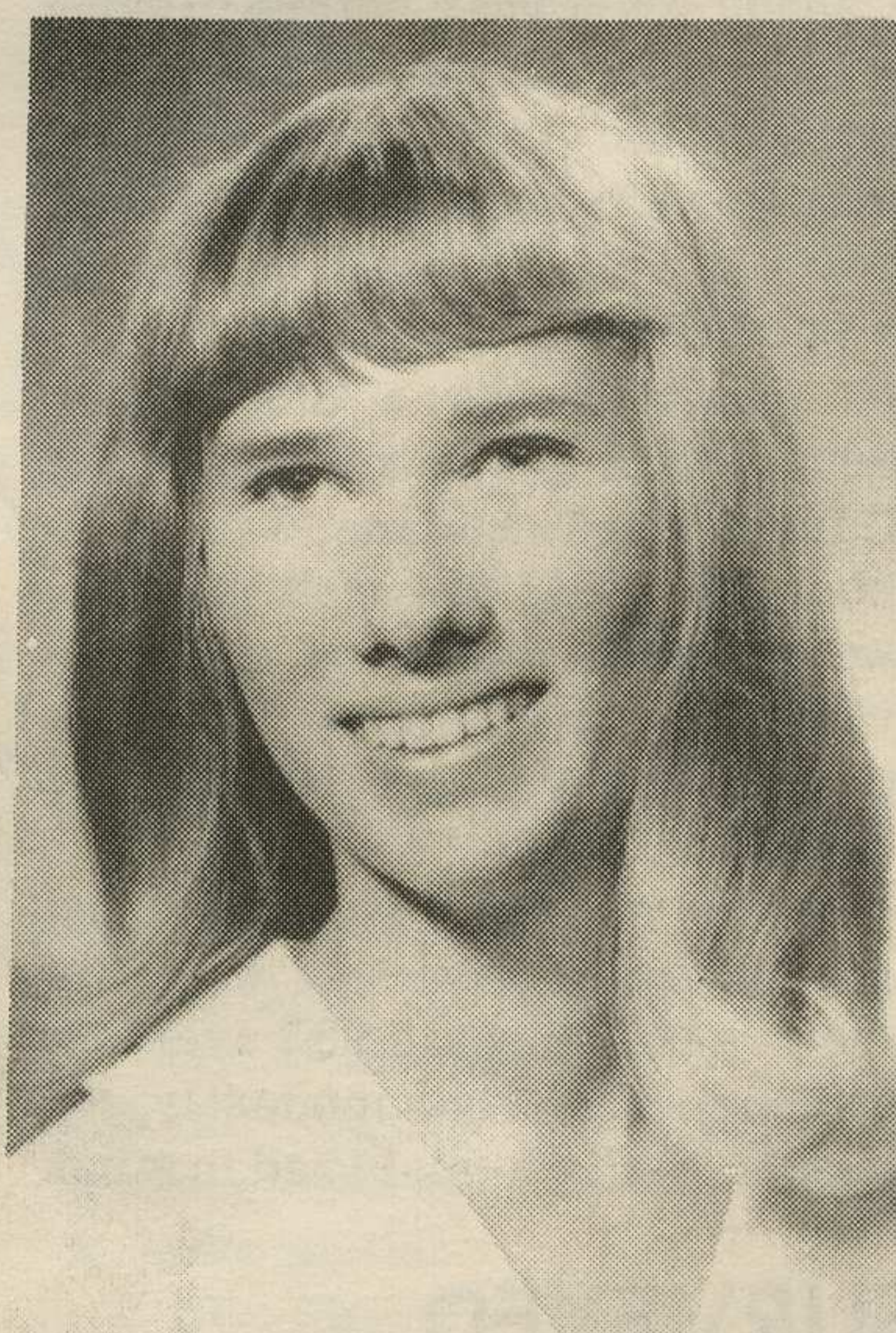

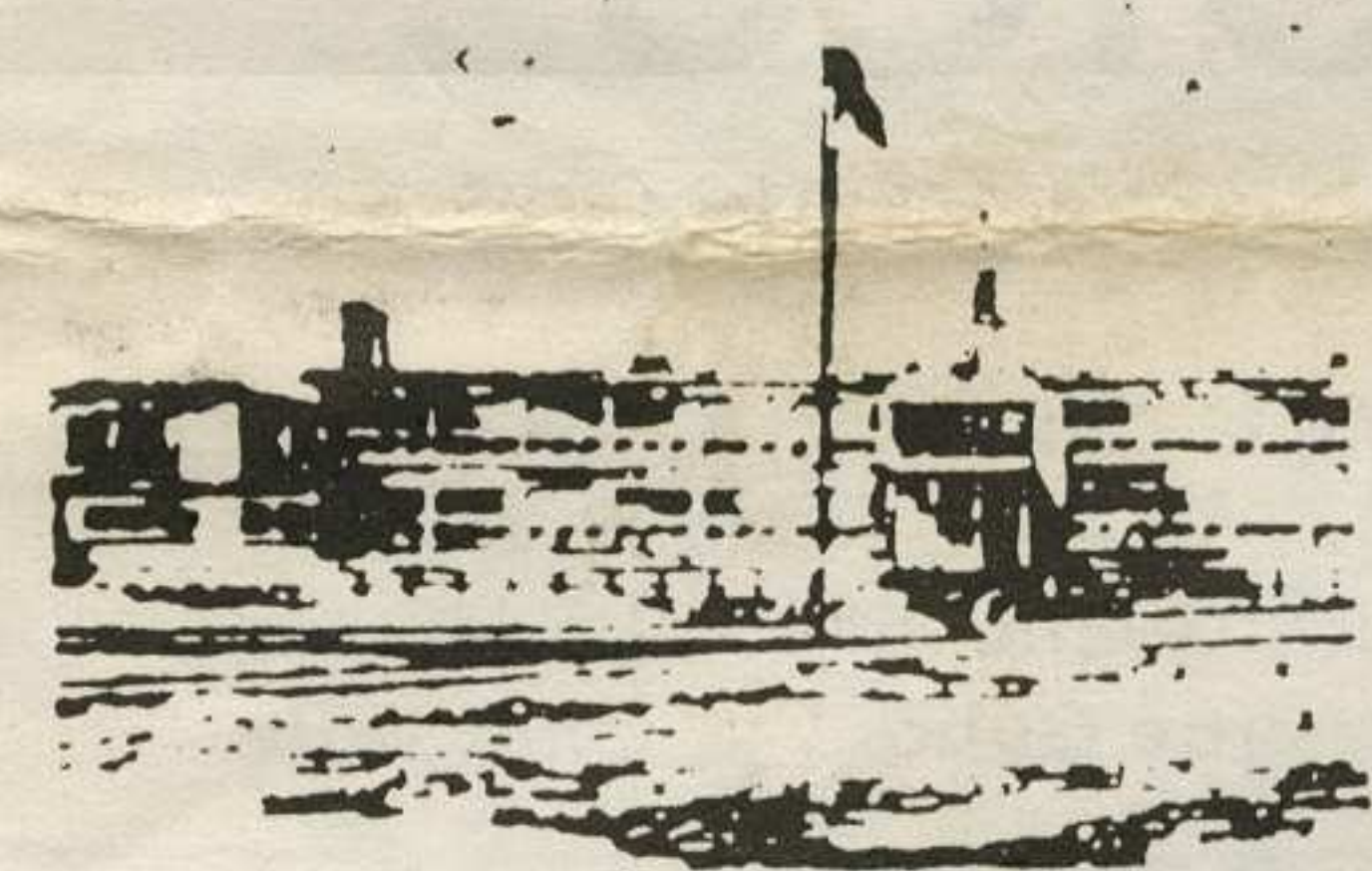

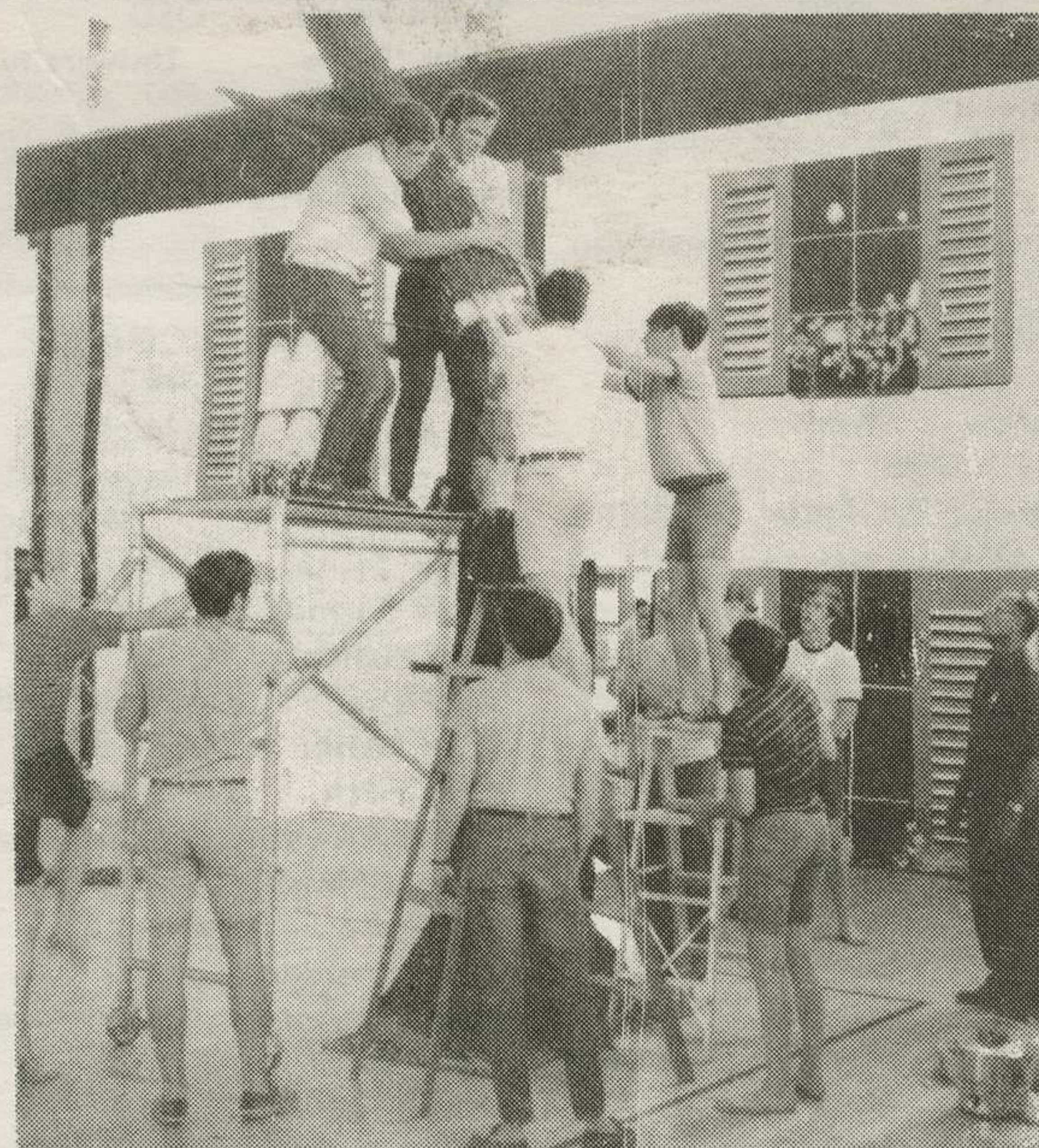
KOLOZE RECALLS WHS EXPERIENCES

In talking about his new position as superintendent of a school system in Long Beach, California he reflected, "The students' attitude will be different, because the basic philosophy of the school is different." Mr. Koloze pointed out that the school's courses are based on the concept that "Education is a quest for knowledge, and this comes from the source that created us."

To conclude, Mr. Koloze remarked that his funniest experience at WHS was when, "a certain number of senior boys picked up a certain number of spoons in the cafeteria, and when returning home from a class at OSU, over 200 spoons were on the front porch and front yard." He pointed out that they spent a good part of the grading period cleaning up the cafeteria, as he chuckled, remembering the incident.

The agenda should follow closely that of last year. There will be a Senior class profile with the valedictorian, salutatorian, and any other 4.0 students announced. Any appointments to the Army, Navy, or Air Force Academies will be confirmed by

their official representatives.

The recipients of several memorial and local business scholarships will be named and several achievement awards will be presented in the categories of Art, Spelling, Journalism, Dramatics, and Home Economics.

The perfect attendance award, though often accompanied by jeers and catcalls, will be presented to any intrepid students who had the audacity to show up all 2,160 days in twelve years. Our AFS students will probably say good-bye and present us their national flags.

DOW NELSON FIELD HOSTS GRADUATION

Rarely are most of the seniors gathered together and even more rare are they together for two hours. But it will happen on June 9 for graduation.

The graduating seniors will receive their diplomas in a Baccalaureate - Commencement ceremony. The annual event will be divided into two parts, the first being the shorter, the Baccalaureate. The Commencement will follow, containing the choir number and the distribution of diplomas. This year's speaker will be Dr. Harold Yochum, the retired president of Capital University. Dr. Yochum was president of the university for twenty-five years. The pastor to perform religious duties is Reverend Benjamin Edwards of Linworth United Methodist Church.

For this year the Baccalaureate-Commencement will be held at Dow Nelson Field. It was held in the gymnasium until it became too hot to endure. The hard benches, crowded situation, and heat moved the ceremony from the gym to the football field. Mr. Koloze recalled the combined dedication of the Dow Nelson field and graduation ceremony. Very dark and very low clouds rumbled up over the river and threatened the ceremony. Unhesitatingly, there was a shift

of location to the gymnasium, and the graduation ceremony continued in a reduced form.

Upholding the tradition, juniors will be the ushers. There is a possibility that junior Mark Sopp will play the organ instead of a professional organist to personalize the ceremony. This year one florist will be creating the floral arrangements for the stage instead of many different florists.

The ceremony begins at 8:00 p.m. and is to end at approximately 10:00. The senior class party is scheduled for 10:30 at Brookside Country Club.

"Being in the top ten never affected me because it was the best-kept secret at WHS!" he laughed. "No, seriously, it never bothered me because I always tried to meet different groups of people, and I've been more or less accepted in all these groups. I wasn't too active before this year, but now that we've started the paper, I like working for it very much. I was on the soccer team, which is not a very well-accepted sport yet at WHS." Preditag will pack up for Oberlin College in September, where "it'll be math or Russian---it depends on what happens in college. There is also a slight-slight-possibility of my going into the priesthood. I really would like teaching, if I was any good at all. The trouble with being good in all things, with having a 3.958, is that nothing stands out. I have everything to choose from."

Kathy Woodward has not thought about aiming for the top ten since junior high school. "It's a silly goal. What matters is how much you learn, not your grades." Kathy, whose grades add up to a 3.939 average, elaborated, "It's more meaningful to be involved in social action." She herself is citywide chairman of the Y-Teens World Fellowship Committee and was instrumental in launching the Sole Walk for

Hunger. Kathy said she was "disappointed in the turn-out" because she thinks too many people "are perpetuating the same myths and they could learn a lot from outside activities." Her own activities include participation in the Race Relations Club, Human Relations Council, Spanish National Honor Society, National Honor Society and choir. Kathy has been awarded a scholarship to Wellesley College where she plans a major in psychology or sociology.

Coincidentally echoing Preditag Matejic, Janet Nelson laughed that being included in the top ten had never affected her "because most people don't know it! I never considered myself a top ten kind of person. I sit and absorb; I see the things that people talk about and think things out for myself, but I don't say much in class. Music is my big interest." She has taken piano lessons for eight and a half years and has sung in both Girls' and Mixed Ensemble as well as in choir. As copy co-editor for the yearbook, she has been unusually busy this year. She plans to attend a small college in Saskatchewan, Canada for a year before "taking a year off to decide what I'm going to do. I'd like to travel, then maybe study languages, but I don't know if I would make languages a profession or not." Janet takes to Saskatchewan a 3.935 point hour and a great admiration for Canada and Canadians. "One reason I'm going there is because we've gone there on a lot of vacations and I have relatives there, and I'd just like to live there for awhile."

Becky Fabbro's incredible list of activities have not kept her from achieving a 3.933 average, although she says modestly, "It wasn't really a goal I had in mind.

I'm happy about it, though." She has been a cheerleader for four years; a member of GAA, Latin Club, National Honor Society, Y-Teens and Cheerleading Club, while serving as Cardinal faculty editor this year. This summer Becky was Girls' State Senate majority whip; she goes back to OSU this fall for a major "possibly in secondary education, in English."

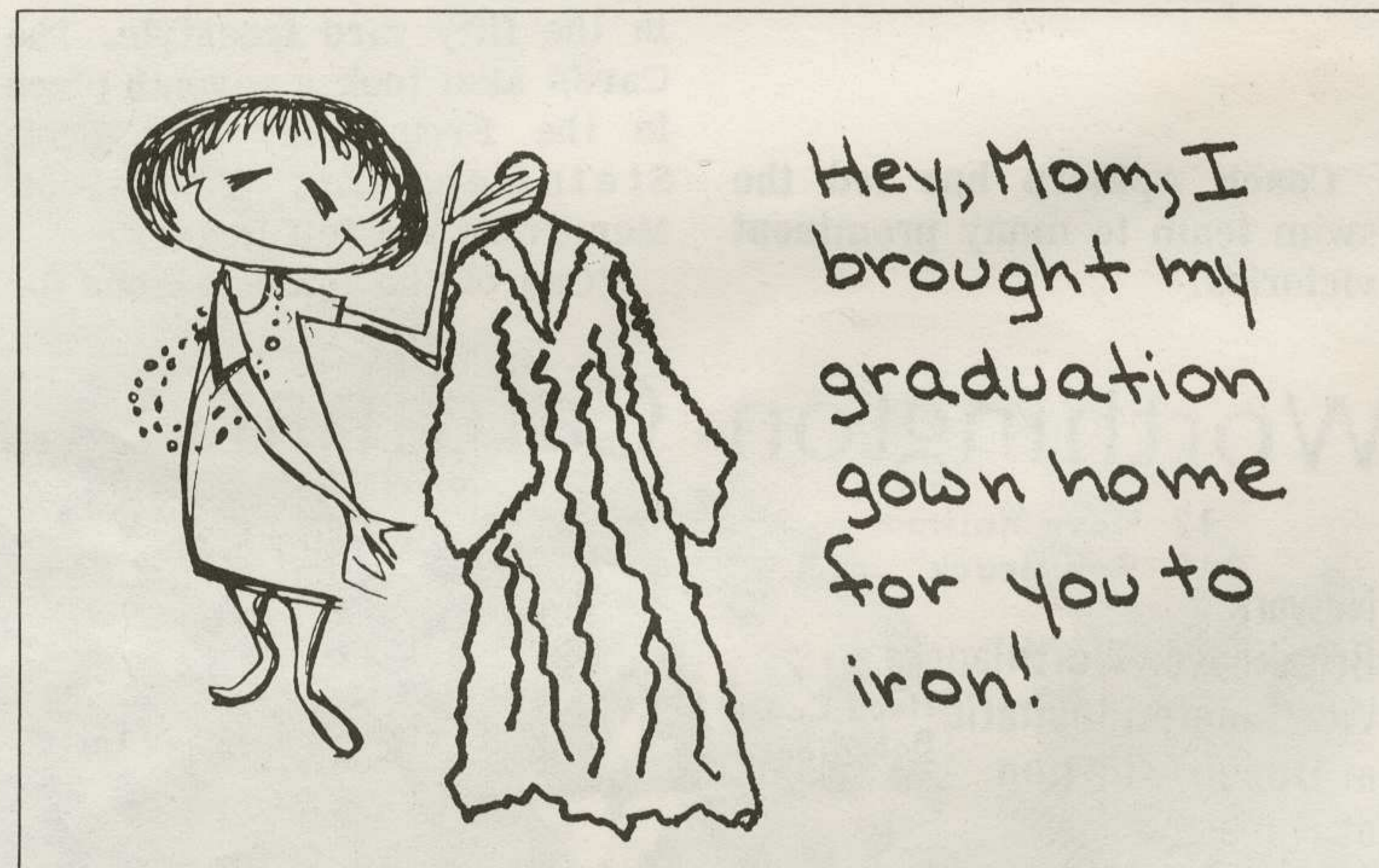

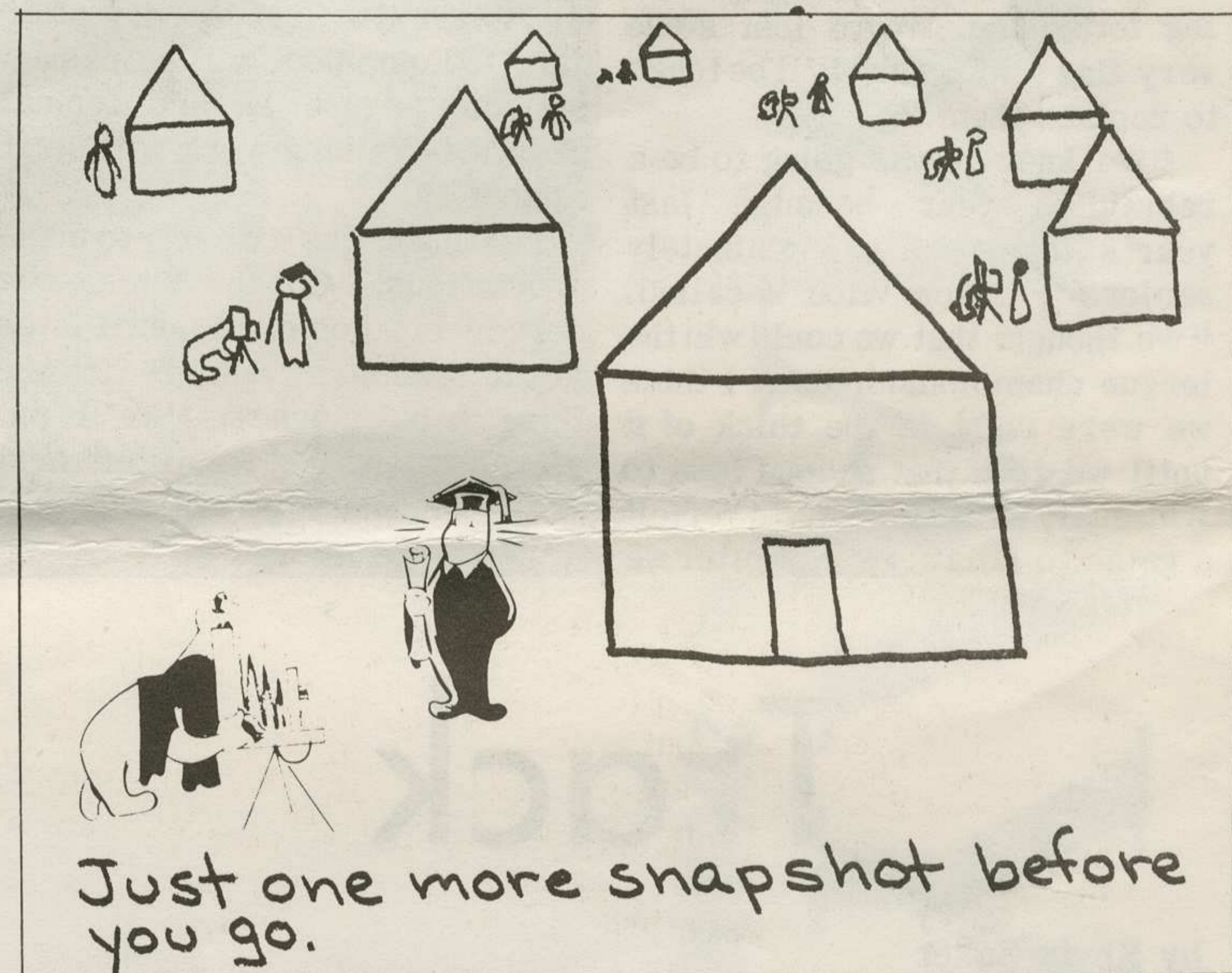

What is marshmallow made of? Have you ever wondered? Maybe not, but if you should be walking down the street and a stuffy Englishman asks you, "I say, do you know what that thing 'marshmallow' really is?" then you will know that answer. Sharp?

This confection earned its name from the marshmallow plant from which the marshmallows were first made. This cute little plant with large, wide leaves and adorable pink clusters of flowers belongs to the Hollyhock family. You remember them? The roots produce a rather sticky substance that is absolutely famous in glue, as a demulcent (look that one up) in medicine, and in that candy of which we are talking.

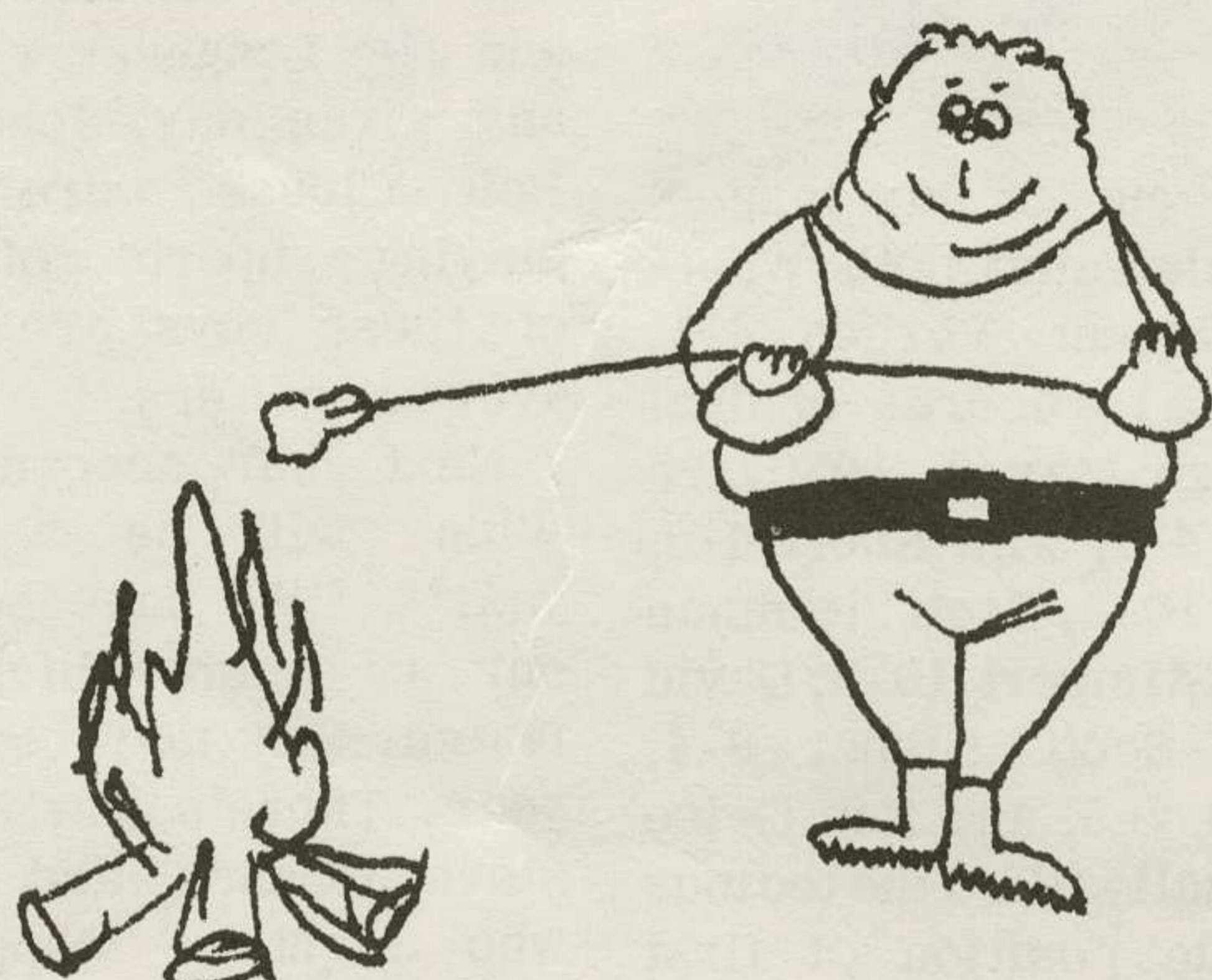

Pete Foss: "The time I was at Jerry's and a junior pulled up with a car better than mine."

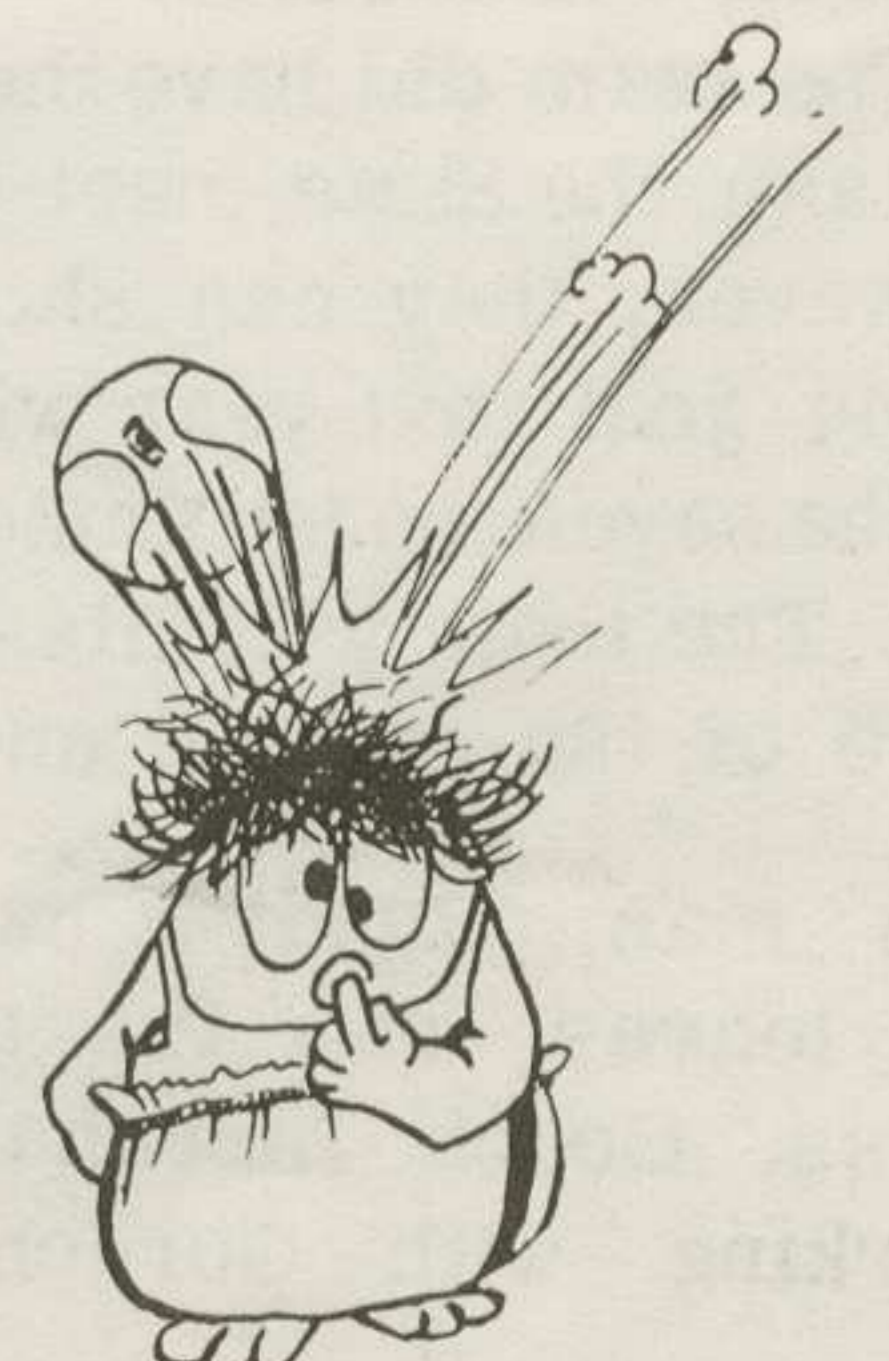
Carol de Volt: "The time when I got lost on my way to a job interview."

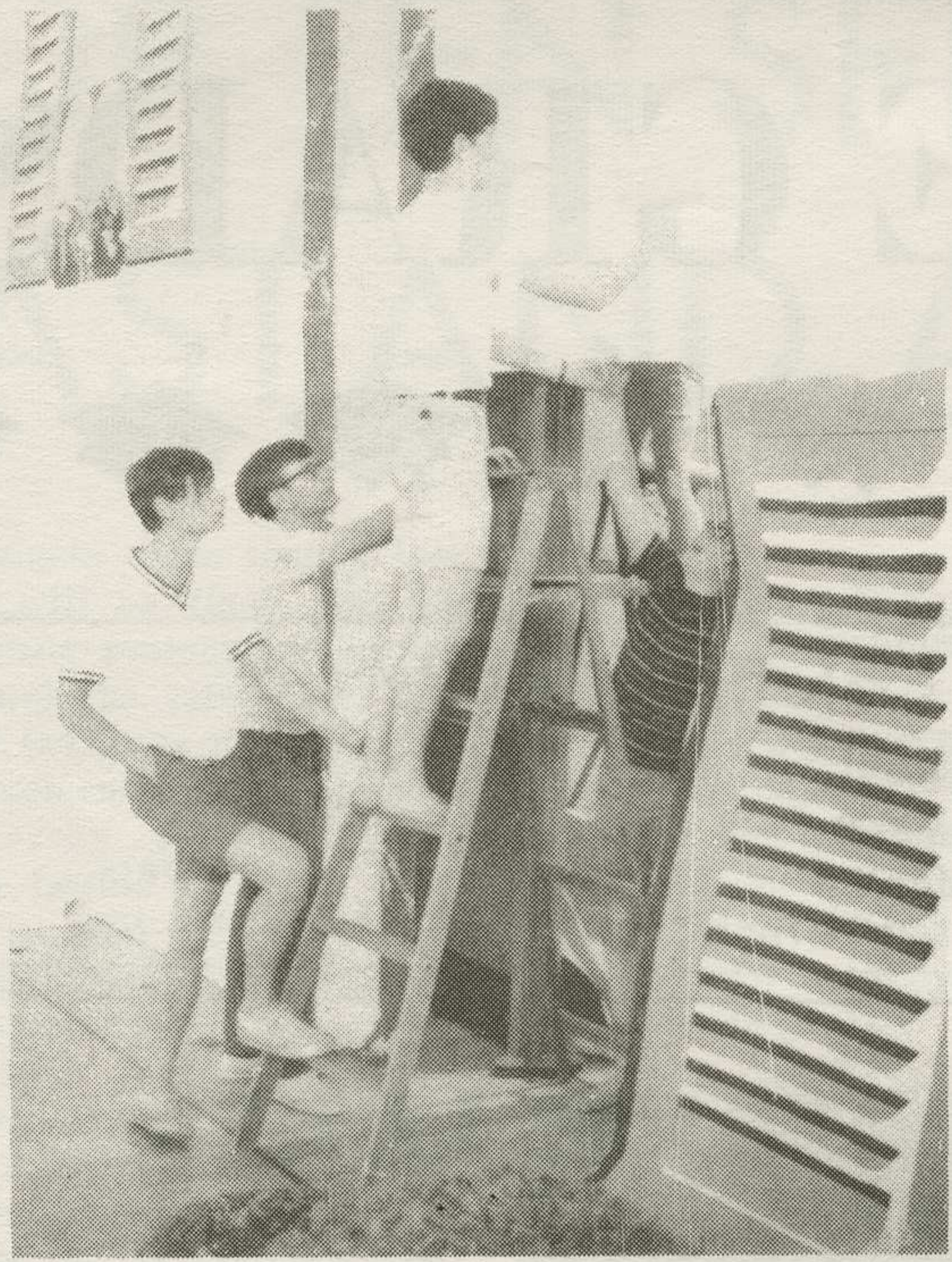

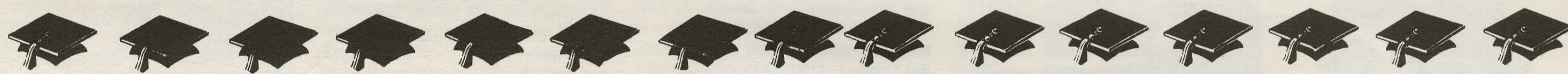


