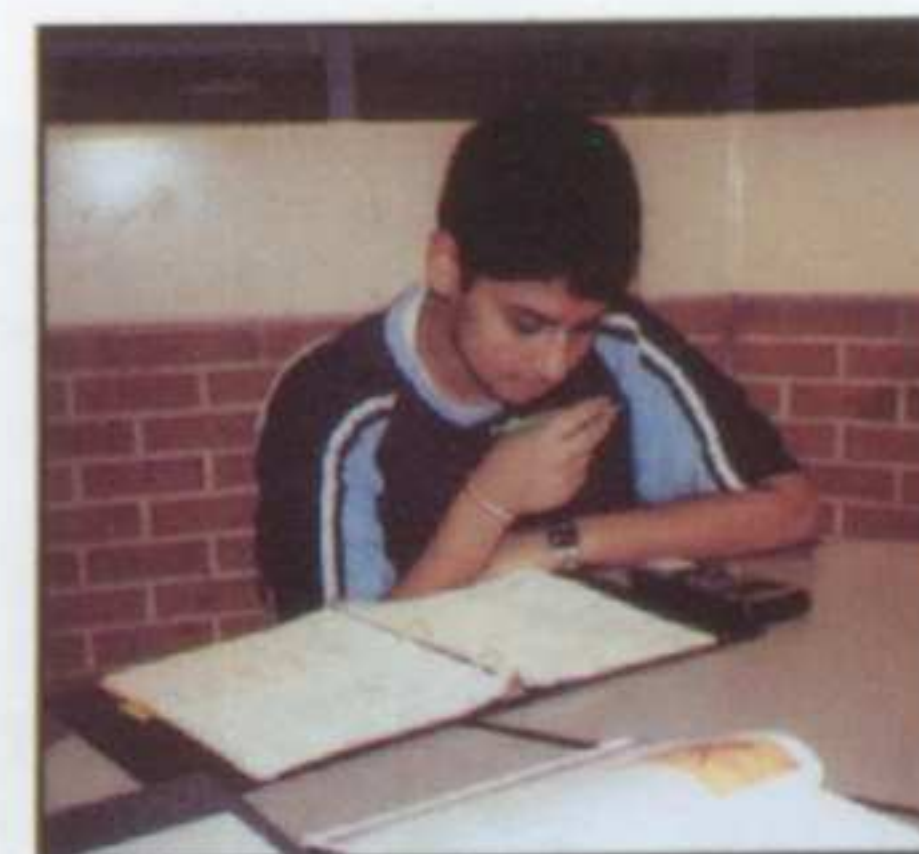

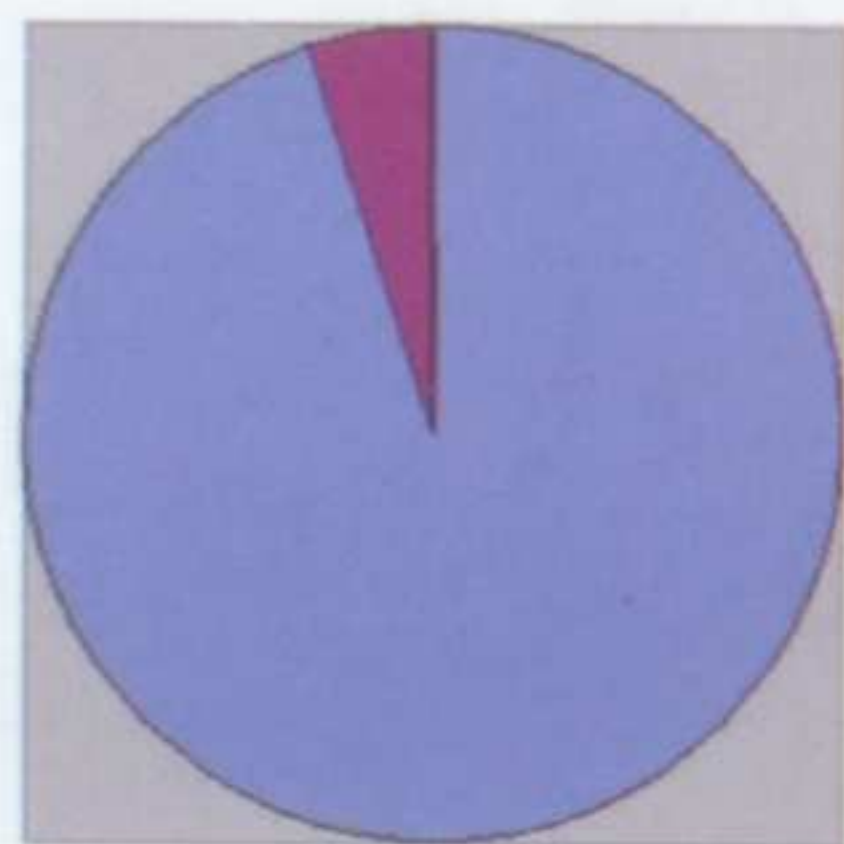
Which Side Were You On?

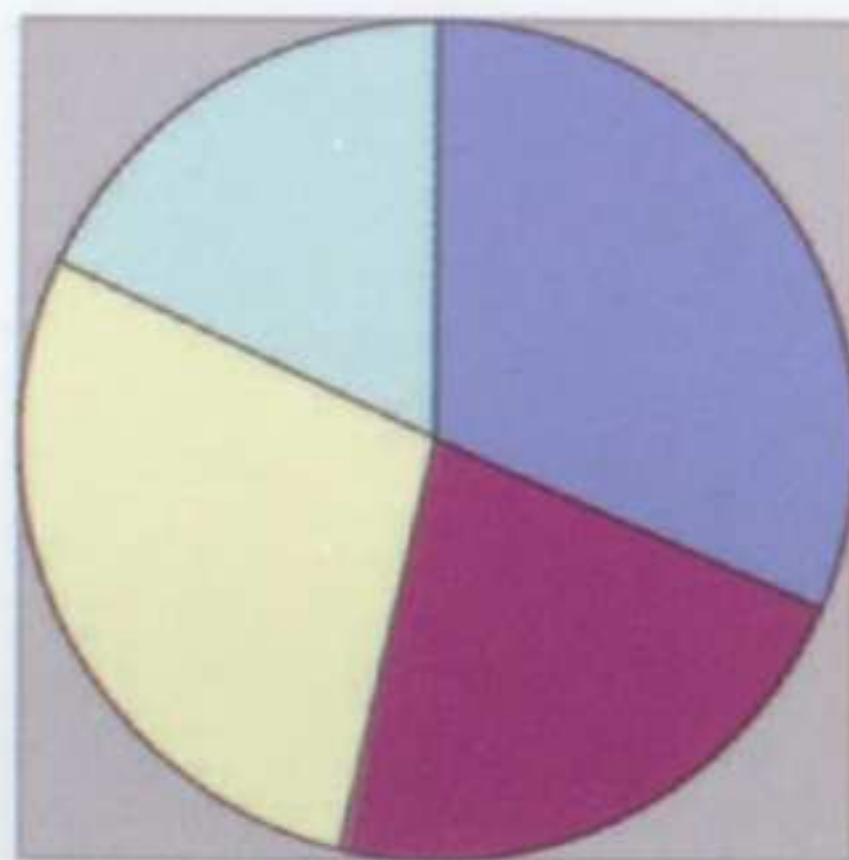

Looking back on a year where the election reigned supreme (briefly), the question still remains...Which Side Were You On?

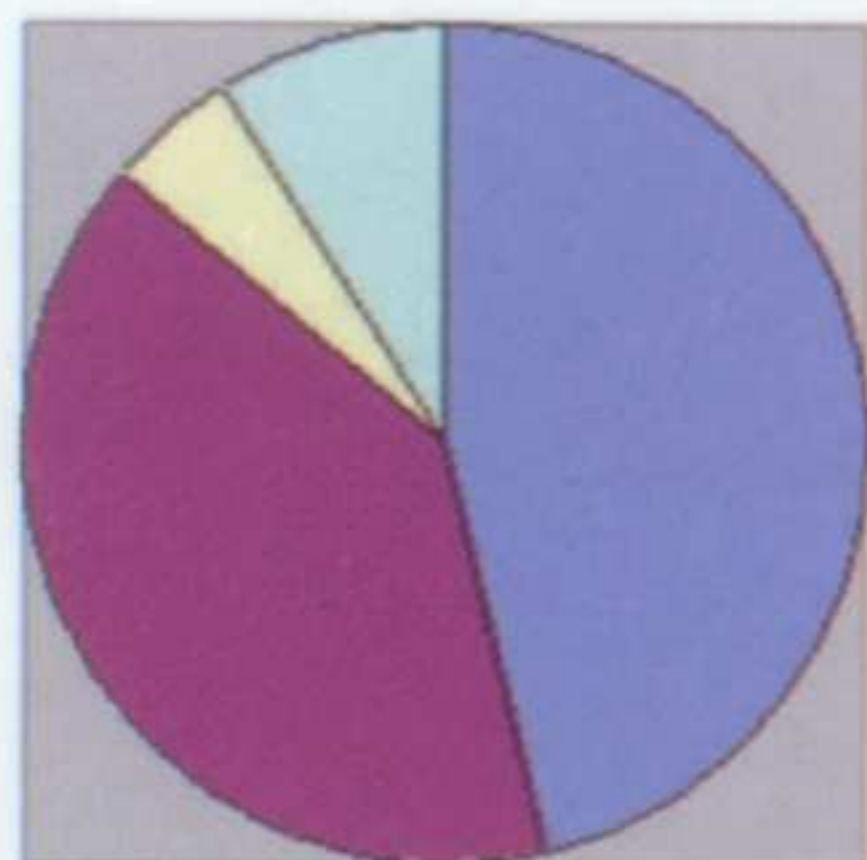
Your Results as Showcased in the Yearbook Election Poll



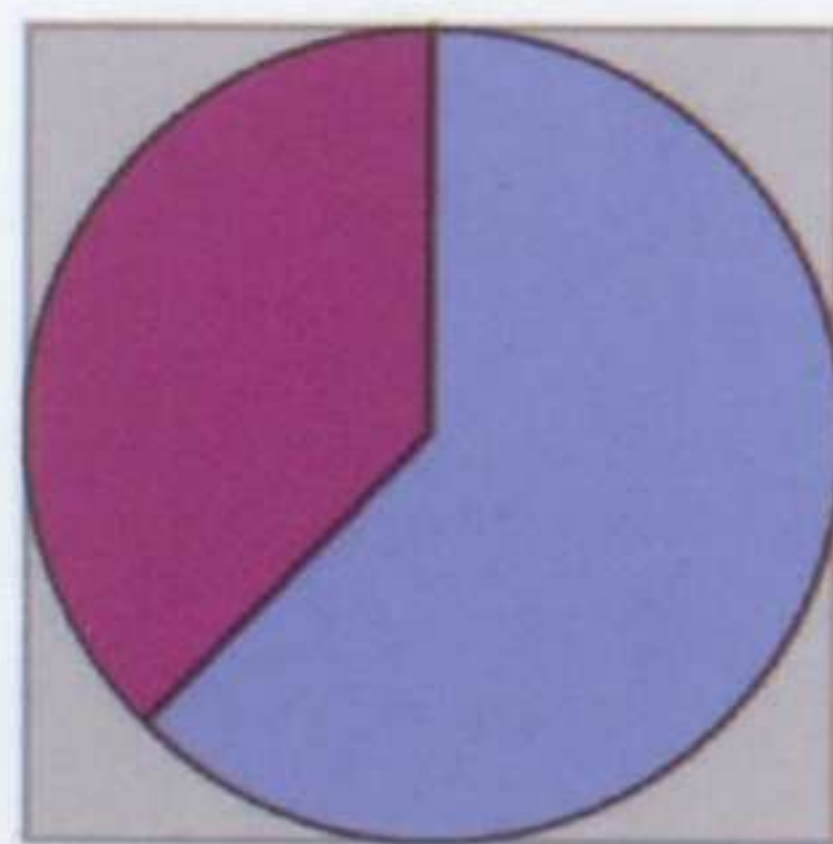
If you could vote, would you?



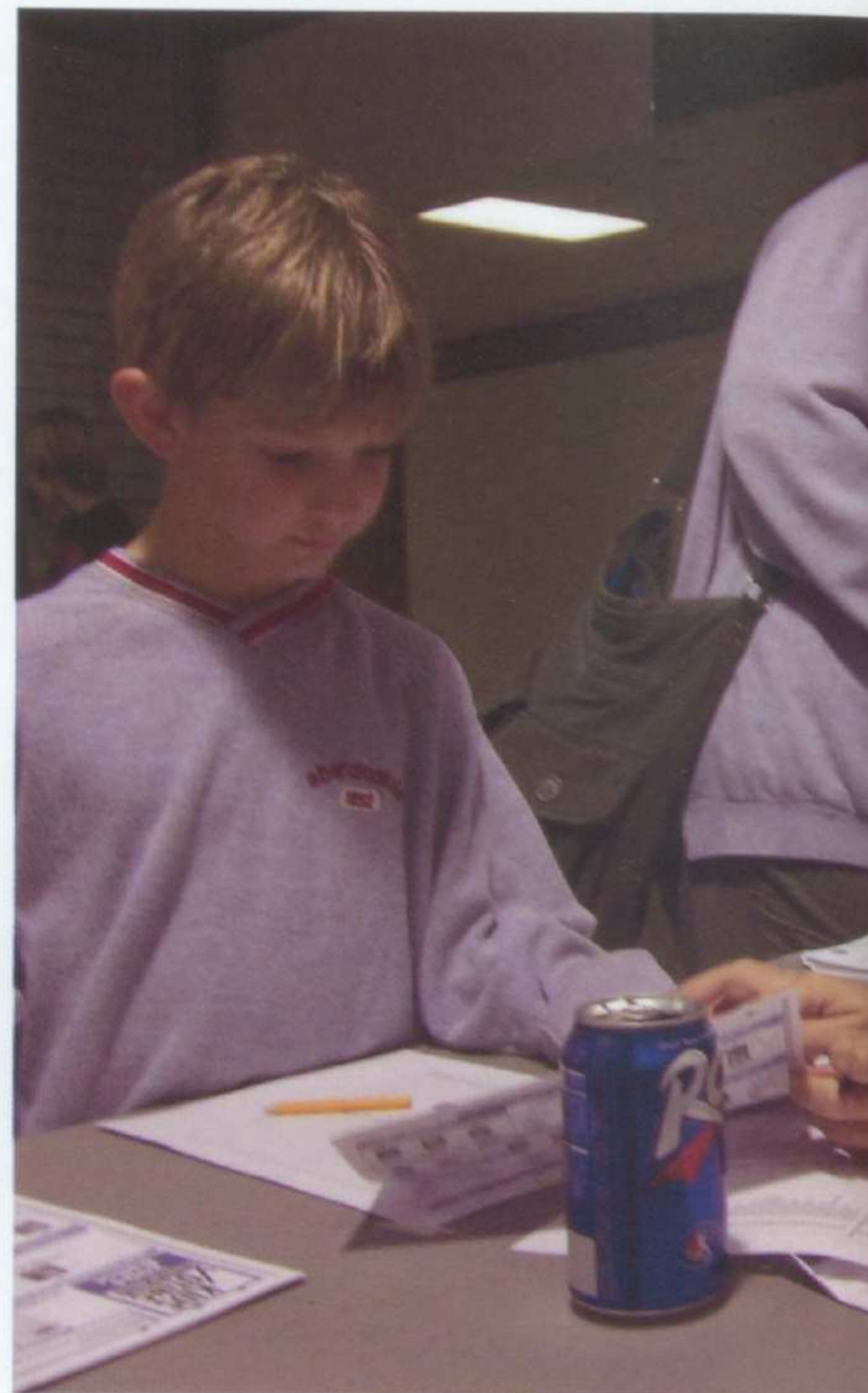
What Party would you register yourself under?



If you were to vote in this upcoming election, whom would you vote for?

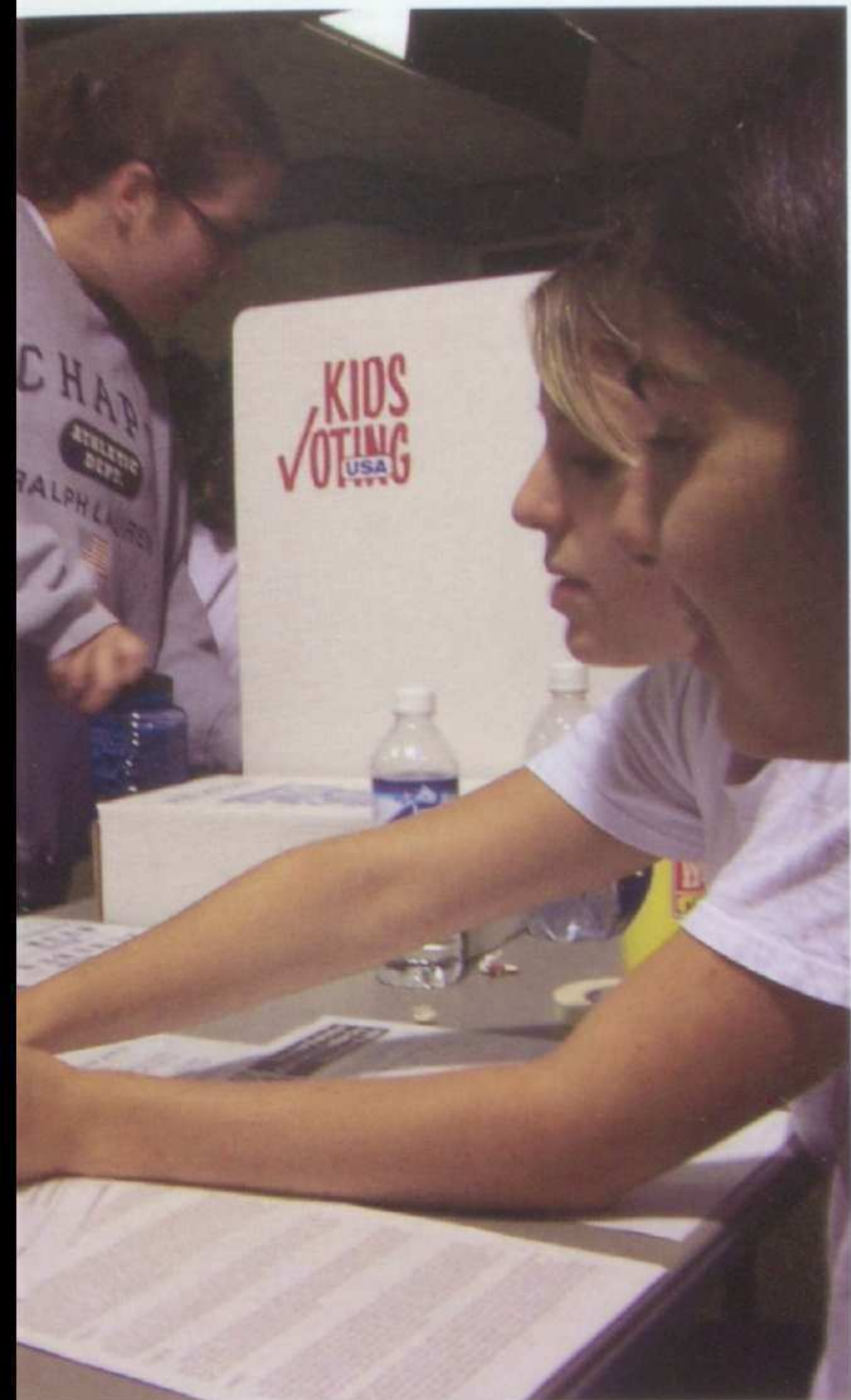

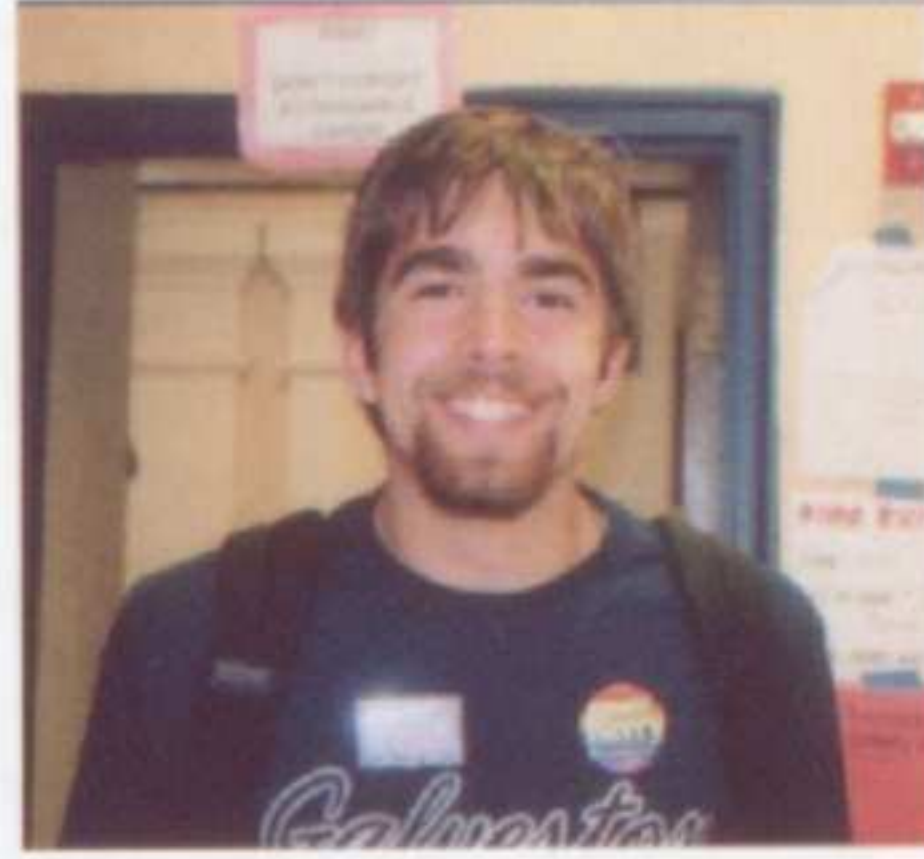

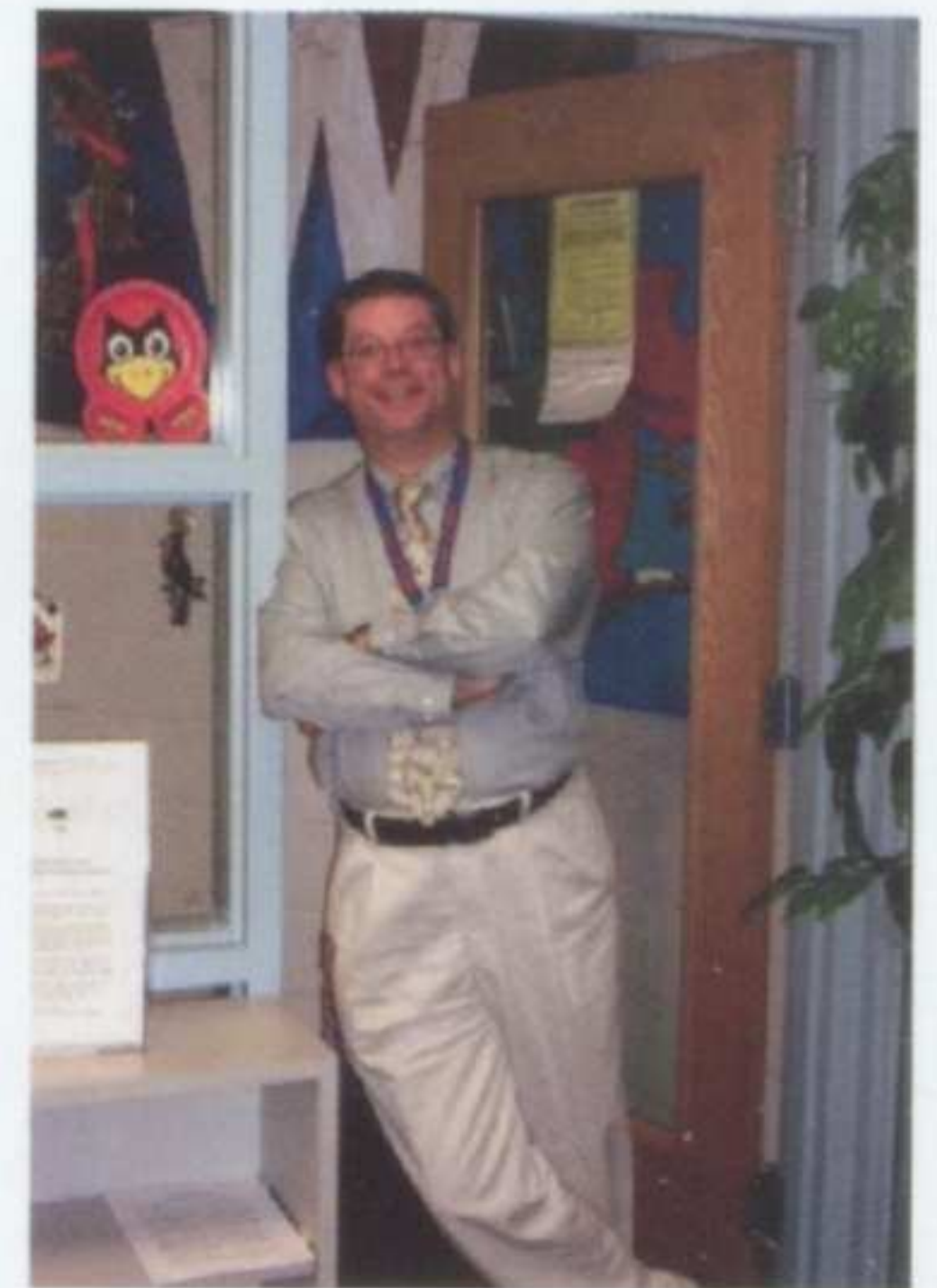

Making sure all students have paid their fees, Mrs. Shaw takes time for a quick smile.



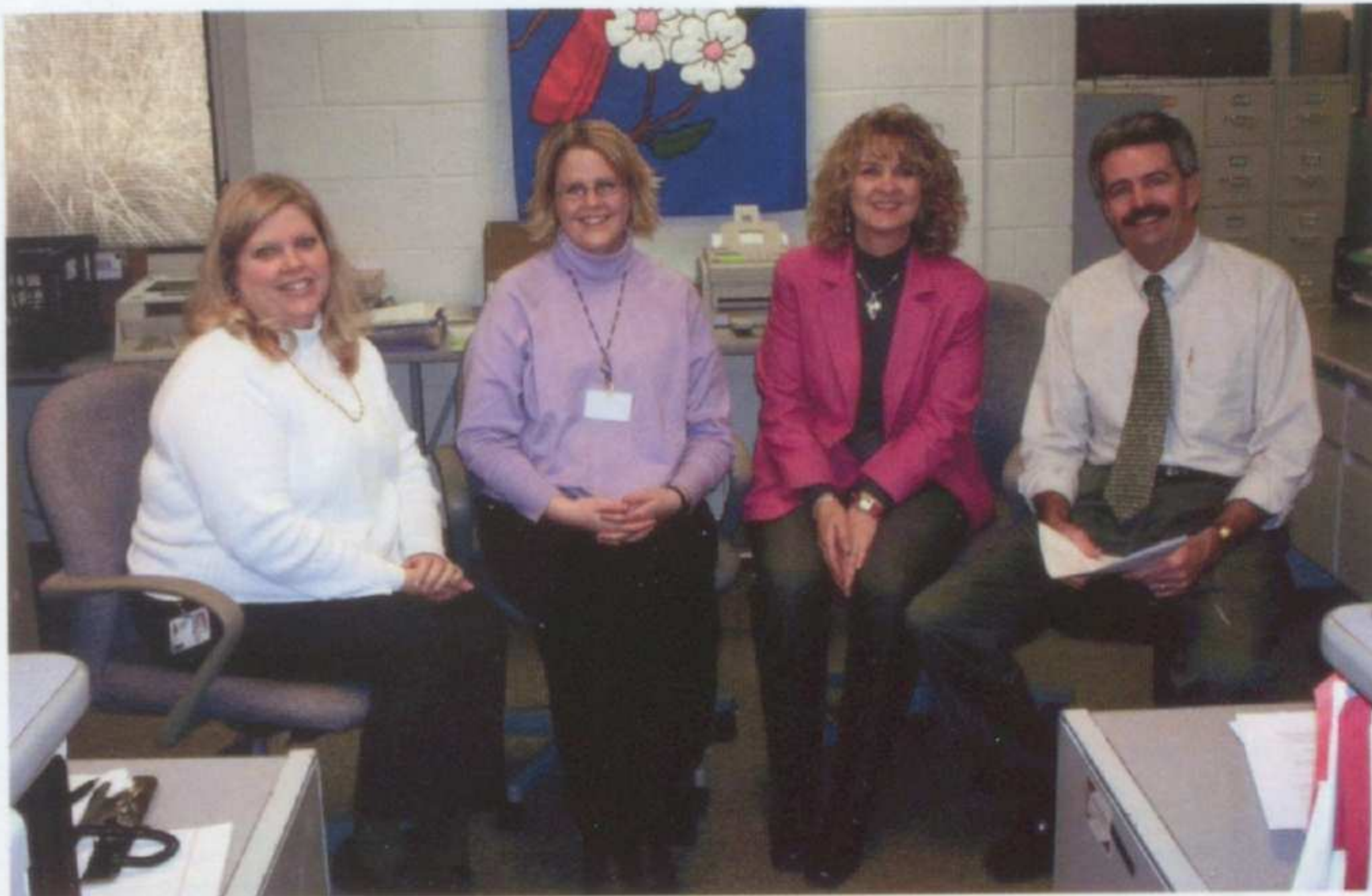

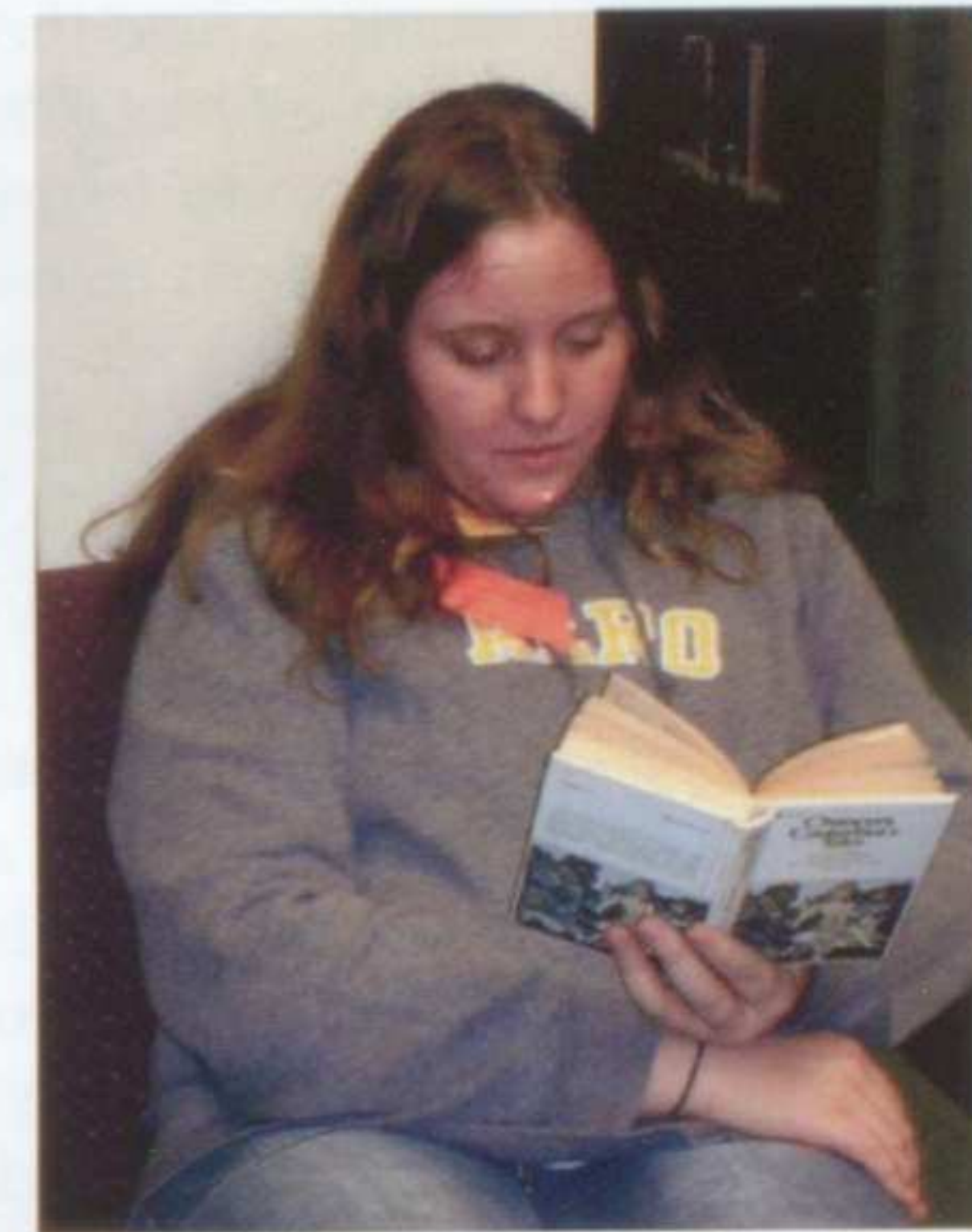

Annex Addition "Extreme Makeover"

The Annex has been a part of Thomas Worthington High School for many years and is a vital asset for the Cardinal Theater, which uses the building to store old props and lumber. The Annex was constructed in 1915 and was originally used as Worthington's first high school. By 1976 it had outlived its purpose as a high school and was transformed into an art facility. However, over the years the Annex has slowly become a rundown, dirty old building, with numerous problems including a broken down heating/cooling system, broken windows, no electricity, peeling paint, crumbling walls, and frequent break-ins.

The Administration decided that it would be cheaper to add on a new theatre/arts center to the campus rather than renovate the Annex. So in 1992, the new arts center was opened. It included three art rooms, a new theatre with a dressing room and costume room, and a new courtyard. One option offered was for the Worthington Community Arts Center to buy it from the school and remodel it to be a new art school. It would cost over \$15 million just to bring it up to code, then at least another million to remodel. Unfortunately the arts center doesn't have enough money to buy, bring up to code, or remodel the building and it also brings up the question of where the theatre would store all its supplies.

The school administrators discussed possibly building another storage facility either behind Evening Street Elementary or behind Perry Middle School, where there is a storage facility already in place. But, that brings out another problem of how the theatre could get to and from Perry to pick up props and lumber. Students cannot drive to and from Perry because of the many legal issues and most students don't have large enough vehicles. A suggestion was made to use an old school bus to transport items but then there was the problem of money for gas and finding someone who could drive it whenever it is needed.

Additionally, there is no place behind Evening Street to build another facility and our school doesn't have enough money to build it. So for now the Annex will remain a very valuable and important part of the Cardinal Theatre Programs, hopefully for many years to come.

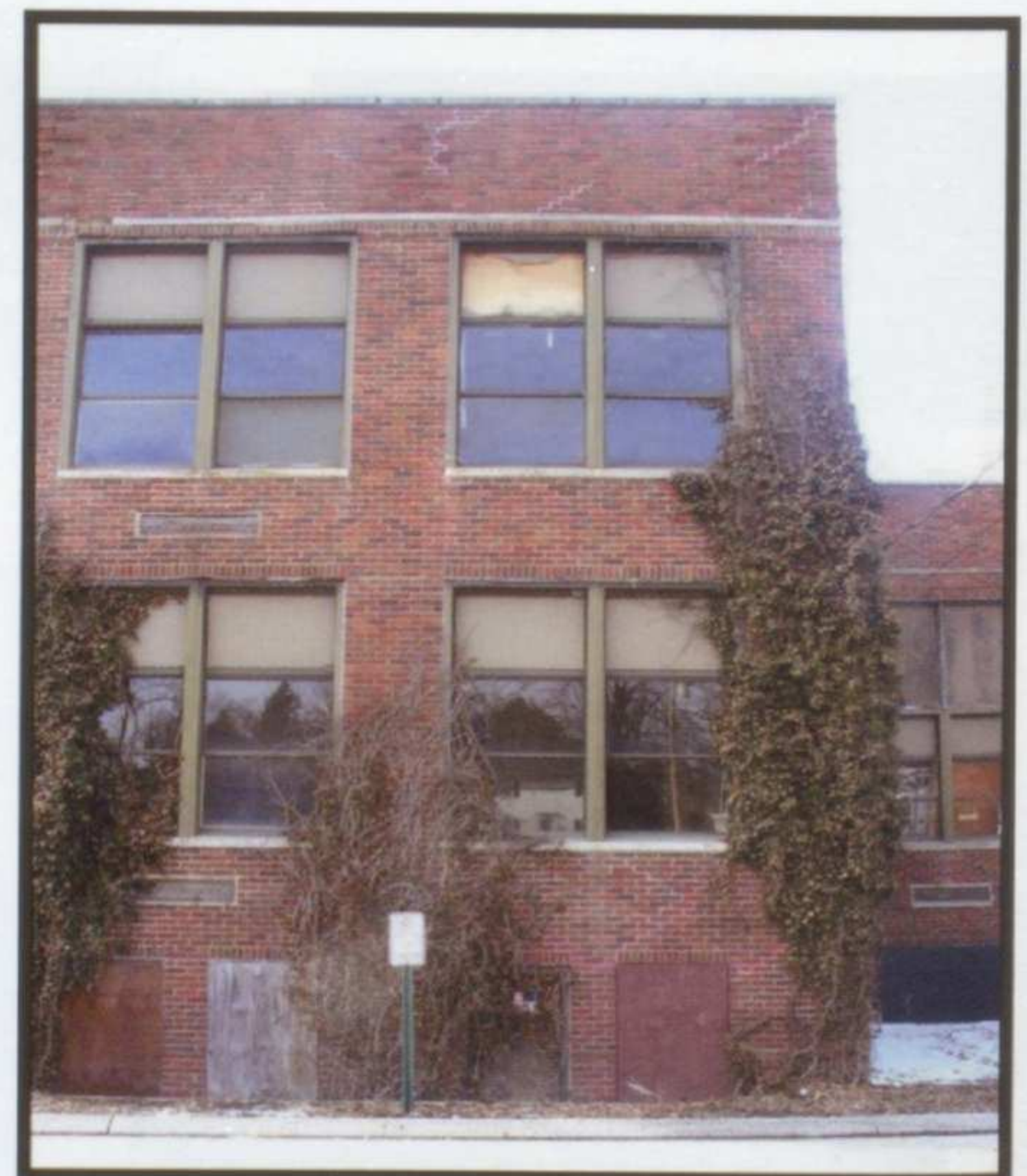
The walls of the Annex are covered in green mold from being damp throughout the years.



The Annex was Erected in 1915 and has been a vital part of the school since that time.

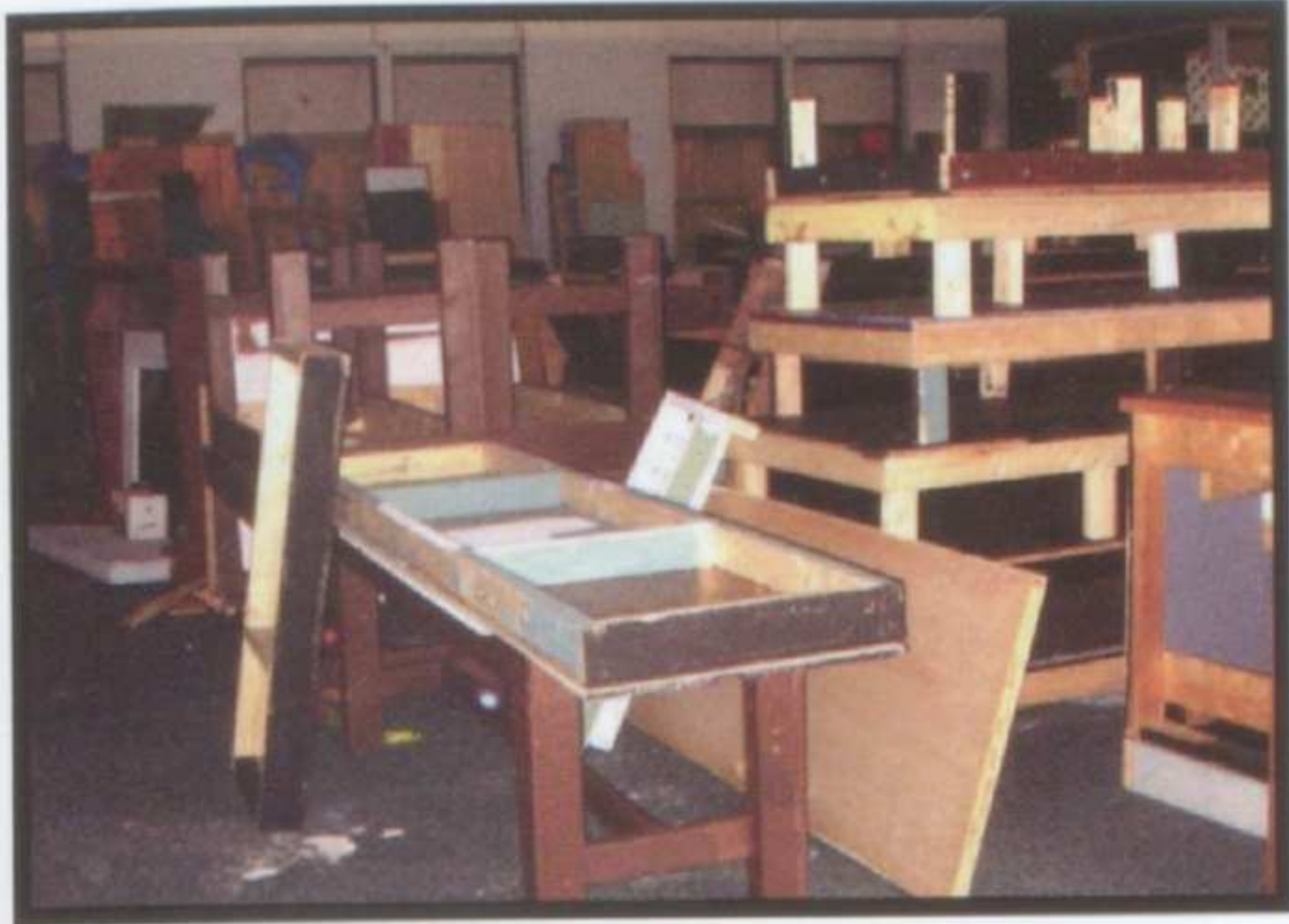

Wonderful Tonight Valentine's Dance

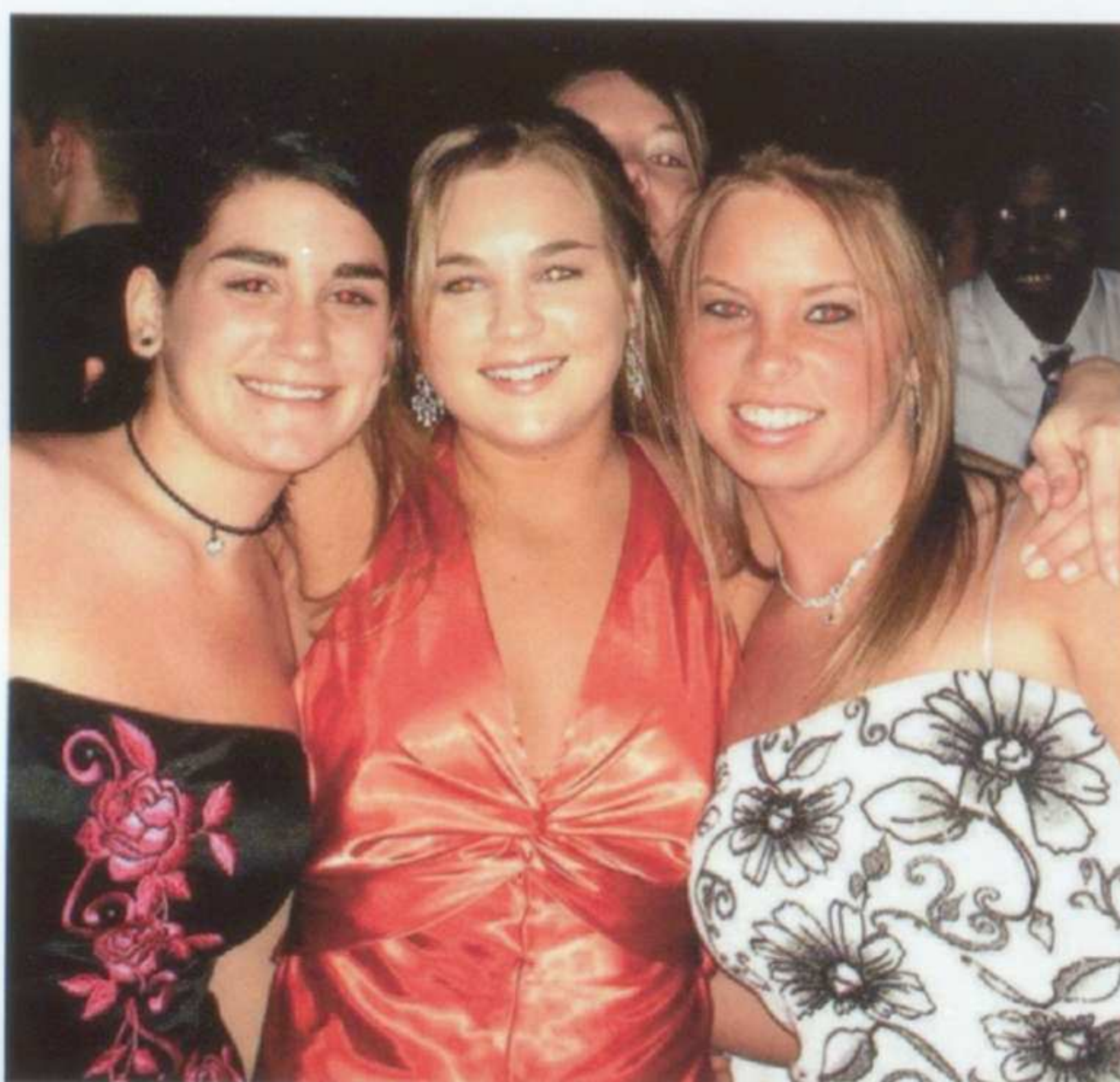

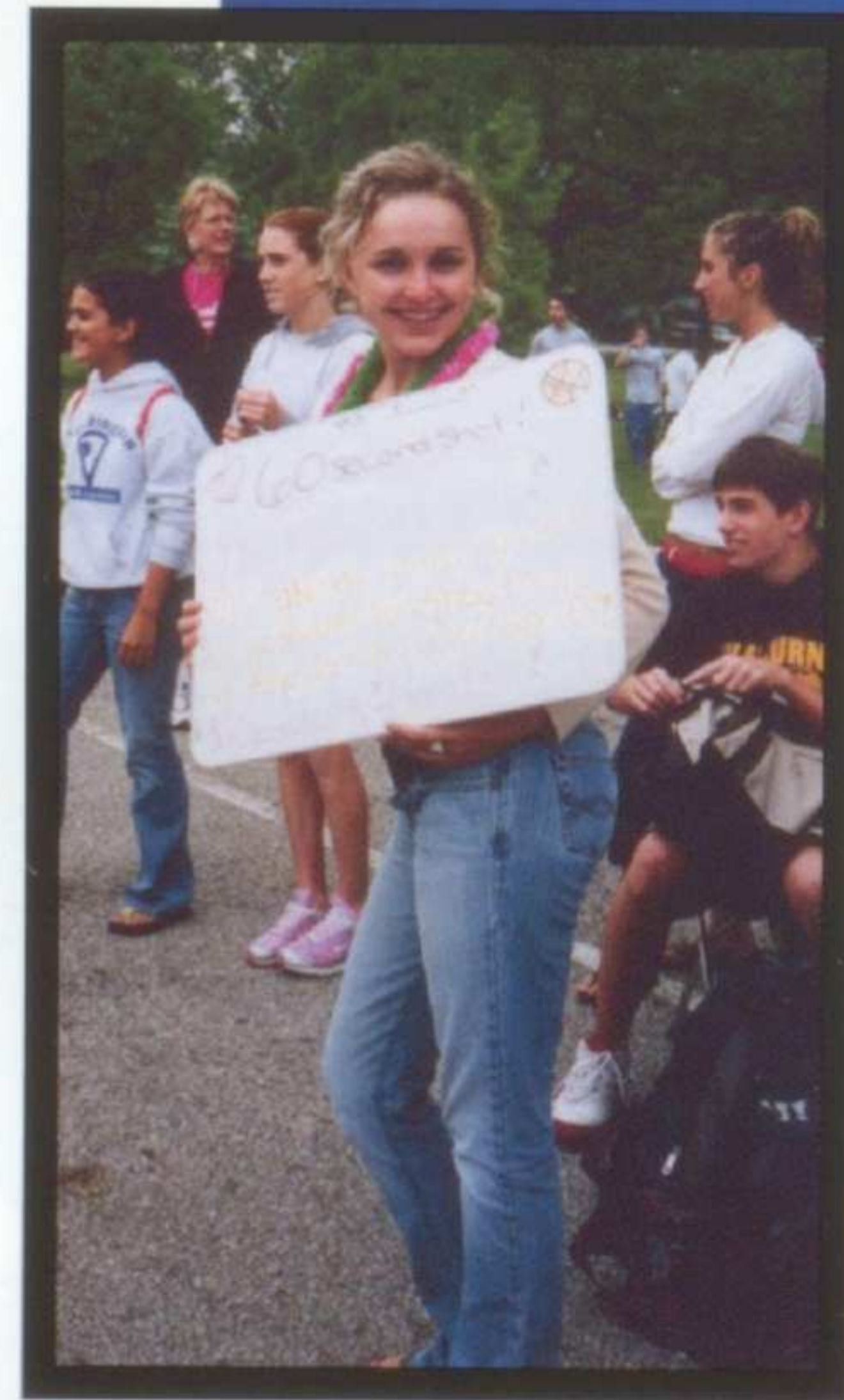
Cardinal Day 2005

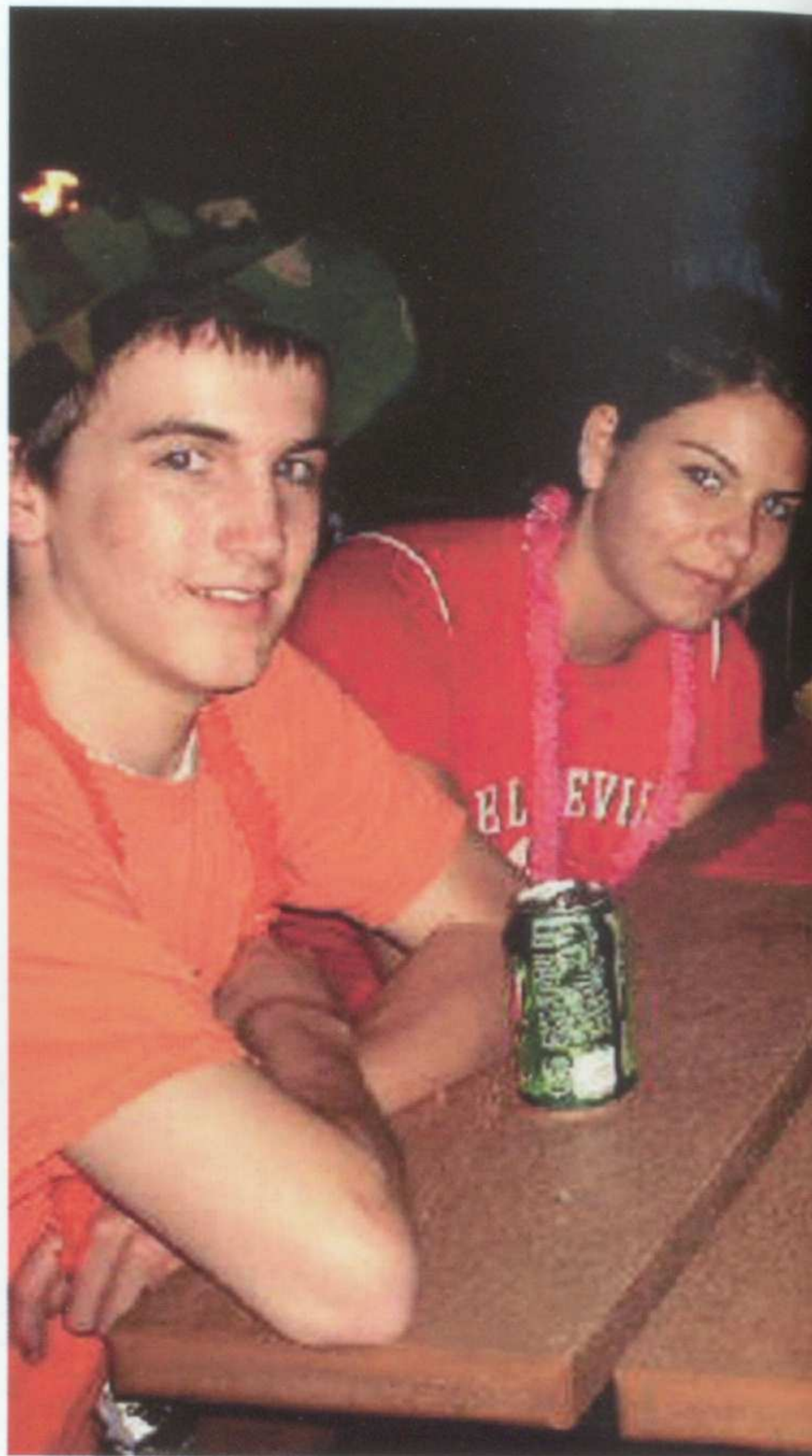


After Graduation

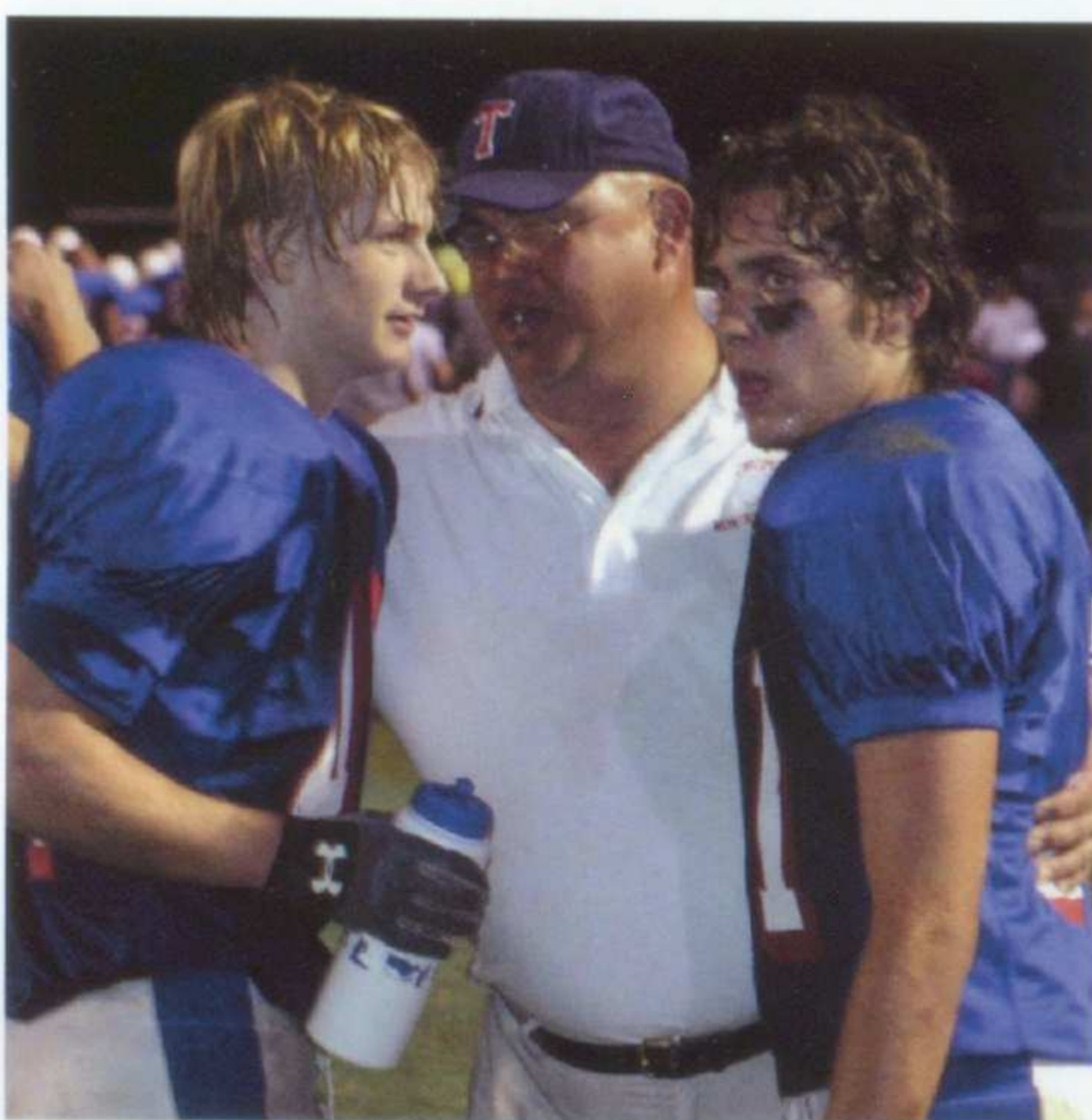

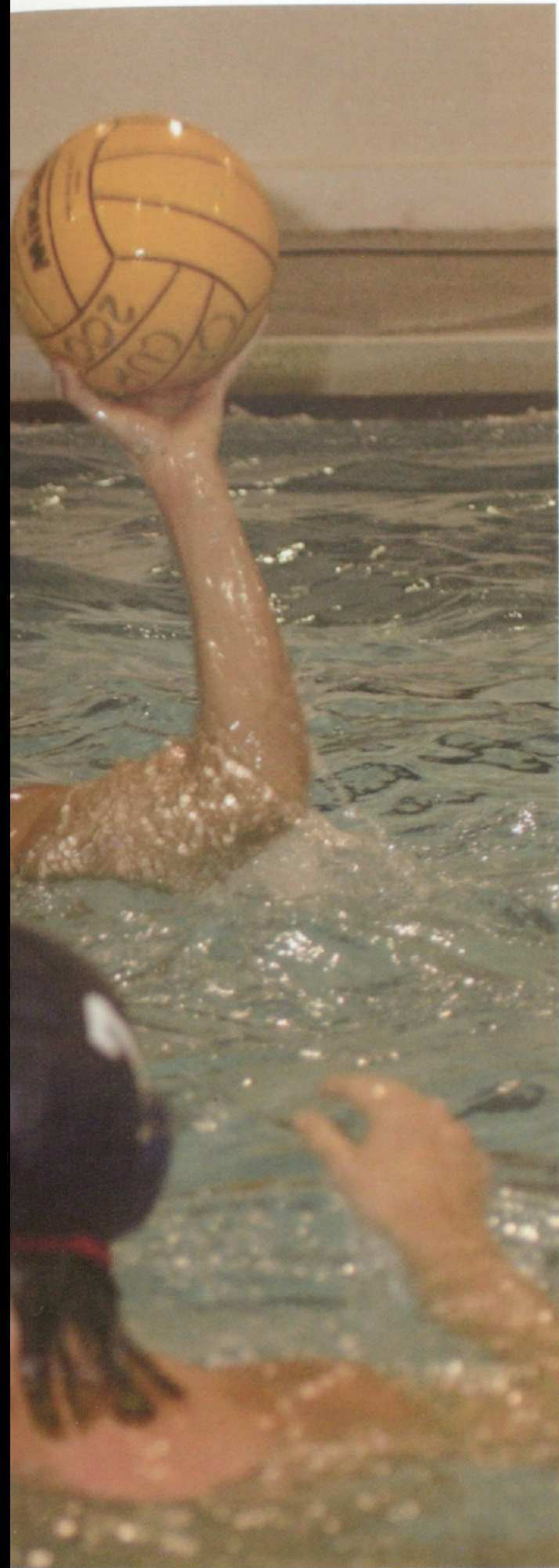

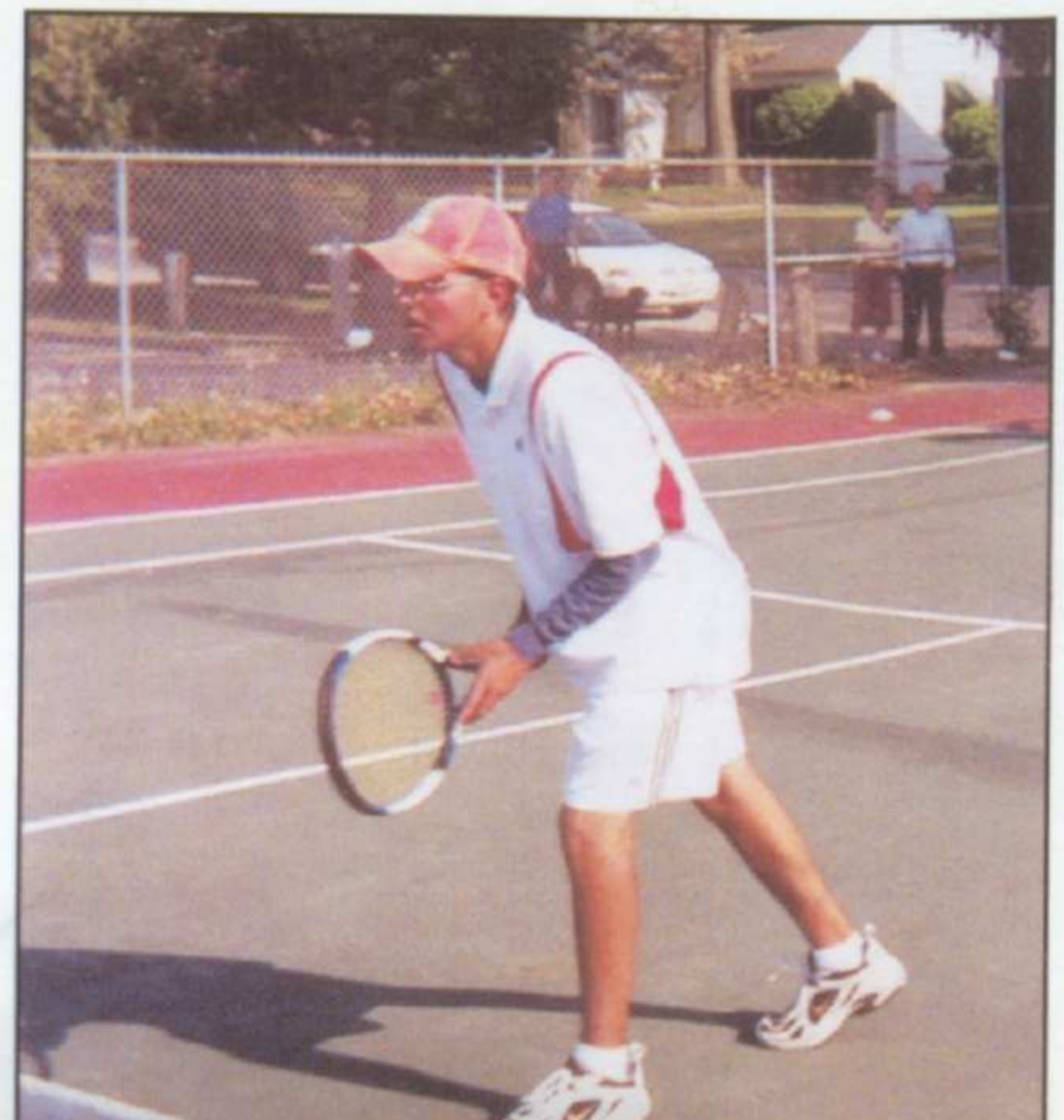

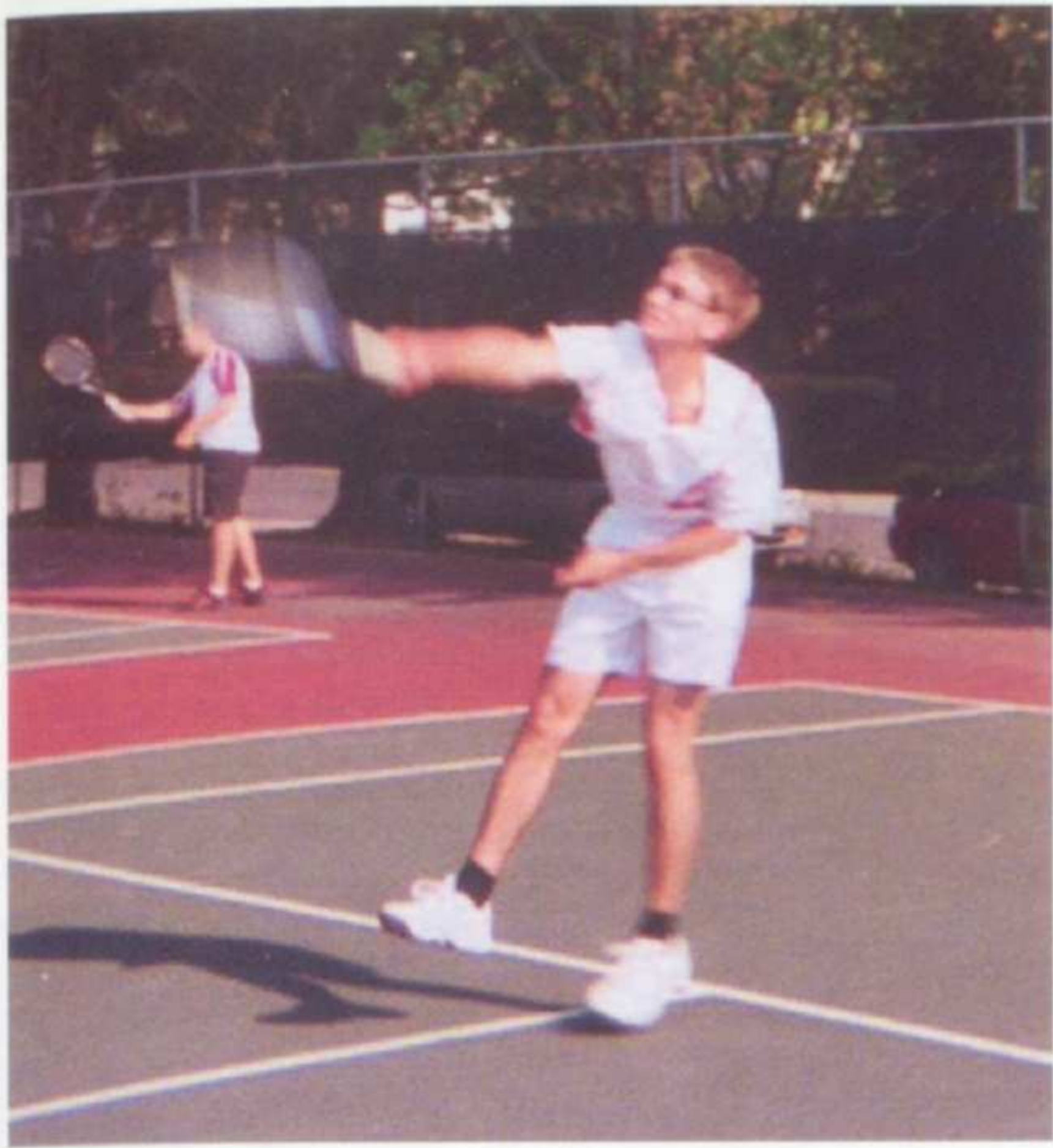

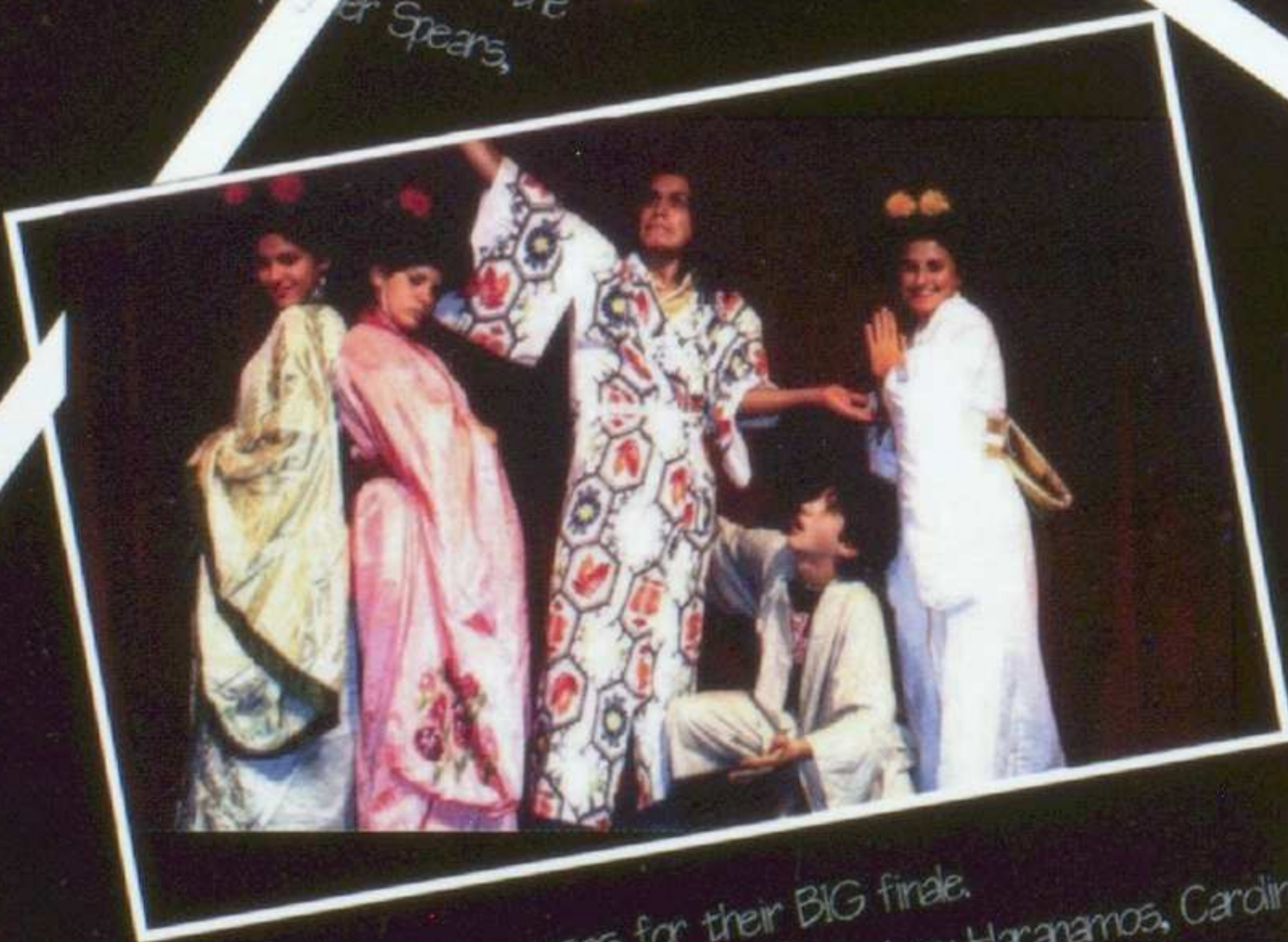

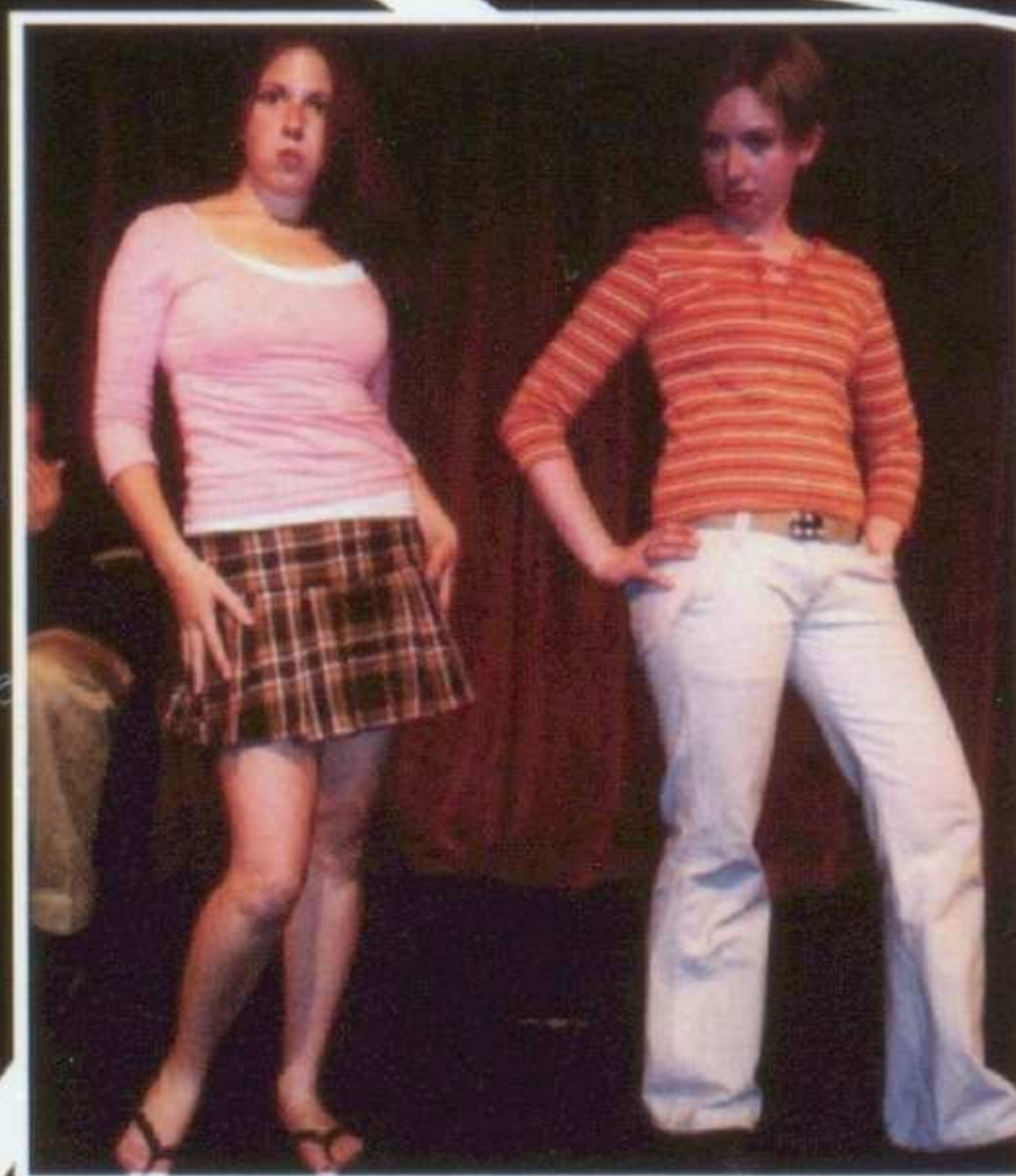

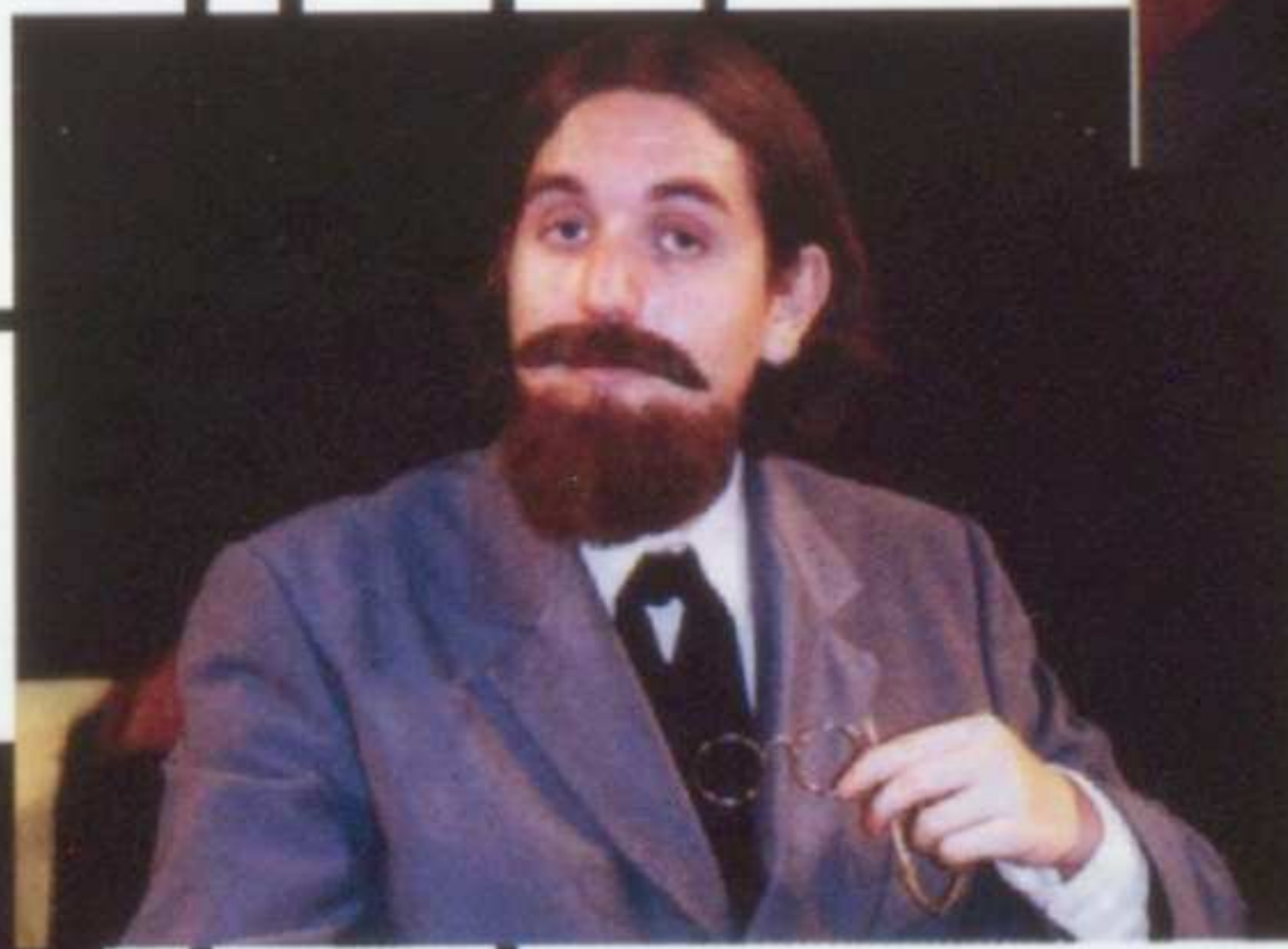

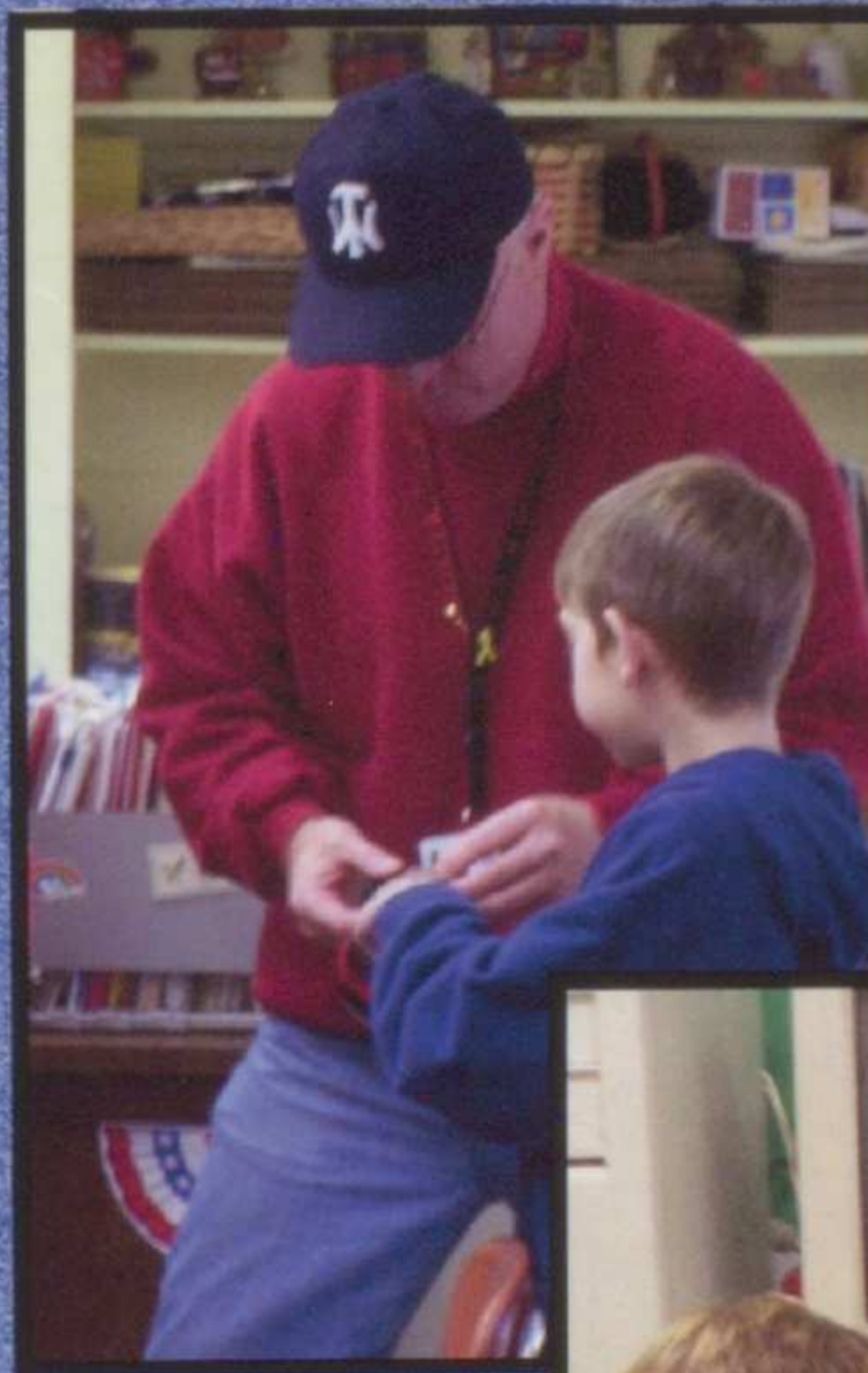
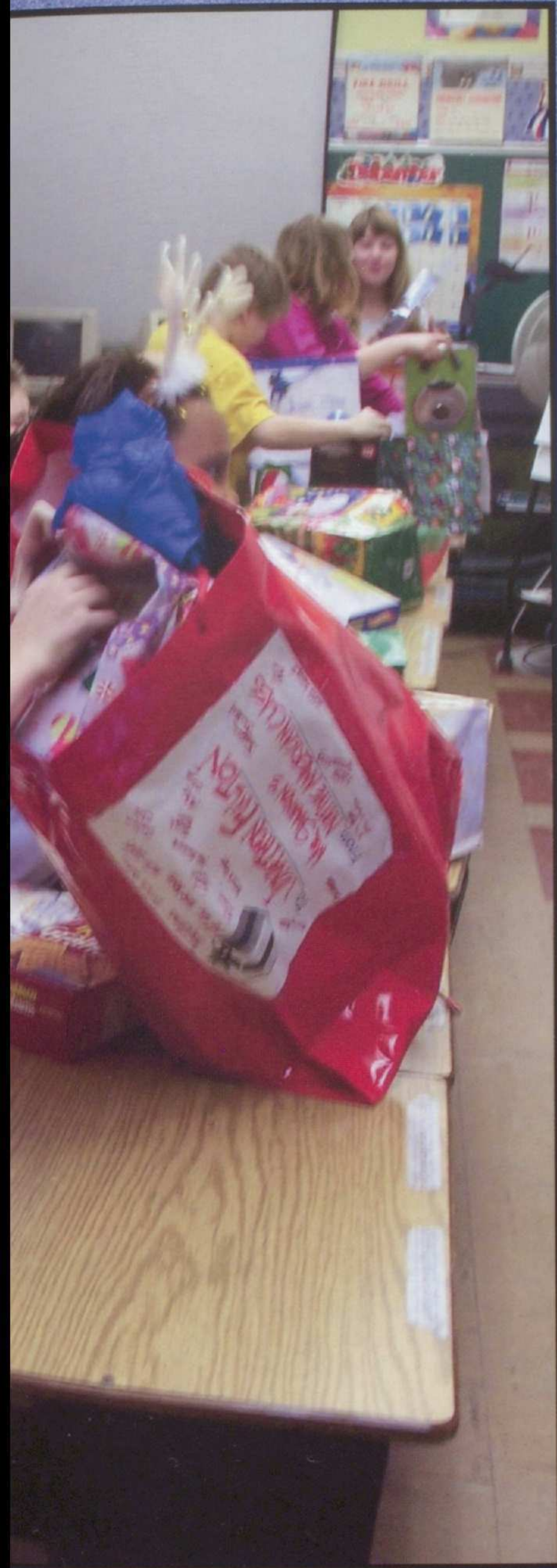
Community Service: Jackson Elementary "Smallville"

Jackson Elementary is a well known grade school here at TWHS because of the Community Service Club. Students are aware every year of donating money to their second period classes in December, but they may not know exactly where the money is going. Before funds are collected, each second period class receives a "Wish List" from one or two students of Jackson Elementary. It is then the job of the TWHS classes to raise enough money and have representatives use it to purchase gifts for the elementary students. The goal amount for each Jackson student's present usually tops off around twenty to twenty-five dollars, which will hopefully purchase a gift that the kids might not have gotten otherwise.

After all of the gifts were purchased and bagged according to elementary grade level, the Community Service Club and a group of students traveled down to Jackson, Ohio to personally deliver the presents and spend the day with the children. An hour-and-a-half bus ride later, the TWHS group arrived at the school and divided into smaller groups to deliver the presents to each grade level, which had only one class apiece. The younger students got to open their gifts right away in a frenzy of flying gift wrap and bows, but the TWHS students who delivered presents to the older grade levels got to sit in on the Jackson students' classes. In some cases they merely listened, in others they gave advice on artwork and greeting cards that the students were making for their families. The kids were anxious to get to their presents, and finally, while the younger grades were eating lunch, the older students returned to their homerooms and opened their gifts.

For the rest of the day, the TWHS students spent time eating lunch with the Jackson kids, listened to the younger students read to them, and then joined them for recess where a game of football broke out. At the end of the afternoon these new friends said their goodbyes and the TWHS students returned to school with a job well done.

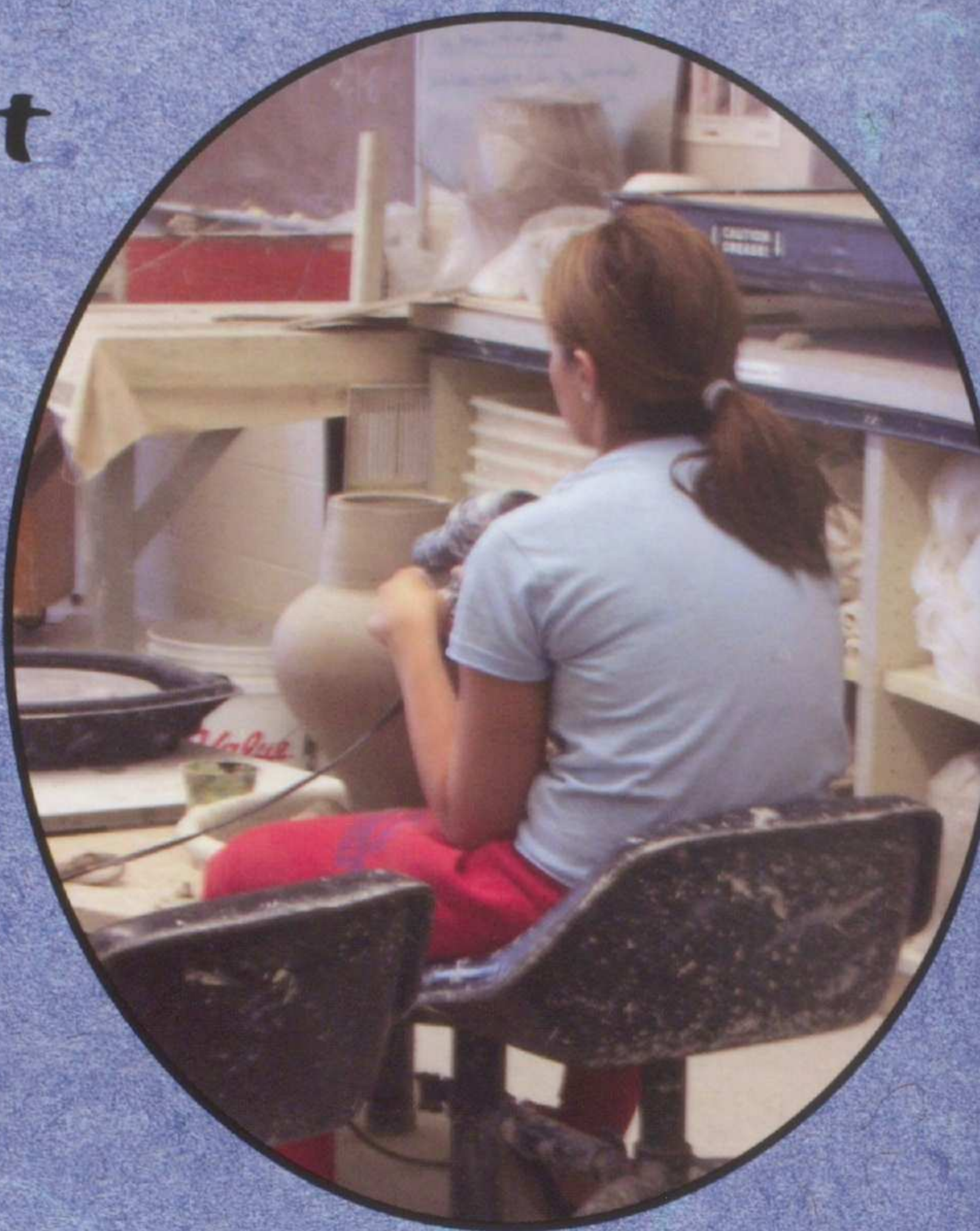

Empty Bowl Project "Super Bowl"

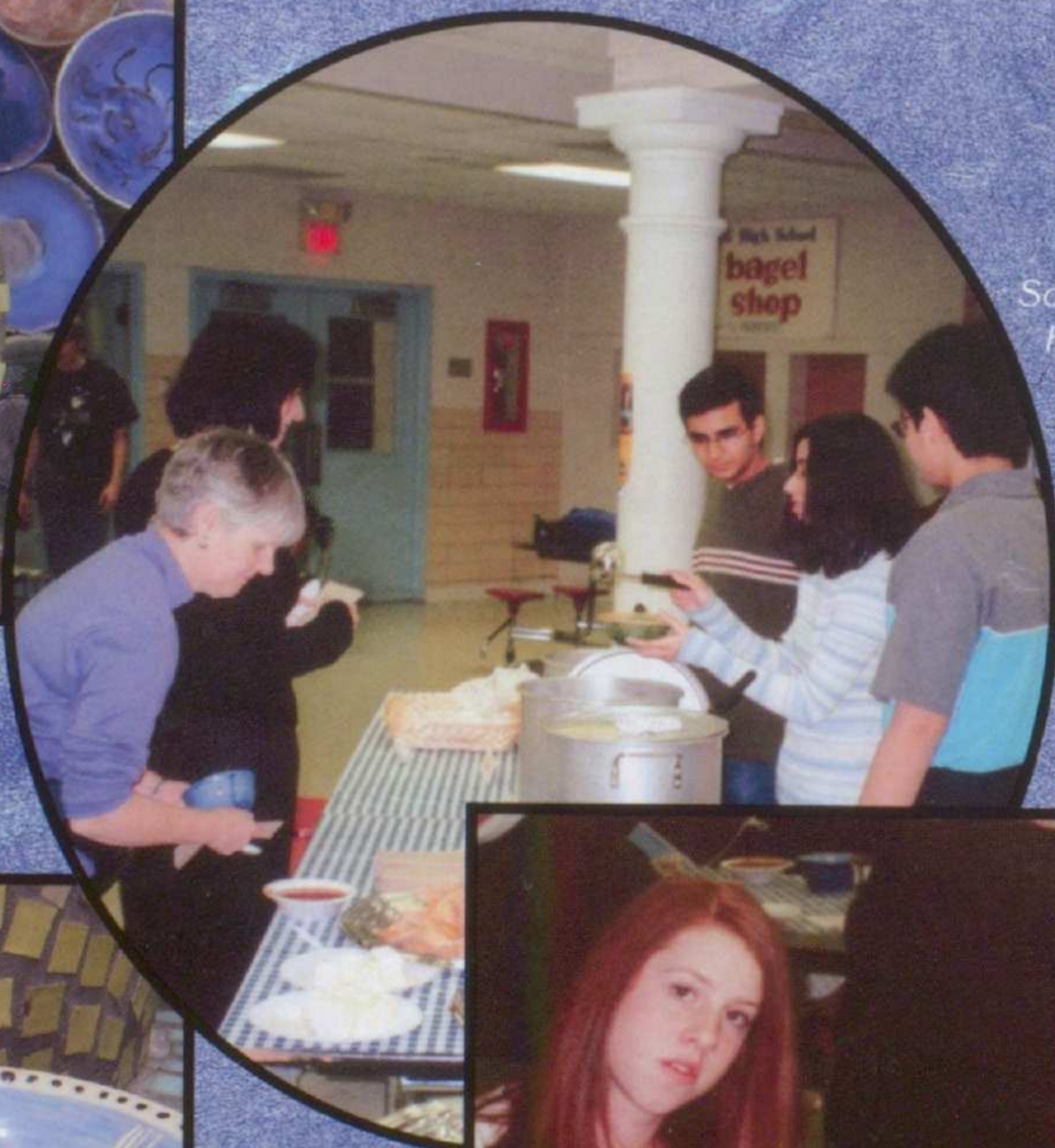

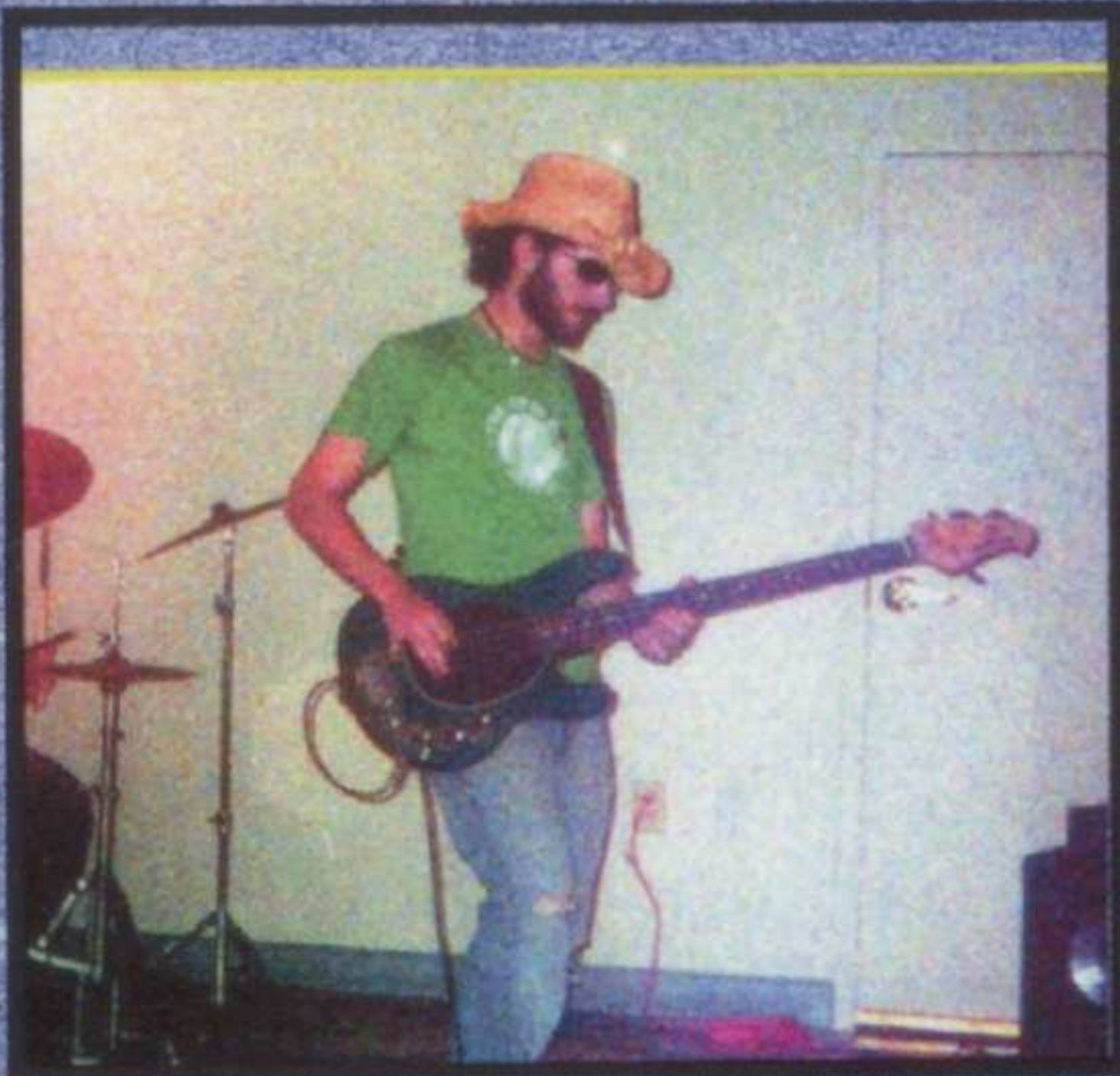
Garage Bands

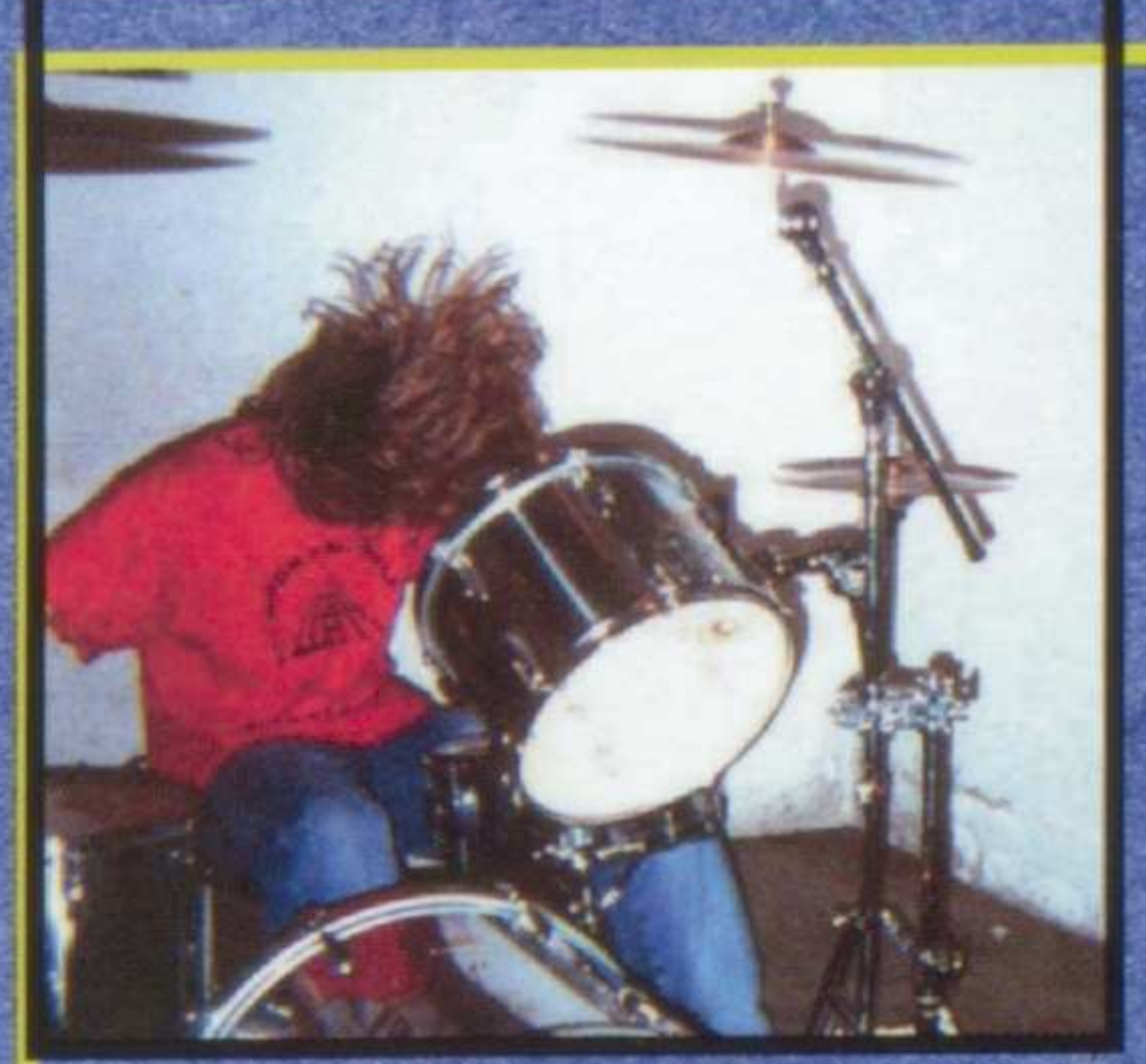

Each year artists at TWHS take part in the Scholastics Art and Writing Competition. Established in 1923, Scholastics invites students from grades 7-12 to send in artwork via their high school. There are Regional Sponsors throughout Ohio which the high schools are connected to. This year the Regional Exhibition took place at the Canzani Hall on the Columbus College of Art and Design's campus in downtown Columbus. 250,000 students participate annually and nearly \$20 million in awards and scholarships are handed out to winners.

Various awards exist, including Gold, Silver, and Bronze Key Awards for individual pieces, Honorable Mentions, and Portfolio winners. Seniors have the chance to send in a body of work, along with an essay, for a chance to get their portfolio into the show. 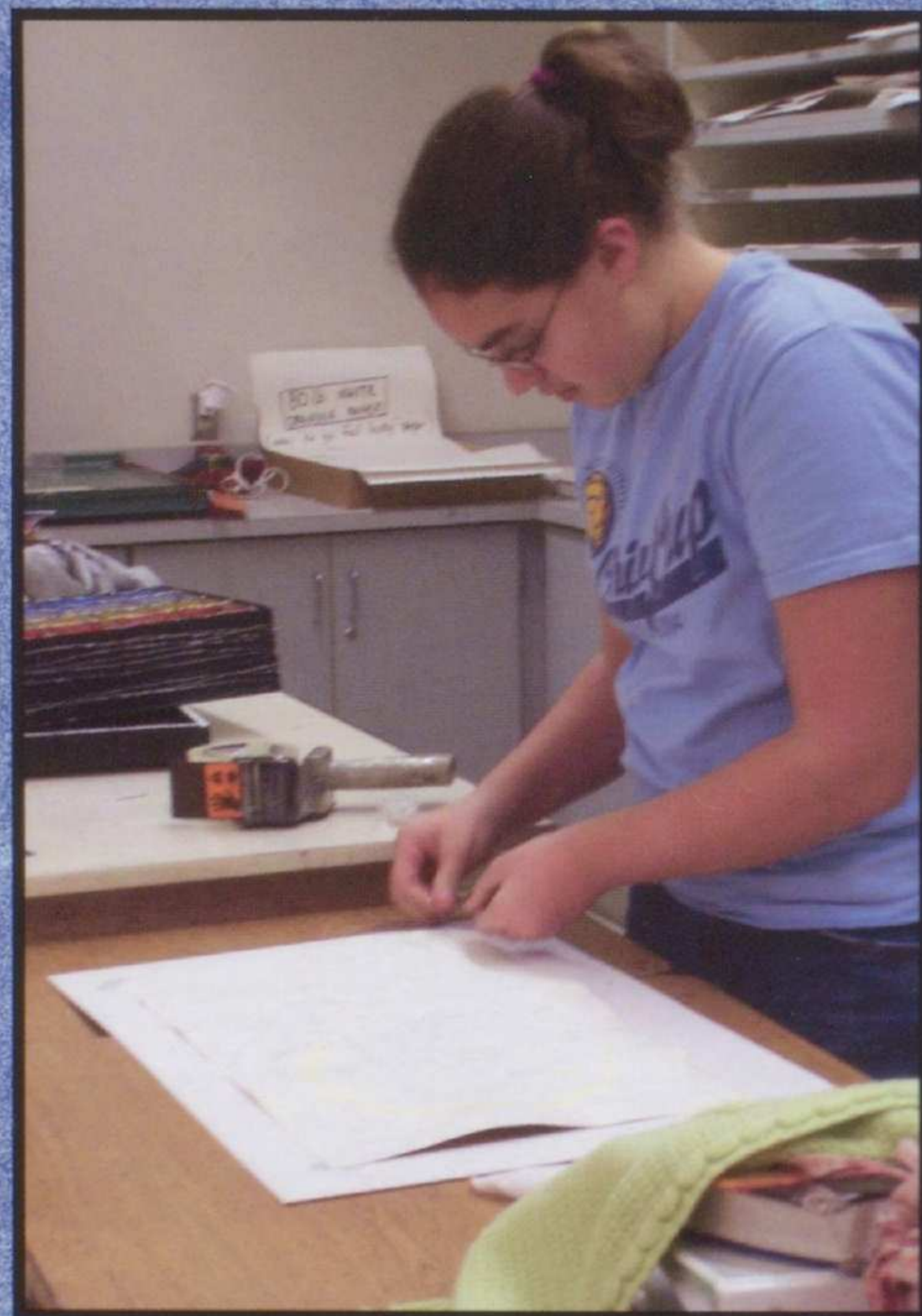

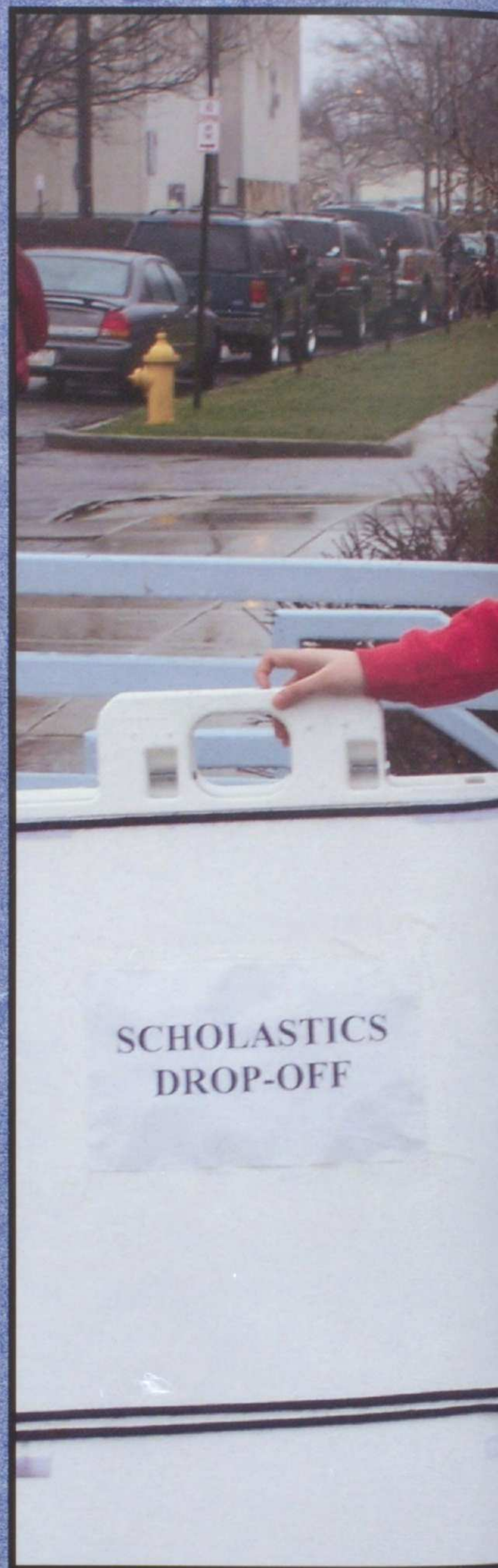

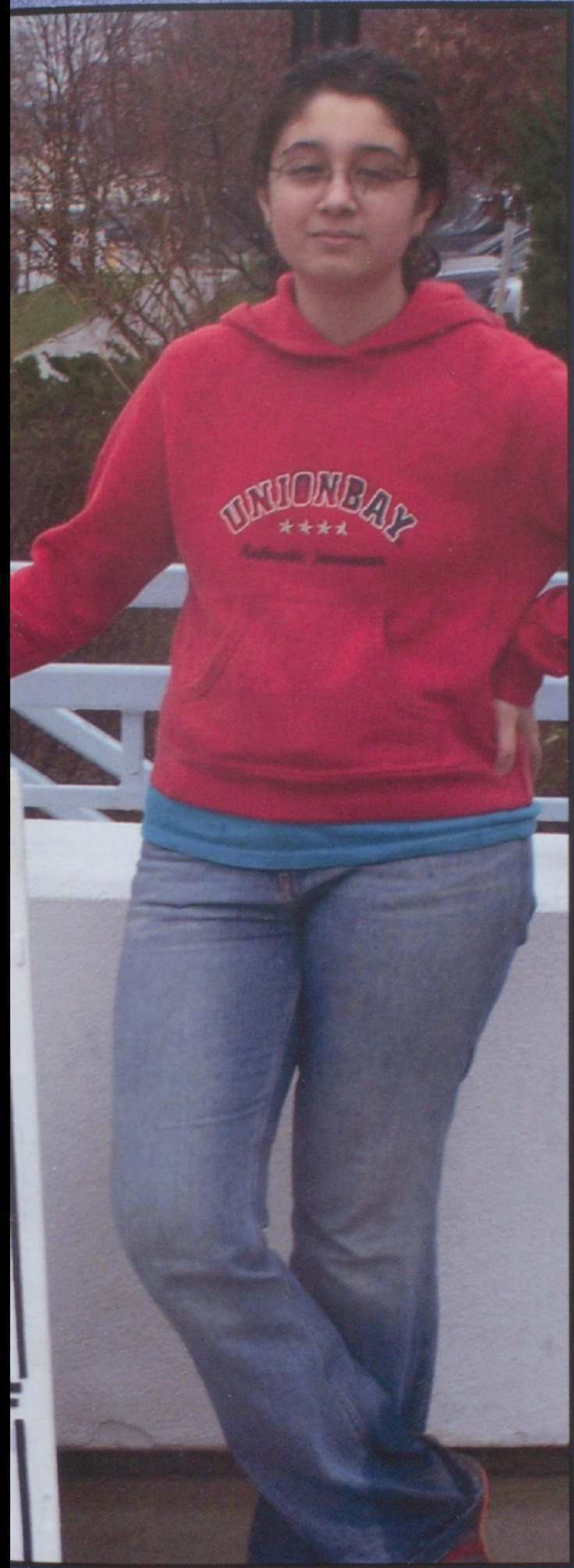
"Design on a Dime"

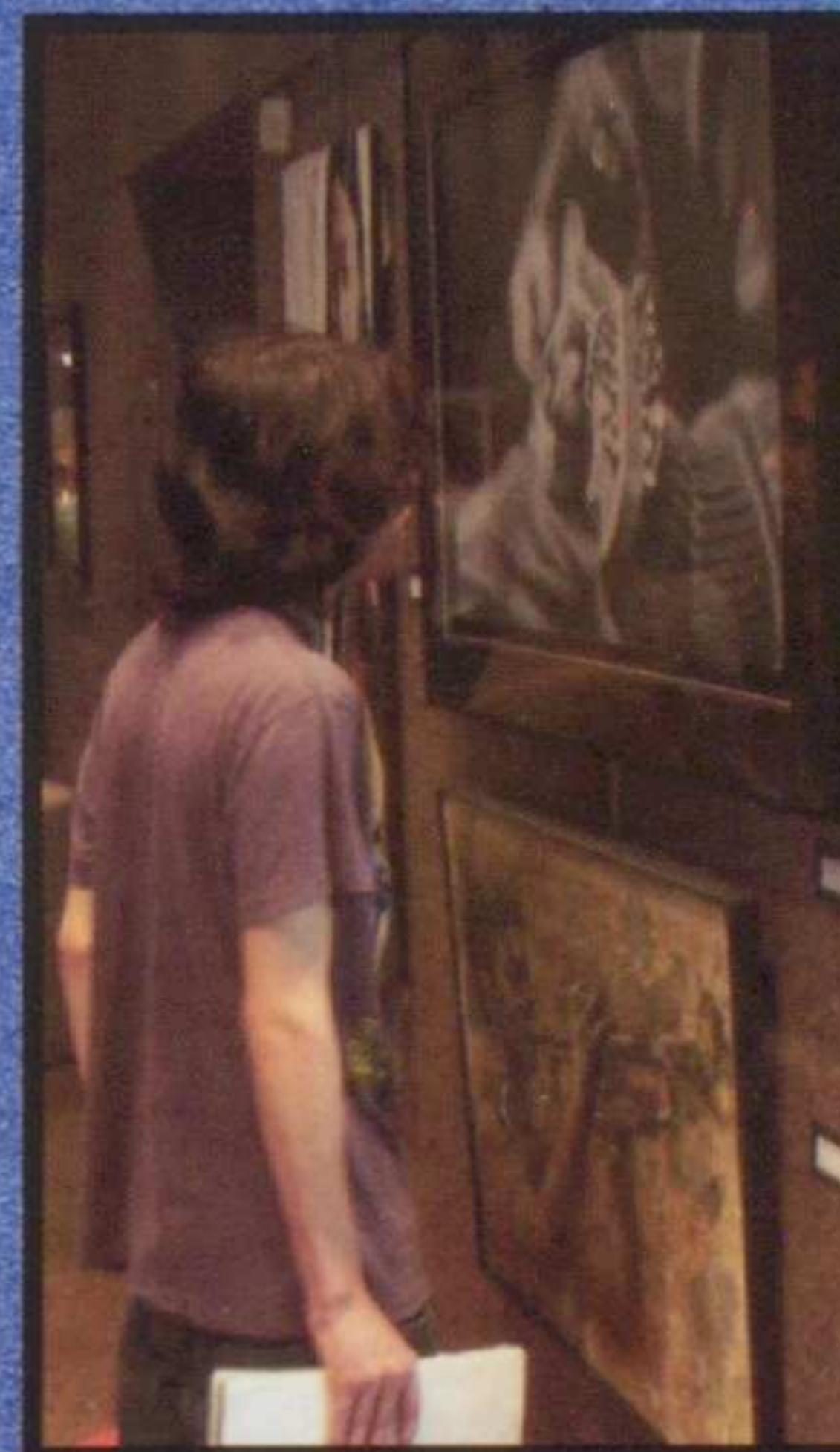

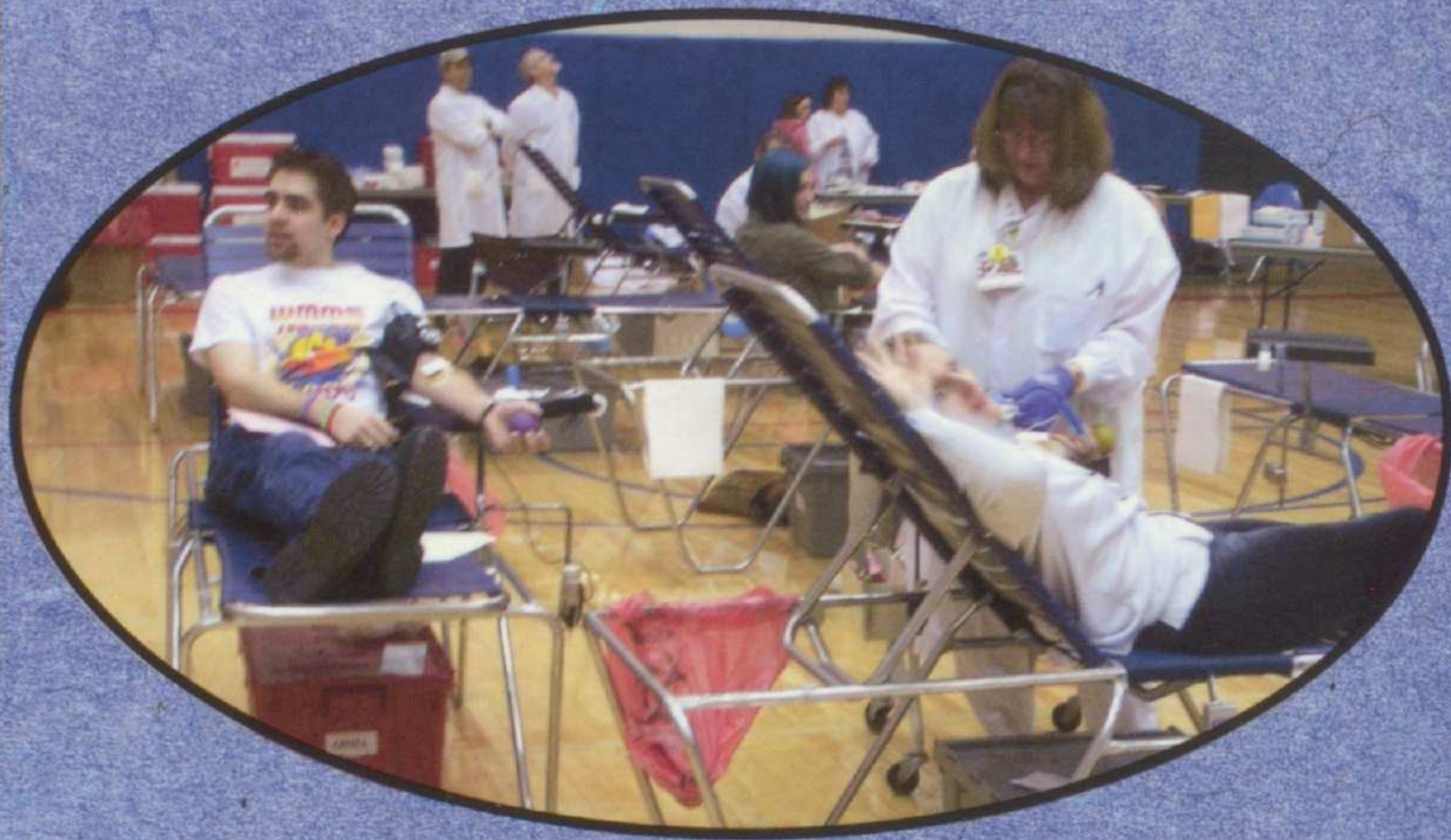

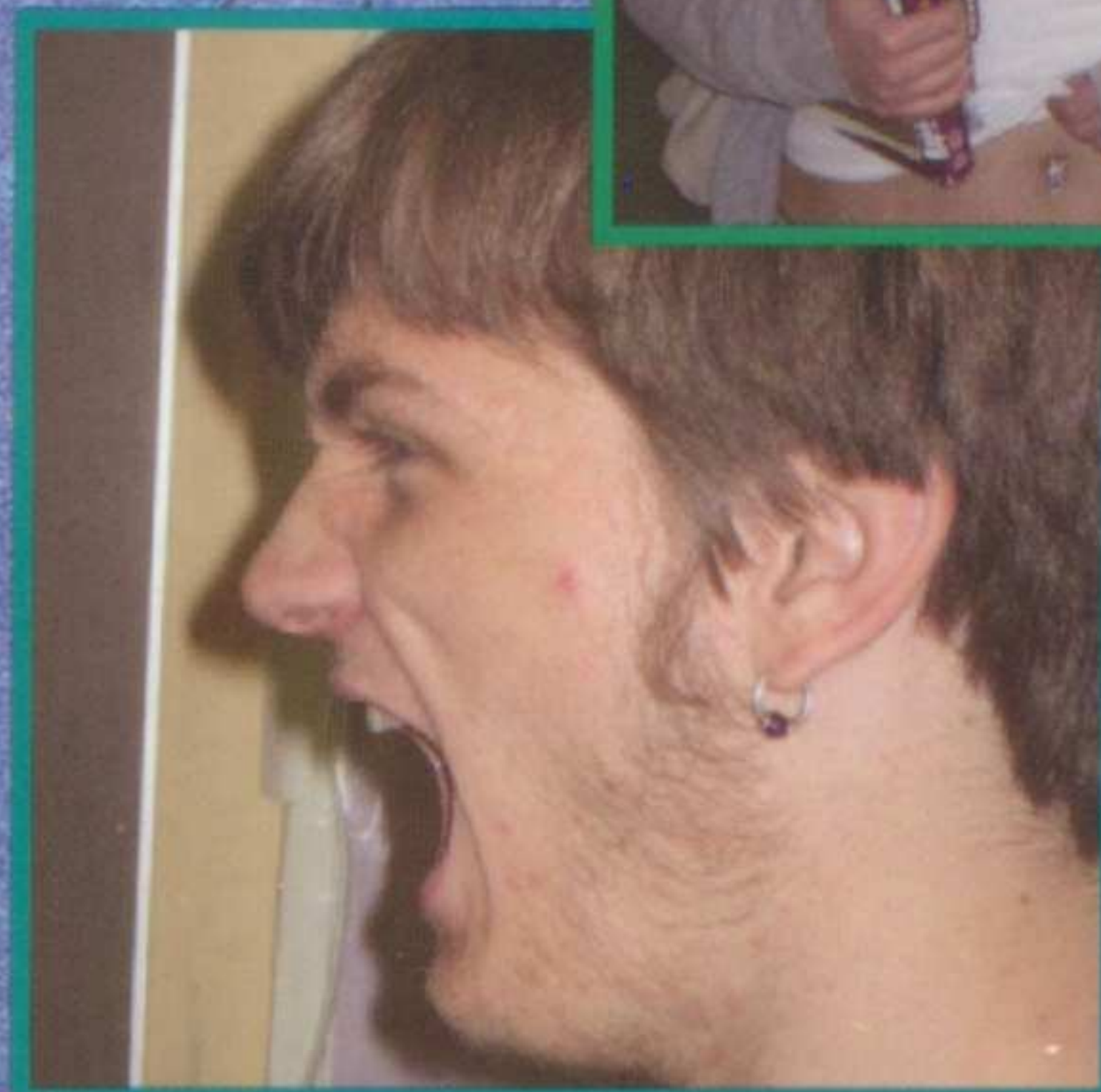

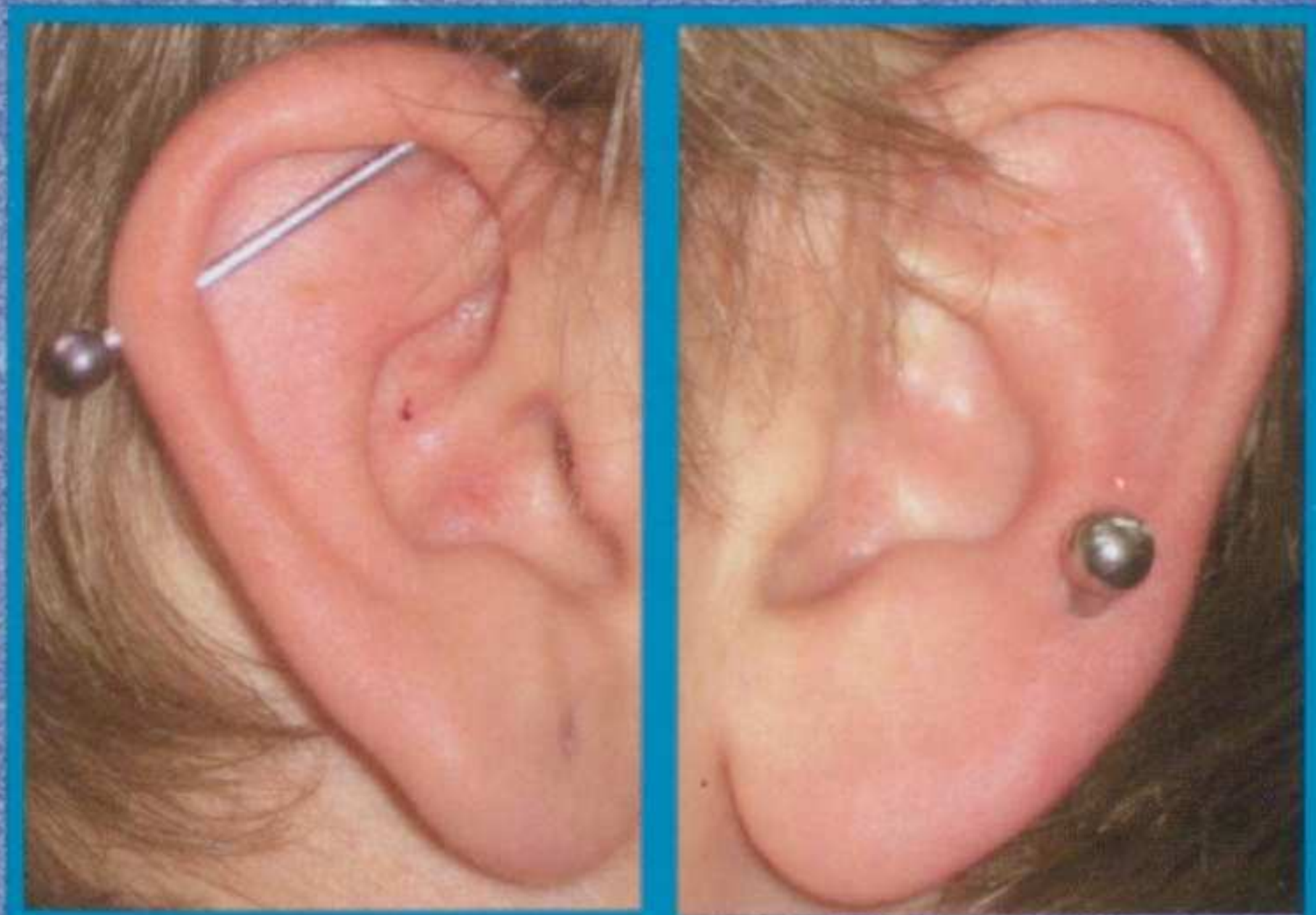

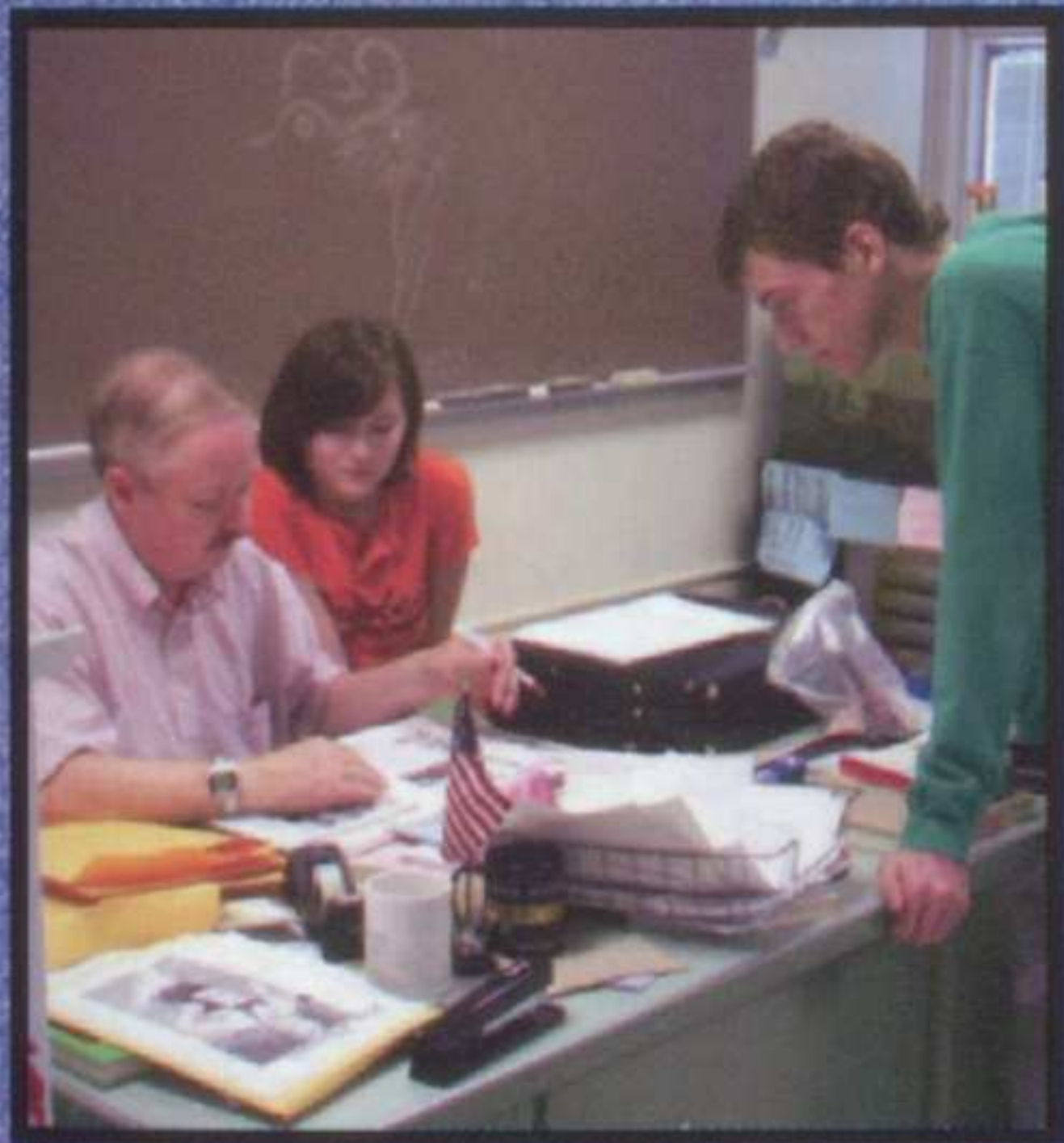

Yearbook "The Insider"

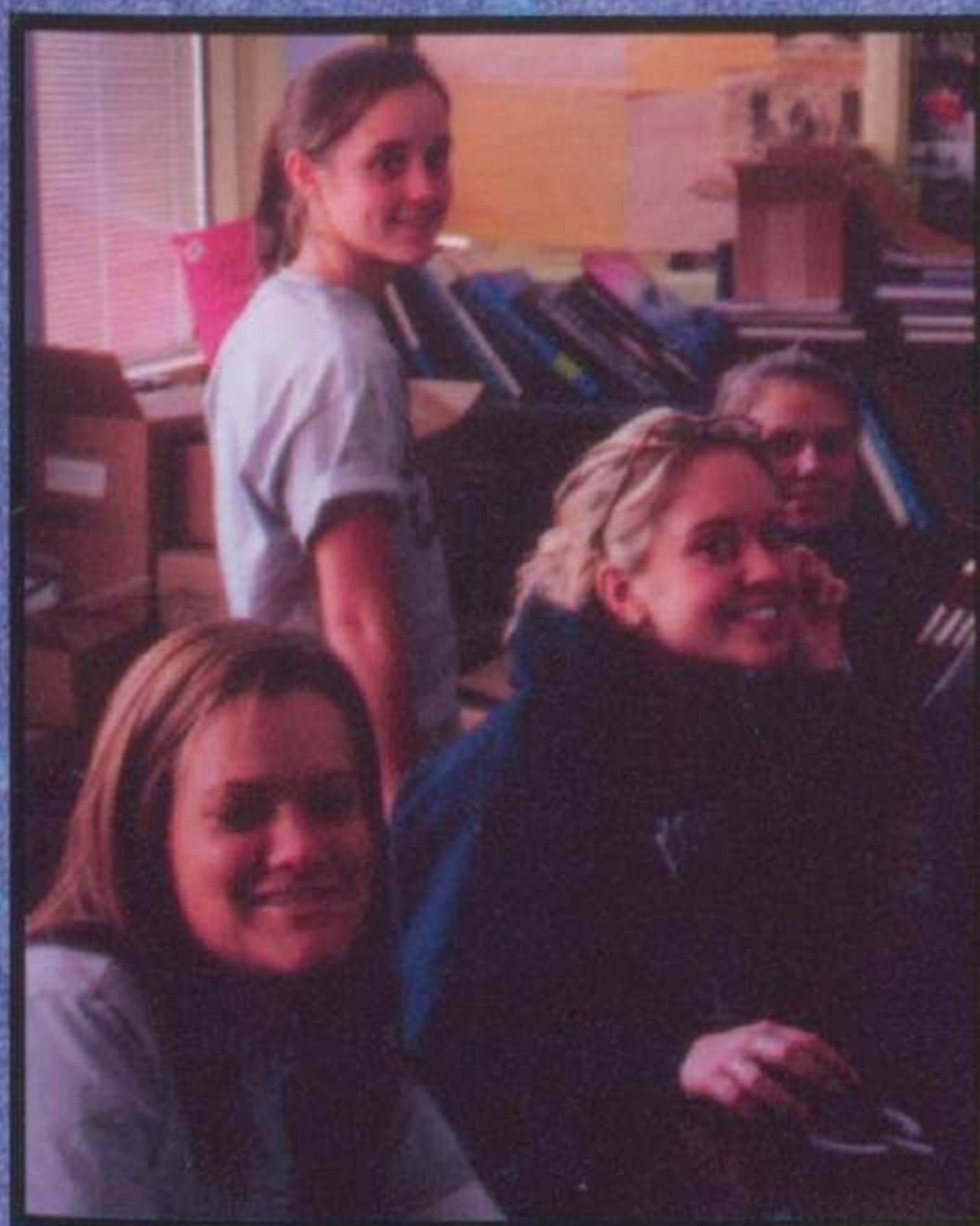

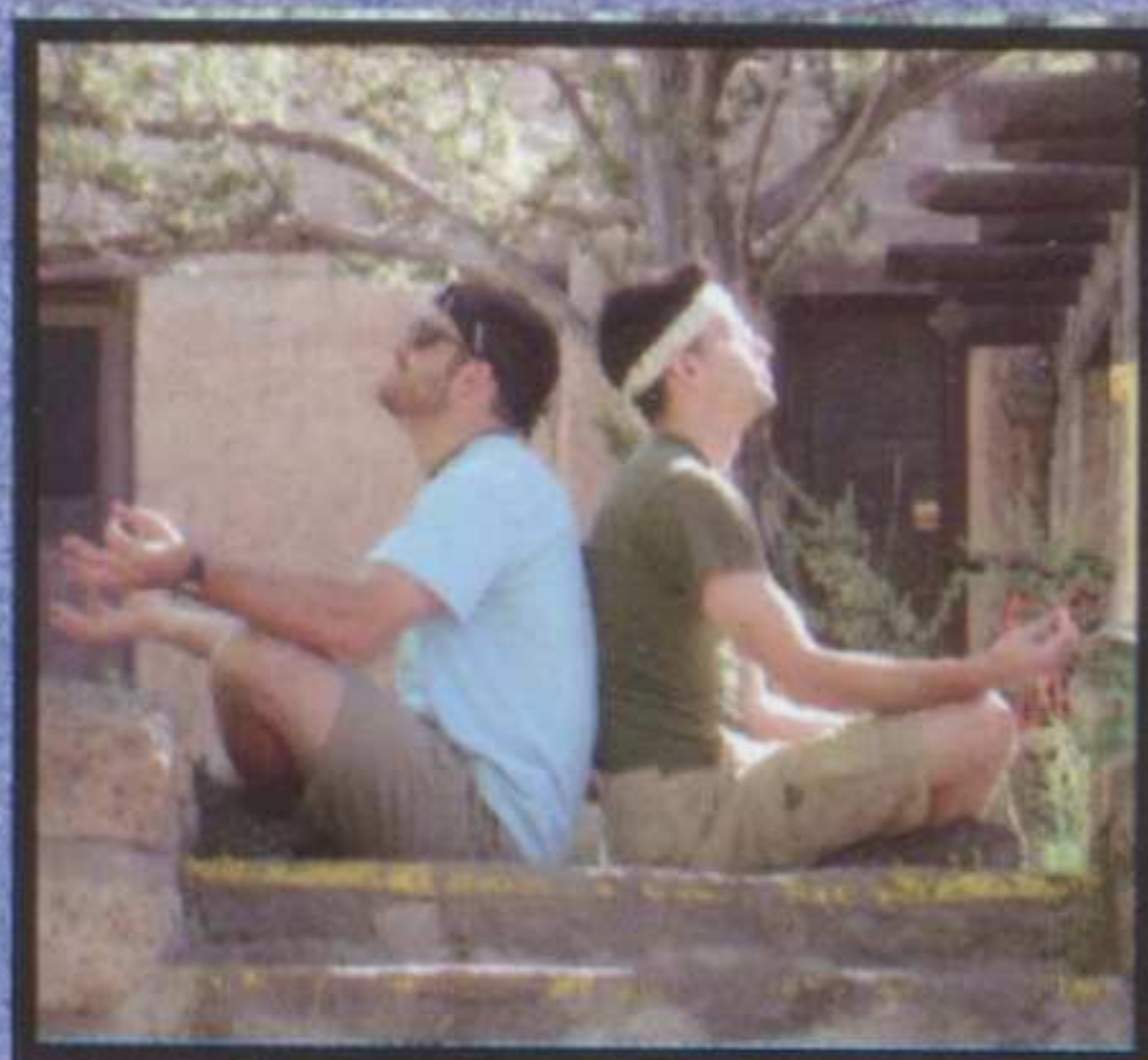

Worthington Field Studies 2004 West Group

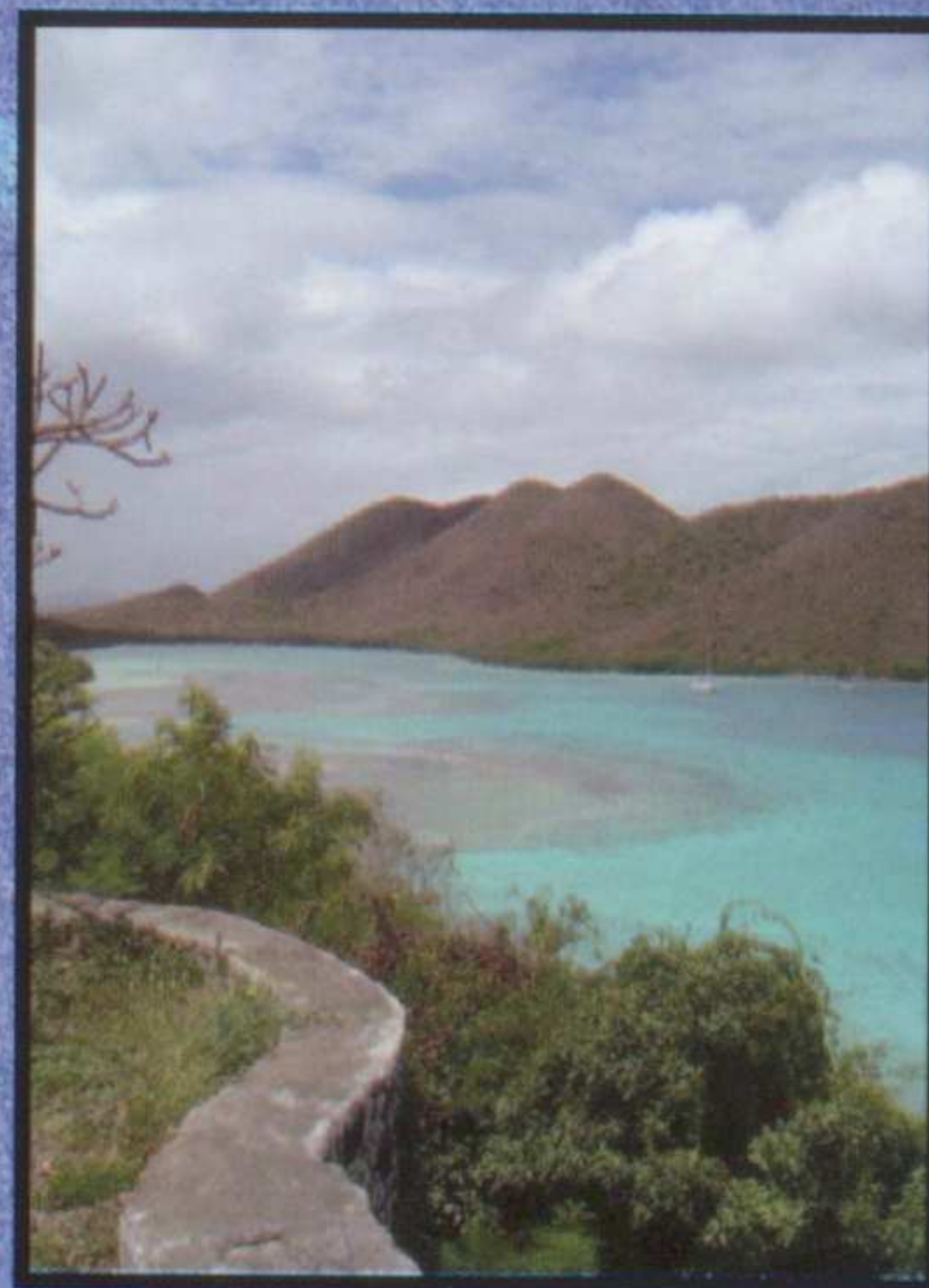
Every year the TWHS Science Department offers two trips for academic credit: one is in the Virgin Islands during Spring Break, the other is throughout the American West and is held during Summer Break.

During **Spring Break 2005** a group of students traveled to the Virgin Islands on a trip that made it possible to receive .5 Science credit. Each student had a journal that included science questions and it had to be filled out by the end of the trip. Despite this small part of "homework" the students usually spent their time swimming, snorkeling, scuba diving, hiking, or just hanging out on the beach. Part of their studies also included observing constellations, the vegetation, geography and topography of the island and participating in a beach walk led by a ranger at Annaberg Sugar Plantation. The students stayed close to the beach in tents and spent the whole week having fun with friends and even learning a few things about earth science at the same time.

During **Summer 2004**, a group of TWHS students prepared for trekking across the West. This time the trip was centralized mostly in the Southwest, and the group journeyed by bus, playing Euchre to pass the time. Everyday activities focused on hiking, and general exploration, but the students did have to keep a journal and answer questions supplied by the advisors. Places they visited included Rocky Mountain National Park, the Mammoth Caves in Kentucky, Durango and Sante Fe.

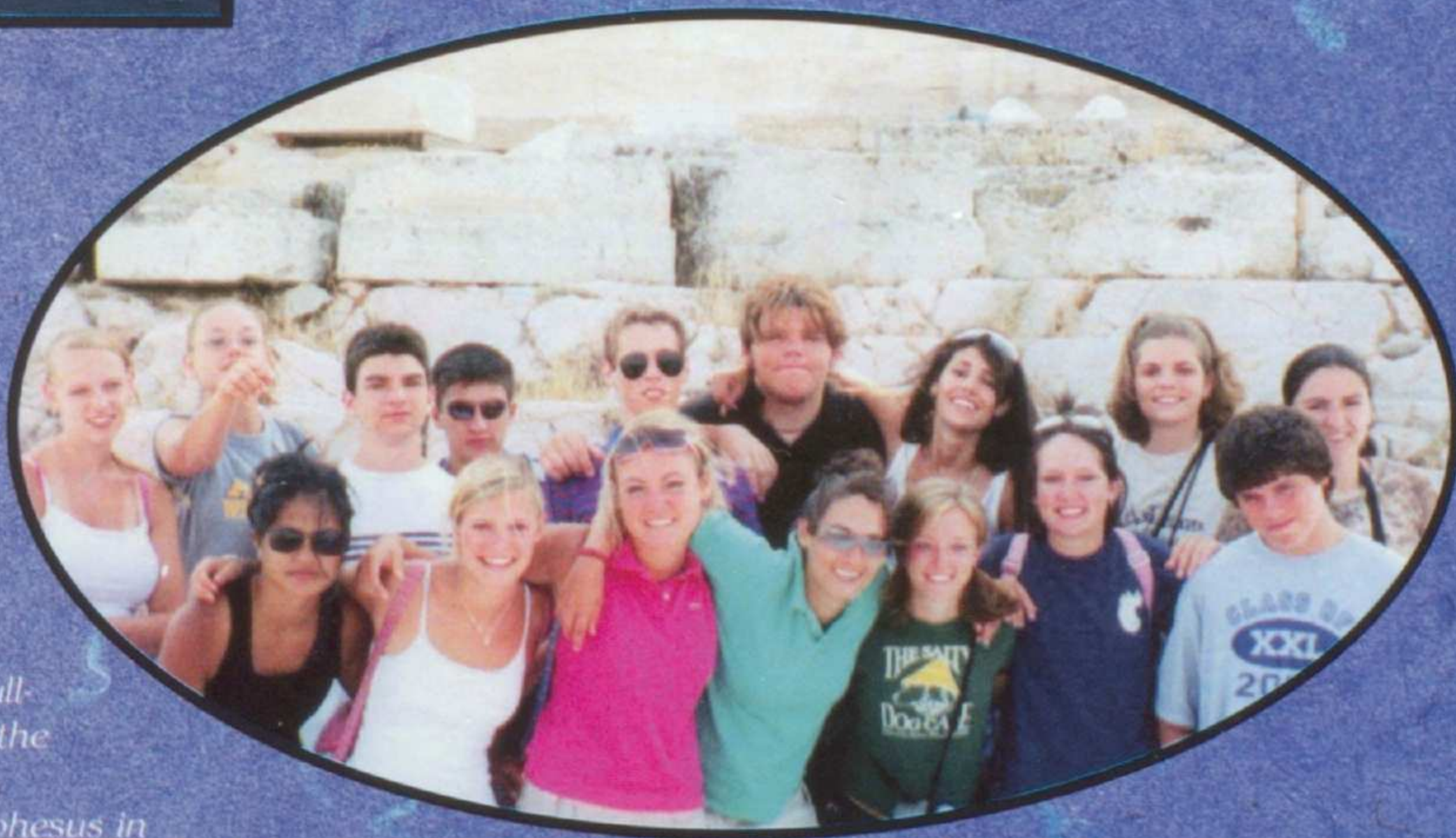

Italy, Greece, and Spain Trips "Travel Channel"

During Summer 2004 teachers Ms. Reeb, Ms. Allsop, and Ms. Gloeckner organized a student trip through Italy and Greece. The group landed in Rome, Italy in June and spent 14 days in Italy visiting places such as Rome, Florence, Sorrento, and the island of Capri. Highlights included the Colosseum, the Roman Forum, the Vatican, viewing Michelangelo's "David", and the archaeological site of Pompeii. From the port city of Brindisi on the south-east coast of Italy, the travelers departed by ferry and spent the rest of the trip in Greece. Places they visited in Greece included Delphi, where the group was able to see the site of the Oracle of Delphi, and Athens where preparation for the 2004 Summer Olympics was in full-swing. The trip was concluded with a three-day cruise on the Aegean sea that took students to the islands of Patras, Mykonos, and Rhodes, and an excursion to the ruins of Ephesus in the country of Turkey. Not only was the group able to experience amazing historical sites, but the students were also immersed in the rich culture of the Italian and Greek people. **Opa!**

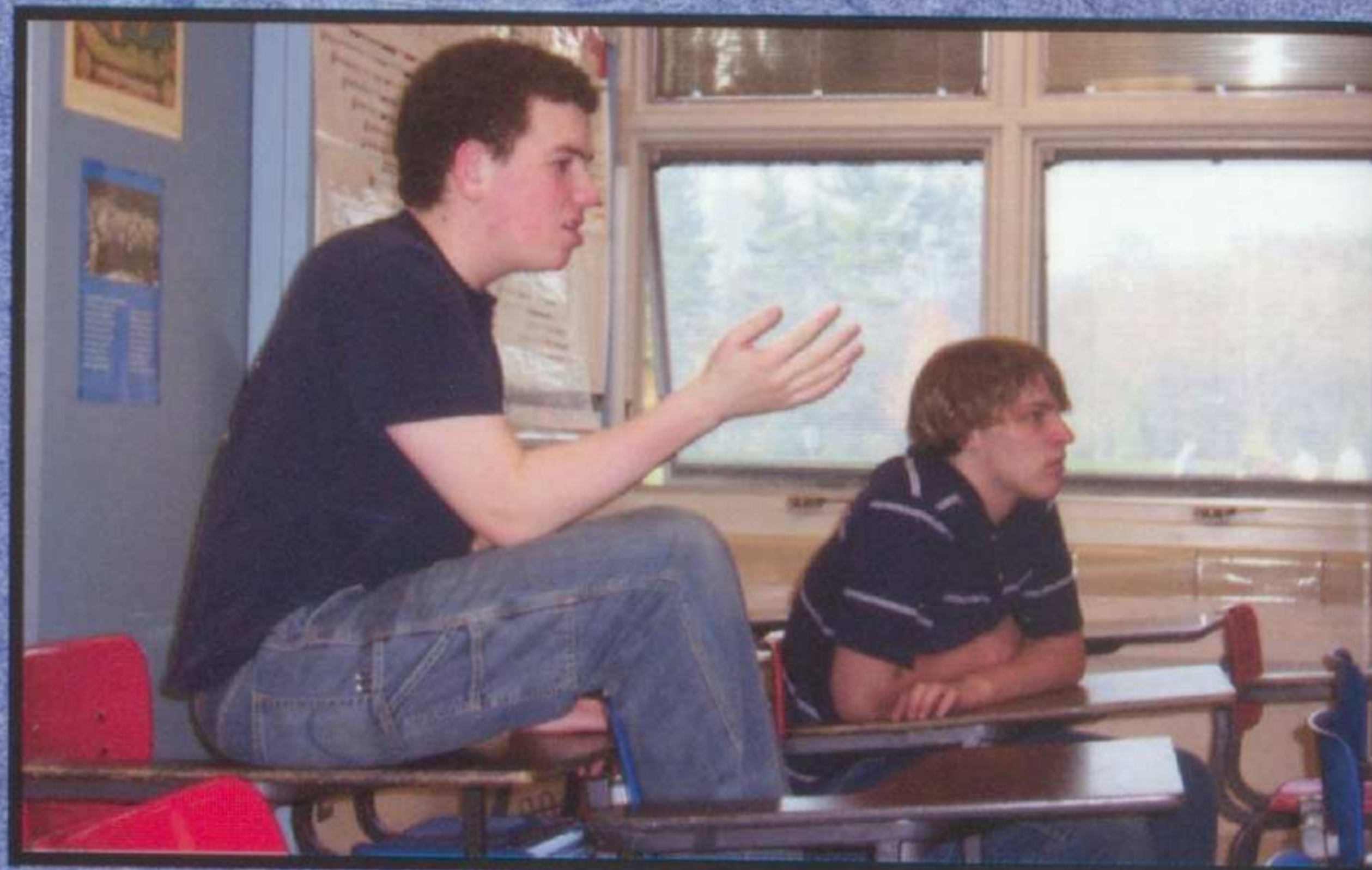

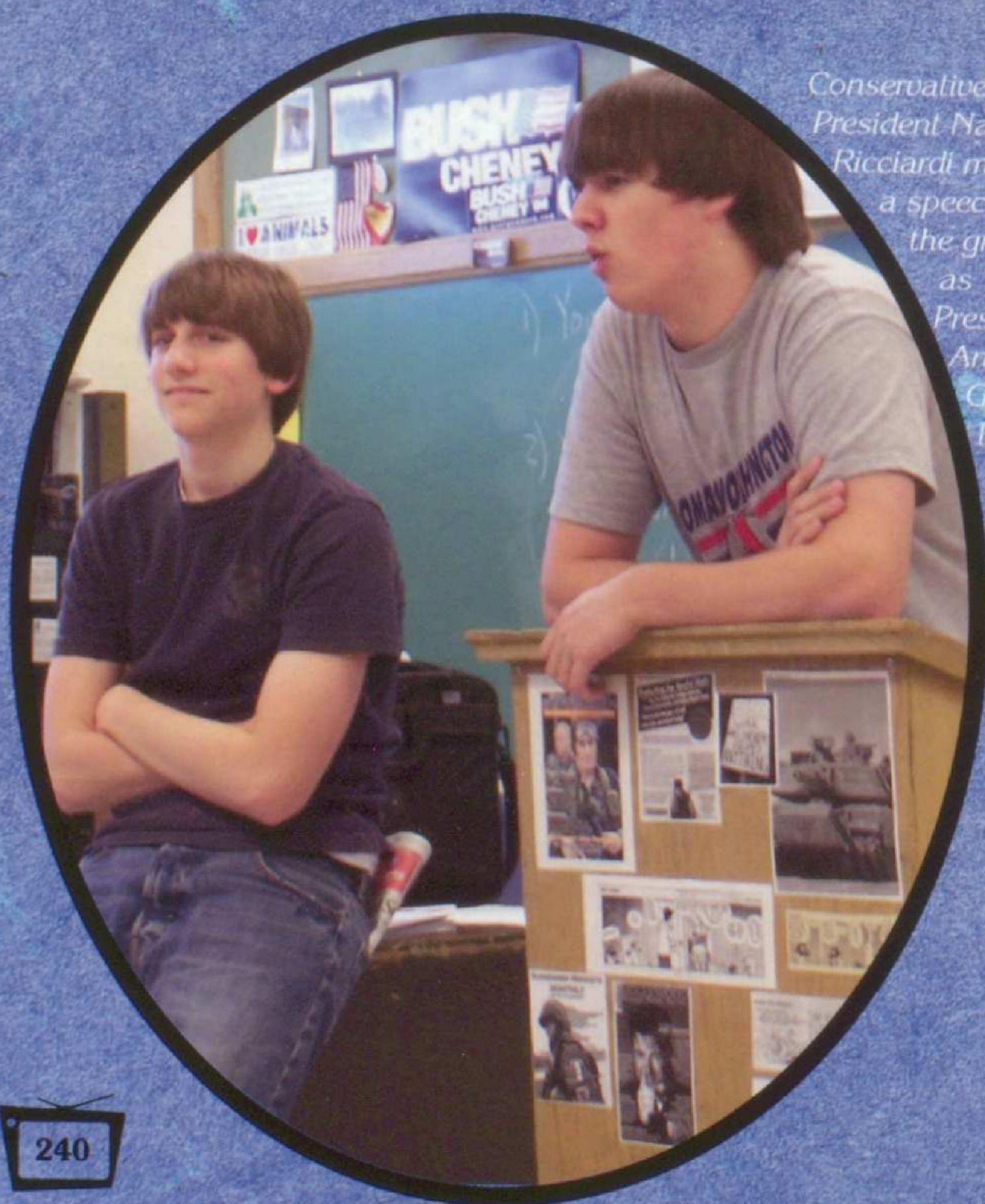

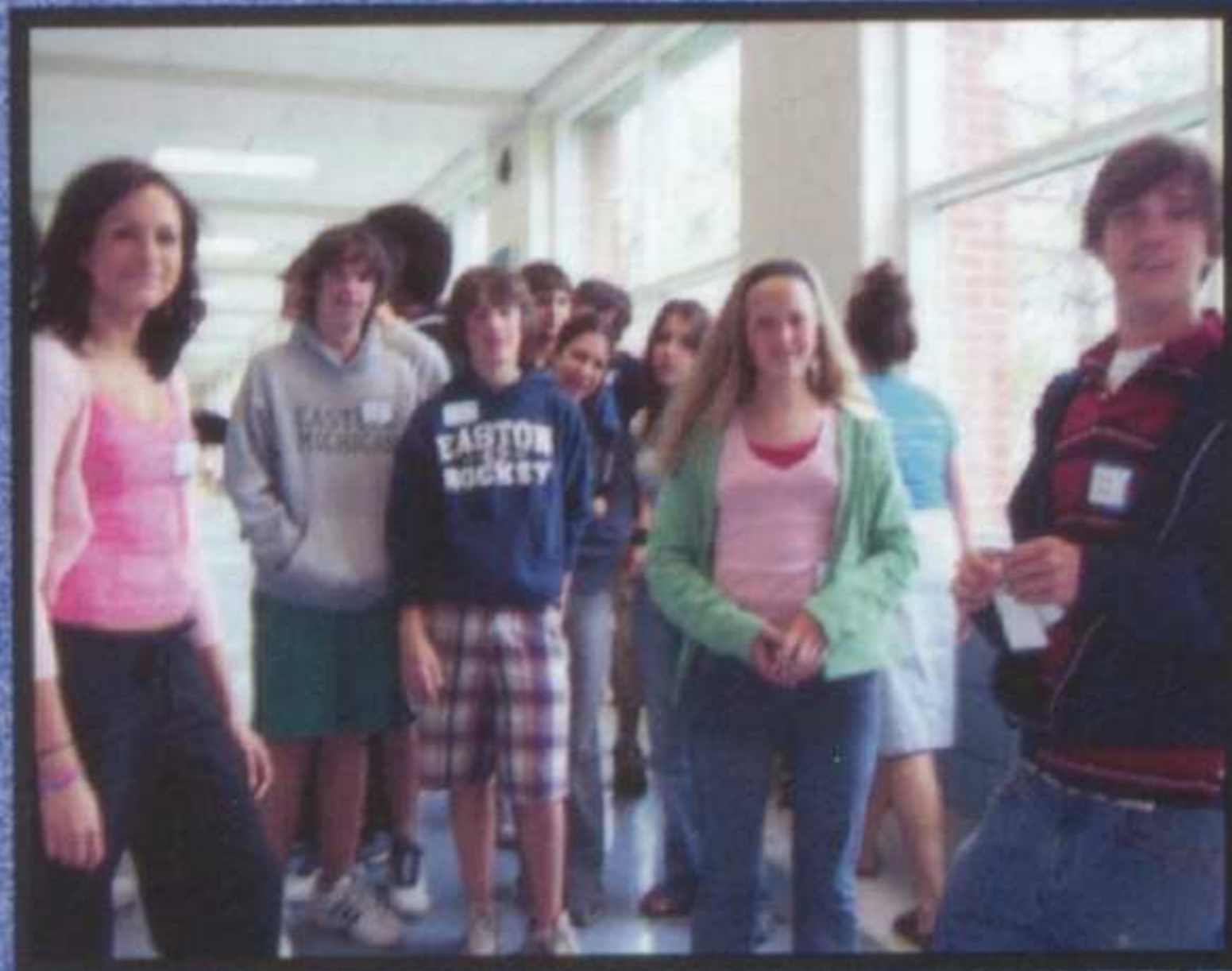

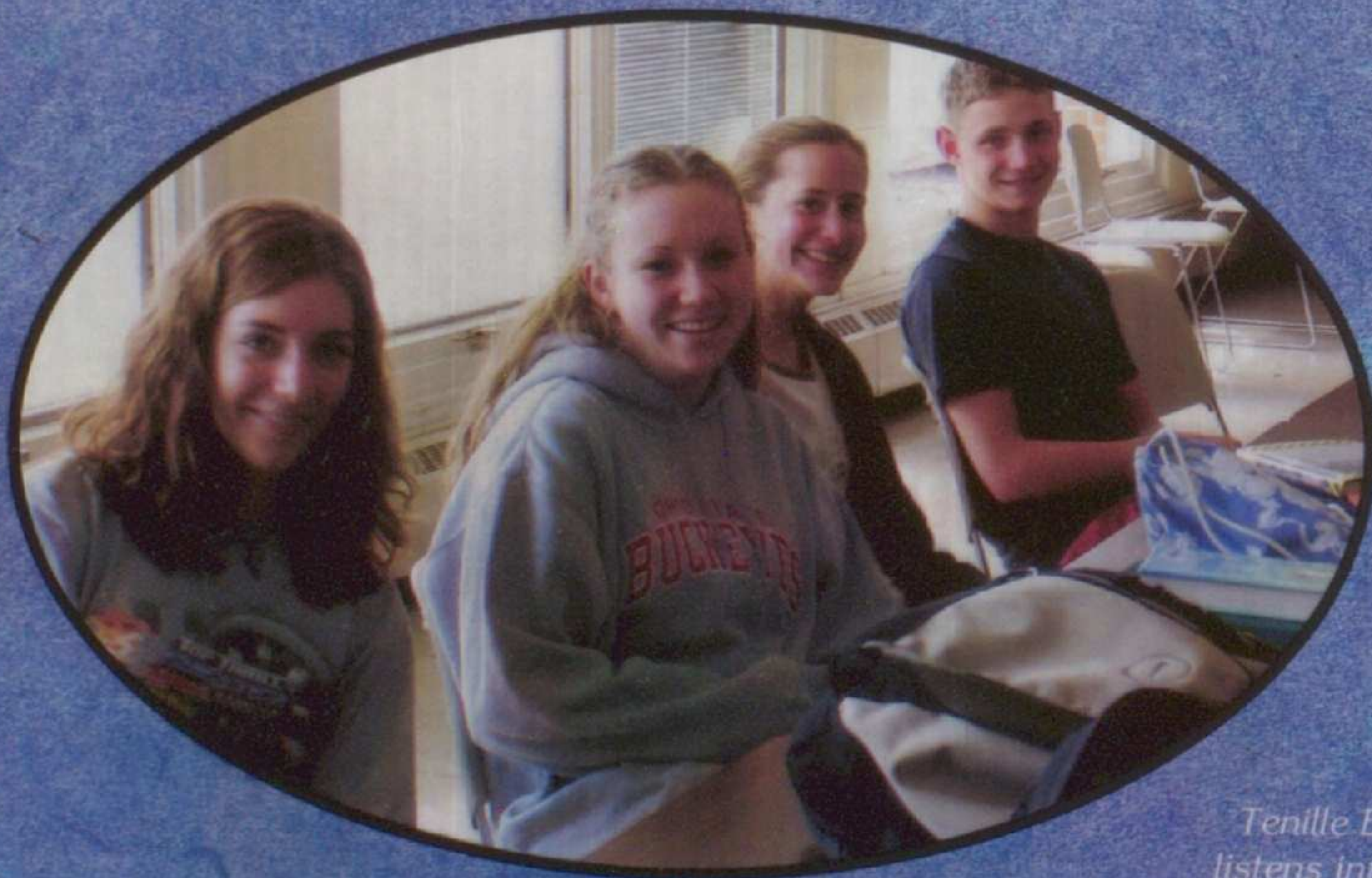

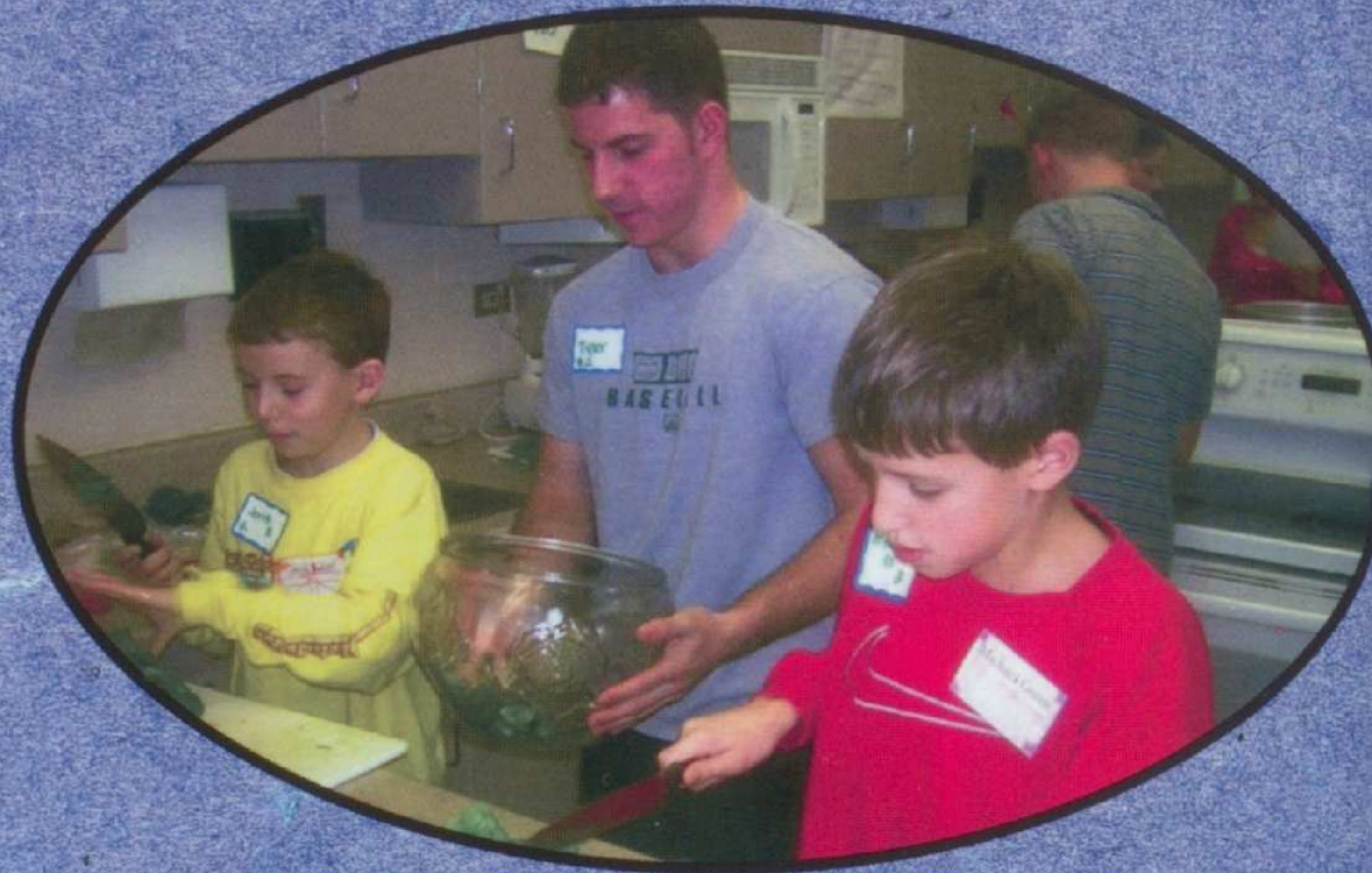

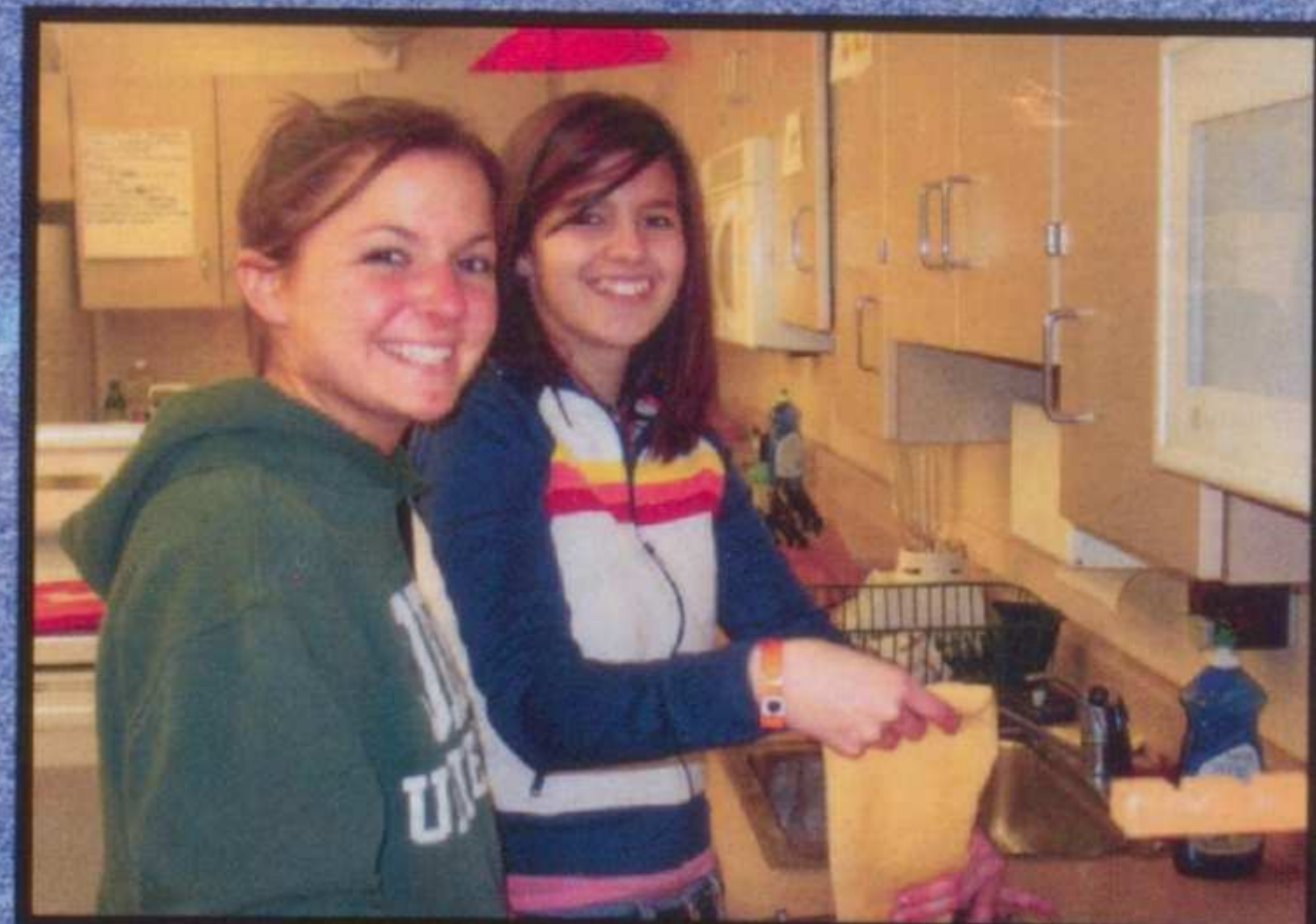

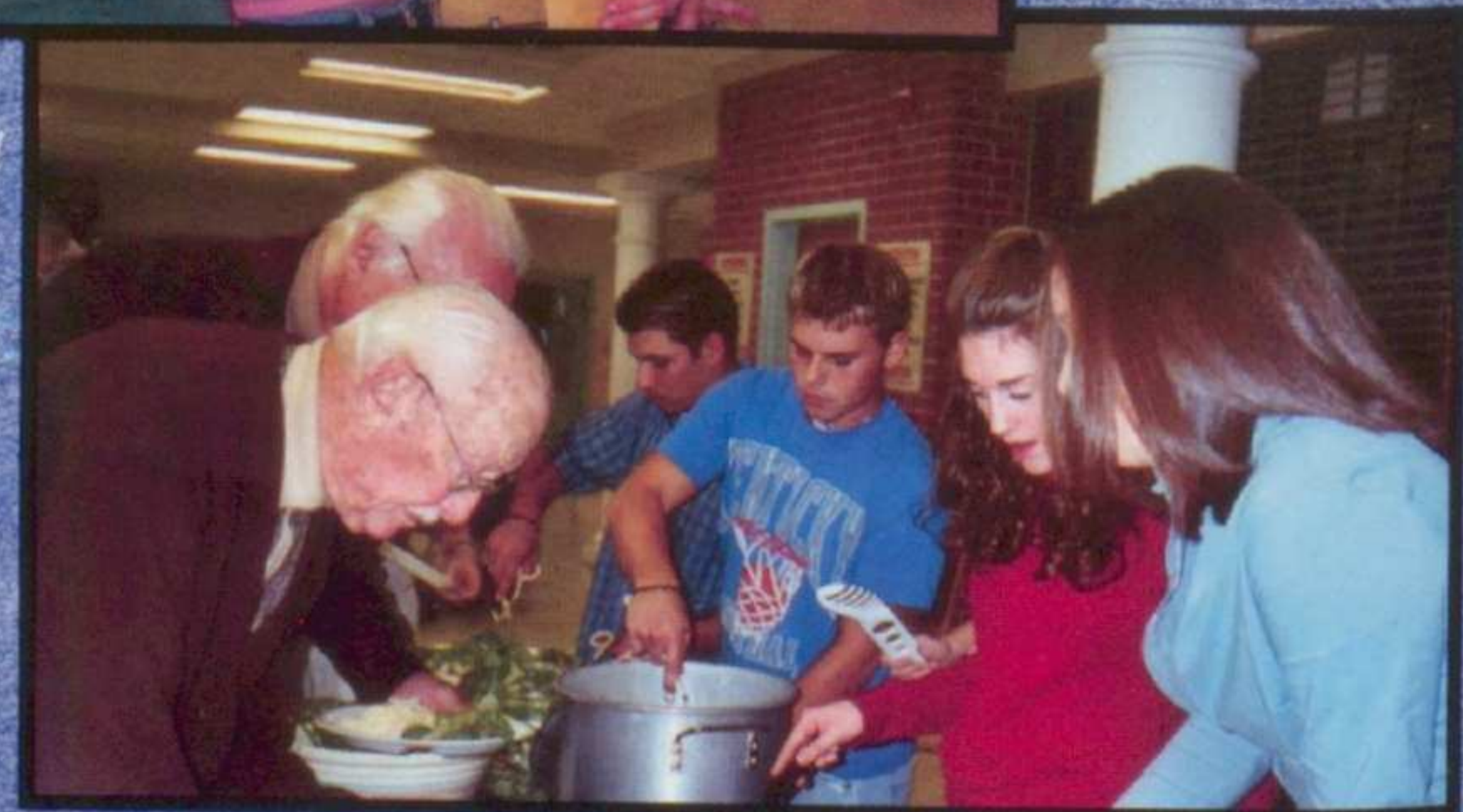

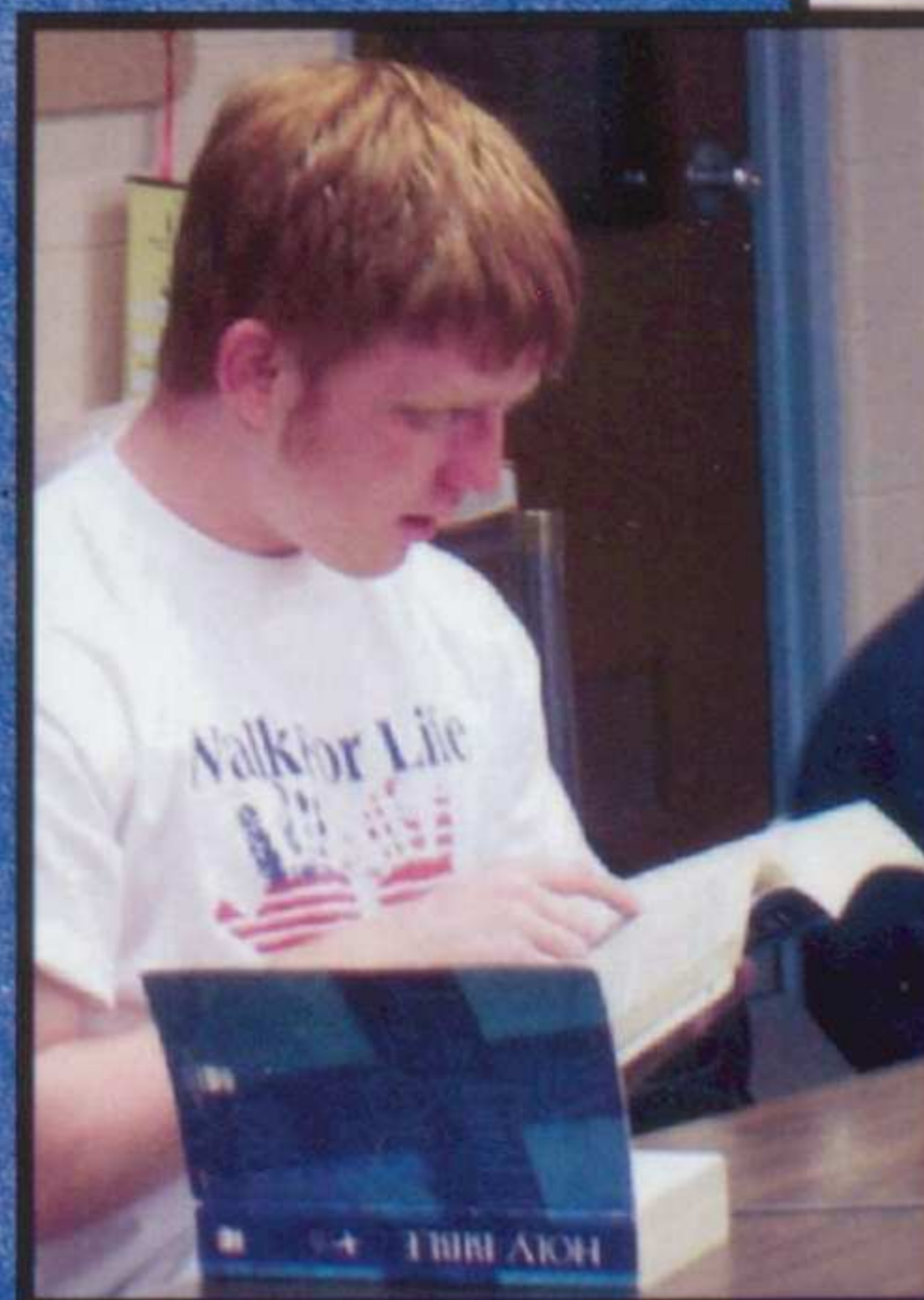

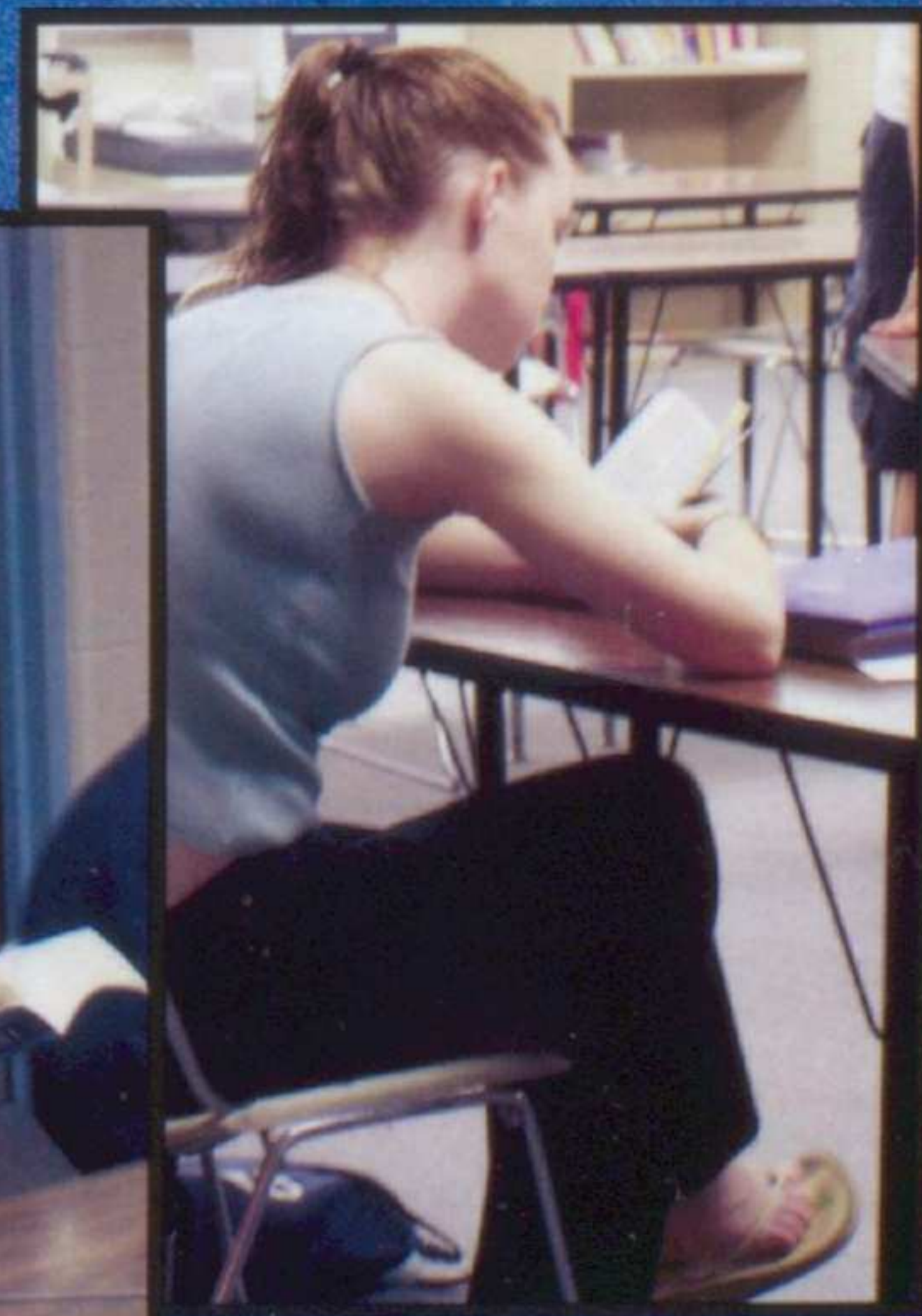

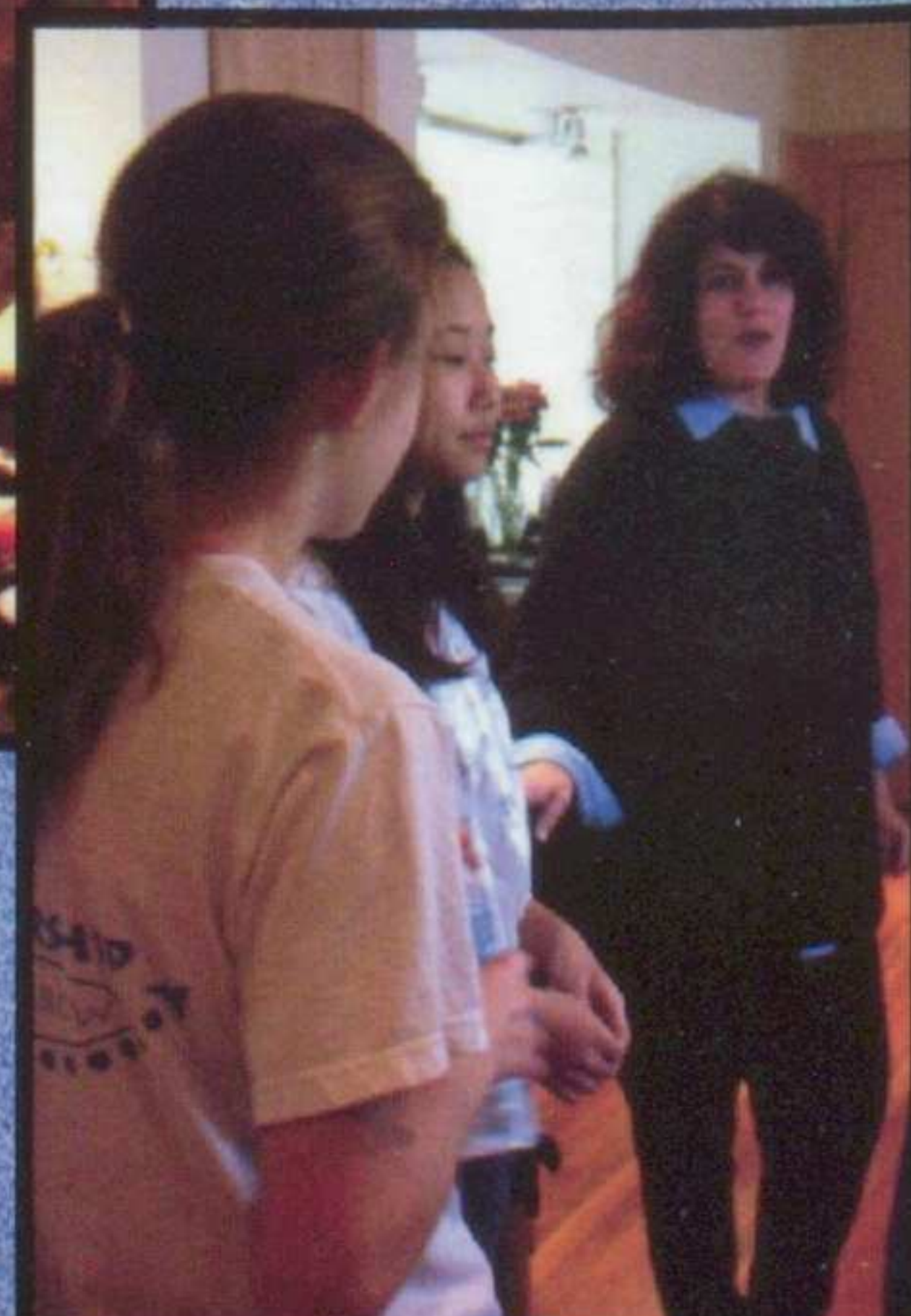

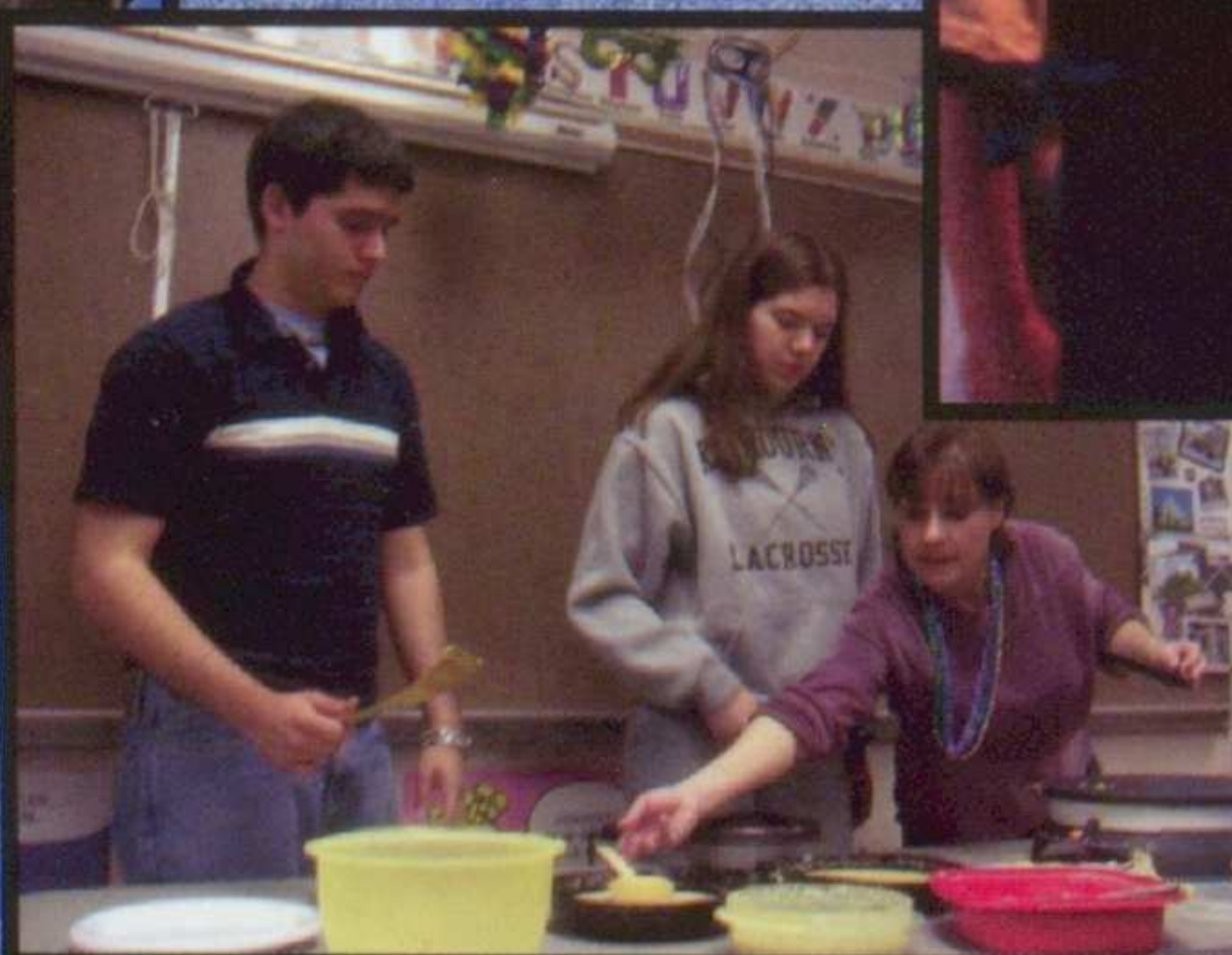

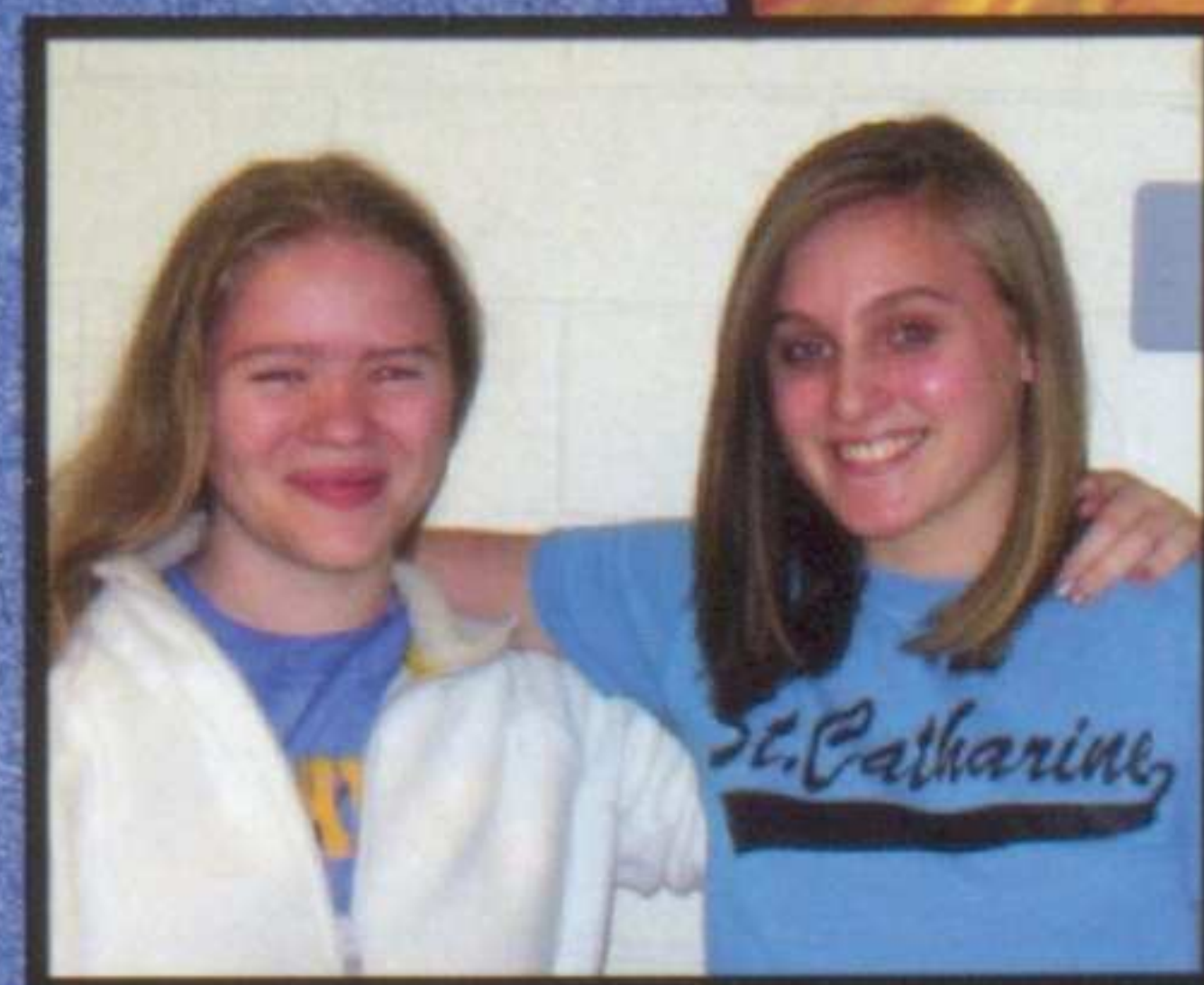

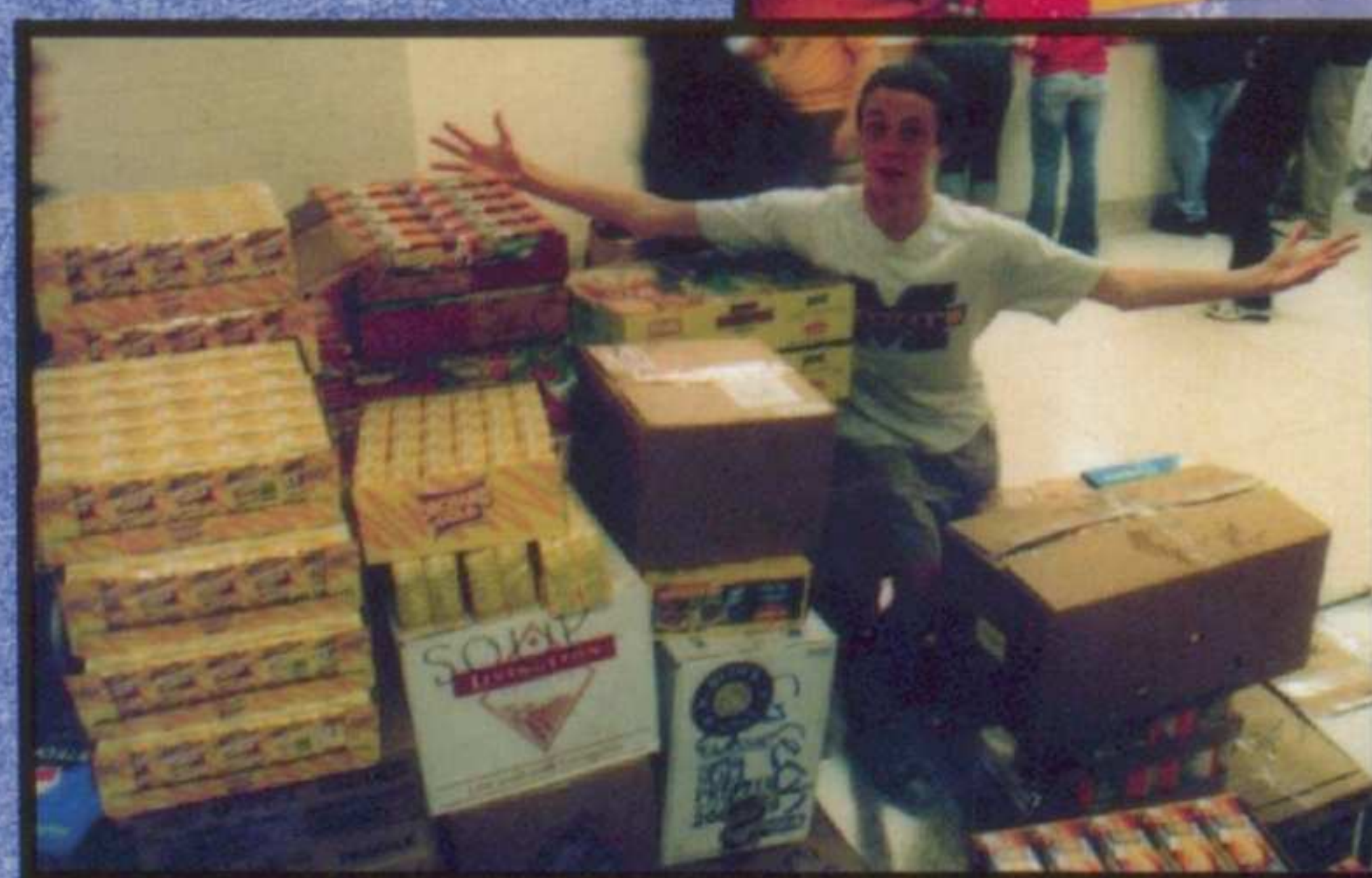

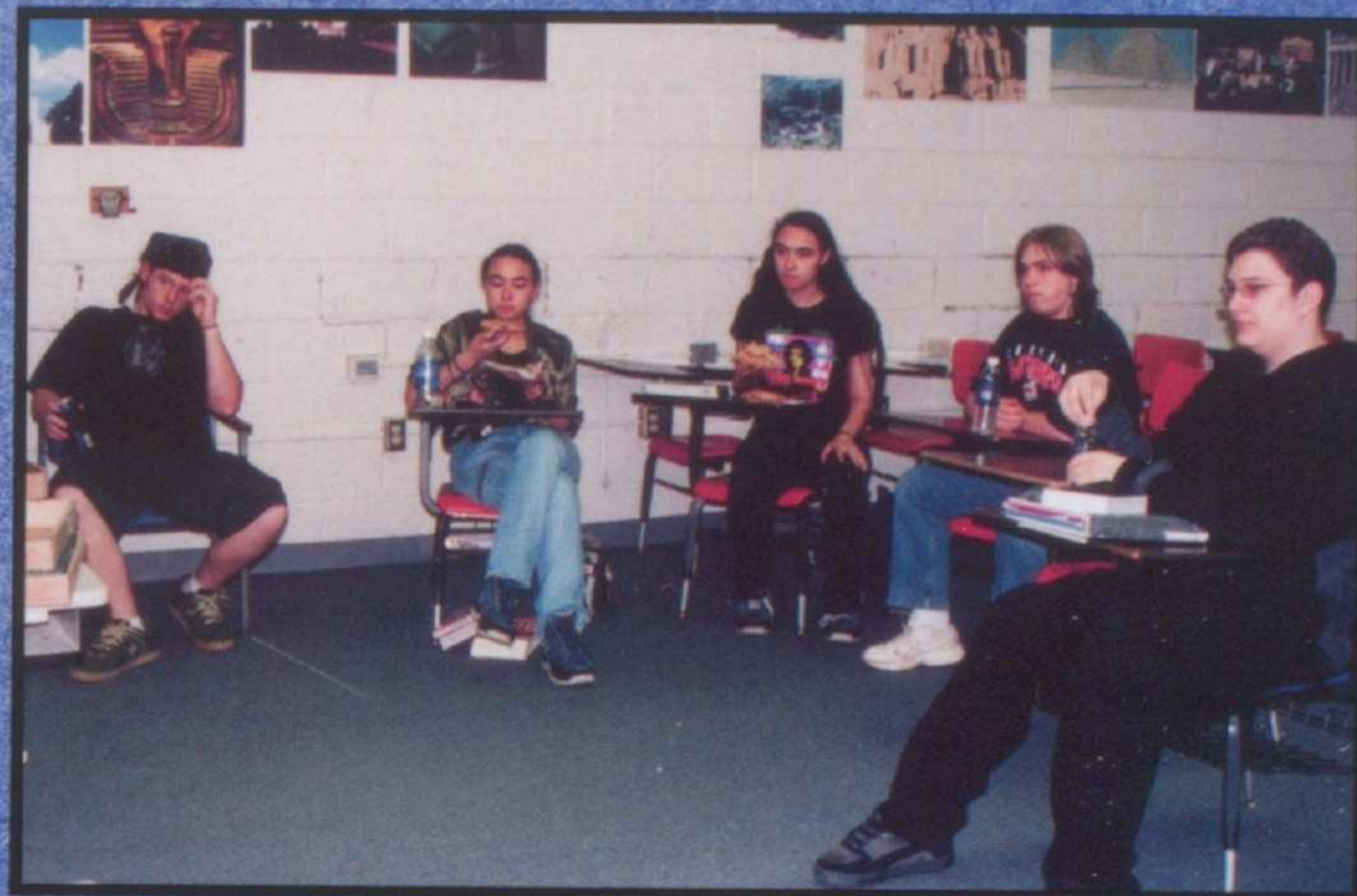

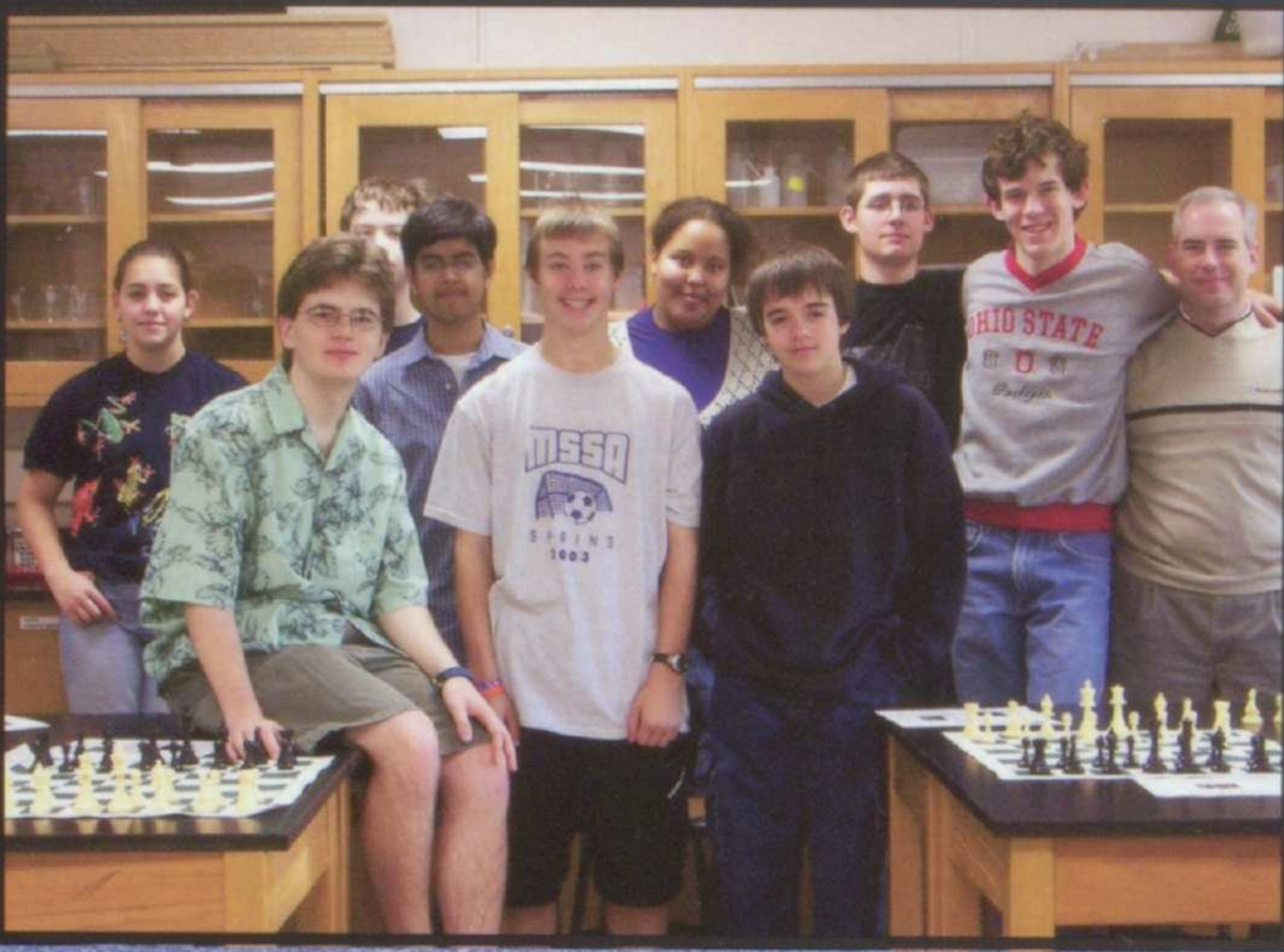

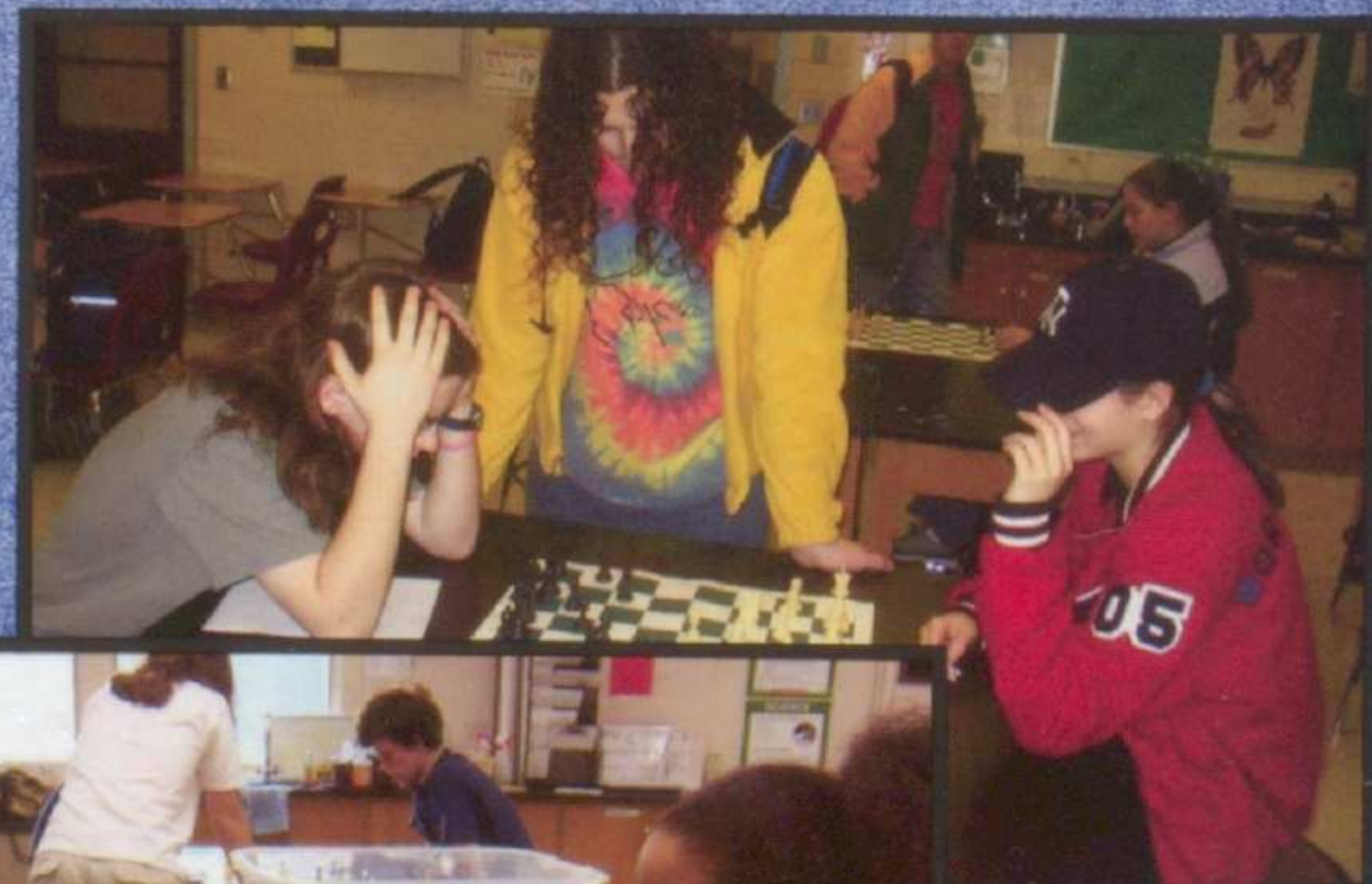

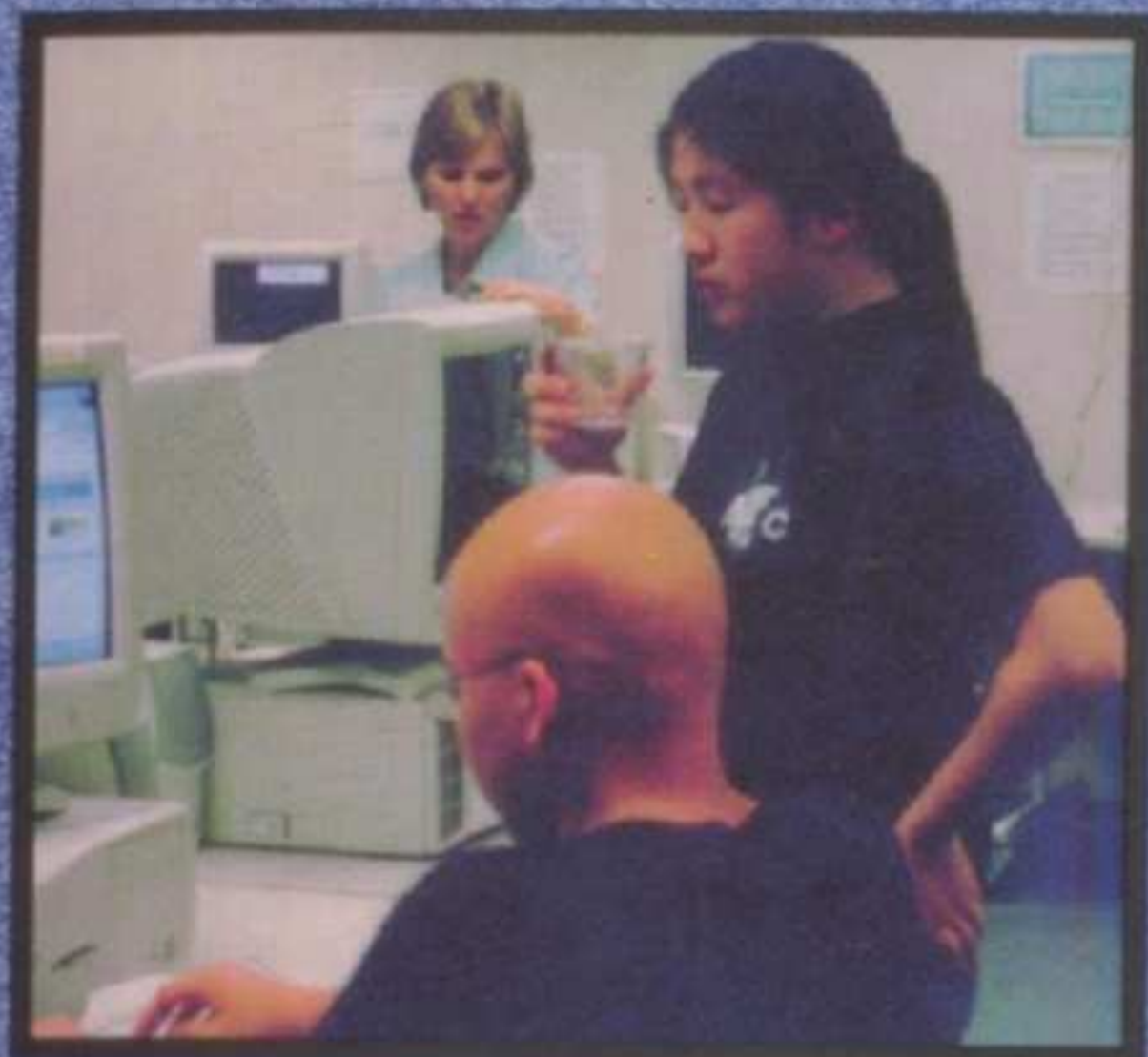

Stock Club "The Price is Right"



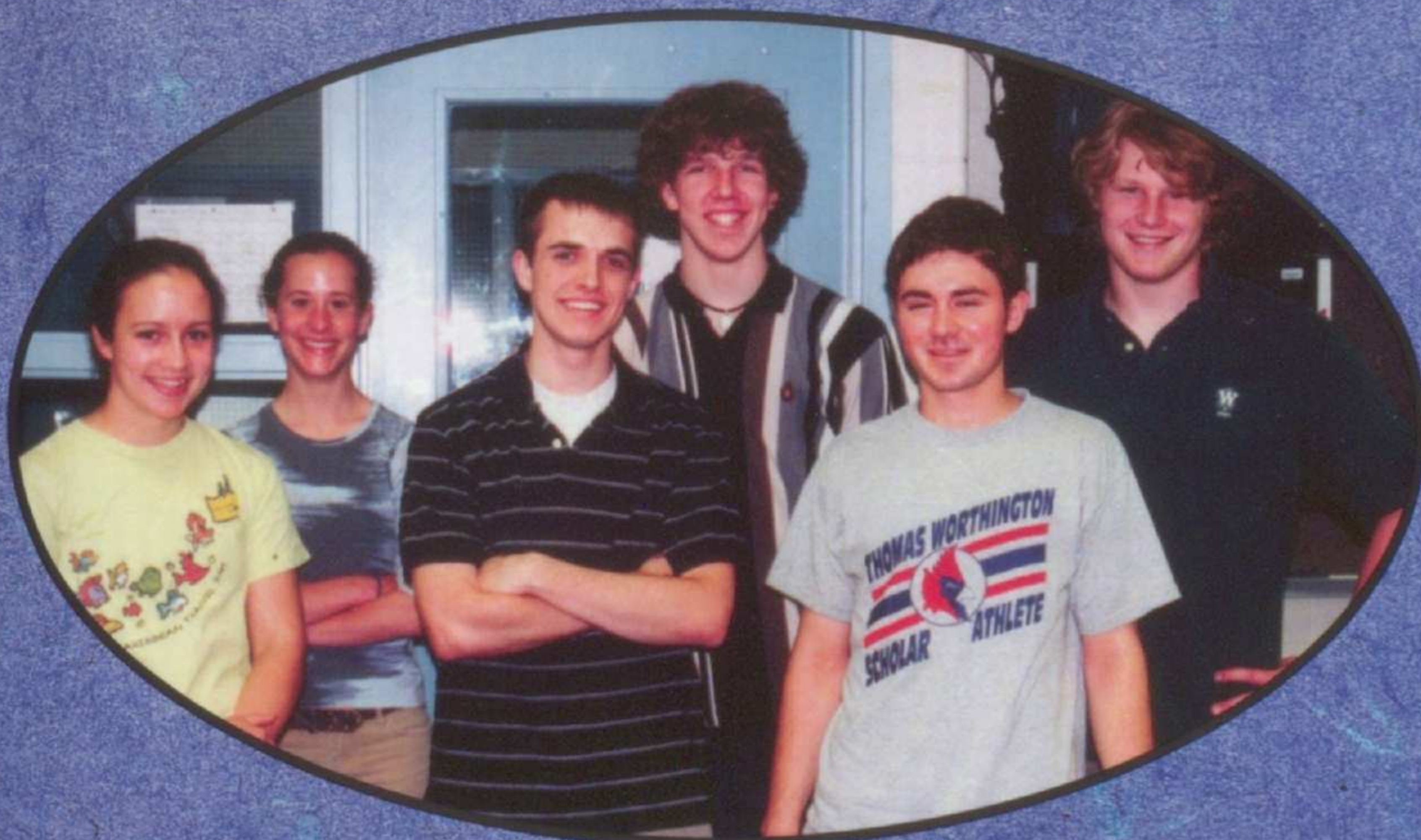

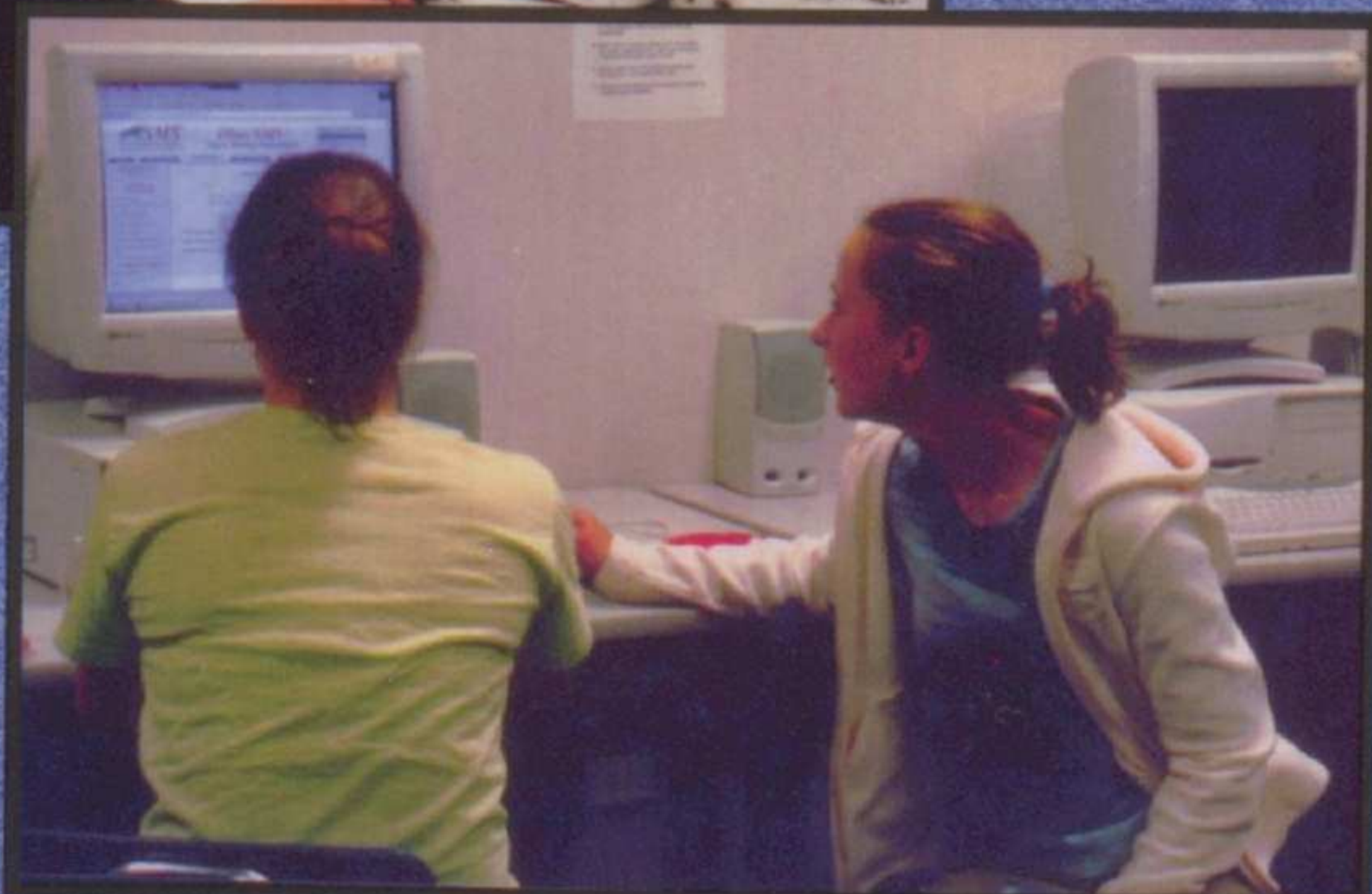

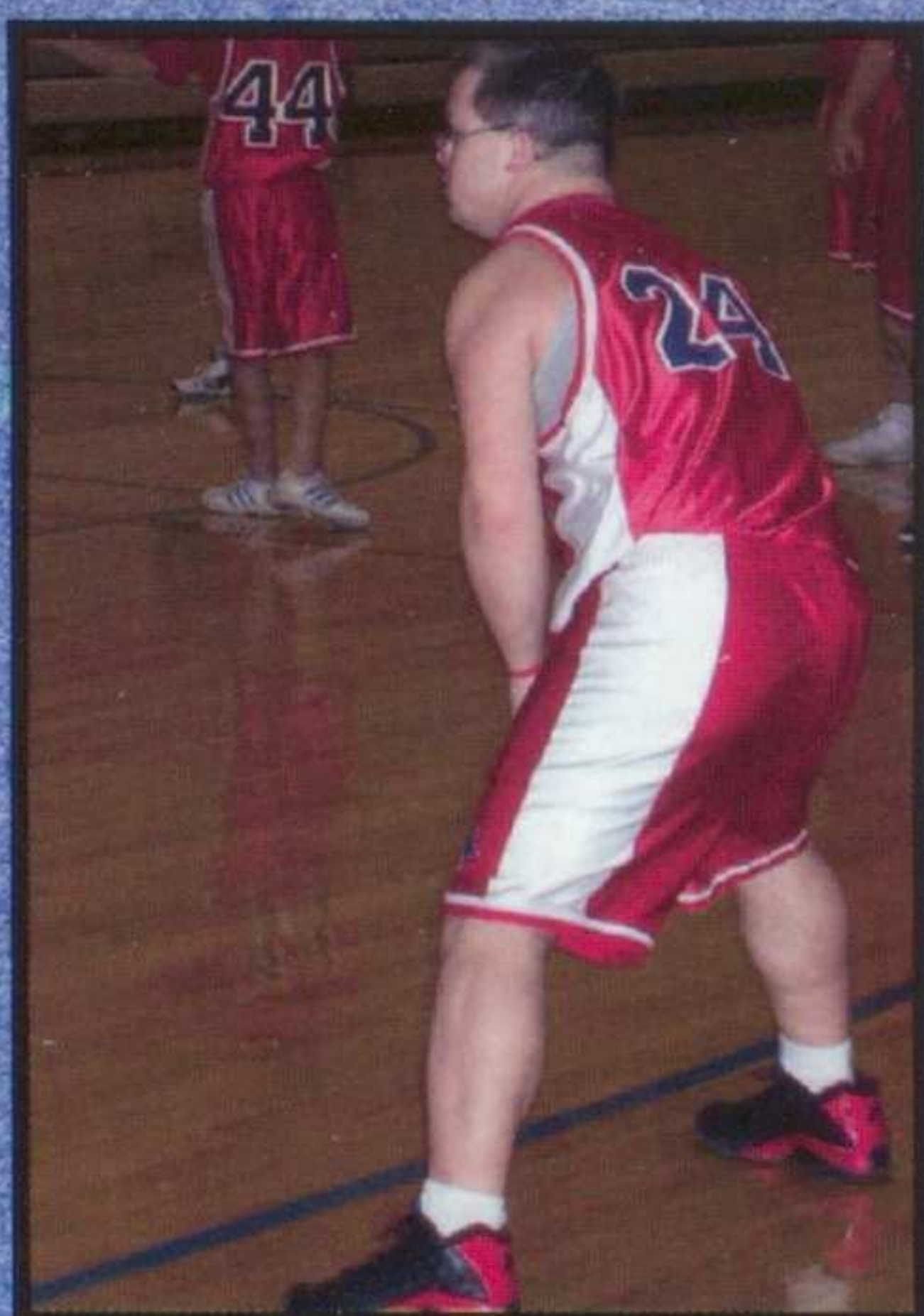

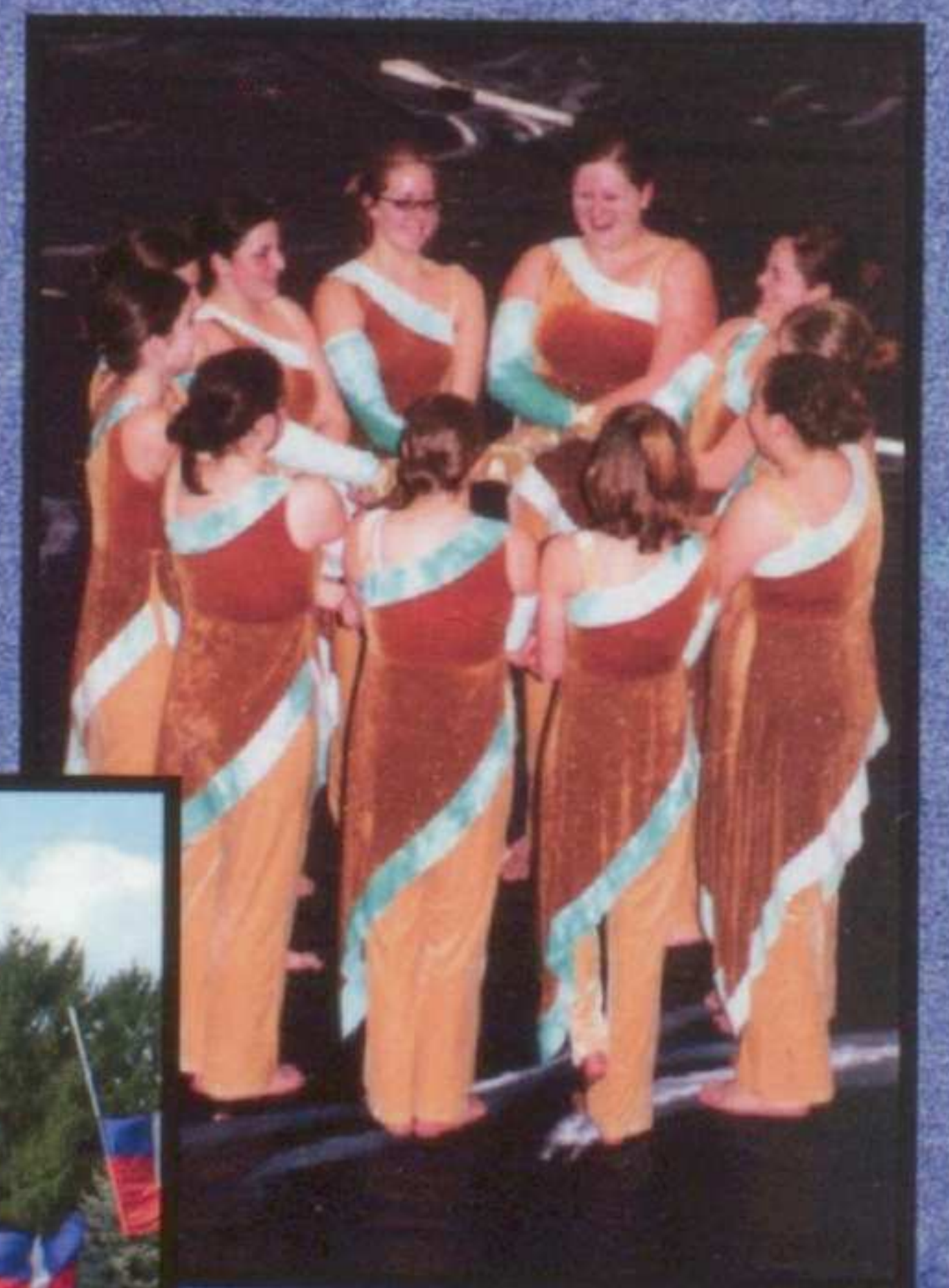

String and Symphonic Orchestras

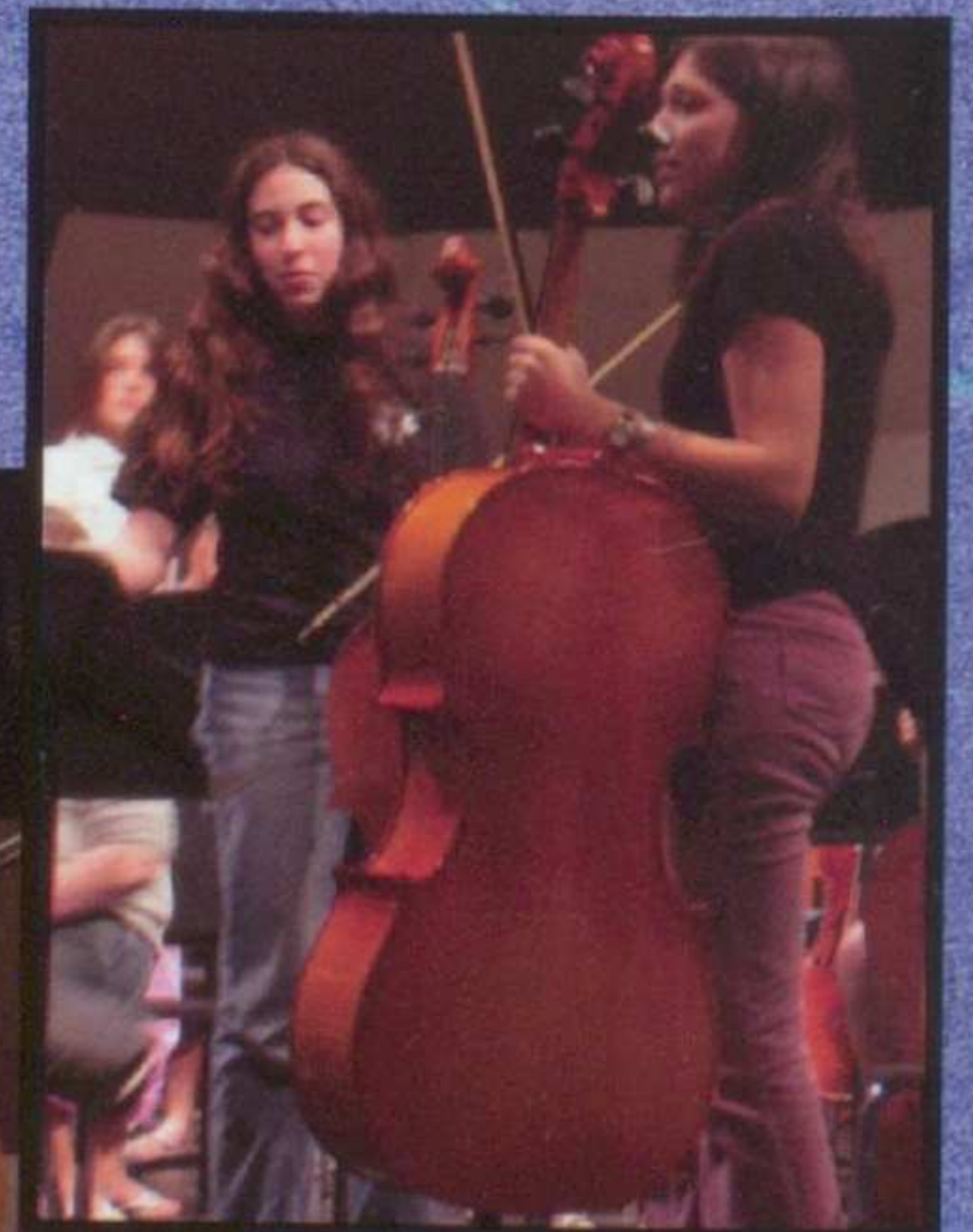

Symphonic Band

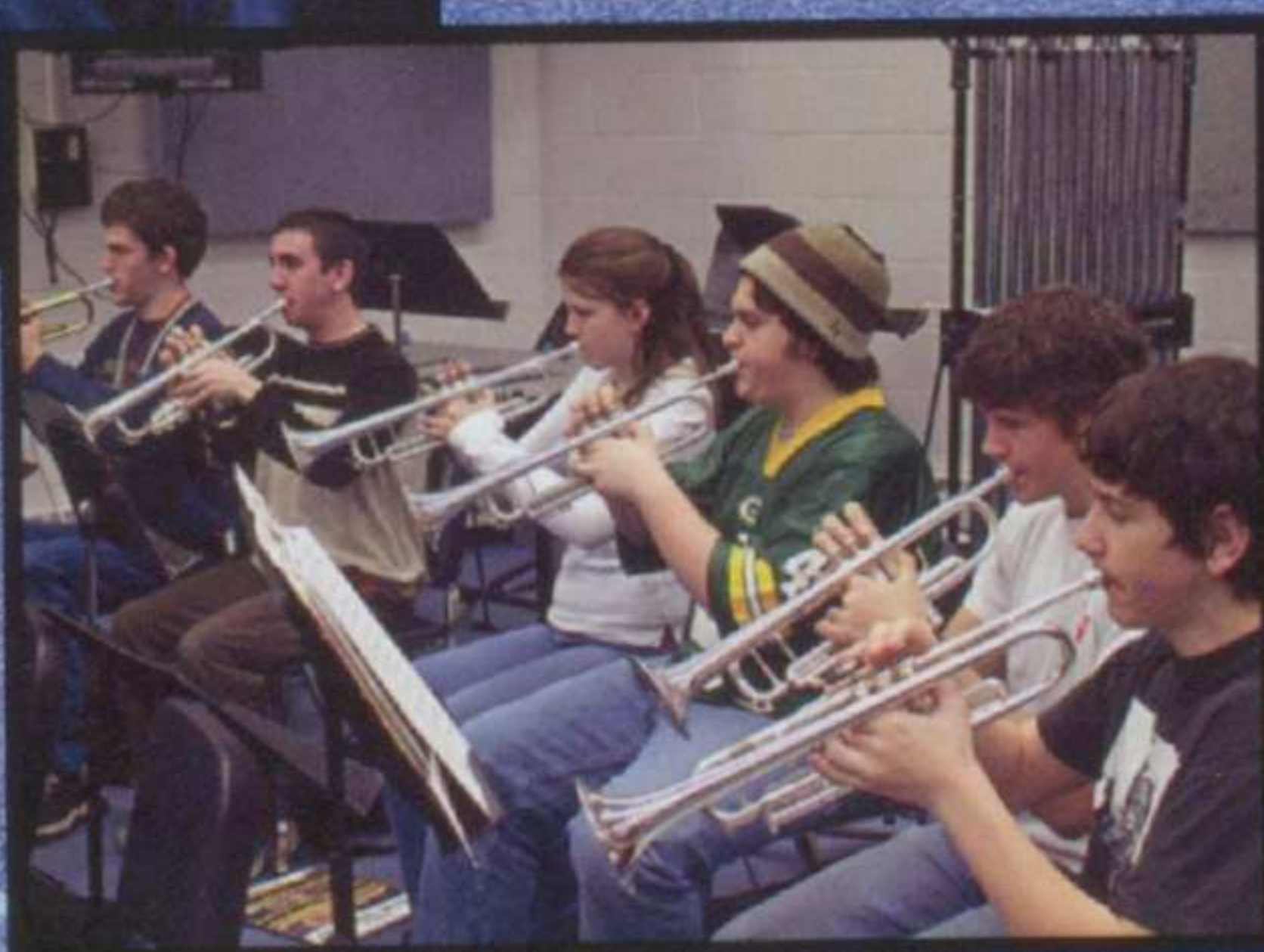

Concert Choir

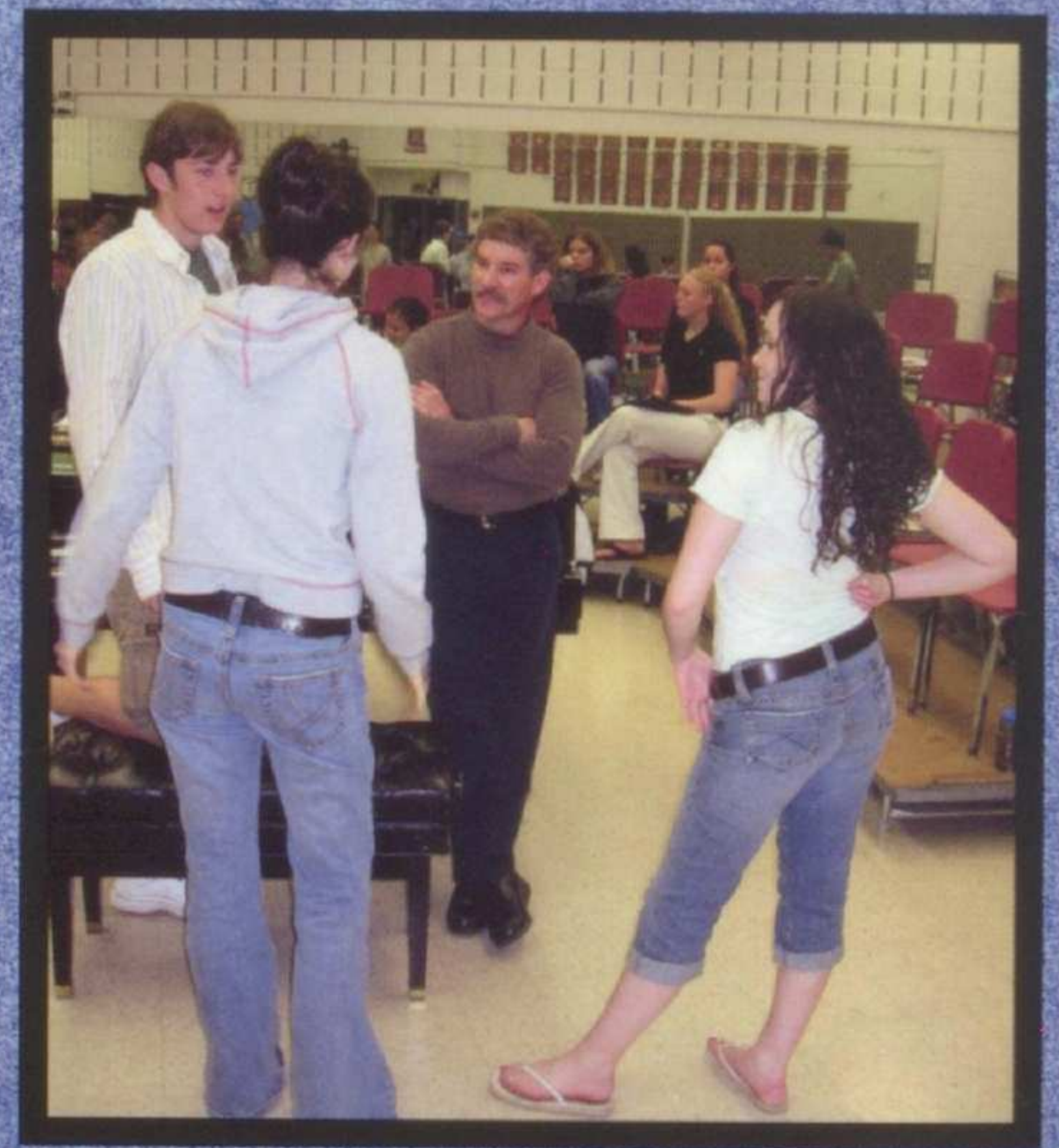

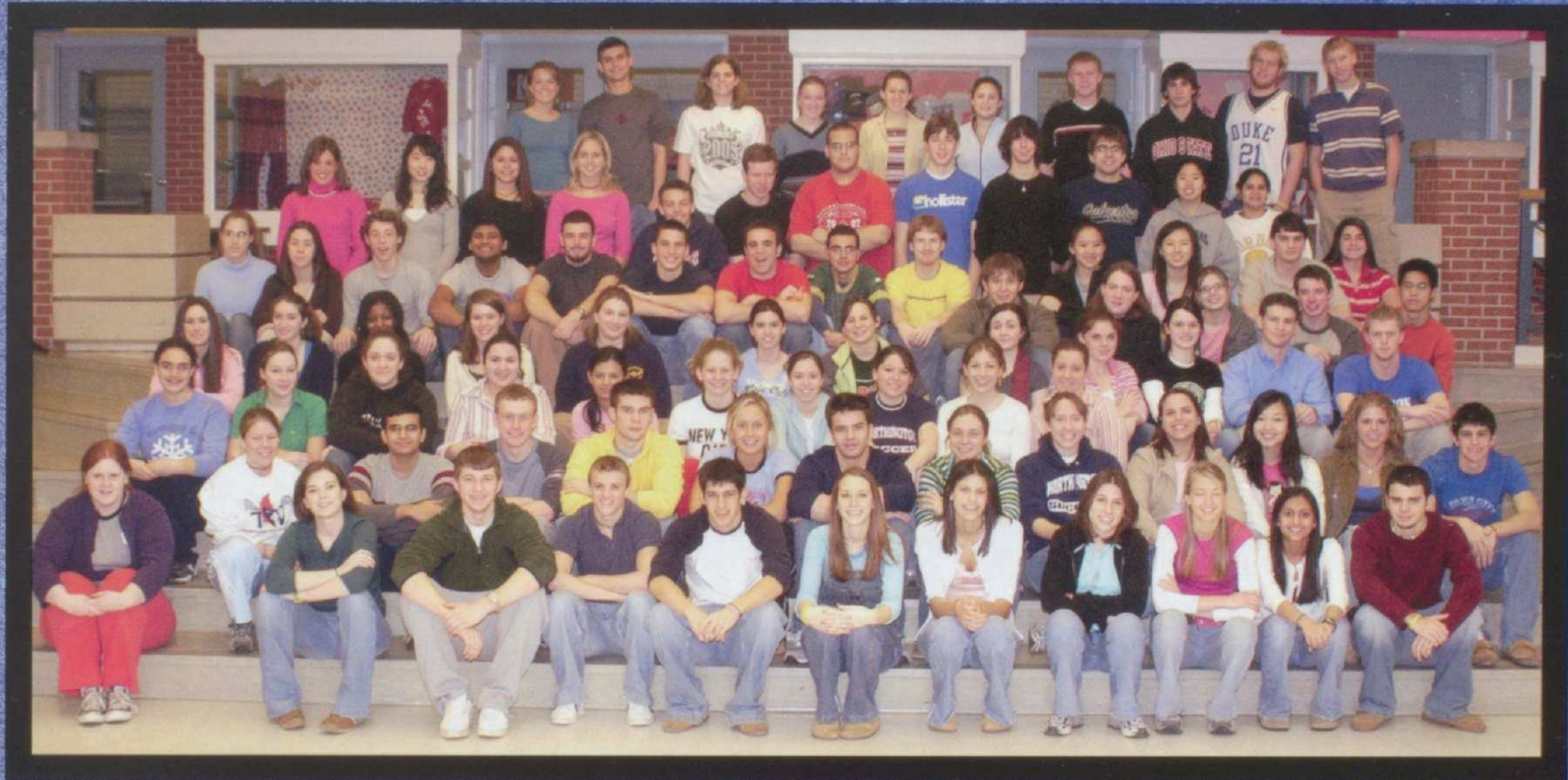
