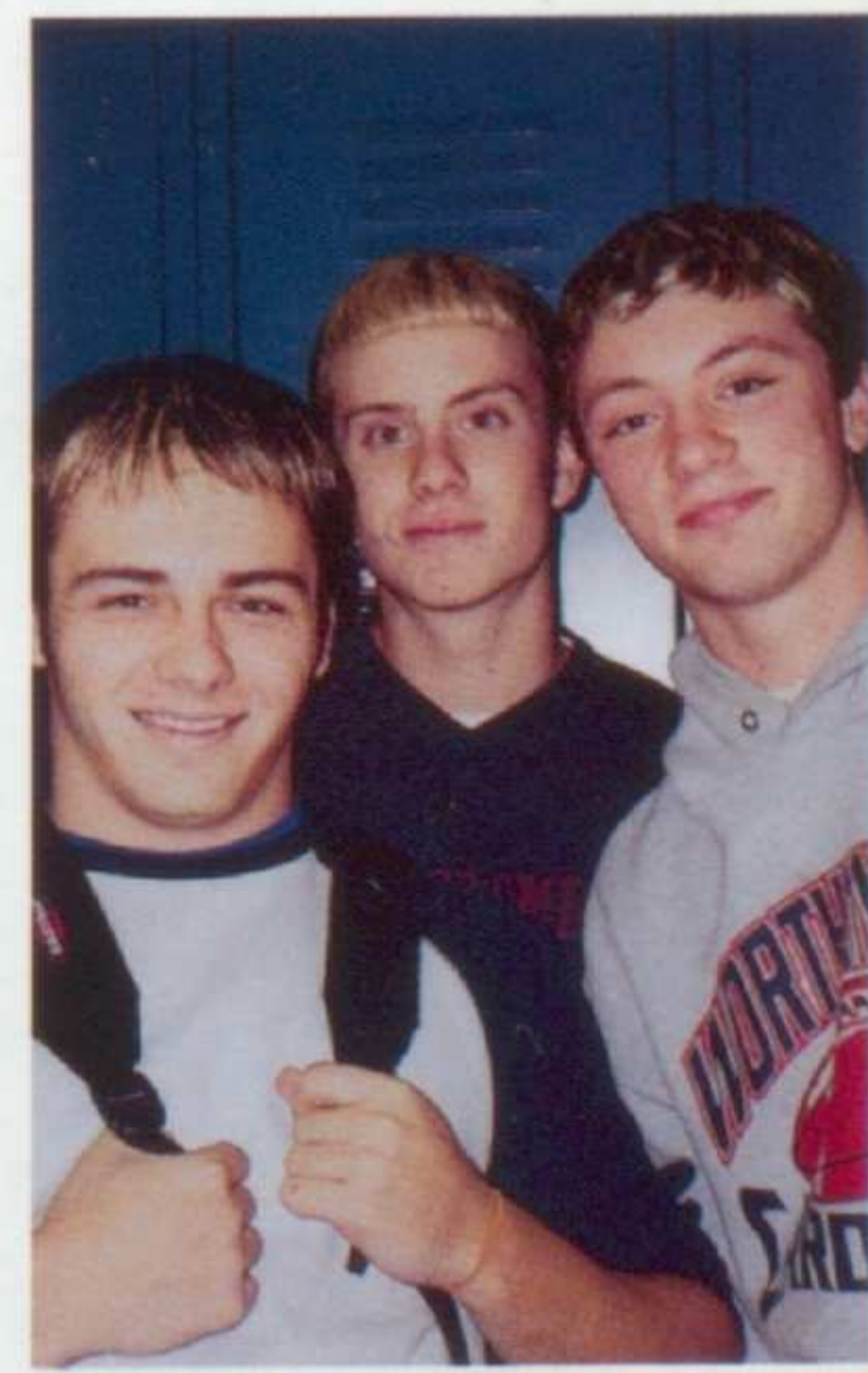

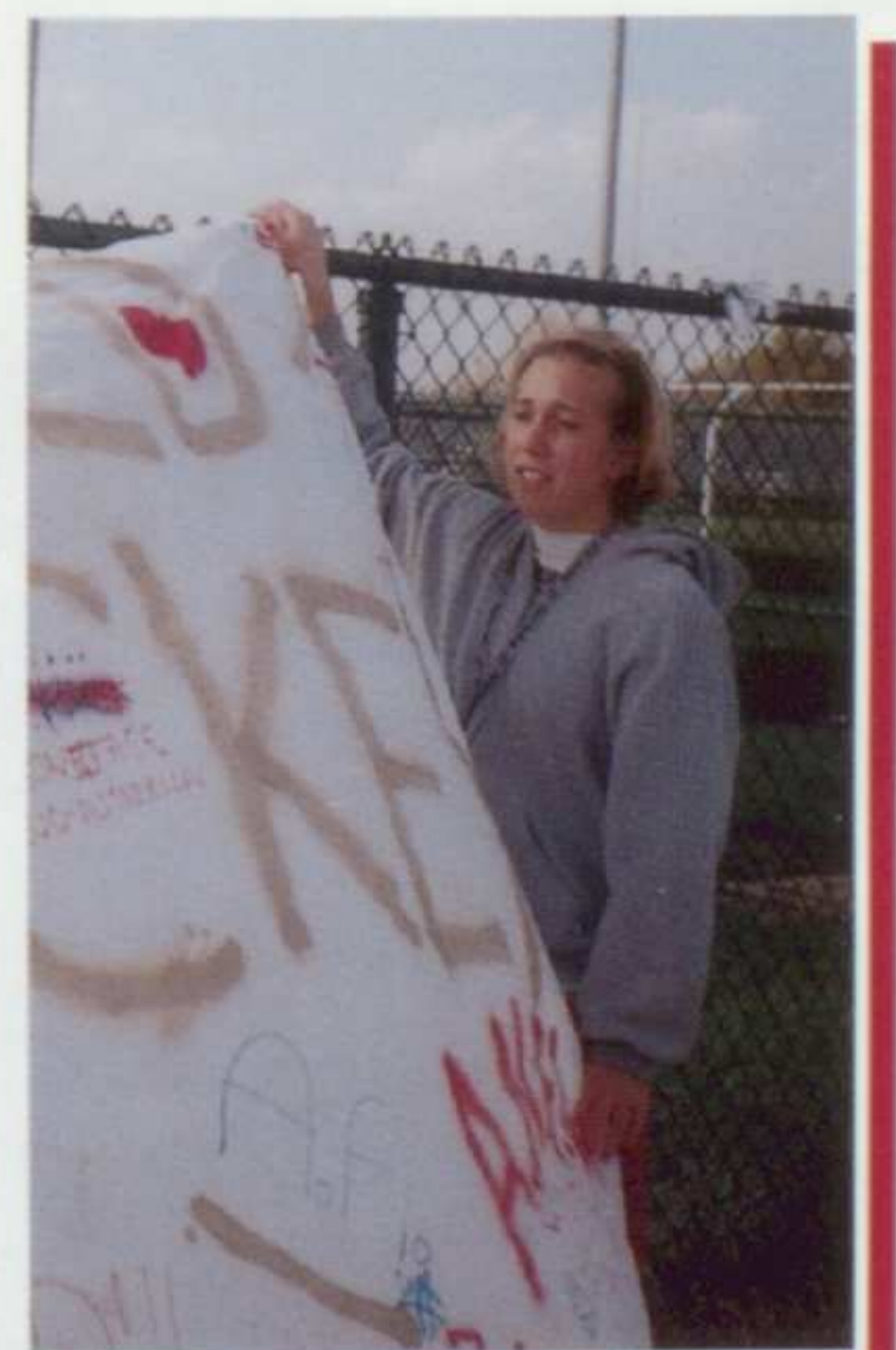

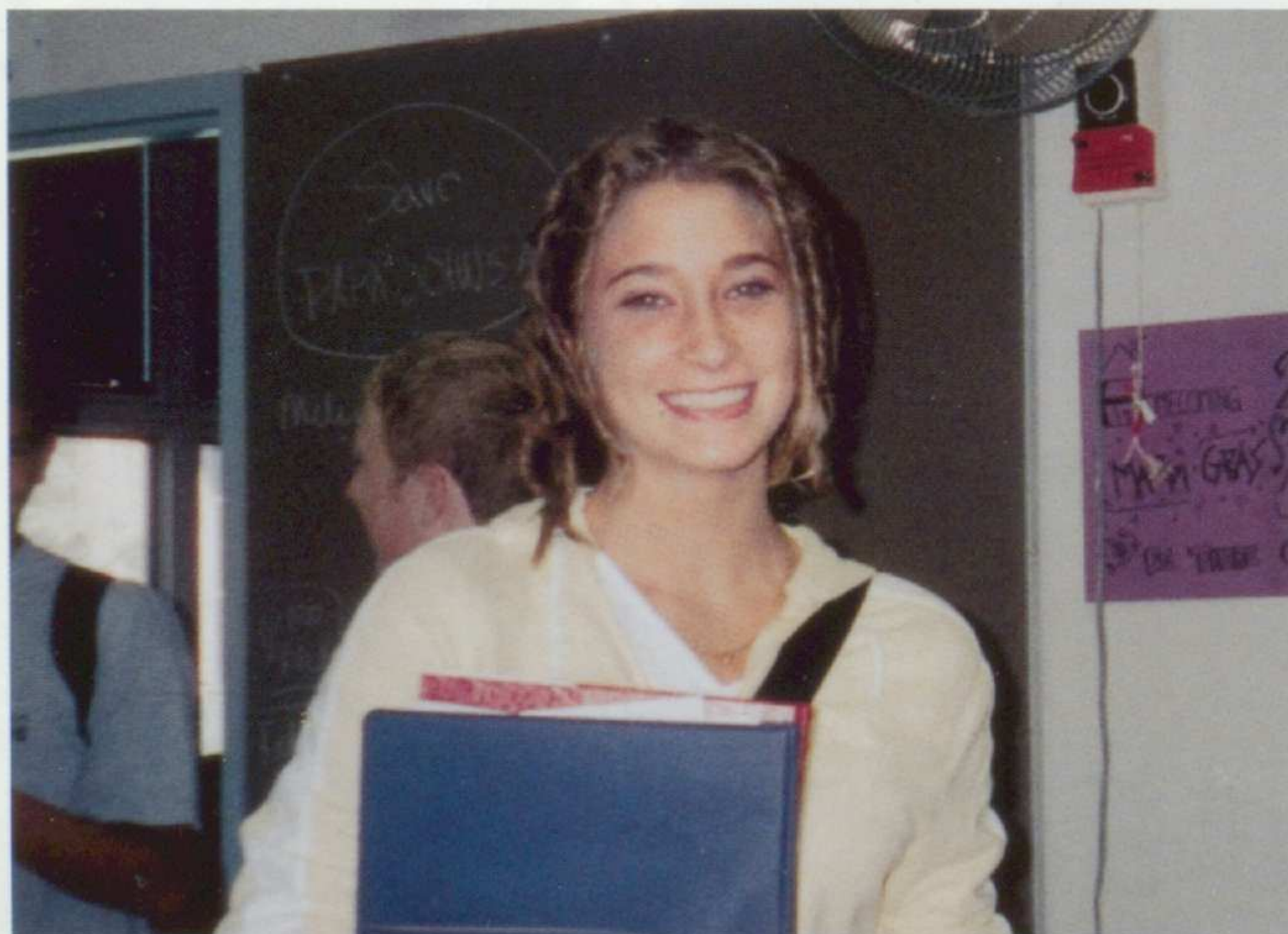

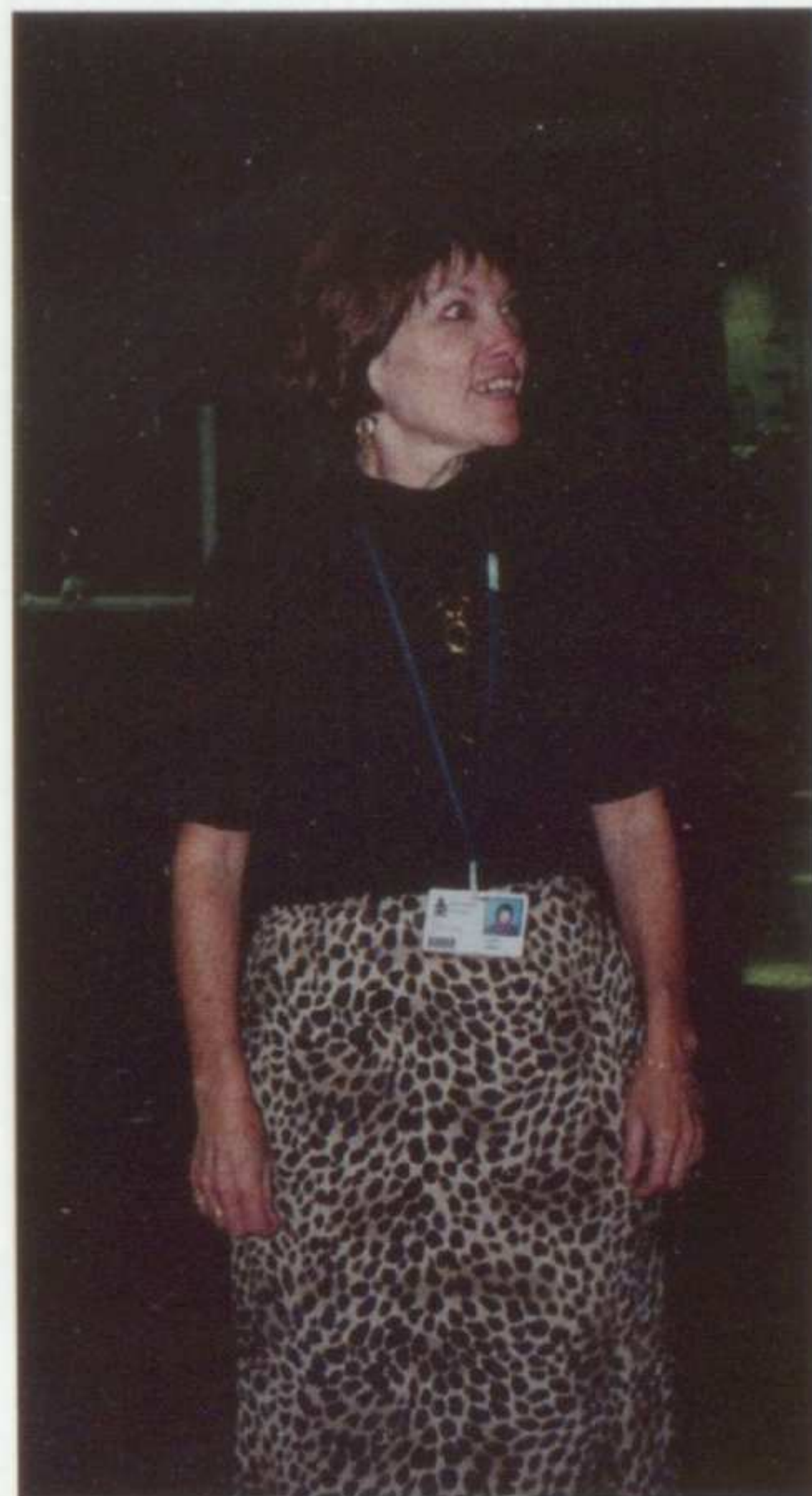

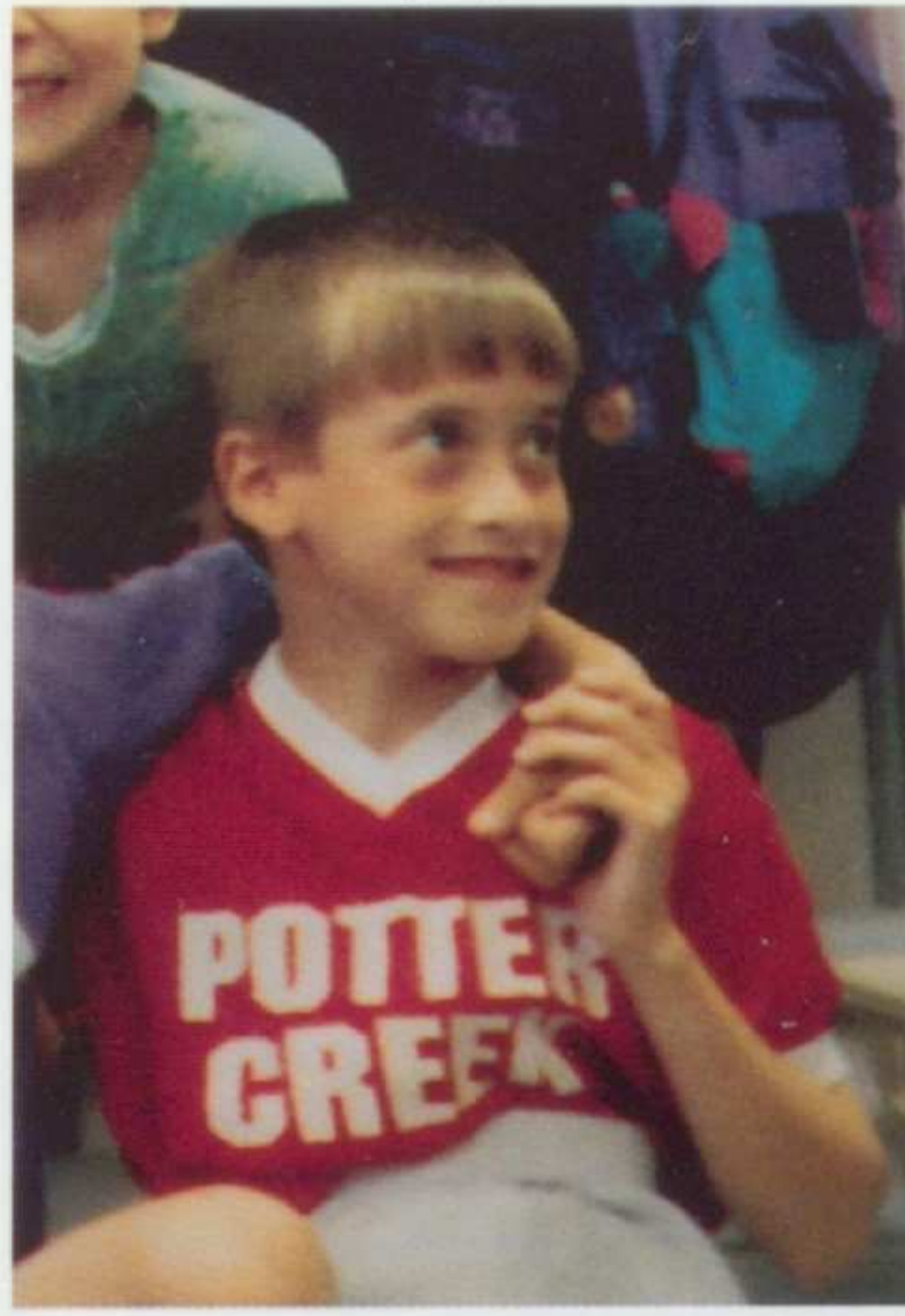

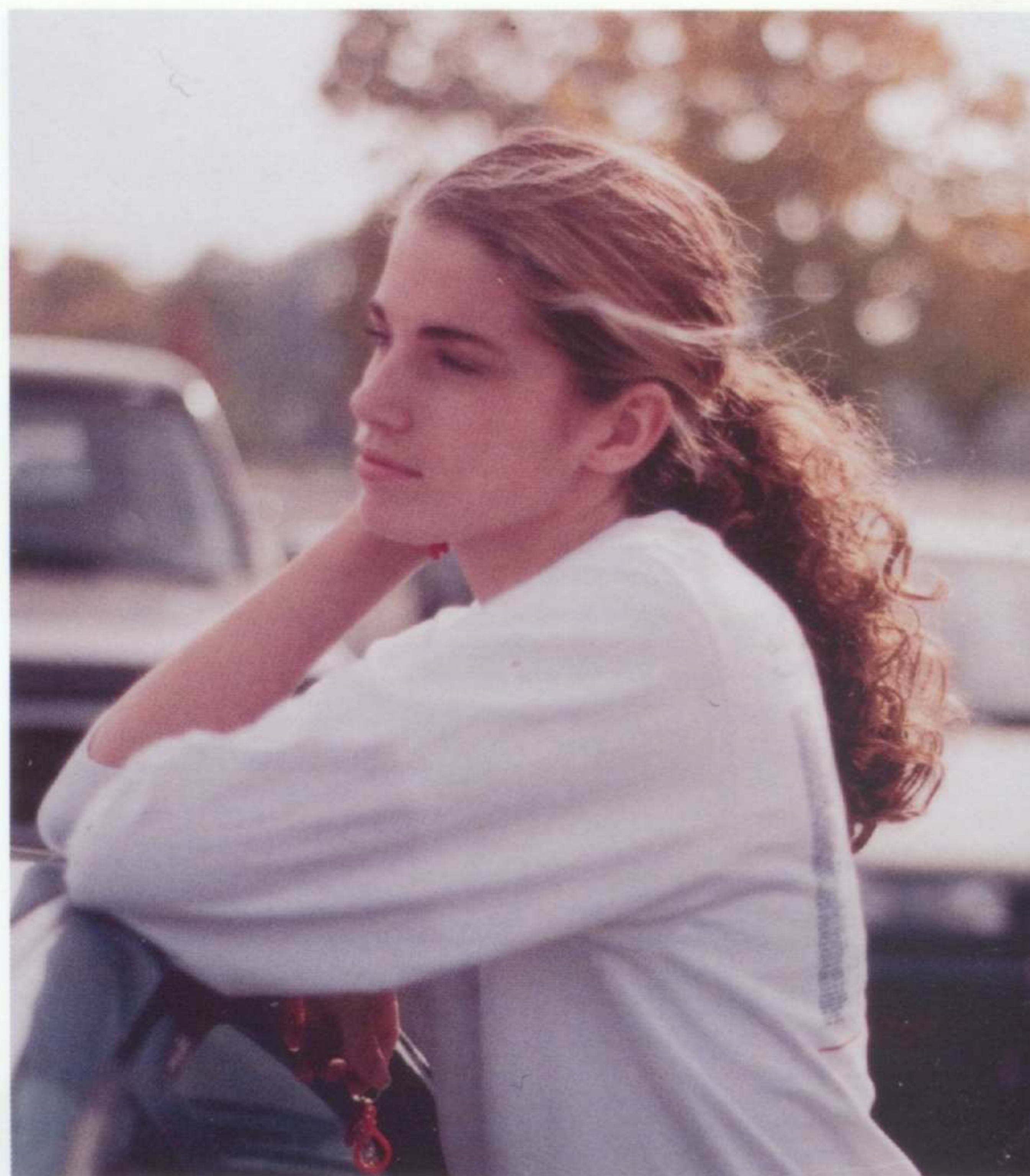

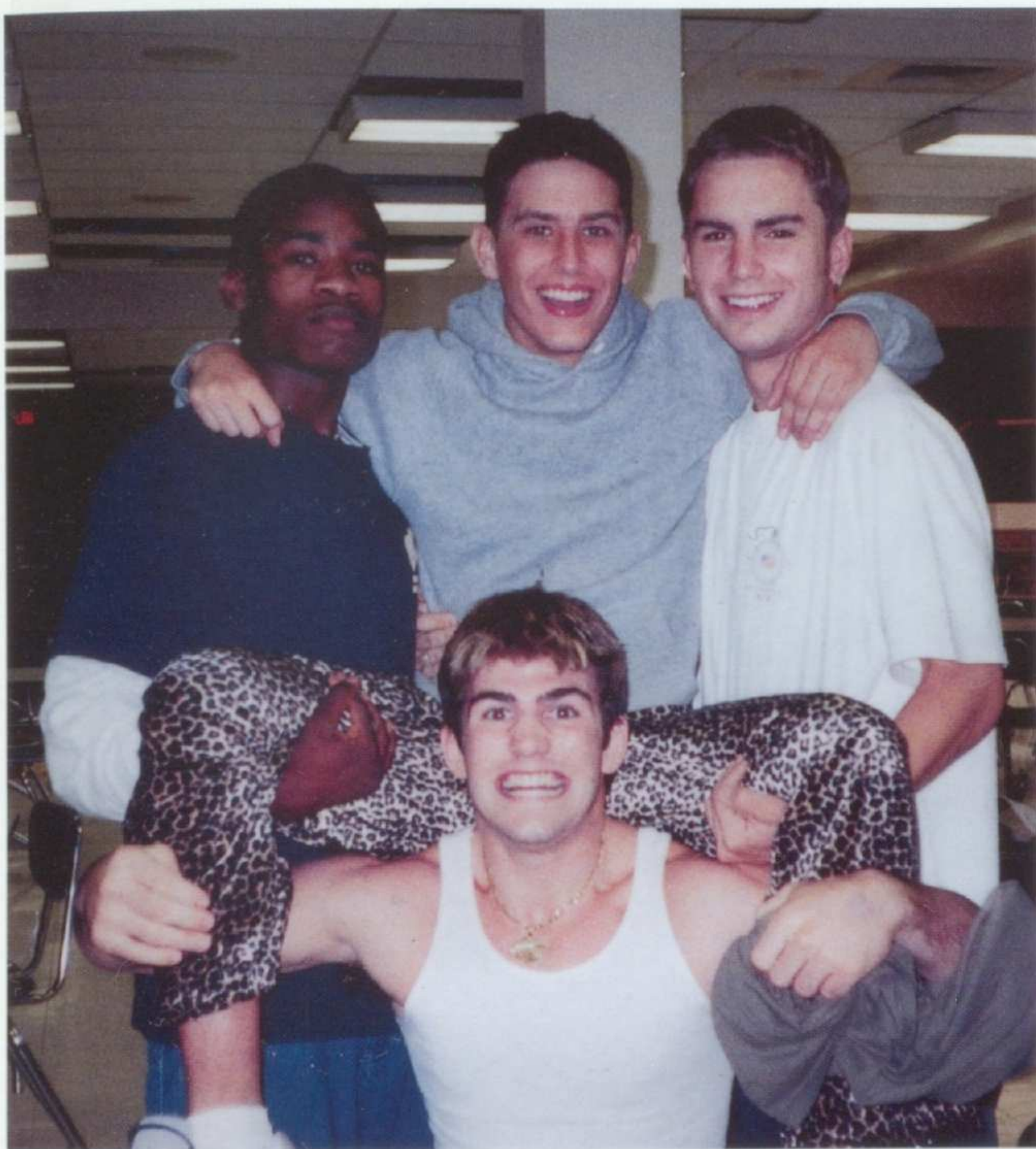

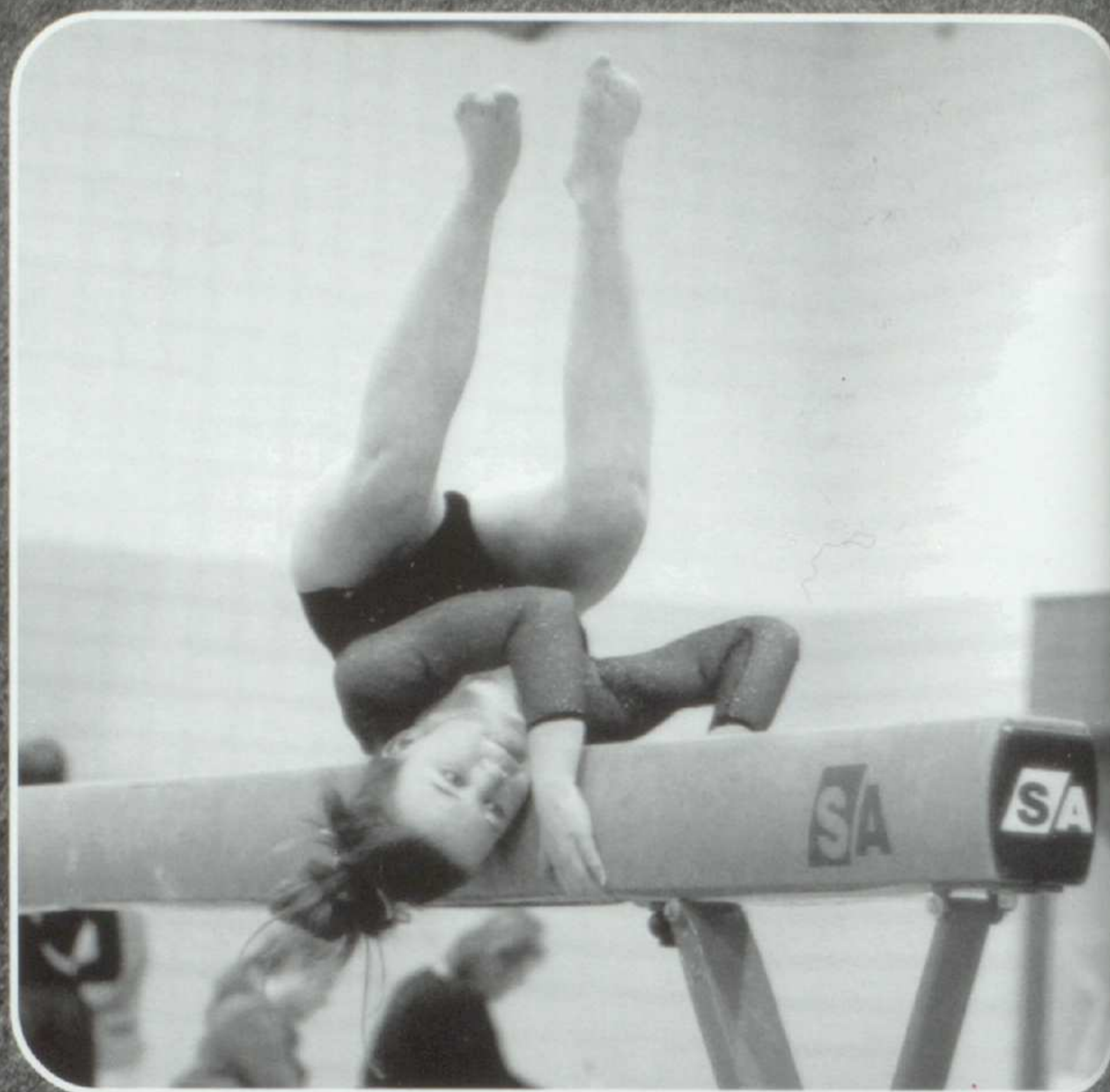

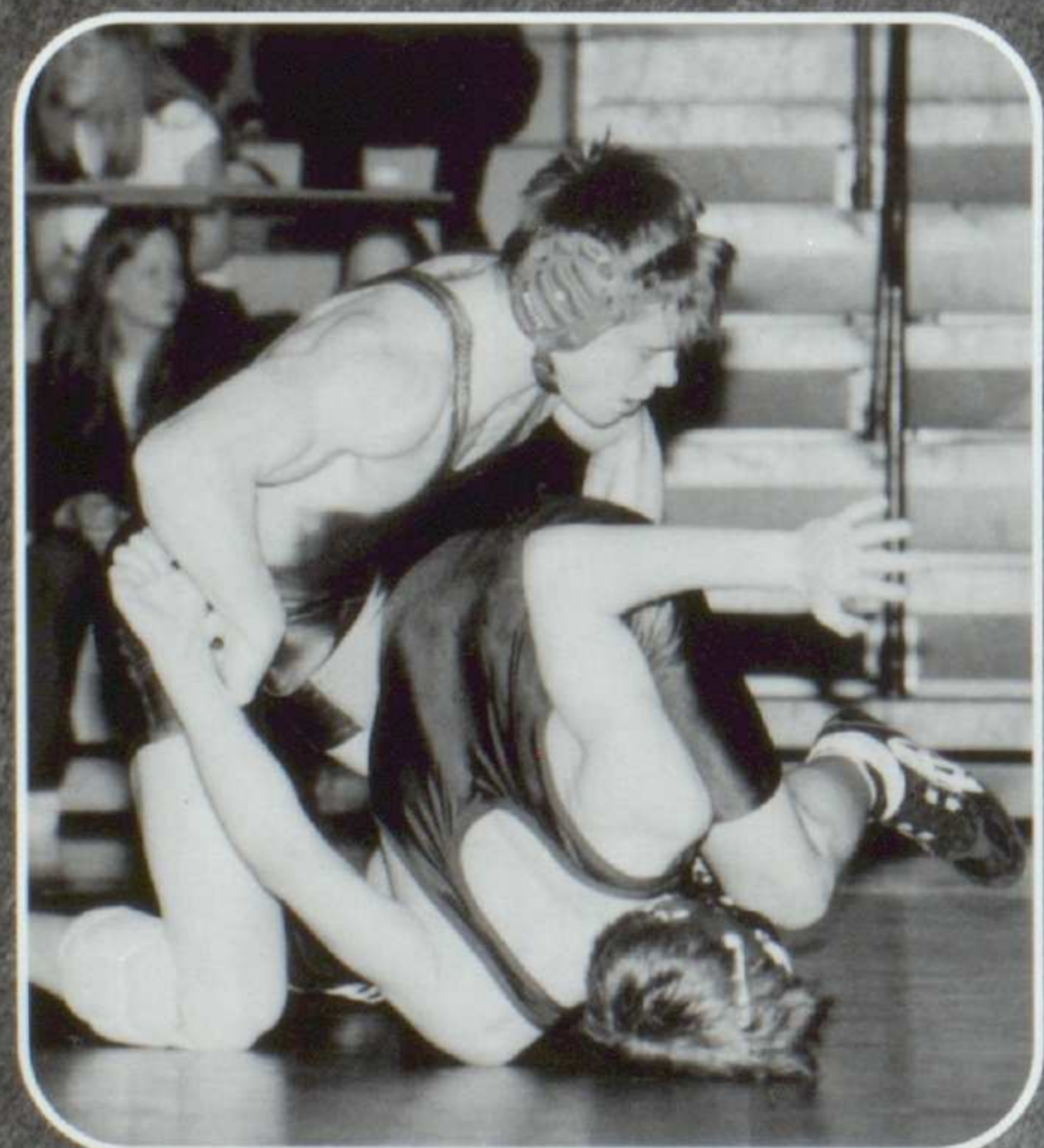

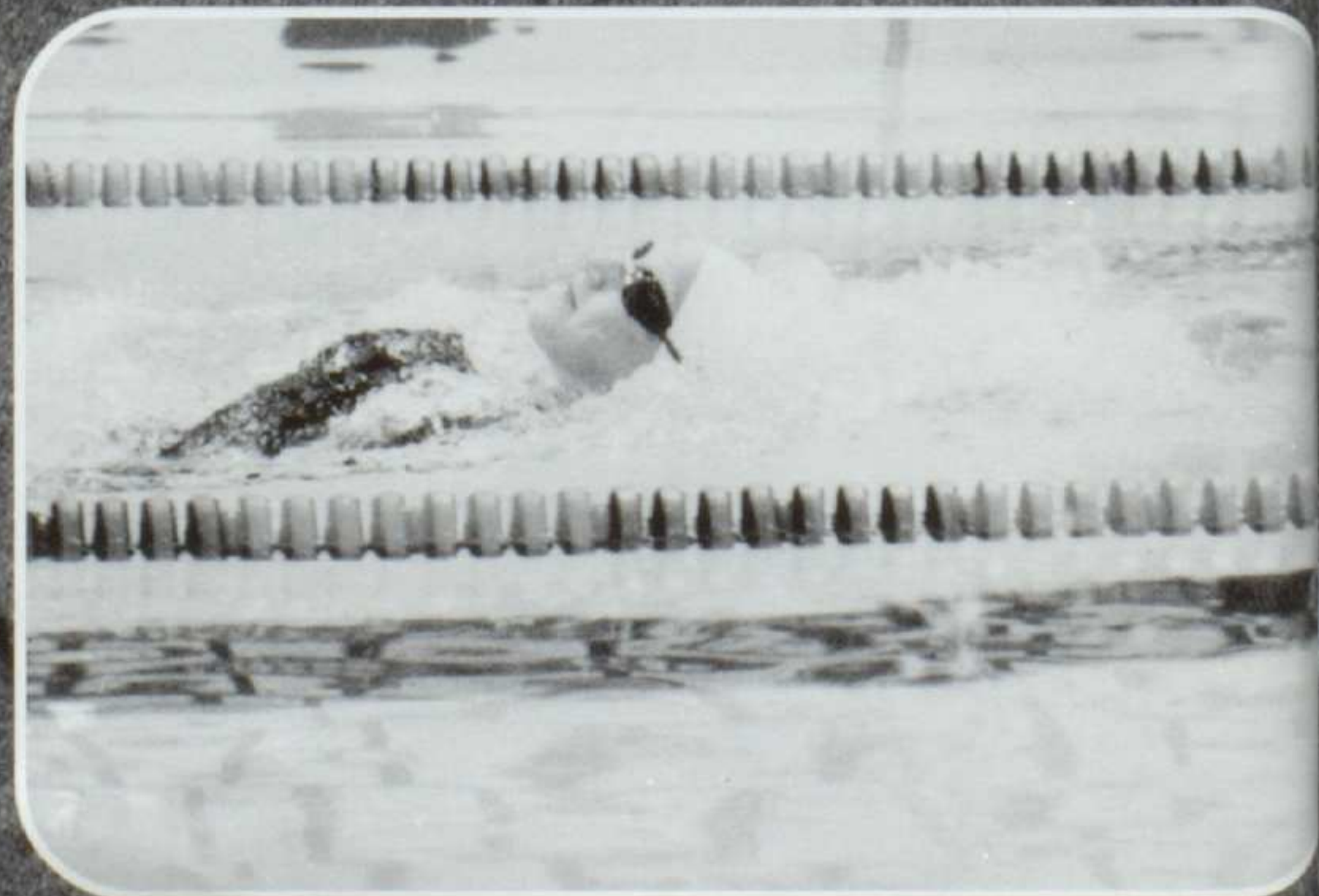

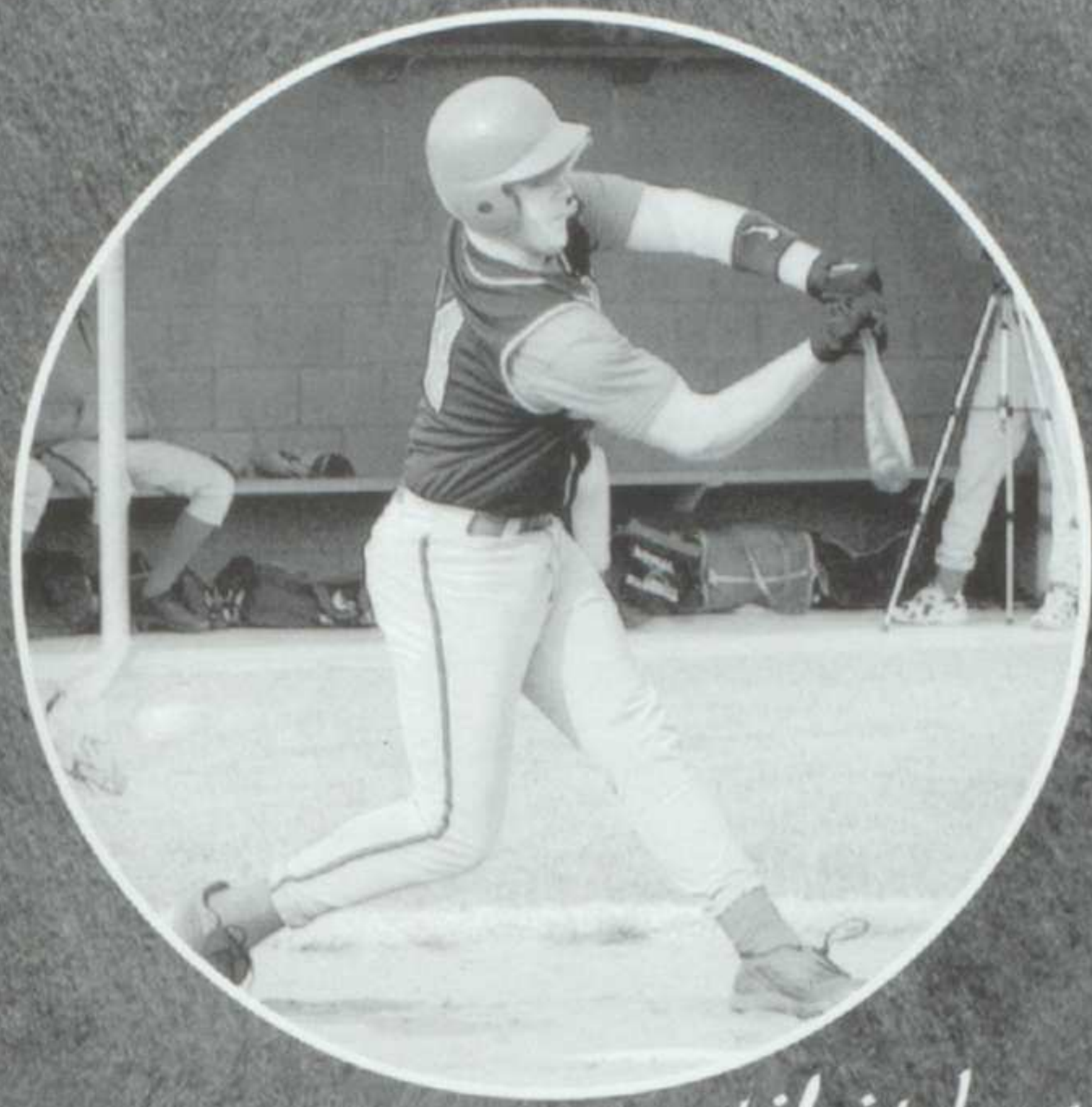

Kickin' Kickin' Up A Fuss Fuss

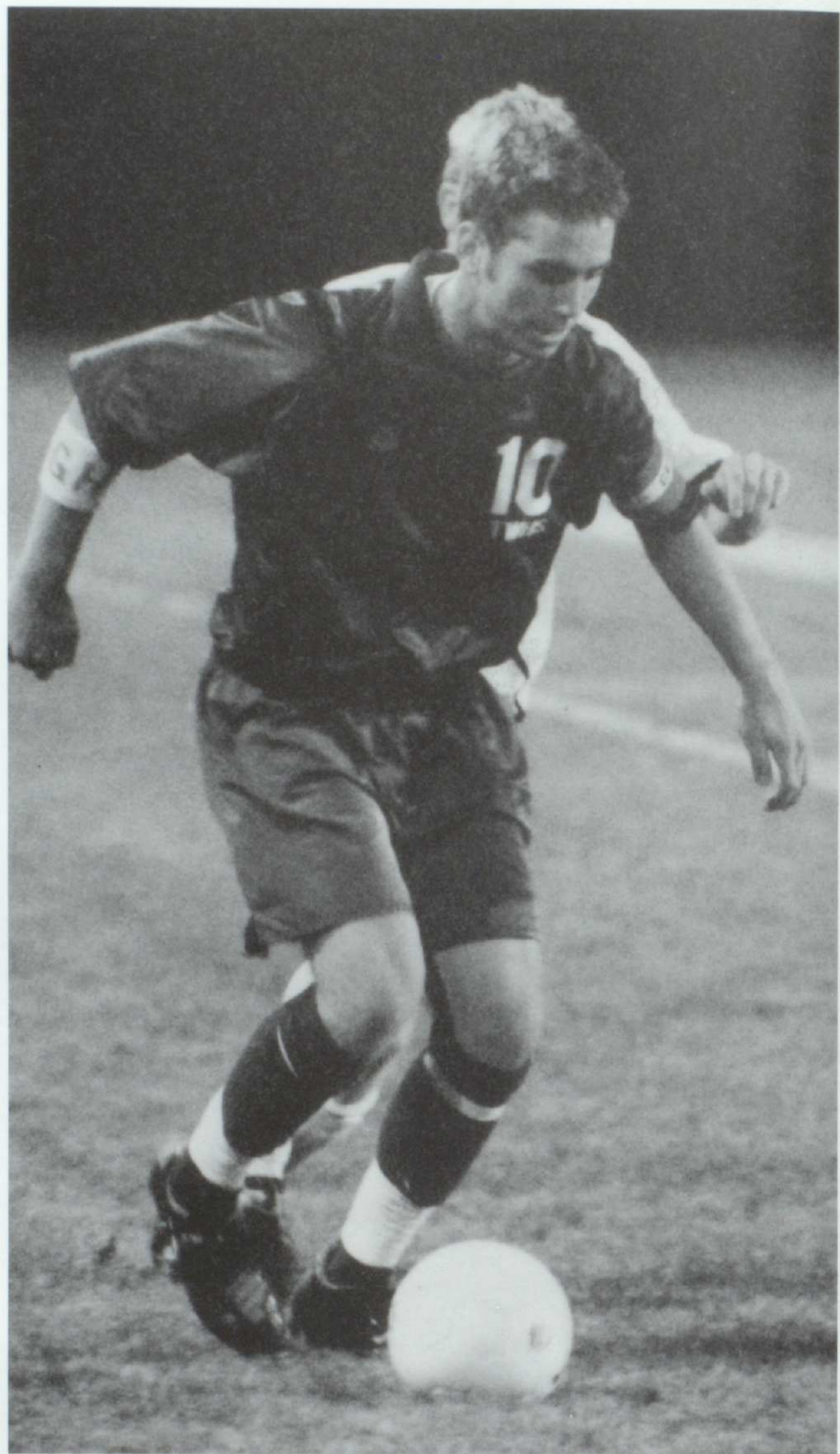
BOYS SOCCER

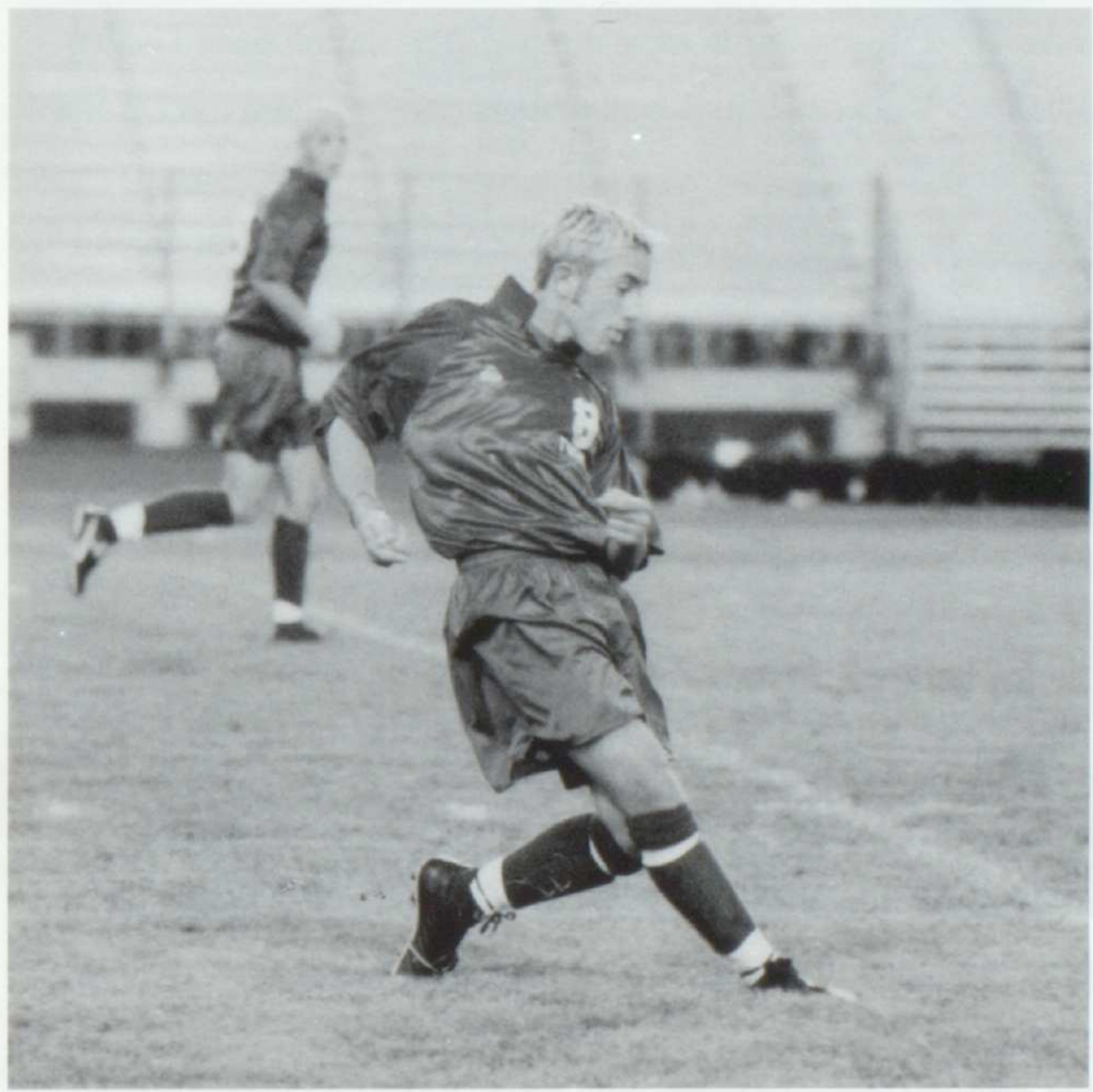

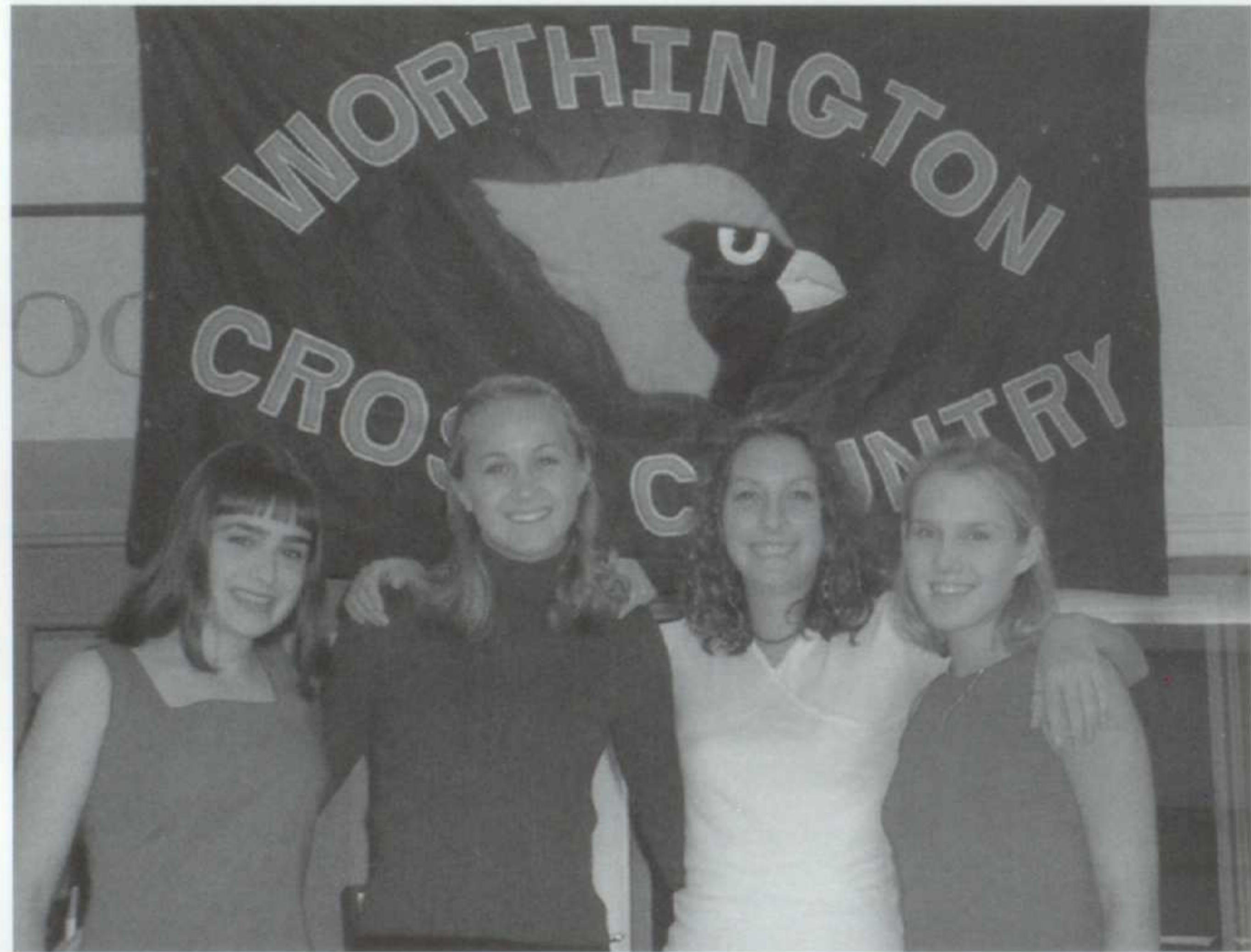

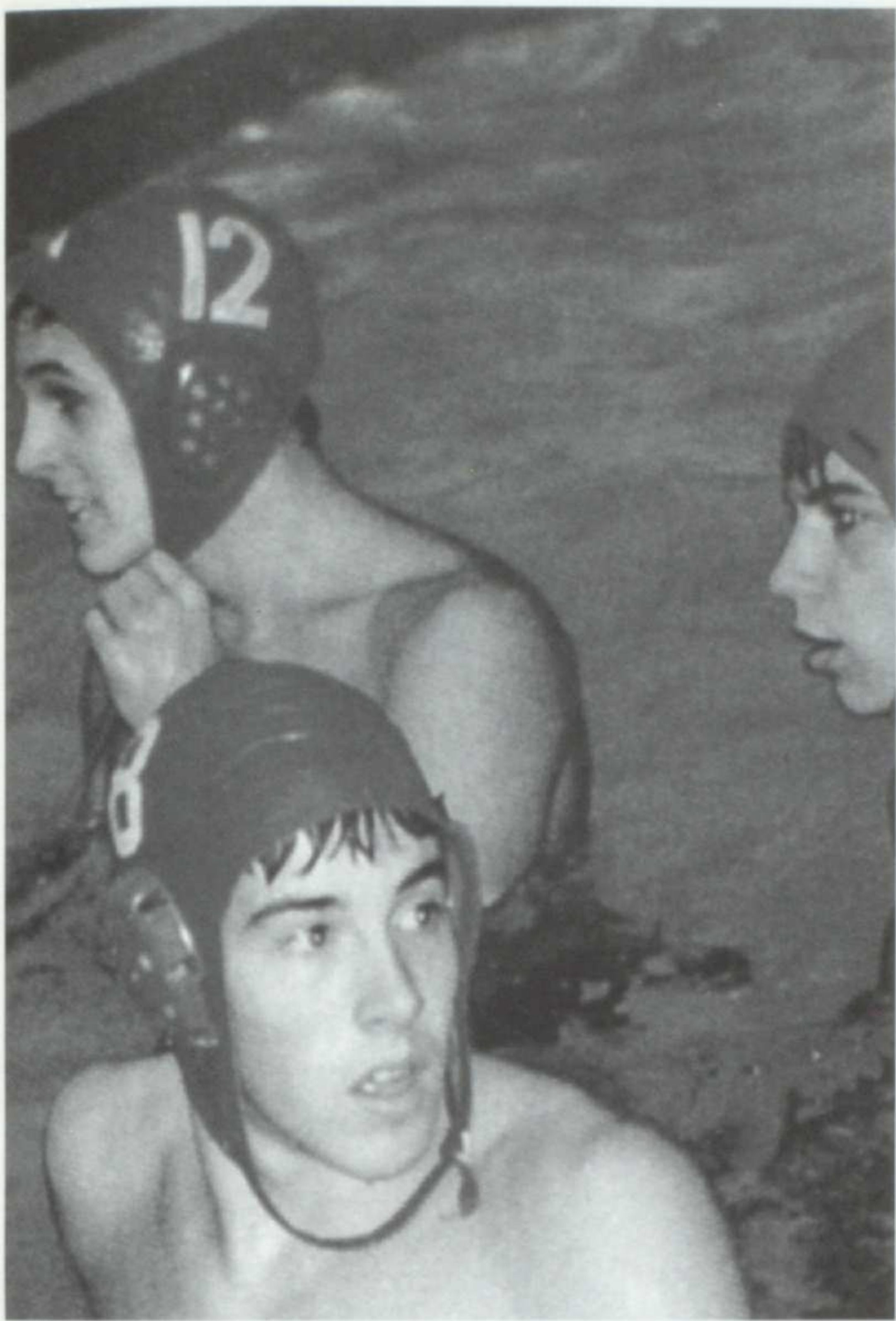

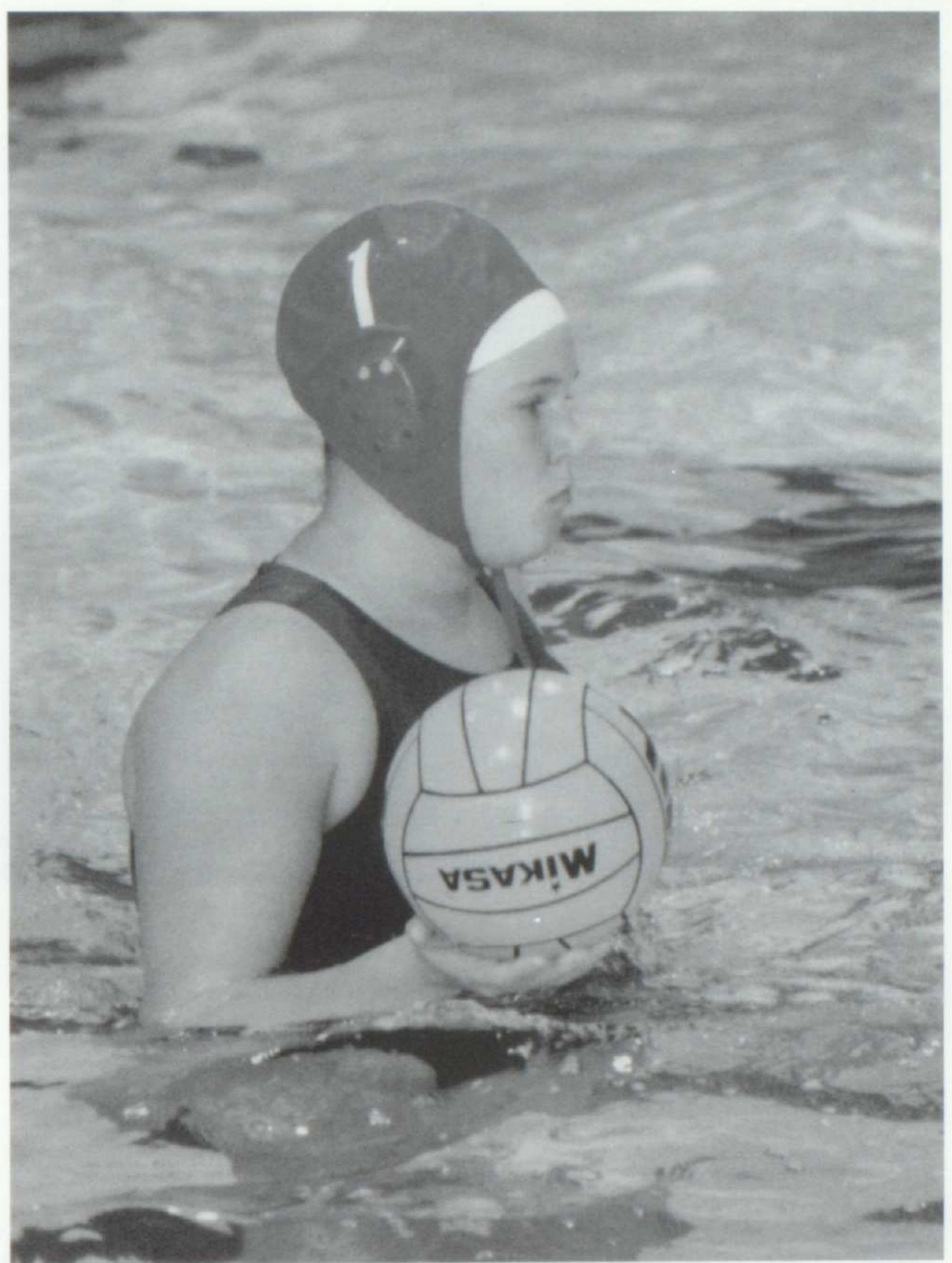

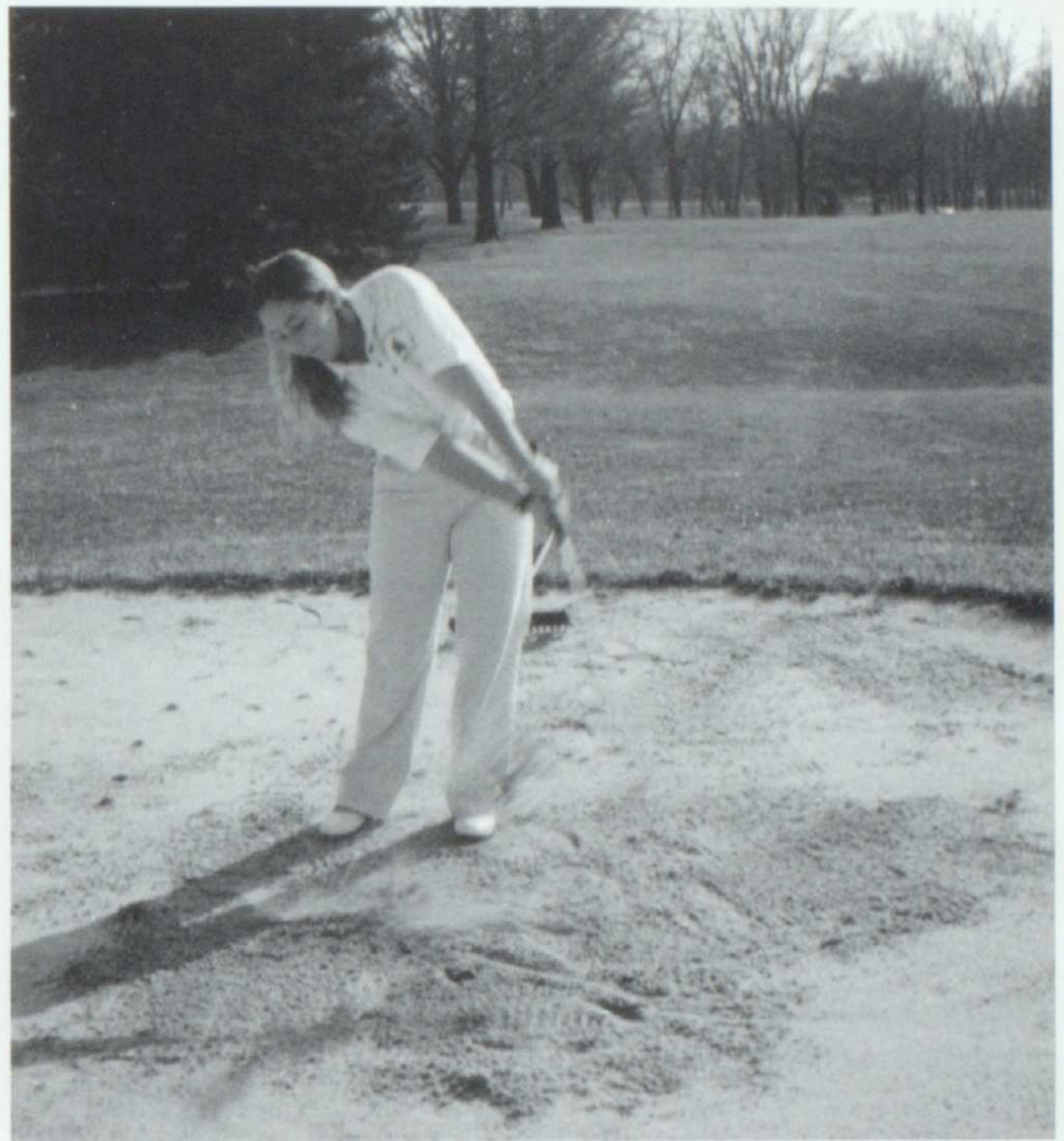

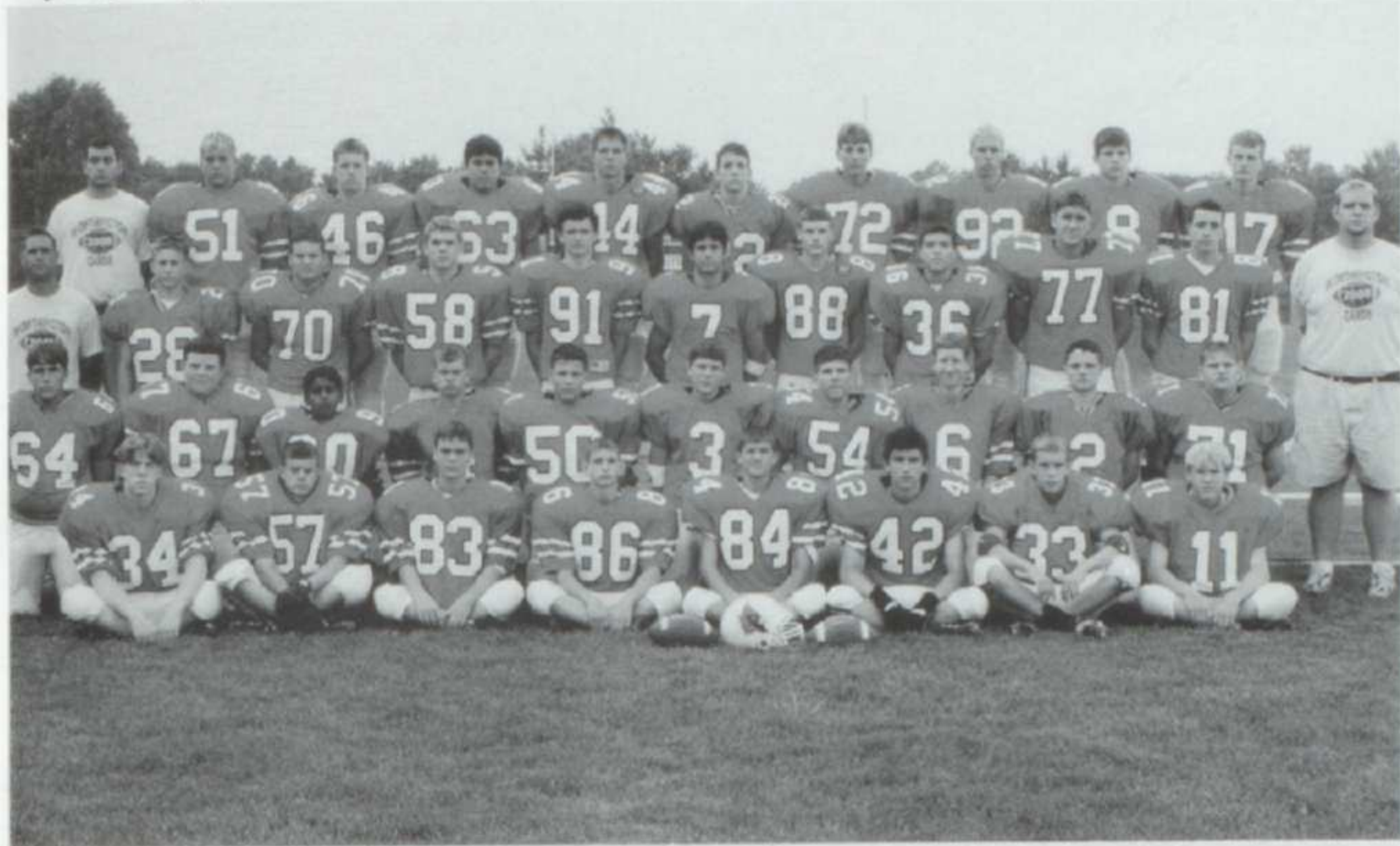

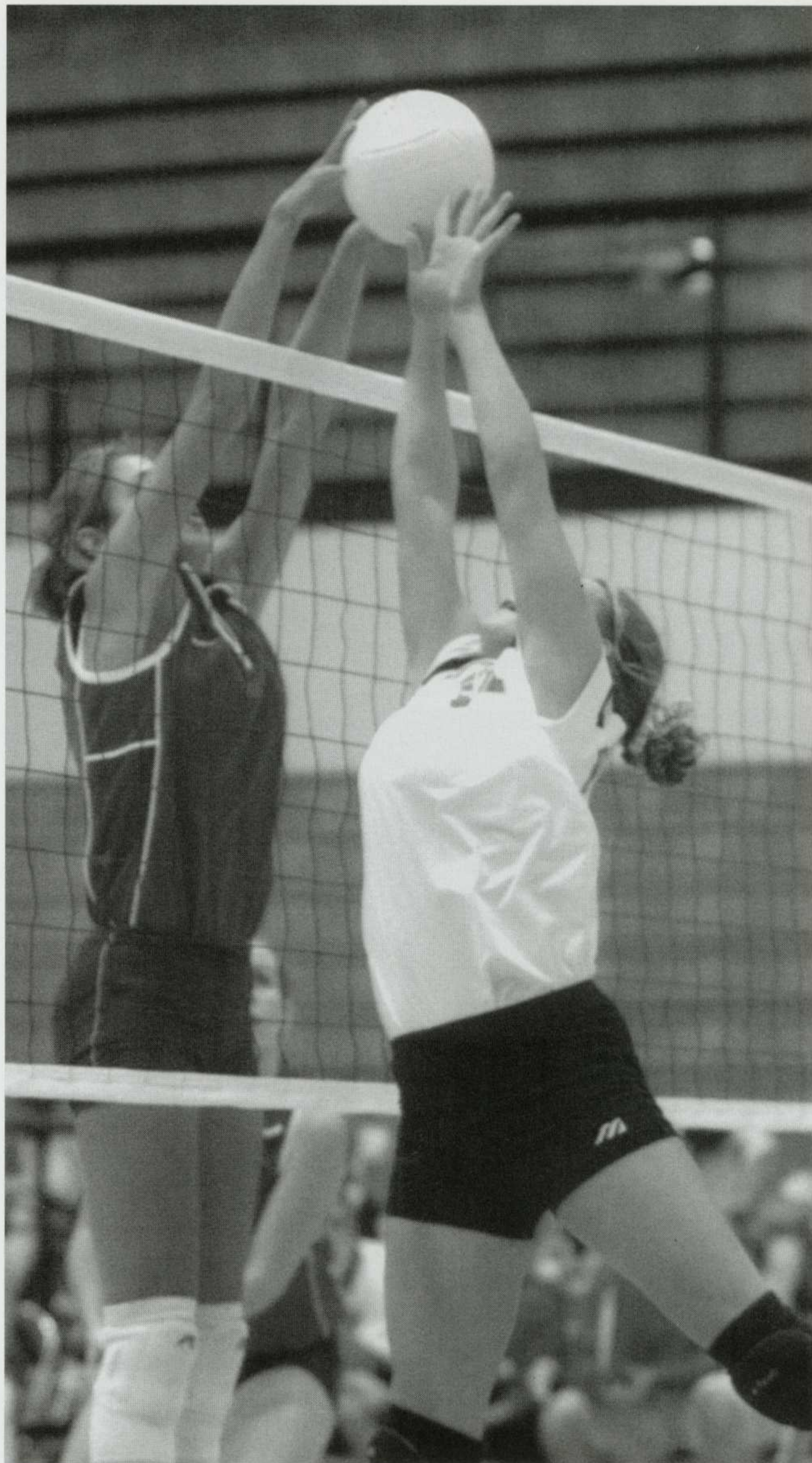

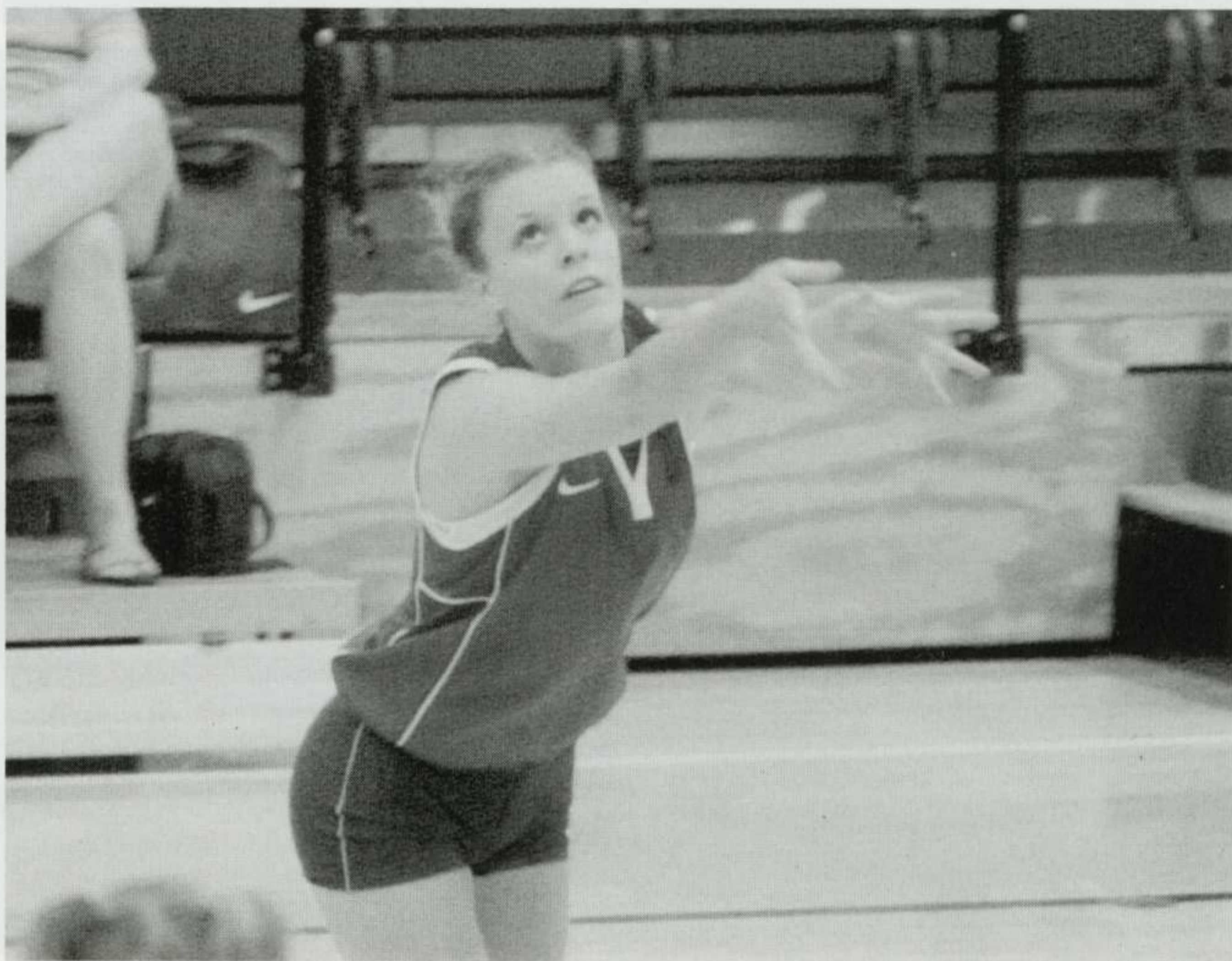

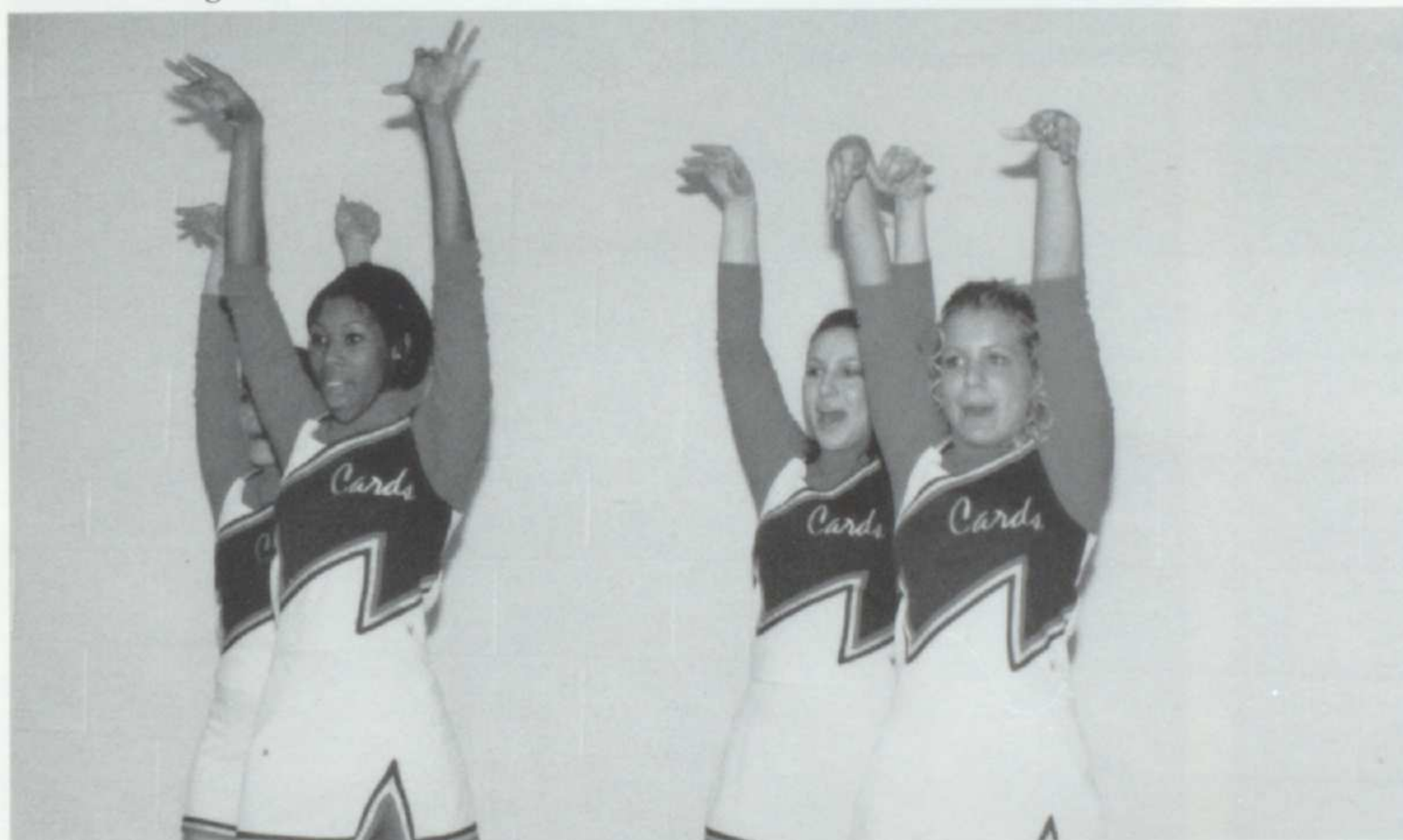
CHEERLEADING

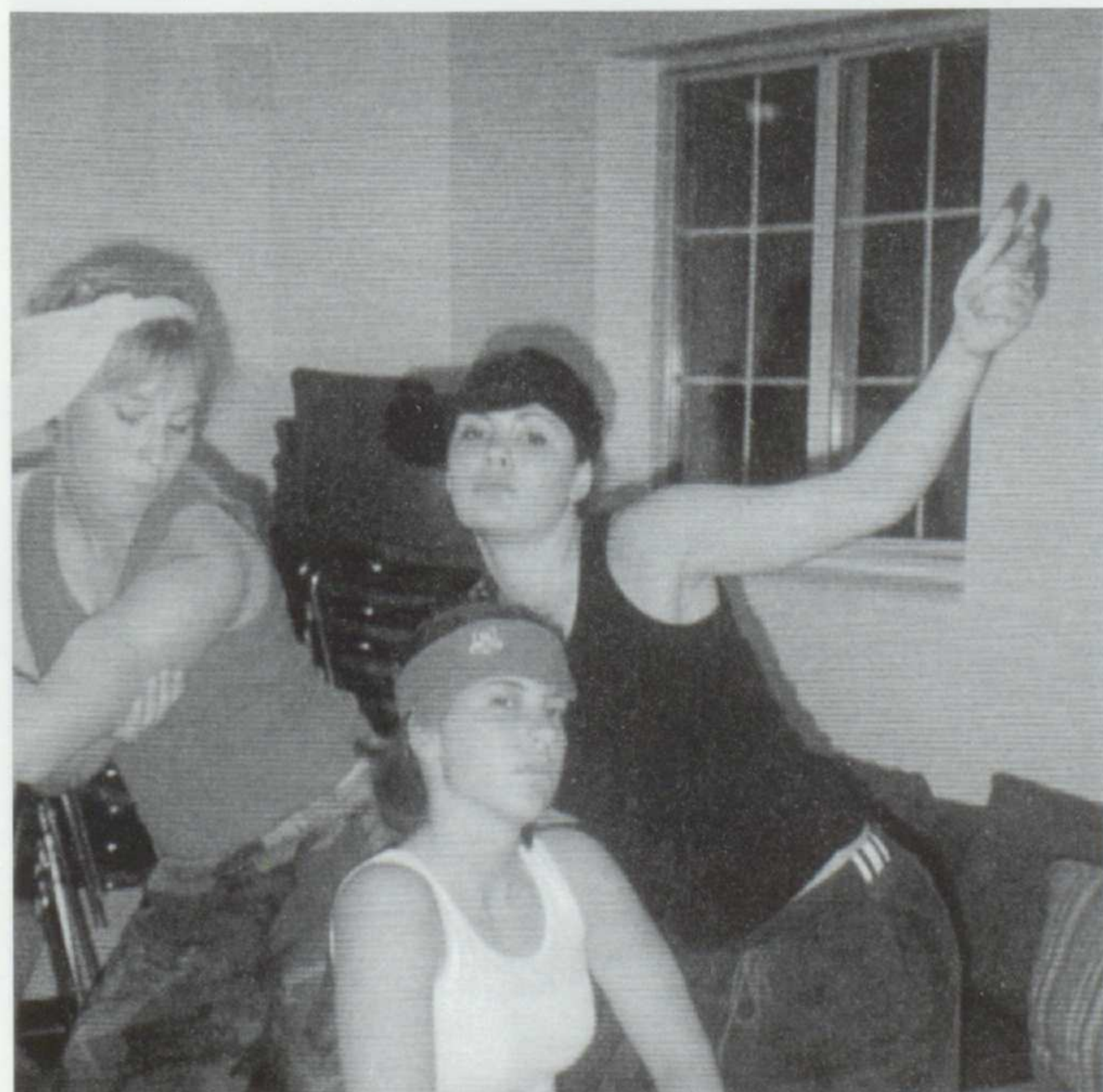

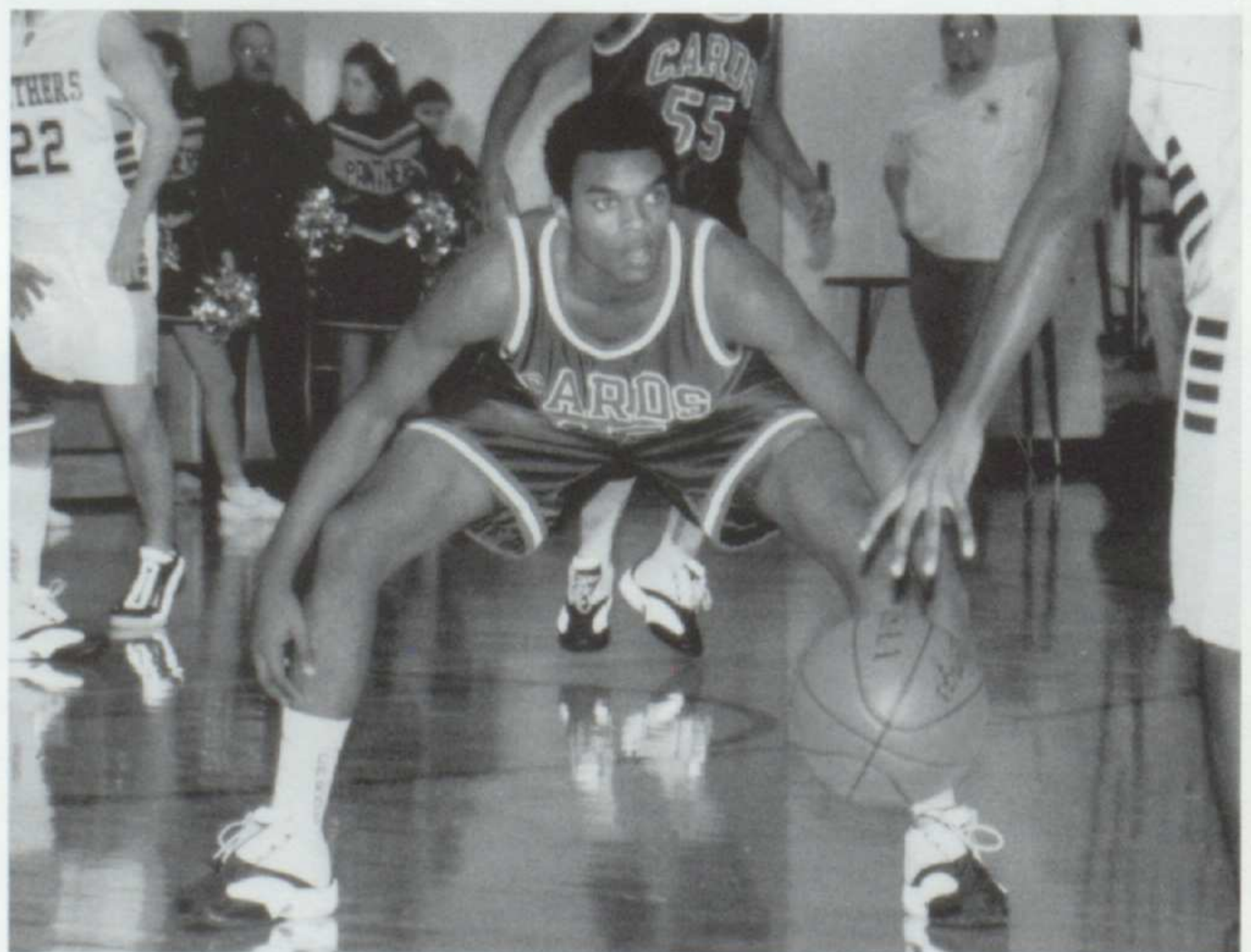

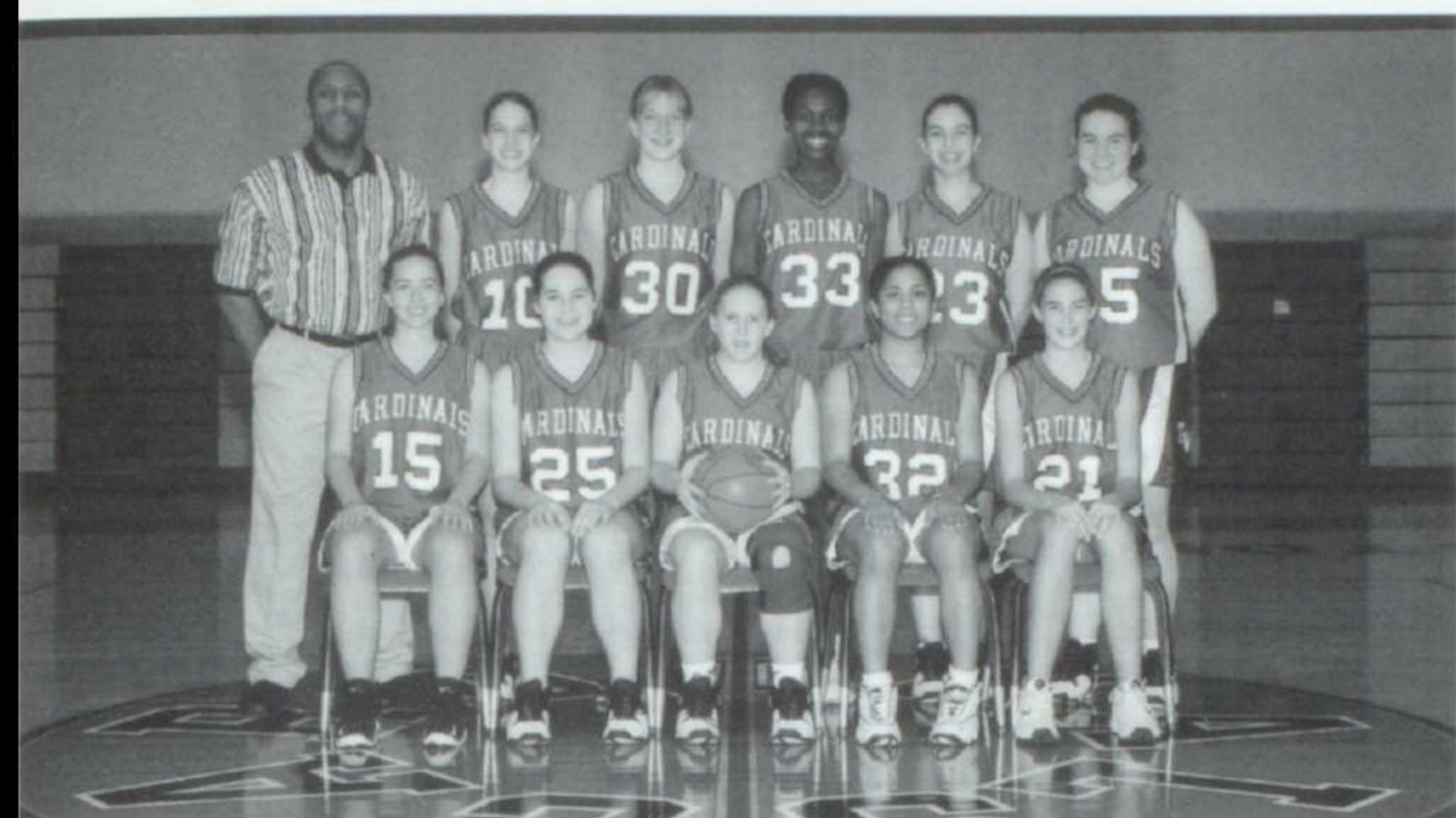

A specific meet that stands out in the girls' minds is the Orange Invitational, where TWHS walked away with first place in the Public School Division.

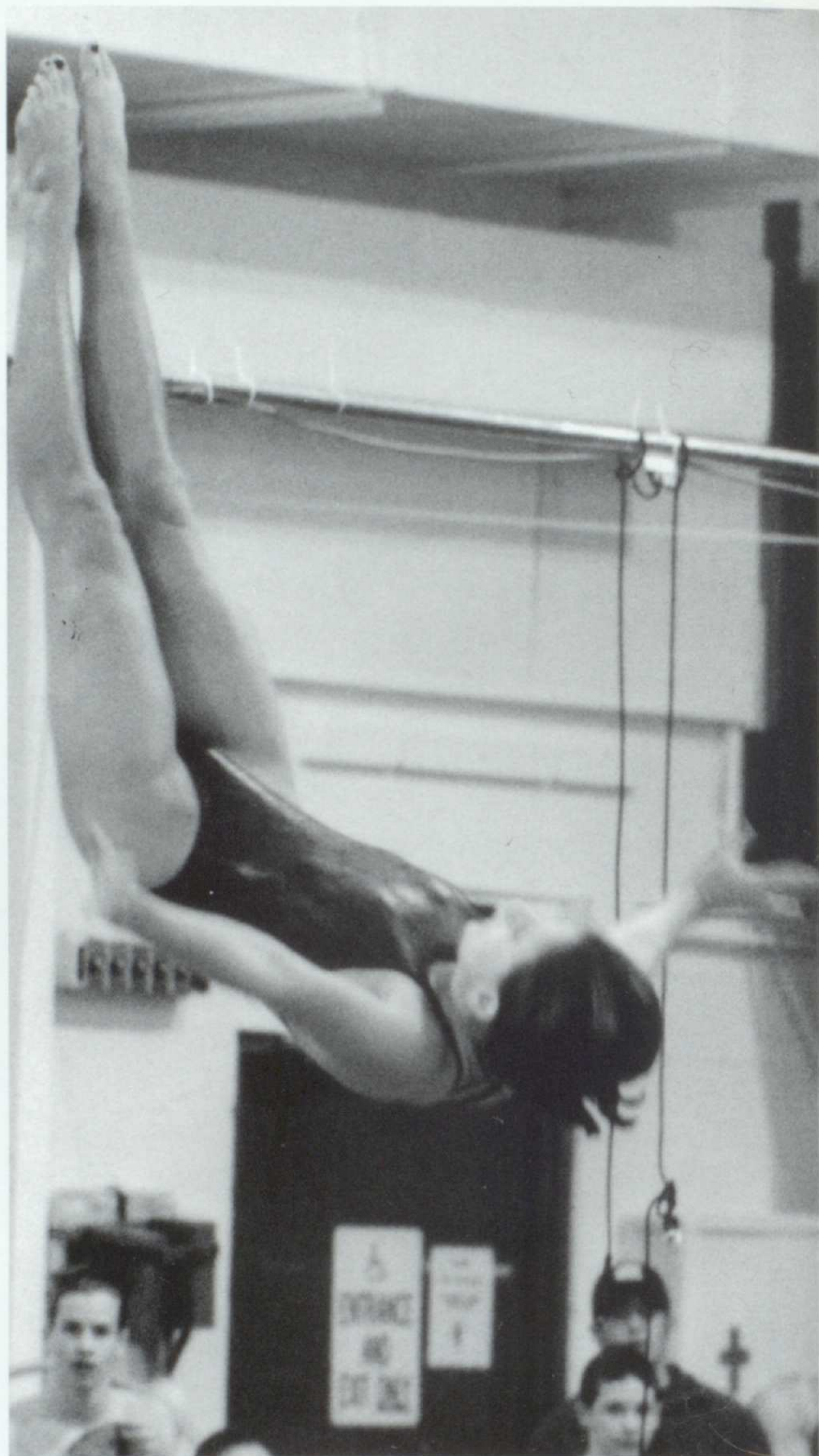
The captains, Megan Thornberg, Katie Ness, Erika Klinker, and Carie Rund, kept the team going with their leadership, support, and guidance.

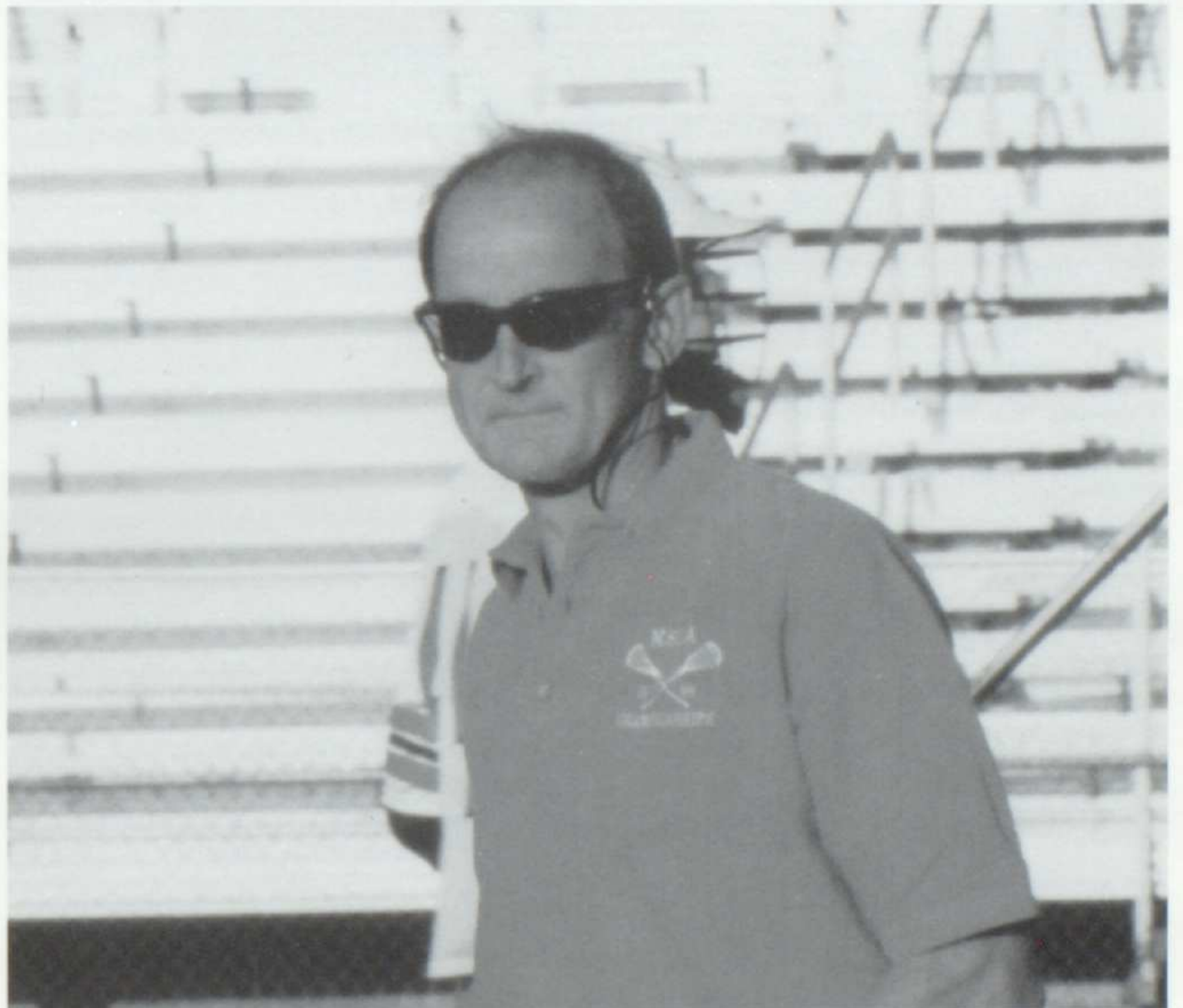

Including Burch and Boswell, the baseball team will be losing five seniors at the end of this year, the others being Matt Bahorek, Nick Comer, and Grant Watson.

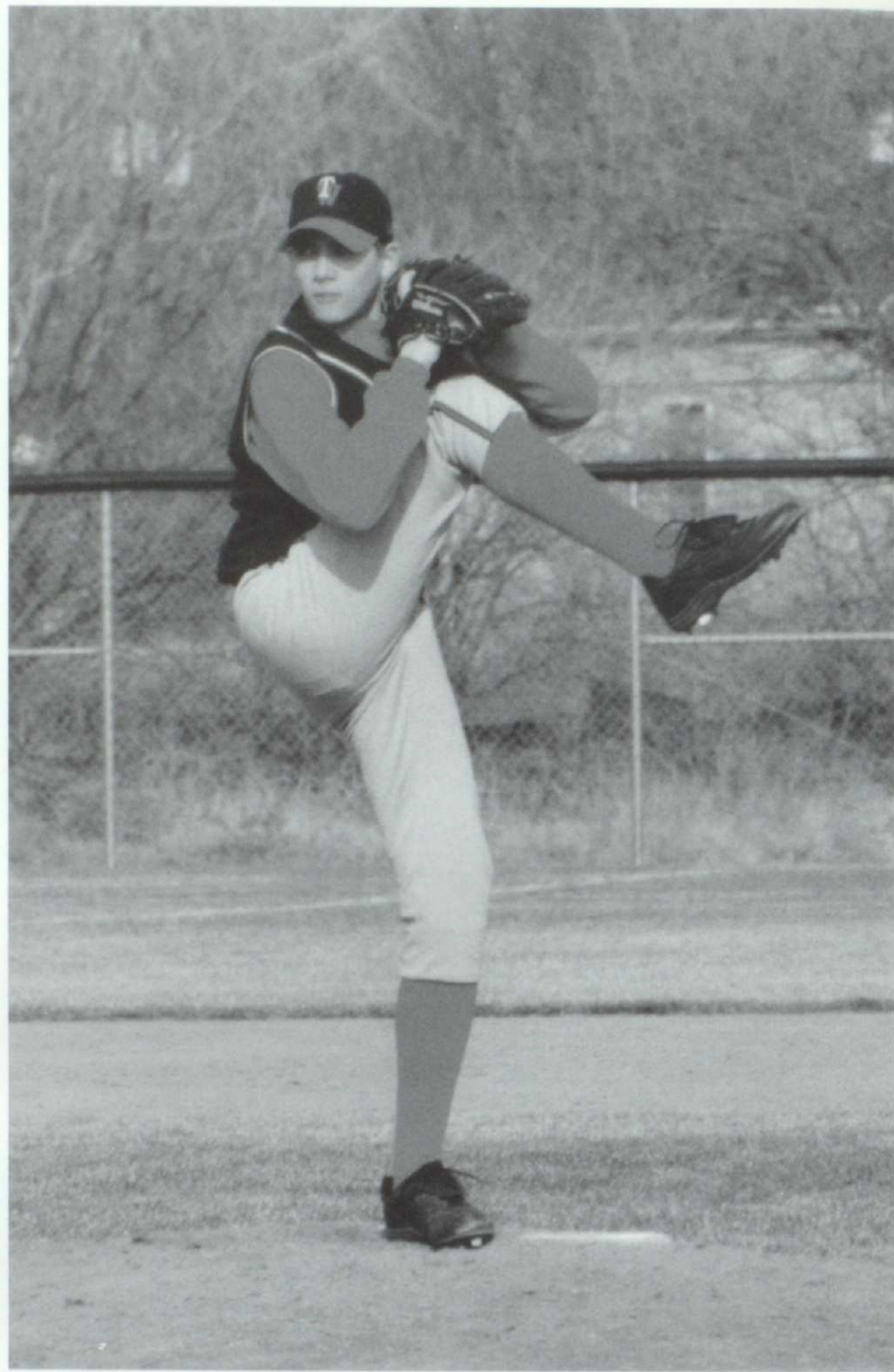

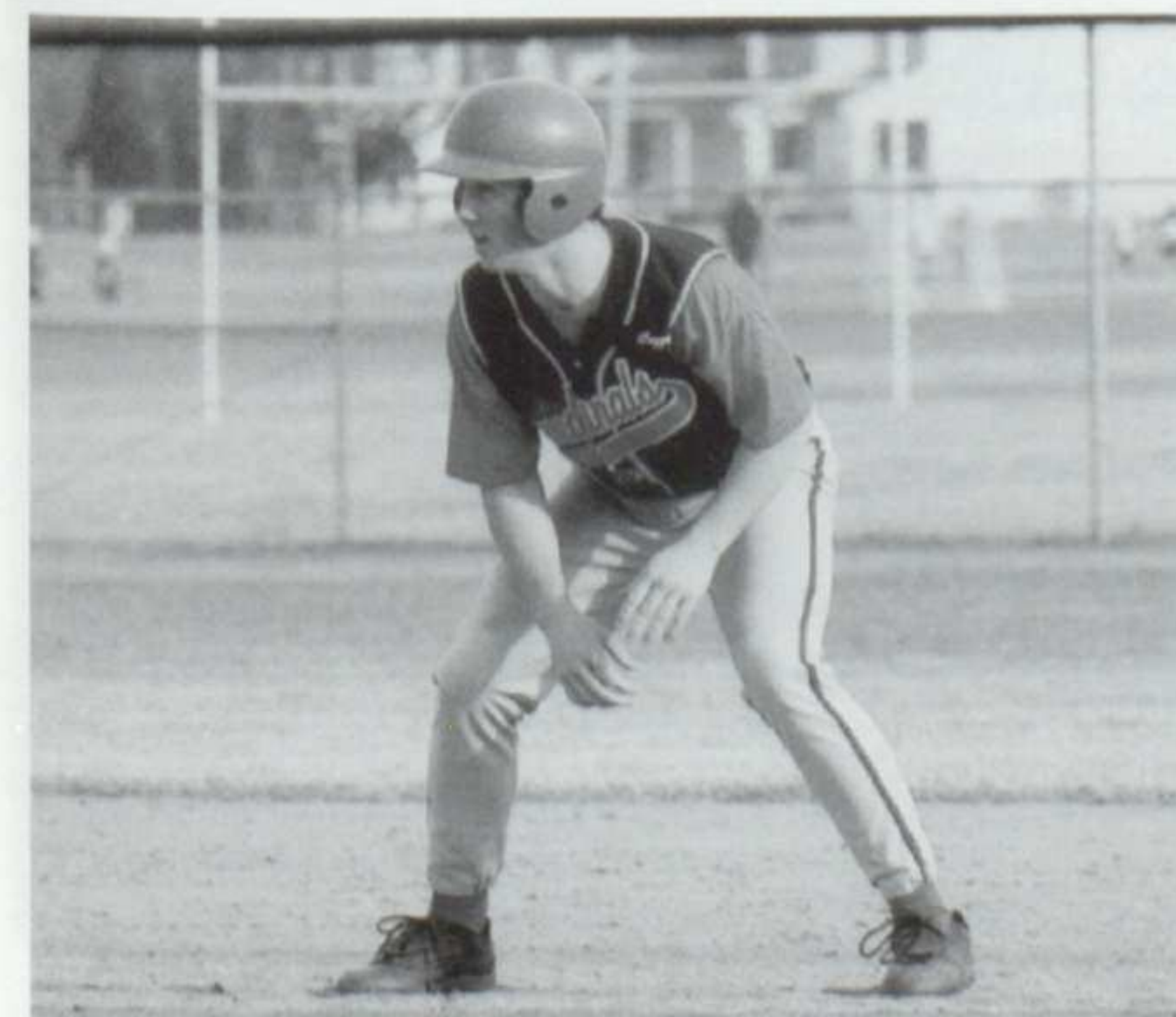

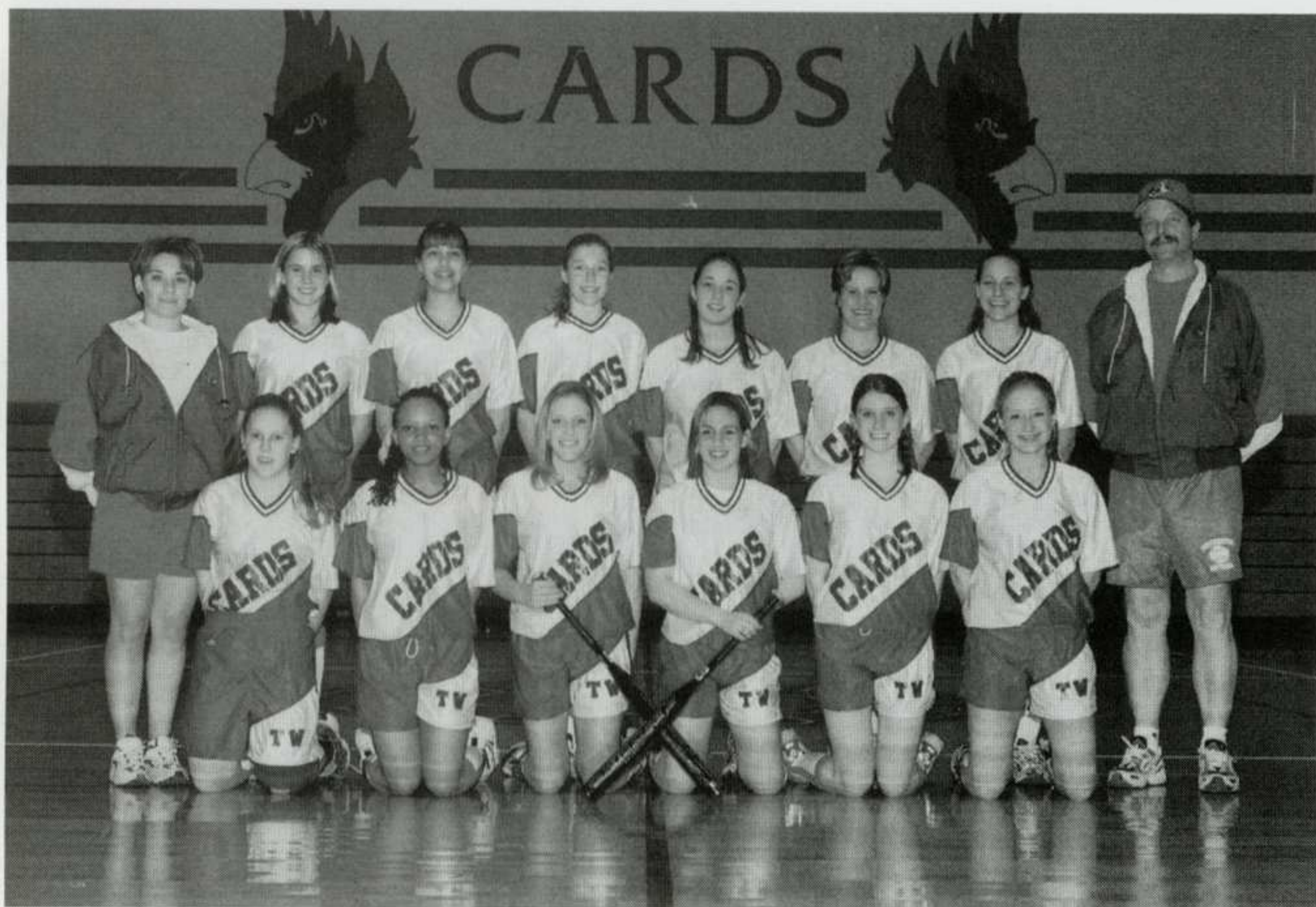
GIRLS SOFTBALL

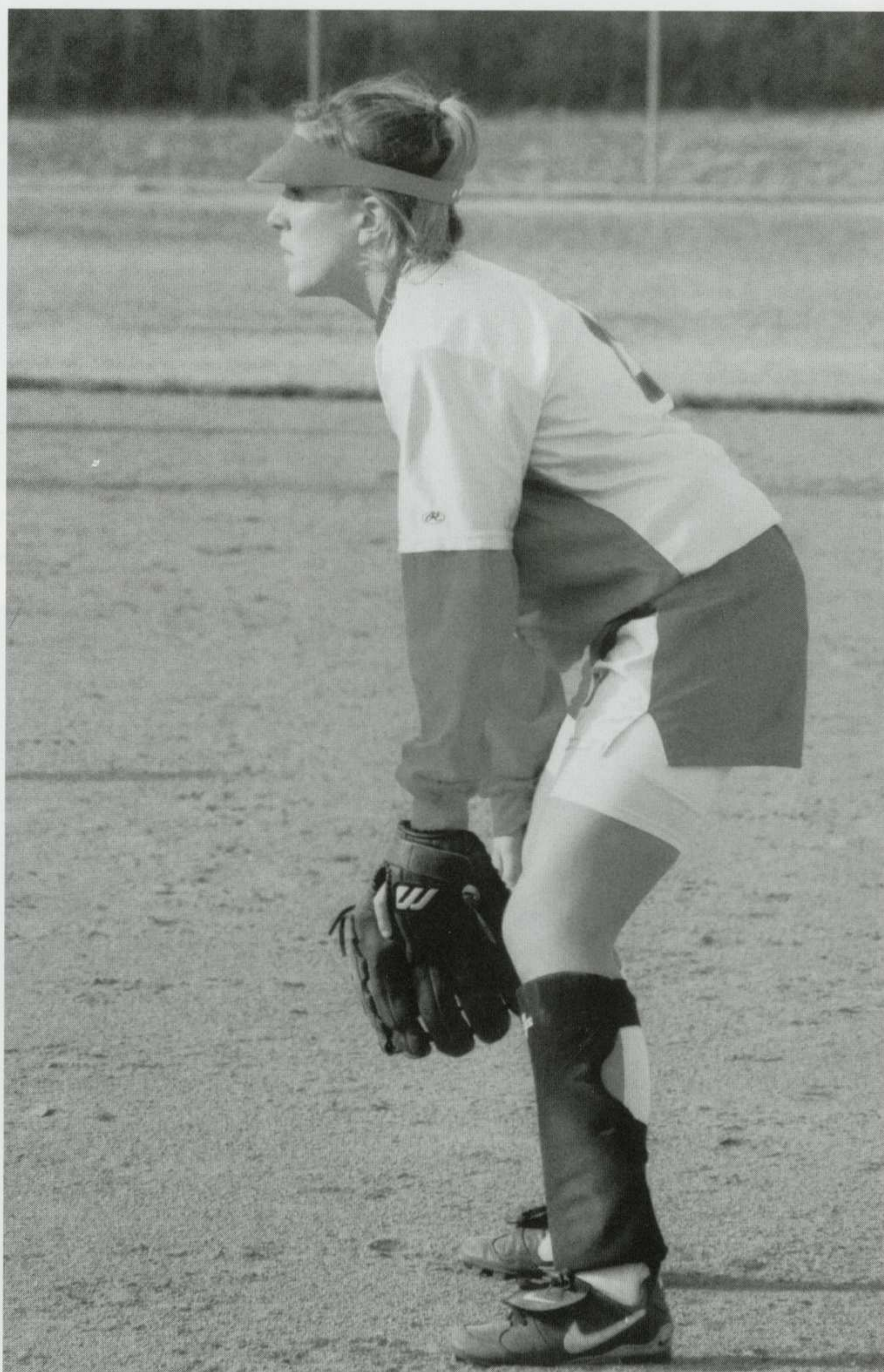

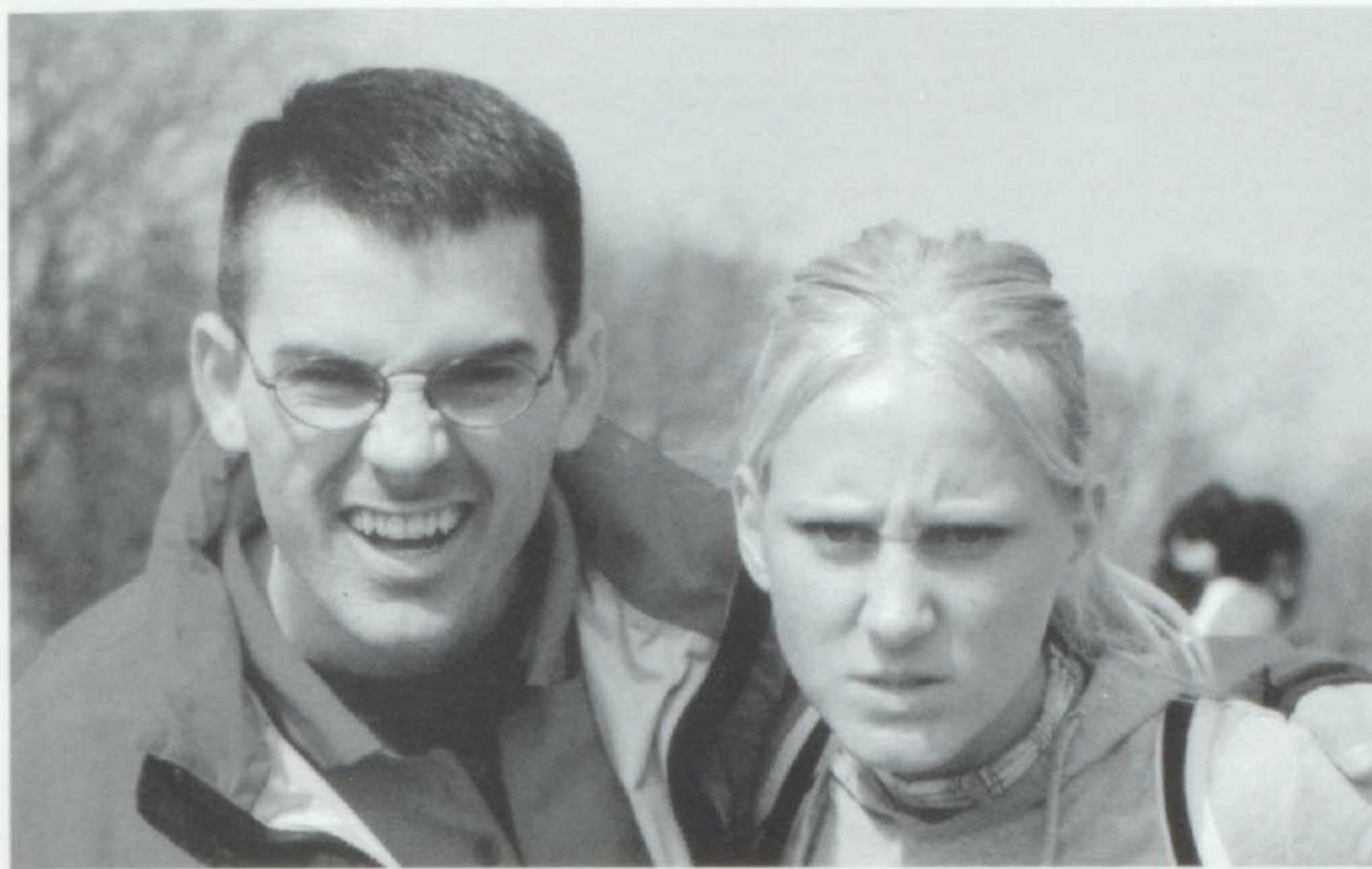

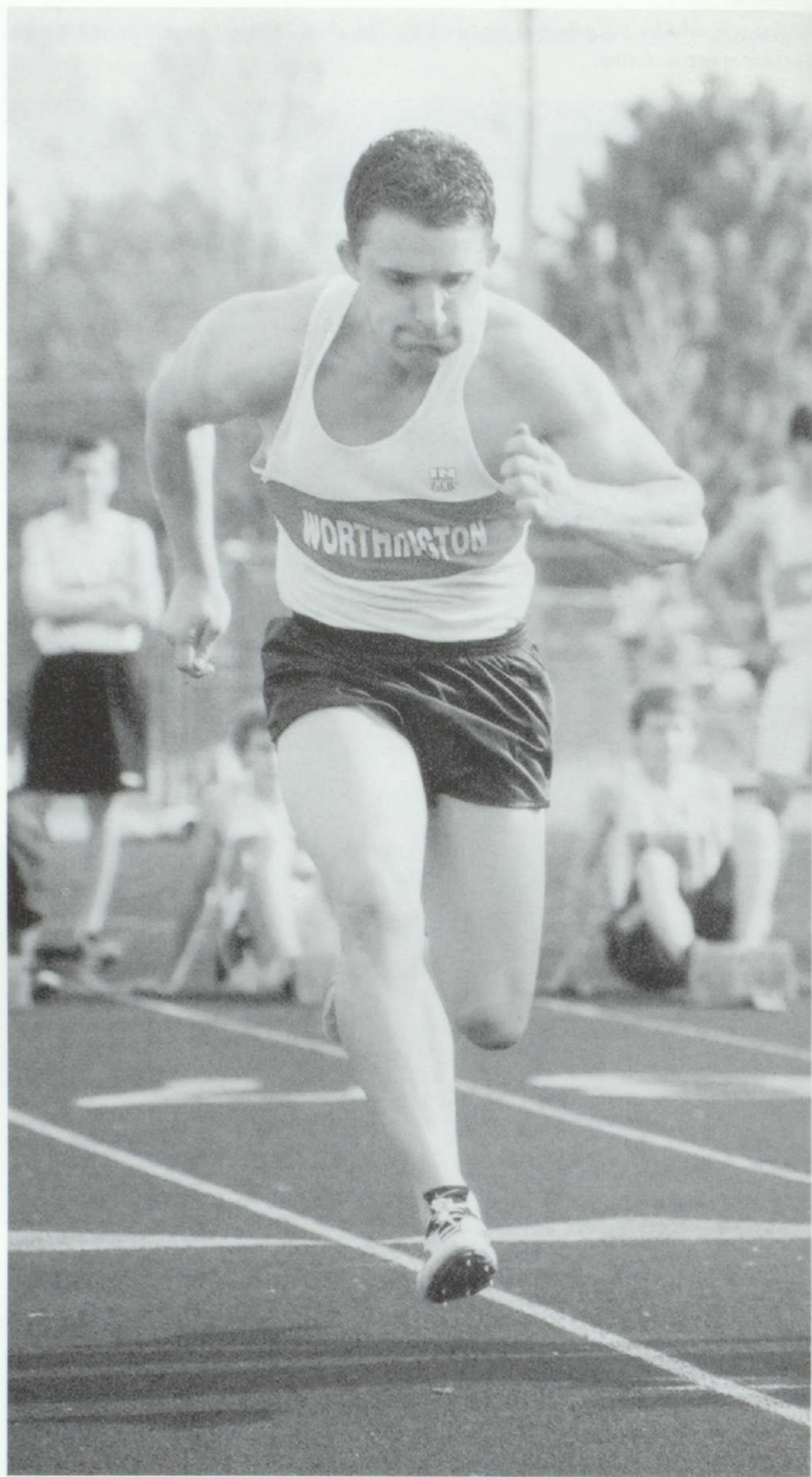

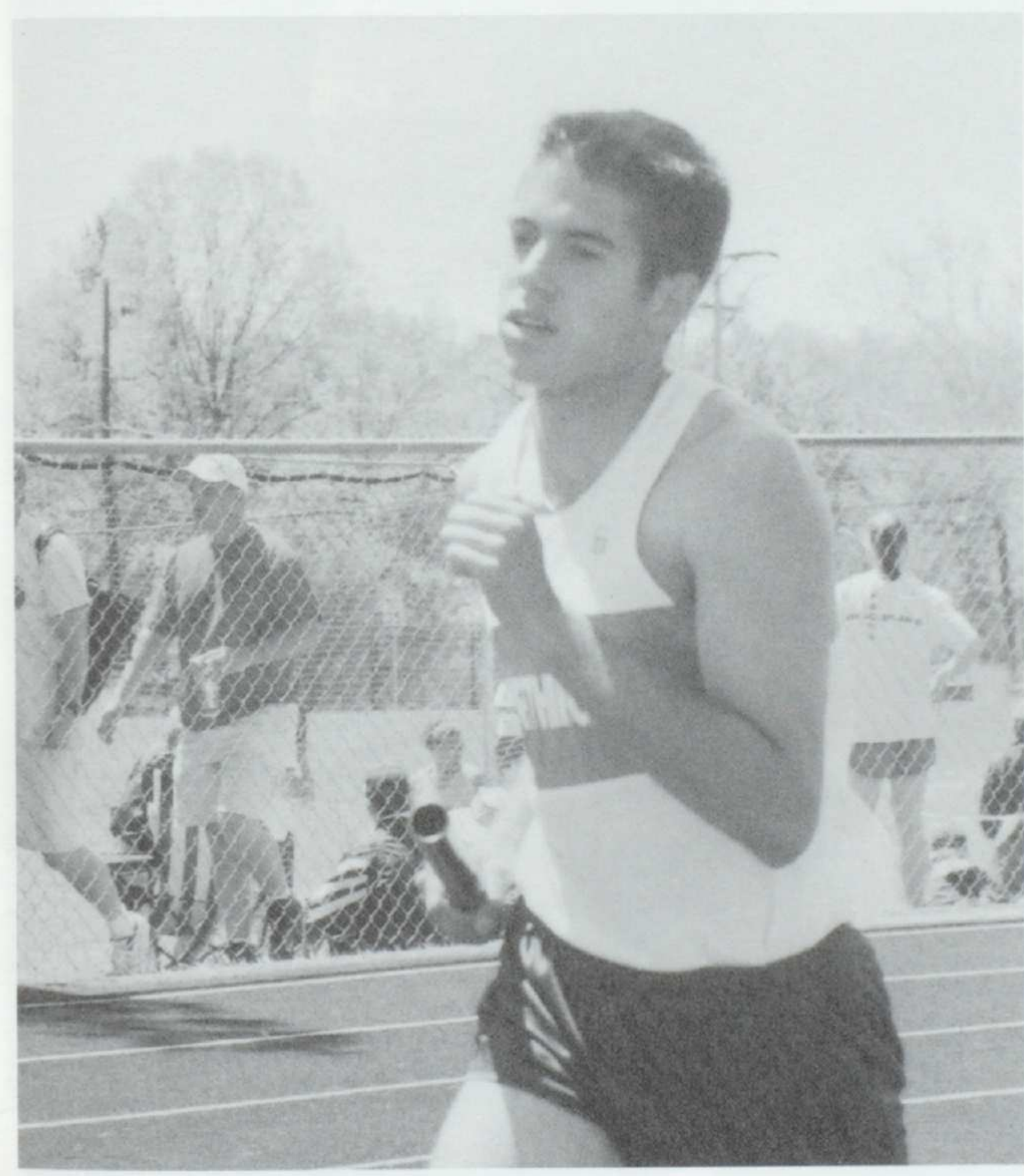

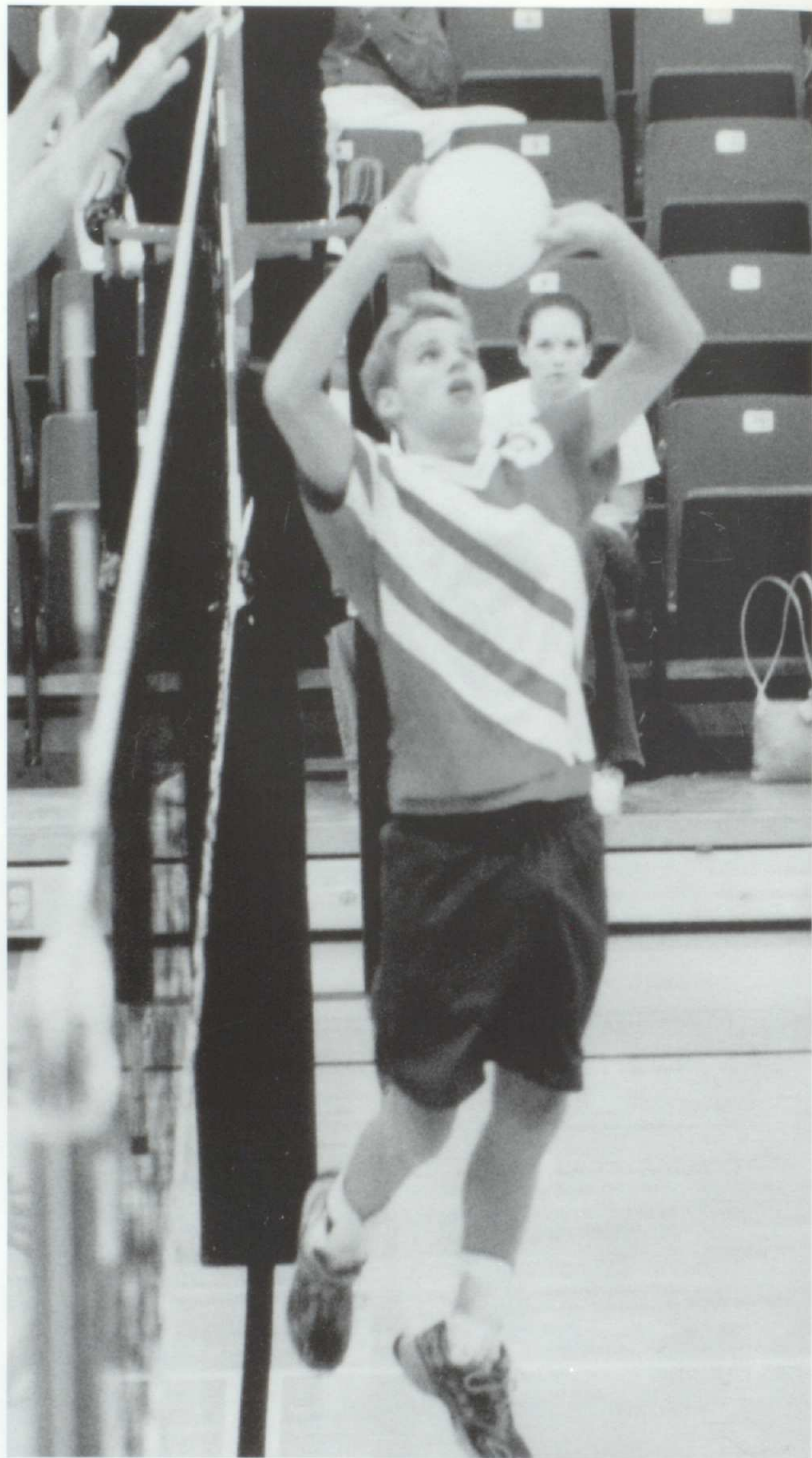

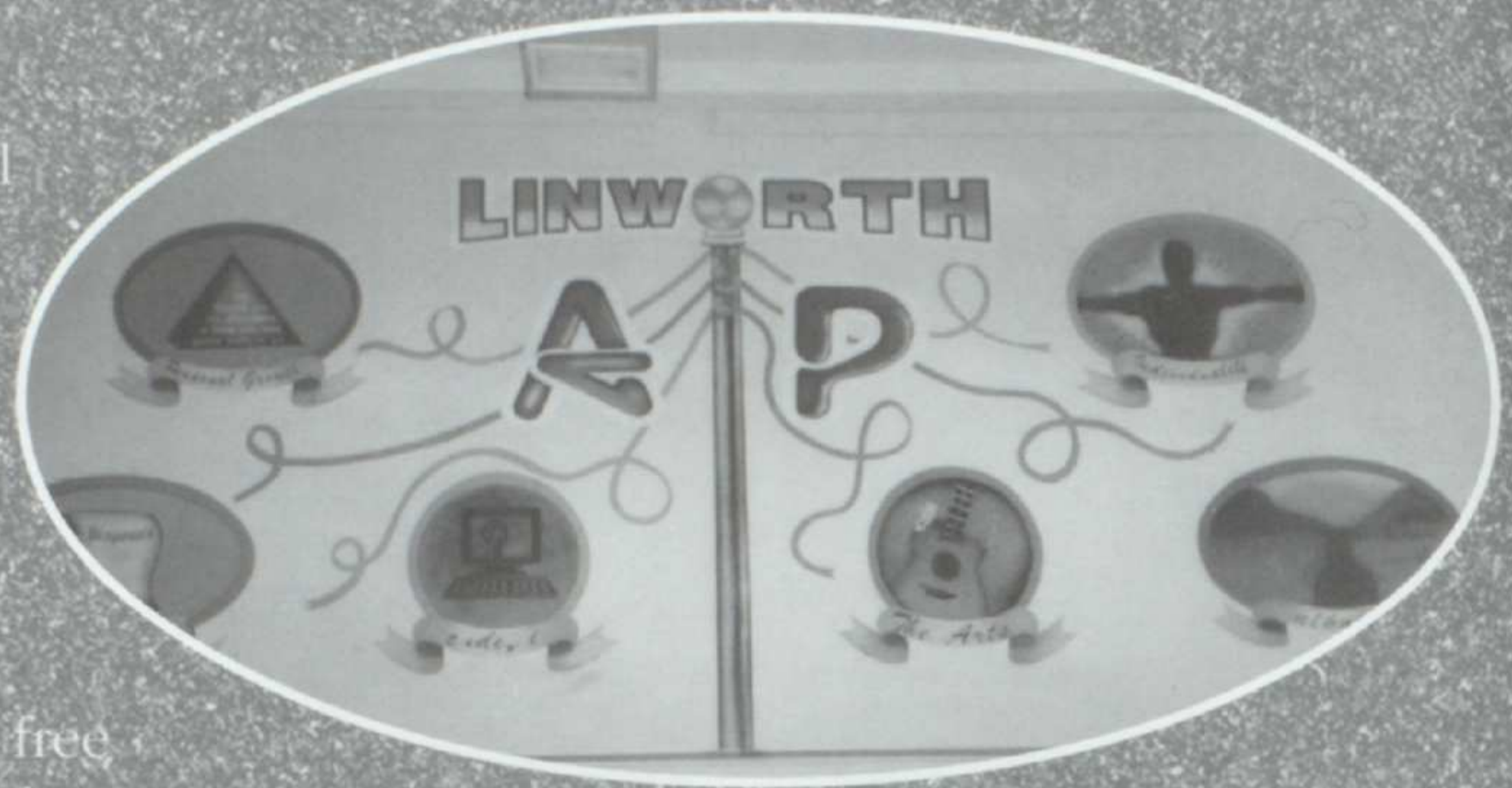


LINWORTH

weekly to talk about upcoming events, decorate the school, and set their own rules. The school is thriving and new students are joining every year.



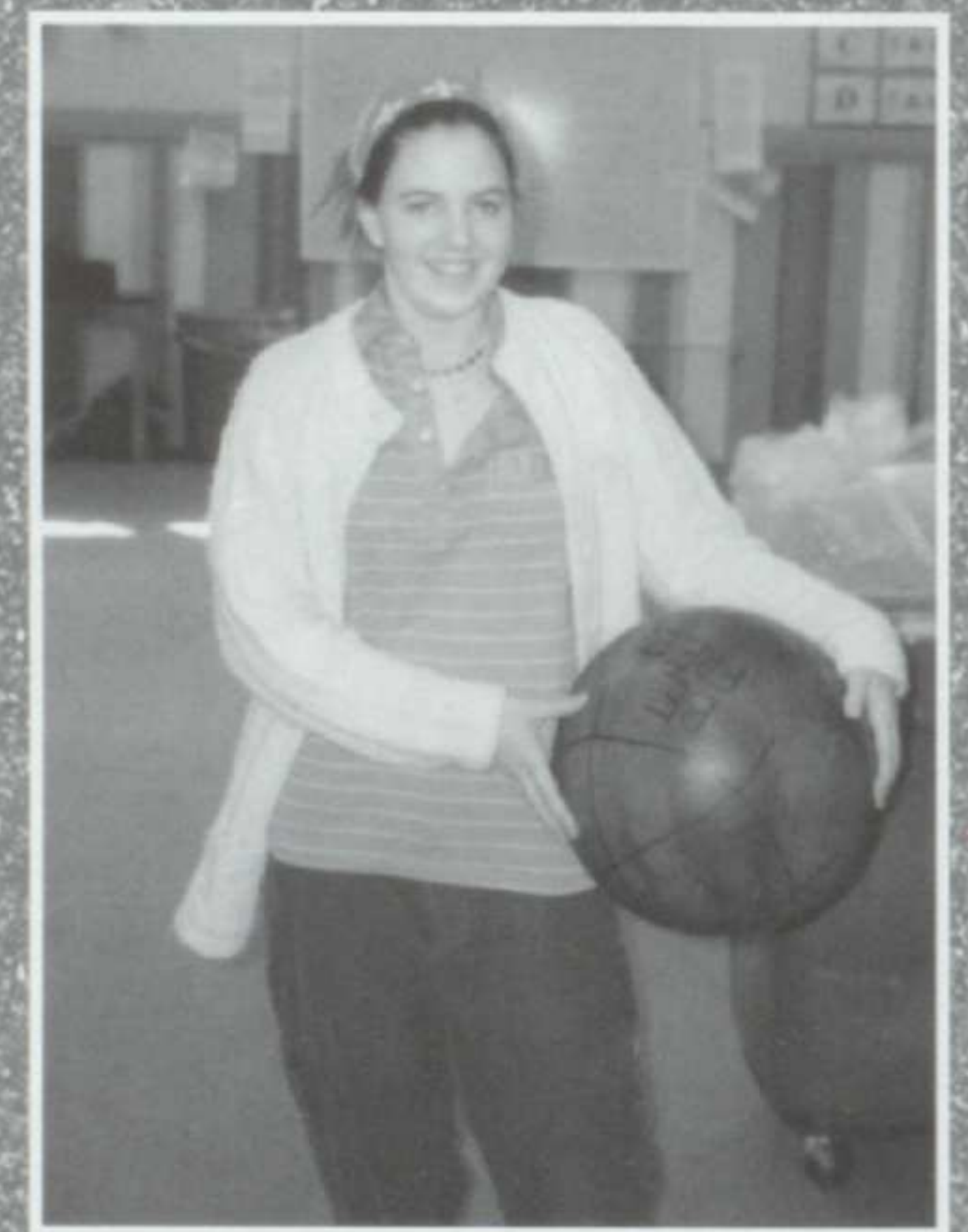

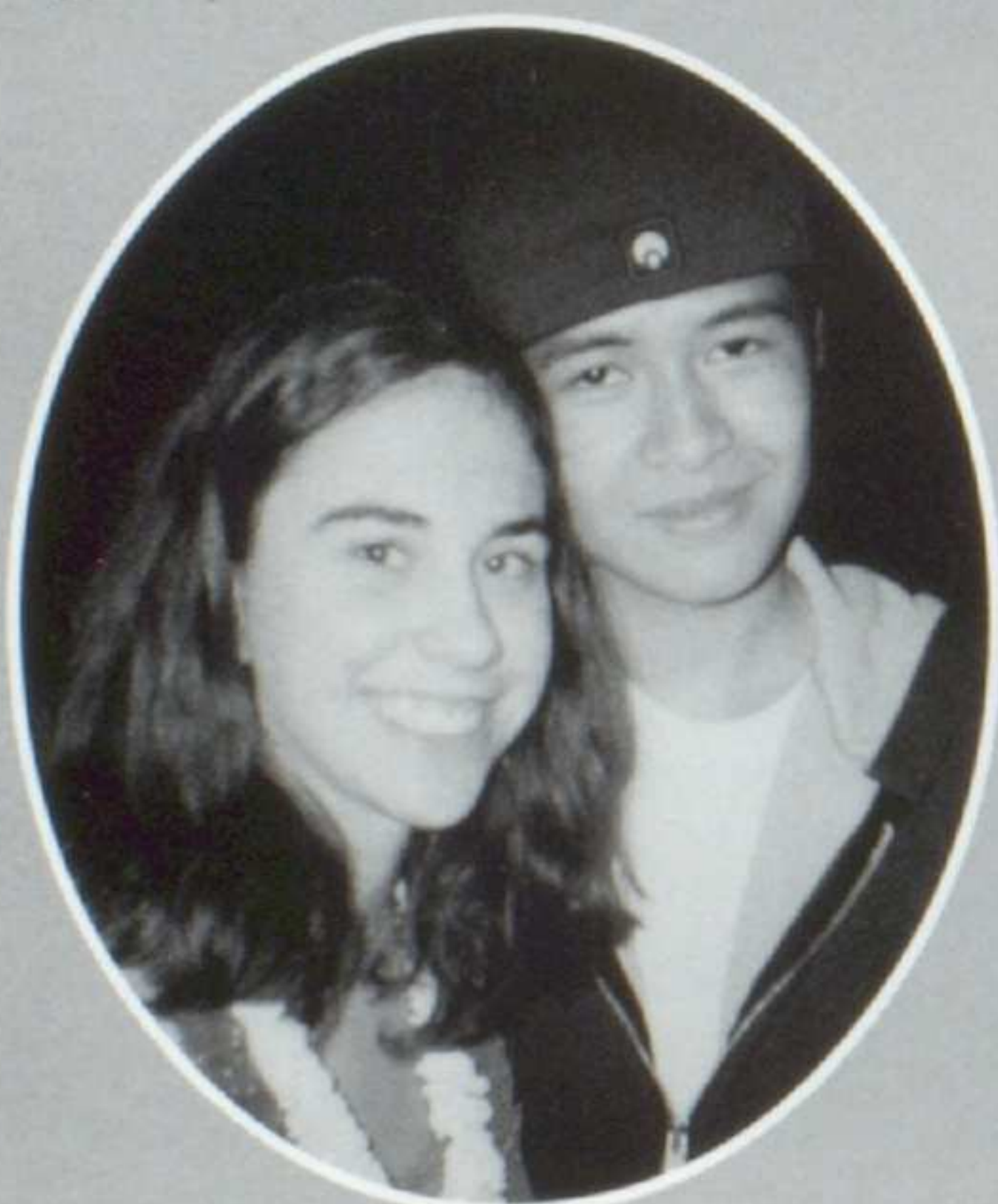


Can't Get Enough

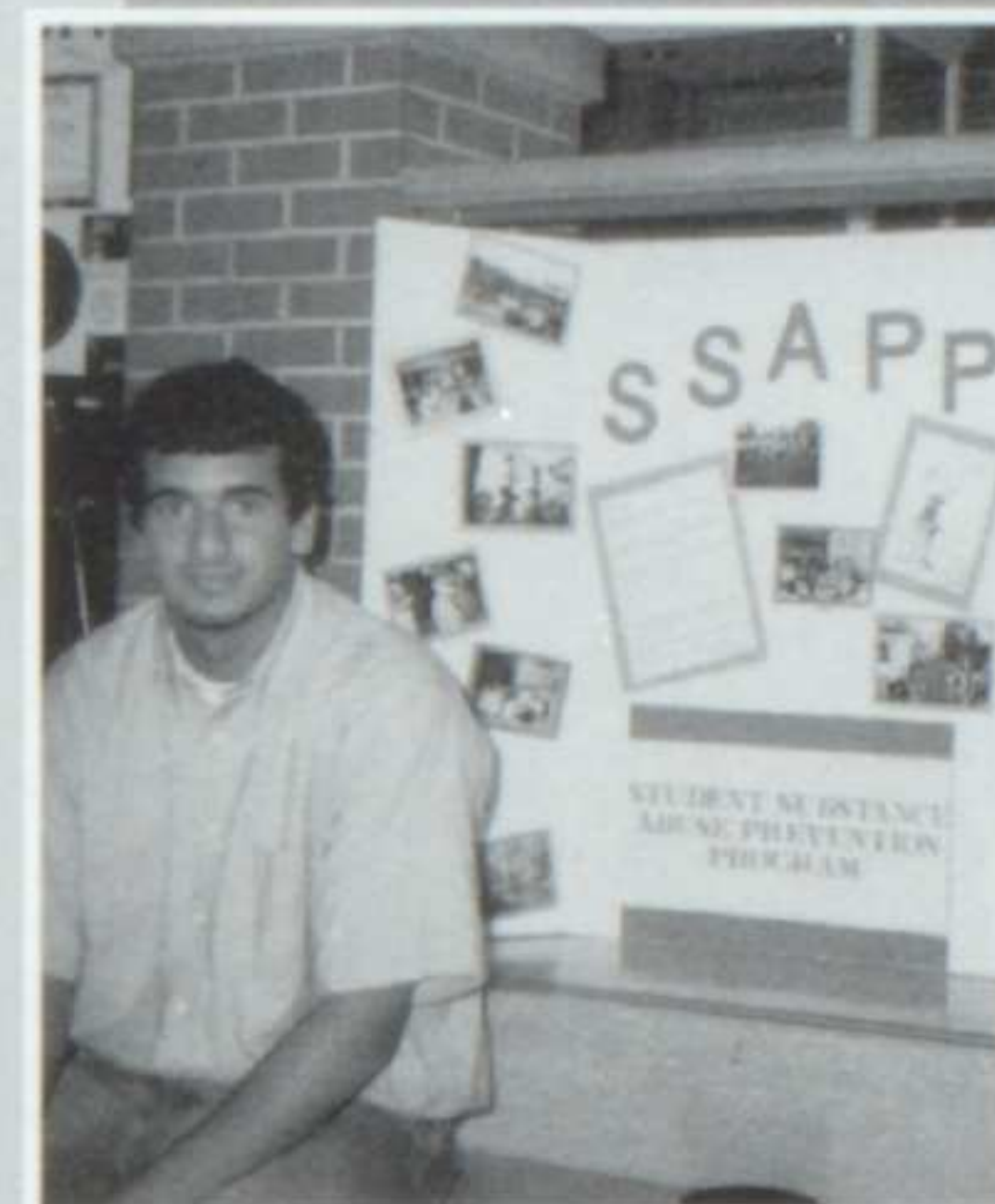

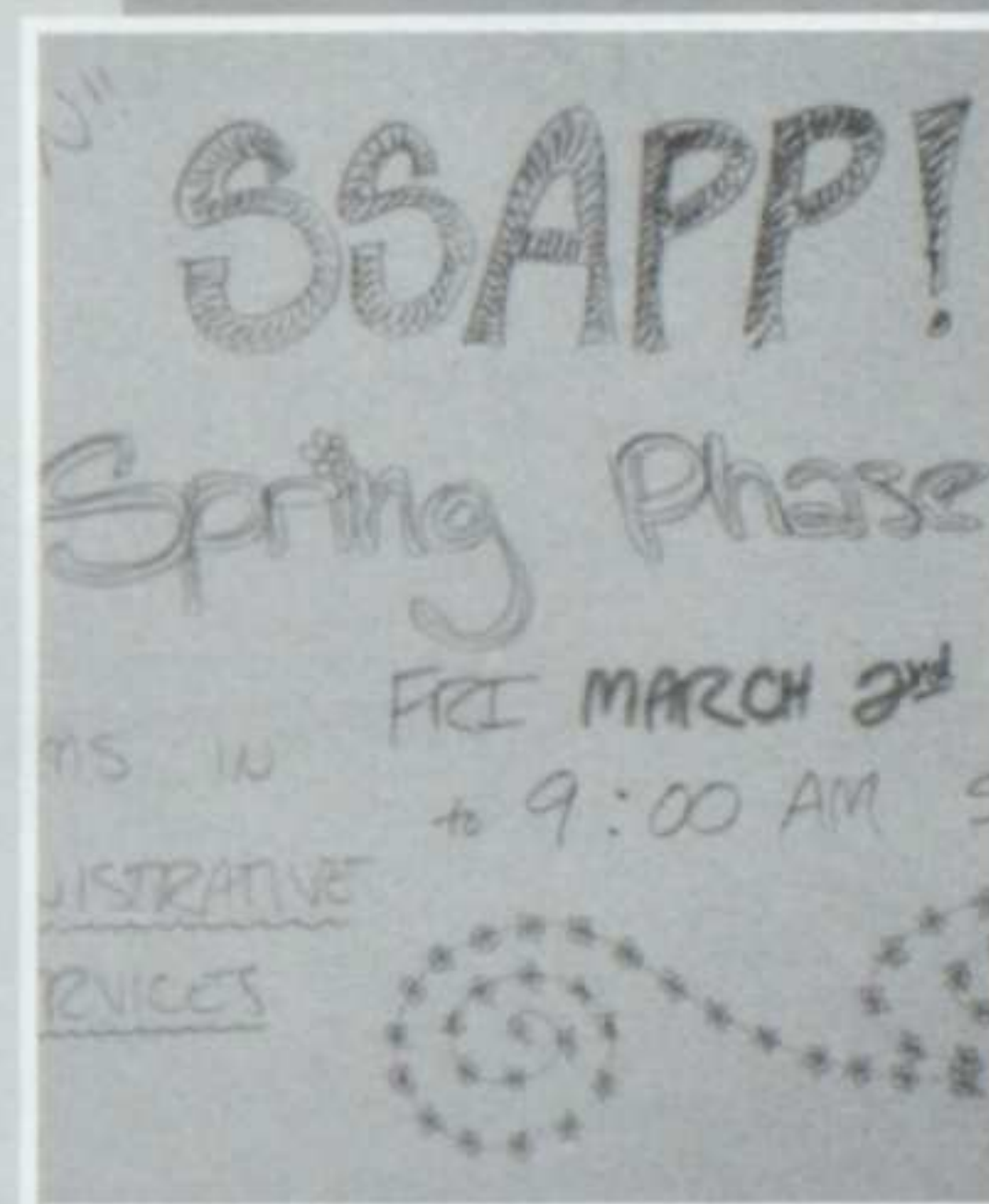

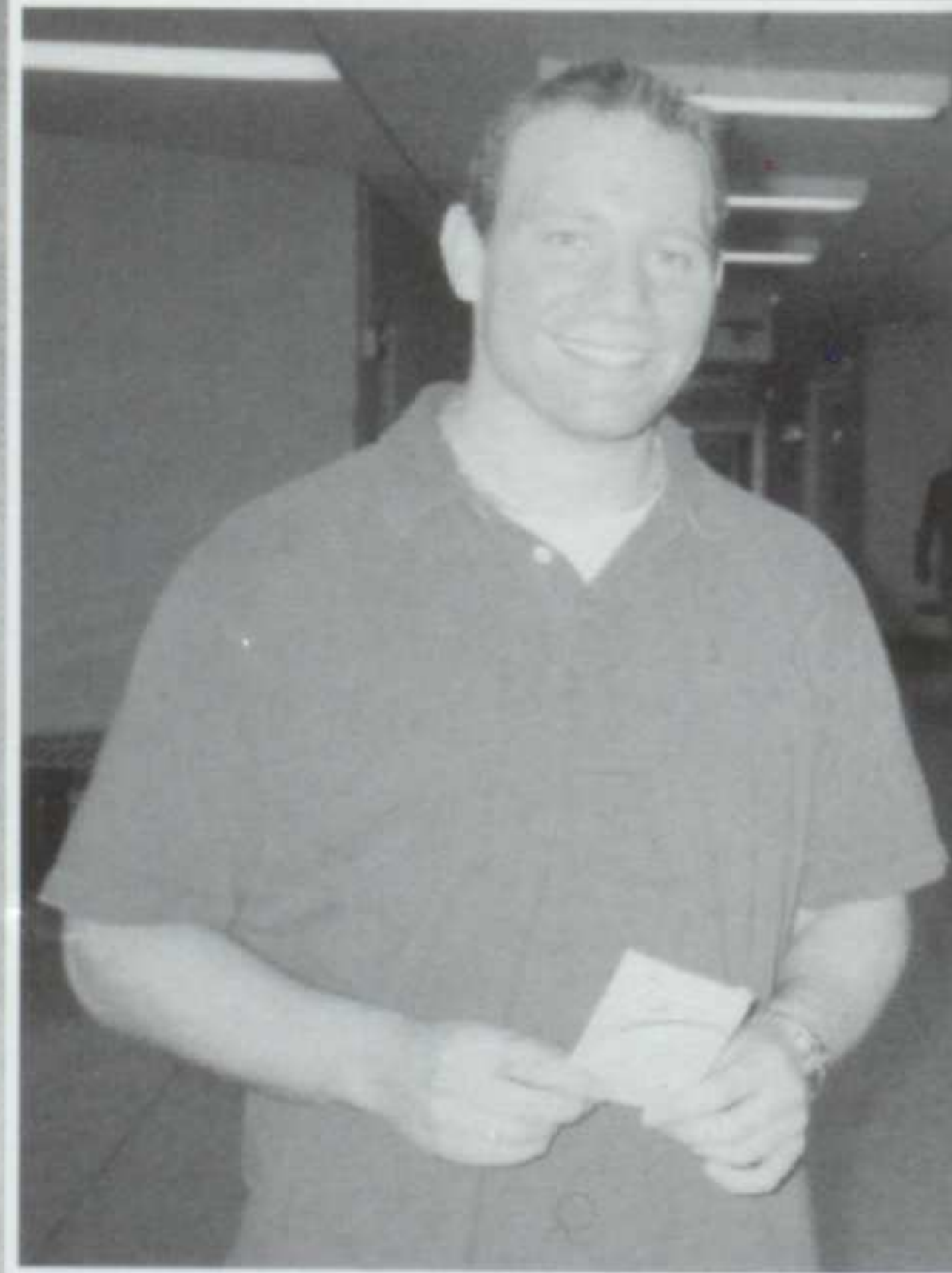

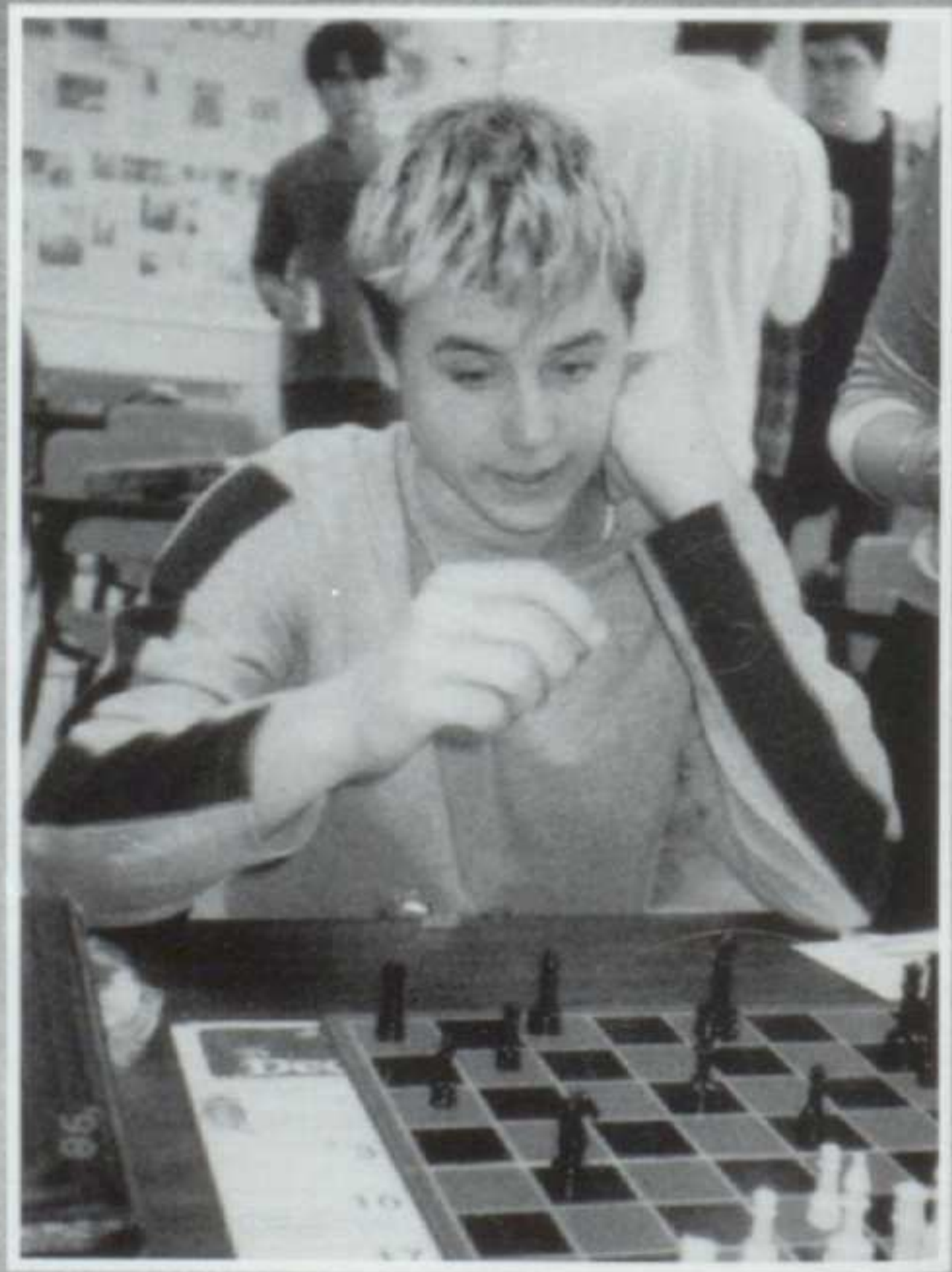

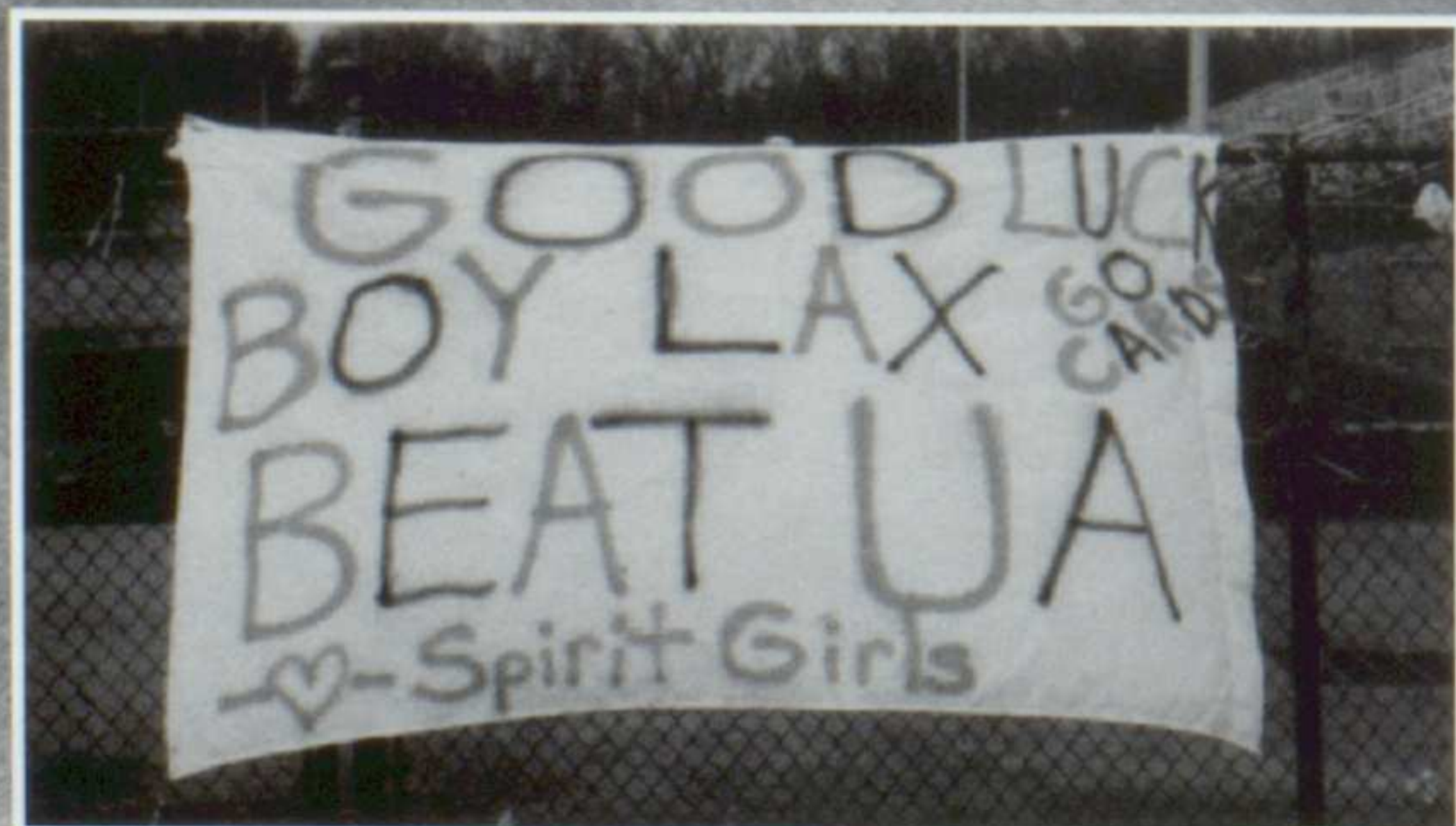
