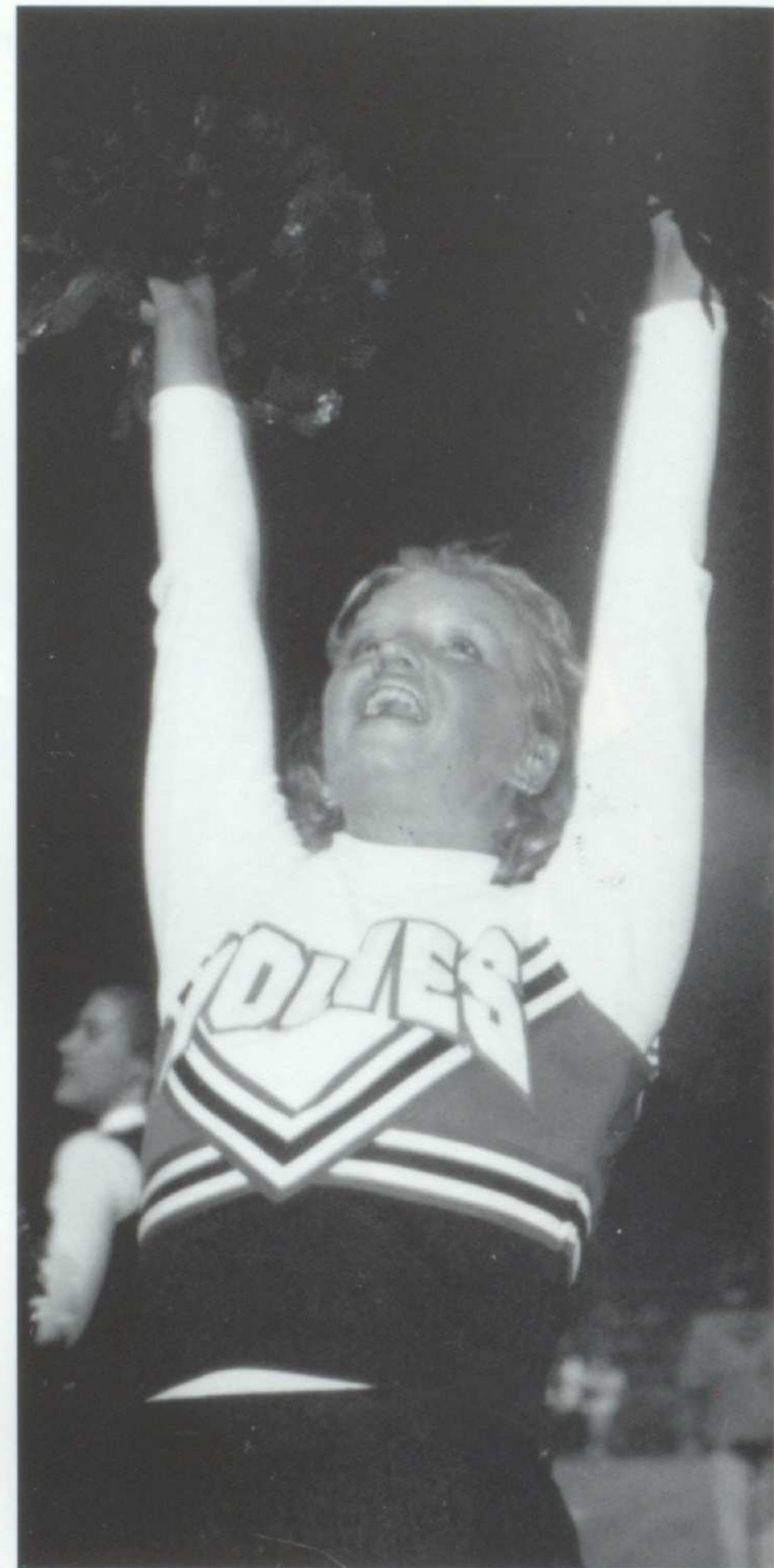

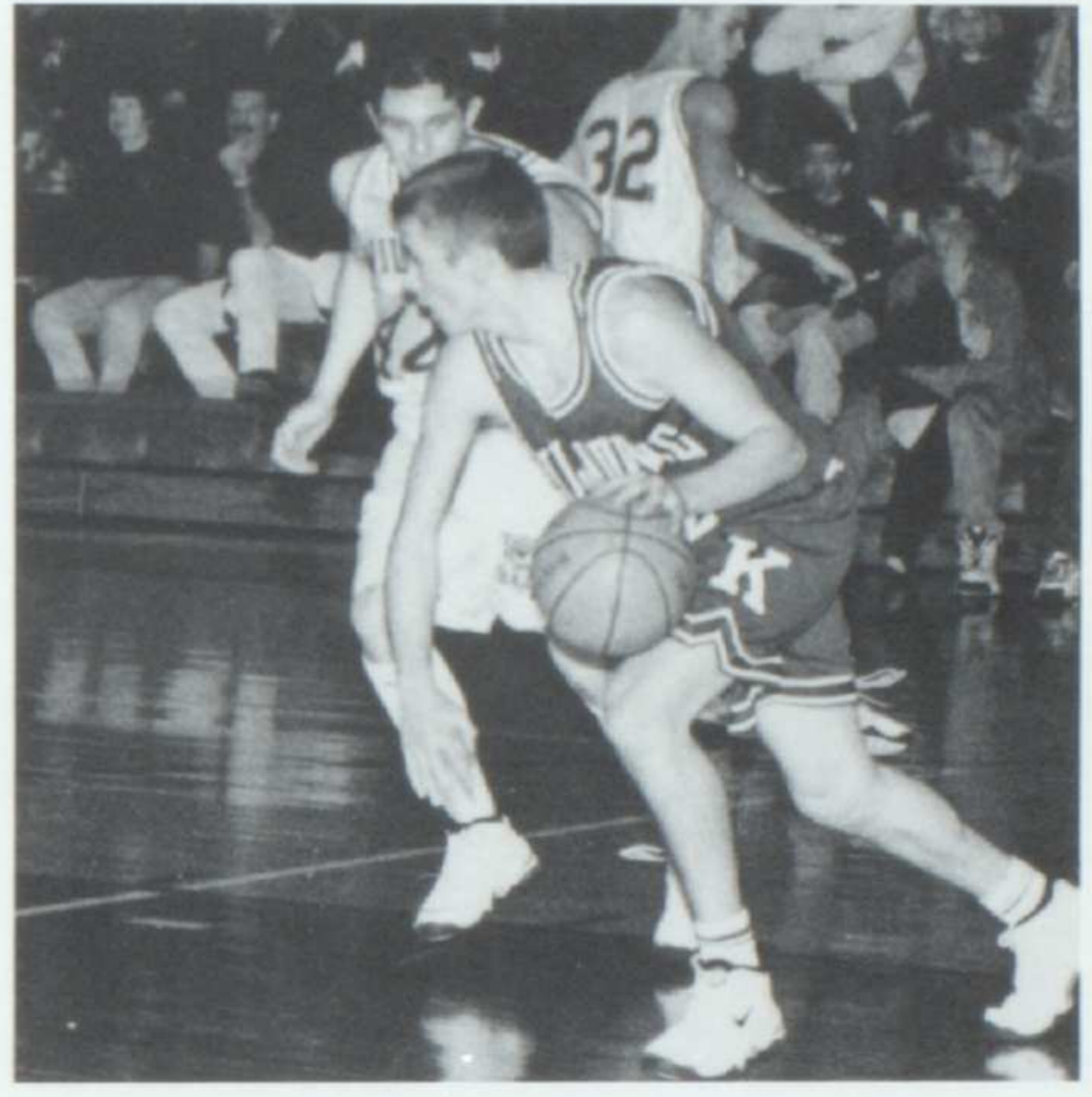

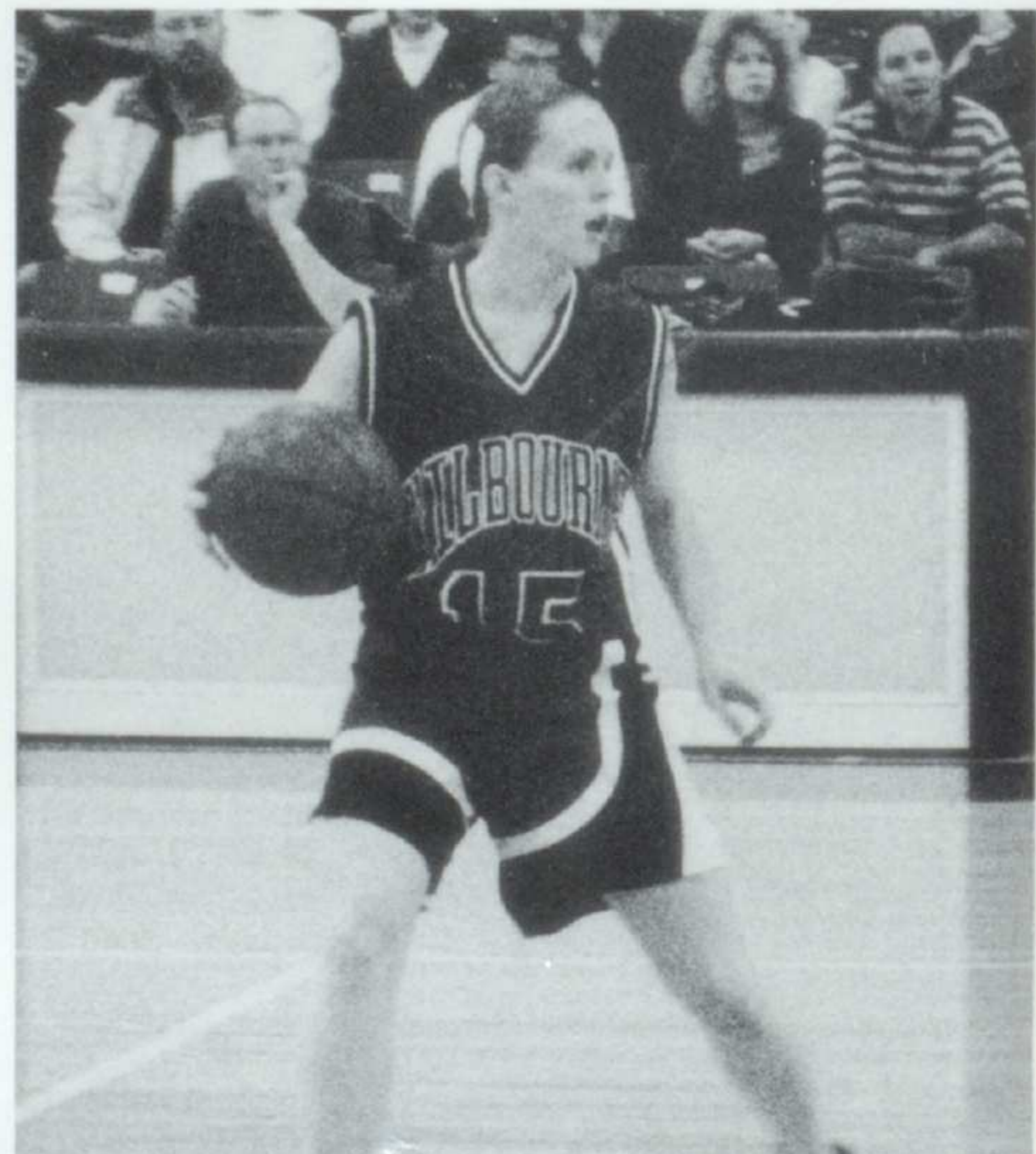

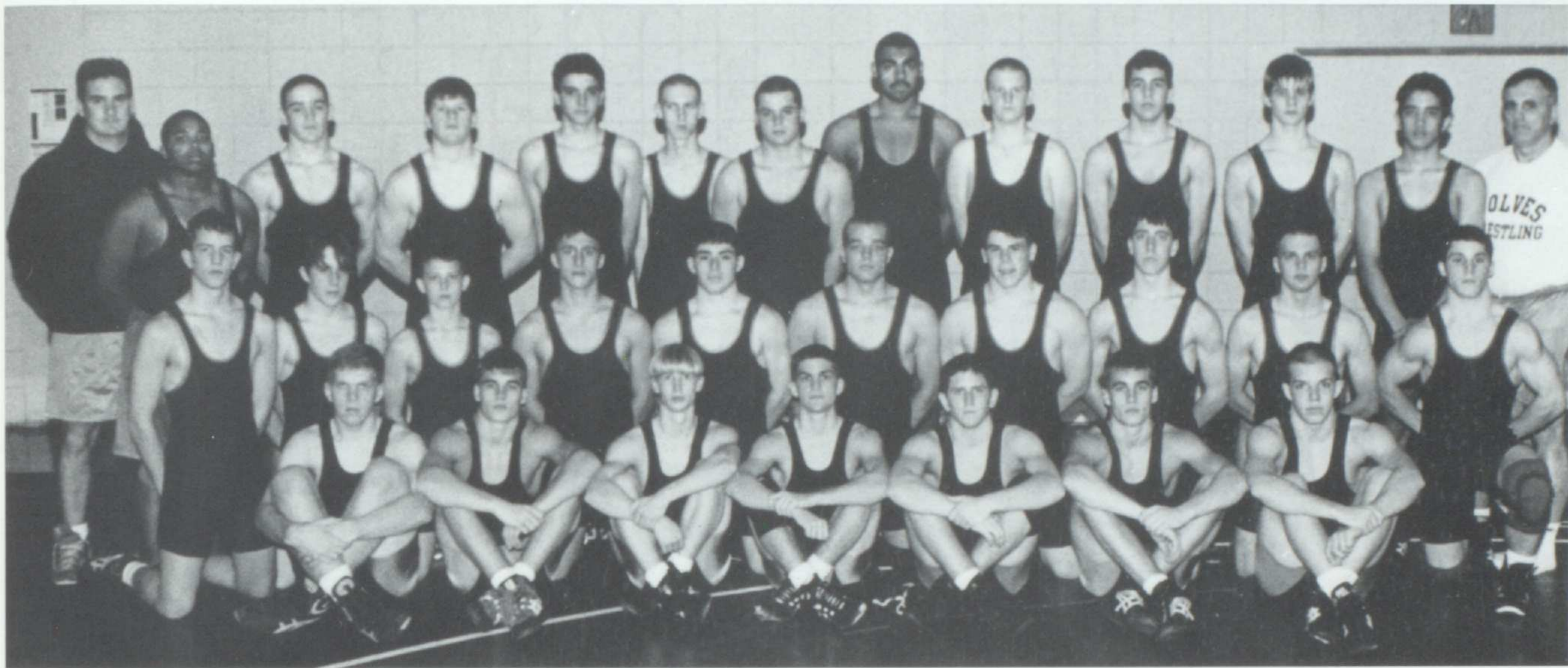

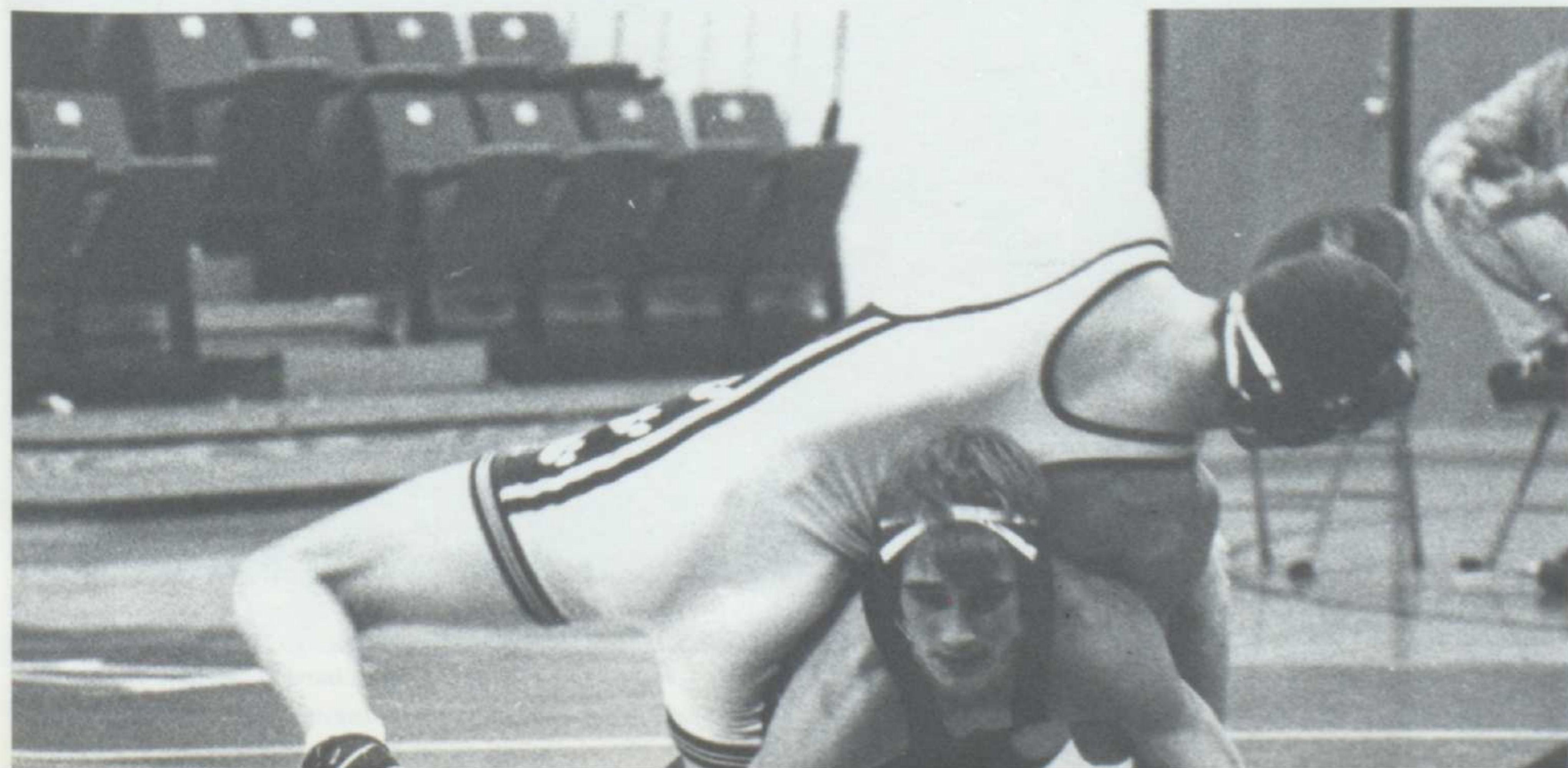

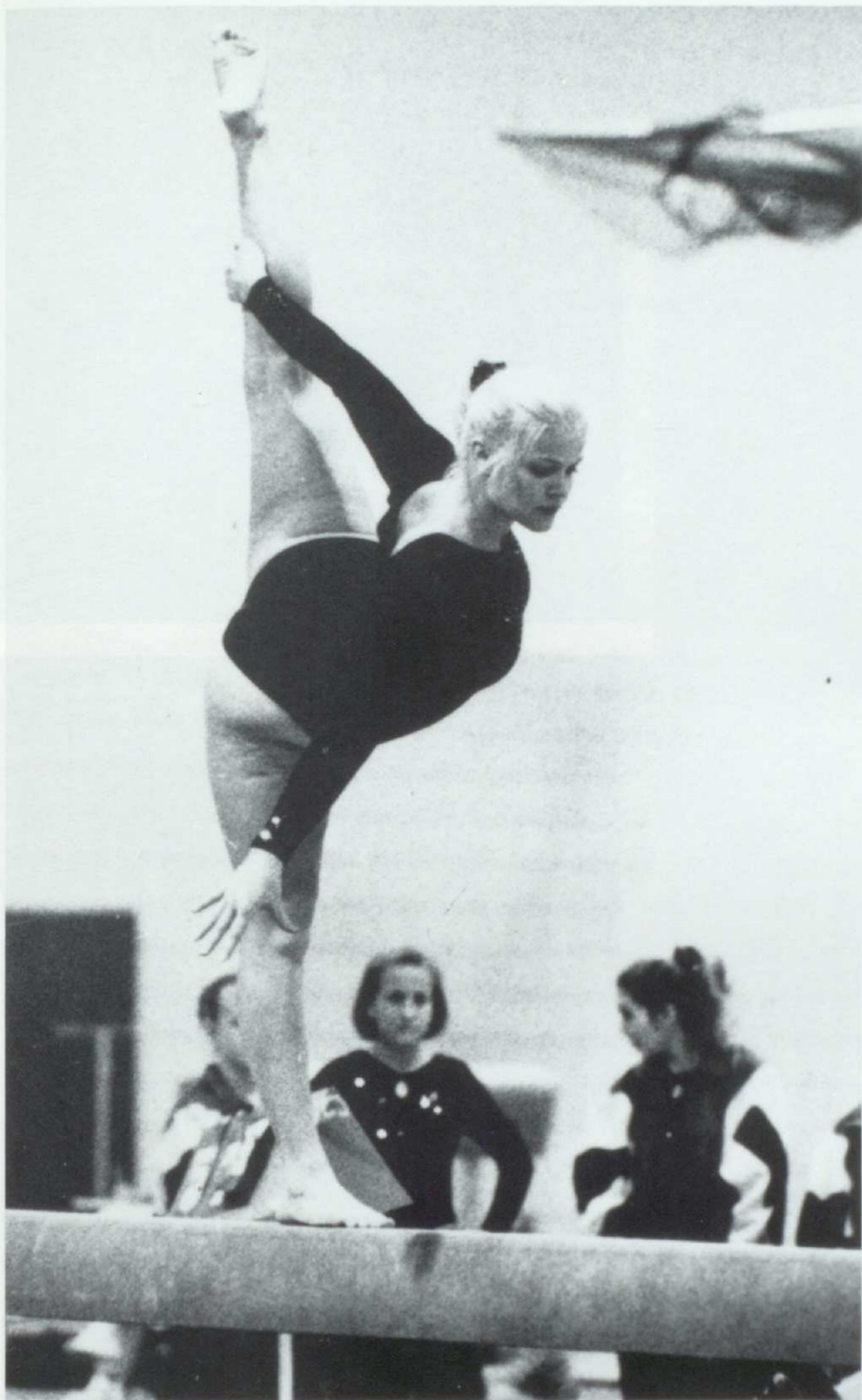

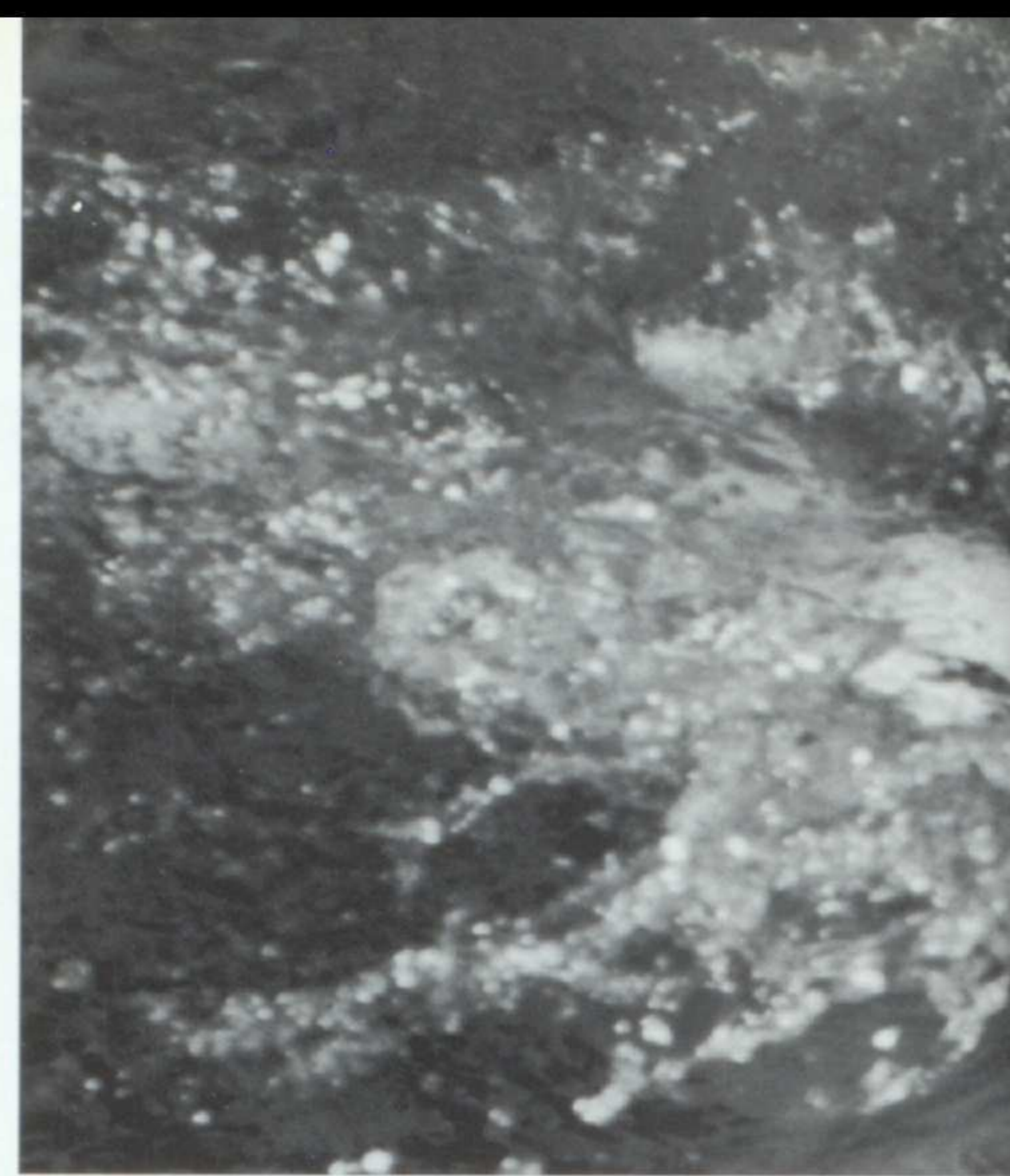

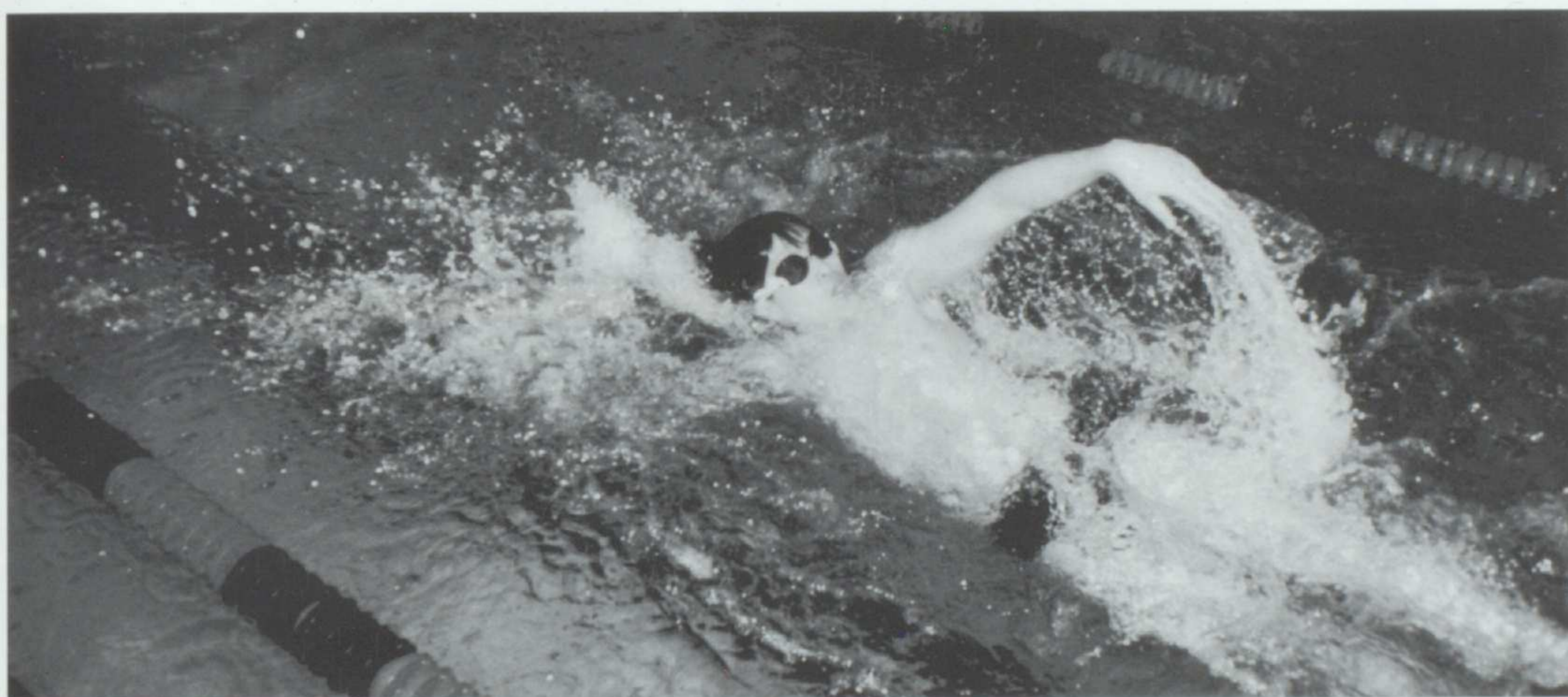

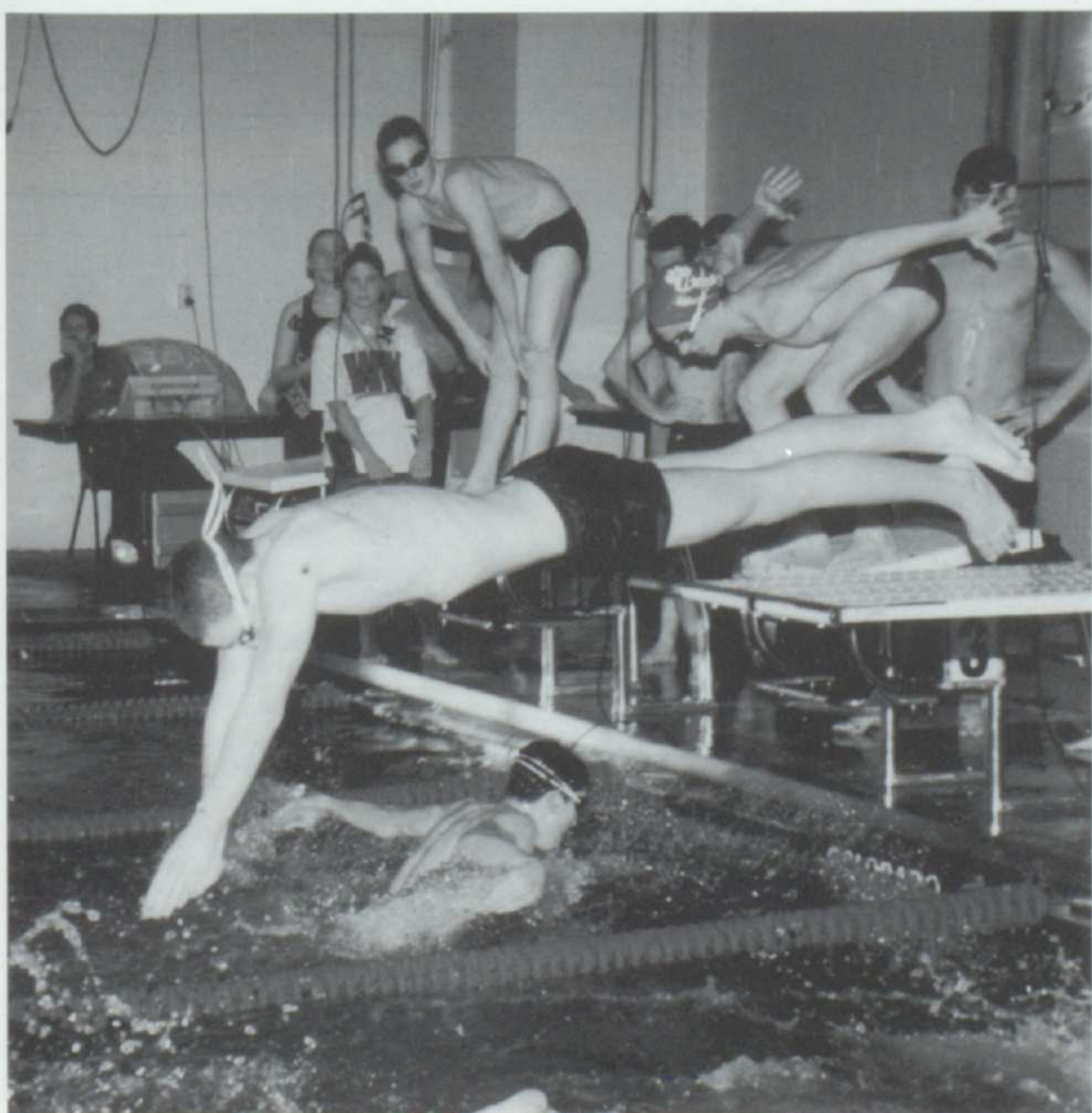

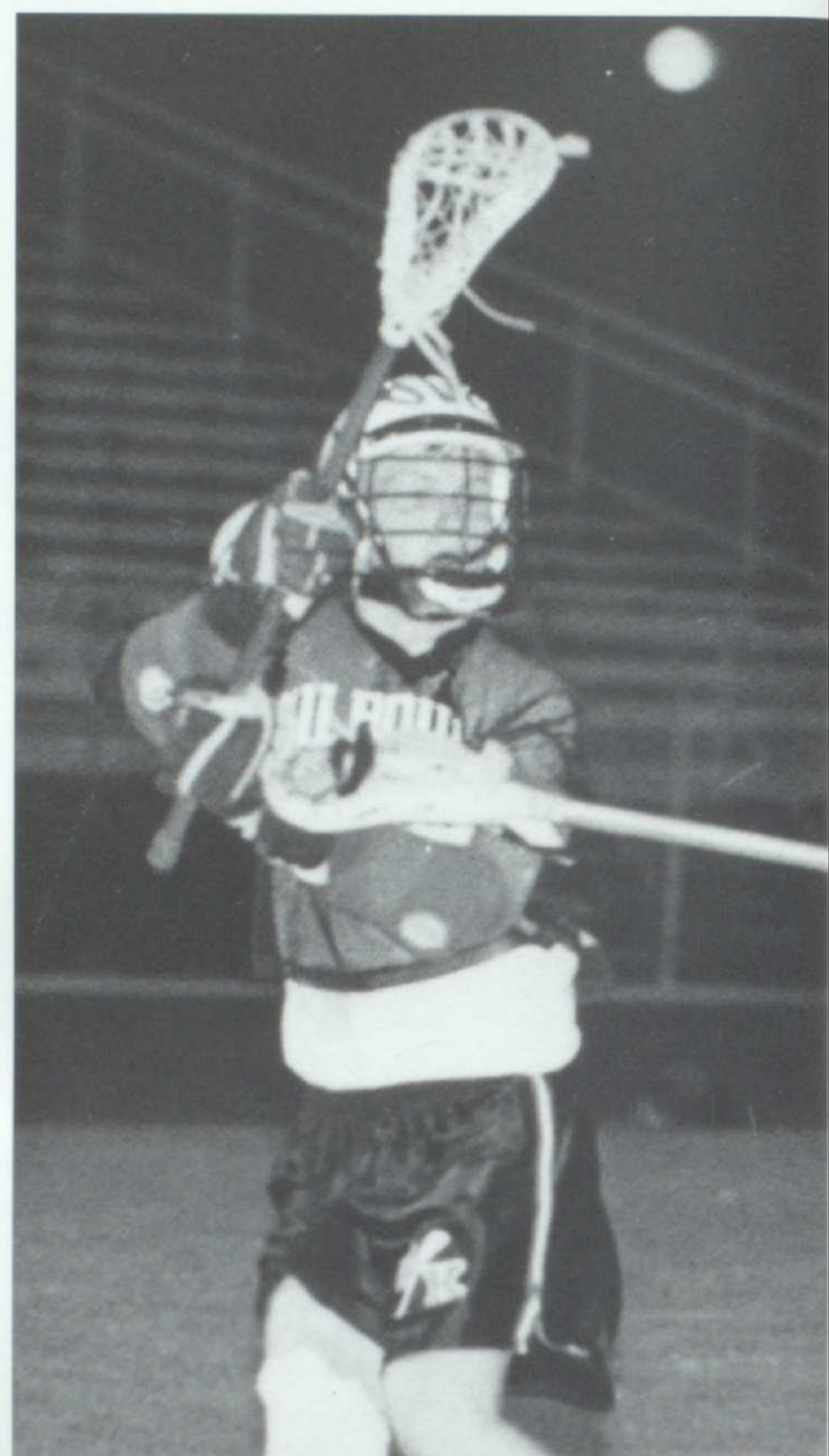

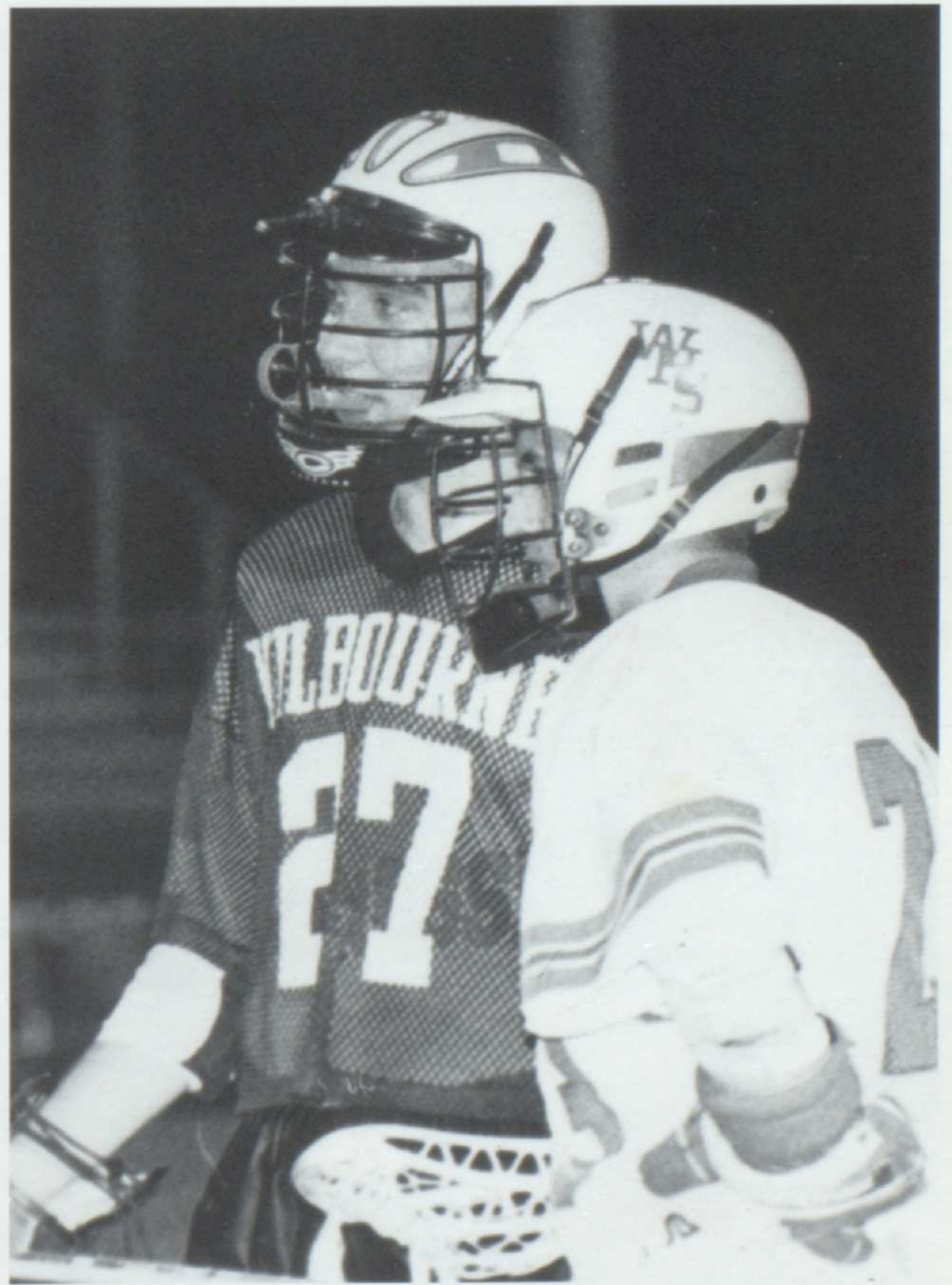

Many of the players broke into the season with a number of games in Florida during spring break. It was both a learning and fun experience for the guys.

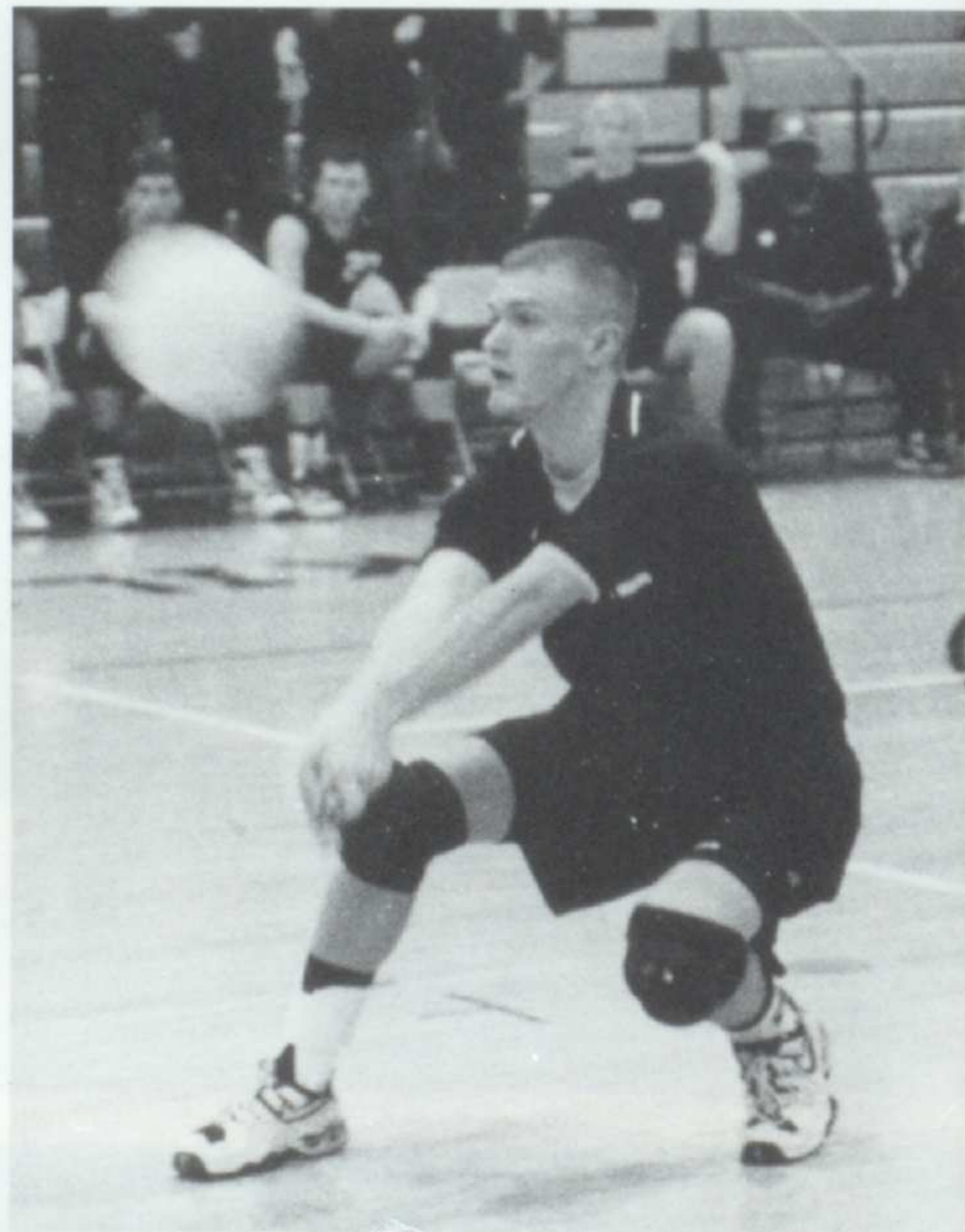
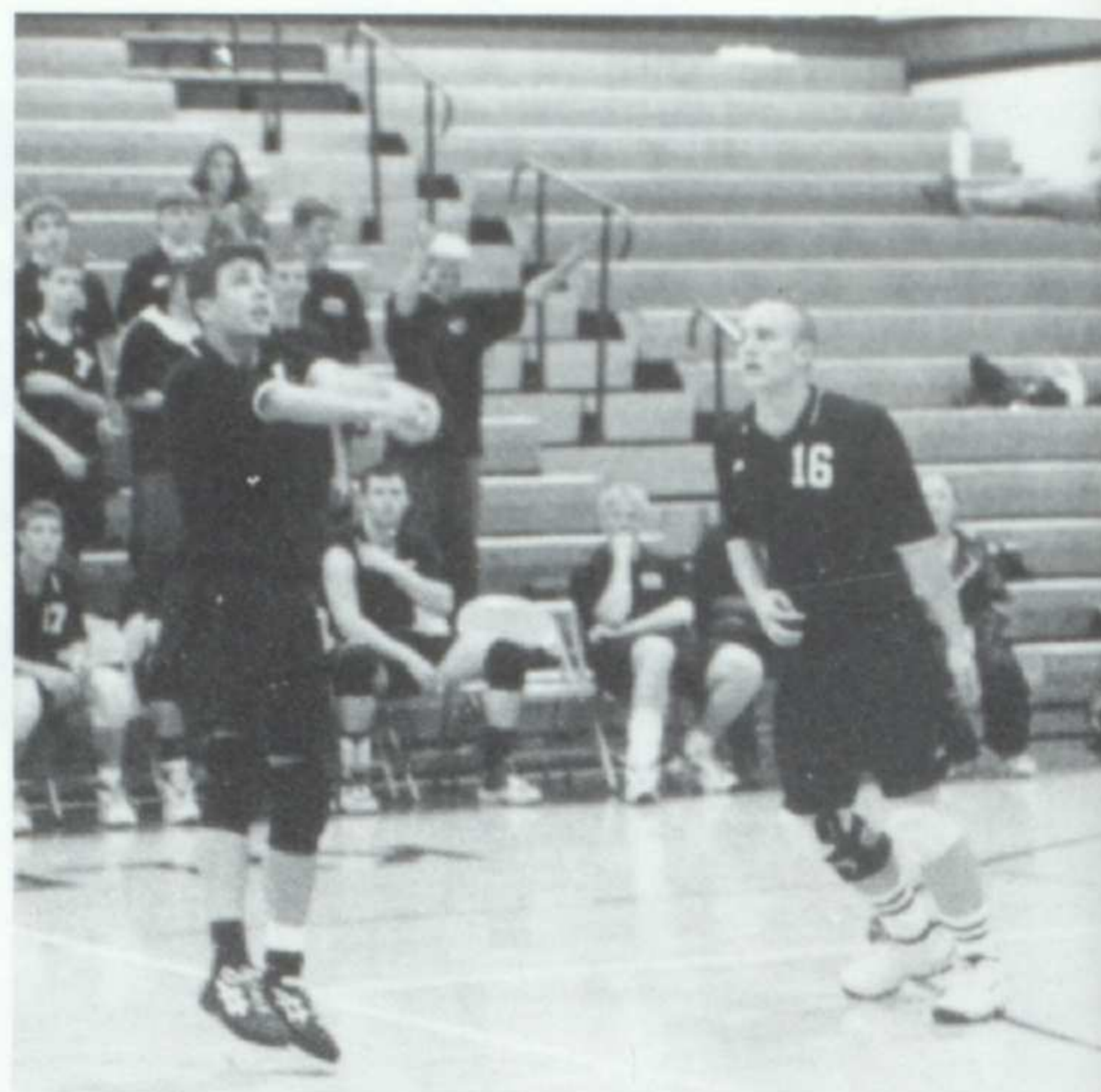

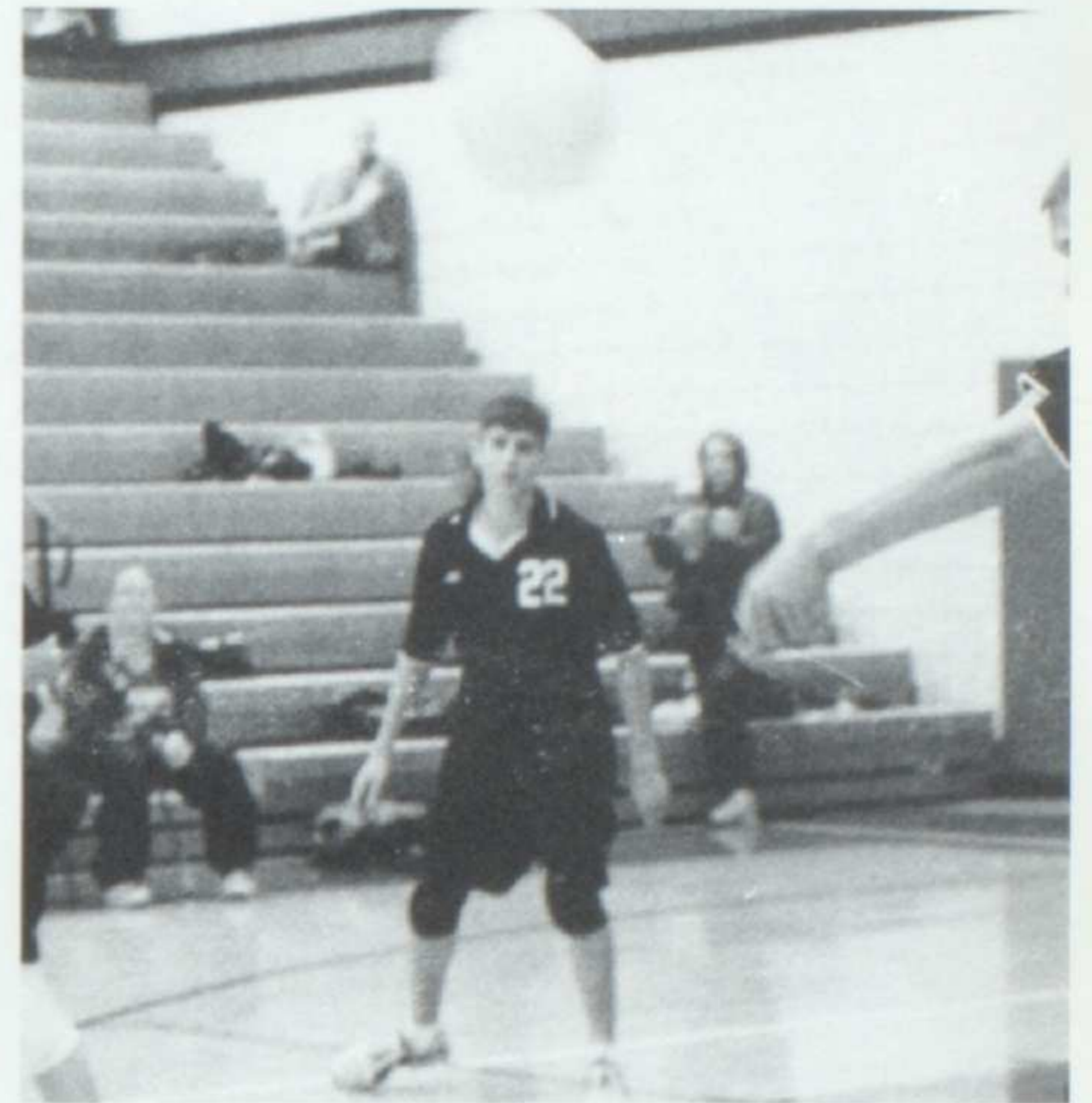

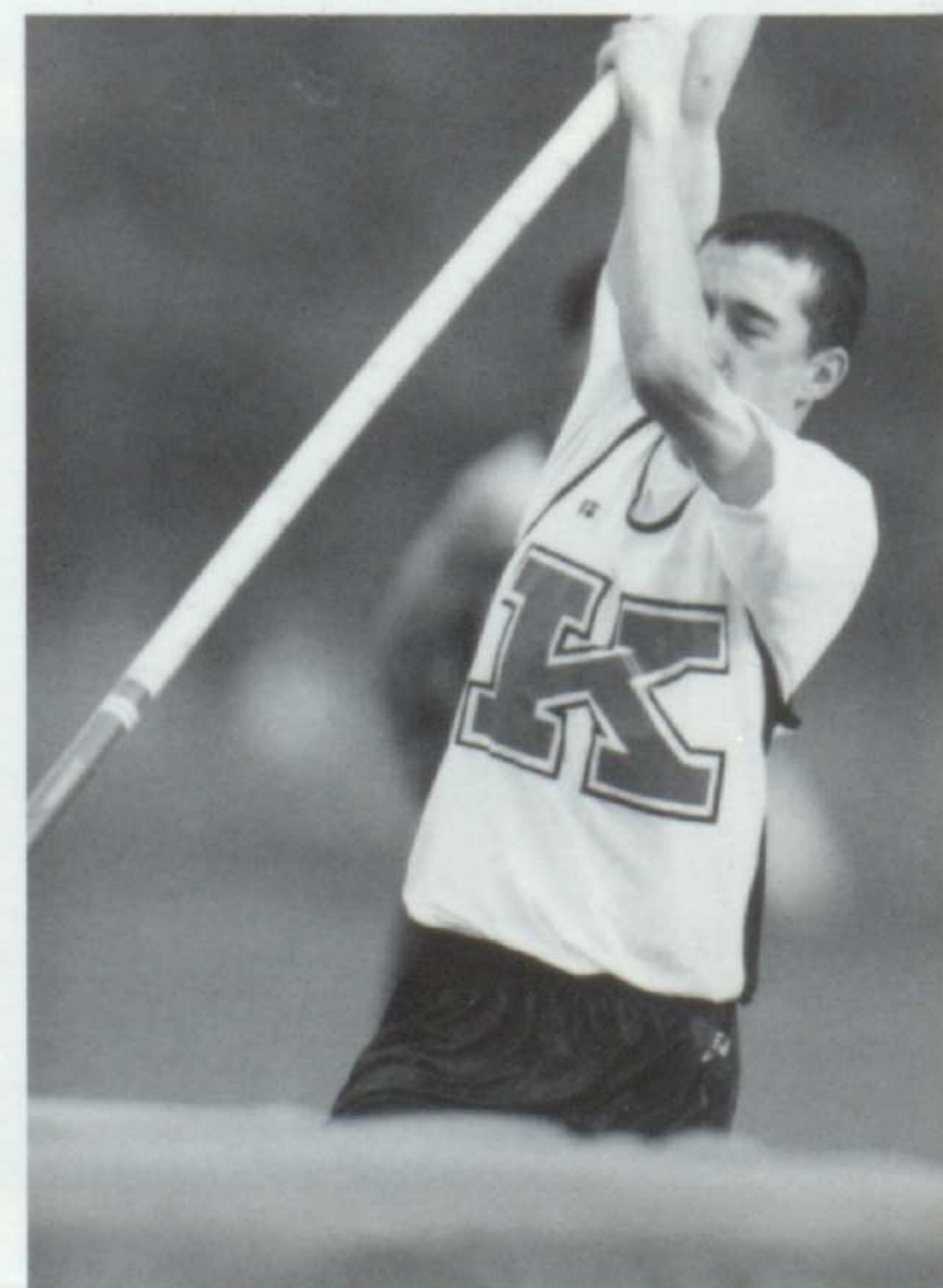

Clare Kelleher showed she has the potential to become a great distance runner while the other freshman, Ashley Early, started her track career on the right foot shattering the long jump record. Co-captain Bethany Gaskill, though, was the catalyst of the team. The team's lone state qualifier, she dominated the competition including a second place at districts and breaking the mile and two-mile Kilbourne records. Commented Coach Williams on her best distance runner, "Bethany is one of the best I have ever coached. She is the best pacer I have ever had."

With a strong junior class and young standouts Early and Kelleher, along with two-time state qualifier Bethany Gaskill, the Wolves will look to be one of the girls track powerhouses next season.

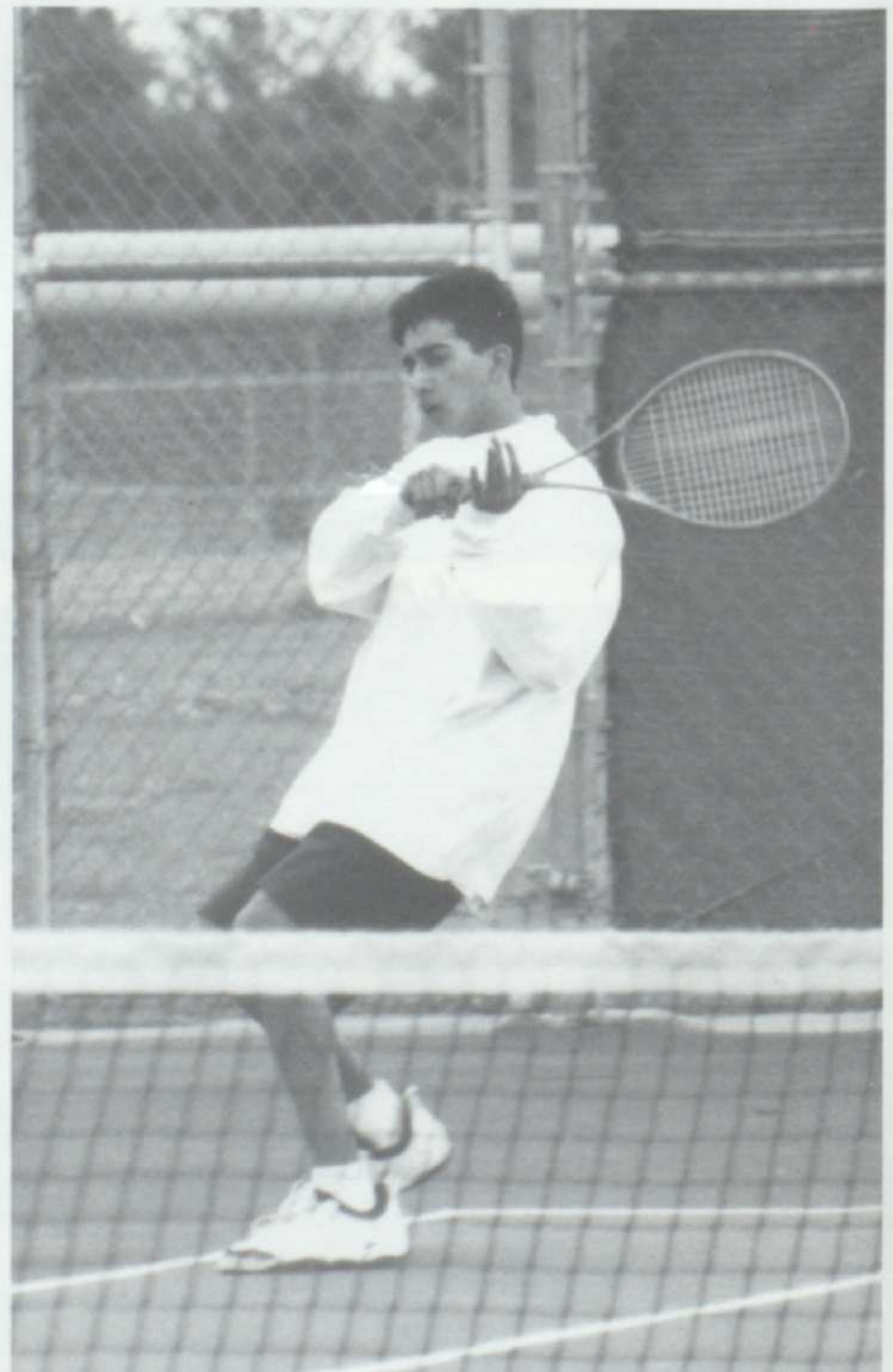

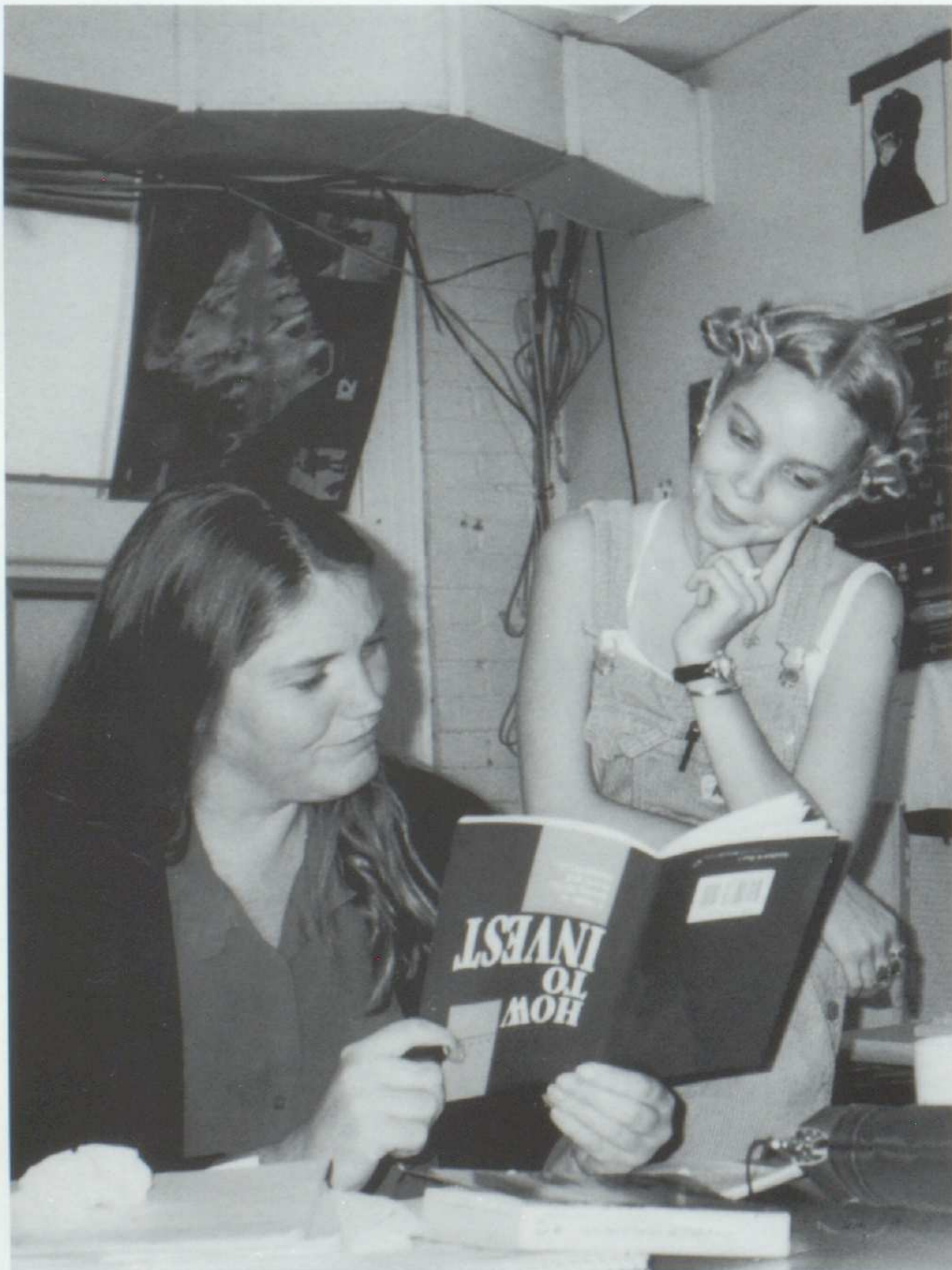
to focus on and develop a talent he/she plans to use in the future.

## Senior Project Gives Students Career Opportunities

Preparing for her career as a resource marketer, Liz Korb informs her committee about her senior project.



A group of Worthington Kilbourne High School seniors ventured beyond the safe and familiar walls of the school to apply what they have learned in the classroom setting to the working world. In addition to having the opportunity to contribute to their chosen "communities," they hoped to broaden their knowledge of the working world. Ten seniors spent the month of May pursuing projects of their choices in everything from volunteering at Huckleberry House, a home for runaway teens, to conducting scientific research and assessing marine life on Andros Island, off the coast of Florida.

Every participant prepared a senior project first by developing an idea. Then a committee of staff, community members, and juniors worked with each senior reviewing and making suggestions regarding the proposal. Students submitting ideas for projects focused on one of four areas: academics, creativity, service, or career-oriented.

By participating in senior projects, ten Worthington Kilbourne High School students have individualized their education according to their interests and learning styles.

- Emma Bierly: Participated on-site at the Capital Area Humane Society

- Starr Brown: Worked with residents in rehabilitation at Whetstone Gardens and Care Center, to learn about medicine and geriatrics.

- Daniel Engler: Created academic project to see how the construction of a house for Habitat for Humanity can be infused in the physics and calcu-

lus curriculum areas

- Erin Grover: Conducted scientific research and assessed marine life on Andros Island, off the coast of Florida; she also sailed to Acsuma Islands to conduct research on tropical bird populations

- Elizabeth Korb: Interned with Inaugurated Marketing in graphic design and with third grade teacher, to see how art is infused into the elementary curriculum

- Justin Lentz: Taught Russian immigrants at the Leo Yassenoff Jewish Center to speak English and helped them assimilate into middle American life

- Daisuke Matsuzaki: Wrote an academic research paper on the current state of Japanese politics, administration foreign affairs, and defense policy, using resources in both English and Japanese

- Sonal Shah: Volunteered at Huckleberry House, a home for runaway teens

- Michael Sirowsky: Interned with a computer science teacher at Briggs High School, to build and integrate different components of a LAN and maintain its integrity

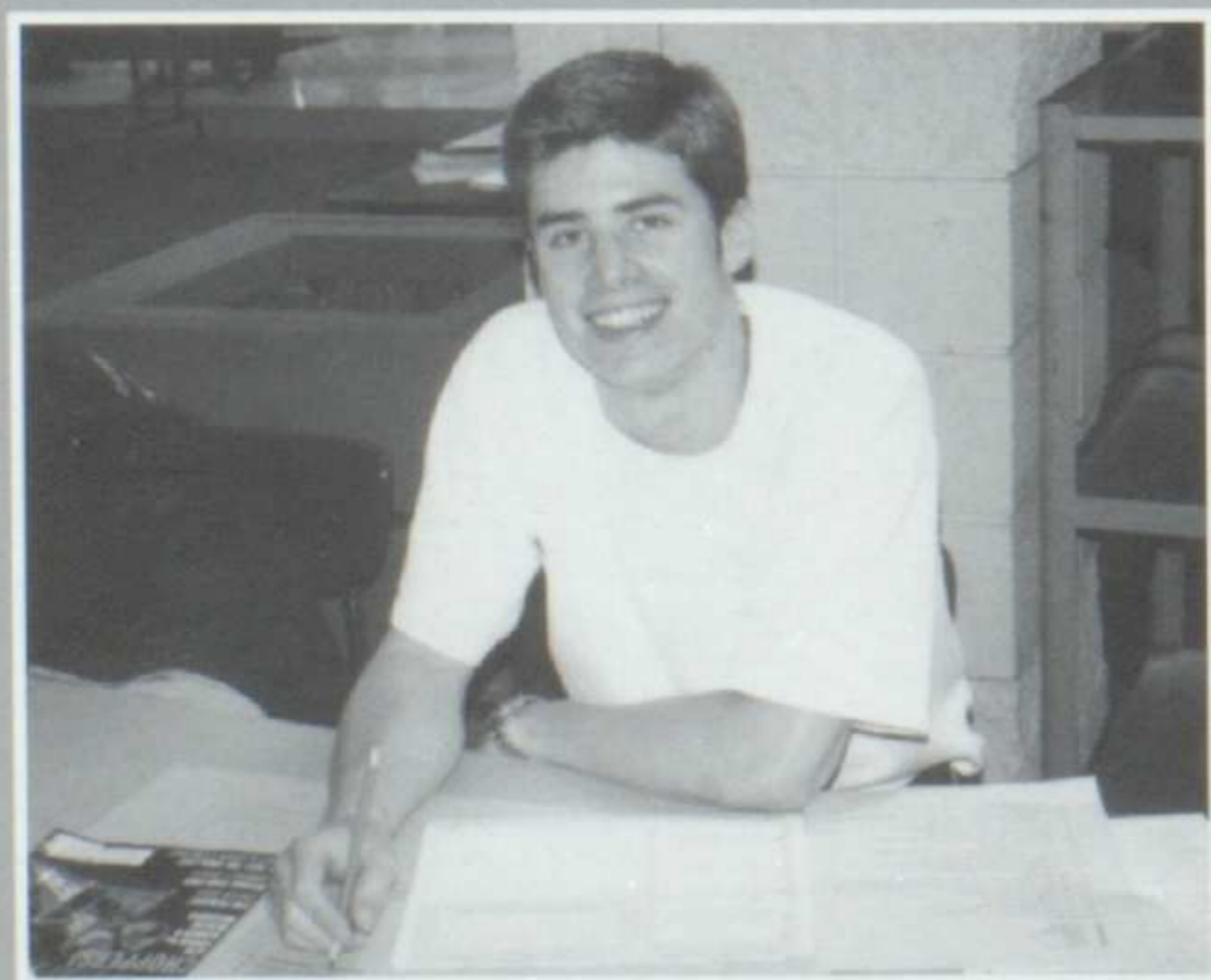
- Cassandra Struble: Explored Dada art to understand the emotions, history, and overall impact of the industrial times

# A Blue Ribbon Award

## Kilbourne Earns Recognition for Excellence



On Tuesday, May 26, 1998, the U.S. Department of Education announced that Worthington Kilbourne High School is a Blue Ribbon School. "I am very excited for the students, faculty, and community because normally the award goes to much older schools. We are among the best of the best," explained Dr. Lindsay.

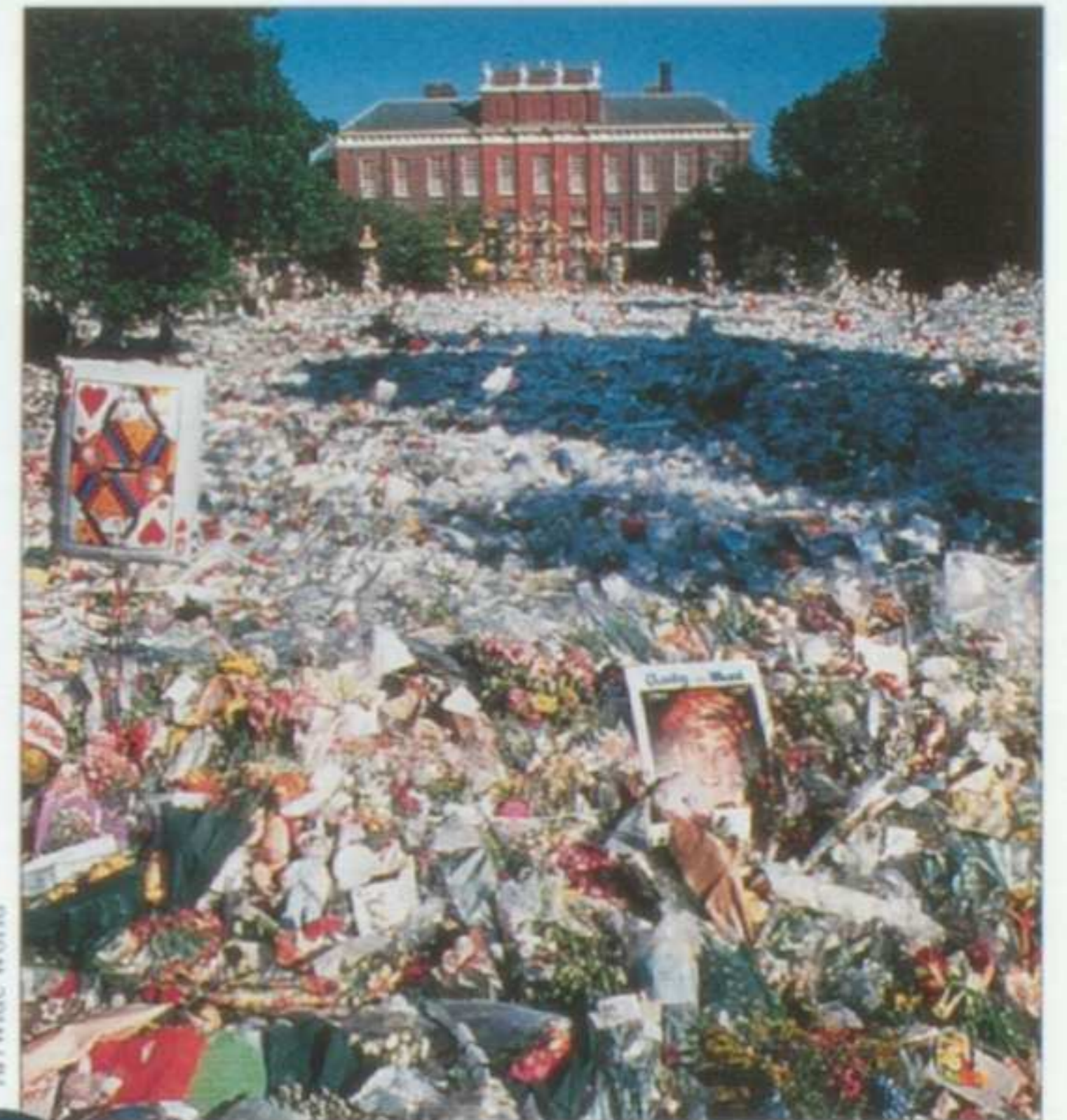

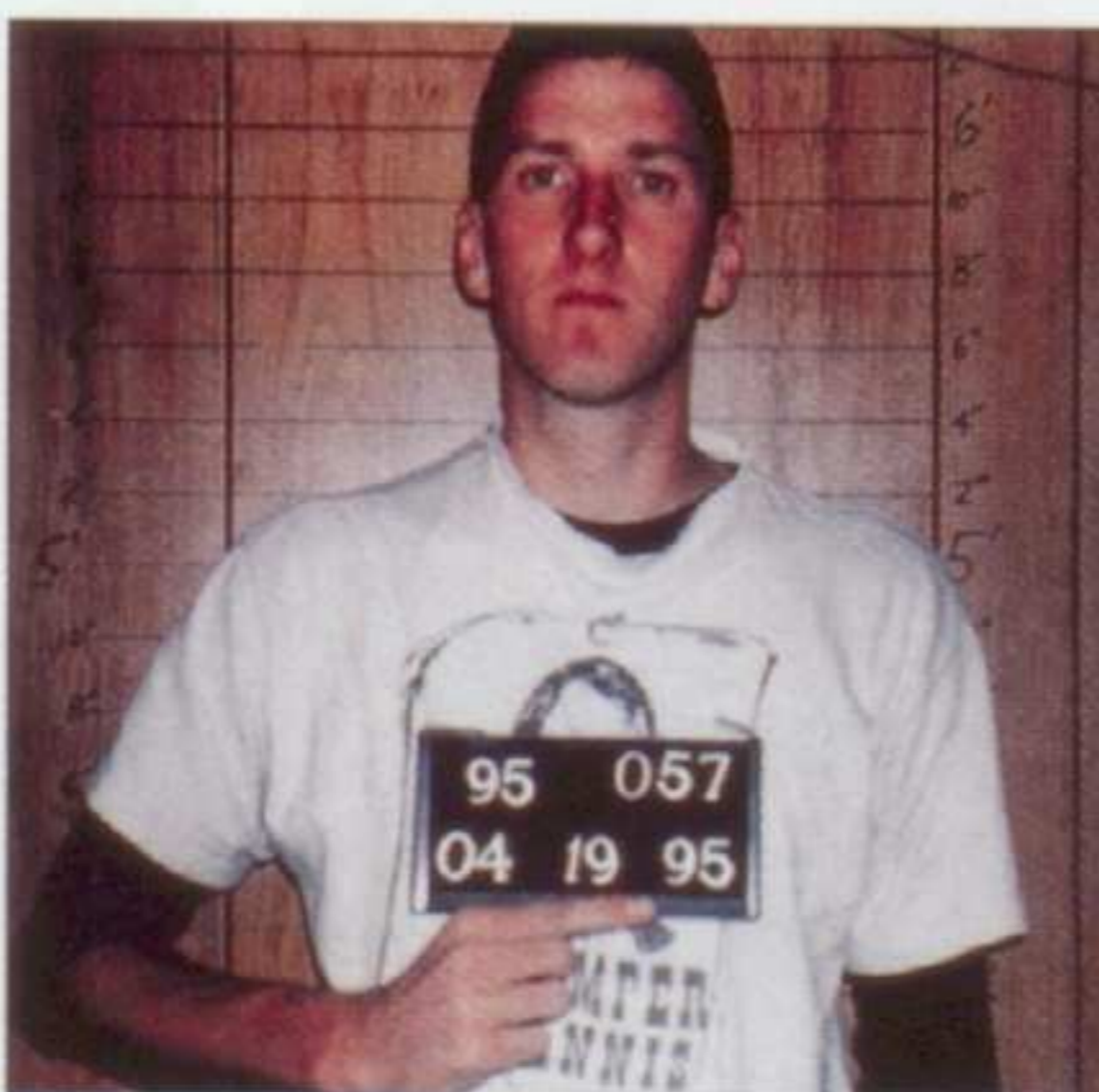

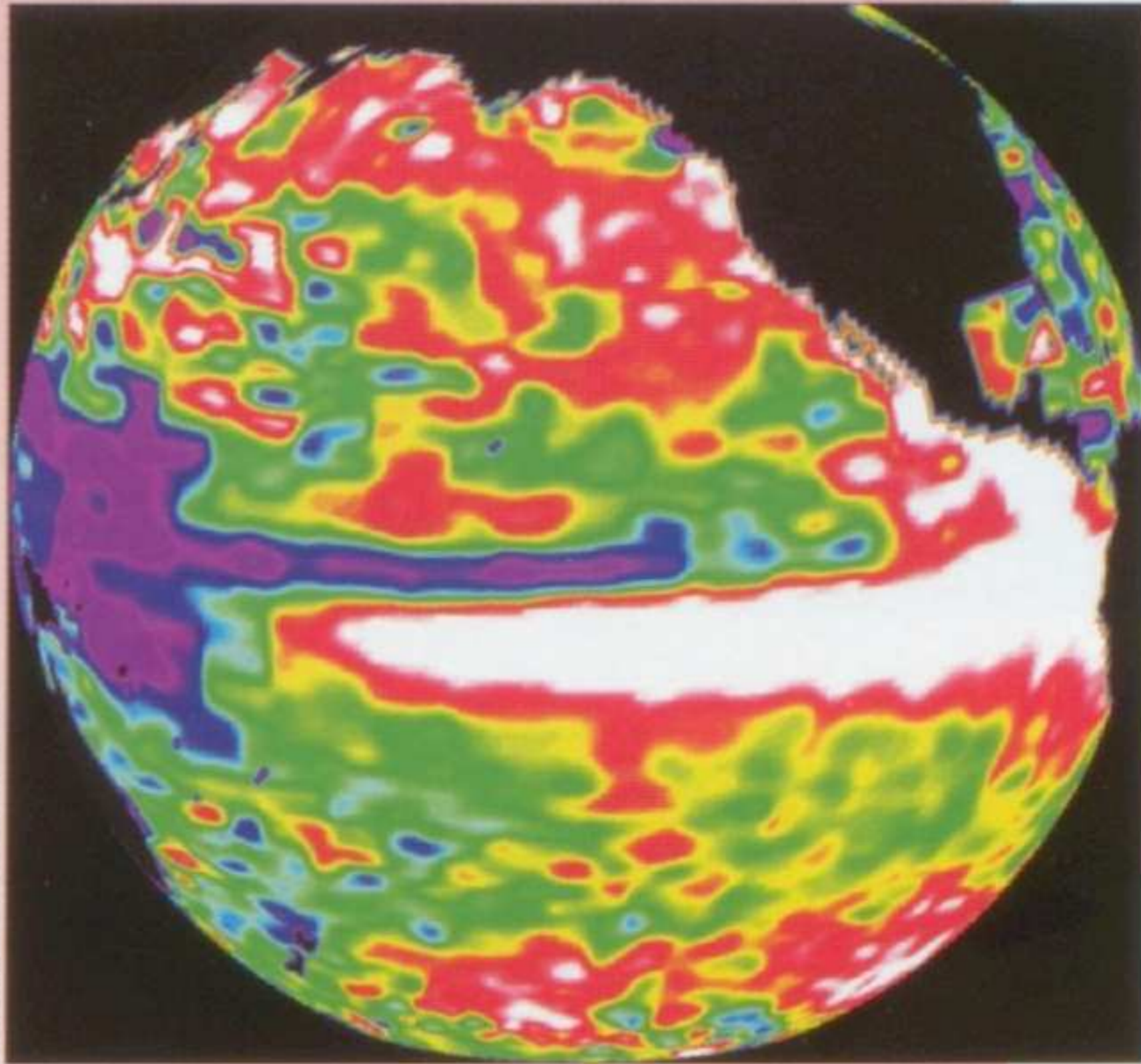

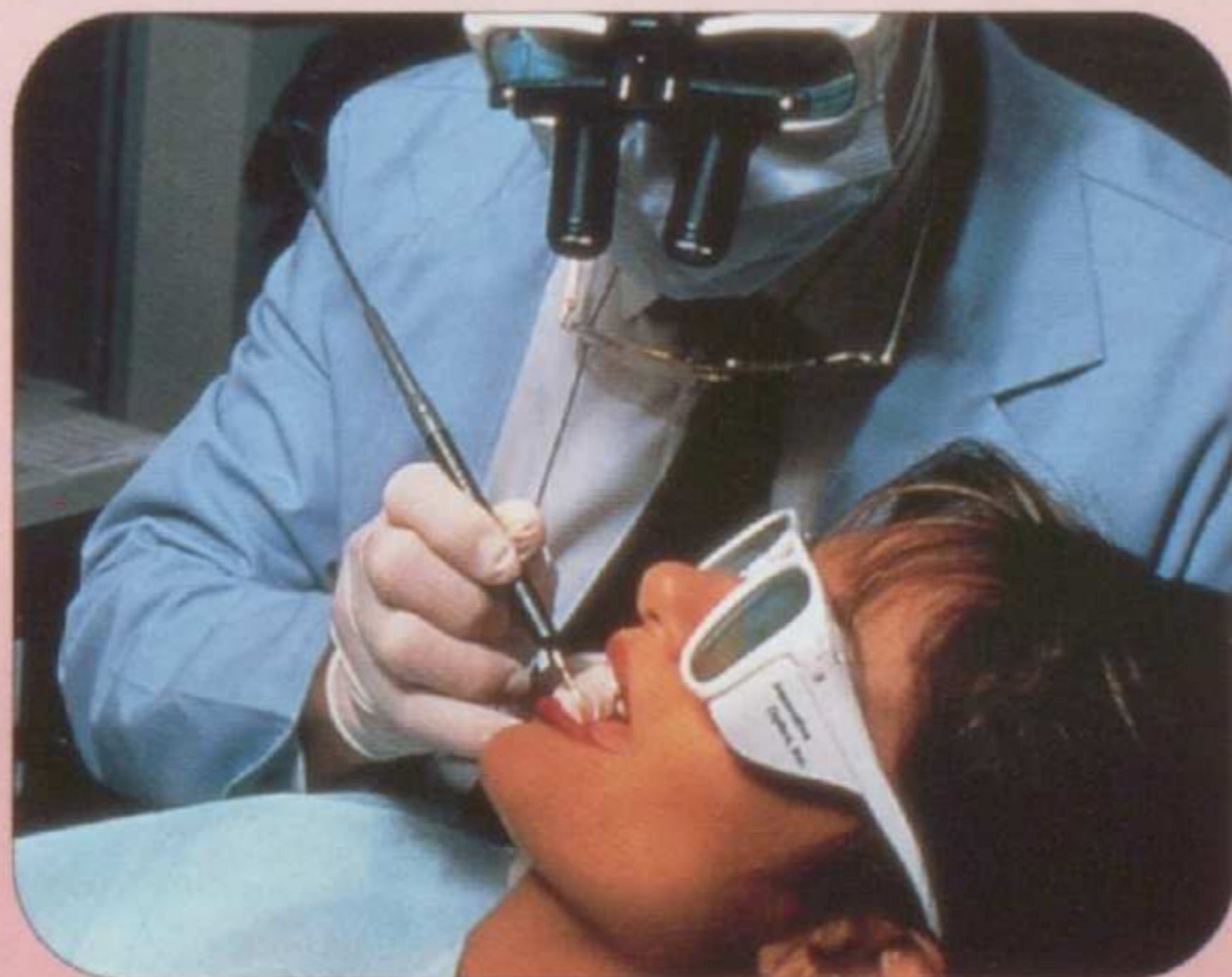

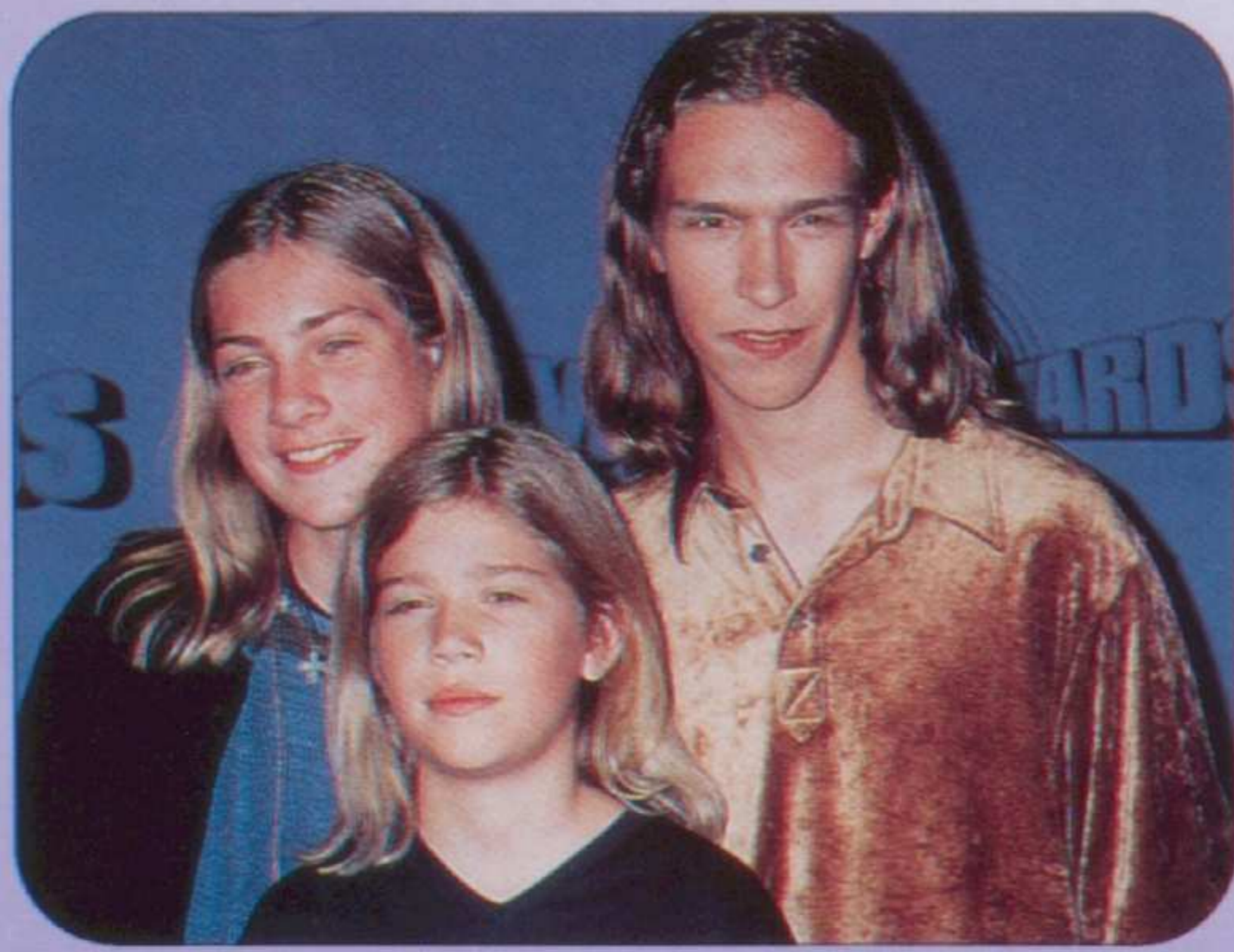

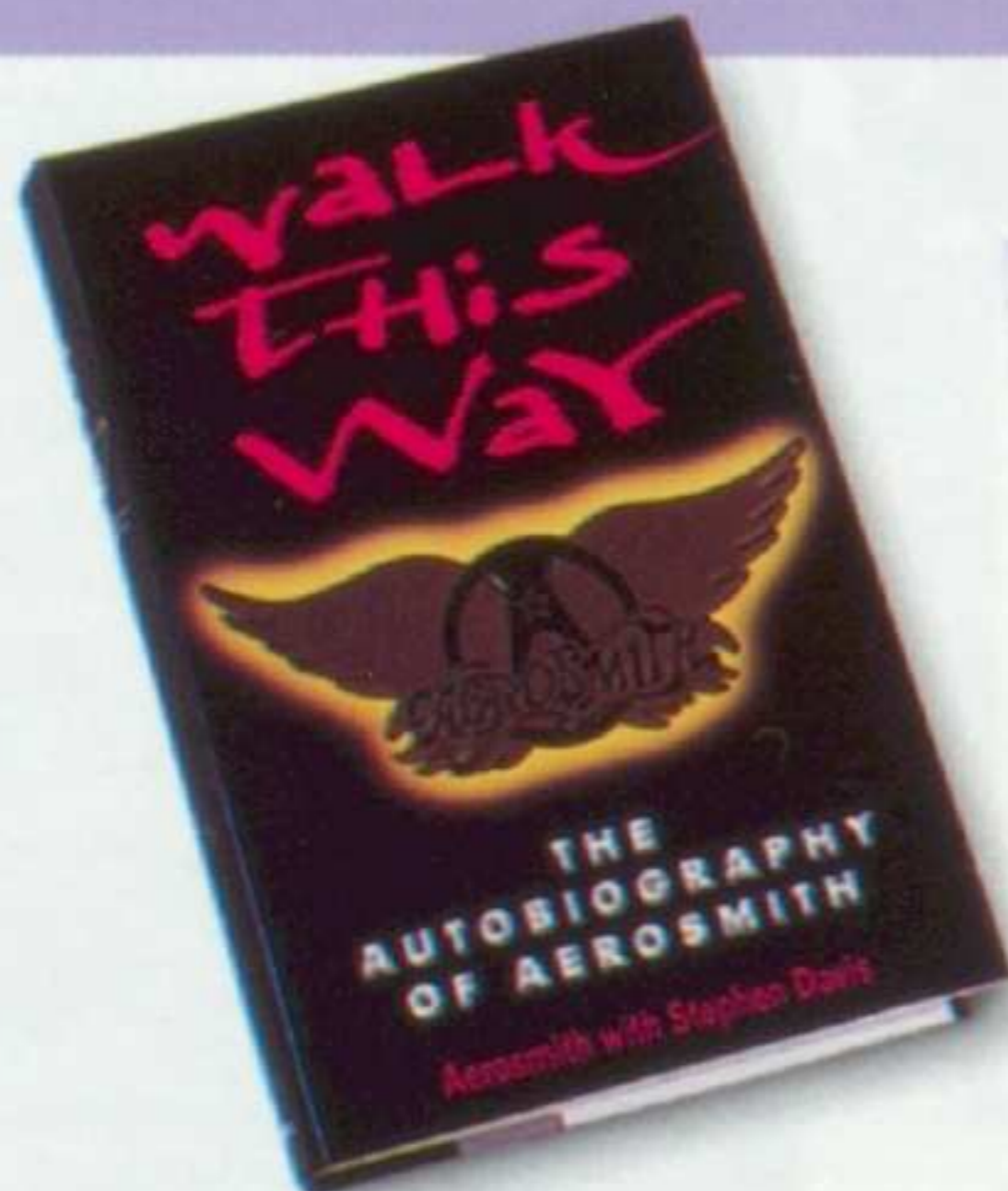

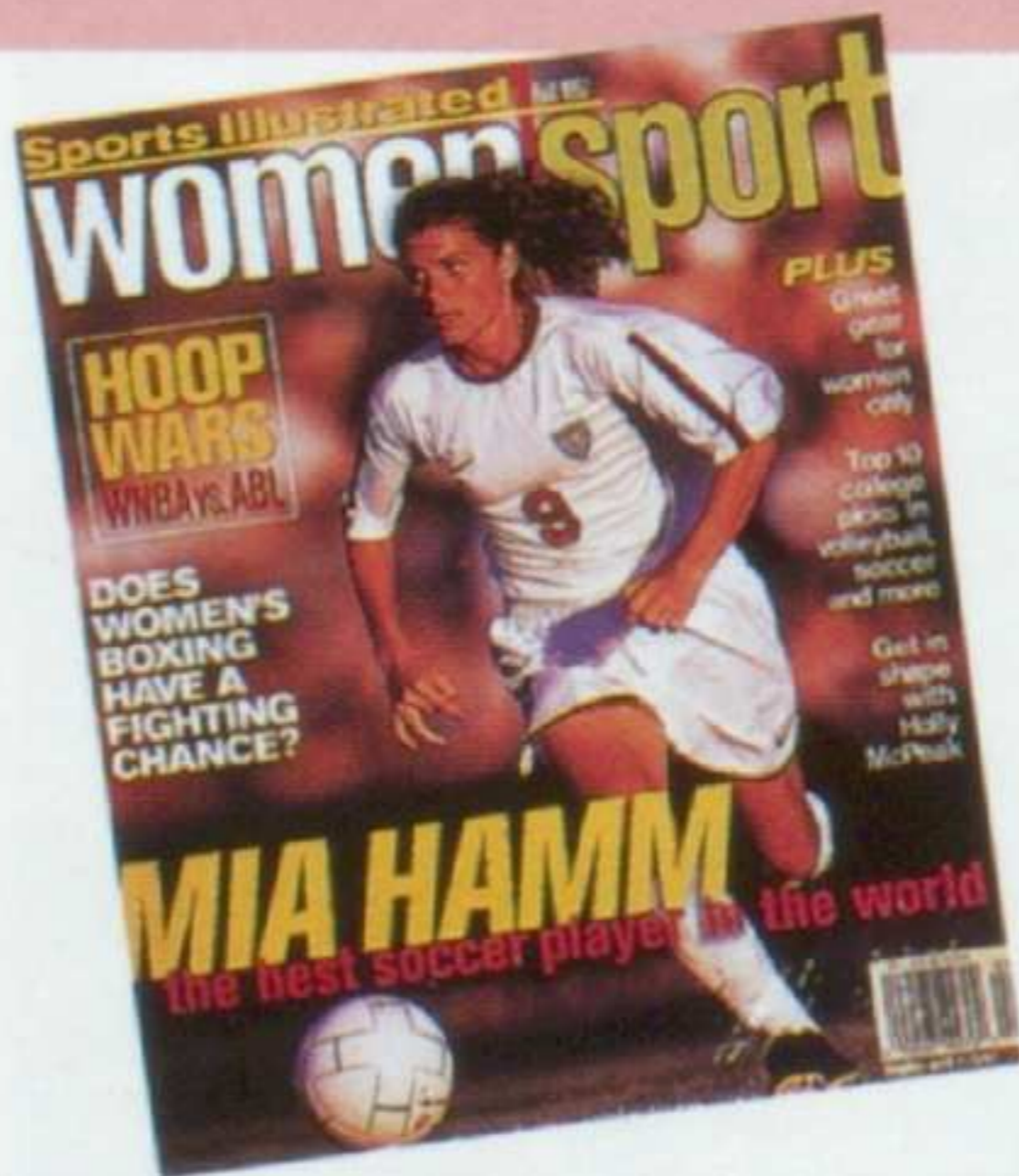

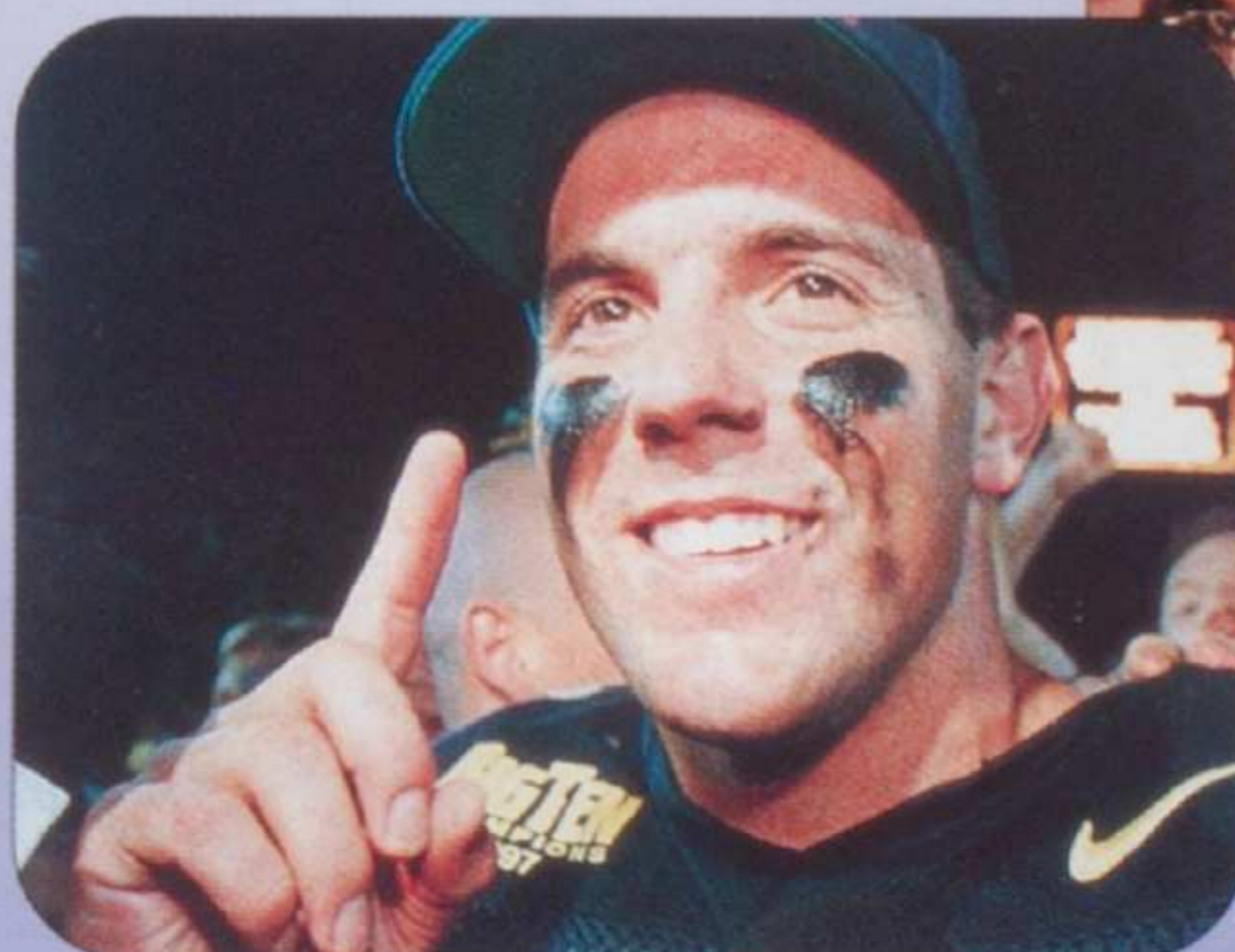

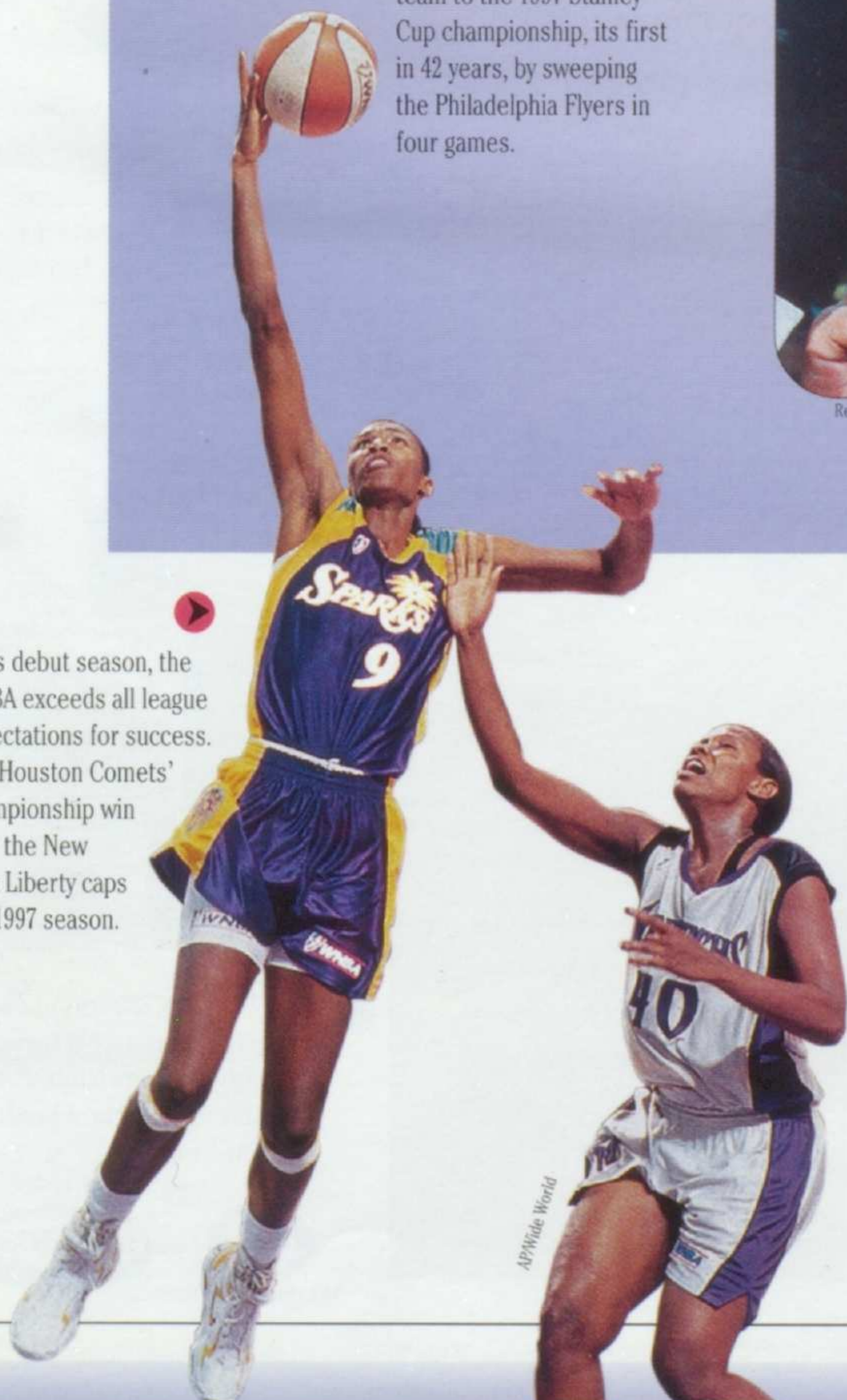

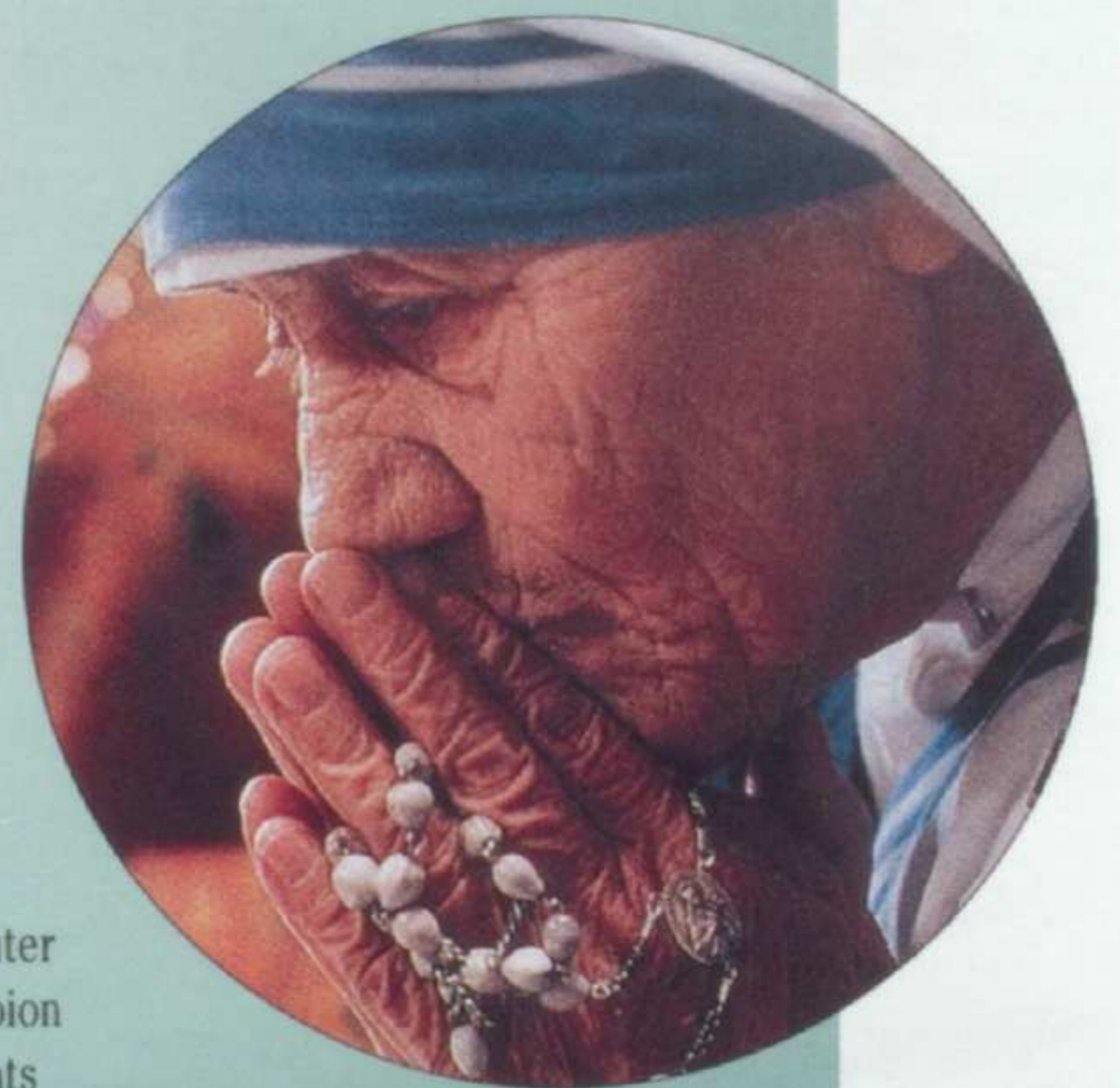
