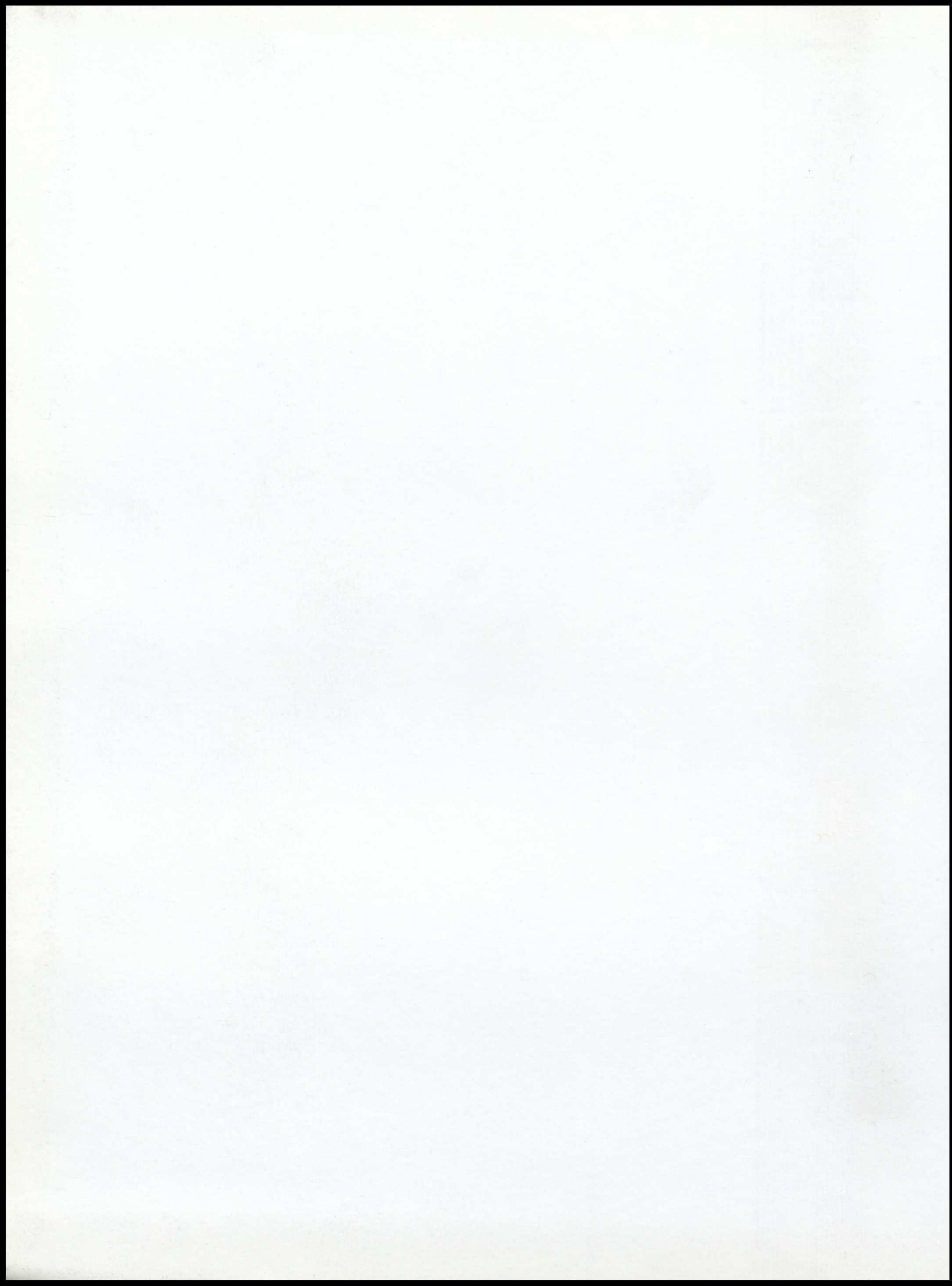

# Death Of Senior Shirts

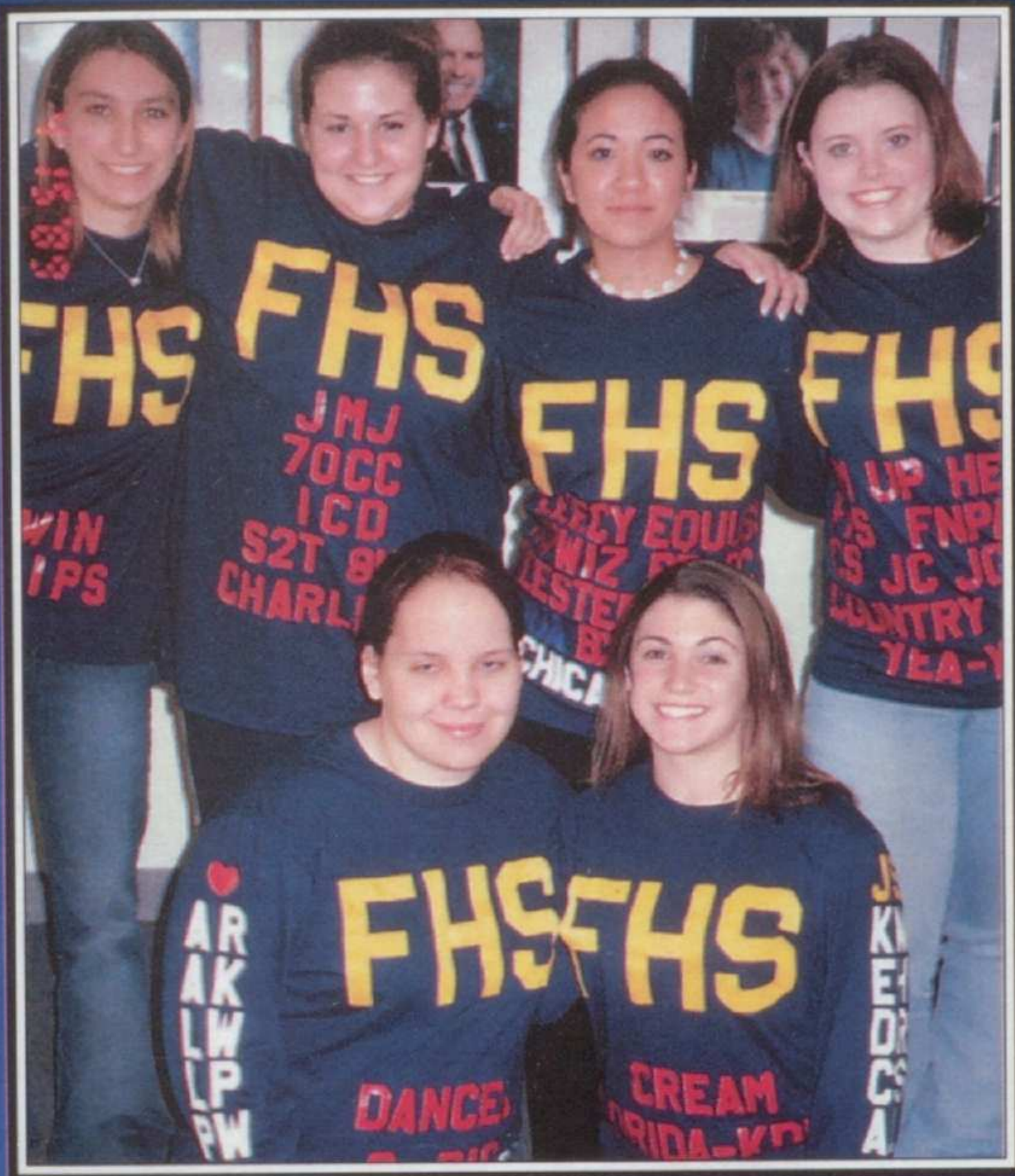

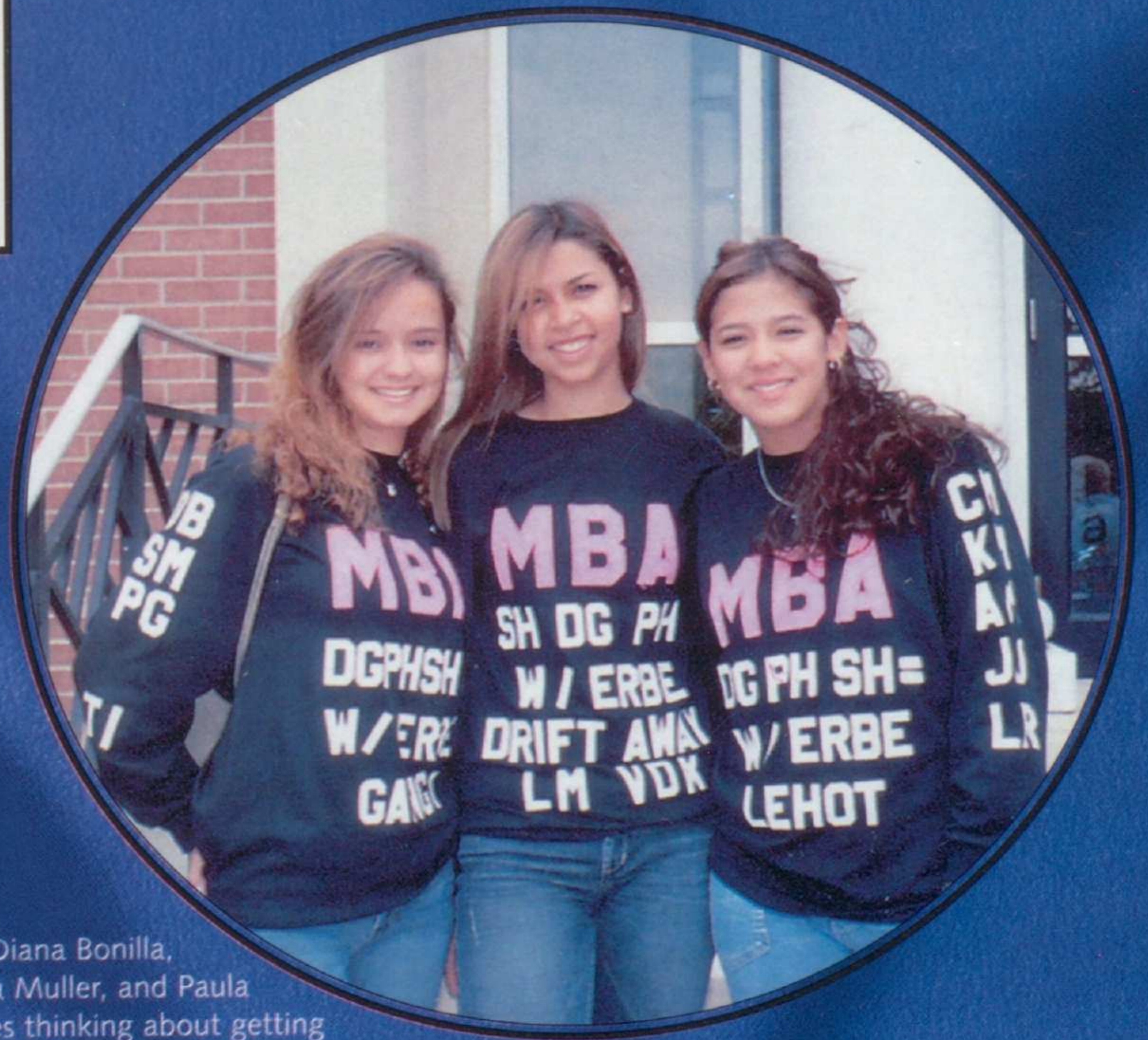

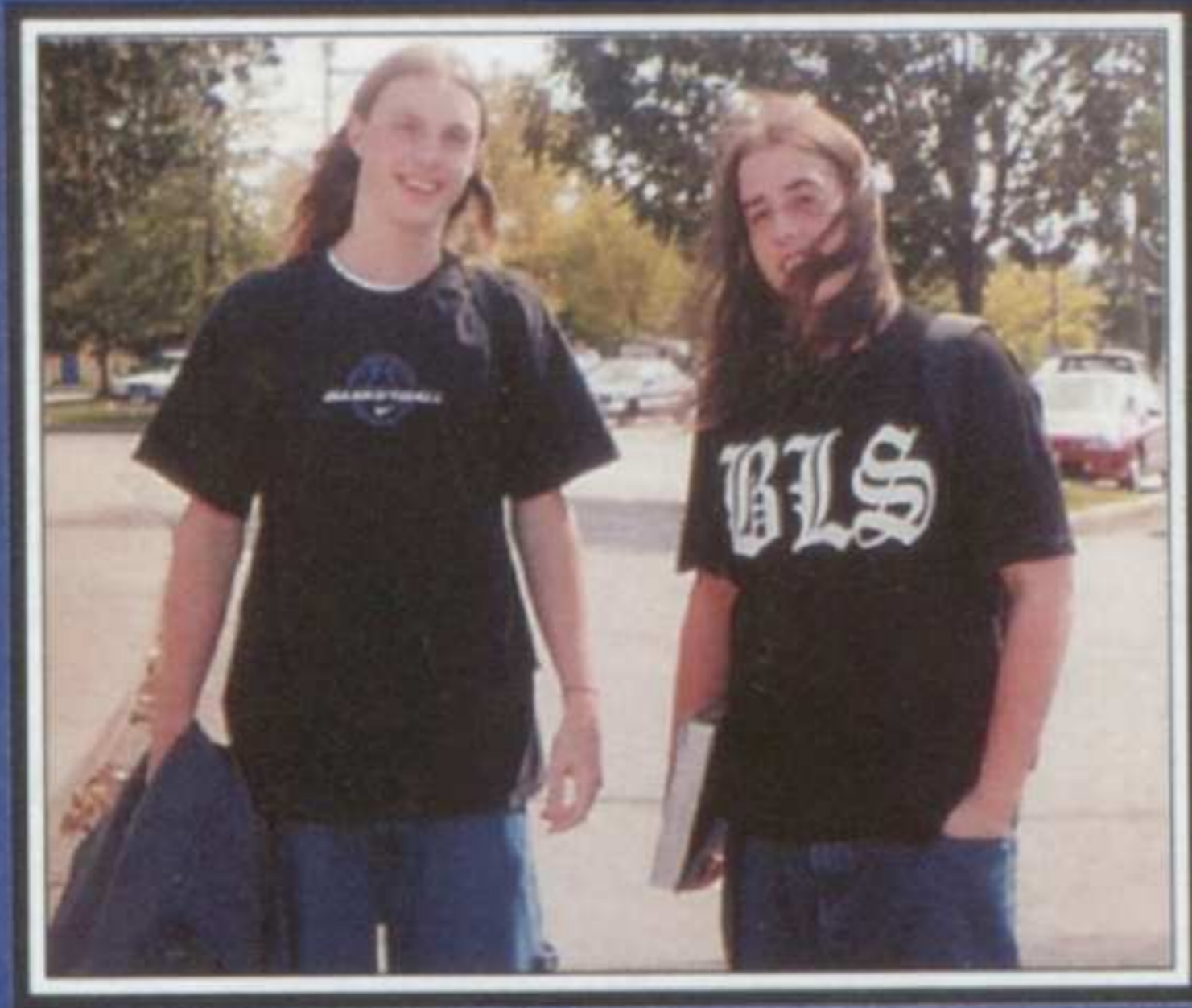

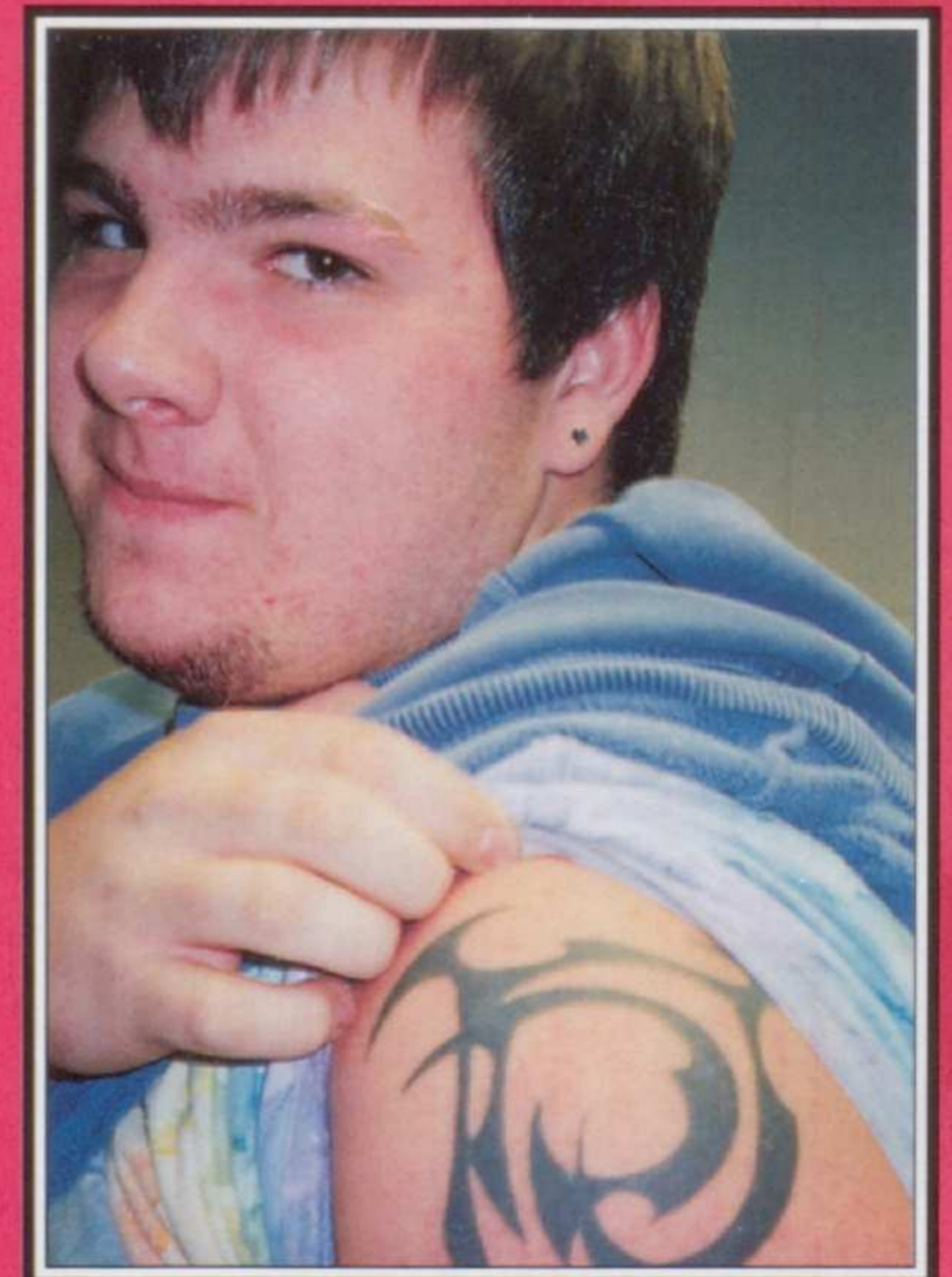

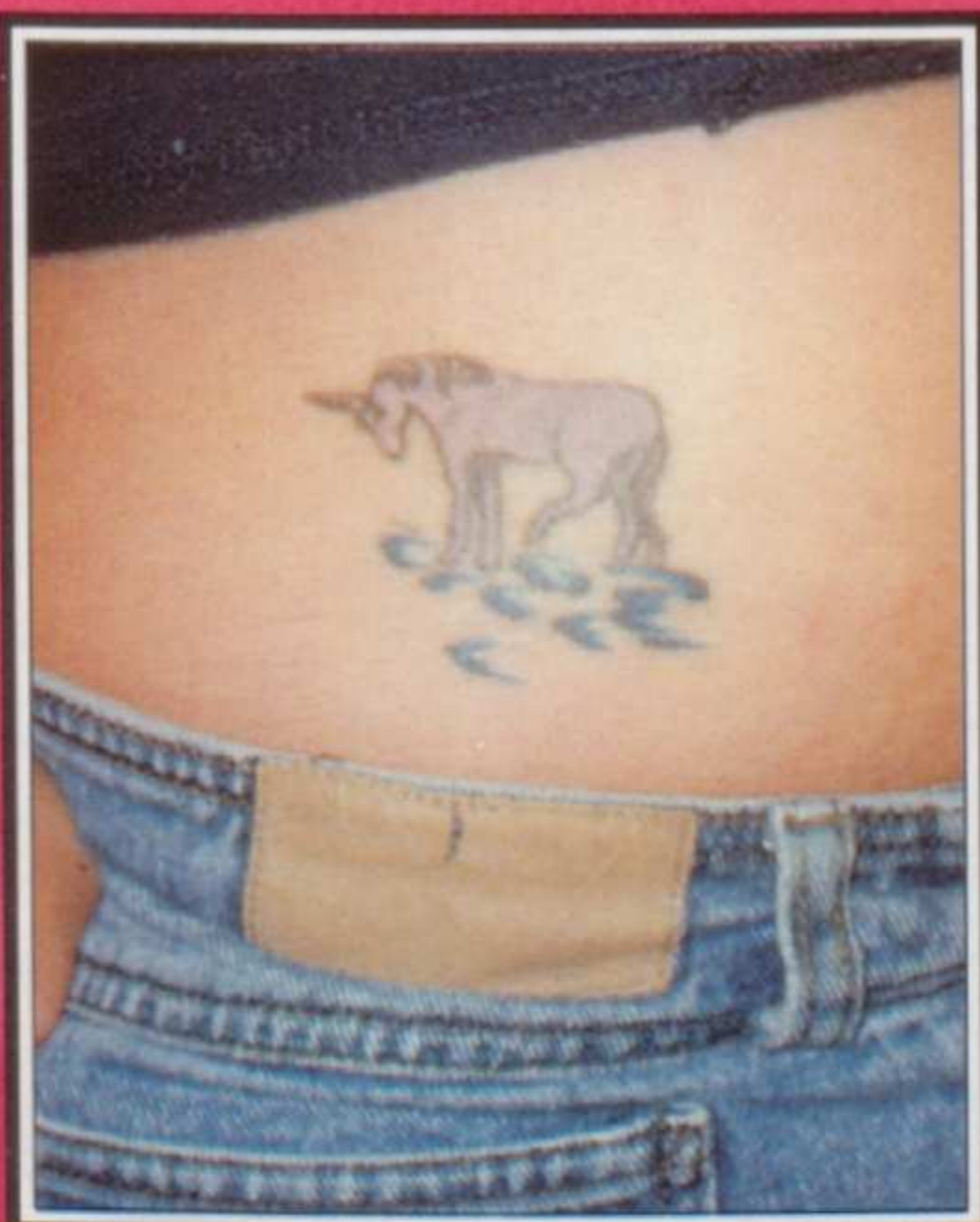

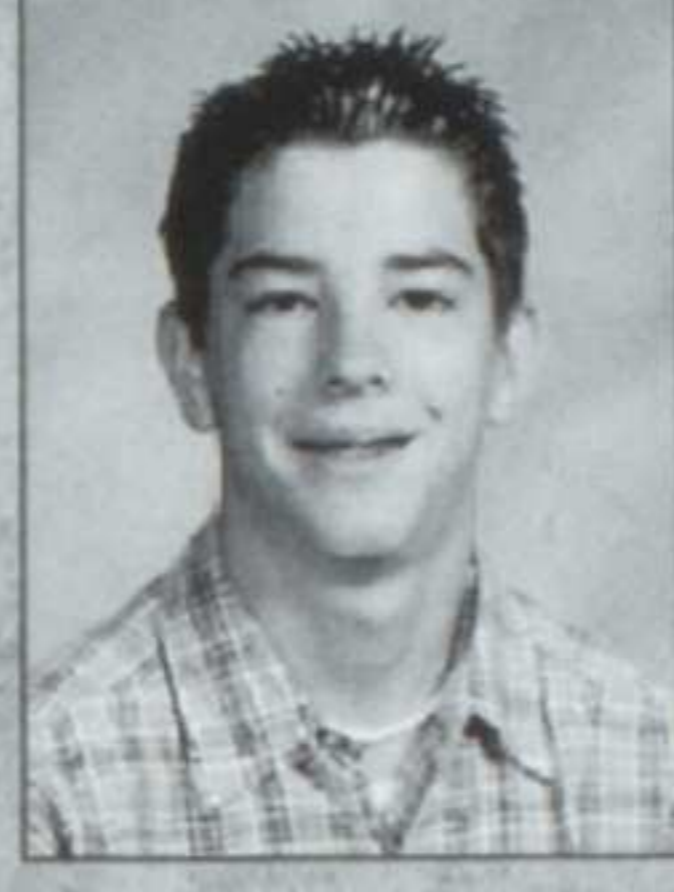
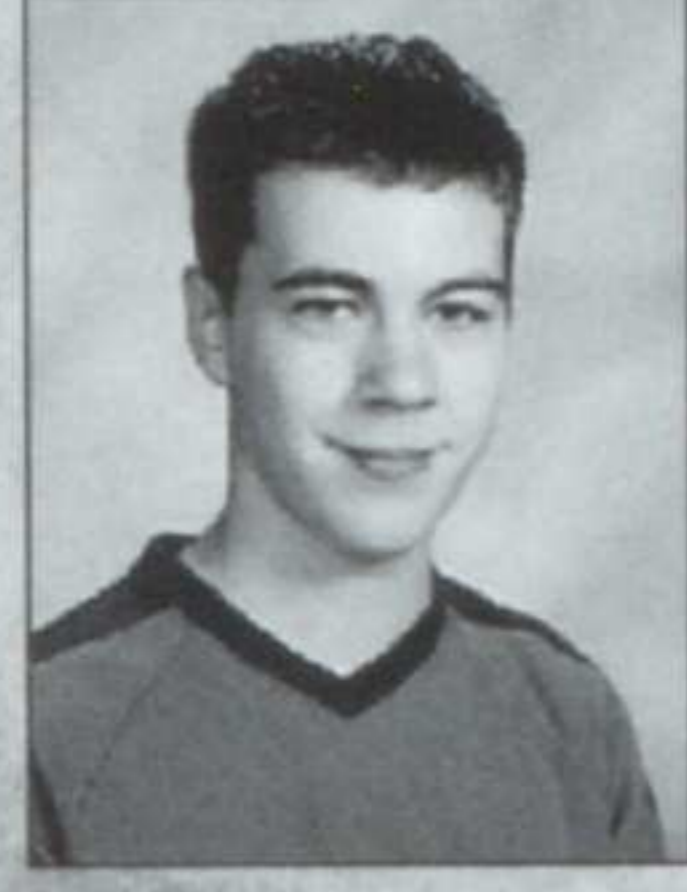
## Fearless Freshmen

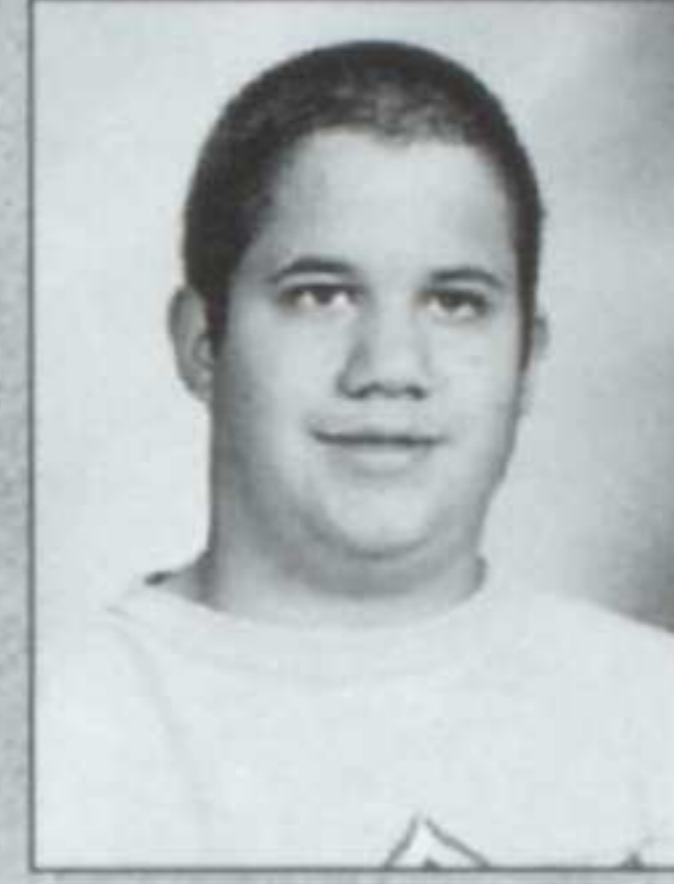
## In The Middle

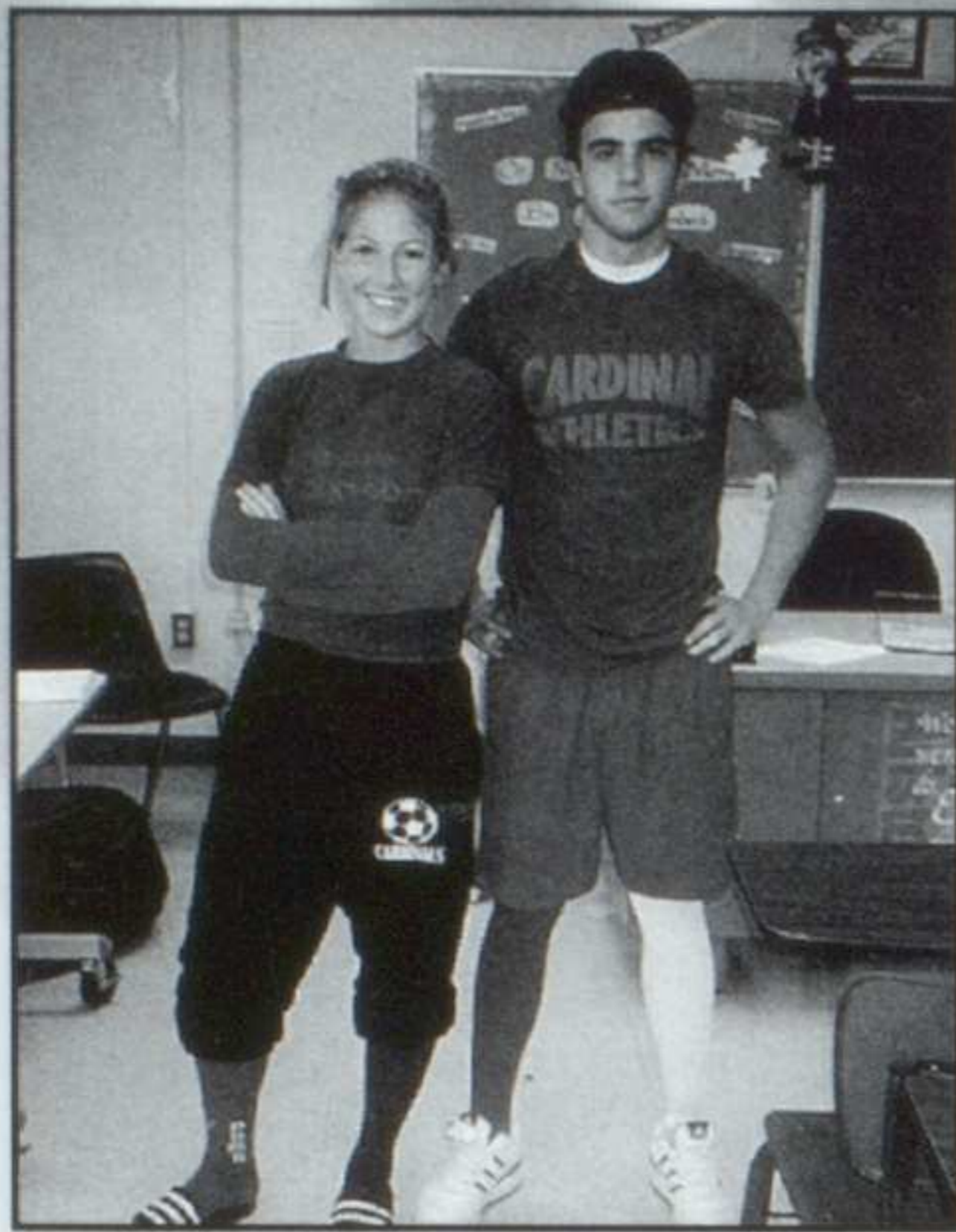
# Spirit Week 2003

# A Midsummer Night's Dream

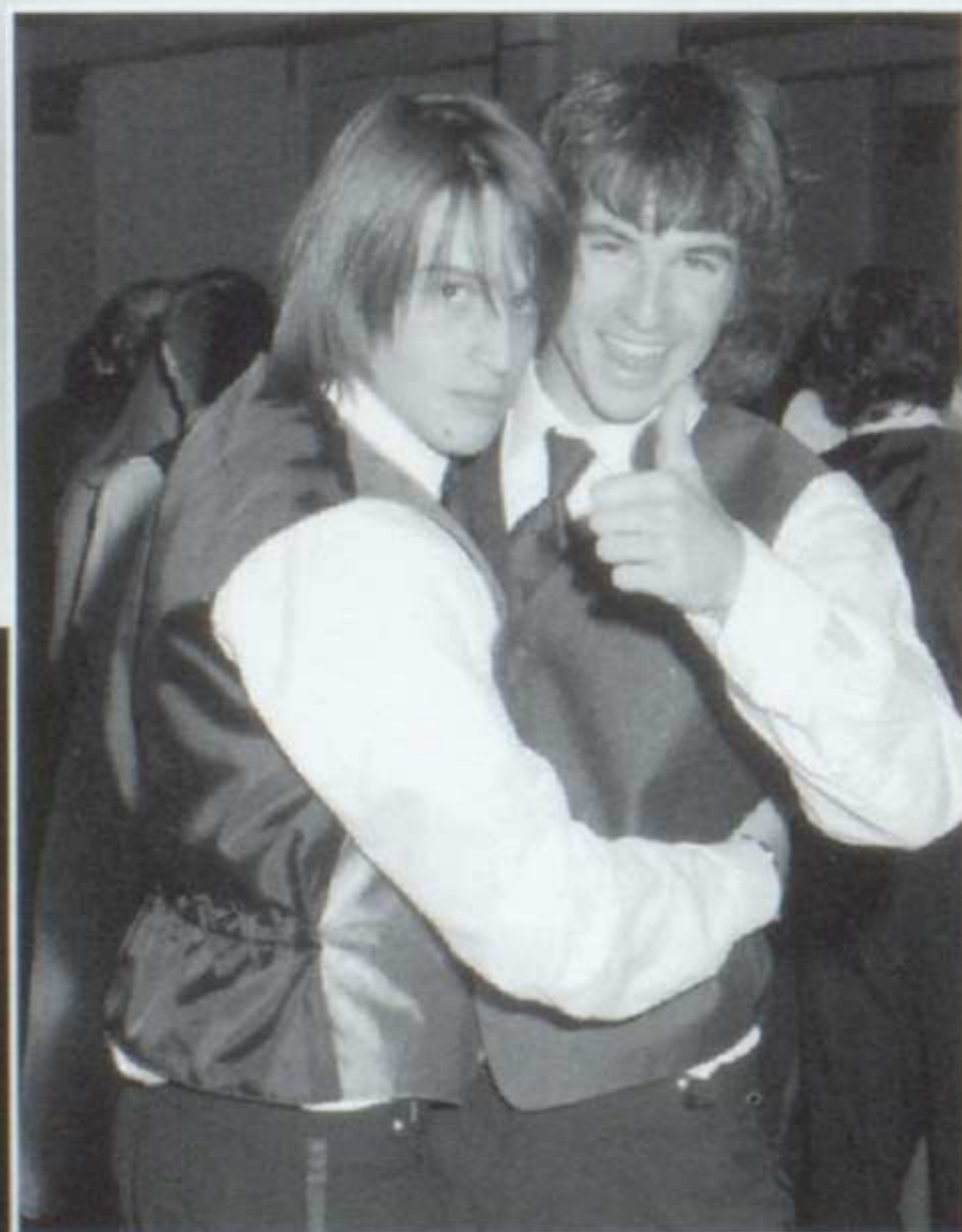

# After Graduation

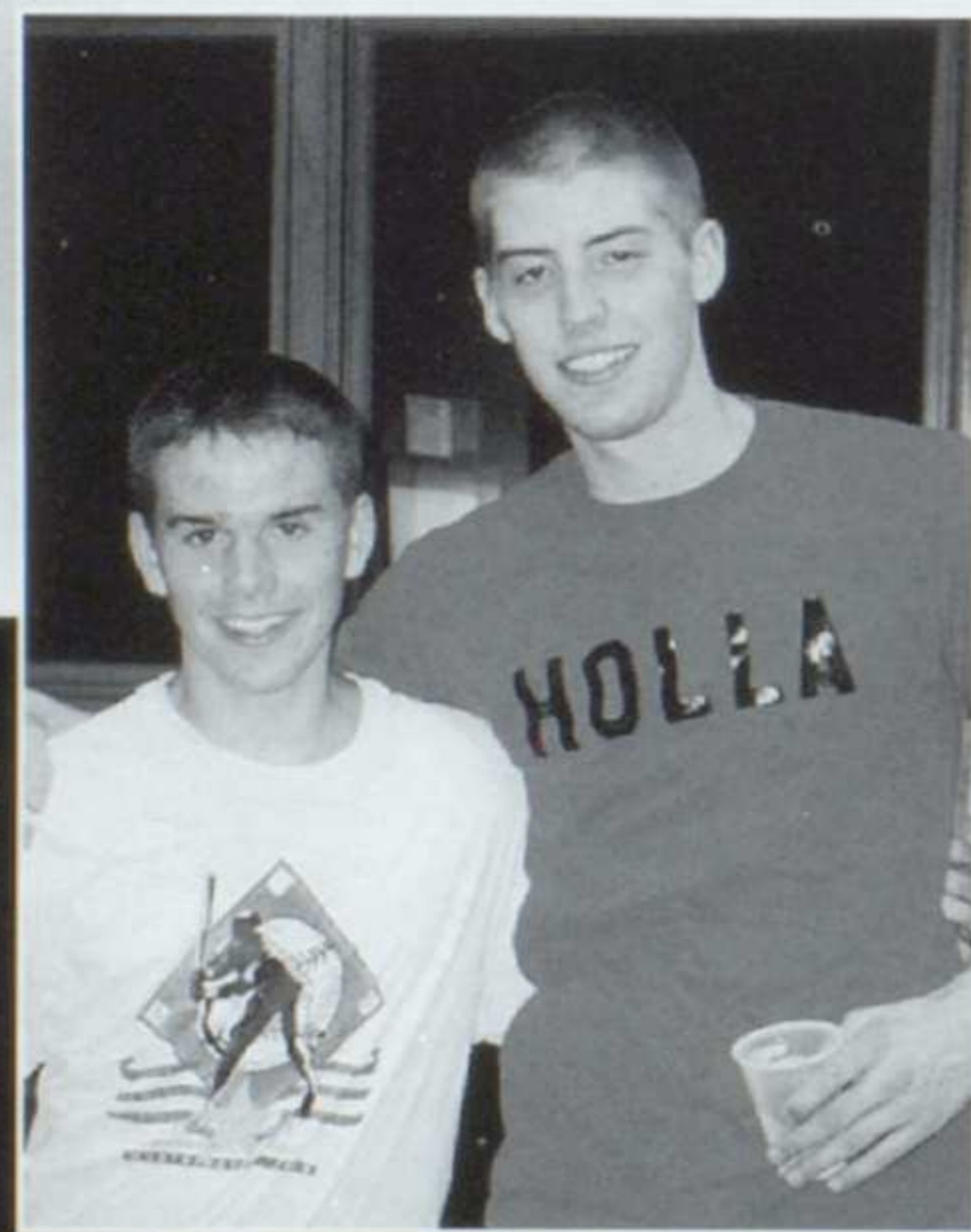

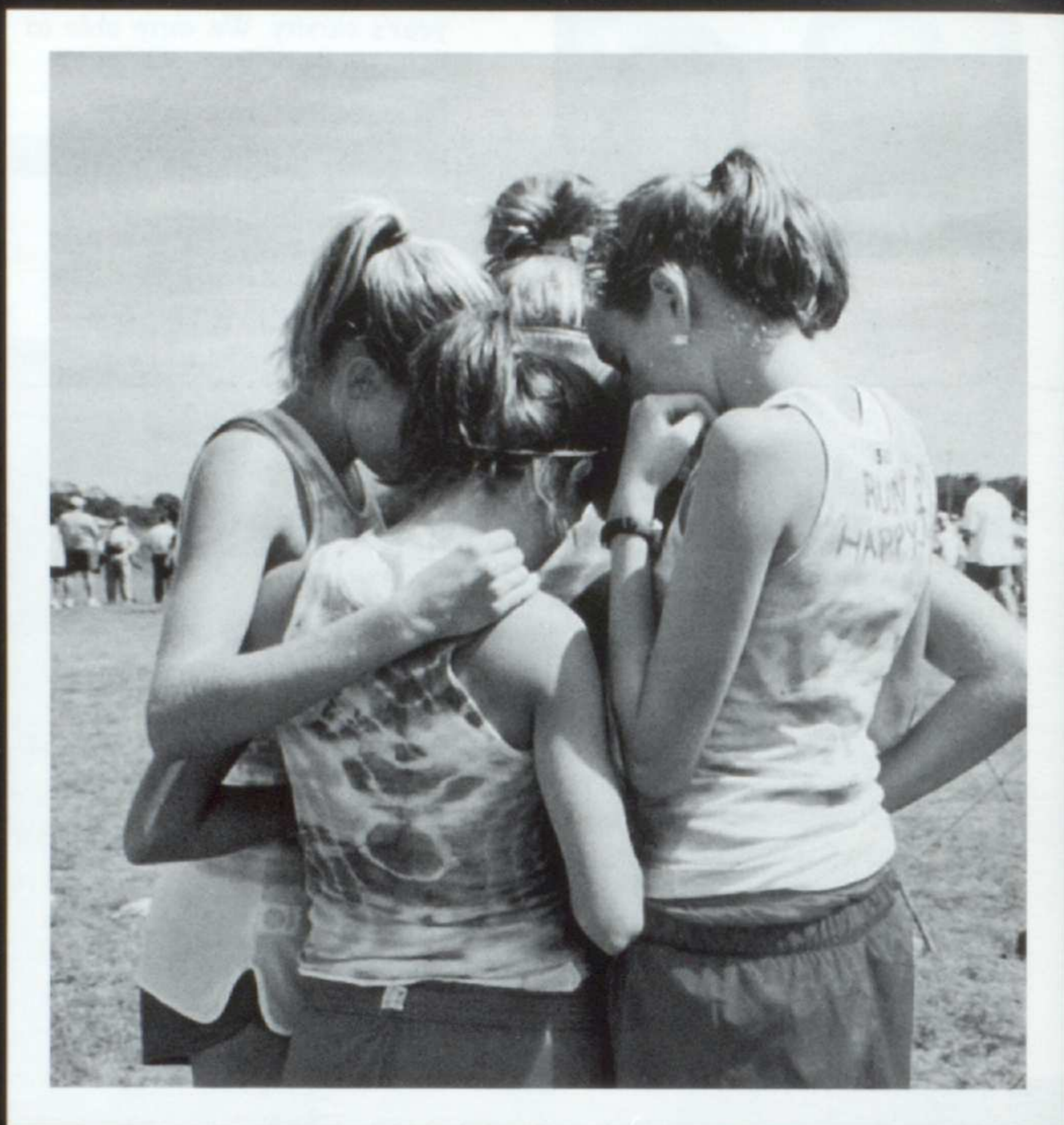
# Girls Cross Country: On the Path

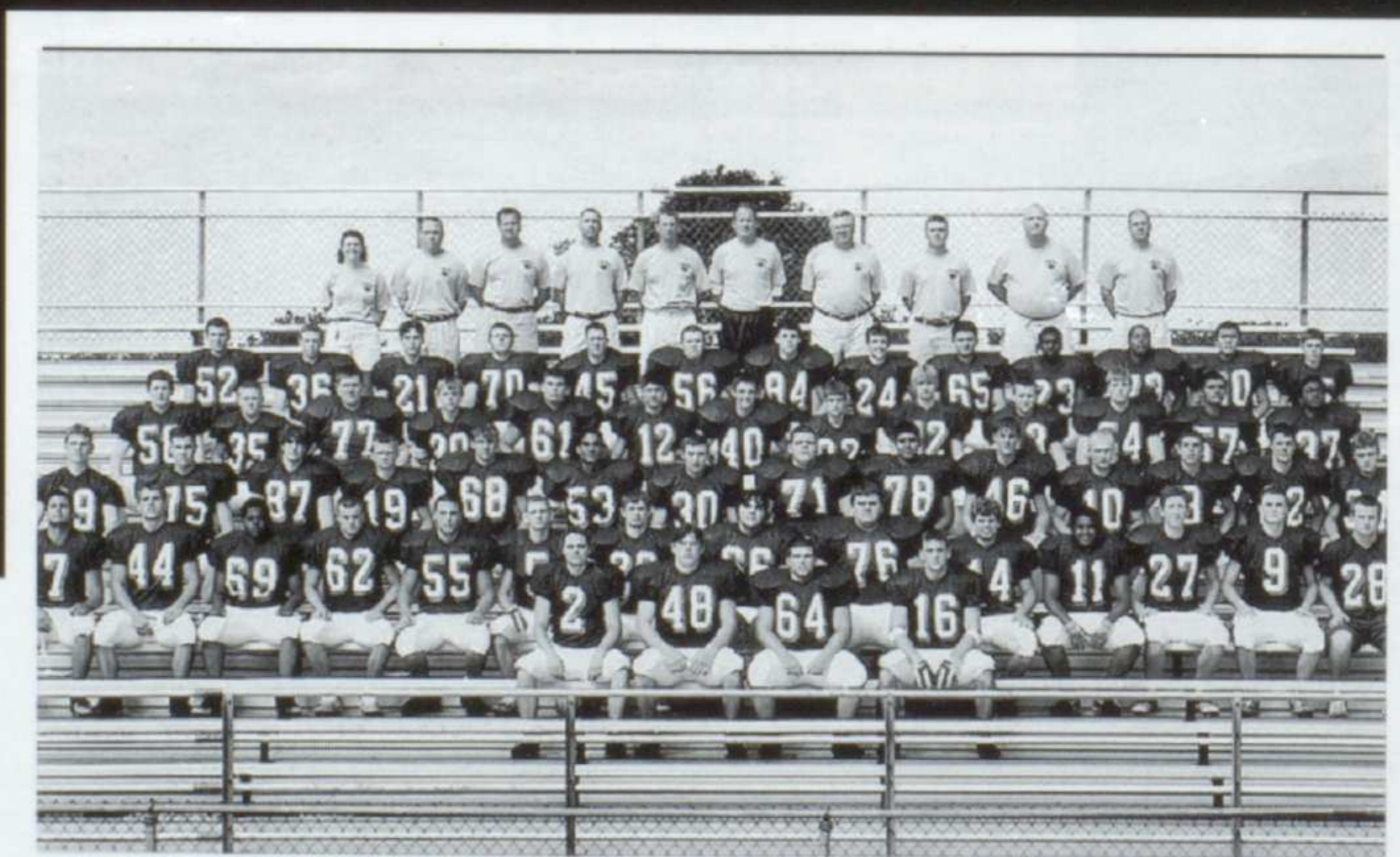
# Football: A Building Year

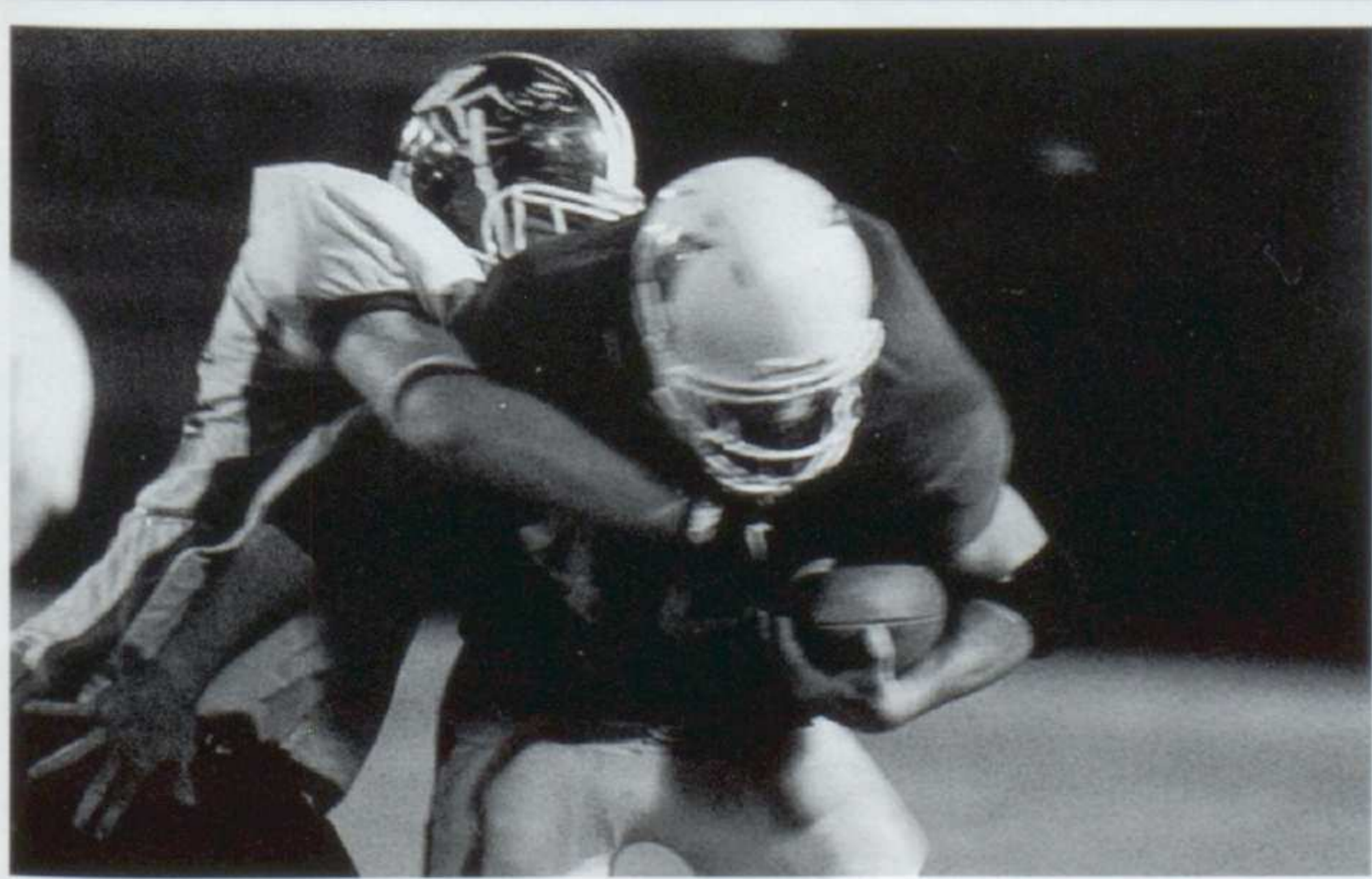

# Girls Water Polo: On the Ball

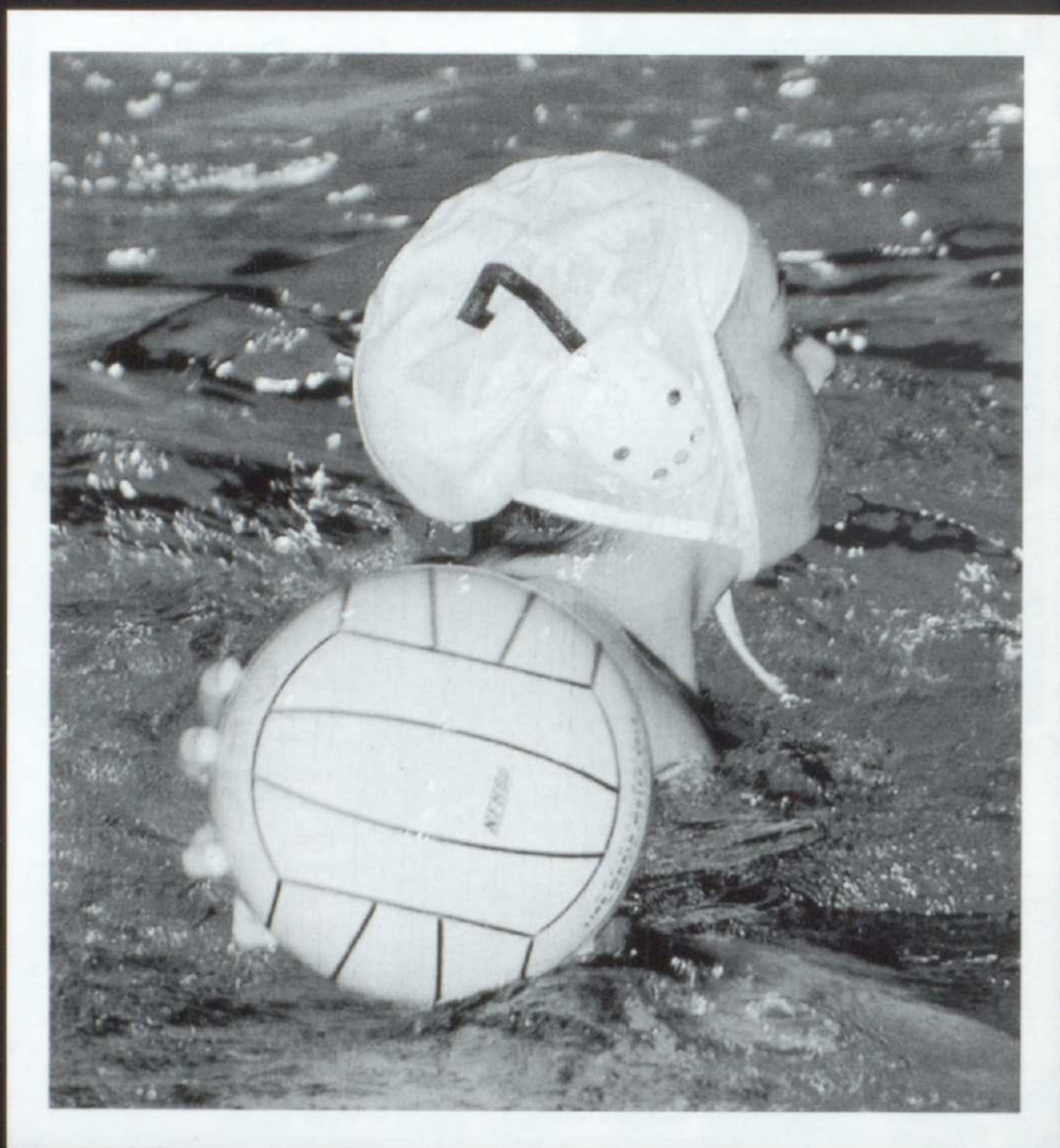
*Here's a math problem for you: morning conditioning plus grueling practices plus hard work plus determination equals...? The 2003 Girls Water Polo team!*

# Girls Basketball: On The Rebound

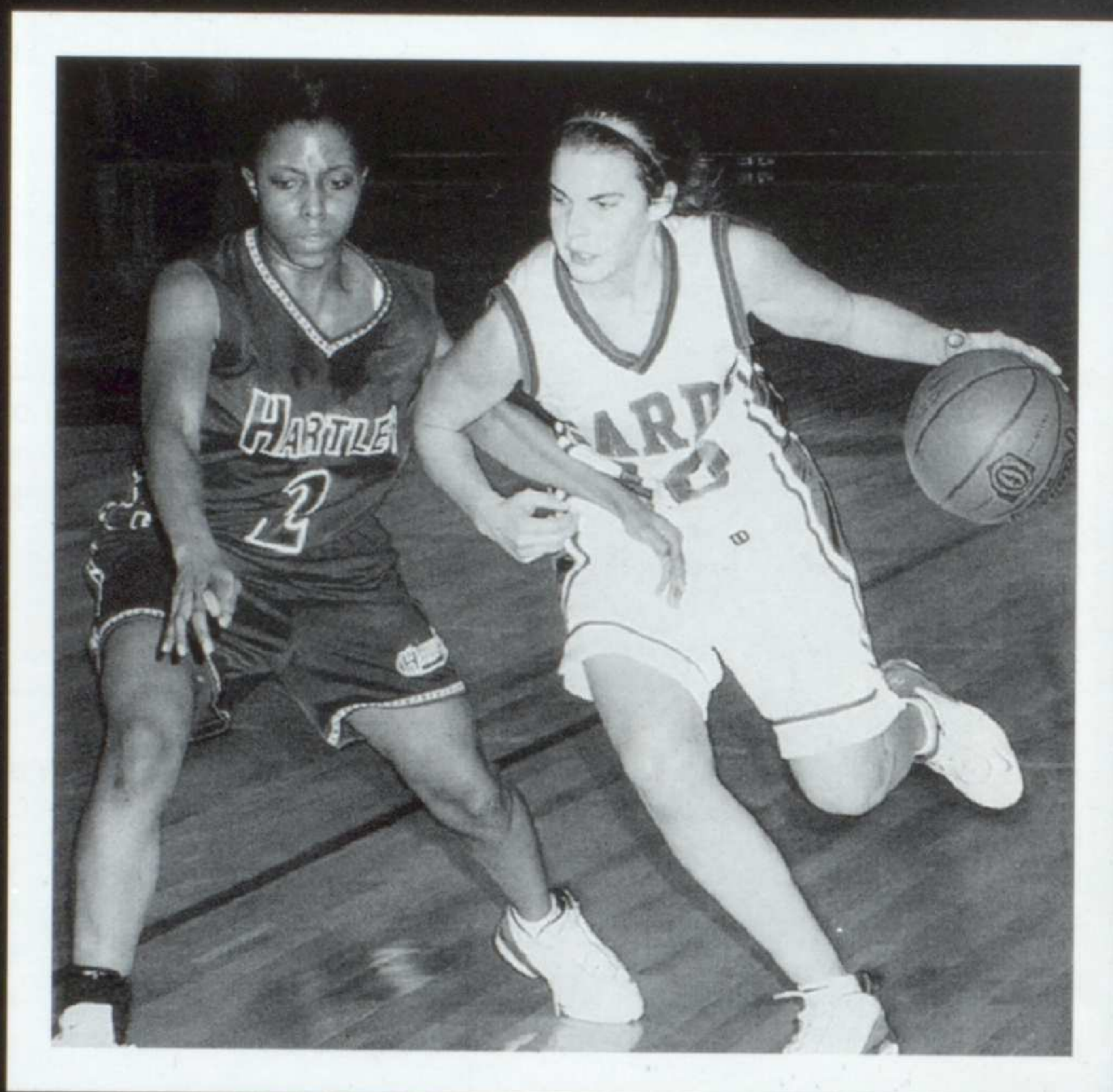

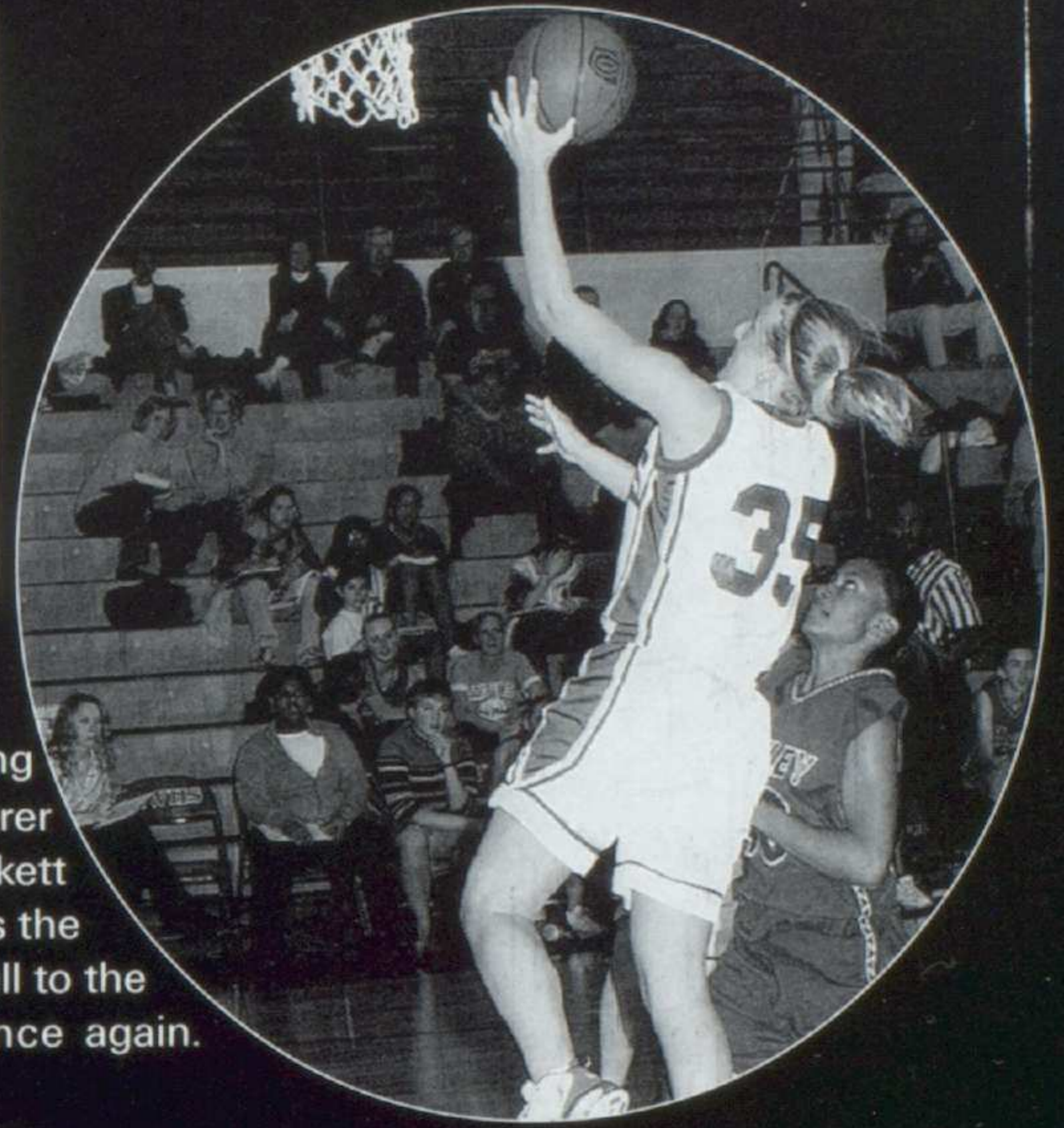

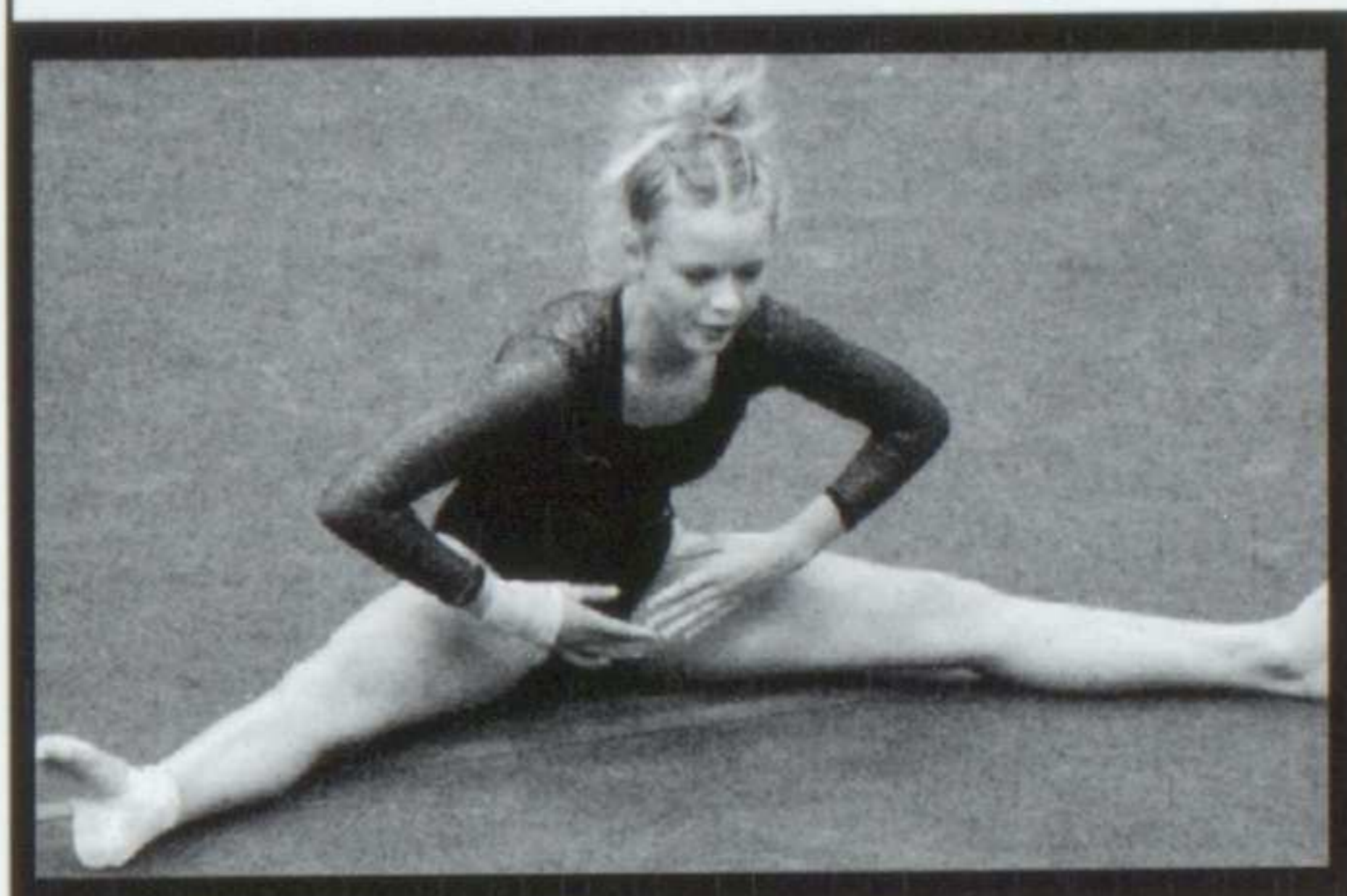

# Boys Swimming and Diving: On The Block

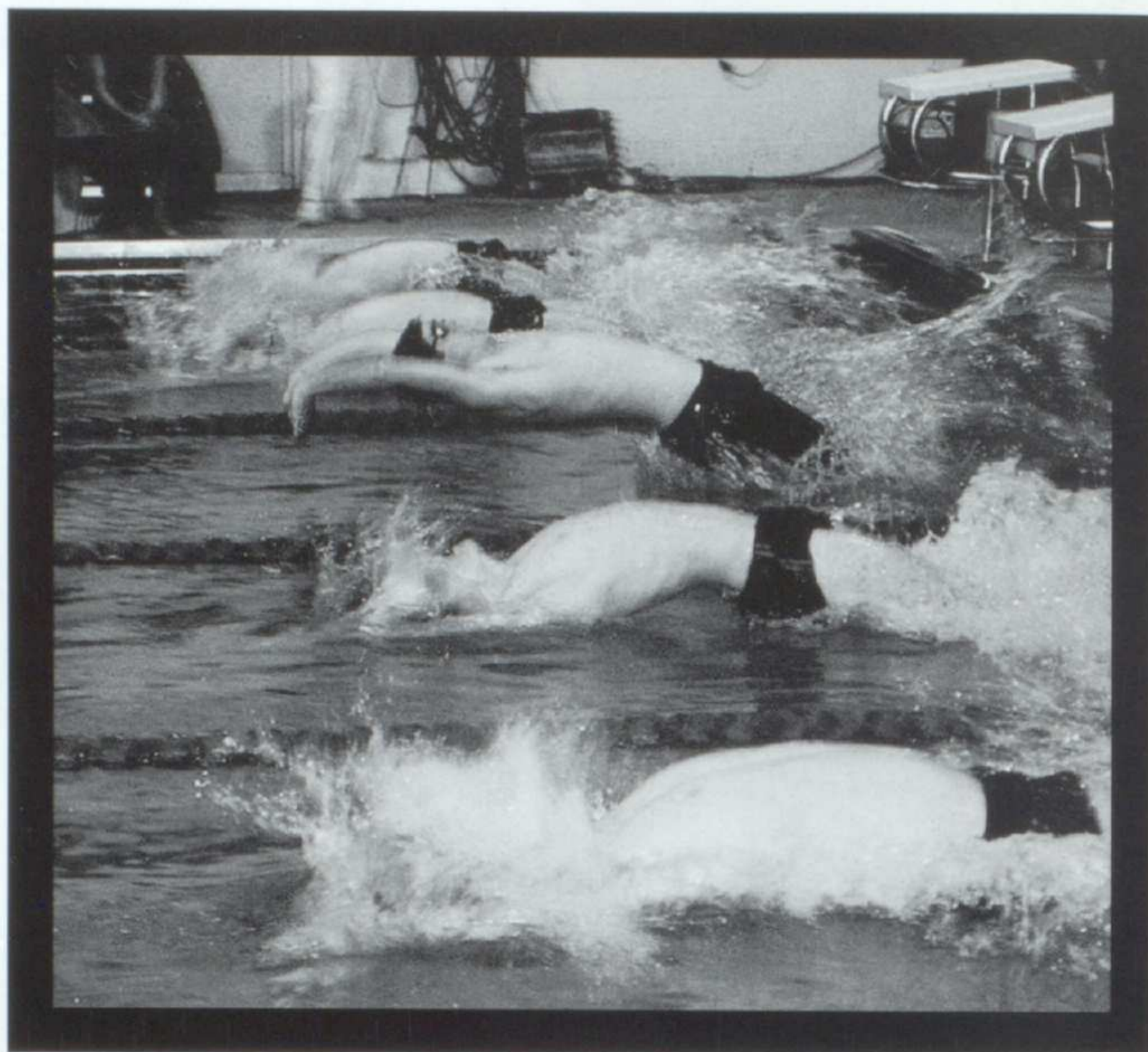

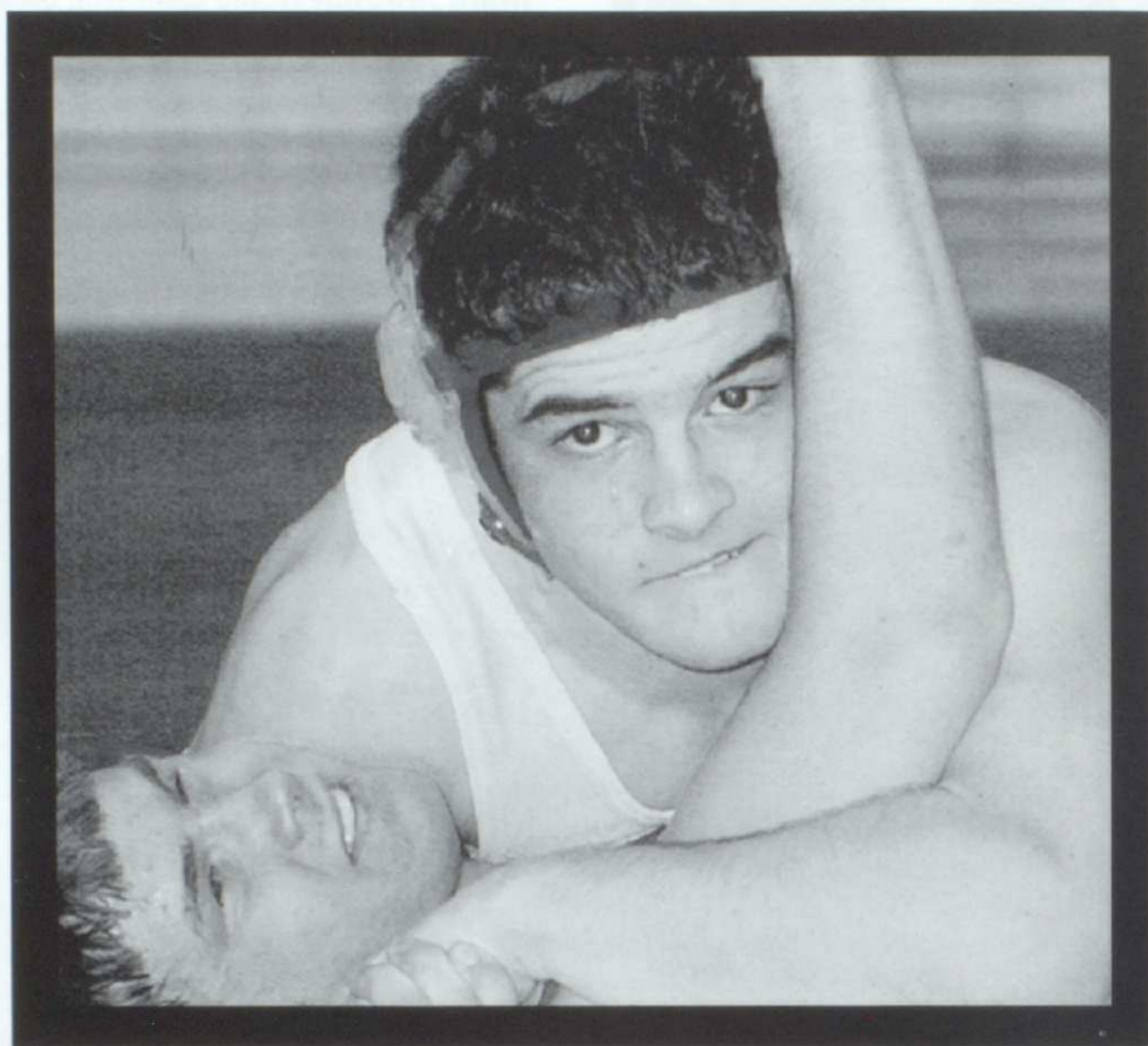
# Wrestling: On the Mat

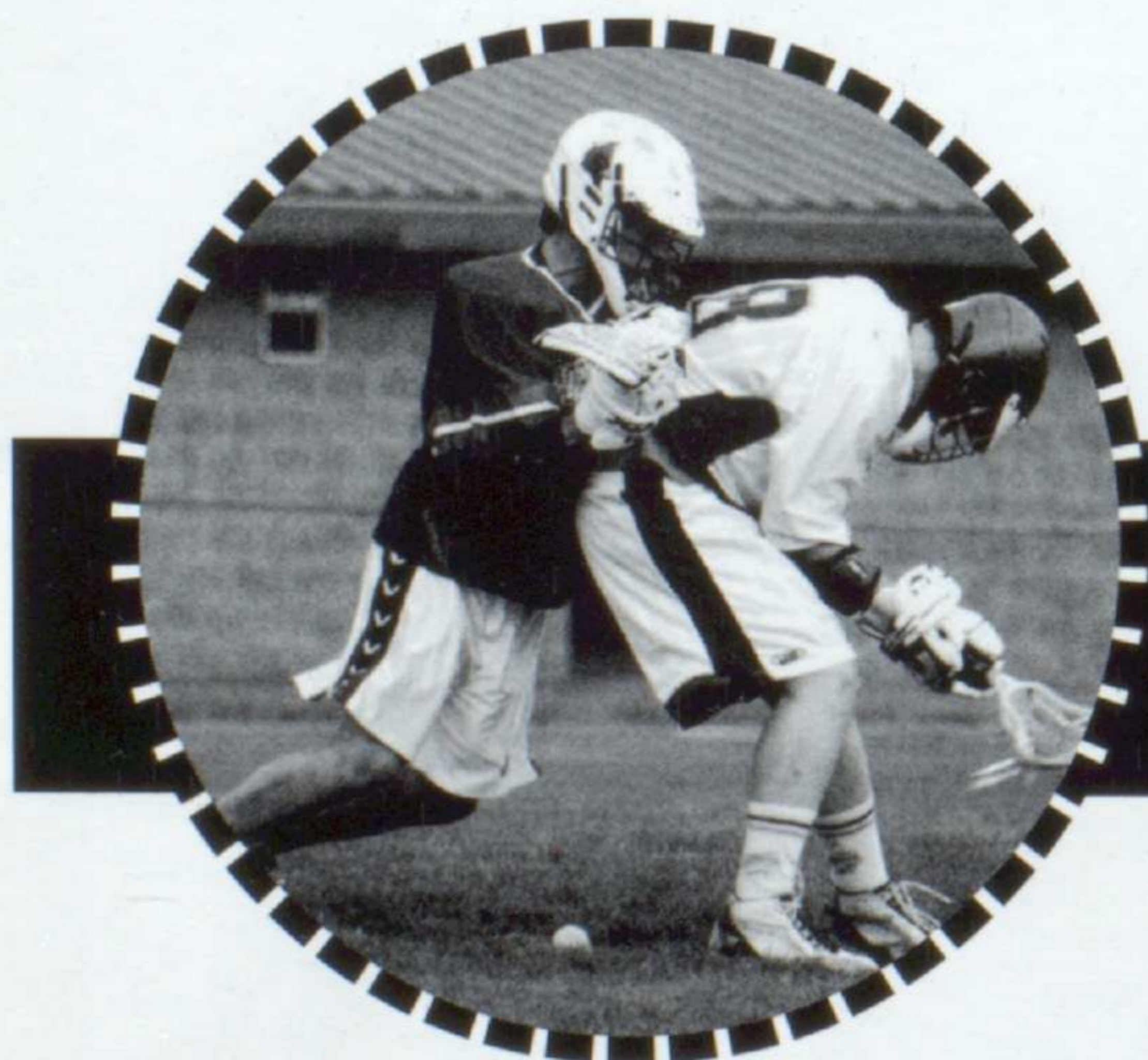
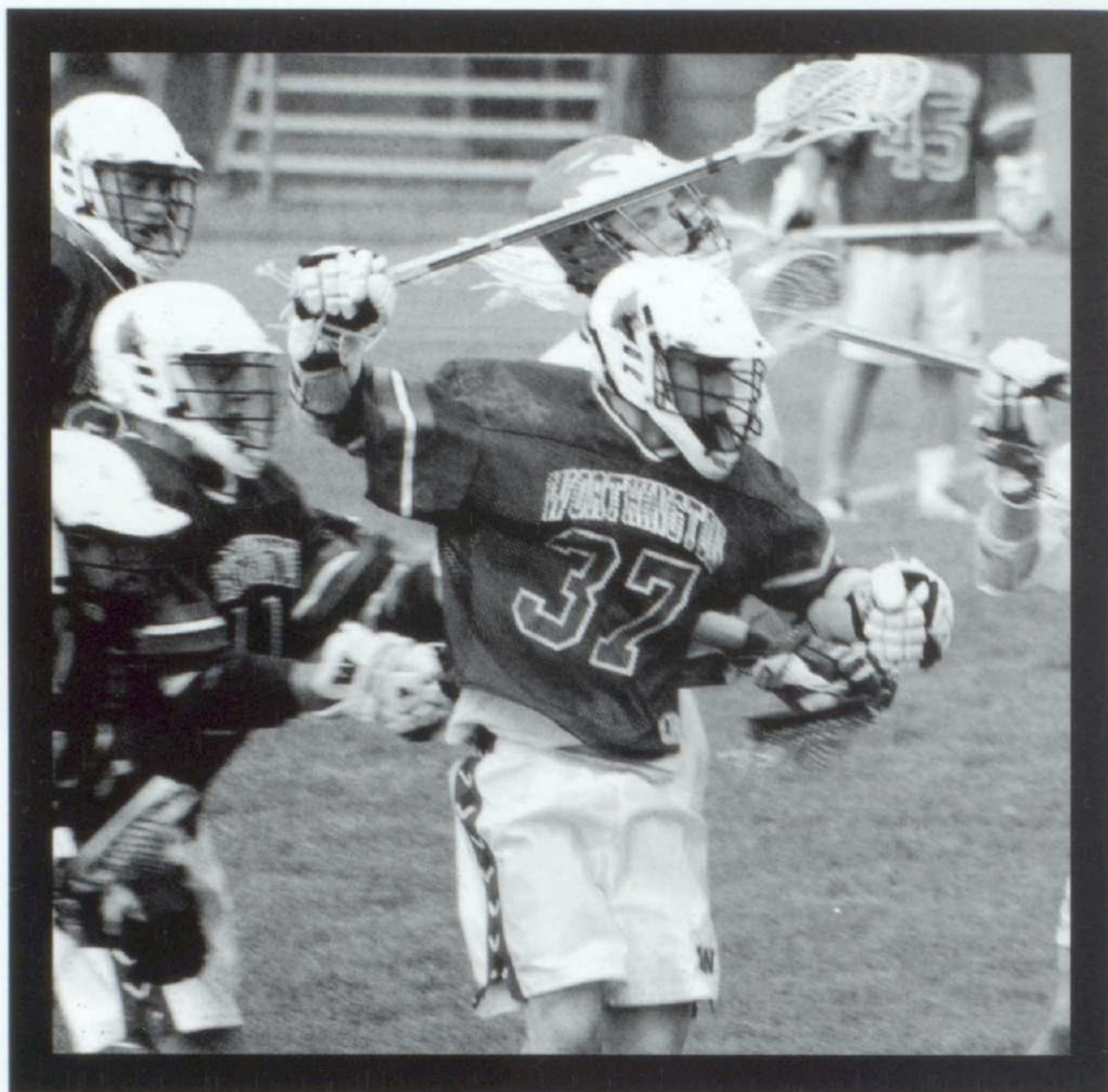
# Boys Lacrosse: On The Field

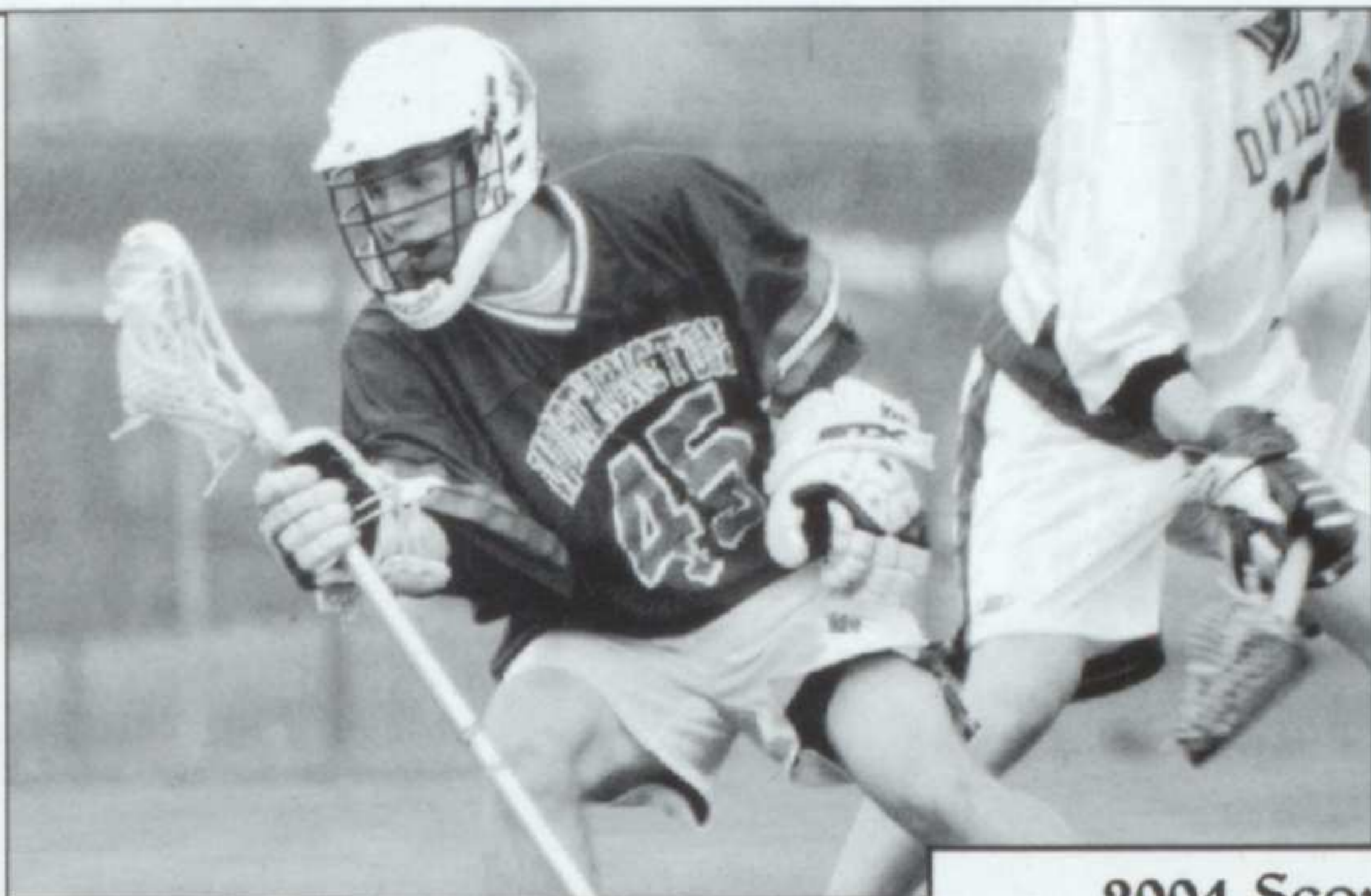

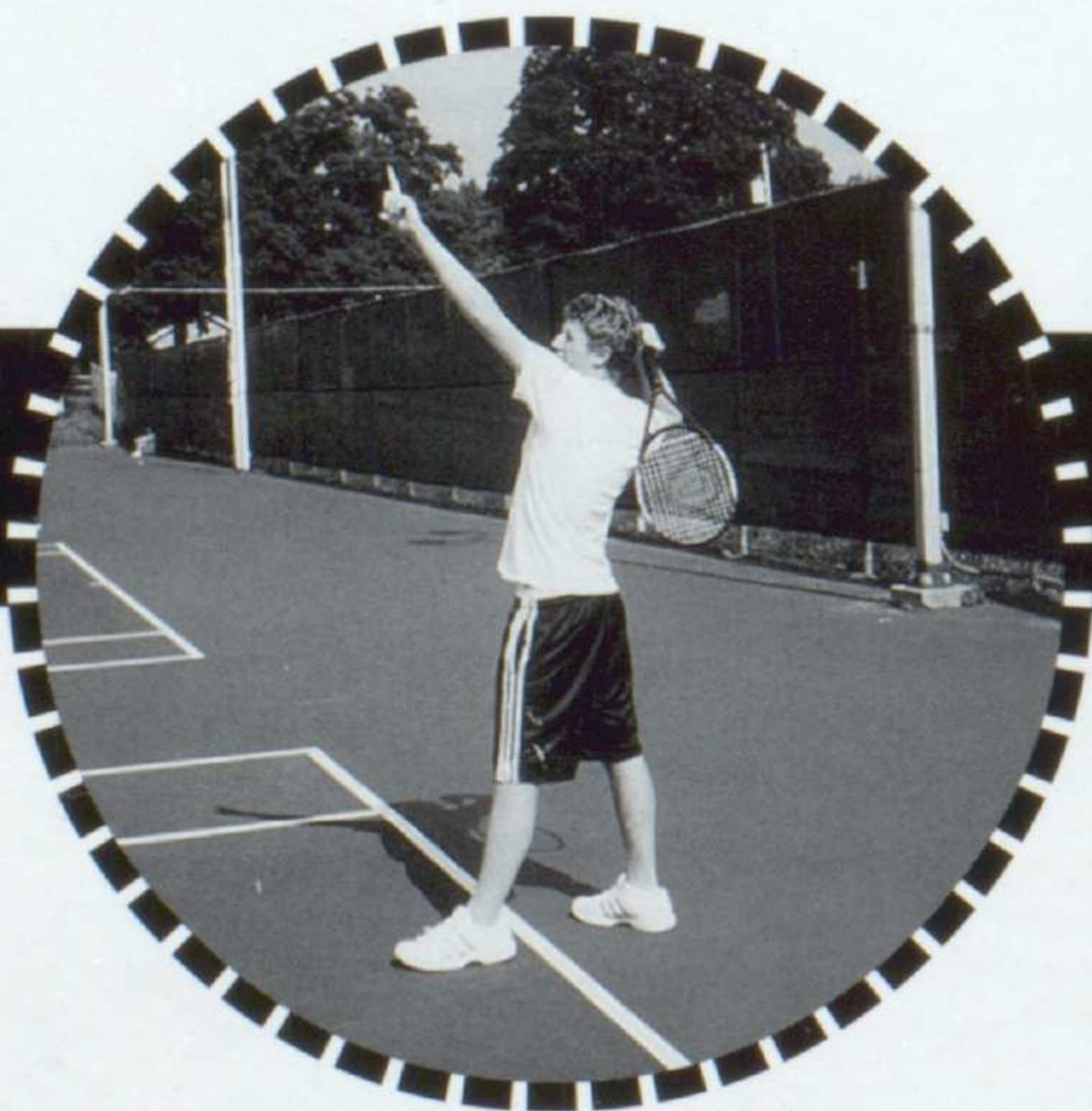

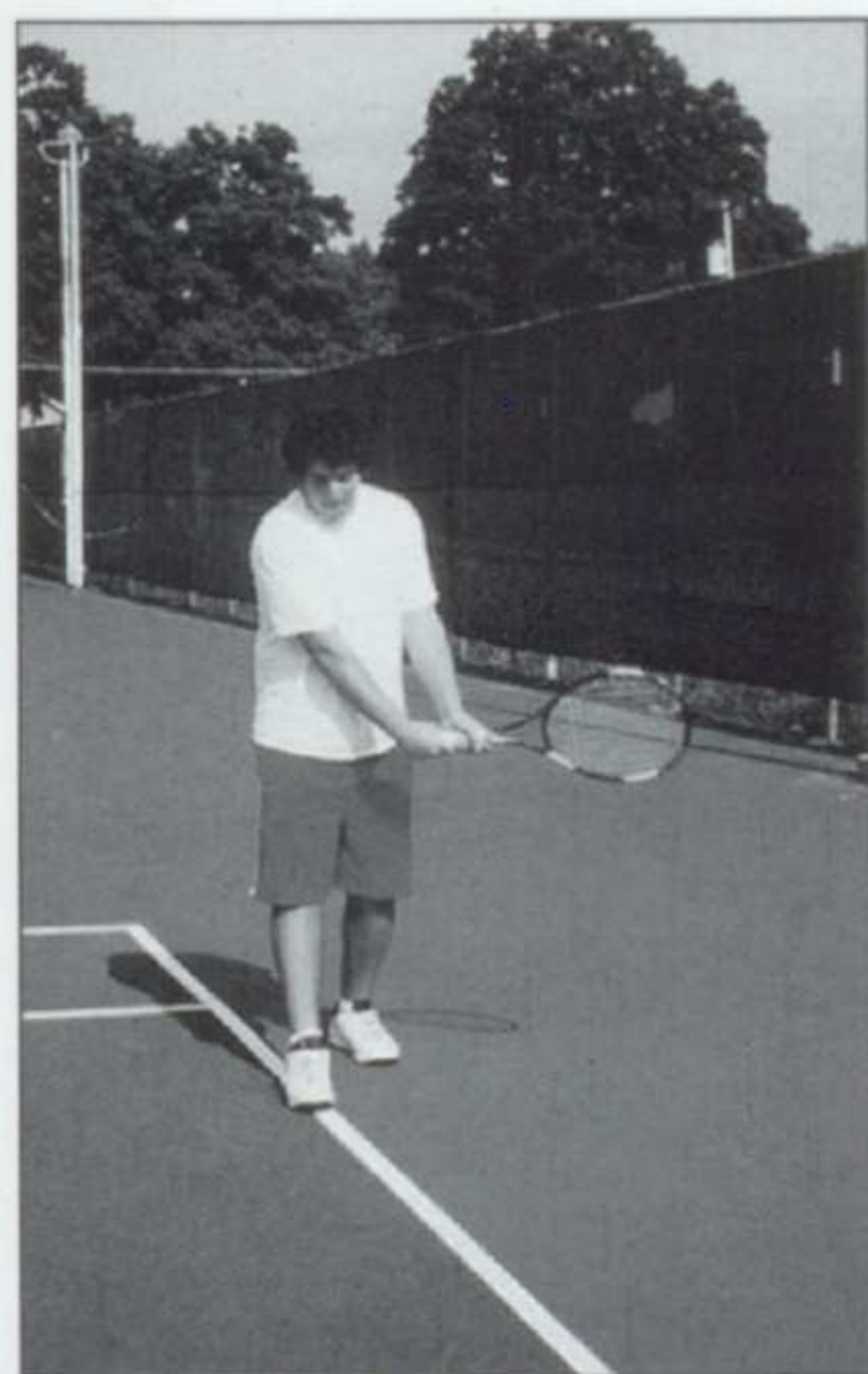

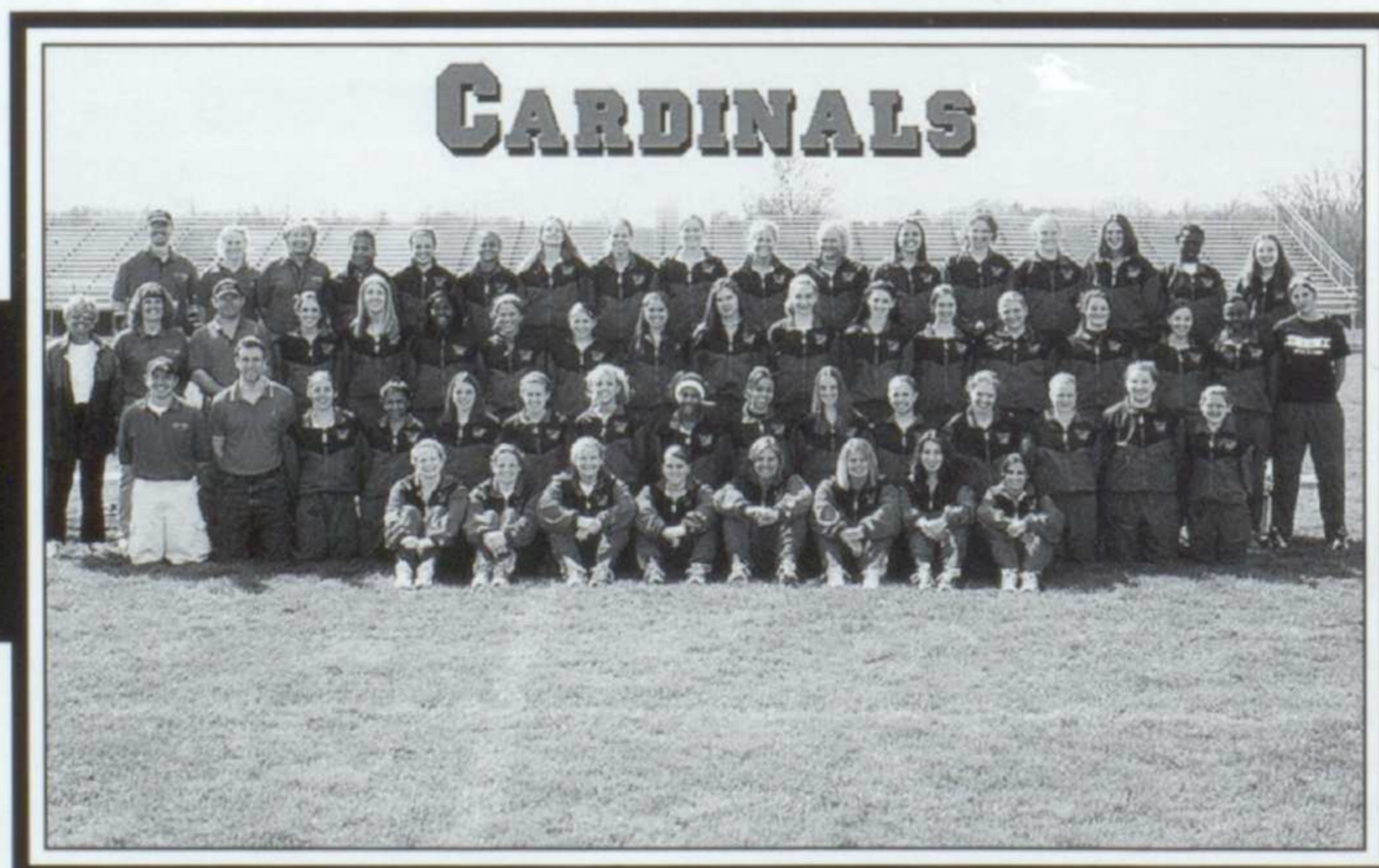

# Boys Volleyball: On the Net

*This year, a plethora of changes were made statewide for men's high school volleyball teams; Thomas Worthington included. These changes will reconfigure several ways the game is normally played and with that come certain rule alterations. According to Thomas Worthington head coach Scott Ebright, the changes were made to keep up with the rest of the modern volleyball world. College and USA Amateur teams already use many, if not all, of these rules. But more importantly, many think that these new rules will improve rallies and make mens volleyball generally more exciting.*

*Traditionally, Thomas Worthington played the game with side-out scoring, in which teams could only score points on their serve. In the new system, the winner of each side-out scores a point, regardless of which team served. With this new scoring, games are now played to 25 points, ten more than the original 15 under side-out scoring.*

*Another difference is the additional position of libero, or defensive or back row specialist. This player only plays back row and may be substituted at any time. The only restriction of the libero is that they can't spike a ball that is higher than the net.*

*This year, the ball may be hit twice on a serve receive. Also, if the ball hits the net on a serve it is still playable. Along with this, any player may use any part of his body to contact the ball.*

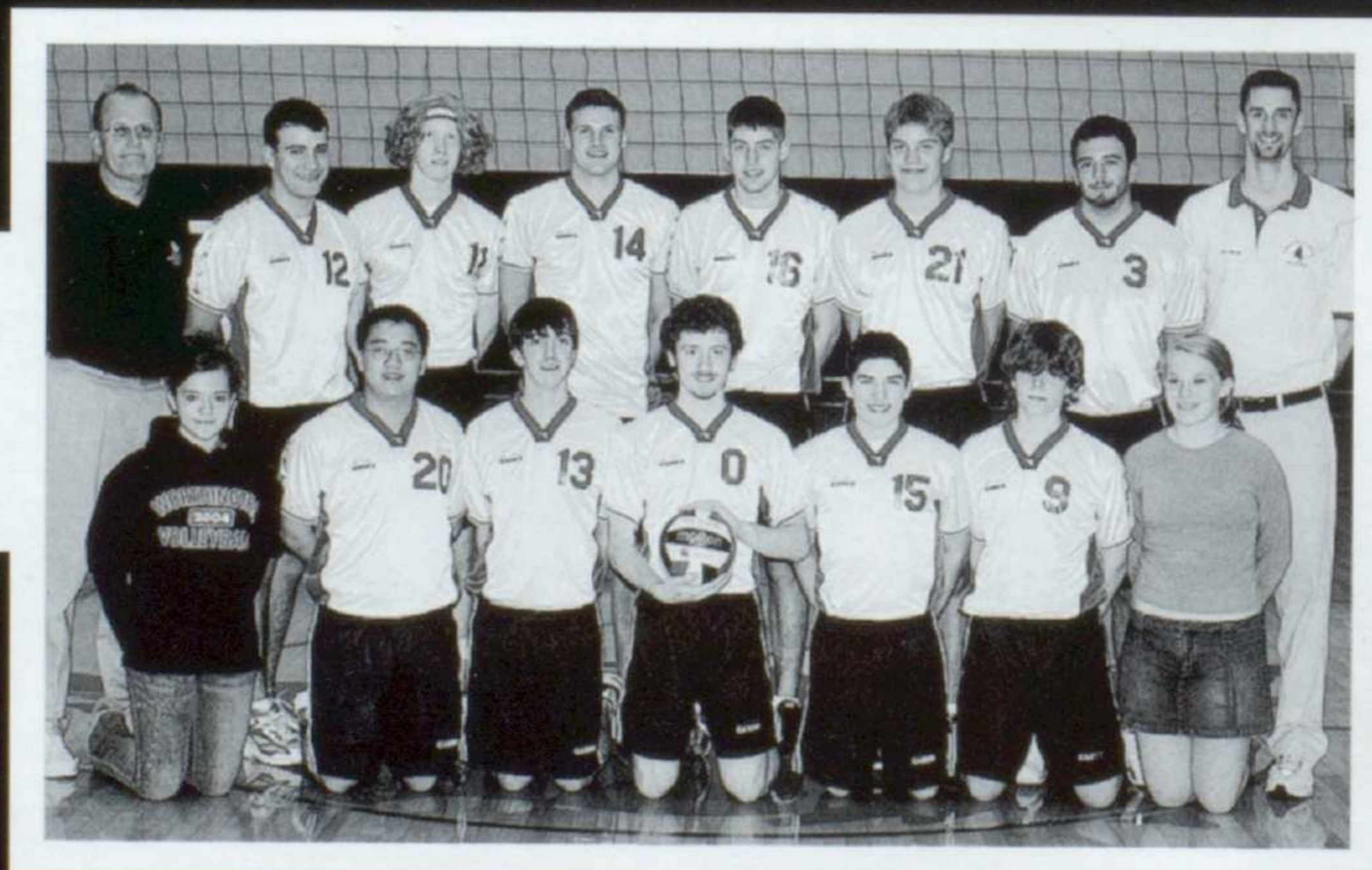

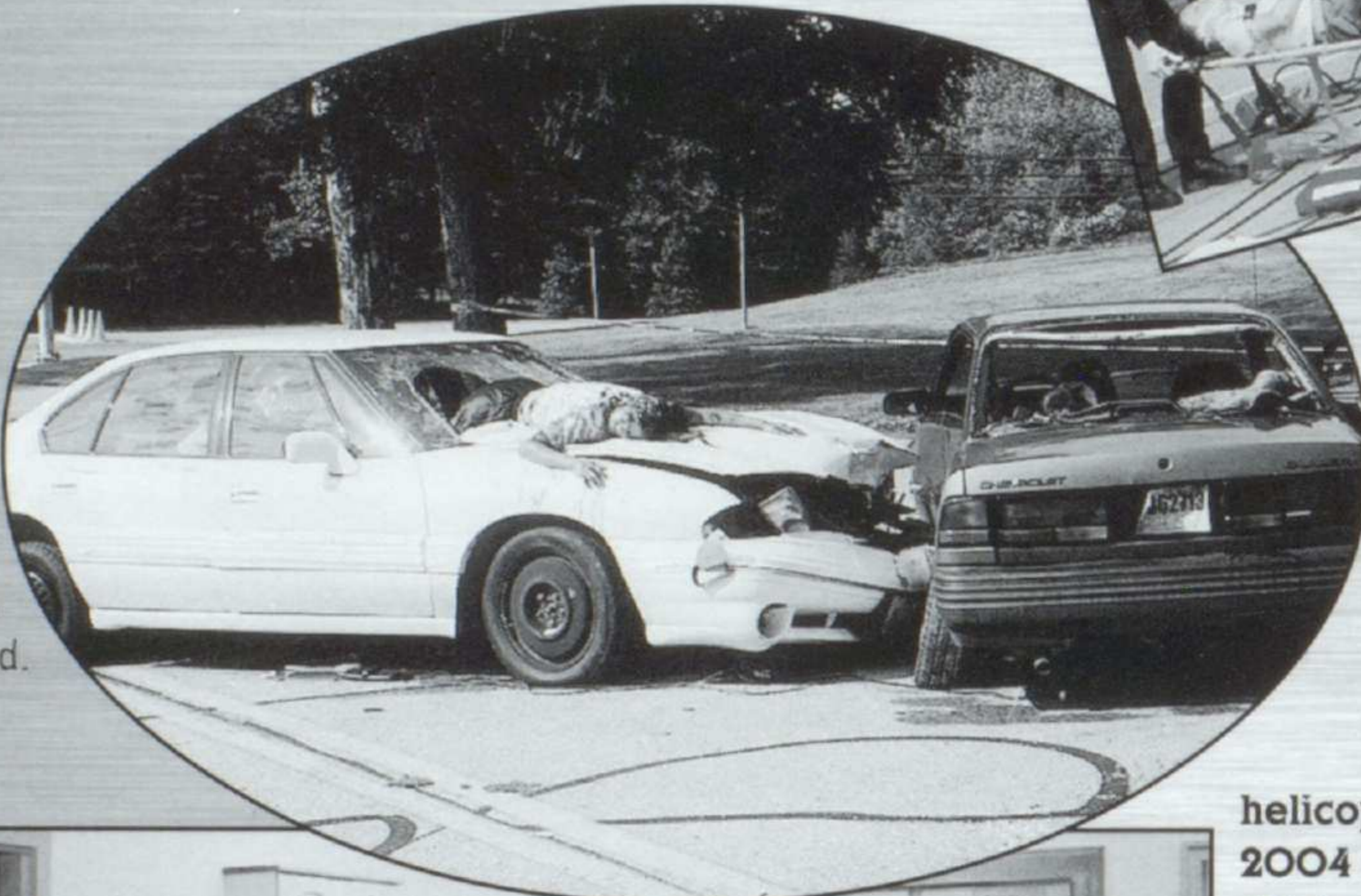

# Mock Accident

Sirens blaring, policemen, paramedics, and a rescue helicopter were all present at Thomas Worthington on May 8, 2004 for the Mock Accident. Hours of planning went into this huge production, and the students who were involved and those who witnessed the accident will be forever changed. After the Mock Accident students left with an image of their friends and classmates making one bad decision and then paying for it. The Mock Accident was set up with a video, filmed by CommTech, of the students involved in the accident drinking while out on senior lunch. Then the juniors and seniors were taken out to the front of the school where the accident was already set up, and the freshmen and sophomores watched a live video feed in the auditorium. Worthington firemen and policemen then drove up to the scene of the accident and began treating the situation as if it were a real accident. Sophomore Lauren McGearly said, "I couldn't believe how long it took to get everyone out of the car." The mock accident intentionally took place just a few days before prom. Everyone involved in the mock accident hoped that students would think twice before making a mistake they would regret for the rest of their lives. Mrs. Bird, the Red Cross contact who helped with the planning process had this to say, "If this production saves just one student's life it was worth it."

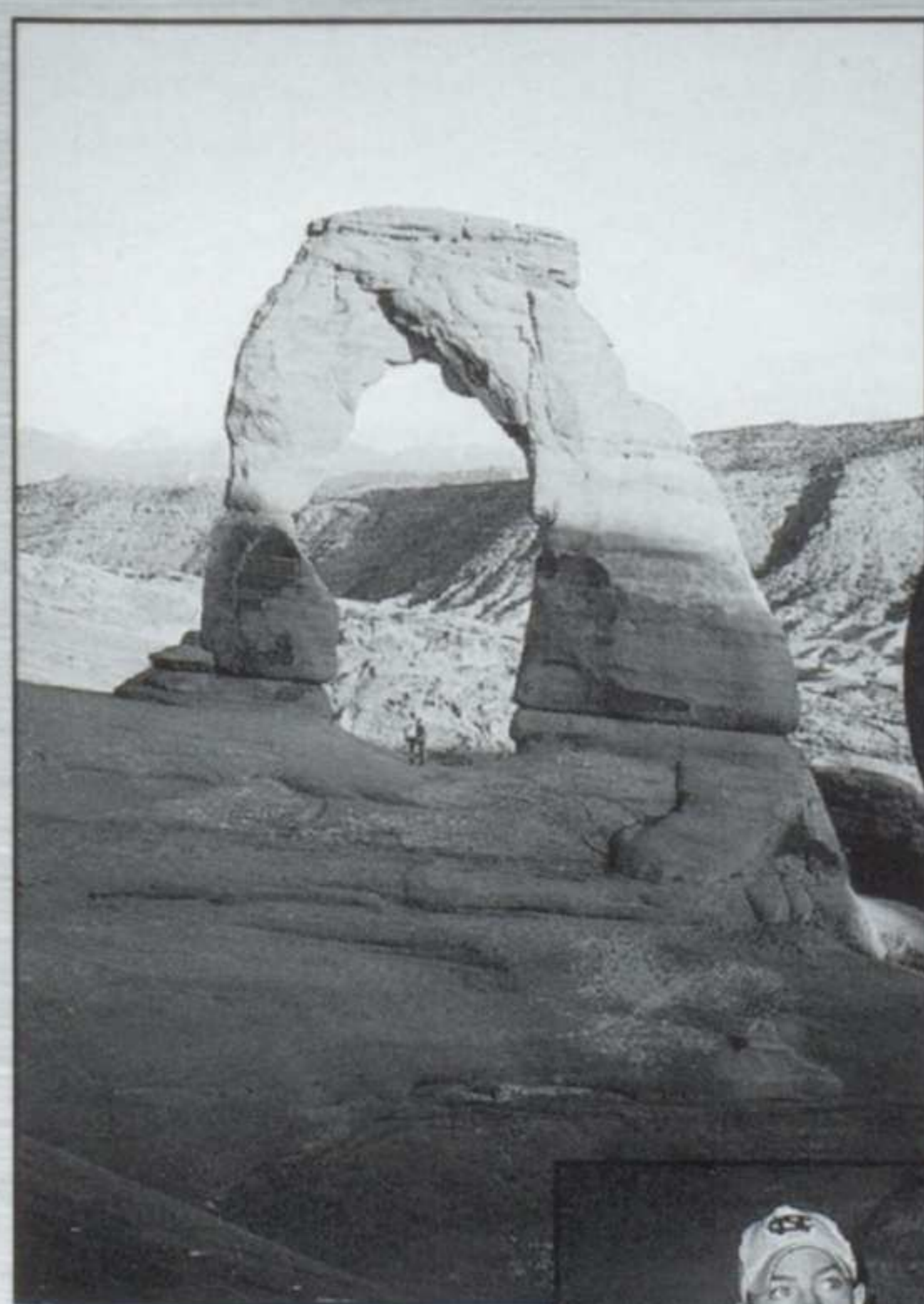

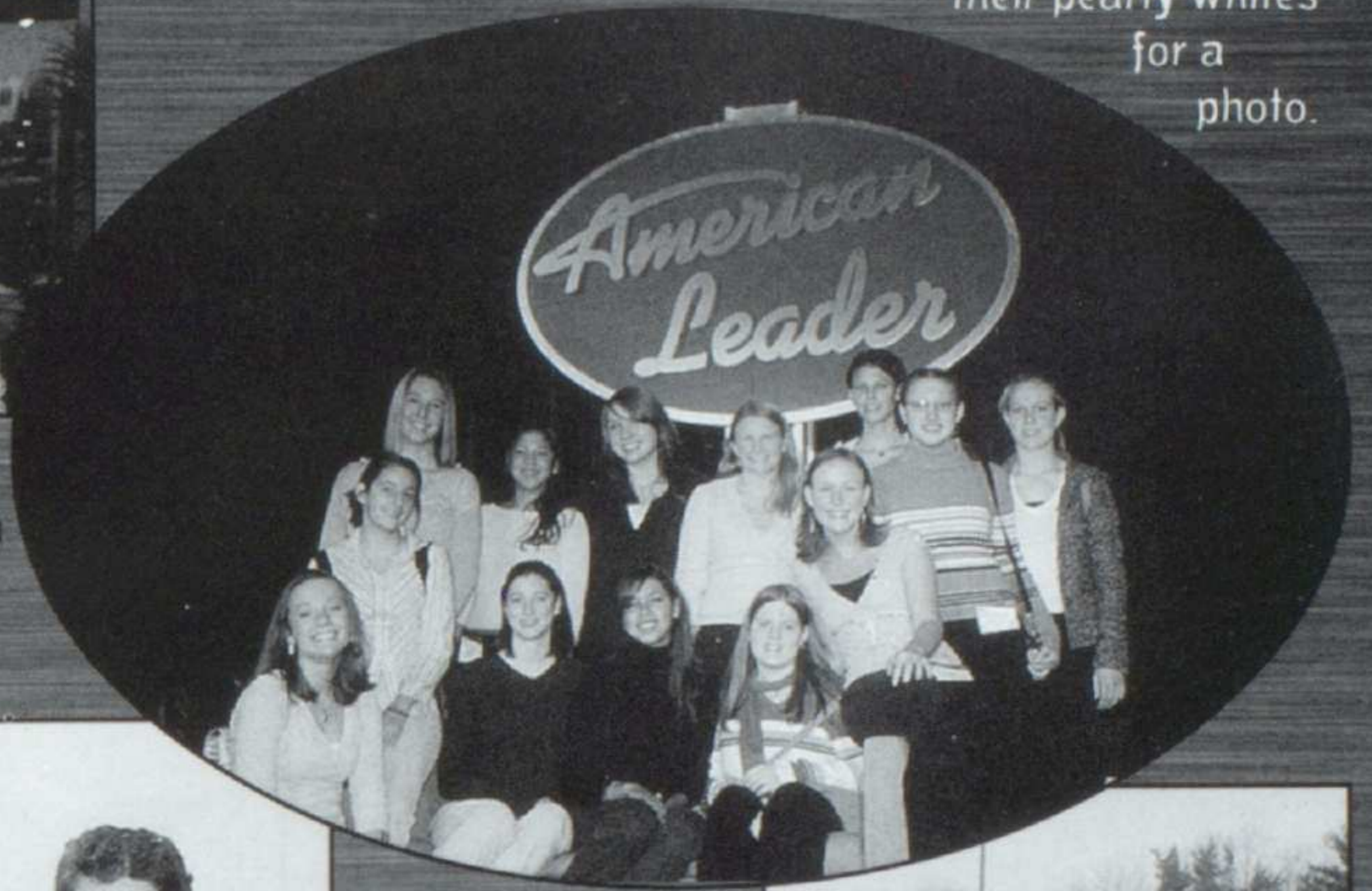

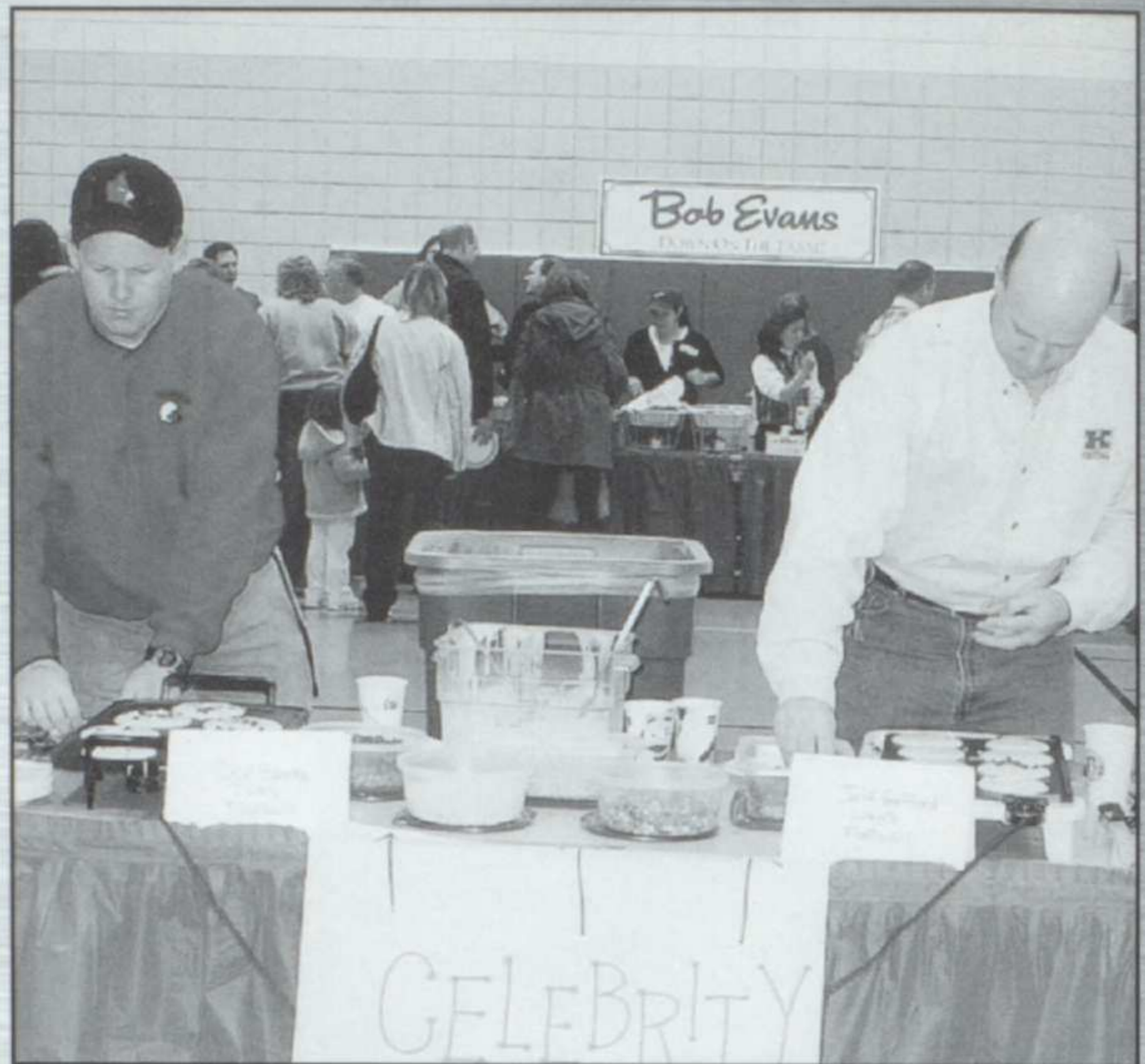

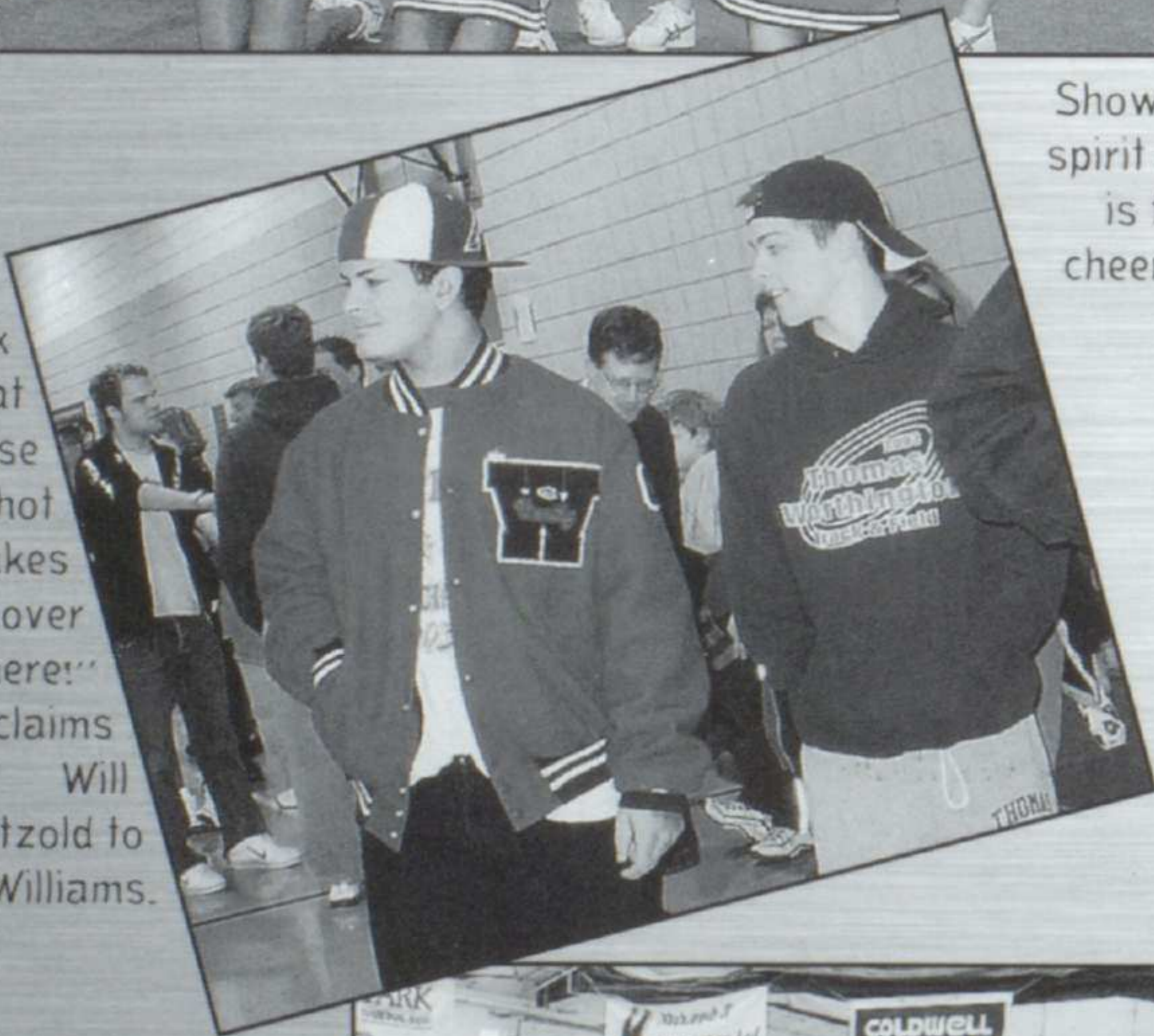

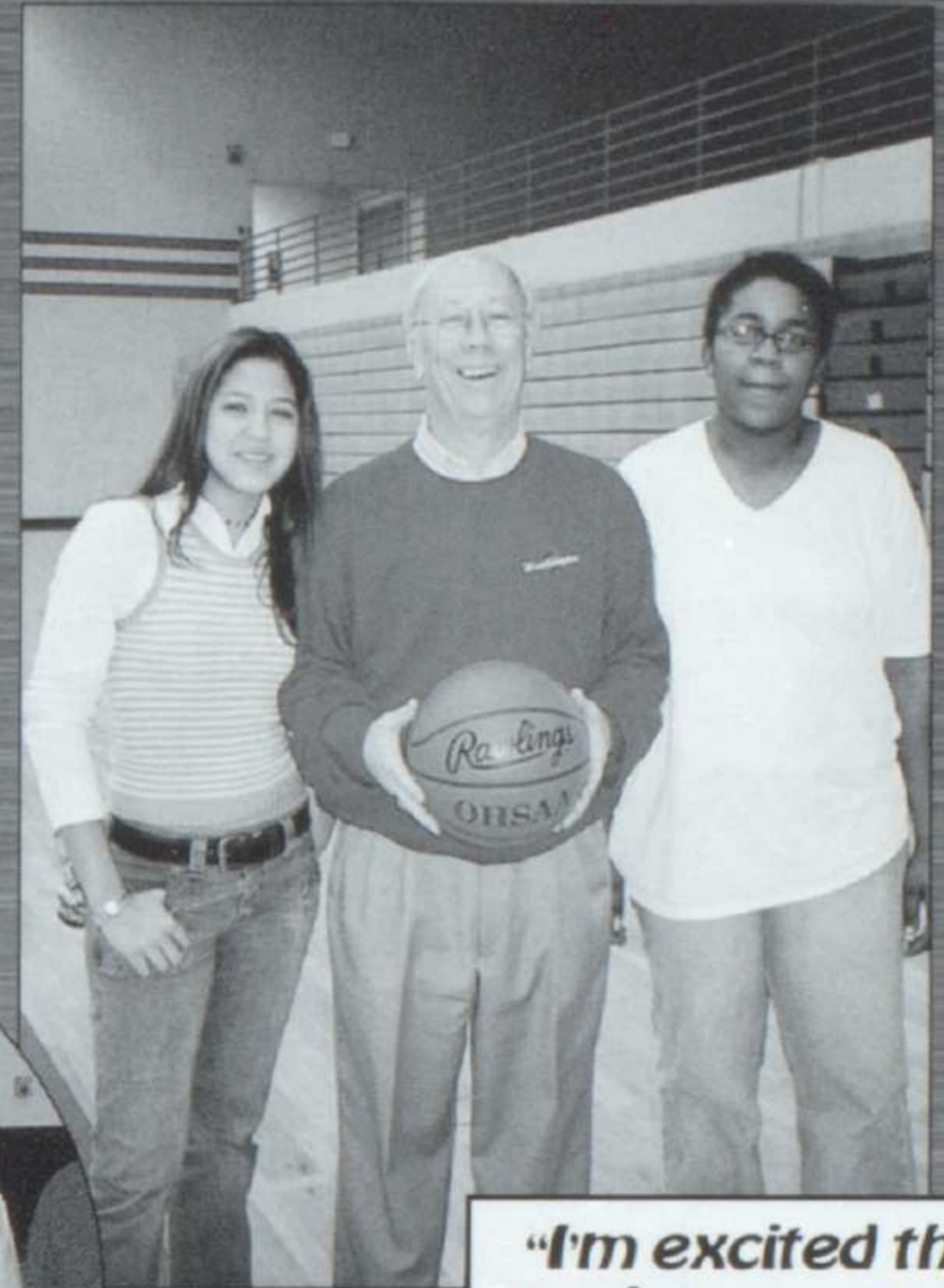

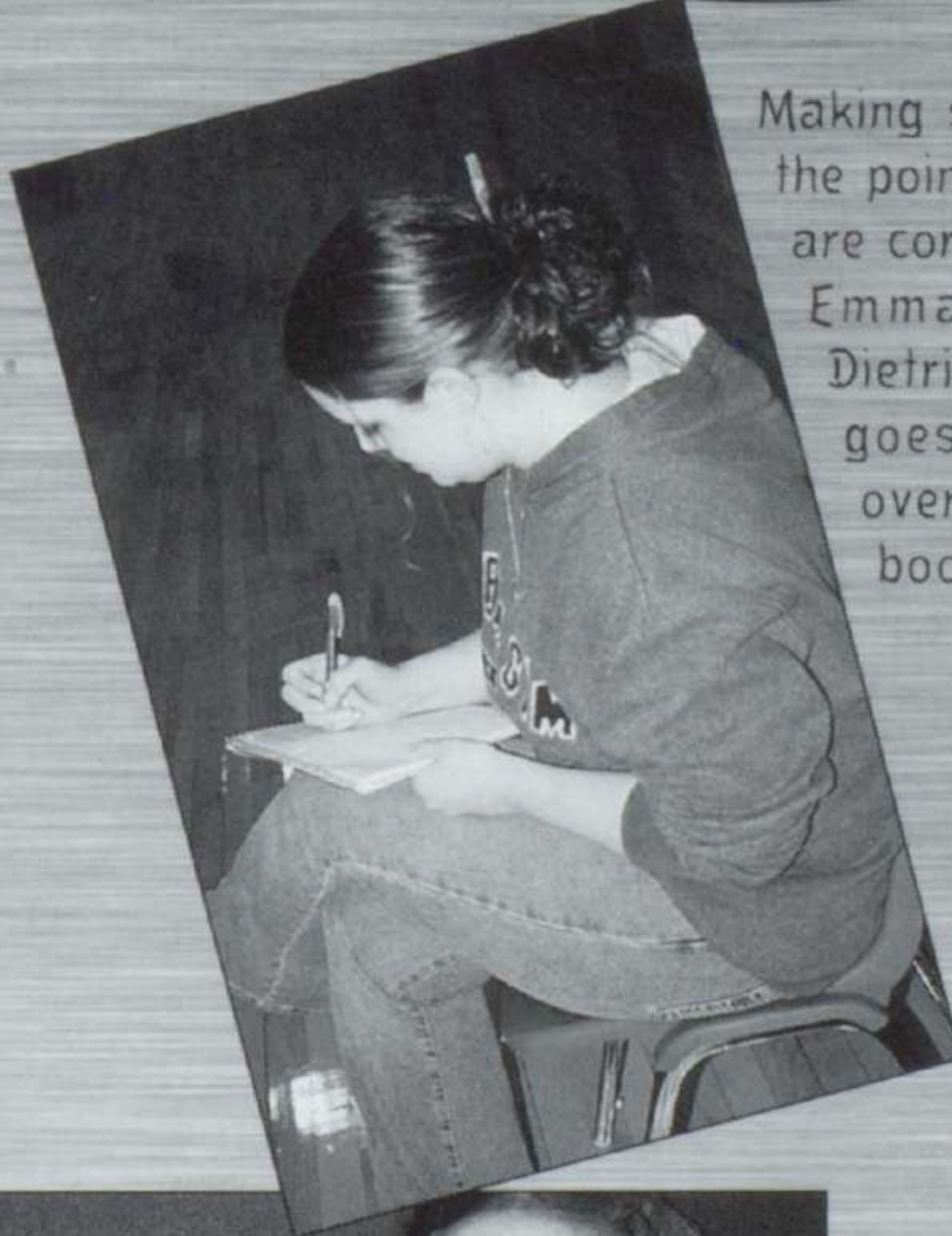

## Cards for Kids

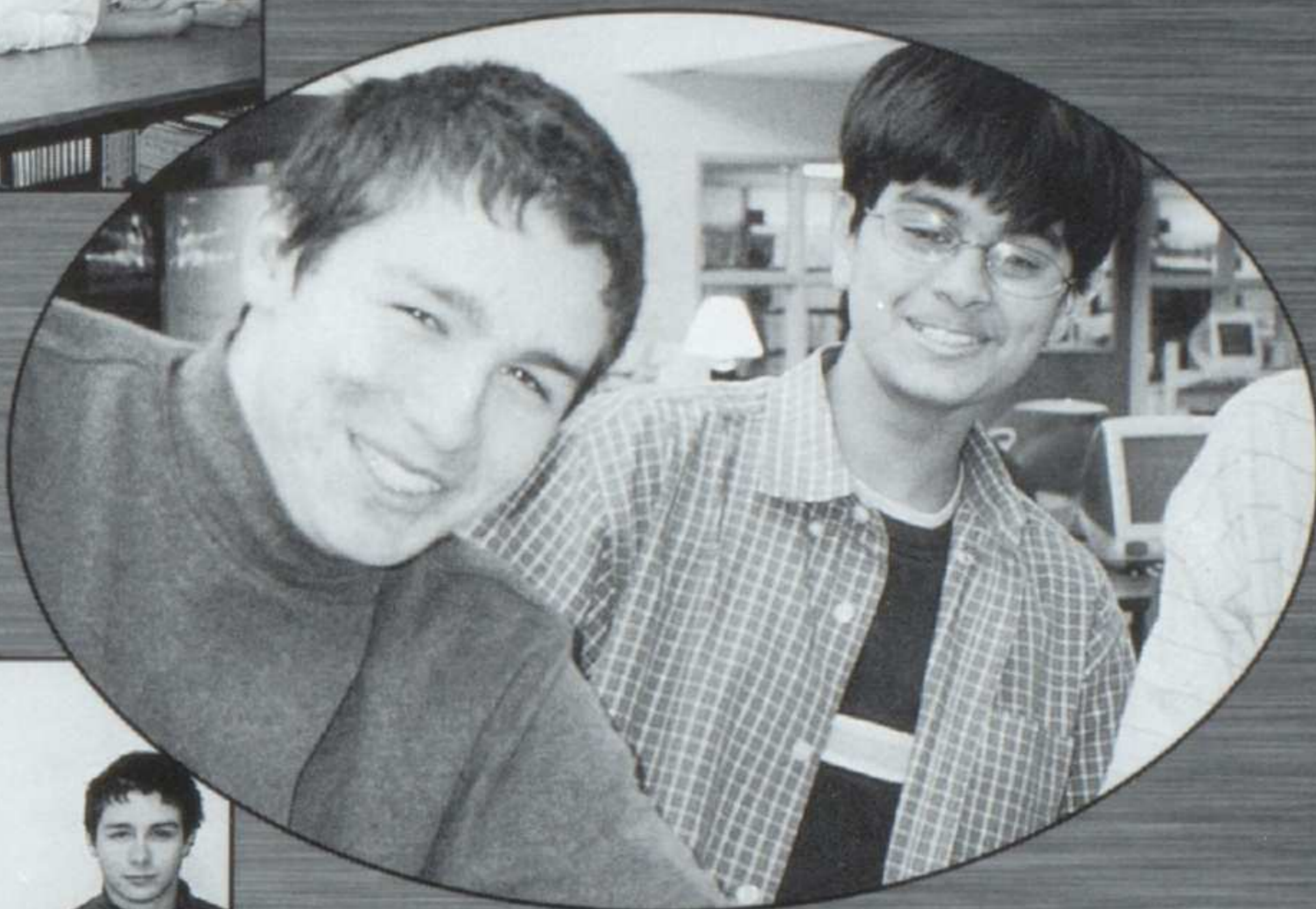

# In The Know

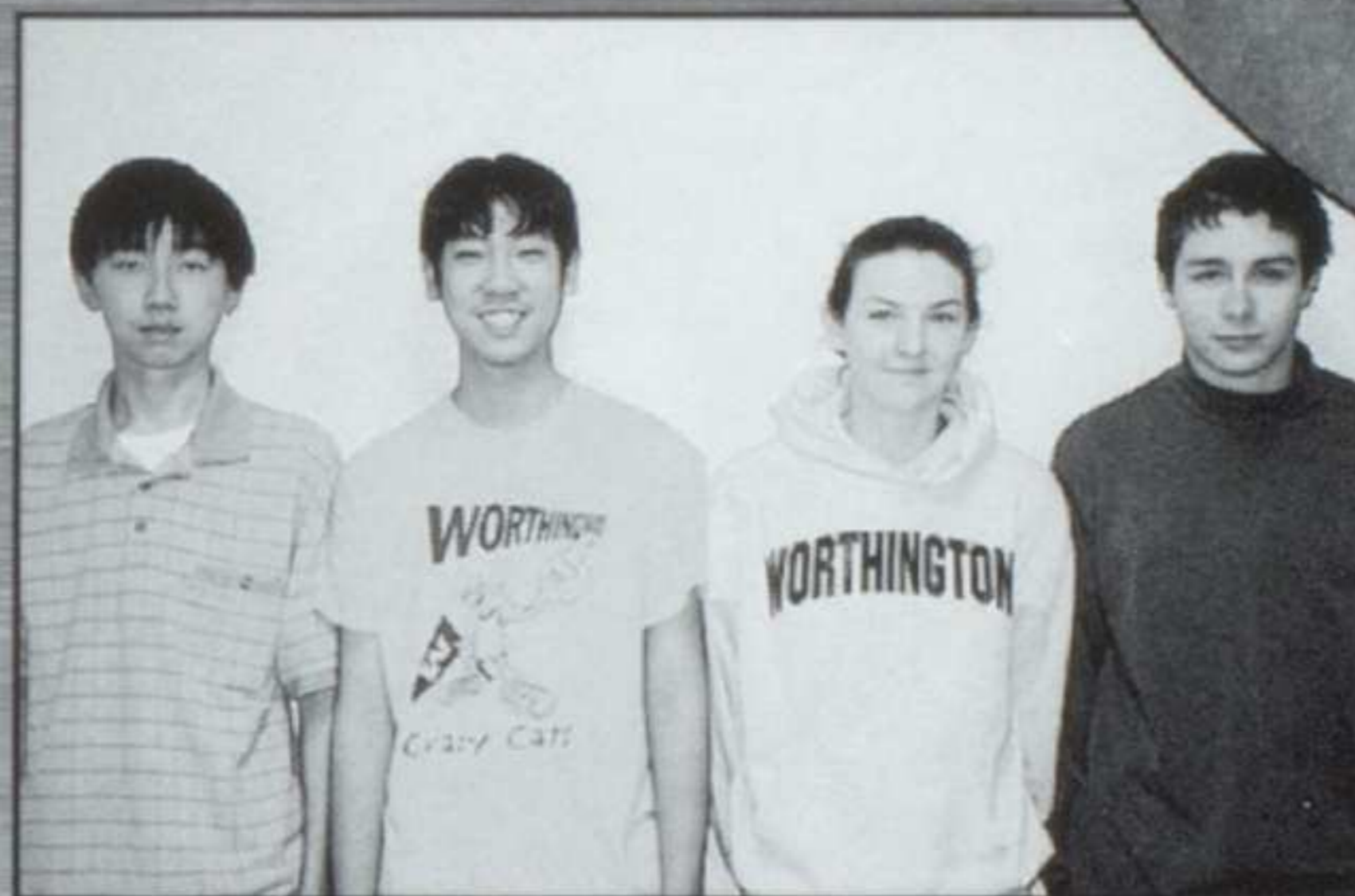

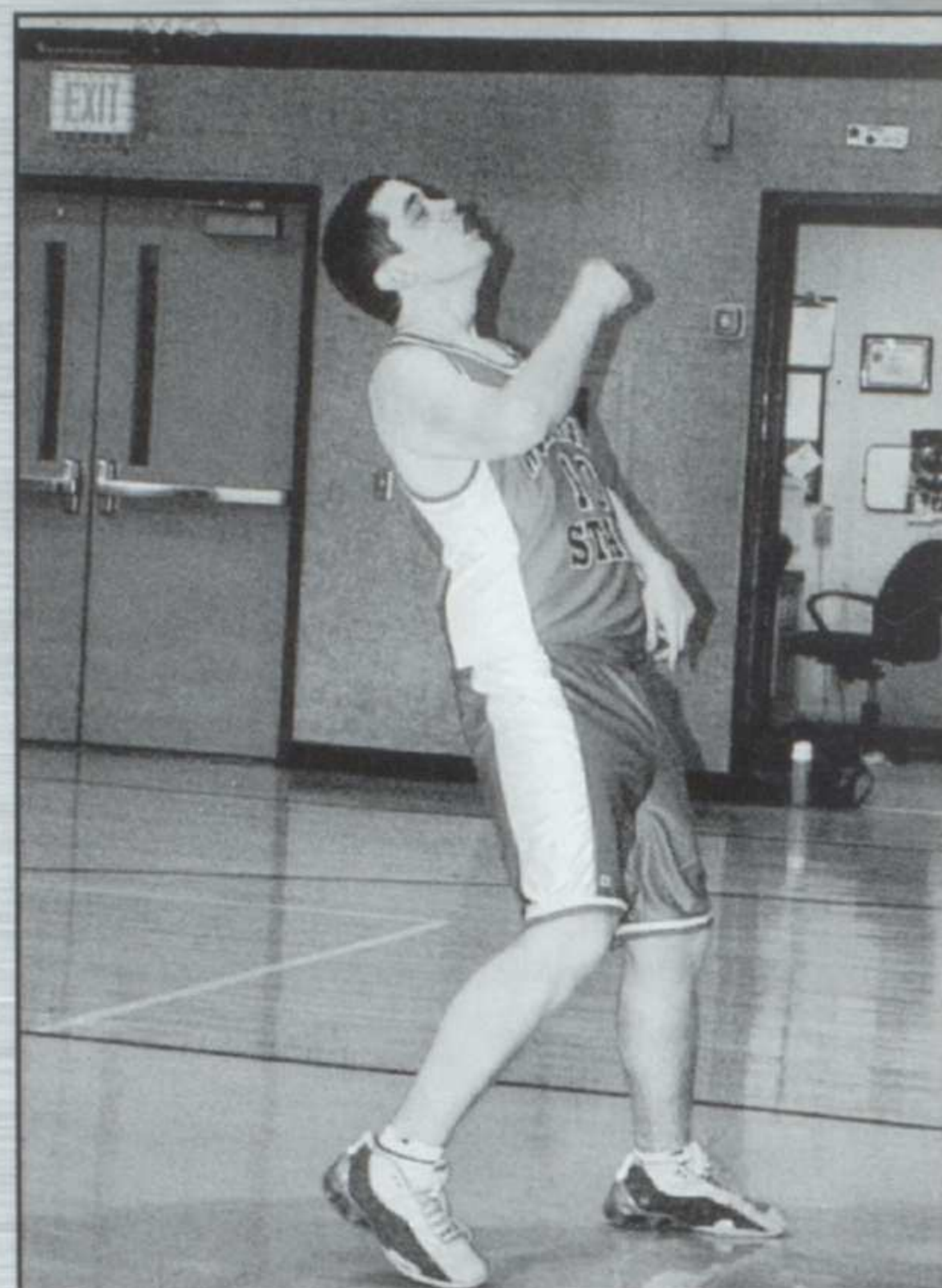
# Blood Drive

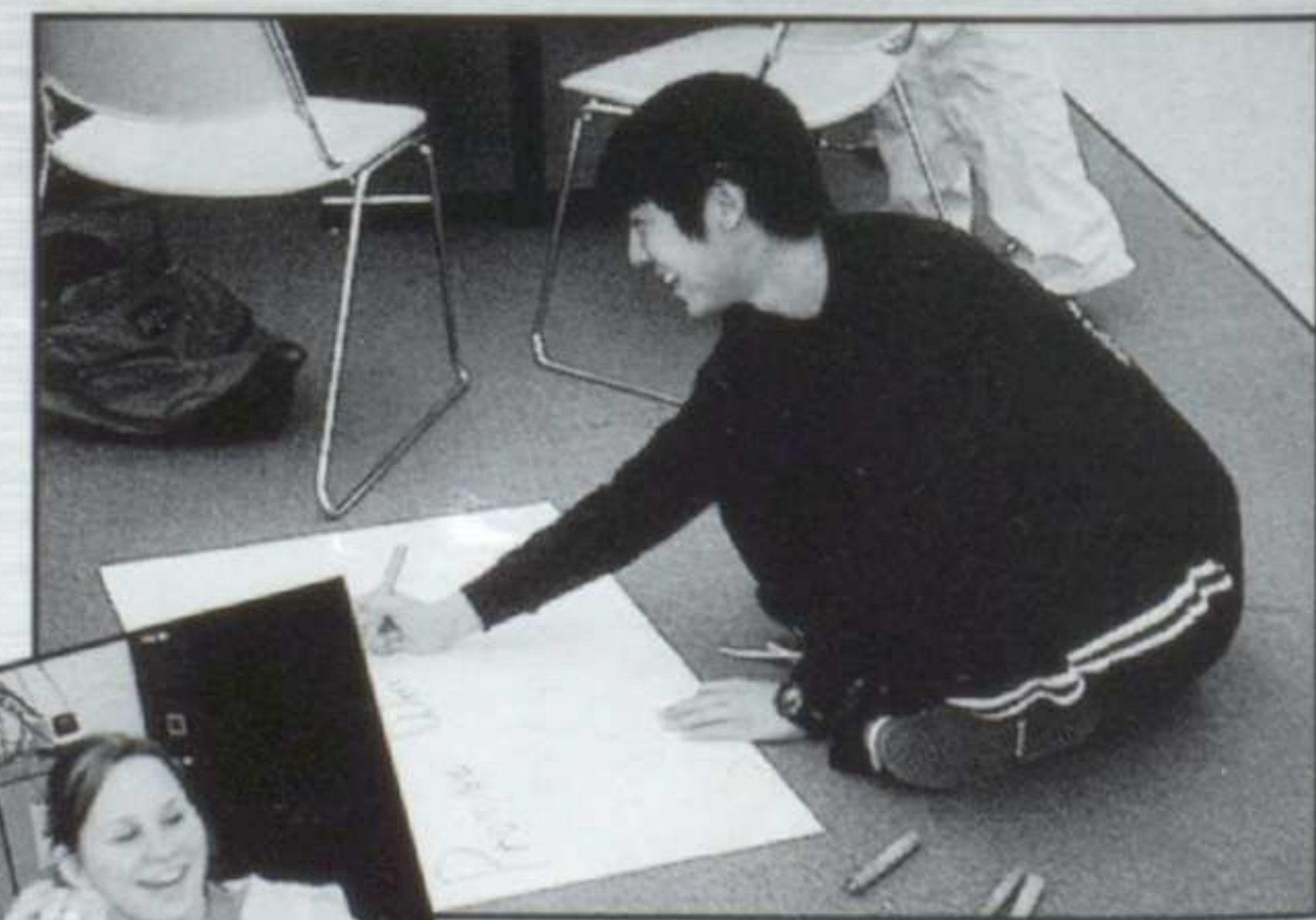

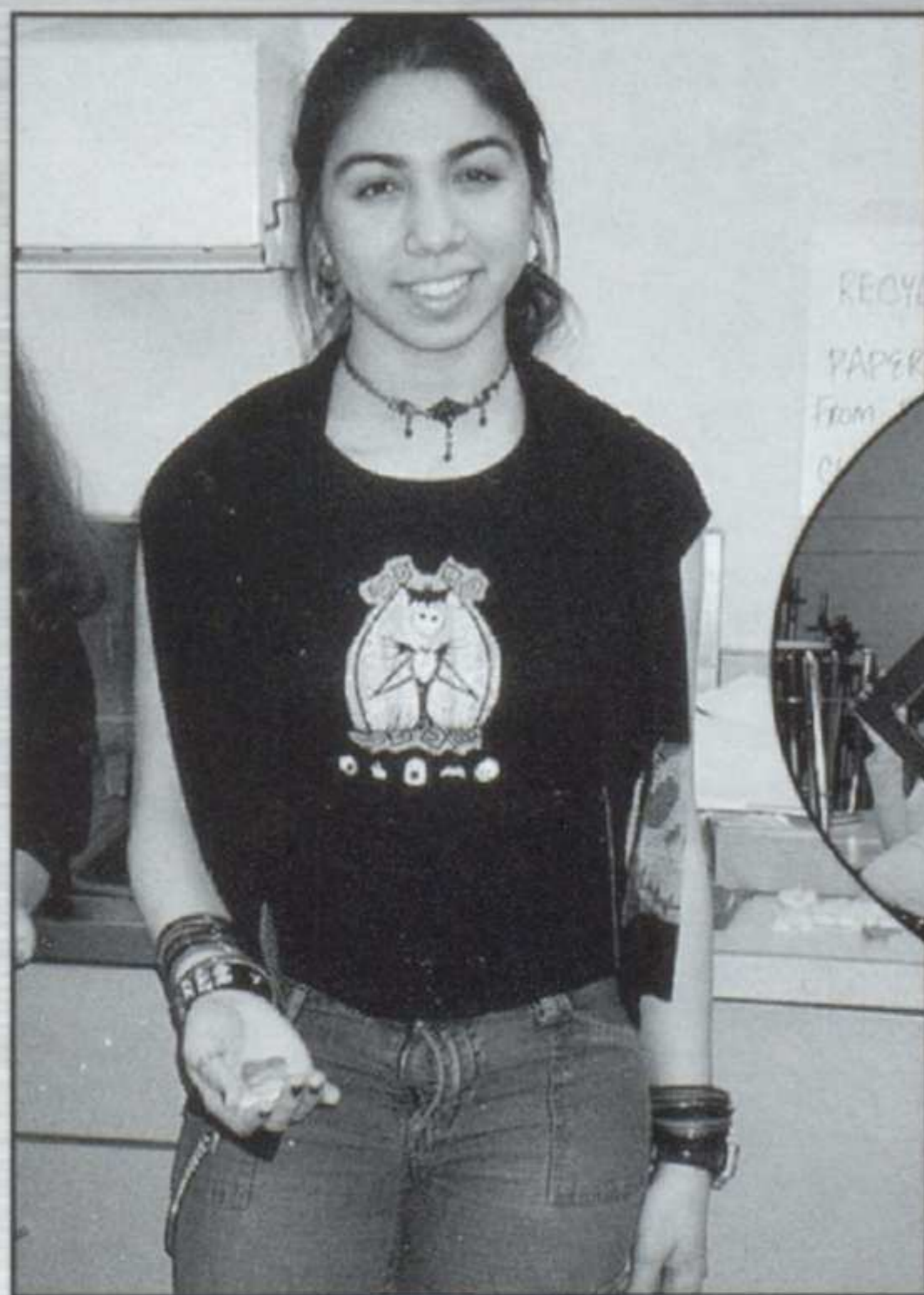

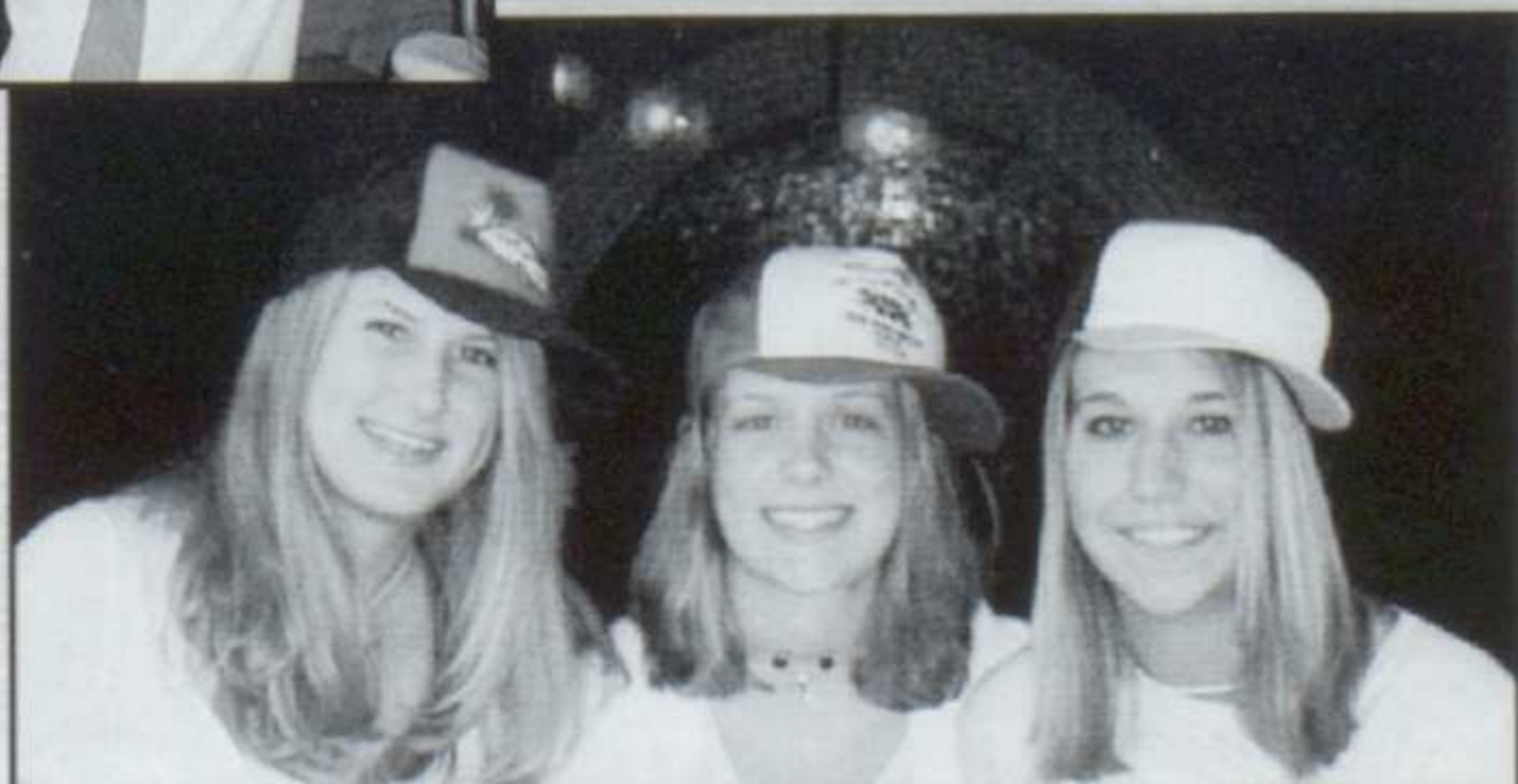
## Spring Break

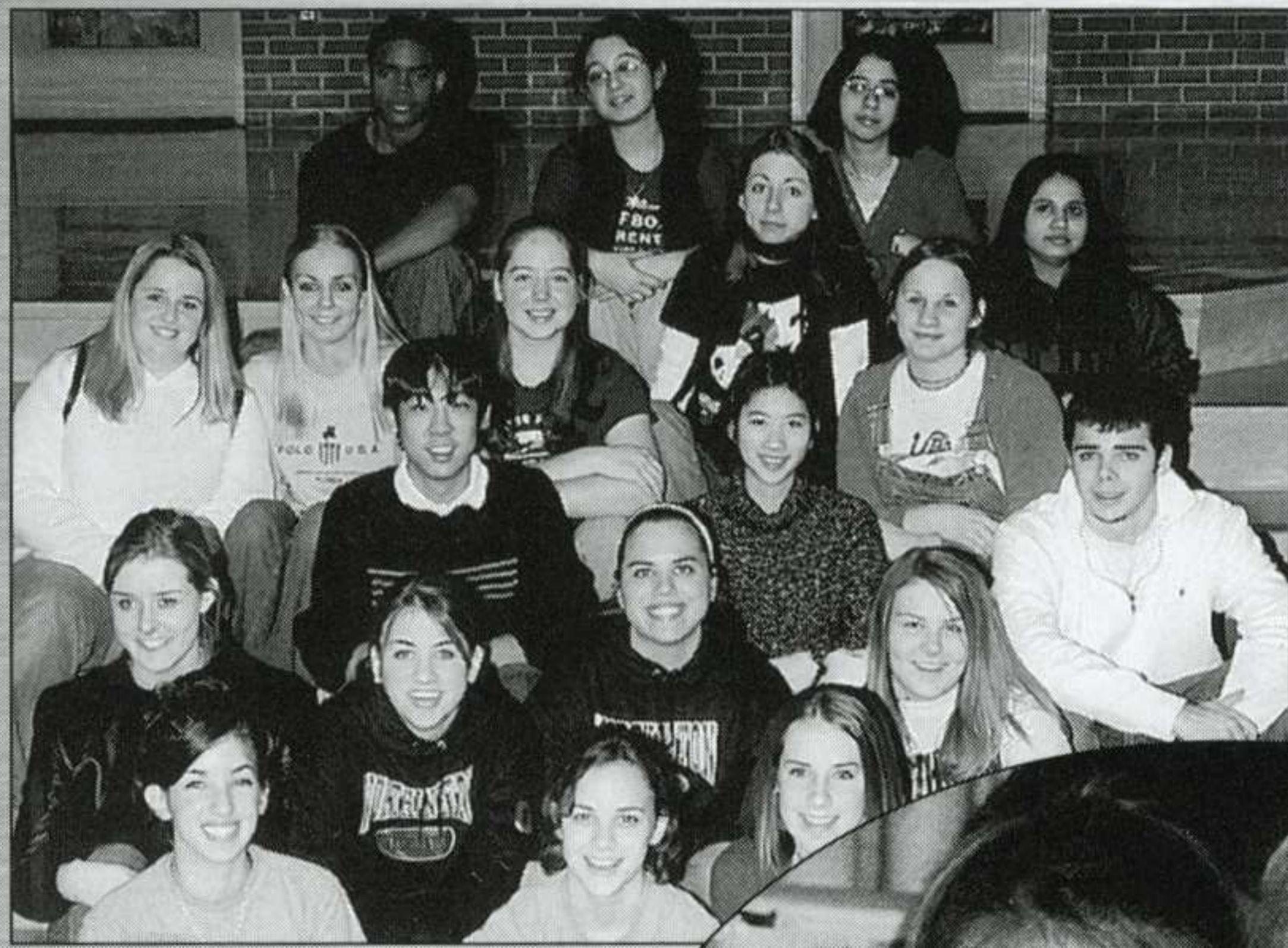

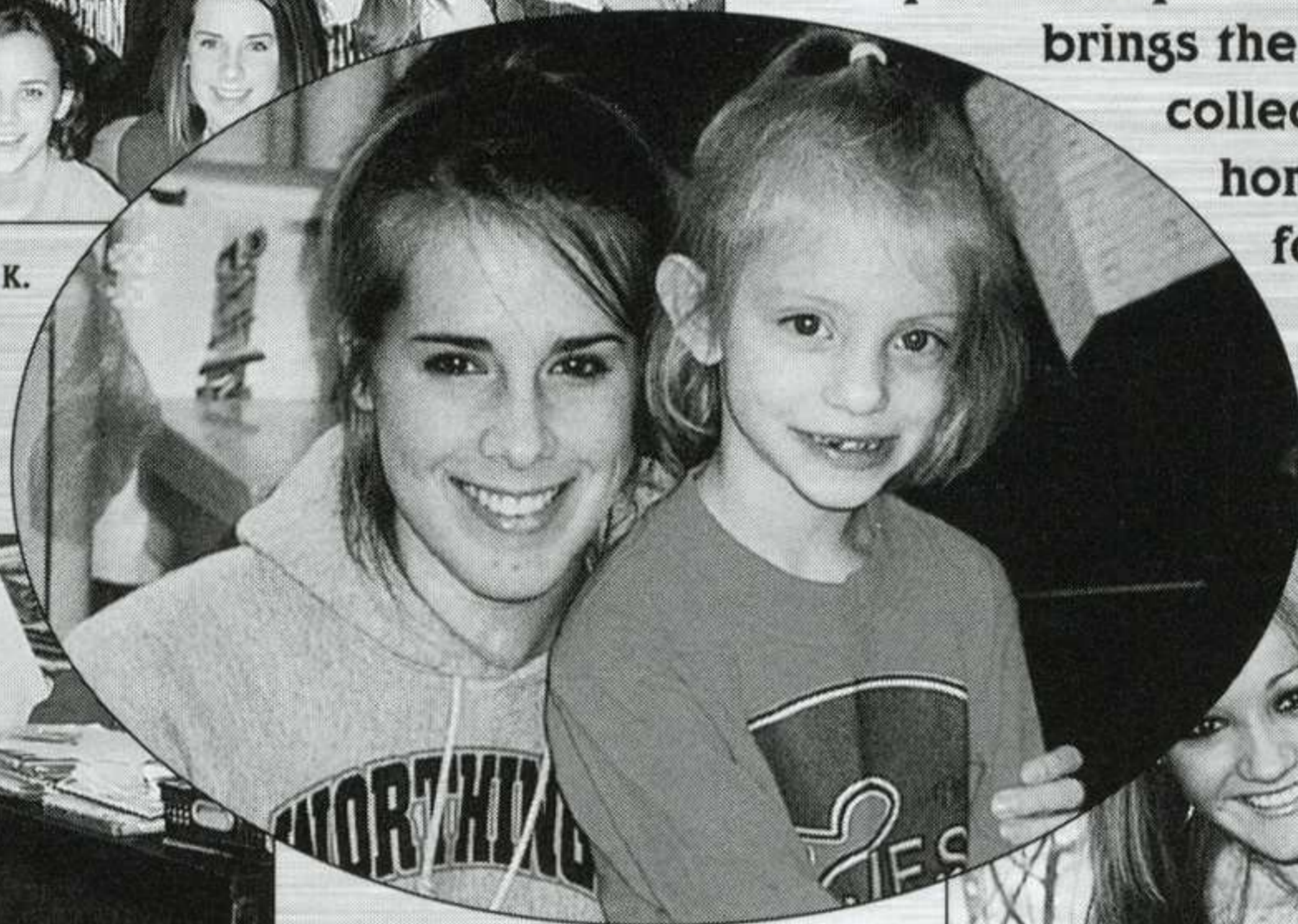


# Community Service Club

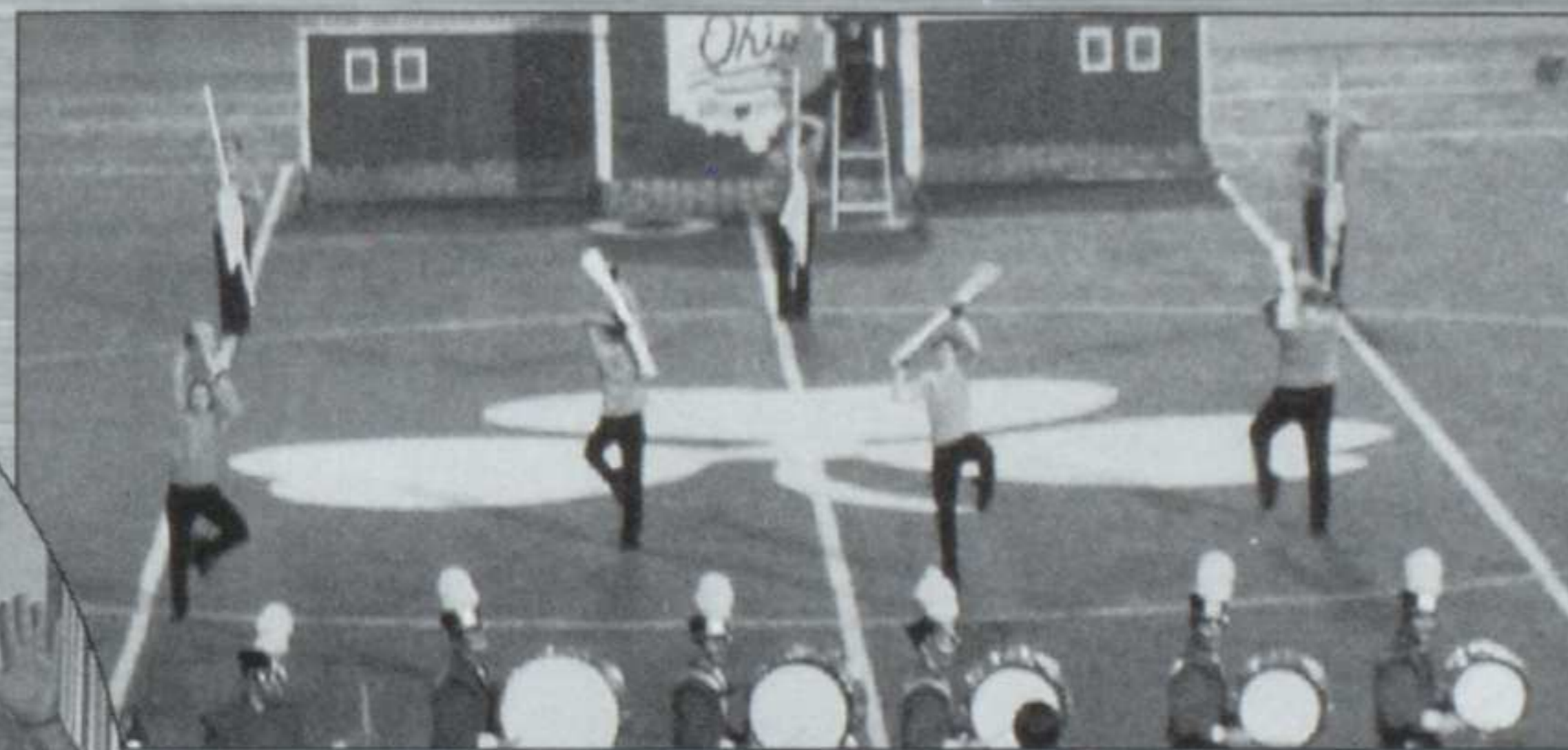

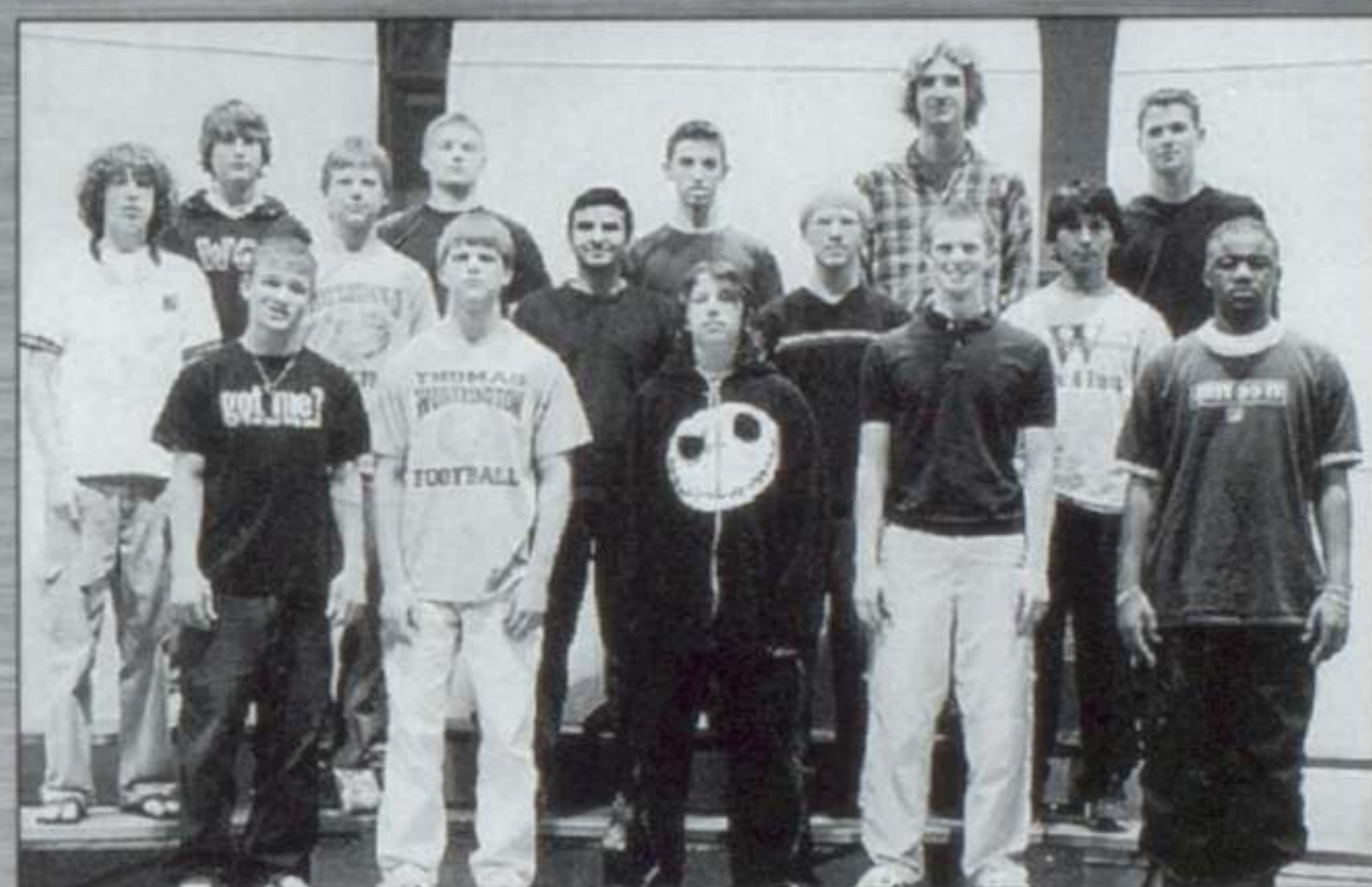

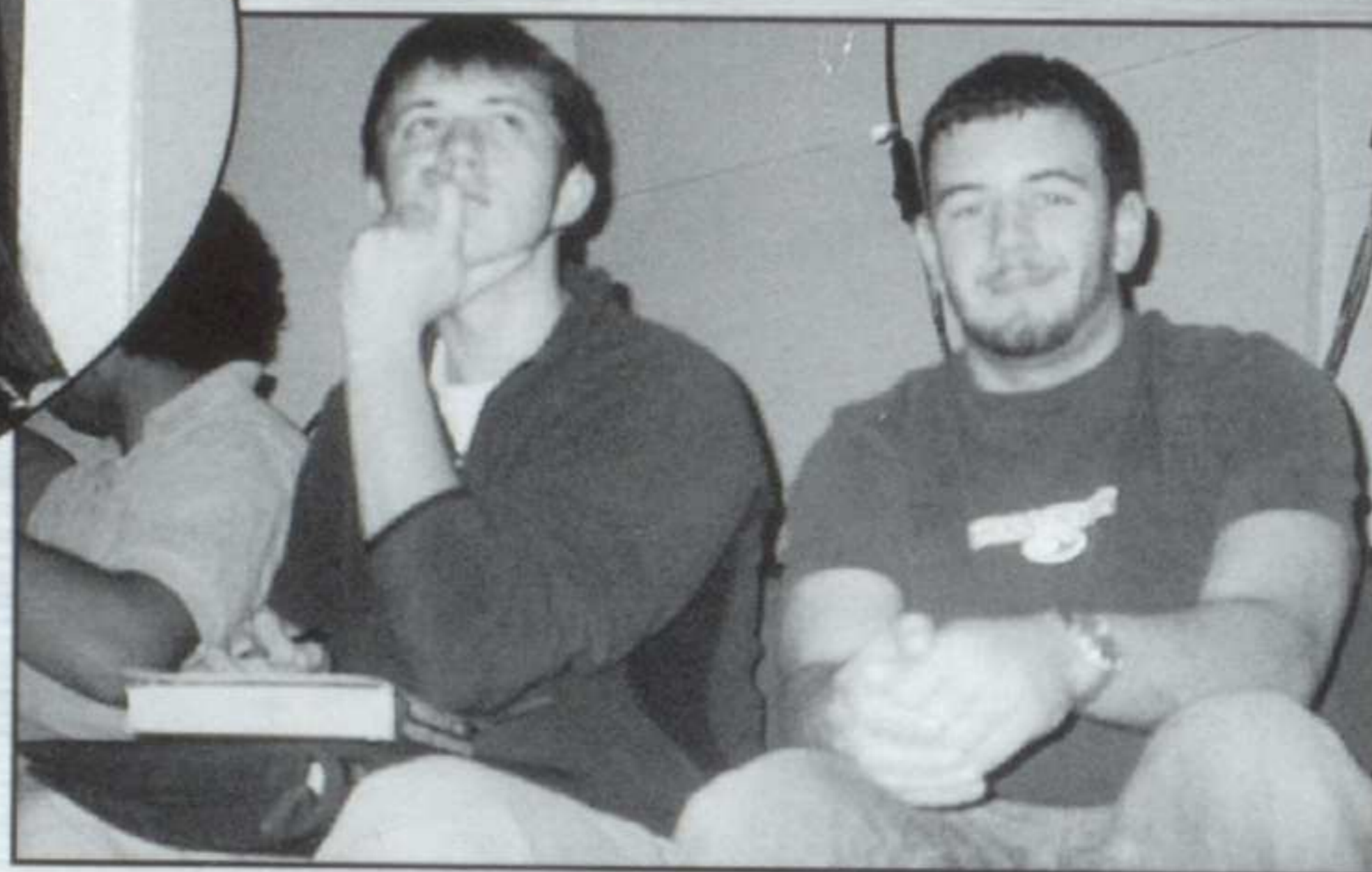
# National Honor Society

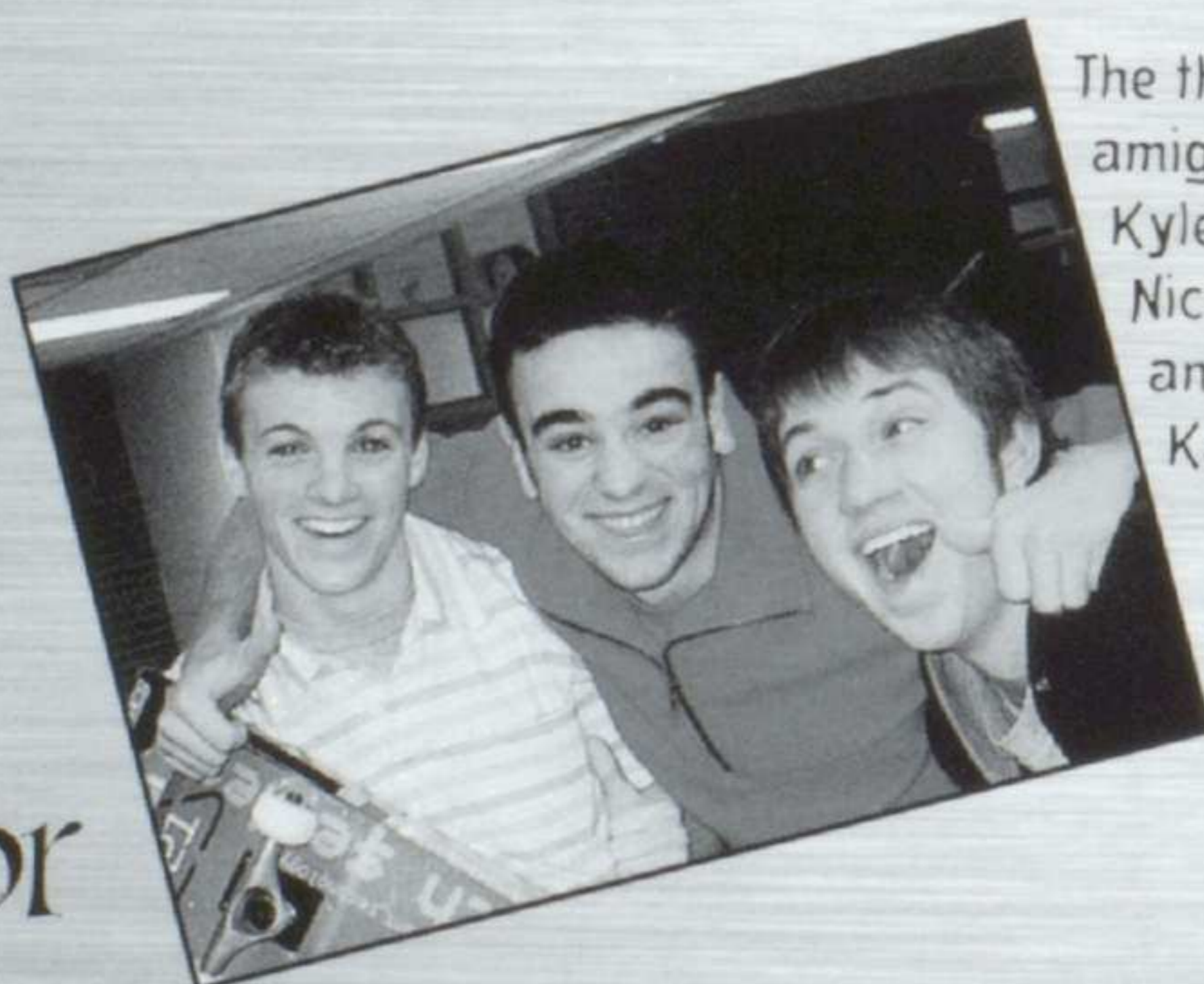

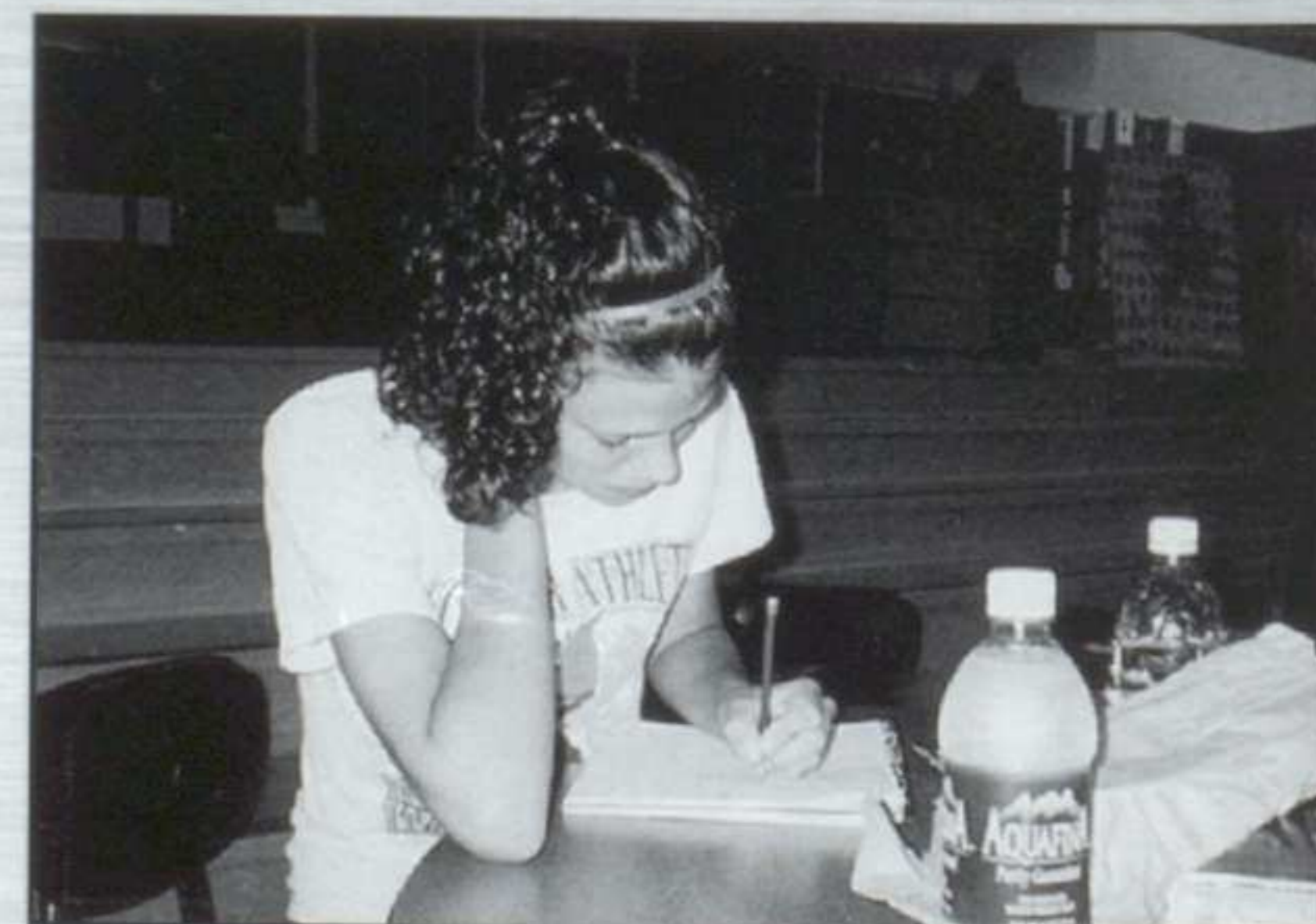

# Spanish National Honor Society

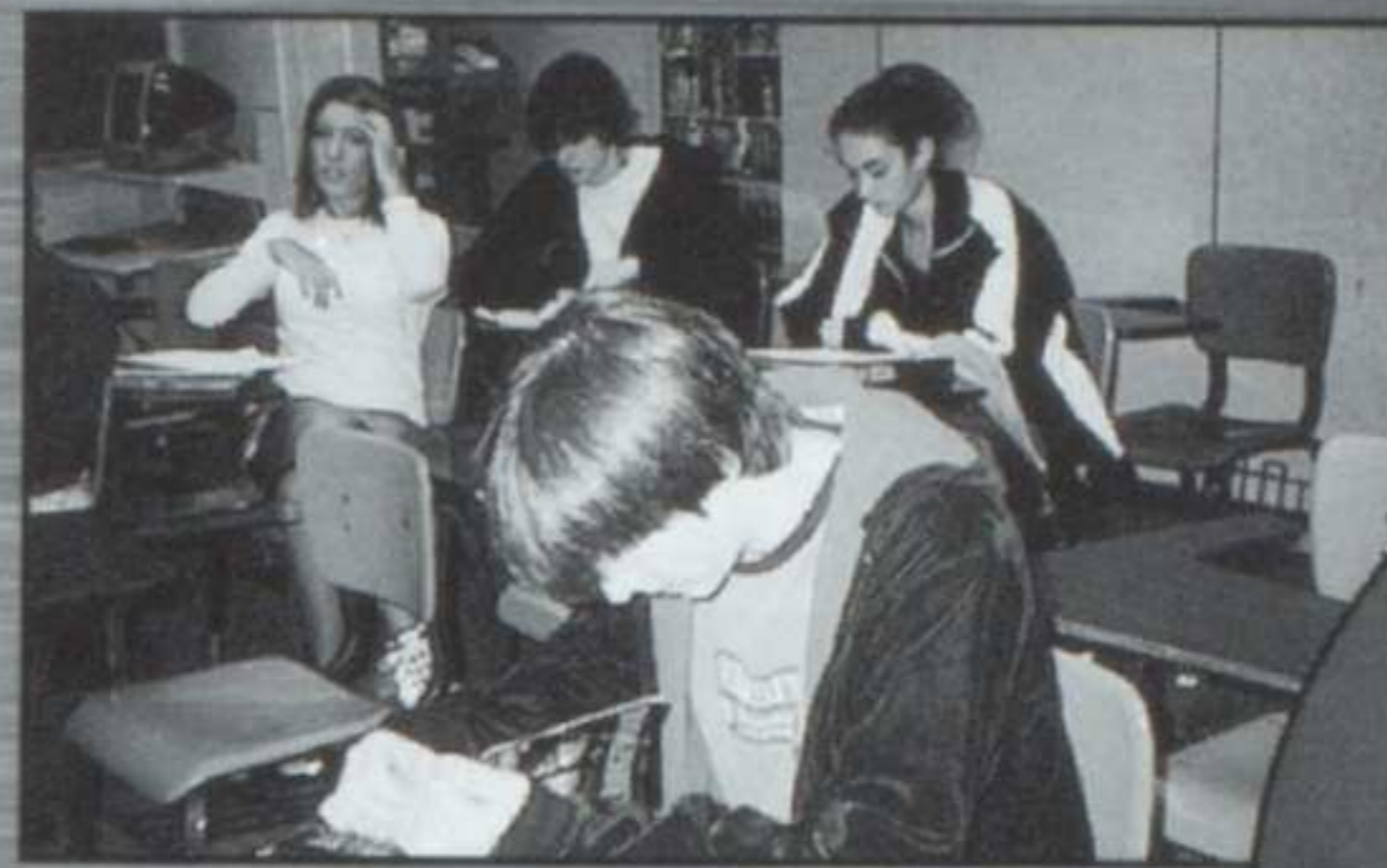

# German National Honor Society

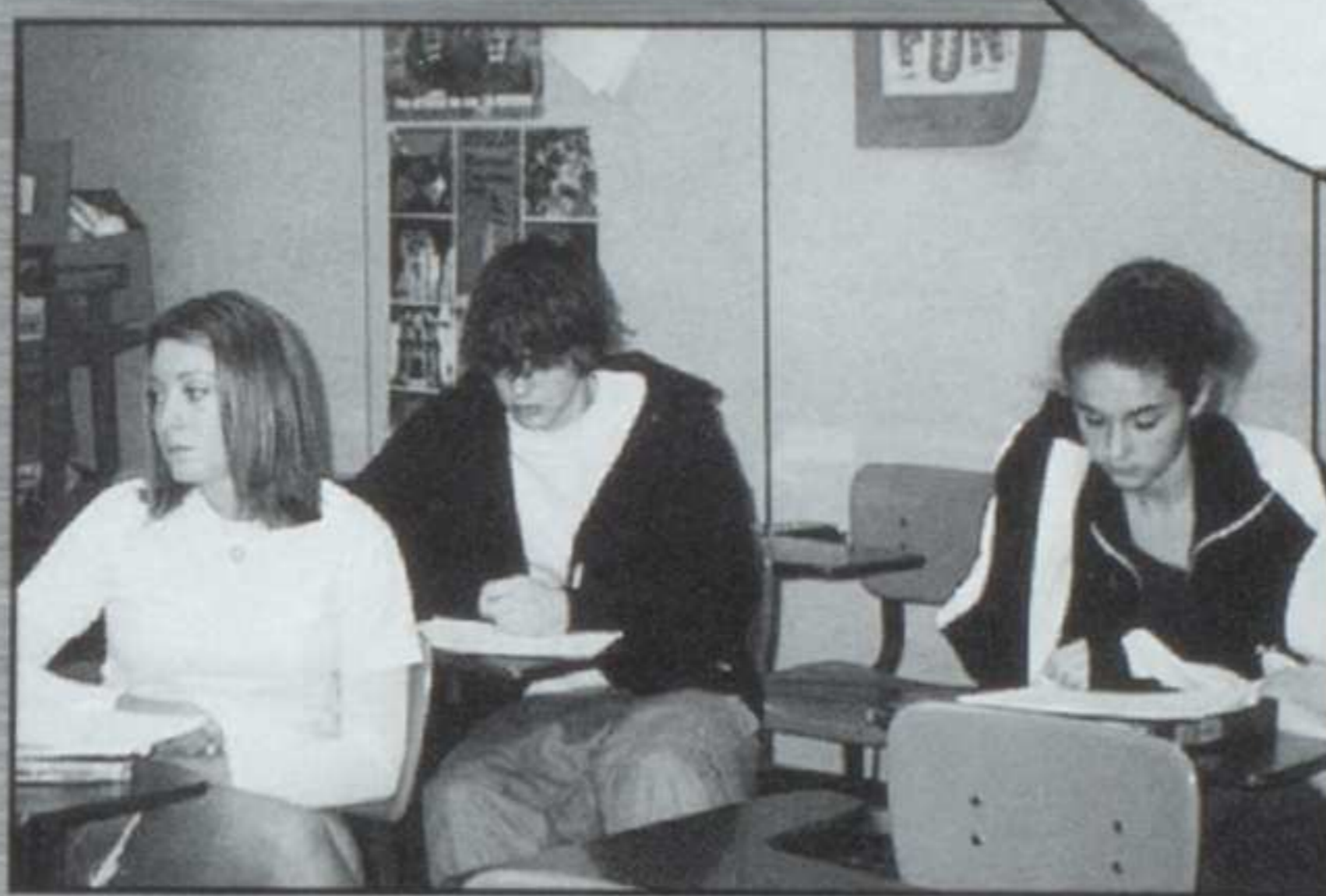

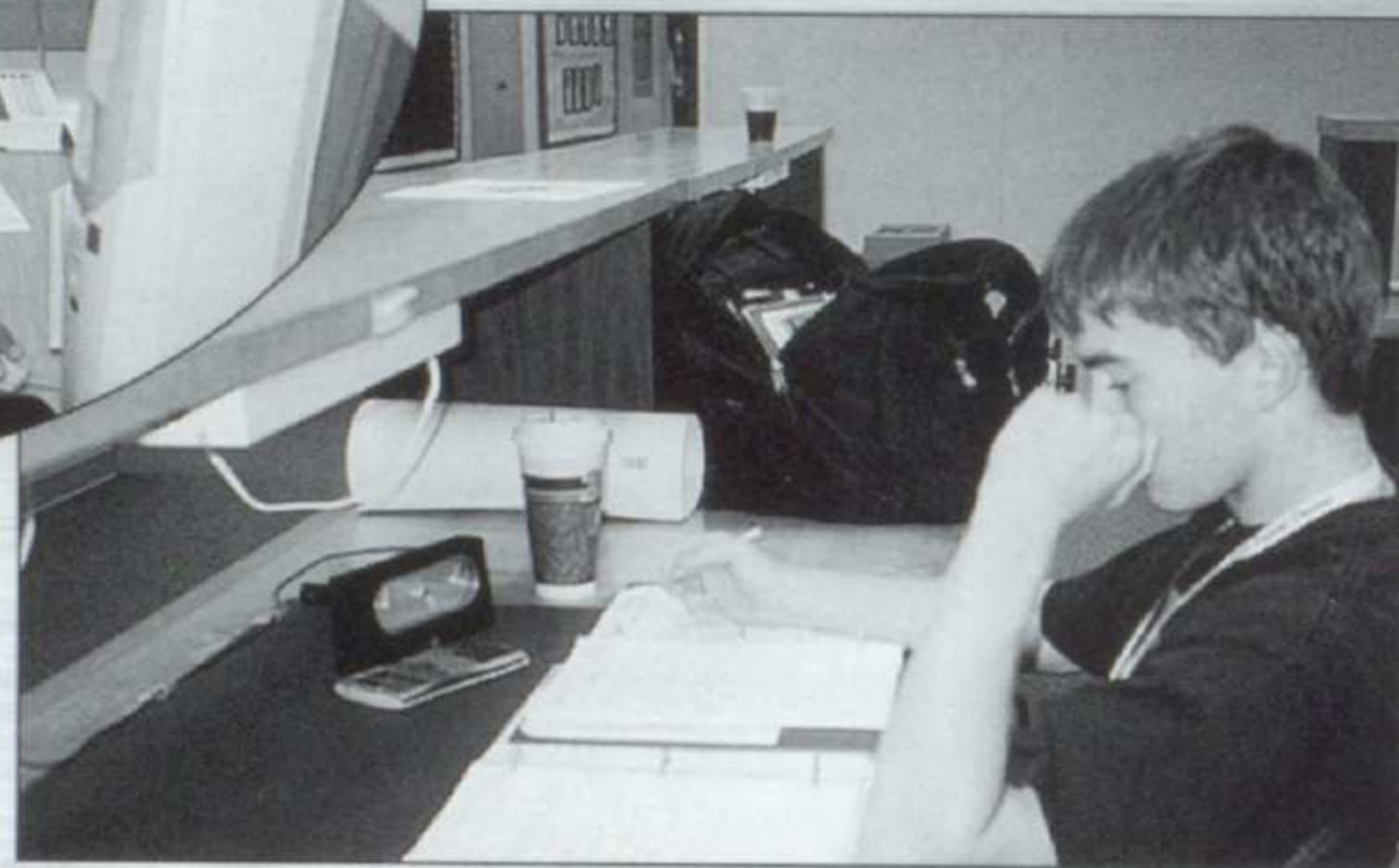
